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CONSTITUTION
OF THE
NORTH CAROLINA ASSOCIATION OF
FREE WILL BAPTISTS

Preamble

The purpose of this organization shall be the establishment and maintenance of a voluntary association of autonomous Free Will Baptist churches, quarterly meetings (or any other meetings), district associations or conferences or any and all additional organizations - area, district or statewide that may be deemed essential to the prosecution and promotion of the general purpose and program of this association. Included also in the purpose of this association is affiliation with the National Association of Free Will Baptists, the adoption of the Treatise of the Faith and Practices of Free Will Baptists as adopted by the National Association, and cooperation in its world-wide ministry. This association holds unswerving loyalty to the inspired Word of God as our infallible rule of faith and practice.

Article I. Name

This association shall be known as the North Carolina Association of Free Will Baptists, however, informally the term "State Association" may be used.

Article II. Composition

This association shall be composed of its officers, members of standing boards, ordained and licensed ministers who are in good standing with a conference or association affiliated with this body, together with three (3) delegates elected from each conference or association and one (1) delegate for every fifty (50) members or fraction thereof from each local church which is in good standing with a conference or association affiliated with this body.

Article III. Meetings

Section 1. This association shall convene in regular annual session Monday and Tuesday after the first Sunday in June and at a place determined by the association in session.

Section 2. In the event of an emergency resulting from a cancellation of the place approved by the association while in annual session, the Executive Board of the association shall have power to make a substitute choice of a suitable location for the annual meeting.

Section 3. Should a called session be deemed essential, the Executive Board shall have authority to issue and publicize a called session of the State Association, said call shall be publicized not less than two (2) weeks in advance of the session.

Section 4. The qualified members in attendance at any regular or called session shall constitute a quorum.

Article IV. Officers

The officers of this association shall consist of the members of the Executive Board, the Board of Trustees, the Board of Missions, the Board of Care for the Aged, the Board of Retirement and Insurance, the Board of Youth Relations, and the Bible Book Store Board.

Article V. Boards

Section 1. This association shall establish the following standing boards:

- The Executive Board
- The Board of Trustees
- The Board of Missions
- The Board of Care For The Aged

The Board of Retirement and Insurance
The Board of Youth Relations
The Bible Book Store Board

Section 2. The Executive Board shall consist of Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer and three (3) members at large elected by the association.

Section 3. The Board of Trustees shall consist of three (3) members elected by the association.

Section 4. The following boards shall each be composed of five (5) members elected by the association.

The Board of Missions
The Board of Care for the Aged
The Board of Retirement and Insurance
The Board of Youth Relations
The Bible Book Store Board

Article VI. Discipline

This association has no judicial or appellate powers conflicting with the independence of the local church or the bodies constituting this association.

Article VII. Amendments

This constitution may be amended by two-thirds majority vote of the members present and voting at a session of the association provided the proposed amendment is presented to the body one day in advance.

Article VIII. Dissolution

In the event of the dissolution of this association any assets of the organization then remaining shall be conveyed to the National Association of Free Will Baptist.

BY-LAWS

Article I. Membership

Section 1. Membership in this association shall be through application of a duly constituted district association (or conference). A credentials committee shall examine the application and make other investigation it deems appropriate. The credentials committee shall make a recommendation to the association as to the action to take regarding the application. The decision on the application shall be by majority vote of delegates present and voting.

Section 2. Each church holding membership in an affiliated association shall automatically be a member of this association.

Article II. Representation

Section 1. Each district association holding membership in the State Association shall send a report of statistics on a form provided by the association to every annual session of the association. Failure to report for two successive sessions of the association may be the basis for dismissal from the association by a majority vote of members present and voting.

Section 2. Seating of delegates shall be through recommendation of a credentials committee. Any potential delegate whose credentials are not recommended for approval by the Credentials Committee may be seated only by a majority vote of seated delegates who are present and voting.

Article III.

Duties of Officers and Boards

Section 1. The Executive Board shall: (1) arrange the program for the annual sessions of the association, (2) fill vacancies which may occur on any board between sessions of the association, (the

person duly elected by the association), (3) promote the work of the association, (4) review the annual reports and proposed budgets of all boards before they are presented to the State Association, (5) provide for and give general supervision to a church bond program and other similar service ministries and, (6) employ and supervise a promotional secretary, whose duties shall be as follows:

- A. Administration. To administer the affairs of the Executive Board within the authority delegated by the board. He shall fulfill all duties commensurate with his office and present plans and procedures to the board which he feels would be effective in promoting the work within the association.
- B. General Promotion. To show through general promotion the correlation and interrelation of all the ministries of the State Association and National Association. It is expected that he will promote impartially the total program of work as devised by all standing boards.
- C. Public Relations. To keep in close contact with pastors, district associations, and local church leaders. He shall represent the State Association to other bodies when in the interest of the association.
- D. Publications. To serve as editor-in-chief of the Free Will Baptist Witness. He shall direct the production of other promotional material as may be approved by the Executive Board.
- E. Stewardship. To provide a stewardship education that will serve to produce increased support for the state ministries through the "State Program" and/or other methods of giving by association, churches, and individuals.
- F. Arranging Annual Association. To expediate

the planning of the annual association program, arrange for the enrolling of ministers and delegates and distribute the printed minutes of the association.

- C. Other Duties. To perform other duties as may be assigned by the Executive Board. It is understood that the Promotional Secretary is to have no official or ex-officio status on any standing board or committee of the association except as may be specifically provided by action of the association.
- H. The Promotional Secretary shall serve as historian for the Association. It shall be his responsibility to gather articles and materials for the historical collection. And also shall publish a history of Free Will Baptists, especially as it relates to the history of Free Will Baptists in North Carolina, and shall update the publication periodically.

The Executive Board may advise and assist other boards of the association. The Executive Board is not authorized to act for the association except as provided in the constitution and by-laws of the association or as specifically directed by the association.

Section 2. The Board of Trustees shall be legal custodian of all property belonging to the Association except in the case of the standing boards of the Association which by action of the association are authorized to incorporate.

Section 3. The Mission Board, the Board of Care for the Aged, the Board of Youth Relations, the Board of Retirement and Insurance and the Bible Book Store Board each shall promote the work within the State as would generally be recognized as coming within the purview of the respective board. Each board shall: (a) be responsible to the State Association

for all their actions, (b) propose by-laws for the government of their respective work, (the by-laws of each board shall be presented to the association for approval), (c) make an annual report of its accomplishments to the association, and (d) prepare a budget of proposed expenditures which shall be presented to the association for approval.

Section 4. The moderator shall, (1) preside at meetings of the State Association and Executive Board, (2) call meetings of the Executive Board of his own volition or upon request of at least three members of the Executive Board, (3) appoint such committees as are created without provision for their selection, (4) fulfill whatever responsibilities that may be commensurate with the office or that may be delegated by the association.

Section 5. The assistant moderator shall preside at the request of, or in the absence of the moderator and assist the moderator in such manner as may be requested.

Section 6. The clerk shall prepare minutes of the proceedings of all meetings of the association or the Executive Board and preserve an accurate record of said proceedings in a book provided for this purpose and shall handle such official correspondence as may be directed by the association. He shall, through the Executive Board, arrange for the printing of the minutes.

Section 7. The treasurer shall hold in trust all money that belongs to the Executive Board of the association and disburse same by order of the association. The Executive Board, or any standing board or subordinate general organization invested with the authority to authorize the disbursement of funds. He shall keep an account of all funds received and disbursed and make an annual report to the association.

Article IV.

Election of Officers and Board Members

Section 1. No person shall hold membership on more than one standing board at the same time.

Section 2. All officers shall be elected by the body. A nominating committee shall be elected at the beginning of each session. After their report is presented, additional nominations for any office may be made from the floor. The General Officers shall be elected for a period of two (2) years. No person shall serve in more than one (1) elected position in the association at the same time, and no one having served a full term shall be elected to succeed himself.

Section 3. The officers of Moderator and Assistant Moderator shall be filled on an alternating basis, from the eastern and western part of the state; Durham shall be the dividing line. When the Moderator is elected from one section, his assistant shall be elected from the other.

Article V. Terms of Office

Section 1. The three (3) members at large elected to the board, shall each have a term of office of three (3) years with their terms arranged so that one (1) member's term expires annually.

Section 2. The members of the Mission Board, Board of Care for the Aged, Board of Youth Relations, Board of Retirement and Insurance and Bible Book Store Board shall each have a term of office of five (5) years with their terms arranged so that one (1) member's term expires annually.

Section 3. The members of the Board of Trustees shall each have a term of office of three (3) years with their terms arranged so that only one member's term expires annually.

Article VI. Committees

Section 1. Various committees shall be constituted when need arises, by the State Association or the Executive Board. The number of members of a committee shall be determined by the establishing body (State Association or Executive Board). Committee members shall be appointed by the moderator unless otherwise provided by the action creating the committee. Committee members shall serve for the length of time provided, until their work has been completed, until they are released, or their successors chosen.

Section 2. The following committees shall be appointed annually to serve during the session of the State Association.

- A. The credentials committee of three (3) members. This committee shall examine all letters to the association, applications for membership in the association, and credentials of the various delegates. The committee shall make recommendations to the Association regarding the seating of delegates and the action to take on applications for membership in the association.
- B. The resolutions committee whose duty it shall be to screen resolutions that are presented. Only resolutions determined by this committee to be worthy are to be presented to the association by the committee.
- C. The finance committee which shall receive and account for all funds received with letters or through offerings during the association.

Article VII

Honorarium and Reimbursements

Section 1. The Clerk shall receive as honorarium \$200.00 annually.

Section 2. Members of standing boards, or duly constituted committees, may be reimbursed for expenses in attending board meetings within the state, exclusive of the annual association meeting, at the rate of 20¢ per mile (may claim road distance if traveling by airplane). In addition if over-night travel is required, reimbursement may be made for actual meals and lodging expenses. No employee of any board may be reimbursed for any travel in excess of this amount.

Article VIII. Quorum

A simple majority of a board of committee shall constitute a quorum.

Article IX. Proxy

No voting shall be done by proxy in meetings of the State Association. Proxy representation shall be accepted for meetings of the Executive Board provided the proxy is designated in writing by the board member or by oral communication between the member and the moderator.

Article X.

Parliamentary Authority

The meetings of the State Association shall be governed by the rules of parliamentary law as set forth in Robert's Rules of Order except in the case of those rules which are superseded by rule of this association.

Article XI. Amendments

These by-laws may be amended by (1) majority vote of the members present and voting provided the amendment is presented on day prior to the vote, or (2) by a two-thirds majority of those present and voting if immediate action is to be taken as soon as debate has been completed.

MONDAY MORNING, JUNE 7, 10:00 A.M.

The twentieth annual session of the North Carolina Association of Free Will Baptist convened Monday, June 7, at the West Calvary Free Will Baptist Church in Smithfield, N. C. After registration and fellowship, the session began at 10:00 A.M. with Rev. Robert Durham presiding. Bro. Billy Keith led in the singing of a hymn. Rev. Wayne Smith read the scripture from Psalm 111 and led in prayer asking the Lord's guidance on this session and His blessings as we seek to do His will. Host pastor, Sam Truett, welcomed us to West Calvary and to Smithfield.

The session was called to order by our clerk, Rev. Bill Reagan, and moderator, Eddie Dollar, took charge of the meeting and the first order of business was the appointment of committees. They were as follows:

After another hymn, led by Bro. Billy Keith, the Minister's Quartet from the Greenville area, provided the special music. The morning message was brought by Rev. William Jacobs, pastor of Jefferson Park Free Will Baptist Church in Rockingham. Taking his text from the book of Genesis, Chapter 3, Verses 1-7, he spoke not only of the sin of Adam and Eve, but the curse of sin and the fact that it was passed down

throughout all humanity. All have sinned. Continuing his message he reminded us of "Lust of the flesh, Lust of the eye, and the Pride of life." Pointing out the fact that lust when conceived is sin. Eve lusted, Adam yielded, both were ashamed. They sewed fig leaves together when they realized they had broken God's commandment. When questioned by the Lord, Adam passed the buck saying, "The woman whom thou gavest me...." Their punishment was great! After the seating of delegates, all of our visitors were welcomed and recognized. A partial report of the credentials committee was given and accepted. The floor was opened for nominations to serve on the Nominating Committee. The following were elected: Rev. Dann Patrick, Rev. Sam Truett, Rev. Wayne Smith, Rev. Charles Keith and Rev. Frank McQuade.

The following reports were given:

Rev. Tom Lilly gave an encouraging report of our Promotional Department. MSC to receive.

Our clerk, Rev. Bill Reagan, gave the report of the Executive Board. Included in the report was the following recommendation which was made to the body to be passed and forwarded to the National Association in Fort Worth, Texas, in July of 1982:

Whereas, there is an unscriptural tolerance of alcoholic beverages in our society today, even among Christians, and

Whereas, the Free Will Baptist denomination has, for years, believed and taught that the consumption of alcoholic beverages is a sin, and

Whereas, our Free Will Baptist covenant condemns the use of alcoholic beverages,

Be it therefore resolved, that we affirm our belief in the position that Christ neither made nor drank fermented wine, but rather forbade and discouraged its use, and

Be it further resolved that no denominational institution or agency teach or advocate any other position than the one stated above.

MSC to accept this report.

Rev. Larry Stevens reported for the Bible Bookstore. MSC to accept this report.

A partial report from our State Home Missions Board was given by Rev. Jakie Creech. MSC to receive this report.

Under miscellaneous business a question was asked whether or not the vote to receive the Executive Board report meant that the body had indeed passed, without discussion, the recommendation concerning the teaching that Christ neither made nor drank fermented wine. When the answer was given that it had indeed passed without discussion, a motion was made and seconded to reconsider. This passed unanimously. Discussion followed. MSC that we should vote on this issue today. A point of order was called when a motion was made to refer to a committee. It was agreed to hear other reports and continue discussion after these scheduled reports were given.

The Board of Care report was given by Rev. Milton Hollifield. MSC to accept this report.

Mrs. Betty Hill reported to the body from the Woman's Auxiliary. MSC to accept report.

In the absence of Rev. Van Dale Hudson, who was out of town for a revival meeting, Rev. John Moran gave a report for the Board of Retirement and Insurance. MSC to receive report.

Motion made to take \$10,000.00 from the Insurance Board and put it into Home Missions. The motion was withdrawn after discussion.

Rev. Malcolm Frye, visiting from our National Sunday School Department, gave a report. MSC to receive as

information.

The recommendation concerning what now had become to be referred to as "The Wine Issue" was discussed. The motion was re-read by our moderator. MS Discussion. An amendment was offered that in the final paragraph, we add "We recommend that...." MSC

There was a MS to recess. This failed. MS to move the previous question. This failed. MS to table until tomorrow. Passed.

Our business session recessed until Tuesday, June 8.

MONDAY NIGHT MISSION SERVICE

One of the highlights of our State Association meetings is the Monday Night Mission Service. Evangelism and growth are two areas of the Great Commission that are emphasized. The service began with Bro. Randy Riggs leading the congregation singing, "Send The Light". Bro. Trymon Messer, Associate Director, of our National Home Missions Department, read scripture and led in prayer. The choir from the West Calvary Church sang a choir special of a medley of missionary hymns.

Rev. Rudolph Outlaw introduced our State Missionaries: Rev. John Goss, Siler City; Rev. Roger Tripp, Hickory; Rev. Johnny Pike, Charlotte; Rev. Ray Connors, Wilmington. Also recognized as having mission works, but not under the State Mission Board, were Rev. Rex Edwards and Rev. Frank Davenport.

An enthusiastic congregation sang, "We've A Story To Tell To The Nations" and a ladies' trio from the Prospect Free Will Baptist Church, Dunn, N. C. presented special music before Home Missionary, Rev. Johnny Pike brought the evening message. Taking his text from I Kings 15:5 and I Chron. 4 stirred our

table. At this point in time a substitute motion was made and seconded. Discussion followed. An amendment was offered and seconded to amend by deletion Section 4 of the substitute motion. This passed and finally after everyone had spoken on this issue that wanted to speak, the substitute motion passed as amended and was voted by the body to send this resolution to the National Association in Fort Worth. The complete resolution is as follows:

1. Whereas, there is an unscriptural tolerance of intoxicating beverages in our society today, even among Christians, and
2. Whereas the Free Will Baptist denomination has for years believed and taught that the consumption of intoxicating beverages is a sin, and
3. Whereas the Scriptures and our Free Will Baptist Covenant condemns the use of intoxicating beverages, and
4. Whereas, we realize that the Greek work "Oinos" can be translated to mean fermented or unfermented wine in the New Testament, be it resolved on the basis of the principles taught in the Old Testament and the sinlessness of our Lord Jesus Christ, that He neither made nor drank fermented wine,
5. Be it resolved that we affirm the position that the miracle in Cana of Galilee (John 2) is no excuse for any tolerance of the use of wine and
6. Be it further resolved that we recommend that all Free Will Baptist pastors, Sunday School teachers, writers of literature and professors and administrators of our colleges vigorously preach and teach the principles of total abstinence.

REPORT OF PROMOTIONAL MINISTER

This report covers a period extending beyond my term of service which began September 1, 1981 as Promotional Minister (MAL) of the North Carolina Association of Free Will Baptists. Since the fiscal year for the Promotional Department and the State Program covers April 1, 1981 through March 31, 1982, the C.P.A.'s compilation included herein presents financial data which represents five months (April through August) in which I did not occupy the office.

It has been my privilege to travel among many of our churches and preach in special services, revivals, conferences, etc., as well as promote our state ministries these past few months. I could not ask for a better reception than I have received among our people. The cooperation of the Pastors has certainly been commendable and the continued support of the churches for this ministry has been an encouragement. To my knowledge, there has been no church which formerly supported the promotional ministry regularly, that has discontinued to do so. On the other hand, some churches have increased their support, as well as responding to appeals for special projects which I have promoted among them.

The special "North Carolina Days" which gives emphasis to the total ministries of the North Carolina Association has been well received with special offerings ranging from \$500.00 to almost \$3,000.00, the most recent not being included in this report. d

The "100 Foundation Family Plan", a project to enlist 100 families to give \$100.00 during 1982 to help start a new church somewhere in the state, now has 45 enlisted with \$2,506.40 on deposit in savings and is still growing. I expect to complete the project in months ahead.

The "Witness" is in need of the continued support of our contributing churches and the additional help of

those churches which heretofore have not done so. The cost of its' publication has accelerated and will necessitate continued bi-monthly editions, and perhaps total reevaluation of the mailing list as well, if the rises continue.

My time spent in revivals and special services has contributed to the financial needs of the Promotional Department, (all the revival offerings goes to the N. C. Association) but has left me little time in the office, or at home to work on the "Witness." I intend to re-arrange some of the time I have available in the future, and still hold two revivals per month when possible.

I am grateful for the opportunity that has been mine to serve the Lord and our people in this great State in this ministry. I appreciate the gracious reception I have had among the Pastors and people. I ask for your prayers and continued support for the future, as we work together to build our work stronger for the Lord in North Carolina.

SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES
AND OTHER MATTERS

The accompanying financial statements include the accounts of The Bible Book Store of Durham, Inc., a subordinate member organization of the National Association of Free Will Baptists. Accordingly, it is exempt from Federal income taxes under the Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(3). The primary function of the Corporation is supplying Sunday School and other Christian literature to the Free Will Baptist Churches in the southeastern states. It also maintains an inventory of Christian literature for sale to the general public. The store accounts for sales and expenses on the accrual method.

Merchandise inventory was taken at retail by seven classifications: Bibles, books, cards, supplies, music, Sunday School literature, and rebound books. A weighted average markup of retail over cost was derived for each classification and then applied to the retail value to derive an inventory value at lower of cost or market.

Bad debts are accounted for by the "direct-charge off" method whereby accounts are charged off as they are determined to be uncollectible.

Other significant accounting policies relate to long-term debt, plant and equipment lease expense and major sales categories. Their policies are disclosed in Notes 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5, respectively.

NOTE 1

Sinking fund accounts of \$1,995 included in cash are restricted for retirement of long-term debts consisting of bonds and the interest on these bonds as they become due. (See Note 2, below)

NOTE 2

Long-term obligations of The Bible Book Store of Durham, Inc. consist of the following at December 31, 1981:

NOTE 3

Equipment is stated at cost less accumulated depreciation, which is computed on the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of assets purchased before January 1, 1981 and the accelerated cost recovery system for assets purchased after January 1, 1981.

NOTE 4

The store occupies an outside the mall location at the North Duke Mall in Durham, North Carolina currently at a monthly rental rate of \$802. At the balance sheet date there was only a verbal lease agreement with a stated term of three years beginning May 1, 1979.

NOTE 5

Sales for the year ended December 31, 1981 were \$246,972 of which \$130, 993, or 53% was generated from the service of supplying Sunday School and Vacation Bible School materials to member churches of the Free Will Baptist Association. Sales of \$115,979, or 47%, were generated from the retail sales of Christian literature, paintings, music, cards, and supplies as well as limited services of imprinting and binding of paper products. Some of the major classifications of sales comprising the \$115,979 figure are: Books \$31,469; supplies \$35,254; Music \$20,476; Bibles \$23,188; and cards \$5,592.
