

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## NORTH CAROLINA ASSOCIATION OF FREE WILL BAPTISTS

#### Preamble

Arthele INTE

The purpose of this organization shall be the establishment and maintenance of a voluntary association of automomous Free Will Baptist churches, quarterly meetings (or any other meetings), district associations or conferences or any and all additional organizations - area, district or state-wide that may be deemed essential to the prosecution and promotion of the general purpose and program of this association. Included also in the purpose of this association is affiliation with the National Association of Free Will Baptists, the adoption of the Treatise of the Faith and Practices of Free Will Baptists as adopted by the National Association, and cooperation in its world-wide ministry. This association holds unswerving loyalty to the inspired Word of God, as our infallible rule of faith and practice.

#### Article I. Name

This association shall be known as the North Carolina Association of Free Will Baptists, however, informally the term "State Association" may be used.

#### Article II. Composition

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This association shall be composed of its officers, members of standing boards, ordained and licensed ministers who are in good standing with a conference or association affiliated with this body, together with three (3) delegates elected from each conference or association and one(1) delegate for every fifty (50) members or fraction thereof from each local church which is in good standing with a conference or association affiliated with this body.

#### Article III. Meetings

Section 1. This association shall convene in regular annual session at a time and place determined by the association in session.

Section 2. In the event of an emergency resulting from a cancellation of the place approved by the association while in annual session, the Executive Board of the association shall have power to make a substitute choice of a suitable location for the annual meeting.

Section 3. Should a called session be deemed essential, the Executive Board shall have authority to issue and publicize a called session of the State Association, said call shall be publicized not less than two (2) weeks in advance of the session.

Section 4. The qualified members in attendance at any regular or called session shall constitute a quorum.

#### Article IV. Officers

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The officers of this association shall consist of the members of the Executive Board, the Board of Trustees, The Board of Missions, the Board of Care for the Aged, the Board of Retirement and Insurance, The Board of Youth Relations, and the Bible Book Store Board.

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#### Article V. Boards

Section 1. This association shall establish the following standing boards:

The Executive Board
The Board of Trustees
The Board of Missions
The Board of Care For The Aged
The Board of Retirement and Insurance
The Board of Youth Relations
The Bible Book Store Board

Section 2. The Executive Board shall consist of Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer and three (3) members at large elected by the association.

Section 3. The Board of Trustees shall consist of three (3) members elected by the association.

Section 4. The following boards shall each be composed of five (5) members elected by the association.

The Board of Missions
The Board of Care for the Aged
The Board of Retirement and Insurance
The Board of Youth Relations
The Bible Book Store Board

#### Article VI. Discipline

This association has no judicial or appellate powers conflicting with the independence of the local church or the bodies constituting this association.

#### Article VII. Amendments

This constitution may be amended by two-thirds

majority vote of the members present and voting at a session of the association provid ed the proposed amendment is presented to the body one day in advance.

#### Article VIII. Dissolution

In the event of the dissolution of this association any assets of the organization then remaining shall be conveyed to the National Association of Free Will Baptist.

#### BY-LAWS

### Article I. Membership

Section 1. Membership in this association shall be through application of a duly constituted district association (or conference). A credentials committee shall examine the application and make other investigation it deems appropriate. The credentials committee shall make a recommendation to the association as to the action to take regarding the application. The decision on the application shall be by majority vote of delegates present and voting.

Section 2. Each church holding membership in an affiliated association shall automatically be a member of this association.

#### Article II. Representation

Section 1. Each district association holding membership in the State Association shall send a report of statistics on a form provided by the association to every annual session of the association. Failure to report for two successive sessions of the association may be the basis for dismissal from the association by a

majority vote of members present and voting.

Section 2. Seating of delegates shall be through recommendation of a credentials committee. Any potential delegates whose credentials committee may be seated only by a majority vote of seated delegates who are present and voting.

#### Article III. Duties of Officers and Boards

Section 1. The Executive Board shall: (1) arrange the program for the annual sessions of the association, (2) fill vacancies which may occur on any board between sessions of the association, (the person duly elected by the association, (3) promote the work of the association, (4) review the annual reports and proposed budgets of all boards before they are presented to the State Association, (5) provide for and give general supervision to a church bond program and other similar service ministries and, (6) employ and supervise a promotional secretary, whose duties shall be as follows:

- A. Administration. To administer the affairs of the Executive Board within the authority delegated by the board. He shall fulfill all duties commensurate with his office and present plans and procedures to the board which he feels would be effective in promoting the work within the association.
- B. General Promotion. To show through general promotion the correlation and interrelation of all the ministries of the State Association and National Association. It is expected that he will promote impartially the total program of work as devised by all standing boards.

- C. Public Relations. To keep in close contact with pastors, district associations, and local church leaders. He shall represent the State Association to other bodies when in the interest of the association.
  - D. Publications. To serve as editor-inchief of the Free Will Baptist Witness. He shall direct the production of other promotional material as may be approved by the Executive Board.
  - E. Stewardship. To provide a stewardship edcation that will serve to produce increased support for the state ministries through the "State Program" and/or other methods of giving by association, churches, and individuals.
  - F. Arranging Annual Association. To expedite the planning of the annual association program, arrange for the enrolling of ministers and delegates and distribute the printed minutes of the association.
- G. Other Duties. To perform other duties as may be assigned by the Executive Board. It is understood that the Promotional Secretary is to have no official or exofficio status on any standing board or committee of the association except as may be specifically provided by action of the association.
  - H. The Promotional Secretary shall serve as historian for the Association. It shall be his responsibility to gather articles and materials for the historical collection. And also shall publish a history of Free Will Baptists, especially as it relates to the history of Free Will Bap-

tists in North Carolina, and shall update the publication periodically.

The Executive Board may advise and assist other boards of the association. The Executive Board is not authorized to act for the association except as provided in the constitution and by-laws of the association or as specifically directed by the association.

Section 2. The Board of Trustees shall be legal custodian of all property belonging to the Association except in the case of the standing boards of the association which by action of the association are authorized to incorporate.

Section 3. The Mission Board, the Board Care for the Aged, The Board of Youth Relations, the Board of Retirement and Insurance and the Bible Book Store Board each shall promote the work within the State as would generally be recognized as coming within the purview of the respective board. Each board shall: (a) be responsible to the State Association for all their actions, (b) propose bylaws for the government of their respective work, (the by-laws of each board shall be presented to the association for approval). (c) make an annual report of its accomplishments to the association, and (d) prepare a budget of proposed expenditures which shall be presented to the association for approval.

Section 4. The moderator shall, (1) preside at meetings of the State Association and Executive Board, (2) call meetings of the Executive Board of his own volition or upon request of at least three members of the Executive Board, (3) appoint such committees as are created without provision for their selection, (4) fulfill whatever responsibilities that may be commensurate with the office or that may be

delegated by the association.

Section 5. The assistant moderator shall preside at the request of, or in the absence of the moderator and assist the moderator in such manner as may be requested.

Section 6. The clerk shall prepare minutes of the proceedings of all meetings of the association or the Executive Board and preserve an accurate record of said proceedings in a book provided for this purpose and shall handle such official correspondence as may be directed by the association. He shall, through the Executive Board, arrange for the printing of the minutes.

Section 7. The treasurer shall hold in trust all money that belongs to the Executive Board of the association and disburse same by order of the association, the Executive Board, Or any standing board or subordinate general organization invested with the authority to authorize the disbursement of funds. He shall keep an accurate account of all funds received and disbursed and make an annual report to the association.

### Article IV. Election of Officers and Board Members

Section 1. No person shall hold membership on more than one standing board at the same time.

Section 2. All officers shall be elected by the body. A nominating committee shall be elected at the beginning of each session. After their report is presented, additional nominations for any office may be made from the floor. The General Officers shall be elected for a period of two (2) years. No person shall serve in more than one (1) elected

position in the association at the same time, and no one having served a full term shall be elected to succeed himself.

Section 3. The officers of Moderator and Assistant Moderator shall be filled on an alternating basis, from the eastern and western part of the state; Durham shall be the dividing line. When the Moderator is elected from one section, his assistant shall be elected from the other.

#### Article V. Terms of Office

Section1. The three (3) members at large elected to the board, shall each have a term of office of three years with their terms arranged so that one (1) member's term expires annually.

Section 2. The members of the Mission Board, Board of Care for the Aged, Board of Youth Relations, Board of Retirement and Insurance and Bible Book Store Board shall each have a term of office of five (5) years with their terms arranged so that one (1) member's term expires annually.

Section 3. The members of the Board of Trustees shall each have a term of office of three (3) years with their terms arranged so that only one member's term expires annually.

#### Article VI. Committees

Section 1. Various committees shall be constituted when need arises, by the State Association or the Executive Board. The number of members of a committee shall be determined by the establishing body (State Association or Executive Board). Committee members shall be appointed by the moderator unless otherwise

provided by the action creating the committee. Committee members shall serve for the length of time provided, until their work has been completed, until they are released, or their successors chosen.

Section 2. The following committees shall be appointed annually to serve during the session of the State Association.

- A. The credentials committee of three (3) members. This committee shall examine all letters to the association, applications for membership in the association, and credentials of the various delegates. The committee shall make recommendations to the association regarding the seating of delegates and the action to take on applications for membership in the association.
- B. The resolutions committee whose duty it shall be to screen resolutions that are presented. Only resolutions determined by this committee to be worthy are to be presented to the association by the committee.
- C. The finance committee which shall receive and account for all funds received with letters or through offerings during the association.

Article VII. Honorarium and Reimbursements

Section 1. The clerk shall receive as honor-arium \$200.00 annually.

Section 2. Members of standing boards, or duly constituted committees, may be reimbursed for expenses in attending board meetings within the state, exclusive of the annual association meeting, at the rate of 15¢ per mile (may claim road distance if traveling by airplane). In addition, if over-night travel is required, reimbursement may be made for actual meals and lodging expenses.

#### Article VIII. Quorum

A simple majority of a board or committee shall constitute a quorum.

#### Article IX. Proxy

No voting shall be done by proxy in meetings of the State Association. Proxy representation shall be accepted for meetings of the Executive Board provided the proxy is designated in writing by the board member or by oral communication between the member and the moderator.

#### Article X. Parliamentary Authority

The meetings of the State Association shall be governed by the rules of parliamentary law as set forth in Robert's Rules of Order except in the case of those rules which are superseded by rule of this association.

#### Article XI. Amendments

These by-laws may be amended by (1) a majority vote of the members present and voting provided the amendment is presented one day prior to the vote, or (2) by a two-thirds majority of those present and voting if immediate action is to be taken as soon as debate has been completed.

## MINUTES OF THE SEVENTEENTH ANNUAL SESSION OF THE NORTH CAROLINA ASSOCIATION OF FREE WILL BAPTISTS

When convened with the Tabernacle Free Will Baptist Church, Kinston, N. C., June 11, 12, 1979.

MONDAY MORNING, JUNE 11, 11:00 A. M.

The Monday morning session opened with the hymn, "On Christ The Solid Rock I Stand" led by Bro. Ronnie Williamson. Bro. William Reagan, moderator, presided in the absence of Bro. Billy Gene Outland in opening the session. Bro. Tom Lilley read Psalm 33:1-12 and opened in prayer. The host pastor, Bro. Johnnie Pike, welcomed us to the Tabernacle Church.

Bro. Reagan gave the appointment of three committees. To the Credentials Committee were appointed Bro. Wayne Smith, Bro. George Lee, and Bro. Ralph Osborne. The Finance Committee consisted of Bro. John Craft, Bro. Larry Hughes, and Bro. Dennis Wiggs, Bro. Earl Hanna, Bro. Alvis Harris, and Bro. Larry Stevens were appointed to the Resolutions Committee.

The 1979 session was officially called to order by Bro. Guy Owens, Clerk Pro-Tem, in the absence of the clerk, who was incapacitated by surgery and could not be present.

An announcement was made that Bro. Ronald Creech would like to meet with the pastors and their wives from the Coastal Association for lunch today.

Bro. Steve Ashby, pastor of St. Johns Church in Goldsboro, sang "Deeper Than The

Stain Has Gone" followed by the morning message brought by Bro. Eddie Dollar on the passage from Isiah 26:3. The main points of his message was the Four-Fold Meaning of Trust:
1. To take refuge in (Ruth 2:12); 2. What time you are afraid, trust in the Lord (Ps. 56:3);
3. To roll on Him all I cannot carry (Ps. 22:8)
4. To stand for the Lord (Job 35:14). He also brought out Four Things About Peace: 1. Peace amidst unprecendented turmoil; 2. Peace in view of unparalled wrath;
3. Peace of unexcelled description; 4. Peace of unlimited source.

Following the morning message the moderator replaced Dennis Wiggs with Glen Thomas on the Finance Committee.

The host pastor gave directions and information concerning the lunch hour and restaurants available in the area.

Bro. A. C. Morgan dismissed us in prayer.

#### MONDAY AFTERNOON SESSION, JUNE 11

The Monday afternoon session was opened with the singing of "There's Within My Heart A Melody" led by Bro. Ronnie Williamson. Bro. Larry Inscoe, missionary to Panama, opened in prayer. Bro. Bill Gardner, pastor of Liberty FWB Church in Durham, sang "Zion's Hill."

Bro. Bill Reagan brought the moderator's message which centered around the thought of doing "One Thing" noting that we often use the expression that we will do a given task "if it is the last thing I do". He brought forth the following examples from the scripture of the "one things" we ought to have, do or

desire. (1) Desire - Psalm 27:4 - To dwell in the House of the Lord. (2) Lacking - Mark 10: 21 - Treasure in Heaven. (3) Needful - Luke 10:42 - To sit as Jesus feet like Mary and hear His Word. (4) I Know - John 9:25 - That where I was blind now I see. (5) I Do - Phil. 3:13 - Forgetting those things that are behind and reaching forth unto those things which are before. To realize what we lack, desire those things that are needful, and to know our standing in Christ will produce Paul's admonition to press toward the mark.

The moderator recognized Bro. Wayne Smith for a partial report of the Credential Committee. A motion prevailed that the partial report of the Credentials Committee be received and that the delegates be seated.

Moderator read a letter from the Bethel Church concerning not filling in the financial statistics on the long reports that the churches send to the State and National Associations. A motion was entertained to consider. Another motion prevailed to postpone and refer to a committee to report back tomorrow. The motion carried and the moderator is to appoint a committee.

Bro. Guy Owens was recognized and gave the Executive Committee Report.

A motion was made to adopt planned program with flexibility. Vote carried.

and his wife and son, Bro. James Raper, Bro. Loyd Olson, and Bro. Ronald Creech.

The following were nominated to serve on the Nomination Committee: Bro. Van Dale Hudson, Bro. Jakie Creech who declined, Bro. Billy Jackson, Bro. Jack Forlines who declined, Bro. Jerry Rackley, Bro. Gene Hales and Bro. William Calvert. Motion prevailed that nominations cease and these five be elected.

The moderator recognized Bro. Guy Owens who gave the Minister-At-Large Report. The report was given and adopted. (See report)

The moderator appointed the following committee to study and bring back a recommendation on the report form: Frank Davenport, Bro Eddie Dollar, and Bro. Glenn Thomas.

Brother Guy Owens, Acting Treasurer, gave the State Treasurer's Report.

The moderator also recognized Bro. Guy Owens to give reports on the following: Promotion Dept. State Program and the 1979 Budget. Vote carried to receive the reports and adopt the budget with the following exception: The Miscellaneous item was raised to \$1,500 from \$300. (See reports)

The moderator recognized Bro. Fred Greene who gave the Report of Bible Book Store. (See report).

Lorenza Stox was recognized by the moderator to give the Report of the Youth Board. (See report.)

The moderator recognized Bro. Jack

Williams for a Report of the Executive Dept. He gave a report on the National Association that is to meet in Charlotte, N. C. in July. He also gave a report on Contact Magazine, and urged us to support the Executive Office. Motion prevailed that we receive this as information.

The moderator recognized Bro. Loyd Olson, who gave a report on the National Layman's Board. Motion prevailed to receive as information.

The moderator recognized Bro. James E. Raper for a Report of the Free Will Baptist Children's Home in Greeneville, Tenn. He stated that last year North Carolina Free Will Baptists gave over \$12,000 to the home. He also stated that two of their children are from North Carolina. This is their 40th year of operation.

An offering was received.

The moderator declared floor open for miscellaneous business. Nothing arose so we continued reports.

The report of the State Board of Retirement and Insurance was given. Motion prevailed to receive report. 

### MINISTER-AT-LARGE REPORT

With joy and gratitude to God and our Free Will Baptist people of North Carolina, I come to report to this 1979 session.

There is generally a good, wholesome state of fellowship among our churches and pastors. In several areas pastors are meeting together monthly for fellowship and prayer. Some plan association-wide events involving wives and families.

### NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS DECEMBER 31, 1978

### SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES AND OTHER MATTERS

The accompanying financial statements include the accounts of The Bible Book Store of Durham Inc., a subordinate member organization of the National Association of Free Will Baptists. Accordingly, it is exempt from Federal income taxes under the Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(3). The primary function of the Corporation is supplying Sunday School and other Christian literature to the Free Will Baptist Churches in the southeastern states. It also

maintains an inventory of Christian literature for sale to the general public. The store accounts for sales and expenses on the accrual method.

Merchandise inventory was taken at retail by seven classifications, Bibles, books, cards, supplies, music, Sunday School literature, and rebound books. A weighted average markup of retail over cost was derived for each classification and then applied to the retail value to derive an inventory value at lower of cost or market.

Other significant accounting policies relate to long-term debt, plant and equipment, lease expense and major sales categories. Their policies are disclosed in Notes 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5, respectively.

### NOTE 1

Sinking fund accounts of \$1,907 included in cash are restricted for retirement of long term debts consisting of bonds and the interest on these bonds as they become due (See Note 2, below.)

#### NOTE 2

Long-term obligations of The Bible Book Store of Durham, Inc. consist of the following at December 31, 1978:

\$16,500 of General Obligation 7% Sinking Fund Church Building Bonds, Series "A", \$2,000 of which is due within one year. (See Note 1, above.)

Bad debts are accounted for by the direct

-Charge off" method whereby accounts are charged off as they are determined to be uncollectible.

#### NOTE #3

Equipment is stated at cost less accumulated depreciation which is computed on the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the assets.

#### NOTE 4

At the balance sheet date, the store is continuing to occupy an "outside-the-mall" location at the North Duke Mall at \$620 per month rental rate. Renewal of the original five-year lease agreement, which expired February 15, 1976, is currently being negotiated. At the balance sheet date, no substantial agreement has been reached concerning the terms of the proposed lease agreement.

#### NOTE 5

Sales for the year ended December 31, 1978 were \$210,695 of which \$98,508, or 47%, was generated from the service of supplying Sunday School and Vacation Bible School materials to member churches of the Free Will Baptist Association.

### NOTE 5, Cont.

Sales of \$112,187, or 53%, were generated from the retail sales of Christian literature, paintings, music, cards, and supplies as well as limited services of imprinting and binding of paper products. Some of the major classifications of sales comprising the \$112,187 figures are: books \$29,284; supplies \$36,133; music \$22,341; Bibles \$19,622; and cards \$4,297.
