

# REVEREND JAMES ROBERT DAVIDSON

Reverend James Robert Davidson was born May 28, 1898, in Wilcox County of the state of Georgia, the youngest of five sons born to William and Ida Mc-Glamry Davidson. He was married to Mary Reynolds June 25th, 1919, to which union six children were born. He is survived by his wife and four children--W. Randall and James E. Davidson, Mrs. William Harrison, and Mrs. A. F. Stocks; a brother-Elvin C. Davidson.

He was licensed to preach the gospel July 1926 by Pleasant Hill Free Will Baptist Church of Dooley County, Georgia. Two months after receiving a license to preach he registered as a ministerial student in Eureka College, Ayden, N. C. In July of the following year, while on vacation with his home folk in Georgia, he was ordained and set apart for the gospel ministry. During his residence in Ayden, however, he had the opportunity to serve a number of churches in the general area as student pastor.

After four years as student and pastor in North Carolina, Brother Davidson was called to the pastoral care of Glennville and Ebenezer Free Will Baptist churches at Glennville, Ga. Due; however, to a lack of available ministers, he was called upon to conduct worship and render general assistance by five additional churches. His wide and fruitful ministry, which extended over a period of 46 wonderful years, took him to churches in North Carolina, Georgia, Florida, Texas, and Tennessee. By a kind providence this dear man of God was called to his home church in Dooley County, Georgia, where he served (about 6 years) until his retirement from full-time ministry.

As an evangelical minister of theological integrity. deep spiritual experience, and consecrated wisdom the service of Rev. J. R. Davidson to the Cause of Christ among Free Will Baptists of all levels was enthusiastically received. Foremost was he in the formulation and administration of all essential church and denominational organization. He was chosen as moderator of either district or state bodies in Georgia, North Carolina, Tennessee, and Texas. He served as moderator of the National Association of Free Will Baptists in 1944-1945 and as a member of the General Board of that body for several years. He is gratefully remembered as justly honored for his arduous work and sacrifices expended in the promotion and establishment of Free Will Baptist Bible College. He was Treasurer-Business Manager of the College during the first five years of its operation and a member of the Board of Trustees from 1941 to 1964.

It is said of the prophet Daniel that he "CONTINUED" (Dan. 1:21). "This perhaps is the greatest tribute to him, that through decades he did not swerve from his loyalty to God, or devotion to the high interests which were committed to his charge. The men who are steadfast in their loyalty to truth, in their prosecution of duty, in their holding the post assigned to them by the providence of God, are those who leave the deepest impression on their contemporaries. It is not the flash of the meteor which the world really wants, but the constant radiance of the fixed star."

# CONSTITUTION of the

## North Carolina Association of Original Free Will Baptists

#### Article I-Name and Purpose

This organization shall be known as the North Carolina Association of Original Free Will Baptists.

The purpose of this organization shall be the establishment and maintenance of a voluntary association of autonomous Original Free Will Baptist churches, quarterly meetings (or any other meetings) district association or conferences—or any and all additional organizations—area, district or state-wide that may be deemed essential to the prosecution and promotion of the general purpose and program of this association. Included, also in the purpose of this association is affiliation with the National Association of Original Free Will Baptists and cooperation in its world wide ministry. This association holds unswerving loyalty to the inspired word of God as our infallible rule of faith and practice.

# Article II-Composition

This association shall be composed of its officers; members of standing boards; ordained and licensed ministers who are in good standing with a conference or an association affiliated with this body; together with three (3) delegates elected from each conference or Association; and one (1) delegate for every fifty (50) members or fraction thereof from each local church. (Note: This also includes any other church who wishes to be affiliated with the National Association.)

# Article III-Meetings

This Association shall meet annually at seven-thirty o'clock (7:30 P.M.) on the first Monday of May and will adjourn at the option of the body.

#### Article IV-Officers and Boards

The officers of this Association shall be Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Executive Board, Board of Trustees, Board of Missions, Board of Care for the Aged, Board of Superannuation, and Board of Youth Relations.

#### Section 1. ELECTIONS.

All officers shall be elected by the body. A nominating committee shall be elected at the beginning of each session.

After their report is presented, additional nominations for any office may be made from the floor. The General officers shall be elected for a period of two (2) years. No person shall serve in more than one (1) elected position in the Association at the same time, and no one having served a full term shall be elected to succeed himself.

#### Section 2. DUTIES.

- A. The duties of the moderator shall be to preside, according to accepted parliamentary procedure, over the sessions of the association; to appoint temporary committees; and the moderator shall serve as an advisor to all standing boards and as chairman of the Executive Board.
- B. The duties of the Assistant Moderator shall be those of the moderator when the latter shall so direct or when he is absent.
- C. The clerk shall record the proceedings of all sessions of the Association and preserve an accurate record of said proceedings in a book provided for this purpose. He shall prepare and cause to be published the minutes of the annual session of the association; hold in trust all documents not otherwise preserved, and surrender same at the direction of the association; and conduct the official correspondence and sign such documents and instruments as require his signature. He shall also serve as secretary of the Executive Board.
- D. The Treasurer shall hold in trust all money that belongs to the Association and disburse same by order of the association, the executive board, or any standing board or subordinate general organization invested with the authority to authorize the disbursement of funds. He shall keep an accurate account of all funds received and disbursed and make an annual report to the association.

# Section 3. EXECUTIVE BOARD.

The Executive Board shall be composed of the general officers and three (3) members elected at large. The members elected at large shall hold office for three (3) years, the term of one expiring each year. The Executive Board shall arrange the program for the annual sessions of the Association. They shall fill vacancies which may occur in any office until the session of the association. It shall be their duty to promote the work of the association They shall direct the work of the Free Will Baptist Witness. They shall employ an Editor and Director of Information whose salary shall be approved by the association in its budget. They may appoint such other assistants as may be necessary.

The Executive Board may advise and assist other boards of the Association.

The Executive Board is not authorized to act as the Association when it is not in session except as provided for in this Constitution and by-laws or specifically directed by this Association.

#### Section 4. BOARD OF TRUSTEES.

The Board of Trustees shall consist of three (3) men elected for three (3) years, the term of one expiring each year. They shall hold in trust all real and personal property of the association and shall convey such property as the Association may direct.

#### Section 5. BOARD OF MISSIONS.

The Board of Missions shall be composed of five (5) members elected for five (5) years, the term of one expiring each year. They may prepare by-laws to govern them in their work providing such by-laws are presented to the Association for approval. They shall make an annual report of their accomplishments to the Association.

#### Section 6. BOARD OF CARE FOR THE AGED.

The Board of Care for the Aged shall be composed of six (6) members elected for three (3) years the term of two (2) expiring each year. They may prepare by-laws to govern them in their work providing such by-laws are presented to the Association for approval. They shall make an annual report of their accomplishments to the Association.

# Section 7. BOARD OF SUPERANNUATION.

The Board of Superannuation shall be composed of five (5) members elected for five (5) years, the term of one expiring each year. They may prepare by-laws to govern them in their work providing such by-laws are presented to the Association for approval. They shall make an annual report of their accomplishments to the Association.

# Section 8. BOARD OF YOUTH RELATIONS.

The Board of Youth Relations shall be composed of five (5) members elected for five (5) years, the term of one expiring each year. They may prepare by-laws to govern them in their work providing such by-laws are presented to the Association for approval. They shall make an annual report of their accomplishments to the Association.

# Article V-Independence of the Local Church

This Association has no judicial or appellate powers conflicting with independence of the local church.

#### Article VI-Amendments

This Constitution may be amended by a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote providing such amendment be read to the body and laid on the table until the following day.

#### **BY-LAWS**

- 1. All meetings shall be opened by singing, reading a portion of God's Word and prayer; and shall be closed with prayer.
- 2. All business, except routine, shall be brought before the body by committee, but should a committee fail or refuse to present a matter of business, the business shall be brought from the floor.
- 3. In parliamentary procedure, Robert's Rule of Order shall be used as a guide.
- 4. The offices of Moderator and Assistant Moderator shall be filled on an alternating basis, from the eastern and western part of the state; Durham shall be the dividing line. When the Moderator is elected from one section, his assistant shall be elected from the other.
  - 5. All officers and board members of this Association shall be reimbursed at the rate of 8¢ per mile when traveling to duly called board meetings or attending to the business of any board. The State Evangelist is to be reimbursed at the rate of 9¢ per mile.
  - 6. These by-laws may be amended or changed at any regular session of this Association by a majority vote.

# MINUTES OF THE TENTH ANNUAL SESSION OF THE NORTH CAROLINA ASSOCIATION OF THE ORIGINAL FREE WILL BAPTISTS

When convened with the Liberty Free Will Baptist Church, Durham, North Carolina, June 12, 13, 14, 1972.

# MONDAY EVENING, JUNE 12

The Monday evening service was under the direction of the North Carolina State Association Youth Board. The Chairman of the Youth Board, Rev. Eugene Hales presided over the service. Mr. Ronald Christ directed the singing. Honorable James Hawkins, mayor of the city of Durham, extended a warm welcome to the congregation and Rev. Eddie Turnage responded.

Special music was rendered by the Peace Crusaders Youth Choir from the Peace Free Will Baptist Church, Wilson, N. C. and by a youth trio from the Liberty Free Will Baptist Church, Durham, N. C. Rev. Sigbee

Dilda led in a testimony time.

Rev. Eugene Hales introduced Rev. Malcolm Fry, who brought greetings from the National C. T. S. Department. Rev. Fry will become the National Director of our C. T. S. Department as of September 1, 1972.

Rev. Eugene Hales introduced the "Conquerors"; Mr. Vernon Whaley and Rev. Jonathan Thigpen. Mr. Vernon Whaley rendered special music and Rev. Jonathan Thigpen brought a stirring message using as his text Joshua 3:5. Rev. Thigpen pointed out three great needs that exists among our young people today, I. The Need for Salvation, II. The Need for seperation and, III. The Need for Surrender.

The congregation sang "Where ever He Leads I'll

The congregation sang ''Where ever He Leads I'll Go.'' There were several decisions made during the

time of invitation.

Mr. Jack Forlines appointed the following committies; Credentials Committee, to serve also as the Placement Committee, Rev. Leon McBride, Rev. Rashie Kennedy, and Rev. Robert Edwards; Finance Committee, Rev. Robert Woodard, Rev. Robert Hagler, and Rev. Weldon Key; Committee to Study Constitution and By-Laws, Rev. Gene Outland, Rev. Bill Robinson, and Rev. William Calvert; and Education Committee, Rev. Harley Brown, Rev. James R. Lee, and Rev. Harvey Dupree.

We were dismissed in prayer by Rev. Eugene Hales.

# TUESDAY MORNING, JUNE 13

The session was opened by Rev. Milton Hollifield who led us in singing of 'Glory to His Name.' Rev. Alton Hines led us in prayer and special music was reddered by the Gospelettes. The clerk, Rev. Gene

Outland called the Tenth Annual Session of the North Carolina Association of Original Free Will Baptist to order and introduced the moderator, Mr. Jack Forlines.

Mr. Forlines commented on this session being our tenth annual session and recognized people who were present at the organizational meeting. Approximately twenty churches were recognized that were not in existence when our State Association was organized. It was noted that many other churches had been organized and missions started that were not represented at our meeting. Mr. Forlines read Prov. 27:18 and challenged our churches to be faithful in supporting all phases of our State work. He stated that people were guilty of enjoying the fruits of others but not willing to help keep the tree. Mr. Forlines urged our churches to support the executive department of the National Association of Free Will Baptist. He noted the need to get more laymen involved in the work of our Associations and State work. Mr. Forlines expressed appreciation for the faithfulness of our ministers to preach the Word. He urged preachers to continue preach the word of God faithfully and to teach the doctrines of our denomination.

Rev. Milton Hollifield recognized the visitors present. They were, Rev. Rufus Coffey, (Executive secretary of the National Association of Free Will Baptist), Harold Critcher, (Foreign Missions Department), (Rev. & Mrs. E. B. Ledlow, Home Missions Department); (Missionaries Rev. Larry Inscoe and Mrs. Joe Hass); Rev. A. S. Trueluck, Rev. Jerry Johnson, Rev. Kenneth Faison, Rev. Tommy Godley, Rev. Seldon Bullard and Rev. Benny

Turner.

Mr. Forlines recognized Rev. Harris, colored minister and his delegates who were visiting our Associational meeting. The moderator recognized various Conferences and Associations.

The Credentials Committee gave a partial report. Motion carried that we receive the partial report of the

Credentials Committee.

Motion carried that church letters and reports be mailed to the churches at least three weeks before the

times for the Annual State Meeting.

The moderator asked for nominations for the Nominating Committee. Rev. Ted Reynolds, Rev. Frank Davenport, Rev. James Pauly and Rev. Milton Hollifield were elected.

:Rev. Billy Allen, Ron Christ; and Rev. Roger Tripp were appointed to serve as the Resolutions Committee.

The clerk read the minutes of the Executive Committee meetings which were held during the year. Motion carried that we receive the report of the Executive Committee.

The moderator introduced our State evangelist, Rev. Ronald Creech. Rev. Creech introduced those who work in our Book store. Rev. Creech commented on God's blessing's on the Book Store and asked for prayer

for its ministry. Rev. Creech commented on Capitol Church Bonds and its growth. He also mentioned "Christians Builders, Inc." which can build churches and other church buildings at better prices than General Construction Companies. Rev. Creech challenged us to stay true to God in all our work.

#### REPORT OF THE STATE EVANGELIST

#### 1972

I am amazed at God's goodness. He has been far better to me than I have ever personally deserved and I am sure He is far better to our State Association than any of us or our churches deserved. His goodness and grace absolutely astound me This has been our best year by far and I am eternally grateful to God for His blessings and thankful and grateful to each of you and your churches for making this year what it has been in our State Associational work.

#### **BOOK STORE**

It is nothing less than fantastic to me that we have gone from \$31,366.61 total sales last year to \$81,811.61 this year. Of course, as you well know, one of the big reasons for this terrific increase in sales is the Sunday School literature contract. I do want to caution, however, that there are only two quarters of Sunday School literature business reflected in this report. Had we had a full year of Sunday School literature business, I fully believe that our volume would have topped \$125,000. For this I am absolutely astounded. God has been so very, very good!

Another thing we are doing now in the store is initiating to our people all across the country a discount buying service. We are going to start publishing each month a discount mailing list. We will charge people \$3 00 per year to get on this particular mailing list. We will sell at a discount ranging from 10% to 60% depending upon our ability to buy individual items. Of course, on a 40% discount item, if it is very big, the individual will more than pay for his yearly membership

fee on the purchase of one item.

Now we have a full time man employee and a full time lady employee. Bro. James Lee is our new Assistant Manager and Mrs. Amanda Carden is our full time lady employee. We have various part time people who come in during Sunday School literature shipping seasons and other rush seasons during year to help as we need them.

There are many sections of our state crying for a branch Book Store. Just as soon as we feel we are well enough established to handle branch stores efficiently, I am going to recommend to our committee that we start branch stores across our state. I have already been approached by one store about the possibility of us buying them out. It is in the investigation stage at the present.

#### CAPITOL CHURCH BONDS, INC.

With the closing of this report, Capitol Church Bonds, Inc. is thirty-nine months old. In the thirty-nine months we have done over a million dollars' worth of programs. When we started this company, I could do everything that was to be done about it. Now I cannot begin to do it all. In fact, we have three men helping us in the field with the programs. I never go to the banks and make a setup any more, cannot go to the church and make presentations, nor can I go back to the church and do programs. All I do now, is order bonds, work out the amortization schedules, order the prospectuses, and in general, supervise the work of the company.

Our year ended March 31. Since then, we have gotten over \$1,000,000 in inquiries about bond programs. For this I am so grateful to God and to our people in this state. We did a \$200,000 program for Grace Church in Greenville where Bro. Chester Phillips is the pastor

last week.

#### FREE WILL BAPTIST WITNESS

I am convinced that this little publication is serving a need in our state. Our Executive Committee has voted to switch from the Club Bundle Plan to the Individual Plan and still send it to each family's mail box in the state and still without charge. I do want you to pray for the ministry of this publication. We are now printing 7,000 copies per month. If your church has not handed in the list of your families to us to be placed on metal plates, please do so immediately. Several churches have already turned in their lists and we have our girls working on them now.

#### CHRISTIAN BUILDERS, INC.

A dream of mine for a long time has been to have a complete building service for our churches who desired such a service. Before settling on one company, I investigated a number of leads and finally decided to recommend Christian Builders, Inc. to our churches. Since doing so, we have a number of projects either under way, in the planning stage, or in the prospect file. The Rocky Mount Free Will Baptist Church, where Bro. Glen Hill is the pastor, is now under construction. It will seat, I think something like 250 to 300 people. Grace Free Will Baptist Church in Rocky Mount, where Bro. Robert Durham is the pastor, will be under construction in just a few days. The working drawings are already completed. I think it is supposed to seat 1,100 or 1,200. The new Calvary Free Will Baptist Church in Durham,

where Bro. Charles Keith is the pastor, is on the drawing board. Others are in various stages of planning or drawing. For instance, 6 or 8 years ago when I was pastor of this very church we are meeting in for this session, we paid our architect 6% to draw the plans for the threestory educational building over to the side of the building we are meeting in today. Contractors back then got 10 to 15%. Now architects get from 8 to 10% and contractors 15 to 20% in most cases. Put those figures together and you can see what a church will save going the route of Christian Builders, Inc. for the planning and the construction supervision for a flat fee of 12%.
