## PROCEEDINGS

#### MAY 18, 1955

The convention was called to order by the president, Mrs. Carl Dudley, and the congregation was led in singing "Jesus Calls Us" by the Rev. Ralph Staten of Belmont.

The opening devotions were conducted by Mrs. Ralph Staten.

Mrs. Roy Rikard welcomed the delegates and visitors to the Cramerton Free Will Baptist Church and the Piedmont district. The response was given by Mrs. Robert Crawford of Greenville, N. C., president of The National Auxiliary Convention.

The girls' trio from the Cramerton church rendered a special message in song. In the absence of Mrs. Bagley Morris, the president proceeded with the stewardship declamation contest. The following were appointed as judges for the contest: the Rev. Ralph Staten, Mrs. Robert Crawford and the Rev. Raymond T. Sasser.

Each of the declarations was a challenging and inspiring message and each girl presented her message in a very creditable manner. Every listener received great blessings from these messages.

Mrs. J. C. Moye, music director for this session, led the congregation in singing "Glory to His Name."

The Rev. Burkette Raper, president of Mount Allen Junior College, introduced the speaker of the evening, Mrs. J. A. Alexander of Portsmouth, Va.

Mrs. Alexander used as a basis for her message the Scripture as recorded in Acts 12:24, 25 and Acts 13:1-4. She urged each one to, "Know what God's will for your life is and then do what He lays on your heart to do. Let the Holy Ghost lead you into declaring His glory at home and among all nations."

After the message of the evening, the judges announced the winner of the declamation contest. Contestant No. 5, Elaine Leonard of the Pee Dee district, was declared winner and No. 2, Dorothy Parker of the Cape Fear district, was second.

The evening session was dismissed with prayer by Mrs. Walter Carter.

#### THURSDAY MORNING, MAY 19, 1955

The morning session was opened by the congregation singing "More Love to Thee, O Christ," Mrs. L. E. Ballard led the morning devotions which were followed with prayer by the Rev. Lee Whaley.

Mrs. Robert Crawford, president of the National auxiliary convention, was recognized at this time.

The following ministers were welcomed and recognized: the Reverends Ralph Staten, Walter Carter, Lee Whaley, Carey Cheshire, Arnold C. Alford, B. L. Shook, L. D. Gray, John Cansler, Charles Keith, Henry Melvin, R. H. Jackson, N. Bruce Barrow, Seldon Bullard, Raymond T. Sasser, Roy Rikard, J. E. Wooten and James A. Evans.

The following committees were appointed:

Finance: Mrs. M. A. Woodard, chairman; Mrs. Ethel Whaley; Mrs. Walter Heath.

Resolutions: Mrs. J. C. Sasser, chairman; Mrs. B. L. Shook; Mrs. W. L. Davenport.

Courtesy: Mrs. Charles Ferrell, chairman; Mrs. James A. Evans; Mrs. Houston Crumpler.

Minutes of the executive board meetings were read by the secretary. Motion was made to accept these minutes, except the regulations concerning study courses in the January 27 minutes, which were to be referred to the resolutions committee and be acted on later in the business session. Motion carried.

Mrs. Archie Willoughby, program chairman, urged that we do more to glorify Christ through our auxiliary programs. "In order to do this we must give them more work, study and prayer," she stated. She urged that the program chairman take her work more seriously and plan her programs with a higher objective in mind, seeking to stir up the God given talents of her members and helping them to find the place of service for which they are best fitted. Some talents may be small and some large, but even the least, if used, will glorify Christ.

Mrs. Albert Coates, benevolence chairman, made the following recommendations:

- 1. That each auxiliary include in its budget monthly support of the super-annuation program.
- 2. That each auxiliary carry on some definitely planned program of benevolence each month.
- 3. That we begin to think and plan for the future when we might provide more ably for the needs of our retired ministers and their widows.
- Mrs. L. E. Ballard, director of Woman's Conference at Cragmont, gave her report of the 1954 conference. (See report.)

The Rev. Burkette Raper, president of Mount Allen Junior College, spoke in behalf of the college, urging our continued support of the institution. He reported very favorably on the vacation Bible school clinic held the first three Tuesday nights in May. He reported an average attendance of over 260. It was also announced that the closing exercises for the first year of the school in Mount Olive would take place on Friday night, May 27.

Mrs. Hattie Adcox, field worker, spoke briefly on "Glorifying Christ Through Organization." She gave her report as field worker and urged that those needing her assistance call her because she can do only as she is called upon. She reported Mrs. L. E. Ballard and Mrs. J. C. Griffin had assisted her this year in filling this office. (See report.)

Mrs. Walter Carter, enlistment chairman, recommends: That we pray the Lord of the harvest to send forth labourers, and as we pray, make personal contacts (Matthew 20:1-8). "As long as there are those who are not enlisted, a duty is ours to perform," she stated. She also said, "It is not by power nor by might but by my spirit, saith the Lord." Work done in His spirit will glorify Him. Personal contact is the best tool of enlistment.

Mrs. J. C. Moye, orphanage chairman, thanked everyone for the splendid support given the orphanage, and urged continued support and loyalty to that institution. She stated that there are seventy-five children in the home and about one hundred applicants waiting and wanting to enter the home. She asked that all auxiliaries in North Carolina send money to the improvement fund to be used to cover the dining hall floor and remodel the old girls' dormitory, which will make room for more children. Mrs. Moye introduced the Rev. R. H. Jackson, the new superintendent, who brought greetings from the orphanage, and asked for our prayers and support. An offering was received in the amount of \$37.79, for the orphanage.

The Rev. J. E. Wooten brought greetings from Cragmont Assembly, and gave the schedule of the summer assemblies with directors for each. He brought to our attention the fact that another note will soon be due, and that Cragmont needs our support. The Rev. J. A. Evans, president of Cragmont Assembly, Inc., presented the secretary with a copy of the institution's auditor's report.

A motion was carried to dismiss for lunch and have business session in the afternoon.

#### THURSDAY AFTERNOON, MAY 19, 1955

Congregational singing of the hymn "Praise H'm! Praise Him!" opened the afternoon session.

A memorial service for those auxiliary members who had passed away since our last convention was conducted by Mrs. Bruce Barrow. Mrs. J. C. Moye and Mrs. J. C. Sasser climaxed the service by singing "Beyond the Sunset."

The convention business session was called to order and reports were made by the following: president, secretary, treasurer, finance, courtesy and resolutions committees. (See reports.) All reports were accepted by motion duly made and carried, with the exception of Item 5 of the resolutions committee report.

Motion was made and carried to table Item 5 of the resolutions committee report until after the new national guidebook has been printed. Mrs. Crawford reported this would be available very soon.

A motion was carried to let the executive committee appoint or elect a Cragmont stockholder representative for our convention. The stockholders representing our convention, and the year their term of office expires are as follows: Mrs. M. E. Godwin, 1955; Mrs. Walter Rhodes, 1956; and Mrs. J. C. Moye, 1957.

Mrs. Roy Rikard and Mrs. Flora Morgan were appointed as delegates to the national convention which convenes in Tulsa, Oklahoma, in July. Each will receive \$15.00 to help defray her expenses. Others who plan to attend any may serve as delegates are: Mrs. Ralph Staten, Mrs. W. H. Calvert, Mrs. William Calvert, Mrs. L. E. Ballard, Mrs. John Cansler, and Mrs. Archie Willoughby. It was pointed out that we are allowed ten delegates, but the convention could not afford expense accounts for that many.

A motion was carried to adjourn. We were dismissed with prayer by the Rev. Walter Carter.

#### Enlistment and Promotional Work:

Number members enrolled at beginning of convention year, 3,458; number new members, 472; present enrollment, 3,721; average attendance, 2,640. Enlistment Work to Win New Members:

#### REPORT OF WOMAN'S CONFERENCE FOR 1954

There were 36 registered, one house guest, 5 staff members and 20 visitors, making a total of 62 persons. These came from nine districts of our state. Although this was not as large a group as we usually have at the August conferences, it was the best. Each year, it seems that our conferences climax all past sessions. Truly, as always, God's presence was real and precious to each heart as the spirit-filled teachers of prayer was used by Mrs. Ethel Whaley, who led in the establishment of a "prayer-band" which we trust will spread to every church and person in our church to the end that our church shall experience an old-time revival throughout the world. Mrs. W. C. Jackson, Black Creek, N. C., was chosen as promotional secretary for this group. If you are interested please write her.

The challenging subject of "stewardship" was impressively presented by Mrs. Clement Sullivan, while Mrs. Ballard and Mrs. J. C. Griffin conducted forums on "The Auxiliary Guidebook." Many pertinent questions were cleared for all present.

The book of Colossians was taught in Mrs. Harold Stevens' usual pleasing

and convincing manner. Everything in the lives of those attending took second place as she set forth the need to let Christ have *pre-eminence* in our lives if we are to glorify Him and bring forth fruits of righteousness.

A spiritual and physical blessing came in the mountain top experience on Mt. Mitchell, Saturday, the 21st. Dinner was prepared on and around a campfire under a shelter provided. A very cold rain fell while we enjoyed a warm spiritual refreshing in a service in which Mrs. Whaley led the singing and the Rev. Harold Stevens brought the message that stirred all hearts.

Each evening session was a missionary service. The Rev. and Mrs. Stevens shared these. Their messages in film and word constrained each of us to leave our places of spiritual content and move out into places of spiritual attainment through yielding our lives more fully to live, to pray, to give, to go, to the ends of the earth. The Sunday evening service climaxed the week's services with a candle-light service in which every person lighted her neighbor's candle around a huge circle, which symbolized the lighting of the candle of needy lives around the world through the redeeming grace of our Lord and Saviour Jesus. As we lighted the candles we pledged our best to Jesus through the coming year. Miss Ada Beth Hickman, one of our Nashville Bible College students, sang during the lighting of the candles, "The Light of the World is Jesus."

During the sessions, the trio and quartet from Jacksonville sang. Sunday morning we went to Sunday school and church services at Marion where the Rev. J. E. Floyd is pastor. The women taught many of the classes and conducted the 11 o'clock service when Mrs. Whaley brought the message of the hour, through which hearts were blessed.

#### EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING

#### Free Will Baptist Orphanage, Middlesex, N. C.

#### September 15, 1954

The Executive committee of the North Carolina State Woman's Auxiliary Convention met at the Free Will Baptist Orphanage in Middlesex, N. C., on September 15, 1954.

## Requirements for Study Course to be A-1 in State of North Carolina Woman's Auxiliary

- 1. Every member must study book.
- 2. A definite time set for teaching the book. (Minimum time, 2 hours, and longer when book length demands it. Time depends on length of book.)

Suggestions for varied ways to have a study course: A guest speaker, who will teach the book; several of your own women, who have prepared a definite part of the book or course to be taught; invite your minister to teach one course; or your study course chairman to teach the book in an interesting and informative manner.

Plan for an all day session at the church with a covered dish luncheon, or an evening session to be begun with a 6 o'clock supper and study not to begin later than 7 p. m. Teach the book one hour on one evening each week until completed.

Where there are several churches within a radius of ten miles, let the study course chairmen get together and plan a joint course with all the auxiliaries nearby—a good leader in one church can use her own initiative in planning with others and publicizing such a course very effectively.

- 3. At least 50 per cent of the active membership must attend.
- 4. Have group participation based on questions presented by leader for the benefit of those who have not been able to attend every class. (This could be called an oral examination.)
- 5. Six (6) books or courses are required during twelve months. The following types are suggested for a well balanced year of study: 1. missionaries, home or foreign; 2. stewardship; 3. guide book and plan of work by the Woman's National Auxiliary Convention in Year Book of Programs; 4. devotional books on prayer, soul winning, child evangelism or a book in the Bible.
