

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CONSTITUTION OF THE NORTH CAROLINA ASSOCIATION OF FREE WILL BAPTISTS

Preamble

The purpose of this organization shall be the establishment and maintenance of a voluntary association of autonomous Free Will Baptist churches, quarterly meetings (or any other meetings), district associations or conferences or any and all additional organizations - area, district or state-wide that may be deemed essential to the prosecution and promotion of the general purpose and program of this association. Included also in the purpose of this association is affiliation with the National Association of Free Will Baptists, the adoption of the Treatise of the Faith and Practices of Free Will Baptists as adopted by the National Association, and cooperation in its world-wide ministry. This association holds unswerving loyalty to the inspired Word of God as our infallible rule of faith and practice.

Article I. Name

This association shall be known as the North Carolina Association of Free Will Baptists, however, informally the term "State Association" may be used.

Article II. Composition

This association shall be composed of its officers, members of standing boards, ordained and licensed ministers who are in good standing with a conference or association affiliated with this body, together with three (3) delegates elected from each conference or association and one (1) delegate for every fifty (50) members or fraction thereof from each local church which is in good standing with a conference or association affiliated with this body.

Article III. Meetings

Section 1. This association shall convene in regular annual session at a time and place determined by the association in session.

Section 2. In the event of an emergency resulting from a cancellation of the place approved by the association while in annual session, the Executive Board of the association shall have power to make a substitue choice of a suitable location for the annual meeting.

Section 3. Should a called session be deemed essential, the Executive Board shall have authority to issue and publicize a called session of the State Association, said call shall be publicized not less than two (2) weeks in advance of the session.

Section 4. The qualified members in attendance at any regular or called session shall constitute a quorum.

Article IV. Officers

The officers of this association shall consist of the members of the Executive Board, the Board of Trustees, the Board of Missions, the Board of Care for the Aged, the Board of Retirement and Insurance the Board of Youth Relations, and the Bible Book Store Board.

Article V. Boards

Section 1. This association shall establish the following standing boards:

The Executive Board
The Board of Trustees
The Board of Missions
The Board of Care For the Aged
The Board of Retirement and Insurance
The Board of Youth Relations
The Bible Book Store Board

Section 2. The Executive Board shall consist of Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer and three (3) members at large elected by the association.

Section 3. The Board of Trustees shall consist of three (3) members elected by the association.

Section 4. The following boards shall each be composed of five (5) members elected by the association.

The Board of Missions
The Board of Care for the Aged
The Board of Retirement and Insurance
The Board of Youth Relations
The Bible Book Store Board

Article VI. Discipline

This association has no judicial or appellate powers conflicting with the independence of the local church or the bodies constituting this association.

Article VII. Amendments

This constitution may be amended by two-thirds majority vote of the members present and voting at a session of the association provided the proposed amendment is presented to the body one day in advance.

Article VIII. Dissolution

In the event of the dissolution of this association any assets of the organization then remaining shall be conveyed to the National Association of Free Will Baptists.

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Article I. Membership

Section 1. Membership in this association shall be through application of a duly constituted district association (or conference). A credentials committee shall examine the application and make other investigation it deems appropriate. The credentials committee shall make a recommendation to the association as to the action to take regarding the application. The decision on the application shall be by majority vote of delegates present and voting.

Section 2. Each church holding membership in an affiliated association shall automatically be a member of this association.

Article II. Representation

Section 1. Each district association holding membership in the State Association shall send a report of statistics on a form provided by the association to every annual session of the association. Failure to report for two successive sessions of the association may be the basis for dismissal from the association by a majority vote of members present and voting.

Section 2. Seating of delegates shall be through recommendation of a credentials committee. Any potential delegates whose credentials are not recommended for approval by the credentials committee may be seated only by a majority vote of seated delegates who are present and voting.

Article III. Duties of Officers and Boards

Section 1. The Executive Board shall: (1) arrange the program for the annual sessions of the association, (2) fill vacancies which may occur on any

board between sessions of the association, (the person duly elected by the association, (3) promote the work of the association. (4) review the annual reports and proposed budgets of all boards before they are presented to the State Association, (5) provide for and give general supervision to a church bond program and other similar service ministries and, (6) employ and supervise a promotional secretary, whose duties shall be as follows:

- A. Administration. To administer the affairs of the Executive Board within the authority delegated by the board. He shall fulfill all duties commensurate with his office and present plans and procedures to the board which he feels would be effective in promoting the work within the association.
- B. General Promotion. To show through general promotion the correlation and interrelation of all the ministries of the State Association and National Association. It is expected that he will promote impartially the total program of work as devised by all standing boards.
- C. Public Relations. To keep in close contact with pastors, district associations, and local church leaders. He shall represent the State Association to other bodies when in the interest of the association.
- D. Publications. To serve as editor-in-chief of the Free Will Baptist Witness. He shall direct the production of other promotional material as may be approved by the Executive Board.
- E. Stewardship. To provide stewardship education that will serve to produce increased support for the state ministries through the "State Program" and/or other methods of giving by by associations, churches, and individuals.

- f. Arranging Annual Association. To expedite the planning of the annual association program, arrange for the enrolling of ministers and delegates and distribute the printed minutes of the association.
- G. Other Duties. To perform other duties as may be assigned by the Executive Board. It is understood that the Promotional Secretary is to have no official or ex-officio status on any standing board or committee of the association except as may be specifically provided by action of the association.
- H. The Promotional Secretary shall serve as historian for the Association. It shall be his responsibility to gather articles and materials for the historical collection. And also shall publish a history of Free Will Baptists, especially as it relates to the history of Free Will Baptists in North Carolina, and shall update the publication periodically.

The Executive Board may advise and assist other board of the association. The Executive Board is not authorized to act for the association except as provided in the constitution and by-laws of the association or as specifically directed by the association.

Section 2. The Board of Trustees shall be legal custodian of all property belonging to the association except in the case of the standing boards of the association which by action of the association are authorized to incorporate.

Section 3. The Mission Board, the Board of Care for the Aged, the Board of Youth Relations, the Board of Retirement and Insurance and the Bible Book Store Board each shall promote the work within the state as would generally be recognized as coming within the purview of the respective board. Each board shall:

(a) be responsible to

the State Association for all their actions, (b) propose by-laws for the government of their respective work, (The by-laws of each board shall be presented to the association for approval), (c) make an annual report of its accomplishments to the association, and (d) prepare a budget of proposed expenditures which shall be presented to the association for approval.

Section—4. The moderator shall, (1) preside at meetings of the State Association and Executive Board, (2) call meetings of the Executive Board of his own volition or upon request of at least three members of the Executive Board, (3) appoint such committees as are created without provision for their selection, (4) fulfill whatever responsibilities that may be commensurate with the office or that may be delegated by the association.

Section 5. The assistant moderator shall preside at the request of, or in the absence of the moderator and assist the moderator in such manner as may be requested.

Section 6. The clerk shall prepare minutes of the proceedings of all meetings of the association or the Executive Board and preserve an accurate record of said proceedings in a book provided for this purpose and shall handle such official correspondence as may be directed by the association. He shall, through the Executive Board, arrange for the printing of the minutes.

Section 7. The treasurer shall hold in trust all money that belongs to the Executive Board of the association and disburse same by order of the association, the Executive Board, or any standing board or subordinate general organization invested with the authority to authorize the disbursement of funds. He shall keep an accurate account of all funds received and disbursed and make an annual report to the association.

Article IV. Election of Officers and Board Members

Section 1. No person shall hold membership on more than one standing board at the same time.

Section 2. All officers shall be elected by the body. A nominating committee shall be elected at the beginning of each session. After their report is presented, additional nominations for any office may be made from the floor. The General Officers shall be elected for a period of two (2) years. No person shall serve in more than one (1) elected position in the association at the same time, and no one having served a full term shall be elected to succeed himself.

Section 3. The officers of Moderator and Assistant Moderator shall be filled on an alternating basis, from the eastern and western part of the state; Durham shall be the dividing line. When the Moderator is elected from one section, his assistant shall be elected from the other.

Article V. Terms of Office

Section 1. The three (3) members at large elected to the board, shall each have a term of office of three years with their terms arranged so that one (1) member's term expires annually.

Section 2. The members of the Mission Board, Board of Care for the Aged, Board of Youth Relations, Board of Retirement and Insurance and Bible Book Store Board shall each have a term of office of five (5) years with their terms arranged so that one (1) member's term expires annually.

Section 3. The members of the Board of Trustees shall each have a term of office of three (3) years with their terms arranged so that only one member's term expires annually.

Article VI. Committees

Section 1. Various committees shall be constituted, when need arises, by the State Association or the Executive Board. The number of members of a committee shall be determined by the establishing body (State Association or Executive Board). Committee members shall be appointed by the moderator unless otherwise provided by the action creating the committee. Committee members shall serve for the length of time provided, until their work has been completed, until they are released, or their successors chosen.

Section 2. The following committees shall be appointed annually to serve during the session of the State Association:

- A. The credentials committee of three (3) members. This committee shall examine all letters to the association, applications for membership in the association, and credentials of the various delegates. The committee shall make recommendations to the association regarding the seating of delegates and the action to take on applications for membership in the association.
- B. The resolutions committee whose duty it shall be to screen resolutions that are presented. Only resolutions determined by this committee to be worthy are to be presented to the association by the committee.
- C. The finance committee which shall receive and account for all funds received with letters or through offerings during the association.

Article VII. Honorarium and Reimbursements

Section 1. The clerk shall receive as honorarium \$200.00 annually.

Section 2. Members of standing boards, or duly constituted committees, may be reimbursed for expenses in attending board meetings within the state, exclusive of the annual association meeting, at the rate of 15¢ per mile (may claim road distance if traveling by airplane). In addition, if over night travel is required, reimbursement may be made for actual meals and lodging expenses.

Article VIII. Quorum

A simple majority of a board or committee shall constitute a quorum.

Article IX. Proxy

No voting shall be done by proxy in meetings of the State Association. Proxy representation shall be accepted for meetings of the Executive Board provided the proxy is designated in writing by the board member or by oral communication between the member and the moderator.

Article X. Parliamentary Authority

The meetings of the State Association shall be governed by the rules of parliamentary law as set forth in Robert's Rules of Order except in the case of those rules which are superseded by rule of this association.

Article XI. Amendments

These by-laws may be amended by (1) a majority vote of the members present and voting provided the amendment is presented one day prior to the vote, or (2) by a two-thirds majority of those present and voting if immediate action is to be taken as soon as debate has been completed.

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MINUTES OF THE SIXTEENTH ANNUAL SESSION OF THE NORTH CAROLINA ASSOCIATION OF FREE WILL BAPTISTS

When convened with the Goshen Free Will Baptist Church, Belmont, N. C., June 12, 13, 1978

MONDAY MORNING, JUNE 12, 11:00 A. M.

The Monday morning session opened with singing the hymn "Jesus Saves" directed by Bro. Charles Keith. Bro. Bennie Turner introduced Bro. Tom Lilly who read the scripture, I Corinthians 13 and led in prayer. We were welcomed to the Goshen church by the host pastor, Bro. Bennie Turner, who extended a very gracious welcome. Bro. Homer Arrowood responded to the welcome.

Bro. Arrowood greeted the congregation and asked for prayer for this session. Bro. Arrowood gave the appointment of three committees. Bro. James Childers, Bro. James Avery, and Bro. RESOLUTION COMMITTEE

RESOLUTION # I: AGAINST LIQUOR BY THE DRINK

WHEREAS, We as christians believe that God's Word prohibits the use of alcoholic beverages as they are now used, and that God pronounces woes upon the drunkard and those who would put the bottle to his neighbor's lips, and,

WHEREAS, We are aware of the fact that the liquor industry because of their ungodly love for money will never be satisfied until they have a saloon on every corner and liquor flowing freely throughout our state, and,

WHEREAS, We are aware of the fact that a majority of our legislators have sold their souls and their votes to the liquor industry and have flagrantly circumvented the will of the people by passing the liquor by the drink bill, and,

WHEREAS, It is evident that certain moral cowards in our legislature have sold out to this ungodly evil by either "taking a walk" on the crucial vote or else changing their votes from no to yes, thereby allowing this bill to be reconsidered and passed after it had been defeated, and,

WHEREAS, It is the duty of all christians to take a stand against such evil that will destroy the moral fiber of our state, Therefore, Be it, RESOLVED, That we pledge ourselves to continue our fight against the evils of alcoholic beverages, by using every means available to us, and, RESOLVED, That we voice our disapproval of this recent action to our represent atives in no uncertain terms by writing them and letting them know where stand, and,

RESOLVED, That we who are pastors and leaders in the church, keep our people informed, taking our stand against this and all other sin, urging our people to do the same, constantly reminding them that to be silent gives consent, and that the only thing necessary for evil to triumph is for good men to do nothing, and,

RESODVED That we seeing the need for both a spiritual and political Revival in our state, seek to affect these things by falling upon our knees in prayer, seeking the help of our God in combating this evil knowing that the battle is the Lords and He will not fail us, and then do our part by going to the polls and voting to replace these moral cowards who have betrayed us with men of convictions enough to stand against the liquor interests and other kindred evils, and, RESOLVED, That we who live in areas that are immediately affected by this law, gird ourselves for battle, encouraging our people to get out and vote against liquor when a referendum is called, and,

RESOLVED, That we pledge our prayerful support and co-operation with all other christians who will take a stand against this, doing all we can to defeat any legislation or any legislator who seek to liberize the liquor laws.

RESOLUTION # II: AGAINST ERA

WHEREAS, The Word of God clearly reveals God's Will and plan for men, women, and children and their proper place both in the church and in society, and, WHEREAS, There is a bill called ERA now pending before our state legislature, that if allowed to pass would undermine and go against all that God has revealed concerning His will for the tranquility of the human family on this earth, and, WHEREAS, This bill while promising woman liberty would actually enslave her and place her in direct rebellion against God's Word, and, WHEREAS, There are already sufficient laws protecting the rights of women, and ERA would destroy and demean womanhood and the human family as we know it, inviting federal intervention into the most intimate relationships allowing a federal judge to declare what is right or what is wrong, and, WHEREAS, We recognize ERA to be a tool of the devil which would destroy and go against all that God has said concerning the matter, therefore be it,

RESOLVED, That we as christians take our stand upon God's Word and against this ungodly legislation, and, RESOLVED, That we write our legislators voicing our disapproval, asking them to vote no when this bill comes before them, and,

RESOLVED, That we keep ourselves informed of the stand of our representatives in this matter and that we encourage our people to get out and vote against those who would vote for such a law, and.

RESOLVED, That we pledge our prayerful support and co-operation with those who will stand with us against this evil, and.

RESOLVED, That we pledge ourselves as husbands and christians to love our wives even as Christ also loved the church, protecting our wives as God has ordained, and,

RESOLVED, That we encourage our people to write to our representatives in Washington, D. C. opposing the extension of the deadline for passage of ERA.

RESOLUTION # III:

Recommendation from the North Carolina State Association of Free Will Baptists to the Executive Committee of the National Association of Free Will Baptists: We, the North Carolina State Association of Free Will Baptists, having met in Annual session on June 12 and 13, 1978, do recommend that the General Board of the National Association present a recommendation to the body of the National Association in the 1978 session that the Texas State Association delegates not be seated due to the fact that the Midessa Association in Texas has not revoked the ordination credentials of Rev. Archie Joe Cooksey who is a proven liberal heretic.

We further recommend that the National Association refuse to seat the Texas delegates in future National Associational meetings until adequate proof has been submitted to the National Association that Rev. Archie Joe Cooksey's credentials have been revoked by the Midessa Association.

our people astray and even taking some
of our churches into their ranks, and,
WHEREAS, We are aware that this is a
repetition of history, for the same
people invaded our ranks spreading
this false doctrine among our people
at the turn of the century and almost
destroyed our denomination and it's

MINISTER-AT-LARGE-REPORT

During our 1977 session at Raleigh, Rev. L. R. Ennis, now deceased, pleaded with our State Association to continue the Promotional Office. Pastors and delegates voted unanimously to do so.

I became Minister-At-Large (MAL) November 1, 1977. After 7 months I come to write this report.

My heart is filled with gratitude for the privilege of representing Christ and FWB across this great state. Also I am grateful to those pastors and churches who have invited and received me, my preaching and presentation of this ministry so wonderfully. Without your help we could not have progressed this far. Some have helped who we have not yet been able to visit.

I am more convinced than ever of the need of this office. As a pastor I led our church to increase several hundred fold our giving to this office. Should I return to the pastorate, I would lead my church to help.

In addition to the ministry of the word and the promotion of our different departments of work, it has given and can give increasing cohesiveness to our state work.

We are a widespread and diverse people. In the early 60's our state was rent apart by a split that was a "blessing in disguise." However, it left us a scattered and disorganized people. We are like the several pieces of cloth constituting a coat. A coat is made up of collar, sleeves, lapels, front, back and side panels, etc; but it becomes a whole unit and has usefulness because of a relatively insignificant "piece of thread" that sews these parts together at the seams.

The MAL travels backward and forward across our thousands of miles of highways like a tiny piece of thread, seeking to minister and give cohesiveness to our approx 200 churches and 9 district associations.

The need of this office was impressed upon me recently as I considered "what would N. C. FWB be like without the ministry of this office?" We would be widely scattered with little or no knowledge of each other and having almost no fellowship except at the district and state levels. The MAL office through travel and printing gives us some contact all year through.

As I look to the future I see this office making an even greater contribution to N. C. FWB.

We need a renewed "forward thrust" in establishing new soul-winning churches. This office as no other can greatly aid our Home Missions Board in laying this need upon the hearts of our people. Our Rest Home Board needs support from a broader base of our churches. dept. can help present this need statewide. Our Superannuation Board has taken a noble step to help retired preachers and/or their widows. They need assistance in acquainting churches with their program and in seeking involvement. This dept. can greatly help. Our Youth Board is doing a commendable job. This office can assist them in presenting their work to other churches, who now do not participate, theu enlarging their ministry.

During the past 12 months we have lost 3 churches due to the influence of Calvinistic teaching. Some feel this problem is more widespread then appears on the surface. This dept. can through travels and printing of The Witness inform our pastors and people as to what is happening so that we may be warned and suffer the least possible harm.

The main function of the Minister-At-Large office is "Ministry." Ministry is "one-service appearances" where we represent the entire scope of ourstate associational works, ministry in Revivals, Bible Conferences and Youth Camps.

Soon we plan to prepare weekly programs for release on radio and eventually T. V. Specials. Personally I will not be satisfied in this ministry until I have a consecutive meaningful ministry of the word. This "different place" every service" drains the soul. Please pray for God's leadership in these new phases of ministry.

Our great need is for regular monthly financial support. States who champion the cooperative plan of support say "you'll never support a promotional department by seeking direct support gifts." I believe we will. It has been hard, harder than I expected. But God has richly blessed us these 7 months.

I appeal to every pastor and church to send us some type of gift each month. There is so much that can be done if we will all "do our part."

The Witness, our state paper, has for some time been paid for "off the top" of state program receipts. This plan has allowed every FWB in the state to receive The Witness "without charge" to them, however, the full cost was paid for by those churches who gave. This plan is no longer working. We must devise a new and I believe more equitable plan.

The approx annual cost of The Witness is just over \$6,000.00. I believe our people appreciate and value The Witness . If most of them know that they are receiving it "at some-one else's expense" and they and their churches are contributing "nothing," I believe they will respond. Brother Ted Reynolds, Pastor Parker's Chapel Church, Greenville, challenges at least 59 other churches to give an annual gift of \$100.00 to support The Witness, thus creating a solid and broader base of support. This could be done (1) By a direct gift from the church treasury; (2) By having a Witness Sunday and receiving a good offering. At this association you will have an opportunity to indicate your willingness to help.

We need your prayers as we continue to minister and give leadership in many areas of our state work.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS DECEMBER 31, 1977

SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES AND OTHER MATTERS

The accompanying financial statements include the accounts of The Bible Book
Store of Durham, Inc. a subordinate member of the National Association of Free Will Baptist Churches. Accordingly, it is exampt from Federal income taxes under the Internal Revenue Code Section 501 (c) (3). The primary function of the corporation is supplying Sunday School and other Christian literature to the Free Will Baptist Churches in the southeastern states. It also maintains an inventory of Christian literature for sale to the general public. The store accounts for sales and expenses on the accrual method.

Other significant accounting policies relate to long-term debt, inventories, plant and equipment and lease expense and major sales categories. Their policies are disclosed in Notes 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6 respectively.

NOTE 1

Cash includes \$1,843 in sinking fund accounts of which use is restricted for retirement of long-term debt consisting of bonds and the interest on these bonds as they become due. (See Note 2, below.)

NOTE 2

Long-term obligations of The Bible Book Store of Durham, Inc. consist of the following at December 31, 1977:

\$18,250 of General Obligation 7% Sinking Fund Church Building Bonds, Series "A", \$1,750 due within one year. (See Note 1, above.)

NOTE 3

Merchandise inventory was taken at retail by seven classifications, Bibles books, cards, supplies, music, Sunday School literature, and rebound books. A weighted average markup of retail over cost was derived by each classification and then applied to the retail value to derive an inventory value at lower of cost or market.

NOTE 4

The Bible Book Store of Durham, Inc employs the straight-line method of depreciating plant and equipment over their estimated useful lives.

NOTE 5

At the balance sheet date, the store continuing to occupy an "outside-the-mall" location at the North Duke Mall at a \$620 per month rental rate. Renewal of the original five-year lease agreement, which expired February 15, 1976, is currently being negotiated. At the balance sheet date, no substantial agreement has been reached concerning the terms of the proposed lease agreement.

NOTE 6

Sales for the nine months ended December 31, 1977 were \$150,626, of which \$71,726, or 48% was generated from the service of supplying, at wholesale prices, Sunday School and Vacation Bible School materials to member churches of the Free Will Baptist Association. \$78,900, or 52%, of sales was generated from the retail sales of Christian literature, paintings, music, cards, and supplies as well as limited services of imprinting and binding of paper products. Some of the major classifications of sales comprising the \$78,900 figure are: books \$21,881; supplies \$23,793; music \$15,266; Bibles \$15,233; and cards \$2,589.
