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

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PROCEEDINGS

The Twenty-second Annual Session of the State Convention of the Free Will Baptist of North Carolina, convened with the church at Micro, Johnston County, N. C. on Tuesday Sept. 11 at 10 o'clock A. M. The Convention was opened with song: "Foot Prints of Jesus." The devotional exercises were led by Rev. W. M. Ferrell, who offered a very earnest prayer for the success of the Convention.

A testimonial meeting was conducted for ten minutes in which many of the brethren gave evidence of their faith in Christ and a determination to press forward to the goal that was set before them.

Rev. R. N. Hinnant of Micro led the song service through the entire three days session of the Convention, exhibiting the greatest interest.

Rev. H. R. Faircloth led in a fervent prayer followed by the song, "When the Roll is Called up Yonder."

The president of the Convention made some very appropriate remarks referring briefly to the names of some noted Free Will Baptist ministers who have passed to the beyond during the past two decades, namely; P. T. Lucas, Frank Casey, Doc. and C. M. Johnson, R. V. Self, B. B. Deans A. B. Peavy, Galis Little, J. R. McCaskey. These names are on banners, each name separate behind the chancel in the splendid auditorium of the church. He gave a brief eulogy of each name and cited to them as worthy of our immitation in the Christian warfare.

Rev. W. L. Moretz of the French Broad Association spoke of the growth and development that is being carried on in the mountain section of the state. He like many others who attended the convention, spoke in the most complimentary terms of the elegant church building that the brethren of Micro church have erected at a cost of several thousand dollars.

The introductory sermon was preached by Rev. C. J. Harris of Green-ville, N. C. Suject: The Great Commission; the power behind it; and the great company of those that published it. Of course his subject was from the words of the Master as recorded in Mark 16: 15, 16 and in other of the Gospels: "Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature. He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved; but he that believeth not shall be damned." Every part of the subject was fully developed and all admitted that the subject though a great one was handled in a masterly way, making apparently a very profound impression. The sermon was followed by the song, "I'll go where you want me to go etc." Benediction by J. C. Griffin.

TUESDAY AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Convention opened with song: The Wondrous Story. Prayer by Rev. Henry Melvin. This was followed by a duet by Mrs. N. D. Wiggs and Mrs Hubert Banks, "List to the Voice of the Saviour." Devotional services led by Rev. N. D. Wiggs with Scripture reading and prayer.

Song, "What a Wonderful Saviour to me," was sung. Benediction by Bro. R. P. Johnson.

TUESDAY NIGHT

A number of songs were sung in the opening of the service led by Rev. R. N. Hinnant. Scripture reading by J. C. Griffin.

The devotional services were conducted in a very impressive manner by Rev. H. R. Faircloth, who in the absence of Rev. W. R. Coats who was assigned the subject: "The Office Work of the Holy Spirit," took the subject in hand and showed very plainly many of the officers of the Holy Spirit regarding both the saint and the sinner. A large audience was in attendance and the benediction was pronounced by the Rev. J. C. Griffin.

WEDNESDAY MORNING

Convention assembled at 9:30 o'clock. The opening song was "Faith of our Fathers." The devotional services were led by Rev. W. K. Jordan of Durham, N. C. Who read the 103 Psalm. Prayer was offered by Rev. J. K. Ruffin of Bailey, N. C.

A goodly number of ministers and delegates were enrolled that were not present on the first day, but the clerk has combined the names of all the ministers and delegates in one place, so they will be found on the first pages of the minutes.

The president appointed Elds. W. R. Williams, L. H. Wetherington and Henry Melvin a finance committee for this session.

The Convention sang at this time, "The Way of the Cross leads home." At this time Jesse P. Barrow of Chicago, Ill., came forward and made some remarks regarding his taking charge of a Bible School at Smithfield, N. C. as has been previously mentioned. His talk at this time was very limited.

A quartet from the Middlesex Orphanage composed of four small girls came forward and rendered some very impressive songs. Miss Zella Frances Brewer presided at the piano.

A strong plea for the Orphanage was made by Rev. J. W Alford of Kenly, N. C. He emphasized the fact that 25cts. per head from the members of the Free Will Baptist Church in North Carolina would meet all the requirements of the Home and soon liquidate all the claims against the institution. This would pay off the \$1200,00 indebtedness and pay the faculty in full for their services to the present time. He insisted upon loyalty by all the pastors and laymen. Following the talk a collection was / taken for the Home amounting to \$66.78.

The reports of the different meetings of the Executive Committee were read by the Secretary and approved by the body as follows:

On motion the Central Conference be received back into the State Convention in full fellowship.

In view of complaints having been made to the First Union Meeting District of the Western Conference, concerning the management of the Orphanage at Middlesex, a motion was made to appoint a committe to go to the Orphanage and make a thorough investigation of the same and report their findings to the Orphanage Board on January 18th, 1934.

MEETING OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE STATE CONVENTION

The Executive Committee of the North Carolina Free Will Baptist State Convention, met in session at the Goldsboro Free Will Baptist Church on January 25th., 1934.

Committee's Report

We your comm. appointed by the Exec. Comm. of the State Convention to investigate certain allegations and complaints made by certain brethren at last session of the first Union Meeting of the Western Conference beg to submit the following report:

We, the undersigned, met at the Home on Jan. 17th, at 10:30 o'clock, and we found the general condition of the Home to be excellent, taking into consideration the handicap under which our Supt., has been forced to labor. We recognize the fact that there are many improvements that could be made, if he had the funds with which to make them.

We have also compared the operation of the Home from a financial standpoint with other like institutions, and find the same very commendable; our Home being operated at a much less per capita cost.

We recognize the great need for more milk cows, and we recommend that the Board make arrangements for the purchase of at least five more good milkers.

We find 17 hogs in good condition for pork, and the balance in fair shape for the winter.

We also inspected all cows at the Home, and find them to be in as good condition as the average.

From our findings here today, we your committee, do heartily recommend the working of your honorable Board and Supt.

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The above named committee were appointed by the president to make investigation demanded in the report.

"I will sing the wondrous story; and "When the roll is called up yonder" was sung by the audience.

A special message in song was delivered by Miss Johnnie Watson of Pine Level, accompanied by Mrs. S. H. Styron at the piano, and Mr. Harvey Creech violinist. This was followed by a duet, Miss Johnnie Watson, soprano; Miss Bertha Rose, contralto; with Mrs. R. N. Hinnant, pianist. Song: "Take your burden to the Lord and leave it there."

Rev. J. C. Griffin spoke a few minutes with reference to Rev. M. L. Hollis of Red Bay, Ala. who followed and preached. Subject: "The Race of Life." Text: Heb. 12:1, 2. Rev. Hollis indeed preached a wonderful sermon. The one who enters this race must be free of all encumbrances. The essentials equipments for this race are (1) hope; (2) faith; (3) courage; (4) patience. He must have on sandals and he must have food for his journey, and he should never take his eyes off the goal, which is Christ Jesus our Lord. Bro. Hollis seems to be a man filled with the Holy Spirit. He has a fine delivery, and seems to have a burning zeal for the kingdom of God. It is reported of him that he has baptist several thousands persons in the course of his ministry. His sermon was received with marked interest by a vast audience.

Following the sermon and a great handshake extended to Bro. Hollis, the benediction for the morning hour was given by the venerable J. H. Worley of Selma, N. C.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON

The afternoon session opened with the song, "The fight is on" etc. A most touching message in song was rendered by Miss Bertha Rose of Goldsboro. Song: "Follow Me."

Rev. J. W. Alford gave a very short eulogy upon the lives of some of our departed heroes, something similar to what was said by Eld. Styron on the first day. He spoke very highly of the lives of Elds. P. T. Lucas, Frank Casey, R. V. Self, A. B. Peavy, Doc. Johnson and Cyrus M. Johnson, B. B. Deans, Calis Little, J. R. McCaskey. He spoke freely of how they used their lives for the glory of God and the good of humanity. Though dead they yet speak. Their names are memorialized in the Micro Church.

Special prayer was made for Sister Georgia Frost Barnes, the direct survivor of the lamented Eld. W. H. Frost. Sister Barnes was at the time of the convention in Duke Hospital for an operation.

Devotional services were conducted by Rev. W. L. Jernigan. He spake of leaving undone what we should have done. He stressed the sin of omission as being very grievious in the sight of our Master.

Bro. D. W. Parker was elected on the Orphanage Board to succeed himself.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF THE ORPHANAGE

To the N. C. State Convention of Free Wil Baptist, Greetings: The

Orphanage Board presents a summary of the years activities which we hope will meet with your approval.

During the year the Board has held six meetings, one at the State Convention and five at the Home, and transacted the various items of business that came to their attention regarding the Home.

There has been thirty-one applications presented to the Board during the year, ten were admitted, sixteen rejected, four pending, and one waiting to be called. There has been six released from the Home during the year. All of this number have become of age. It is our policy to stay in touch with all the children that leave the Home for any reason, in order that we may know just how they are being cared for, and to let them know that the Institution is still interested in them and loves them.

The Health condition at the Home for the past year has been excellent. We have had a few cases that required medical attention and had only one that required hospital attention. Dr. E. C. Powel of Middlesex is the family physician. He has never presented the Home with a bill. This is indeed a great gift, and we are very grateful to Dr. Powell for his service. Dr. Barnes and Dr. Blackshear of Wilson, N. C. have contributed largely to the Institution, in that of rendering service without compensation. Dr. Massey of Zebulon has also rendered his service at very little cost. We greatly appreciate each and every favor they have shown.

There has been several improvements made at the Home during the past year. We are now remodeling a dwelling that had greatly depreciated in value. There is much more repair work we are hoping to begin on right away. We would appreciate a visit from you, that you might see exactly what has been done, and in what way you could help in the future. It is your Home, and we are anxious for you to know more about it.

Your Superintendent pleads with all of you for a unanimous co-operation for the support of that Home. During the year we have had 28,835 days of fare, and served 86,505 meals to dependent children. We have given them every religious and educational advantage possible. We wish to, be efficient in the coming year, however, than we have in the past, and with your support and prayers we will continue to have a Home of which you will be greatly proud, and one that will meet the approval of the One above, who is the Giver of all good gifts.

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS OF THE NORTH CAROLINA STATE CONVENTION OF THE ORIGINAL FREE WILL BAPTIST CHURCH.

PREAMBLE

We, the Original Free Will Baptists of North Carolina, assembled in order to advance, promote and increase the cause of Jesus Christ, do establish and ordain this Constitution and these By-Laws.

CONSTITUTION Article I.

Section 1. This assembly shall be known as the North Carolina State Convention of the Original Free Will Baptist church of Jesus Christ.

Article II.

Section 1. The officers of the Convention shall be President, Vice-President, Recording Secretary, Field Secretary, Treasurer and Executive Board.

Section 2. The Convention shall be composed of all the ordained ministers belonging to the Convention; one delegate from each church in good standing; one delegate from each Union Meeting, Conference and Association in good standing for every one thousand members or a fraction thereof.

BY-LAWS

Article I.

Section 1. It shall be the duty of the President to preside over each session, preserve order, govern the body according to established parliamentary usage and appoint all temporary committees. He shall have the power to declare any office of the Convention vacant, temporarily, subject to the approval of the Executive Committee.

Section 2. The duties of the Vice-President shall be the duties of the President when that officer is not present.

Section 3. The Recording secretary shall keep an accurate record of the transactions of the Convention and preserve the same, keep all valuable documents and surrender the same to his successor in office.

Section 4. The Field Secretary shall have charge of preparing statistical tables showing the increase or decrease in membership, church property, etc., and read at each session of the Annual Convention and refer same to the Recording Secretary for permanent record. He shall have charge of placing all the work of the Convention before the various Conferences and Associations. Also the Field work in general.

Section 5. All money belonging to the Convention shall be kept by the Treasurer and paid out by him only by order of the Convention. Bills not having been voted to be paid either by the Convention or its Executive Board must be signed by the President and Recording Secretary before being paid by him.

Section 6. The work of the Executive Board shall be that of the Convention when the Convention is not in session and to call extra sessions when such becomes necessary. It shall have the authority to suspend any office: of the Convention when he or she proves a failure in official duties,

proves non-Christian in official or any other work or detrimental to the cause of Christ and appoint others to fill the vacancy; also fill vacancies made by any other cause. Officers thus appointed shall hold office until the next regular session of the Convention. This Board shall be composed of the President, Recording Secretary, Field Secretary, Treasurer and Chairman of all standing boards of the Convention.

Section 7. The President and Field Secretary of the Convention shall be ex-officio members of all Boards.

Article II.

Section 1. The method of the Convention shall be to departmentalize the work and place at the head of each department a Board which shall be governed by certain rules adopted by the Convention.

Section 2. Delegates from churches, Union Meetings, Conferences and Associations shall answer to roll calls and serve in whatever capacity they may be called upon by the Convention. They shall have the right to speak on any subject before the Convention by first addressing the President and obtaining the floor.

Article III.

The following named Boards shall be elected in the following manner: Section 1. Orphanage Board. The Board of Trustees for the management and control of the Free Will Baptist Orphan Home at Middlesex, N. C., shall be composed of five members elected for a period of five years; the office of one member expiring each year and another elected by the Convention to fill the vacancy.

Section 2. Board of Finance. The Board of Finance shall be composed of six members elected for a term of three years with two members retiring each years and others elected by th Convention to fill the vacancy.

Section 3. Board of Superannuation. The Board of Superannuation shall be composed of six members elected for a term of three years with two members retiring each year and others elected by the Convention to fill the vacancy.

Section 4. Board of Missions. The Board of Missions shall be composed of six members elected for a term of two years with three members retiring each year and others elected by the Convention to fill the vacancy.

Section 5. Church Extension Board. The Church Extension Board shall be composed of five members retiring each year and others elected by the Convention to fill the vacancy.

Section 6. Board of Auditors. The Board of Auditors shall be composed of two members elected annually.

Section 7. Board of Surveyors. The Board of Surveyors shall be composed of three members elected annually.

AMENDMENTS.

This Constitutes and these By-Laws shall not be changed or altered only by a two-thirds vote of members present in a regular session. All amendments shall lie on the table not less than six hours prior to adoption and shall during that time be read not less than twice in open Convention.


