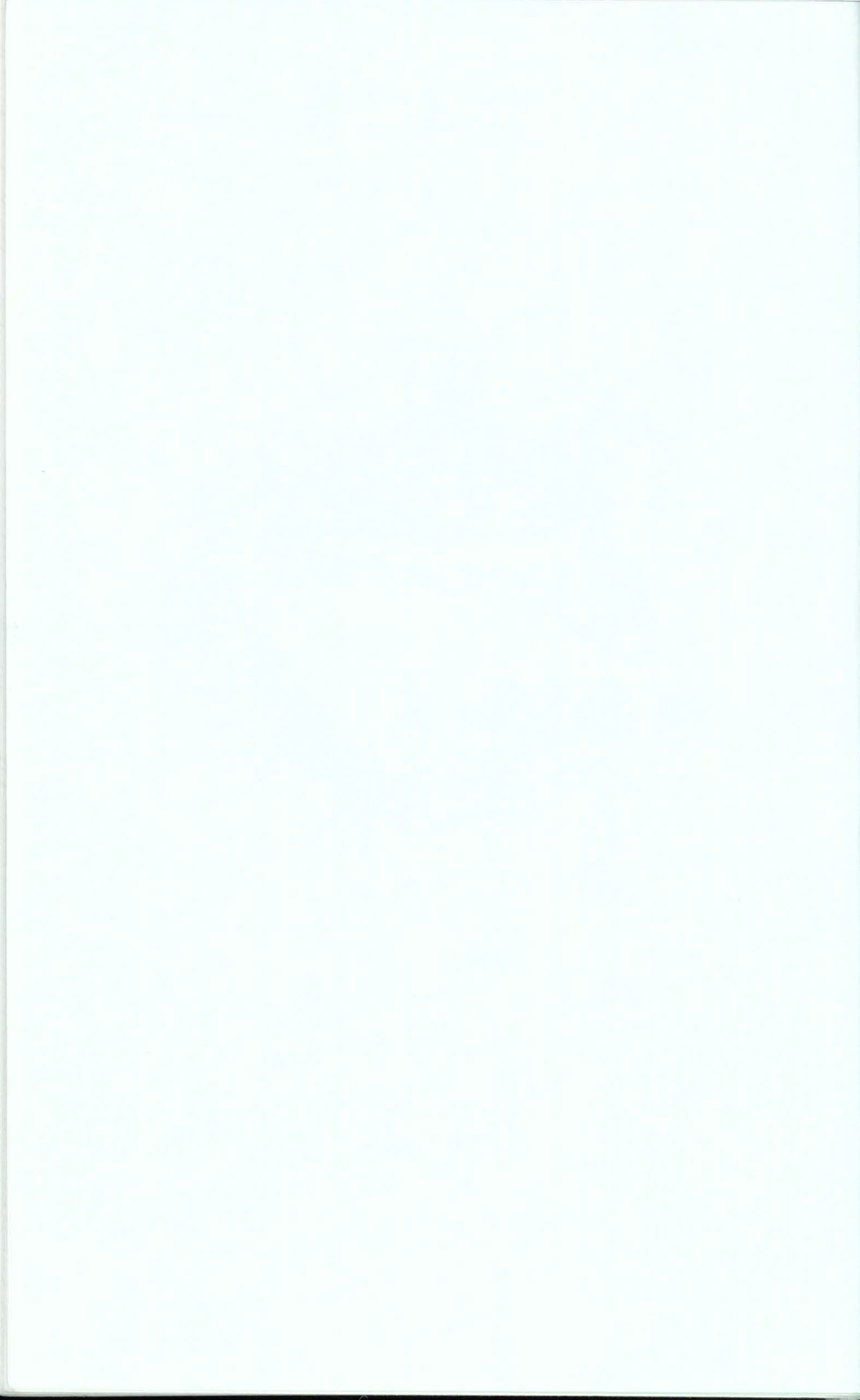
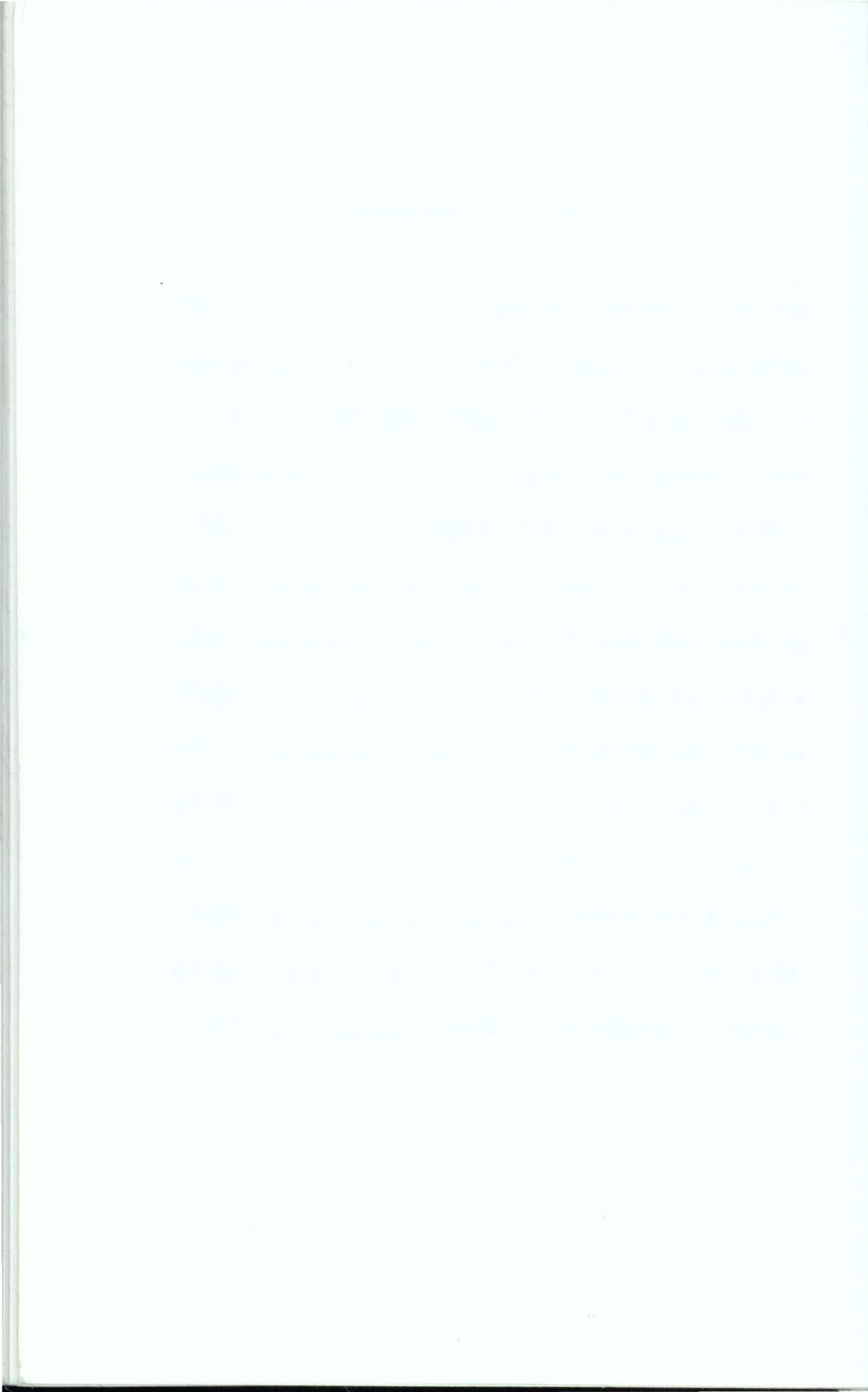

CONSTITUTION
OF THE
NORTH CAROLINA ASSOCIATION
OF FREE WILL BAPTISTS

Preamble:

The purpose of this organization shall be the establishment and maintenance of a voluntary association of autonomous Free Will Baptist churches, quarterly meetings (or any other meetings), district associations or conferences or any and all additional organizations - area, district or statewide that may be deemed essential to the prosecution and promotion of the general purpose and program of this association. Included also in the purpose of this association is affiliation with the National Association of Free Will Baptists, the adoption of the Treatise of the Faith and Practices of Free Will Baptists as adopted by the National Association, and cooperation in its world-wide ministry. This association holds unswerving loyalty to the inspired Word of God as our infallible rule of faith and practice.

Article I. Name

This association shall be known as the North Carolina Association of Free Will Baptists, however, informally the term "State Association" may be used.

Article II. Composition

This association shall be composed of its officers, members of standing boards, ordained and licensed ministers who are in good standing with a conference or association affiliated with this body, together with three (3) delegates elected from each conference or association and one (1) delegate for every fifty (50) members or fraction thereof from each local church which is in good standing with a conference or association affiliated with this body.

Article III. Meetings

Section 1. This association shall convene in regular annual session Monday and Tuesday after the first Sunday in June and at a place determined by the association in session.

Section 2. In the event of an emergency resulting from a cancellation of the place approved by the association while in annual session, the Executive Board of the association shall have power to make a substitute choice of a suitable location for the annual meeting.

Section 3. Should a called session be deemed essential, the Executive Board shall have authority to issue and publicize a called session of the State Association, said call shall be publicized not less than two (2) weeks in advance of the session.

Section 4. The qualified members in attendance at any regular or called session shall constitute a quorum.

Article IV. Officers

The officers of this association shall consist of the members of the Executive Board, the Board of Trustees, the Board of Youth Ministry, the Board of Missions Ministry, the Board of Care for the Aged Ministry, the Board of Retirement and Insurance Ministry, and the Board of the Bible Book Store Ministry.

Article V. Boards

Section 1. This association shall establish the following standing boards:

The Executive Board
The Board of Trustees
The Board of Youth Ministry
The Board of Missions Ministry

The Board of Care For The Aged Ministry
The Board of Retirement and Insurance Ministry
The Board of the Bible Book Store Ministry

Section 2. The Executive Board shall consist of Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer and three (3) members at large elected by the association.

Section 3. The Board of Trustees shall consist of three (3) members elected by the association.

Section 4. The following boards shall each be composed of five (5) members elected by the association.

The Board of Youth Ministry
The Board of Missions Ministry
The Board of Care For The Aged Ministry
The Board of Retirement and Insurance Ministry
The Board of the Bible Book Store Ministry

Article VI. Discipline

This association has no judicial or appellate powers conflicting with the independence of the local church or the bodies constituting this association.

Article VII. Amendments

This constitution may be amended by two-thirds majority vote of the members present and voting at a session of the association provided the proposed amendment is presented to the body one day in advance.

Article VIII. Dissolution

In the event of the dissolution of this association any assets of the organization then remaining shall be conveyed to the National Association of Free Will Baptists.

BY-LAWS

Article I. Membership

Section 1. Membership in this association shall be through application of a duly constituted district association (or conference). A credentials committee shall examine the application and make other investigation it deems appropriate. The credentials committee shall make a recommendation to the association as to the action to take regarding the application. The decision on the application shall be by majority vote of delegates present and voting.

Section 2. Each church holding membership in an affiliated association shall automatically be a member of this association.

Article II. Representation

Section 1. Each district association holding membership in the State Association shall send a report of statistics on a form provided by the association to every annual session of the association. Failure to report for two successive sessions of the association may be the basis for dismissal from the association by a majority vote of members present and voting.

Section 2. Seating of delegates shall be through recommendation of a credentials committee. Any potential delegate whose credentials are not recommended for approval by the Credentials Committee may be seated only by a majority vote of seated delegates who are present and voting.

Article III. Duties of Officers and Boards

Section 1. The Executive Board shall: (1) arrange the program for the annual sessions of the association, (2) fill vacancies which may occur on any board between sessions of the association, (the

person duly elected by the association), (3) promote the work of the association, (4) review the annual reports and proposed budgets of all boards before they are presented to the State Association, (5) provide for and give general supervision to a church bond program and other similar service ministries and, (6) employ and supervise a promotional director, whose duties shall be as follows:

- A. Administration. To administer the affairs of the Executive Board within the authority delegated by the board. He shall fulfill all duties commensurate with his office and present plans and procedures to the board which he feels would be effective in promoting the work within the association.
- B. General Promotion. To show through general promotion the correlation and interrelation of all the ministries of the State Association and National Association. It is expected that he will promote impartially the total program of work as devised by all standing boards.
- C. Public Relations. To keep in close contact with pastors, district associations, and local church leaders. He shall represent the State Association to other bodies when in the interest of the association.
- D. Publications. To serve as editor-in-chief of the Free Will Baptist Witness. He shall direct the production of other promotional material as may be approved by the Executive Board.
- E. Stewardship. To provide a stewardship education that will serve to produce increased support for the state ministries through the "State Program" and/or other methods of giving by association, churches, and individuals.
- F. Arranging Annual Association. To expediate

the planning of the annual association program, arrange for the enrolling of ministers and delegates and distribute the printed minutes of the association.

- G. Other Duties. To perform other duties as may as assigned by the Executive Board. It is understood that the Promotional Director is to have no official or ex-officio status on any standing board or committee of the association except as may be specifically provided by action of the association.
- H. The Promotional Director shall serve as historian for the Association. It shall be his responsibility to gather articles and materials for the historical collection. And also shall publish a history of Free Will Baptists, especially as it relates to the history of Free Will Baptists in North Carolina, and shall update the publication periodically.

The Executive Board may advise and assist other boards of the association. The Executive Board is not authorized to act for the association except as provided in the constitution and by-laws of the association or as specifically directed by the association.

Section 2. The Board of Trustees shall be legal custodian of all property belonging to the Association except in the case of the standing boards of the Association which by action of the association are authorized to incorporate.

Section 3. The Board of Missions Ministry, the Board of Care for the Aged Ministry, the Board of Youth Ministry, the Board of Retirement and Insurance Ministry and the Board of the Bible Book Store Ministry each shall promote the work within the State as would generally be recognized as coming within the purview of the respective board. Each board shall: (a) be responsible to the State Association for all their

actions, (b) propose by-laws for the government of their respective work, (the by-laws of each board shall be presented to the association for approval), (c) make an annual report of its accomplishments to the association, and (d) prepare a budget of proposed expenditures which shall be presented to the association for approval.

Section 4. The moderator shall, (1) preside at meetings of the State Association and Executive Board, (2) call meetings of the Executive Board of his own volition or upon request of at least three members of the Executive Board, (3) appoint such committees as are created without provision for their selection, (4) fulfill whatever responsibilities that may be commensurate with the office or that may be delegated by the association.

Section 5. The assistant moderator shall preside at the request of, or in the absence of the moderator and assist the moderator in such manner as may be requested.

Section 6. The clerk shall prepare minutes of the proceedings of all meetings of the association or the Executive Board and preserve an accurate record of said proceedings in a book provided for this purpose and shall handle such official correspondence as may be directed by the association. He shall, through the Executive Board, arrange for the printing of the minutes.

Section 7. The treasurer shall hold in trust all money that belongs to the Executive Board of the association and disburse same by order of the association. The Executive Board, or any standing board or subordinate general organization invested with the authority to authorize the disbursement of funds. He shall keep an account of all funds received and disbursed and make an annual report to the association.

Article IV. Election of Officers and Board Members

Section 1. No person shall hold membership on more than one standing board at the same time.

Section 2. All officers shall be elected by the body. A nominating committee shall be elected at the beginning of each session. After their report is presented, additional nominations for any office may be made from the floor. The General Officers shall be elected for a period of two (2) years. No person shall serve in more than one (1) elected position in the association at the same time, and no one having served a full term shall be elected to succeed himself more than once.

Section 3. The officers of Moderator and Assistant Moderator shall be filled on an alternating basis, from the eastern and western part of the state; Durham shall be the dividing line. When the Moderator is elected from one section, his assistant shall be elected from the other.

Article V. Terms of Office

Section 1. The three (3) members at large elected to the board, shall each have a term of office of three (3) years with their terms arranged so that one (1) member's term expires annually.

Section 2. The members of the Board of Missions Ministry, the Board of Care for the Aged Ministry, the Board of Youth Ministry, the Board of Retirement and Insurance Ministry and the Board of the Bible Book Store Ministry shall each have a term of office of five (5) years with their terms arranged so that one (1) member's term expires annually.

Section 3. The members of the Board of Trustees shall each have a term of office of three (3) years with their terms arranged so that only one member's term expires annually.

Article VI. Committees

Section 1. Various committees shall be constituted when need arises, by the State Association or the Executive Board. The number of members of a committee shall be determined by the establishing body (State Association or Executive Board). Committee members shall be appointed by the moderator unless otherwise provided by the action creating the committee. Committee members shall serve for the length of time provided, until their work has been completed, until they are released, or their successors chosen.

Section 2. The following committees shall be appointed annually to serve during the session of the State Association.

- A. The credentials committee of three (3) members. This committee shall examine all letters to the association, applications for membership in the association, and credentials of the various delegates. The committee shall make recommendations to the Association regarding the seating of delegates and the action to take on applications for membership in the association.
- B. The resolutions committee whose duty it shall be to screen resolutions that are presented. Only resolutions determined by this committee to be worthy are to be presented to the association by the committee.
- C. The finance committee which shall receive and account for all funds received with letters or through offerings during the association.

Article VII. Honorarium and Reimbursements

Section 1. The Clerk shall receive as honorarium \$200.00 annually.

Section 2. Members of standing boards, or duly constituted committees, may be reimbursed for expenses in attending board meetings within the state, exclusive of the annual association meeting, at the rate of 20¢ per mile (may claim road distance if traveling by airplane). In addition if over-night travel is required, reimbursement may be made for actual meals and lodging expenses. No employee of any board may be reimbursed for any travel in excess of this amount.

Article VIII. Quorum

A simple majority of a board or committee shall constitute a quorum.

Article IX. Proxy

No voting shall be done by proxy in meetings of the State Association. Proxy representation shall be accepted for meetings of the Executive Board provided the proxy is designated in writing by the board member or by oral communication between the member and the moderator.

Article X. Parliamentary Authority

The meetings of the State Association shall be governed by the rules of parliamentary law as set forth in Robert's Rules of Order except in the case of those rules which are superseded by rule of this association.

Article XI. Amendments

These by-laws may be amended by (1) majority vote of the members present and voting provided the amendment is presented on day prior to the vote, or (2) by a two-thirds majority of those present and voting if immediate action is to be taken as soon as debate has been completed.

MONDAY MORNING, June 4, 1984, 11:00 am.

The twenty-second annual session of the North Carolina Association of Free Will Baptists convened Monday, June 4, 1984 at Ahoskie Free Will Baptist Church in Ahoskie, NC. After registration, the session began at 11:00 am with Rev. Jerry Rackley presiding. Bro. Bob Baines led us in singing "He Keeps Me Singing." Rev. Troy Smith read the Scripture Hebrews 1:10-12 and led in prayer. Host pastor Rev. Roy Harris welcomed us to the Ahoskie Church and to Ahoskie.

The session was called to order by our clerk, Rev. Bruce Barnes, and moderator Rev. Robert Durham took charge of the meeting. The first order of business was the appointment of committees. They were as follows:

Credentials: Frank Davenport, Frank McQuage, Billy Keith

Resolutions: John Moran, Randy Cox, Earl Sutton

Finance: Cecil Boswell, Fred Caraway, Johnny Pike.

Bro. Bob Baines led us in singing "All That Thrills My Soul." After an offering Rev. Randy Stone brought the morning message. Taking Isaiah 40:27-31 as his text he preached on the subject "Rejuvenation." Our hearts were challenged and uplifted as he showed us:

- I. The Need For Rejuvenation
- II. Some Examples of Rejuvenation
- III. The Process of Rejuvenation.

After prayer by Bro. Rudolph Outlaw, the Association meeting was recessed for lunch.

MONDAY AFTERNOON, June 4, 1984, 1:30 pm

The afternoon session convened at 1:30 pm with Bro. Dave Nobels leading us in "There Is A Name I Love To Hear," and one verse of "Amazing Grace." Bro. James Pauley led in prayer. After Bro. Malcom Fry sang the special selection of "When My Saviour Reached Down For Me," Bro. Robert Durham preached from Nehemiah 2:17-18 on the subject "Let Us Rise Up and Build." He showed us that:

- I. Nehemiah prayed for the help of God.
- II. Nehemiah went about to get the job done that he had prayed about.
- III. All the people worked together to get the job done.
- IV. Everyone went to his own work.
- V. The work of God was too important to stop and come down from the wall.

He asked us to consider the truths revealed here and how it should apply to our united effort as a State Association to get God's work done in North Carolina among Free-Will Baptists.

After the seating of delegates and recognition of visitors the Nominating Committee was elected as follows: Sam Truett (Chairman), Billy Bevan, Jerry Williams, Rudolph Outlaw, and William Calvert.

A partial report of the Credentials Committee was then given reporting present at the meeting 91 Ministers, 31 delegates, 31 visitors, and 1 Missionary.

The State Promotional Director, Rev. Tom Lilly, gave an encouraging report of our Promotional Department. MSC to receive the report.

Our clerk, Rev. Bruce Barnes, gave the report of the Executive Board. MSC that the report be accepted as information. The Executive Board presented specific recommendations for the body's approval. The following recommendations were passed by the body:

MONDAY AFTERNOON, June 4, Cont'd.

(1) MSC: "To add the words 'more than once' after the words 'succeed himself' in Article IV, Section 2 of the By-Laws."

(2) MSC: "That the State Program be incorporated in the Promotional Department Budget, and that all funds continue to be sent and designated as desired."

(3) MSC: "That the following percentages be approved and reviewed annually in the budget for the disbursement of any undesignated money that comes to the Promotional Department (excluding money from Church Bond Service):"

Missions Ministry.....	40 %
Book Store Ministry.....	7 %
Youth Ministry.....	10 %
Rest Home Ministry.....	10 %
Retirement and Insurance Ministry...	3 %
Promotional Department.....	30 %

(4) MSC to table Item #4 to tomorrow's session.

(5) MSC: "In order to achieve a more equitable and realistic plan of support for NC ministries the Executive Committee recommends a 70/30 plan of support be adopted by the NC Association of Free Will Baptists, and we recommend the implementation of this program by our churches."

(6) MSC: "That the Promotional Director and one representative from the Executive Board, preferably the Moderator, be sent to the Leadership Conference and that their expenses be paid."

(7) MSC: "That Bro. Tom Lilly be allowed to produce The Witness under a Editor/Editor-in-chief arrangement to make the production of this publication easier on Bro. Lilly."

MONDAY AFTERNOON, June 4, Cont'd.

Bro. James Stancil reported for the Bible Book Store Ministry. MSC to accept this report.

Bro. Donnie Miles gave a report for the Board of Youth Ministry. MSC to receive this report.

Bro. A.C. Morgan reported for the Board of Missions Ministry. MSC to accept this report and adopt the budget.

Bro. Tom Lilly reported in behalf of the Board of Care For The Aged Ministry. MSC to receive the report and adopt the budget.

Bro. John Moran gave a report for the Board of Retirement and Insurance Ministry. MSC to receive.

The Woman's Auxiliary report was given by Mrs. Annie Talton, the State Woman's Auxiliary Treasurer. MSC to receive her report.

The National Executive Department report was given by Bro. Melvin Worthington.

A hymn "To God Be The Glory" was sung while a special offering was taken in honor of Rev. Buford Pierce who had recently passed away. \$420.00 was given.

After the offering our Promotional Director gave an address to the body concerning the "state-of-affairs" in North Carolina. He also encouraged us to be concerned about and to be completely aware of where we are going so that we might build a strong foundation.

Bro. Lilly shared that we have overlooked certain needs that exist within the State. There are some people he said, that are not committed to a strong State Work. He reminded us then to recall that the order of strength in Free Will Baptist is the Christian family, the church, the Association, the State, and then the Na-

tional ministries. Bro. Lilly told us that some of the difficulties we face are (1) Apathy against anything denominational and (2) Lack of concern for the State work in general. He said for us to accomplish the goal of building a State Office Complex that we must all work together.

At this time Bro. Eugene Waddell gave a report for the Foreign Missions Department. MSC to accept this report as information.

Bro. Frank Davenport led in prayer after which we adjourned for the afternoon.

MONDAY NIGHT MISSION SERVICE, June 4, 1984, 7:30 pm

One of the highlights of the State Meeting was the Monday Evening Mission Service. The service began with Bro. Gerald Jackson leading the congregation in singing "Rescue The Perishing," after which Rev. Randy Stone led in prayer.

Rev. Dean Dobbs introduced our State Missionaries: Rev. Ray Conners, Wilmington; Rev. Roger Tripp, Hickory; Rev. Johnny Pike, Charlotte; and Rev. Steve Pryor, Henderson.

After the congregation sang "Tell Me The Story of Jesus," Diana Harris rendered a special selection entitled "I Will Glory In The Cross."

The evening message was brought by Rev. Steve Pryor reading II Chronicles 15:1-15. Our hearts were challenged as Bro. Pryor preached concerning Asa's faithfulness in the work for he showed us that:

- I. Asa took courage.
- II. Asa put away all their abominable idols.
- III. Asa renewed the altar.
- IV. Asa extended his influence to the other 10 tribes.

- V. Asa led the people into a new relationship with God by a covenant.
- VI. Asa led the people to unite for strength.

After Rev. Earl Hanna took up the evening Missions offering Rev. Robert Durham made brief remarks to the body. The prayer of benediction was led by Bro. Charles Keith.

TUESDAY MORNING, June 5, 1984, 9:00 am

The session reconvened at 9:00 am, Tuesday, June 5, 1984 with Rev. Bobby Parker presiding. Rev. Mike Gladson then led the congregation in singing "The Lilly of The Valley." Rev. Earl Hanna led in prayer. A special quartet number was rendered by Bob Baines, Doug Henderson, Randy Sawyer, and Donnie Miles singing "We'll Cast Our Crowns At His Feet."

Rev. Randy Cox brought the morning message taking his text from Amos 7:7-8 and 16-17 speaking on the theme "The Plumbline Message." Concerning "The Plumbline Message" he said:

- I. That it must be clear in its presentation.
- II. That compassion is to saturate its proclamation.
- III. That conflicts arise at its application.
- IV. That it is correct in its declaration.

Following the message, the session entered into its Tuesday business session. Bro. Jim Lawthorn reported for the Sunday School Department, Bro. Johnny Pike for the Leah Waddell Scholarship Fund, Bro. Joe Haas for Southeastern Free Will Baptist College, Bro. Herman Hersey for the Insurance and Retirement Board, Bro. George Lee for the T.V. and Radio Ministry, and Bro. Ronald Creech for the Free Will Baptist Bible College.

Rev. Connie Cariker gave a report for the Home Missions Department stating that on Roll-call Sunday 196,194

people were in attendance, representing 2,800 churches, with an average attendance of 75.89 %. It was encouraging to note that North Carolina had the best attendance with an average of 105.11 per church across the state.

MSC that all these reports be accepted as information.

Bro. Tom Lilly then gave a presentation to the body concerning the proposed State Office Complex. After his presentation MSC to take Item # 4 of the Executive Board Specific Recommendations from the table. Bro. Lilly gives an explanation why this 3-step plan is as it is. He presents slides of the floor plan and also a color rendering of what the building would look like. The money needed to complete the State Office Complex was projected as follows: \$163,000 = price for the building; \$110,000 = price for the land; \$300,000 = total to get the building ready to move into. It was the general feeling that "not a shovel of dirt be turned" until the land is paid for.

At this time Bro. James Stancil speaks concerning why the Durham Book Store needs to stay in Durham and not be moved to the new complex under discussion. The major reasons is because of the percentage of walk-in traffic as well as the Sunday School sales.

Item # 4 of the Executive Board's Specific Recommendations was amended and passed as follows:

"That the following two-step plan of action be taken as it relates to the State Office Complex:

1. Purchase land in the Greenville, NC area.
2. Erect a building to house the State Offices and Book Store, to operate as a satellite of the Durham store, and that this not be done untill phase 1 is completed and paid for."

MSC that we consider taking out an insurance policy on Bro. Tom Lilly and that it be put in the hands of the Executive Board to determine the conditions.

EXECUTIVE BOARD REPORT

During the past year the Executive Committee met three times. As authorized by the Constitution and By-Laws or as directed by this body we endeavored to transact the business of the North Carolina Association of Free Will Baptists.

On October 10, 1983 the Executive Committee met at West Calvary Free Will Baptist Church in Smithfield. The purpose of the meeting was to fulfill the directive given by the State Association to pursue:

- (1) Selection of a site for the building of a State Office Complex.
- (2) Architectural drawings for a State Office Complex.
- (3) Provide means by which funds may be raised to fund this project.

To help expedite as quickly as possible the selection of a site for the State Office Complex, a three man committee was formed which included Tom Lilly, Sam Truett, and Larry Stevens. This committee was charged with the responsibility to search for property that would meet the best interests of the state work and then report back at our next meeting. To propose a means of support by which funds could be raised, a special plan was tentatively approved for promotion across the state to aid all state ministries, as well as help fund the State Office Complex. Bro. Frank Davenport was nominated and elected to be Association- al Director of Moderators for the Co-ordinating Committee. The Board accepted the resignation of Dilmos Johnston as Asst. Moderator, and Bro. Homer Arrowood was elected to fill the unexpired term.

On February 20, 1984 the Executive Committee met in Durham at the Carolina-Duke Motor Inn, and on February 21 at Liberty Free Will Baptist Church. After the third quarter report of the Promotional Director,

a recommendation followed on how to break down any undesignated money that comes to the Promotional Department. The three man committee reported their findings concerning property for the State Office Complex. The Executive Committee approved that an option be secured on the piece of property recommended by that committee. The option would be until July 1. The Committee had a special meeting with the Board of the Bible Book Store Ministry for it to present its views to the Committee concerning the feasibility of moving the Book Store to the new State Office Complex already in planning. We considered their views and then passed a three-step plan of action to recommend to the State. While the various boards of the State met, the Committee met with the moderators. A list of churches was given that had not paid representation fees last year. We discovered that \$2,500.00 was drained from the state finances because of these unpaid fees. The Committee then discussed the Promotional Department budget for the coming year and heard reports from all the boards of the State.

On May 14, 1984 the Executive Committee met at Liberty FWB Church in Durham. After adopting the Promotional Department Budget various recommendations were passed to present to the State Association, and the program for the State Meeting was finalized. The Committee heard the reports and budgets from all State Boards. Upon the completion of these reports the Committee once again discussed the special plan of raising money across our State to aid all state ministries, as well as help fund the State Complex. The percentages originally approved in the October meeting were modified to recommend for the State's approval. Other general recommendations were passed for the State's consideration. We elected Eddie Dollar as Asst. Moderator to fill the unexpired term of Homer Arrowood.

Other items of business discussed follows this re-

port by way of specific recommendations from the Executive Committee. (*For these recommendations see page 15 of the Minutes.*)

We believe that this report reflects a fair and accurate summation of the endeavors of the Executive Committee during the past year.

The C.P.A.'s compilation report of the Promotional Department and the State Program presented in this digest includes the balance sheet of the fiscal years ended March 31, 1984, 1983, and 1982, arranged in columnar parallel format for purposed of comparison of both the receipts and disbursements of those years.

At the fiscal years end March 31, 1984 all significant accounts were currently up to date except for the purchase of a Savin 5020 copier paid for by Tom Lilly which amounted to, \$3,200.00 plus tax, an expense to be assumed by the Promotional Department before the 1984-85 years end. Therefore, the balance shown at the 1984 fiscal year ending fairly represents the financial condition of both the Promotional Department and the State Program with the exception of the cost of the copier.

God's blessing upon this ministry has been very obvious this past year as we have traveled among our churches promoting North Carolina ministries in revivals, soulwinning conferences, "North Carolina Days," special services, bond programs and building consultation. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES AND OTHER MATTERS:

The accompanying financial statements include the accounts of the Bible Book Store of Durham, Inc. a subordinate member organization of the National Association of Free Will Baptists. Accordingly, it is exempt from Federal income taxes under the Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c) (3). The primary function of the Corporation is supplying Sunday School and other Christian literature to the Free Will Baptist Churches in the southeastern states. It also

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS, Cont'd.

maintains an inventory of Christian literature for sale to the general public. The store accounts for sales and expenses on the accrual method.

Merchandise inventory was taken at retail by seven classifications: Bibles, books, cards, supplies, music, Sunday School literature, and rebound books. A weighted average markup of retail over cost was derived for each classification and then applied to the retail value to derive an inventory value at lower cost or market.

Bad debts are accounted for by the "direct-charge off" method whereby accounts are charged off as they are determined to be uncollectible.

Other significant accounting policies relate to long-term debt, plant and equipment, lease expense and major sales categories. Their policies are disclosed in Notes 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5, respectively.

NOTE 1:

Sinking fund accounts of \$3,836 included in cash are restricted for retirement of long-term debts consisting of bonds and the interest on these bonds as they become due. (See Note 2, below).

NOTE 4:

The store occupies an outside-the-mall location at the North Duke Mall in Durham, North Carolina. For the lease year, May 1, 1983 to April 30, 1984, the minimum monthly rental rate was \$894. In addition to the minimum rent, the lease requires payment of additional rent of 3½% of gross annual sales in excess of \$306,429. The percentage rent is paid monthly for any month in which gross monthly receipts exceed \$25,536.

At the end of the lease year, the actual percentage rent for the year is determined and any excess rent paid during the year is refunded. Such refunds received are recorded as other income in the year received.

A refund of \$1,598 was received in 1983 for the lease year ended March 31, 1983 and has been included in other income.

For the lease year May 1, 1984 to April 30, 1985, minimum rent payments are \$1,123 per month. Additional rents of 3½% of gross annual receipts in excess of \$385,000 are required.

NOTE 5:

Sales for the year ended December 31, 1983 were \$284,878 of which \$152,091 or 53%, was generated from the service of supplying Sunday School and Vacation Bible School materials to member churches of the Free Will Baptist Association. Sales of \$132,787 or 47%, were generated from the retail sales of Christian literature, paintings, music, cards, and supplies as well as limited services of imprinting and binding of paper products. The classifications of sales comprising the \$132,787 figure are: Books \$39,951; supplies \$39,940; music \$17,275; Bibles \$26,681; cards \$6,760; and imprinting and binding \$2,180.
