

PROCEEDINGS

Minutes of the thirty-fourth annual session of the North Carolina Free Will Baptist Woman's Auxiliary Convention, convening with Elwood Lane Free Will Baptist Church, Kannapolis, N. C., May 25, 1961.

Theme: "The Power of Abounding Grace."

Scripture: "But where sin abounded, grace did much more abound" (Romans 5:20).

Thought for the Day: Thank God, while sin abounds throughout the world, grace doth much more abound. Thank God that while sin reigns in death, grace reigns through rightcousness unto eternal life, through Jesus Christ our Lord.

The convention was called to order by the vice-president, Mrs. Frank Walston. Reverend C. F. Bowen directed the hymn, "Jesus Shall Reign." Mrs. Ruth Clark Taylor was organist.

Mrs. Norvelle Dawson gave the morning devotions. Her subject was "His Grace Abounds on the Farthest Shores." She used Scripture references Acts 1:8; Mark 16:15, 16 and Acts 4:12 as a basis for her very timely remarks. The Reverend C. F. Bowen offered prayer.

Mrs. Paul Jenkins, wife of the pastor of Elwood Lane, welcomed us on behalf of the Piedmont District Auxiliary Convention as well as the host church. Mrs. J. K. Rhodes responded.

Mrs. Watson stated that she was unprepared to give a message but made brief remarks in lieu of the scheduled president's message by Mrs. J. C. Moye. Mrs. Moye's husband, the Reverend J. C. Moye, passed away Sunday prior to the convention.

The following ministers were present and were recognized: R. W. Allman, Bruce Barrow, Jesse Bone, C. F. Bowen, William Calvert, Randy Cox, Leroy Cutler, Roy Duckett, Wilbert Everton, David Hansley, R. H. Jackson, Paul Jenkins, M. L. Johnson, T. L. Osborne, Raymond T. Sasser, Wayne Smith, and M. L. Terrell.

The state and district officers were recognized, likewise the delegates, showing a good representation from all districts.

Executive committee meetings minutes were read and adopted.

A motion carried to refer the matter of a credentials committee to the executive committee.

The president read a report of her work the past year. (See reports.) Following this report, she presided until the close of the convention.

Mrs. Moye stated that life awards funds the coming year would be sent to the Children's Home. She urged each local and district auxiliary to give at least one life award each year.

A motion carried to move the date of the annual convention back to Thursday following the first Sunday in May, so as not to conflict with school closings, thereby prohibiting the attendance of declamation and essay winners in our meetings. In case of conflict with other meetings, a motion carried to empower the executive committee to change said date.

A motion carried to change the date of the State Youth Fellowship Day to the last Saturday in March; this to be held the coming year with the First Free Will Baptist Church in Smithfield. The president stated that awards to declamation and essay winners would hereafter be awarded at this meeting instead of at the Woman's Auxiliary Convention.

Mrs. R. B. Crawford, youth chairman, gave the youth report. (See reports.)

Miss Leah McGlohon, Y. P. A. sponsor, read the winning essays at this time. They were written by Glenda Adams, Y. P. A. from Smithfield Church, and Terry Brantham, G. T. A. from Goldsboro Church.

The treasurer's report was read and adopted. (See reports.)

The Reverend Wilbert Everton brought greetings from the Children's Home, after which an offering was taken for this enterprise in the amount of \$46.12. Reverend Everton gave the offertory prayer.

The congregation was directed in singing "Majestic Sweetness Sits Enthroned." The Reverend Randy Cox, pastor of the First Free Will Baptist Church, Beaufort, was the morning worship messenger. His subject was, "Abounding Grace, the Need of Our World Today." He cited us to several Scriptures from the book of Romans. He said the price of grace was Calvary; the provision was salvation; the product, a new creature; and propogaters are Christians.

The president appointed the following committees:

Courtesy: Mrs. Ralph Staten, Mrs. Norvelle Dawson, Mrs. Earl Glenn. Reverend Paul Jenkins invited us to lunch in the recreation building. Reverend Wayne Smith pronounced the benediction and grace.

Afternoon Session

The afternoon session was opened by singing the hymn, "O Zion Haste." Mrs. Felton Watson gave the devotions, using "His Grace Abounds at Our Doors" as her subject. The Scripture reference was 1 Timothy 1.

The president recognized representatives of various state enterprises and read a letter from the Reverend Walter Reynolds, representative of superannuation, who was absent. Those presenting their cause were: Reverend R. H. Jackson, State Mission Board; Reverend Bruce Barrow, Free Will Baptist Press; Reverend M. L. Johnson, Mount Olive College; Reverend Wayne Smith, Cragmont.

Mrs. L. E. Ballard gave a report on Cragmont Woman's Conference. Report adopted. (See reports.)

Greetings from Mrs. Alice E. Lupton were extended by Mrs. J. C. Griffin.

The president read a letter of resignation as G. T. A. sponsor from Mrs.

W. J. Gaskins. The resignation was accepted with regret. A motion carried that the secretary write Mrs. Gaskins a letter of gratitude for her fine work in this capacity. Mrs. Madelin Perry, Second Western District, was elected to this office.

The following reports were given and accepted: Field Worker, Secretary, Resolutions and Courtesy. (See reports.)

Mrs. L. E. Ballard was reelected to the Cragmont Stockholders Committee. Mrs. Ruth Clark Taylor was elected to the Anna Phillips Loan Fund Committee.

The following delegates were appointed to the National Woman's Auxiliary Convention at Norfolk, in July: Mrs. C. L. Patrick, Mrs. L. E. Ballard, Mrs. H. A. Pitts, Mrs. S. A. Smith, Mrs. Wayne Smith, Mrs. J. C. Griffin, Mrs. Almond Warrick, Mrs. R. B. Crawford, Mrs. Luther Kirby, Mrs. R. Y. Stephenson. Mrs. Leroy Cutler, Mrs. David Hansley and Mrs. Earl Glenn are alternates.

The report of the finance committee was given and adopted following the deletion of the allocated \$50 for delegates expenses to the National Convention and the addition of \$10 to the per capita dues, making a total of \$400 per capita dues to send to the National Woman's Auxiliary Convention.

Mrs. Earl T. Lockamy rendered a very impressive memorial service, using a greenery-covered cross with lighted tapers. She attached white carnations as she called the names of those who had deceased in the districts the past year. Miss Leah McGlohon sang a special musical selection.

Closing meditations, "That Grace May Abound in Our Lives, Too," was given by the program-prayer chairman, Mrs. C. F. Bowen.

Reverend M. L. Johnson gave the benediction.

REPORT OF STATE YOUTH COMMITTEE

The State Youth Committee of the North Carolina Free Will Baptist Woman's Auxiliary Convention held three committee meetings during the year: at Parker's Barbecue, Wilson, on August 19, 1960; at First Free Will Baptist Church, Greenville, on October 15, 1960; and again at Greenville on February 4, 1961. All district youth chairmen were invited to meet with us in the first and last meetings.

In these meetings plans were discussed and made concerning the following topics: District workshops and fellowship days; national mission project; ranks, rank drills and awards; and State Youth Fellowship Day—program and banquet.

The secretary-treasurer, Leah McGlohon, who was appointed in the first meeting, sent out on four occasions information and letters urging work on ranks in the auxiliaries to the district youth chairmen. Rank drill materials were sent with the letters.

Over 200 letters were mailed to youth sponsors advertising the State Youth Fellowship Day and banquet.

About 225 members and sponsors of youth auxiliaries met at St. Mary's Free Will Baptist Church in New Bern, to attend the North Carolina State Youth Fellowship Day on April 8. The program had as its theme, "Youth Advancing with Christ."

In the morning, YPA and GTA declamation contests were held. Winners of the contests who were presented in the afternoon program were as follows: YPA—Wayne Phillips of Smithfield, first place, and Pauline Rice of Cedar Hill, second place; GTA—Karen Hancock of St. Mary's, first place, and Philip Frazier of LaGrange, second place.

Carrying out the theme of the program were two playlets: "Advancing with Christ Through YPA and GTA Work—How We Do It," by the Smithfield YPA and GTA, and "Youth Advancing with Christ Through Giving," by the Greenville YPA.

In addition to the playlets, Frank Harrison and Johnny Craft, two ministerial students from the colleges at Mount Olive and Nashville, spoke on the topics, "Youth Preparing to Advance with Christ" and "Youth Advancing with Christ," respectively.

To promote work on the ranks in the youth auxiliaries, drills on ranks were held. Winners in the drill on the rank of Page for GTA were Linda Avery of Winterville, first place, and Carol Daughtry of Smithfield, second place. Winners in the drill on the rank of Apprentice for YPA were Mary Beth Swain of Malachi's Chapel, first place, and Lois Issette of the Second Western District, second place.

Another highlight of the program was the announcement of the essay winners: YPA—Glenda Adams of Smithfield, first place, and Barbara Lancaster of Kinston, second place; GTA—Terry Brantham of Goldsboro, first place, and Vicki Warren of Kinston, second place.

This year the youth auxiliaries have been working on medical facilities

and equipment for the children's division of the proposed hospital in Africa as a national missions project. For this project \$584.43 had been given by the North Carolina auxiliaries on April 8. Since that time the total given has been at least \$613. Jacksonville YPA, giving \$65.31, and Bridgeton GTA, giving \$17.50, were recognized as the YPA and GTA giving the most to the project.

At 5:30 p. m. a banquet was held in the recreation center. Attending the banquet were 119 members and sponsors. Miss Diane Avery of Core Creek YPA was the mistress of ceremony. An entertaining program consisting of singspiration, clarinet trio by St. Mary's BA, and a skit by Mrs. Joshua Rowe and Mrs. J. D. Reese of New Bern were enjoyed. After the entertainment a film, "Highest Mountain," was shown.
