

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PROCEEDINGS

Minutes of the thirty-first annual session of the North Carolina Free Will Baptist Woman's Auxiliary Convention, convening with Free Union Free Will Baptist Church, Greene County, May 22, 1958.

Theme: "... I have set thee a watchman ..." (Ezekiel 33:7).

The convention was called to order by the president, Mrs. Carl Dudley, and the congregation was led in the singing of the opening hymn by Mrs. L. E. Ballard.

Mrs. Paul Thigpen led in the opening devotions using Ezekiel 33:7 as her Scripture.

We were welcomed to Free Union Church and the Central District by Mrs. Albert Proctor, Central District president. Mrs. Lonnie Davenport, president of the Albemarle District, responded.

Mrs. Carl Dudley, the president, brought her message, "Watchmen in Action," at this time.

Executive committee meeting minutes were read and approved.

In the absence of Mrs. H. L. Spivey, Mrs. J. C. Moye reported that investigations have been made concerning auxiliary pins. She stated that 10k gold pins would cost \$5.50, life awards \$3.50, 1/10 10k gold pins \$1.55, and another pin \$1.00.

Mrs. J. C. Moye made a motion that the convention appropriate \$125.00 for dies for auxiliary pins and life membership awards. The motion was carried.

The Rev. Joe Fort reported that the Anna Phillips Loan Fund charts will be ready in a few days and may be ordered directly from the press.

Delegates to the National Convention were appointed as follows: Mrs. Robert Crawford, Mrs. Henry Van Kluyve, Mrs. Burkette Raper, Mrs. D. W. Hansley, Mrs. J. C. Griffin, Mrs. L. E. Ballard, Mrs. Cecil Campbell, Mrs. Walter Carter.

Mrs. Robert Crawford made a motion that the convention contribute toward the expenses of our president and field worker to the National Convention. This motion was carried.

The Rev. Burkette Raper spoke on behalf of Mount Olive College. He made an urgent plea for contributions from both auxiliaries and individuals to be sent in before June 30. He also showed a picture plate of the college which, with the hanger, sells for \$2.50. Mr. Raper urged that auxiliaries take them on consignment and sell them for the benefit of the college. The Memorial Education Loan Fund was also explained. Those contributing \$100.00 or more may memorialize some friend or loved one by having their name engraved on a brass plaque which is kept on display at the college.

Mrs. P. L. Barrow rendered a special number at this time, "It Was for Me."

Mrs. J. C. Moye presented Mrs. S. A. Smith who in turn presented a group of children from the Children's Home. The children sang "He Holds My Hand." The Rev. S. A. Smith pleaded for special contributions to the home in May because of the very urgent need for funds. While the children sang, "I Want My Life to Tell for Jesus," an offering was received in the amount of \$114.16.

The Rev. J. C. Griffin presented the speaker of the day, the Rev. Robert Edwards. His message, "The Imperative Need of Watchmen," was very challenging, inspiring and soul searching. He said that one chief need is a concern for lost souls and the obedience to God's command to go ye into all the world.

Benediction and grace was pronounced by the Rev. Henry Melvin.

AFTERNOON SESSION

The afternoon session was opened by congregational singing of the hymn, "Sweet By and By."

Mrs. J. K. Rhodes conducted a memorial service at this time. A cross with eight candles, representing those in the eight districts who had gone to meet their reward during the past year, was on the table. Appropriate selected Scriptures were read and Mrs. J. C. Moye sang "No Night There."

Mrs. Robert Crawford presented the state winners of the declamation contest, Miss Linda Higgins, G. T. A. winner, Smithfield Church, Cape Fear District; and Miss Genevieve Johnson, Y. P. A. winner, Smithfield Church, Cape Fear District. These young people will represent North Carolina at the National Convention in July.

The Rev. Wilbert Everton represented the cause of superannuation.

The Rev. Herbert Waid, missionary candidate to Japan, spoke briefly and stated that he and his wife expect to be in language school in Japan early in September. He pleaded for the prayers and earnest support, in every way, of those who stay here on the home front.

Motion made and carried that the secretary wire a message of thanks to Franklin Spencer for his gifts to the Anna Phillips Loan Fund.

Motion carried that the secretary write a letter to the North Carolina State Sunday School Convention, thanking them for the week at Cragmont awarded to the winners of the declamation contest.

Motion made and carried to receive one offering for Mount Olive College.

Motion made and carried that the convention give the Rev. and Mrs. Herbert Waid \$25.00 from its home missionary fund, to aid them in getting ready to go to Japan.

Motion carried that the convention allocate \$25.00 from its home mission fund to the superannuation program.

RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE

- 1. Be it resolved: that we recommend to the North Carolina State Convention of Free Will Baptists that they sponsor a laymen's organization instead of it being sponsored only by the Woman's Auxiliary Convention.
- 2. Be it resolved: that this convention express appreciation to the State Sunday School Convention for the week at Cragmont being offered our declamation winners, and to Mount Olive Junior College for the \$50.00 scholarship being granted the Y. P. A. winner.
- 3. Be it resolved: that the executive committee be authorized to make a study of methods of publicizing the work of the State Woman's Auxiliary and to appoint an assistant editor to more effectively use the facilities of The Free Will Baptist, if the executive committee feels one is needed.
 - 4. Be it resolved:
 - (a) That Miss Juanita Dunn and Mrs. Cecil Campbell be reelected as sponsors of the State G. T. A. and Y. P. A. organizations.
 - (b) That the expense of these sponsors be paid according to the way the executive committee members are paid.
- 5. Believing that it would work out satisfactorily to both the convention and the committee, we therefore offer the following resolution:
 - (a) That we require only one member of the Anna Phillips Loan Fund Committee to be present at our executive board sessions.
- (b) That this member be the chairman of said committee, when and if possible, otherwise she be made responsible to name another member to attend in her place.

 - (b) That the director of the Cragmont Woman's Conference be a member of the executive committee of this convention.
- 7. Inasmuch as the winner of the declamation contest received a trip to the National Convention, be it resolved: That the runners-up be given \$10.00 each on a trip to a youth conference at Cragmont. In case they are unable to attend, be it recommended that a Bible not to exceed this price be given.

8. Whereas there is an urgent need for Christian colleges for our youth; and whereas Mount Olive Junior College is our own institution of Christian higher education, being sponsored by the North Carolina State Convention of Free Will Baptist Churches; therefore, Be it Resolved:

That the North Carolina State Woman's Auxiliary Convention recommend to our vacation Bible schools that they designate their offerings for Mount Olive Junior College.

Your chairmen of the various departments of woman's auxiliary work in our state, wish to submit the following recommendations for 1958. May the Lord help each of us throughout the state to ever hold His banner high and let us strive to be both "A-1" Christians and "A-1" auxiliaries.

ENLISTMENT

The following are some ideas on enlistment for our auxiliary women:

- 1. A good way to promote enlistment is to use the circle plan, as this will put more women to work.
- 2. If your auxiliary has as many as twenty members divide into circles. For information, see Pages 34-38 of your Manual for instructions.
- 3. A good way to enlist new members is for every circle chairman to attend every service of her church regularly. Contact all those who are not already enlisted. Invite them to your circle meeting (then go by for them). Then have your auxiliary put on a contest for a three month period and give a nice gift to the circle chairman having the most circle members present during the contest.
- 4. Make a list of all women in the church who are not in the auxiliary. Keep these before auxiliary and circles as a challenge. Keep a watch for new members who join the church, they are prospects, too.

Youth

The following are the resolutions I am presenting as youth chairman:

- 1. Be it resolved:
 - (a) That each district be asked to sponsor a special meeting of all youth auxiliaries once each year. These meetings are to be called "Youth Auxiliary Fellowship," as suggested by the W. N. A. C., and are to provide inspiration and fellowship for the youth auxiliary members. They will be supervised by the district youth chairman but will feature youth leadership and participation.
 - (b) That the declamation contests be conducted and essay contest be featured at these district meetings. The first and second winners in the G. T. A. contest, the Y. P. A. contest, and the essay

contest will then be presented at the District Auxiliary Convention.

- 2. Be it resolved: That the name Y. P. A.-G. T. A. Rally Day be changed to North Carolina State Youth Auxiliary Fellowship, which will continue to be held at Mount Olive Junior College each year on the third Saturday in May. The winners of the district declamation and essay contests will compete at this meeting and the first and second place winners will be presented at the State Woman's Auxiliary Convention.
- 3. Be it resolved: That the state Woman's Auxiliary Convention sponsor a Youth Auxiliary Workshop for local, district and state auxiliary youth chairmen and G. T. A. and Y. P. A. sponsors. (The time suggested is the second week in September.) Speakers on a national level should be secured. The state youth chairman, the state G. T. A. sponsor and the state Y. P. A. sponsor, along with the president of the State Auxiliary Convention will serve as program chairmen for this workshop.
- 4. Be it resolved: That the State Auxiliary Convention continue to cooperate with the Free Will Baptist Press in promoting vacation Bible school clinics.

Mrs. Robert Crawford reported on the National Convention. One particular item of interest was the fact that our G. T. A. contestant, Miss Suzanne Mallard from New Bern, was winner of the national declamation contest. Other items reported on were discussed and taken care of later in the meeting.

Motion carried that we ask each local auxiliary to have a special missionary service on Africa and present the plans as suggested by Mrs. Miley, our national president, to set in motion the raising of our quota of \$1,750 for the African Mission Station.

Motion carried that Mrs. L. E. Ballard head the campaign to promote and publicize plans for raising our quota for African missions and that the expense of same be paid from our treasury.

Motion carried to allocate the following quota to the eight districts to be raised this year for African missions: Albemarle, \$200; Central, \$400; Cape Fear, \$300; Eastern, \$150; Western, \$400; Pee Dee, \$25.00; Piedmont, \$300; Blue Ridge, \$150.

We were dismissed for lunch with prayer by the Rev. Burkette Raper.

AFTERNOON SESSION

The meeting was opened with prayer by Mrs. Walter Carter.

Motion carried that the life membership fees received this year be applied toward the furnishing of the reception room of the new girl's dormitory at Mount Olive College.

After due consideration of Item No. 1 of the resolutions committee report, page 11 of the 1957 State Convention minutes, the executive committee recommends to the convention that our present meeting date be retained.

It was announced that the state meeting this year will be held with the Central District—place to be announced later.

Motion carried that the Anna Phillips Loan Fund committee instruct the Free Will Baptist Press to reprint 500 loan fund charts and stamps.

Motion carried to authorize Mrs. James A. Evans to purchase a fire case and ledger for the use of the Anna Phillips Loan Fund committee.

Motion carried that Mrs. Lee Whaley's expense incurred in making contacts to collect delinquent and current loans be paid by our treasurer; this work to be done in connection with her itinerate missionary work.

Motion carried to allocate \$500 to the Anna Phillips Loan Fund.

Motion carried to defer the election of a treasurer for the loan fund un-

til convention time, at which time this officer will be elected along with the other state officers.

The Rev. Burkette Raper represented Mount Olive College and recommended that the eight districts in the state adopt as their project the furnishing of the new girl's dormitory—the cost to be approximately \$15,000 or \$300 per room.

Motion carried to accept the above recommendation.

Motion carried that a committee be appointed to revise the North Carolina Guidebook in accordance with the changes that have been made by the State Convention. Committee: Mrs. L. E. Ballard, Mrs. J. C. Moye, Mrs. Alice E. Lupton.

We were adjourned with prayer by Mrs. J. C. Griffin.
