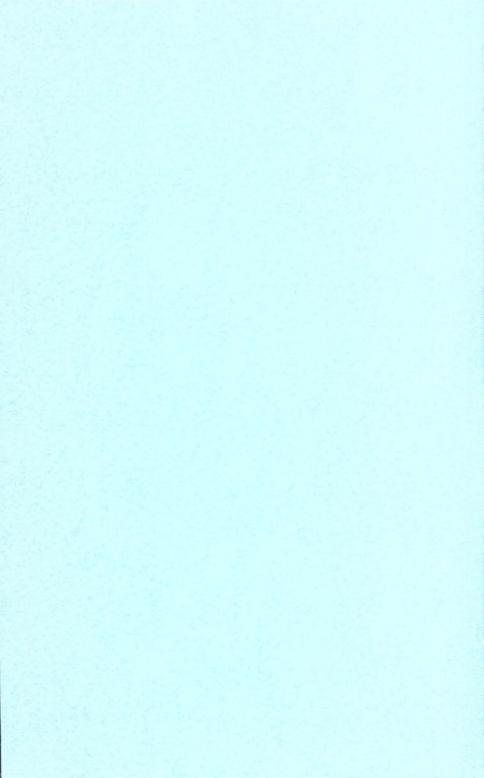

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CONSTITUTION OF THE NORTH CAROLINA ASSOCIATION OF FREE WILL BAPTISTS

Preamble

The purpose of this organization shall be the establishment and maintenance of a voluntary association of autonomous Free Will Baptist churches, quarterly meetings (or any other meetings), district associations or conferences or any and all additional organizations - area. district or state-wide that may be deemed essential to the prosecution and promotion of the general purpose and program of this association. Included also in the purpose of this association is affiliation with the National Association of Free Will Baptists, the adoption of the Treatise of the Faith and Practices of Free Will Baptists as adopted by the National Association, and cooperation in its world-wide ministry. This association holds unswerving loyalty to the inspired Word of God as our infallible rule of faith and practice.

Article I. Name

This association shall be known as the North Carolina Association of Free Will Baptists, how-ever, informally the term "State Association" may be used.

Article II. Composition

This association shall be composed of its officers, members of standing boards, ordained and licensed ministers who are in good standing with a conference or association affiliated with this body, together with three (3) delegates elected from each conference or association and one (1) delegate for every fifty (50) members or fraction thereof from each local church which is in good standing with a conference or association affiliated with this body.

Article III. Meetings

Section 1. This association shall convene in regular annual session at a time and place determined by the association in session.

Section 2. In the event of an emergency resulting from a cancellation of the place approved by the association while in annual session, the Executive Board of the association shall have power to make a substitue choice of a suitable location for the annual meeting.

Section 3. Should a called session be deemed essential, the Executive Board shall have authority to issue and publicize a called session of the State Association, said call shall be publicized not less than two (2) weeks in advance of the session.

Section 4. The qualified members in attendance at any regular or called session shall constitute a quorum.

Article IV. Officers

The officers of this association shall consist of the members of the Executive Board, the Board of Trustees, the Board of Missions, the Board of Care for the Aged, the Board of Retirement and Insurance, the Board of Youth Relations, and the Bible Book Store Board.

Article V. Boards

Section 1. This association shall establish the following standing boards:

The Executive Board
The Board of Trustees
The Board of Missions
The Board of Care For the Aged
The Board of Retirement and Insurance
The Board of Youth Relations
The Bible Book Store Board

Section 2. The Executive Board shall consist of Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer and three (3) members at large elected by the association.

Section 3. The Board of Trustees shall consist of three (3) members elected by the association.

Section 4. The following boards shall each be composed of five (5) members elected by the association.

The Board of Missions
The Board of Care for the Aged
The Board of Retirement and Insurance
The Board of Youth Relations
The Bible Book Store Board

Article VI. Discipline

This association has no jidicial or appellate powers conflicting with the independence of the local church or the bodies constituting this association.

Article VII. Amendments

This constitution may be amended by two-thirds majority vote of the members present and voting at a session of the association provided the proposed amendment is presented to the body one day in advance.

Article VIII. Dissolution

In the event of the dissolution of this association any assets of the organization then remaining shall be conveyed to the National Association of Free Will Baptists.

Article I. Membership

Section 1. Membership in this association shall be through application of a duly constituted district association (or conference). A credentials committee shall examine the application and make other investigation it deems appropriate. The credentials committee shall make a recommendation to the association as to the action to take regarding the application. The decision on the application shall be by majority vote of delegates present and voting.

Section 2. Each church holding membership in an affiliated association shall automatically be a member of this association.

Article II. Representation

Section 1. Each district association holding membership in the State Association shall send a report of statistics on a form provided by the association to every annual session of the association. Failure to report for two successive sessions of the association may be the basis for dismissal from the association by a majority vote of members present and voting.

Section 2. Seating of delegates shall be through recommendation of a credentials committee. Any potential delegates whose credentials are not recommended for approval by the credentials committee may be seated only by a majority vote of seated delegates who are present and voting.

Article III. Duties of Officers and Boards

Section 1. The Executive Board shall: (1) arrange the program for the annual sessions of the association, (2) fill vacancies which may occur on any

board between sessions of the association, (the person duly elected by the association), (3) promote the work of the association, (4) review the annual reports and proposed budgets of all boards before they are presented to the State Association, (5) provide for and give general supervision to a church bond program and other similar service ministries and, (6) employ and supervise a promotional secretary, whose duties shall be as follows:

- A. Administration. To administer the affairs of the Executive Board within the authority delegated by the board. He shall fulfill all duties commensurate with his office and present plans and procedures to the board which he feels would be effective in promoting the work within the association.
- B. General Promotion. To show through general promotion the correlation and interrelation of all the ministries of the State Association and National Association. It is expected that he will promote impartially the total program of work as devised by all standing boards.
- C. Public Relations. To keep in close contact with pastors, district associations, and local church leaders. He shall represent the State Association to other bodies when in the interest of the association.
- D. Publications. To serve as editor-inchief of the Free Will Baptist Witness. He shall direct the production of other promotional material as may be approved by the Executive Board.

- E. Stewardship. To provide stewardship education that will serve to produce increased support for the state ministries through the "State Program" and/or other methods of giving by associations, churches, and individuals.
- F. Arranging Annual Association. To expedite the planning of the annual association program, arrange for the enrolling of ministers and delegates and distribute the printed minutes of the association.
- G. Other Duties. To perform other duties as may be assigned by the Executive Board. It is understood that the Promotional Secretary is to have no official or exofficio status on any standing board or committee of the association except as may be specifically provided by action of the association.

The Executive Board may advise and assist other boards of the association. The Executive Board is not authorized to act for the association except as provided in the constitution and by-laws of the association or as specifically directed by the association.

- Section 2. The Board of Trustees shall be legal custodian of all property belonging to the association except in the case of the standing boards of the association which by action of the association are authorized to incorporate.
- Section 3. The Mission Board, the Board of Care for the Aged, the Board of Youth Relations, the Board of Retirement and Insurance and the Bible Book Store Board each shall promote the work within the state as would generally be recognized as coming within the purview of the respective board. Each board shall: (a) be responsible to

the State Association for all their actions, (b) propose by-laws for the government of their respective work, (The by-laws of each board shall be presented to the association for approval), (c) make an annual report of its accomplishments to the association, and (d) prepare a budget of proposed expenditures which shall be presented to the association for approval.

Section 4. The moderator shall, (1) preside at meetings of the State Association and Executive Board, (2) call meetings of the Executive Board of his own volition or upon request of at least three members of the Executive Board, (3) appoint such committees as are created without provision for their selection, (4) fulfill whatever responsibilities that may be commensurate with the office or that may be delegated by the association.

Section 5. The assistant moderator shall preside at the request of, or in the absence of, the moderator and assist the moderator in such manner as may be requested.

Section 6. The clerk shall prepare minutes of the proceedings of all meetings of the association or the Executive Board and preserve an accurate record of said proceedings in a book provided for this purpose and shall handle such official correspondence as may be directed by the association. He shall, through the Executive Board, arrange for the printing of the minutes.

Section 7. The treasurer shall hold in trust all money that belongs to the Executive Board of the association and disburse same by order of the association, the Executive Board, or any standing board or subordinate general organization invested with the authority to authorize the disbursement of funds. He shall keep an accurate account of all funds received and disbursed and make an annual report to the association.

- Article IV. Election of Officers and Board Members
- Section 1. No person shall hold membership on more than one standing board at the same time.
- Section 2. All officers shall be elected by the body. A nominating committee shall be elected at the beginning of each session. After their report is presented, additional nominations for any office may be made from the floor. The General Officers shall be elected for a period of two (2) years. No person shall serve in more than one (1) elected position in the association at the same time, and no one having served a full term shall be elected to succeed himself.
- Section 3. The offices of Moderator and Assistant Moderator shall be filled on an alternating basis, from the eastern and western part of the state; Durham shall be the dividing line. When the Moderator is elected from one section, his assistant shall be elected from the other.

Article V. Terms of Office

- Section 1. The three (3) members at large elected to the board, shall each have a term of office of three years with their terms arranged so that one (1) member's term expires annually.
- Section 2. The members of the Mission Board, Board of Care for the Aged, Board of Youth Relations, Board of Retirement and Insurance and Bible Book Store Board shall each have a term of office of five (5) years with their terms arranged so that one (1) member's term expires annually.
- Section 3. The members of the Board of Trustees shall each have a term of office of three (3) years with their terms arranged so that only one member's term expires annually.

Article VI. Committees

Section 1. Various committees shall be constitued, when need arises, by the State Association or the Executive Board. The number of members of a committee shall be determined by the establishing body (State Association or Executive Board). Committee members shall be appointed by the moderator unless otherwise provided by the action creating the committee. Committee members shall serve for the length of time provided, until their work has been completed, until they are released, or their successors chosen.

Section 2. The following committees shall be appointed annually to serve during the session of the State Association:

- A. The credentials committee of three (3) members. This committee shall examine all letters to the association, applications for membership in the association, and credentials of the various delegates. The committee shall make recommendations to the association regarding the seating of delegates and the action to take on applications for membership in the association.
- B. The resolutions committee whose duty it shall be to screen resolutions that are presented. Only resolutions determined by this committee to be worthy are to be presented to the association by the committee.
- C. The finance committee which shall receive and account for all funds received with letters or through offerings during the association.

Article VII. Honorarium and Reimbursements

Section 1. The clerk shall receive as honorarium \$100.00 annually.

Section 2. Members of standing boards, or duly constituted committees, may be reimbursed for expenses in attending board meetings within the state, exclusive of the annual association meeting, at the rate of 15¢ per mile (may claim road distance if traveling by airplane). In addition, if over night travel is required, reimbursement may be made for actual meals and lodging expenses.

ARTICLE VIII. Ouorum

A simple majority of a board or committee shall constitute a quorum.

Article IX. Proxy

No voting shall be done by proxy in meetings of the State Association. Proxy representation shall be accepted for meetings of the Executive Board provided the proxy is designated in writing by the board member or by oral communication between the member and the moderator.

Article X. Parliamentary Authority

The meetings of the State Association shall be governed by the rules of parliamentary law as set forth in Robert's Rules of Order except in the case of those rules which are superseded by rule of this association.

Article XI. Amendments

These by-laws may be amended by (1) a majority vote of the members present and voting provided the amendment is presented one day prior to the vote, or (2) by a two-thirds majority of those present and voting if immediate action is to be taken as soon as debate has been completed.

MINUTES OF THE FOURTEENTH ANNUAL SESSION OF THE NORTH CAROLINA ASSOCIATION OF FREE WILL BAPTISTS

When convened with the First Free Will Baptist Church, Stanley, N. C., June 14, 15, 1976

MONDAY MORNING, JUNE 14, 11:00 A.M.

The Monday morning service was presided over by Rev. Frank McQuage of Rockingham. Bro. Ron Dail of the Fellowship Church, Durham, led the congregation in singing "Since Jesus Came Into My Heart." Bro. Odell Cook read Hebrews 10:19 for our scripture. We were welcomed to Stanley by the host pastor, Bro. Sherman Branch, who gave an unusually warm welcome, saying that "we hope our actions will speak louder than our words and that we will truly make you to know how welcome you are." Bro. Dennis Wiggs, moderator, responded to the welcome.

Bro. Wiggs, at this time, appointed two committees. The Credentials Committee consisting of Rev. James Stepp, Rev. A. C. Morgan, Rev. Lee Whaley.

The 1976 session was officially called to order by Clerk Guy Owens. Bro. Ron Dail again led the congregation in singing "Standing On The Promises." Bro McQuage introduced Mrs. Pat Ziegler of the host church who sang "The Longer I Serve Him." Bro. McQuage recognized host pastor Sherman Branch who introduced the speaker for the hour, Rev. Howard Messer, pastor of Meadowbrook Church in Swannanoa, to bring the morning message. Bro. Messer took his text from Proverbs 14:34 and spoke on "America In Trouble." Bro. Messer developed his message showing first the direction of America morally, educationally, religiously and politically,

painting indeed a dark picture. He then showed the answer for America's dilemma to be two-fold --the preaching of the Word of God and prayer.

Following the message the moderator appointed the Resolutions Committee consisting of Rev. Randy Cox, Rev. William Calvert and Rev. Sigbee Dilda. He instructed each department to be sure to present their budget for adoption at the time of their report.

We were dismissed for lunch.

MONDAY AFTERNOON SESSION, JUNE 14

The Monday afternoon session began by singing "When We All Get To Heaven" led by Brc. Ron Dail. Prayer was offered by Bro. Norman Perkins. Bro Wiggs was recognized to bring the moderator's message entitled "To Cooperate or Not to Cooperate With A Denomination", the outline of which follows:

 - A. To Not Affiliate with a Denomination Due to
 - 1. Difference in Doctrine
 - 2. Departure from the Faith
 - Disrespect for Leaders and/or Organization
 - B. To Affiliate with a Denomination for the Purpose of
 - Cooperating in World-wide Ministries
 - 2. Communing with Other Believers

3. Contending for the Faith in Unity

II. DETERMINATION TO DO BEST ONCE DECISION MADE

- A. If You Choose Independency
 - 1. Be faithful to Word of God
 - Love the Brethren even if not of your Group
 - Cooperate When Possible with Other Groups
- B. If You Choose Denominational Affiliation
 - Stand for What is Right Keep it Pure
 - 2. Serve Faithfully in Your Elected Responsibilities
 - 3. Seek Fellowship of Entire Group

At the Conclusion of his message the moderator called on Clerk Guy Owens to pray.

The moderator requested that we adopt the program as planned by the Executive Committee as our order of business with deviations permitted as deemed wise and necessary during the proceedings. A motion prevailed to that effect. The moderator then recognized the chairman of the Credentials Committee, Bro. John Craft, for their report. Motion prevailed to receive the report and seat the delegates. See report page 34.

The moderator then recognized out-of-state visitors--Rev. Herman Hersey of the Board of Retirement and Insurance, Nashville, Tennessee, Rev. James Earl Raper of the Children's Home, Greenville, Tennessee, Mr. Mark Staten of the Woodale Church, Knoxville, Tennessee, Rev. Charles Thigpen of Free Will Baptist Bible College,

Nashville, Tennessee, Rev. Rolla Smith, Department of Foreign Missions, Nashville, Tennessee, Rev. Harold Harrison, Sunday School Department, Nashville, Tennessee. Visitors from within the State were recognized—Rev. Clint Morgan, who is a missionary appointee to Africa, Mr. and Mrs. Neil Hearn of New Bern.

The moderator then called for an election of the Nominating Committee and a motion from the floor prevailed that the chair be empowered to appoint such committee.

The moderator informed us that the report of the Executive Board and Promotional Department scheduled next would be delayed until Tuesday morning.

Bro. Fred Green, manager of the Bible Book Store in Durham, was recognized for a report which was received as information.

The moderator then recognized Bro. Bob King of the Bible Book Store Board for his report which contained three recommendations. (1) That Rev. Dennis Lowry be elected to fill the unexpired term of Rev. Wayne Smith on the board. (2) That Bro. Lee Thomas be elected to a full term. Bro. Thomas had been serving on the board filling an unexpired term of a member who resigned. (3) Recommended that we grant the board authority to negotiate a new lease and to relocate the Book Store at their discretion. A motion prevailed that we receive the report and grant the three recommendations. The motion prevailed unanimously.

The Bible Book Store now presented their new Constitution and By-Laws for approval by the

Association. Motion prevailed that they be read and considered item by item. After two pages, having been read a motion prevailed to table until tomorrow, giving us time to read and study them in detail.

The moderator now recognized Rev. Herman Hersey for the report of Retirement and Insurance. Bro. Hersey spoke of a special travel insurance and reminded us of travel insurance available to the ministers and that a special Father's Day offering is received for the benefit of our older ministers. Motion prevailed to receive the report as information.

Things began to get a little drowsy and the moderator called on Bro. Ron Dail to lead us in a song. We stood and sang "To God Be The Glory."

We then came to a time for miscellaneous business. Bro. Frank Davenport of Faith Church in Goldsboro mentioned that Senator Thomas Strickland of Goldsboro, candidate for Governor, who has served three terms in the House of Representatives and four in the Senate would be in the area and requested that Senator Strickland be given time to speak. A motion prevailed that if other candidates are present that they all be given time to speak, the total time for all candidates inclusive not to exceed fifteen minutes. The moderator ruled that since the Home Mission Board is in charge of the Monday night service that the Mission Board determine whether the candidates should speak during or after the service.

The moderator now recognized Bro. J. C. Lynn for the report of the Board of Care for the Aged. Bro. Lynn gave a report on the progress of the building of the rest home near Asheville and

mentioned that a plan used by the board for raising money had received only seven responses to 275 letters. A motion prevailed to receive the report as information.

The moderator now recognized Inc. Joanne Fing for the report of the Woman's Auxiliary Convention who have a very spititual and glowing report of the Moman's Auxiliary victories this year. Motion prevailed to receive the report as information.

The moderator recognized Roo. Edgle Middick for the report of the Board of Petirement and Insurance. Bro. Middick in turn recognized Rro. The moderator now appointed the Nominating Committee consisting of Nev. James Pauley, Rev. Hathan Eason, Rev. Bill Reagan, Rev. Roy Ribard, Pev. Ted Reynolds.

The moderator recognized Rev. Rolla Smith, General Director of our Foreign Missions Department, Nashville, Tennessee, for a Foreign Missions report. Bro. Smith gave a good solid Biblical statement of foreign missions, and informed us that financially the department was doing better the first five months of the year and that the latter part of the year was the best part of the year for foreign missions. Motion prevailed to receive the report as information.

MONDAY NIGHT SESSION, JUNE 14

The session began with Bro. G. C. Lee leading the congregation in singing.

Bro. Roger Tripp gave a glowing report of the accomplishments of the Home Mission Board for the past year. The entire Mission Board was appropriately attired in attractive blazers carrying an emblem and the words "N. C. Home Missions." They also passed out to everyone present note pads with the emblem of N. C. Free Will Baptist Home Missions, "Winning Souls Through N. C. Home Missions", printed on them. Bro. Ted Reynolds spoke and presented the Hope Trio from the Caroleen Church who sang "Jesue Pilots My Ship", "Thank You Lord For Your Blessings On Me" and "Stepping On The Clouds."

MONDAY HIGHT SESSION, JUNE 14 CONTINUED:

Bro. Peynolds introduced the speaker for the evening, board member Bro. Larry Hughes, pastor of our Canton Church. Bro. Hughes spoke on "The Believer's Mission." He took as his text the familiar passage - Matthew 28:18-20. He said (1) We have one mission, (2) We have many ministries in this one mission. He developed the thought that there are many methods we can use in the ministry of proclaiming the Word of God. To illustrate this he mentioned his five-minute daily radio ministry and his chaplaincy of his local Rescue Squad. (3) We have a mind to keep concerning it all.

Following the very challenging, warm-hearted message by Bro. Hughes, an offering for N. C. F'JB Home Missions was received.

The service was dismissed in prayer.

TUESDAY MORNING, JUNE 15

The Tuesday morning, June 15th session becan with Rev. Dill Reagan of Morehead City leading the congregation in singing "Love Lifted Me." Prayer was led by Rev. Larry Stevens of New Bern. Bro. Owen Ganey, pastor of Living Waters Church, Bethel, brought the message entitled "The Need of The Hour." Bro Ganey said that revival is the greatest need of the hour and presented eight reasons why revival is needed -- (1) To awaken Christians to a holy life, (2) Because of the condition of lost mankind, (3) In order to wage a war against sin, (4) To awaken sinners to God's coming judgment, (5) To reveal God's love to the unsaved, (6) To strengthen the church, (7) to prepare people for heaven and (8) To put compassion in the lives of God's people.

The moderator now called on Rev. William Sealey, pastor of our Cove City Church, to lead us in prayer for revival.

The moderator asked for report of the Monday night's offering. (See Finance Committee report.)

The moderator now recognized visitors - Rev. Rufus Coffey, Executive Secretary of the National Association of Free Will Baptists, Nashville, Tennessee, Rev. Bobby Rose of the Bay Branch FWB Church, Timmonsville, S. C., Rev. Bob Shockey, General Director of the National Home Missions Board.

The moderator appointed the Placement Committee consisting of Rev. Sherman Branch, Rev. Bill Reagan, Rev. Eddie Riddick, Rev. R. J. Kennedy, Sr.

The moderator recognized Rev. Charles
Thigpen, Dean of Free Will Baptist Bible College,
Nashville, Tennessee for a report. Bro. Thigpen
spoke briefly then recognized Bro. Jack Paramore
who spoke for a few minutes on the college's
development program. Bro. Thigpen then recognized Rev. Bob King who commented regarding
a substantial gift made to Free Will Baptist
Bible College and to Free Will Baptist Foreign
Missions by a North Carolina layman and his wife
from the Prospect Church. Motion prevailed to receive the report as information.

The moderator now recognized Bro. Lee Thomas for a report from the Laymen's Board. Motion prevailed to receive the report as information.

The moderator recognized Rev. Bob Shockey, General Director of the National Home Missions.

Motion prevailed to receive the report as information.

The moderator recognized Rev. Sigbee Dilda, pastor of Ruth's Chapel Church, New Bern for the report of the Board of Youth. Motion prevailed to receive the report as information. See report on page 32.

The moderator recognized Rev. Guy Owens, Chairman of the National Association Invitation Committee, who gave an oral report recommending that we invite the National Association to Charlotte for the 1979 session. Approximate cost to the State Association -- \$6,000. Motion prevailed to adopt the report and recommendation.

The moderator called on Clerk Owens for the report of the Executive Board. The clerk read the report and recommended that the report be received and the budget of the Promotional Department adopted. Motion prevailed. See report on page 44.

The moderator called upon Rev. Ronald Creech, State Promotional Secretary for the report of the State Promotional Department. See report on page 69.

The moderator recognized Rev. Rufus Coffey, Executive Secretary of the National Association of Free Will Baptists, who gave an oral report. Motion prevailed to receive the report as information.

The moderator recognized Rev. James Earl Raper for the report of the Free Will Baptist Children's Home, Greeneville, Tennessee. Motion prevailed to receive the report as information.

The moderator next inquired concerning the attendance at the Tuesday morning business session and learned that it was 145 and asked that it be entered in the minutes.

The moderator recognized Rev. John Craft of Smithfield for the final report of the Credentials Committee. See report on page 34.

The moderator recognized Rev. James Stepp for the report of the Finance Committee. See report on page 31.

The moderator recognized Rev. Randy Cox, Raleigh, for the report of the Resolutions Committee. Upon hearing the report a motion prevailed that we receive the report and adopt it item by item. See report on page 31.

The moderator next recognized Rev. Sherman Branch for the report of the Placement Committee. Two invitations had been received to host the 1977 session. One from First Church, Raleigh, the other from First Church, Beaufort, both of which have new buildings. After some jovial discussion, the body voted to accept the Raleigh invitation.

Motion prevailed to remove the Bible Book Store Constitution and By-Laws from the table. After much difficulty in reading and comprehending the technical language of the Constitution and By-Laws, a motion prevailed that the Bible Book Store Board take their Constitution and By-Laws back and return to the body next year a Constitution and By-Laws in simple laymen's language for consideration at the 1977 session.

The moderator now recognized Rev. Eddie Riddick for the continued report of the Board of

Retirement and Insurance. Bro. Riddick read the resolution and the quidelines. Motion prevailed to amend number four of the guidelines under resolution "if approved by the State Association while in regular or called session." See report on page 46.

The moderator recognized Rev. Larry Hughes for the report of the Home Missions Board. Motion prevailed to receive the report as information and adopt the budget. See report on page 54.

A motion prevailed that the incoming moderator be given the authority to select state's delegates to the National Association.

The moderator called for nominations for North Carolina's member on the General Board of the National Association. Rev. Ronald Creech was elected.

The moderator brought before us the need for a committee to entertain the National Association. Motion prevailed that the moderator appoint that committee. In light of the fact that our invitation to host the 1979 session is still pending and has not yet been accepted by the National Association, the appointment of the committee was deferred until next year.

Rev. J. V. Johnson secured the floor and spoke about certain books and versions of the Bible sold in our Bible Book Store, such as Good News For Modern Man, The Living Bible, etc. Motion was offered that the Living Bible or any other untrustworthy version be removed and not sold at our Bible Book Store. After discussing the proposed motion for awhile, a

substitute motion was offered and prevailed "that we remind the Bible Book Store Board to closely adhere to the guidelines drawn up for their operation and approved by this body."

The moderator now recognized Rev. James Pauley with the report of the Nomination Commitee. Upon hearing the report a motion prevailed that we receive the report and vote on it item by item. See report on page 30.

At this time there was a clarification of the members and the expiration date of their terms of the Board of Care for the Aged. They are as follows: Rev. James Pauley's term expires in 1977, Rev. Troy Smith's in 1978, Rev. Billy Allen in 1979, Rev. William Fish in 1980 and Rev. J. C. Lynn in 1981.

The moderator now recognized Sister Molly Barker, missionary to Uraguay, South America, who spoke to the delegates concerning her work there.

Rev. Bob King, pastor of Prospect Church, Dunn, gained the floor and requested information regarding the repeated appeals for support of the Promotional Office. Bro. John Craft arose and expressed regret at the repeated appeals for funds for the same office. Moderator Wiggs related the Executive Board's efforts to support the Promotional Office.

Motion prevailed to adjourn. Moderator Dennis Wiggs called upon Rev. Homer Arrowood, our newly elected moderator, to dismiss us in prayer. Adjournment time - 1:40 P.M.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS MARCH 31, 1976

SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES AND OTHER MATTERS

The accompanying financial statements include the accounts of The Bible Book Store of Durham, Inc. a subordinate member organization of the National Association of Free Will Baptists. Accordingly, it is exempt from Federal income taxes under the Internal Revenue Code Section 501 (c)(3). The primary function of the corporation is supplying Sunday School and other Christian literature to the Free Will Baptist Churches in the southeastern states. It also maintains an inventory of Christian literature for sale to the general public. The store accounts for sales and expenses on the accrual method.

Other significant accounting policies relate to long-term debt, inventories, plant and equipment and lease expense. Their policies are disclosed in Notes 1, 4, 2, 3 and 5, respectively.

NOTE 1

Cash consists of \$1,410 in sinking fund accounts of which use is restricted for retirement of long-term debt consisting of bonds and the interest on these bonds as they become due. (See Note 4, below.)

NOTE 2

Merchandise inventory was taken at retail by seven classifications, Bibles, books, cards,

supplies, music, Sunday School literature, and rebound books. A weighted average markup of retail over cost was derived by each classification and then applied to the retail value to derive an inventory value at lower of cost or market.

NOTE 3

The Bible Book Store of Durham, Inc. employs the straight-line method of depreciating plant and equipment over their estimated useful lives.

NOTE 5

On November 1, 1975 the corporation moved its store facilities to the North Duke Mall and occupied 3,750 square feet of space outside the mall area on a temporary three and one-half month basis at a rental fee of \$620 per month. According to the original five year lease agreement, they were to occupy the temporary location until February 15, 1976, then move into the mall and occupy a 2,962 square feet location for a monthly rental fee of \$1,320. The lease also contained a provision that the rental fee would be eight percent of sales once sales reached \$197,000 annually.

BIBLE BOOK STORE BOARD REPORT

The Bible Book Store was moved to our present location, North Duke Mall, 3600 Duke Street, Durham, N. C., in October 1975. The store was incorporated on October 8, 1975, under the name of THE BIBLE BOOK STORE OF DURHAM, INC. Both of these actions were authorized by the Association at the Thirteenth Annual Session held at Sherwood Forest FWB Church, New Bern, N. C., June 9-11, 1975.

This board met at Liberty FWB Church, Durham on April 6, 1976, in a joint session with the Executive and other Boards of our state association. All of our board members were present.

BIBLE BOOK STORE BOARD REPORT CONTINUED:

Mr. Andy Curl, a member of the accounting firm which is employed by our board, met with us for consultation concerning the financial status of our operation. The financial report of the previous eleven months was carefully reviewed by the board.

Proposed By-Laws for the Book Store have been written and are being submitted for approval at this session of our State Association. Our financial report for the fiscal year ending March 31, 1976, is also being submitted for information and approval.

We, the members of your Book Store Board, welcome and encourage your suggestions as to how we can better serve you through the Book Store. Our manager, Mr. Fred Green, would welcome an opportunity to visit your church during this next year to share with you the services your Book Store has to offer.

We discussed the matter of inviting the National Association to North Carolina and a committee composed of Guy Owens, Ronald Creech, and Billy Gene Outland were authorized to continue to investigate this matter and bring it back to the Association. We also recommended that the Moderator appoint an Audit Committee to examine the Books of the State Program, Promotional Department, and Capital Church Bonds. This Audit Committee is to annually go over the books and report to the Executive Board that the Executive Board might better perform its duty of oversight

for this body. The result of the Audit Committe's study will be passed on to the State Association.

During the year the Executive Board made several appointments with the various boards filling vacancies due to moving, etc.

In our April 6 meeting in addition to hearing reports of the Promotional Department, Capital Church Bonds, and State Program, we planned the program for the State Meeting and prepared a budget for the promotional Department for 1976-77. The result of this work is reflected in this Association Program and our report to the Association.

A special feature of this year's meetings has been the simultaneous meetings of most of our boards at the same time, at the same location, having lunch together and returning to share particular victories, problems, plans, etc., of our work. Thus giving to all board members present an overall view of the entire work of all the boards of the Association and giving the boards the benefit of counsel in needed areas. We feel that this meeting together of the boards has greatly enhanced our state ministry and communication of problemns, needs, etc., and has had a cohesive effect to our state work.

Brother Roy Rikard was elected by the Board as Chairman to replace Brother Joe Hailey and Brother Eddie Riddick was elected as Secretary-Treasurer to replace Brother Harley Brown.

The Treasurer's report showed that we have \$536.49 in the treasury. MSC that we send \$300.00 of this amount to the National Board of Retirement & Insurance.

MSC to adopt the proposed resolution dealing with the setting up of a fund to be used as a gift of appreciation to our retired or disabled North Carolina preachers and missionaries and their widows.

MSC to adopt the proposed guidelines that would be used in deciding which preachers and missionaries and their wives are eligible to receive payments from this retirement fund with the right for each board member to study them and recommend a change later if needed.

September 23, 1975 -- Two members of the Board of Retirement met with Brother Frank Davenport and a representative of Blue Cross for him to explain the proposed increase in the Blue Cross

premiums. A Quorum was not present.

November 28, 1975 -- The North Carolina Board of Retirement and Insurance met at the Faith Free Will Baptist Church in Goldsboro to discuss our health insurance program. Brother Roy Rikard, our chairman, called on Brother Harley Brown to open with prayer. Brother Frank Davenport presented to us a need to amend our current By-Laws.

MSC to amend the By-Laws of the Free Will Baptist Superannuation Association as presented in this meeting.

MSC that the American Association of Independent Employees Plan be made available to our preachers as an alternate to Blue Cross.

MSC that the application for Blue Cross Hospitalization will be accompanied with a certificate statement of Good Health on the date of application.

MSC that the Term Life Insurance Program be made available to all persons who were members of the Superannuation Association prior to May 30, 1974, on each November upon file of proper application.

MSC to ask Brother Rikard to write the other board members who have not been attending the meetings as to whether they will be able to function in the future.

The Board decided to put some promotion in the WITNESS on behalf of the North Carolina Board of Retirement and Insurance.

MSC to adjourn.

January 26, 1976 -- The North Carolina Board of Retirement and Insurance met together at the Faith Free Will Baptist Church in Goldsboro for a called meeting. Brother Frank Davenport showed us the new bookkeeping set-up.

MSC to authorize the clerk to purchase a brief case to be used by the Board.

MSC to ask the State Executive Board to appoint a member in the place of Brother Harley Brown who has moved from our state.

MSC to adjourn.

May 11, 1976 -- The North Carolina Board of Retirement and Insurance met at the Faith Free Will Baptist Church in Goldsboro. Brother Frank Davenport announced that Blue Cross would probably be going up in October and he is working on alternate plans.

MSC to allow Brother Frank to set up an insurance office at the State Meeting.

MSC that we present our appreciation plan to the State Association.

MSC that the Clerk write Brother William Hill to see if he will be able to serve the Retirement Board in the future or if he would like to be replaced.

RECOMMENDATION: We recommend that the State Association allow us to initiate a plan to show appreciation to our retired and disabled ministers in North Carolina.

Eddie Riddick Secretary-Treasurer RESOLUTION REGARDING GUIDELINES FOR MINISTERS TO RECEIVE PAYMENTS FROM OUR BOARD PRESENTED TO ASSOCIATION WHILE IN SESSION.

RESOLUTION;

Whereas - There are a number of Ministers in our state who because of age and/or illness have been forced into retirement from the pastorate and have served our God and our people diligently and

Whereas - We feel there is a need to express our appreciation for their faithful time of service to our state word and

Whereas - We received a suggestion from the Parker's Chapel Church that this remembrance be by a monetary gift.....

Therefore Be It Resolved:

- 1. That we ask all of our North Carolina Churches to contribute by regular monthly support, and give their Sunday School Offering on Father's Day or another designated Sunday offering of their choice, for this specific purpose.
- 2. This money is to be divided equally among the retired or disabled Pastors, Evangelists, and Missionaries or their widows (Spouses) being members of a church affiliated with the National Association of Free Will Baptists and approved by the North Carolina Board of Retirement and Insurance. The Pilot Program payments to be disbursed December 1, and June 1 annually.
- 3. That eligible people be recommended to the Board of Retirement and Insurance by their local church.

4. Guide lines will be published by the Board and made available to anyone upon request. They may be changed by the Board from time to time as the need warrants, if approved by the State Association while in regular or called session.

Guidelines for Ministers who are eligible to receive payments from the North Carolina Free Will Baptist Board of Retirement and Insurance:

- The applicant must be retired from his full time ministry. (Retired means he is no longer receiving a regular salary from his ministry.)
- 2. The applicants' name must be submitted to the Board of Retirement and Insurance by the local church of which he or she is a member. This local church must be affiliated with the National Association of Free Will Baptists.
- 3. The applicant must be either 65 years of age or disabled (disabled means that he has been physically unable to earn any money for the last 6 months.) At such time that he is again able to earn money and is under 65 he is no longer eligible for payments from this board.
- 4. The applicant must have been pastoring church affiliated with the National Association of Free Will Baptists for at least 10 years prior to retirement or disability.
- 5. At least one of the following must apply to the applicant:
- a. He was born in North Carolina, has pastored churches affiliated with the National Association of Free Will Baptist for at least 10 years prior to his disability or retirement and he or his widow is now living in North Carolina.
- b. He was born in North Carolina, has pastored North Carolina churches affiliated with the

National Association of Free Will Baptists for at least 15 years and he or his widow is now living in another state.

- c. He was born outside of North Carolina, has pastored North Carolina churches affiliated with the National Association of Free Will Baptist for at least 20 years and he or his widow is now either living in North Carolina or another state.
- 6. The widow whose husband has met eligibility requirements is also eligible for payments until death as long as she is at least 60 years of age and unmarried.
- 7. The applicant must hold a certificate or ordination into the Gospel Ministry accepted by his local conference or association and be in good standing with such local conference or association.

Minutes of the Fourteeneth Annual Session of the Woman's Auxiliary of the N. C. Association of Original Free Will Baptists, convening with the Grifton Free Will Baptist Church, Grifton, North Carolina, May 4, 1976.
