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NORTH CAROLINA ASSOCIATION OF FREE WILL BAPTISTS CONSTITUTION

THE PREAMBLE

The purpose of this organization shall be the establishment and maintenance of a voluntary association of autonomous Free Will Baptist churches, quarterly meetings (or any other meetings), district associations or conferences or any and all additional organizations - area, district or statewide that may be deemed essential to the prosecution and promotion of the general purpose and program of this Association. Included also in the purpose of this Association is affiliation with the National Association of Free Will Baptists, the adoption of The Treatise of the Faith and Practice of Free Will Baptists, and cooperation in its world-wide ministry. This Association holds unswerving loyalty to the inspired Word of God as our infallible rule of faith and practice.

Article I: Name

This Association shall be known as *The North Carolina Association of Free Will Baptists*. However, informally the term "*State Association*" may be used.

Article II: Composition

This Association shall be composed of its officers, of standing boards, ordained and licensed ministers who are in good standing with a conference or association affiliated with this body, together with three (3) delegates elected from each conference or association and one (1) delegate from every fifty members or fraction thereof from each local church which is in good standing with a conference or association affiliated with this body.

Article III: Meetings

Section 1: This association shall convene in regular annual session Monday and Tuesday after the first Sunday in June, and at a place determined by the Association in session.

Section 2: In the event of an emergency resulting from a cancellation of the place approved by the Association while in annual session, the Executive Board of the Association shall have the power to make a substitute choice of a suitable location for the annual meeting.

Section 3: Should a called session be deemed essential, the Executive Board shall have authority to issue and publicize a called session of the State Association: said call shall be publicized not less than two (2) weeks in advance of the session.

Section 4: The qualified members in attendance at any regular or called session shall constitute a quorum.

Article IV: Officers

The officers of this Association shall consist of the members of the Executive Board, the Board of Trustees, the Board of Youth Ministry, the Board of Missions Ministry, the Board of Care for the Aged Ministry, and the Board of the Bible Book Store Ministry.

Article V: Boards

Section 1: This Association shall establish the following standing boards.

The Executive Board
The Board of Trustees
The Board of Youth Ministry
The Board of Missions Ministry
The Board of Care for the Aged Ministry
The Board of the Bible Book Store Ministry

Section 2: The Executive Board shall consist of Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer and three (3) members at large elected by the Association.

Section 3: The Board of Trustees shall consist of three (3) members elected by the Association.

Section 4: The following boards shall each be composed of five (5) members elected by the Association. The Board of Youth Ministry, the Board of Missions Ministry, the Board of Care for the Aged Ministry, and the Board of the Bible Book Store Ministry.

Article VI: Discipline

This association has no judicial or appellate powers conflicting with the independence of the local church or bodies constituting this Association.

Article VII: Amendments

This constitution may be amended by two-thirds Majority vote of the members present and voting at a session of the Association, provided the proposed amendment is presented to the body one day in advance.

Article VIII: Dissolution

In the event of the dissolution of this Association, any assets of the organization then remaining shall be conveyed to the National Association of Free Will Baptists.

NORTH CAROLINA ASSOCIATION OF FREE WILL BAPTIST BY-LAWS

Article I: Membership

Section 1: Membership in this Association shall be through application of a duly constituted district association (or conference). A credentials committee shall examine the application and make other investigation it deems appropriate. A credentials committee shall make a recommendation to the association as to the action to take, regarding the application. The decision on the application shall be by majority vote of delegates present and voting.

Section 2: Each church holding membership in an affiliated association shall automatically be a member of this association.

Article II: Representation

Section 1: Each district association holding membership in the State Association shall send a report of statistics on a form provided by the Association to every annual session of the Association. Failure to report for two successive sessions of the association may be the basis for dismissal from the association by a majority vote of members present and voting.

Section 2: Seating of delegates shall be through recommendation of a credentials committee. Any potential delegate whose credentials are not recommended for approval by the Credentials Committee may be seated only by a majority vote of seated delegates who are present and voting.

Article III: Duties of Officers

Section 1: The Executive Board shall: (1) arrange the program for the annual sessions of the Association, (2) fill vacancies which may occur on any board between sessions of the Association, (the person duly elected by the Association), (3) promote the work of the Association, (4) review the annual reports and proposed budgets of all boards before they are presented to the Association, (5) provide for and give general supervision to a church bond program and other similar service ministries and, (6) employ and supervise a Promotional Director, whose duties shall be as follows:

A. Administrative. To administer the affairs of the Executive Board within the authority delegated by the board. He shall fulfill all duties commensurate with his office and present plans and procedure to the board which he feels would be effective in promoting the work within the Association.

- **B.** General Promotion. To show through general promotion the correlation and interrelation of all the ministries of the State Association and National Association. It is expected that he will promote impartially the total program of work as devised by all standing boards.
- C. Public Relations. To keep in close contact with pastors, district associations, and local church leaders. He shall represent the State Association to other bodies when in the interest of the Association.
- **D. Publications.** To serve as editor-in-chief of *The Witness*. He shall direct the production of other promotional material as may be approved by the Executive Board.
- **E.** Stewardship. To provide a stewardship education that will serve to produce increased support for the state ministries through the "State Program" and/or other methods of giving by Associations, churches, and individuals.
- F. Arranging the Annual Association. To expedite the planning of the annual Association program, arrange for the enrolling of ministers and delegates and distribute the printed minutes of the Association.
- G. Other Duties. To perform other duties as may be assigned by the Executive Board. It is understood that the Promotional Director is to have no official or ex-officio status on any standing board or committee of the Association, except as may be specifically provided by action of the Association.
- H. The Promotional Director shall serve as historian for the Association. It shall be his responsibility to gather articles and materials for the historical collection. He also shall publish a history of Free Will Baptists, especially as it relates to the history of the Free Will Baptists in North Carolina, and shall update the publication periodically.

The Executive Board may advise and assist other boards of the Association. The Executive Board is not authorized to act for the Association except as provided by the Constitution and By-Laws of the Association, or as specifically directed by the Association.

NORTH CAROLINA ASSOCIATION OF FREE WILL BAPTIST BY-LAWS

Section 2: The Board of Trustees shall be legal custodian of all property belonging to the Association, except in the case of the standing boards of the Association, which by action of the association are authorized to incorporate.

Section 3 The Board of Missions Ministry, the Board of Care for the Aged Ministry, the Board of Youth Ministry, the Board of Retirement and Insurance Ministry and the Board of the Bible Book Store Ministry each shall promote the work within the State as would generally be recognized as coming within the purview of the respective board. Each board shall: (a) be responsible to the State Association for all their actions, (b) propose by-laws for the government of their respective work, (the by-laws of each board shall be presented to the Association for approval), (c) make an annual report of its accomplishments to the Association, and (d) prepare a budget of proposed expenditures which shall be presented to the Association for approval.

Section 4: The moderator shall, (1) preside at meetings of the Association and Executive Board, (2) call meetings of the Executive Board of his own volition or upon request of at least three members of the Executive Board, (3) appoint such committees as are created without provision for their selection, (4) fulfill whatever responsibilities that may be commensurate with the office or that may be delegated by the Association.

Section 5: The assistant moderator shall preside at the request of, or in the absence of the moderator, and assist the moderator in such manner as may be requested.

Section 6: The clerk shall prepare minutes of the proceedings of all meetings of the Association or the Executive Board and preserve an accurate record of said proceedings in a book provided for this purpose, and shall handle such official correspondence as may be directed by the Association. He shall, through the Executive Board, arrange for the printing of the minutes.

Section 7: The Treasurer shall hold in trust all money that belongs to the Executive Board of the Association and same by order of the Association, the Executive Board, or any standing board or subordinate general organization invested with the authority to authorize the disbursement of funds. He shall keep an account of all funds received and disbursed and make an annual report to the Association.

Article IV: Election of Officers and Board Members

Section 1: No person shall hold membership on more than one standing board at the same time.

Section 2: All officers shall be elected by the body. A nominating committee shall be elected at the beginning of each session. After their report is presented, additional nominations for any office may be made from the floor. The general officers shall be elected for a period of two (2) years. No person shall serve in more than one (1) elected position in the Association at the same time, and no one having served a full term shall be elected to succeed himself more than once.

Section 3: The officers of Moderator and Assistant Moderator shall be filled on an alternating basis, from the eastern and western part of the state: Durham shall be the dividing line. When the Moderator is elected from one section, his assistant shall be elected from the other.

Article V: Terms of Office

Section 1: The three (3) members at large elected to the board, shall each have a term of office of three (3) years with their terms arranged so that one (1) member's term expires annually.

Section 2: The members of the Board of Missions Ministry, the Board of Care for the Aged Ministry, the Board of Youth Ministry, and the Board of the Bible Book Store Ministry shall each have a term of office of five (5) years with their terms arranged so that one (1) member's term expires annually.

Section 3: The members of the Board of Trustees shall each have a term of office of three (3) years with their terms arranged so that only one member's term expires annually.

Article VI: Committees

Section 1: Various committees shall be constituted when need arises, by the State Association or the Executive Board. The number of members of a committee shall be determined by the establishing body (State Association or Executive Board). Committee members shall be appointed by the moderator unless otherwise provided by the action creating the committee. Committee members shall serve for the length of time provided, until their work has been completed, until they are released, or their successors are chosen.

NORTH CAROLINA ASSOCIATION OF FREE WILL BAPTIST BY-LAWS

Section 2: The following committees shall be appointed annually to serve during the session of the State Association.

A. The credentials committee of three (3) members. This committee shall examine all letters to the Association, applications for membership in the Association, and credentials of the various delegates. The committee shall make recommendations to the Association regarding the seating of delegates and the action to take on applications for membership in the Association.

B. The resolutions committee whose duty it shall be to screen resolutions that are presented. Only resolutions determined by this committee to be worthy are to be presented to the Association by the committee.

C. The finance committee which shall receive and account for all funds received with letters or through offerings during the Association.

Article VII: Honorarium and Reimbursements

Section 1: The Clerk shall receive as honorarium \$300.00 annually.

Section 2: Members of standing boards, or duly constituted committees, may be reimbursed for expenses in attending board meetings within the state, exclusive of the annual Association Meeting, at the rate of 31 cents per mile (may claim road distance if traveling by airplane). In addition if over-night travel is required, reimbursements may be made for actual meals and lodging expenses. No employee of any board may be reimbursed for any travel in excess of this amount.

Article VIII: Quorum

A simple majority of a board or committee shall constitute a quorum.

Article IX: Proxy

No voting shall be done by proxy in meetings of the State Association. Proxy representation shall be accepted for meetings of the Executive Board provided the proxy is designated in writing by the board member or by oral communication between the member and the moderator.

Article X: Parliamentary Authority

The meeting of the State Association shall be governed by the rules of parliamentary law as set forth in *Robert's Rules of Order*, except in the case of those rules which are superseded by rule of this Association.

Article XI: Amendments

These By-Laws may be amended by, (1) majority vote of the members present and voting, provided the amendment is presented on day prior to the vote, (2) by a two-thirds majority of those present and voting if immediate action is to be taken as soon as debate has been completed.

Executive Board Report NC State Association of Free Will Baptist

Sept. 23, 2002

The Executive Board met in Cary at the Comfort Suites Hotel on the evening of Sept. 23, 2002. The following board members were present. Rev. Nate Ange, Rev. Jim Marcum, Rev. Wade Parker, Rev. Tim Young, Rev. Robert Harris, Rev. Dean Dobbs, and Rev. Doug King.

The following items were discussed:

- 1) Brother Jim Marcum gave us a report regarding the State Promotional Department. He reported that giving to his department had declined some. He attributed it mostly to the economy.
- 2) The Board approved the compensation package for Brother Marcum.
- 3) The Board discussed the motion passed by the NC State Association that had been held in June 2002, regarding making loans to the NC Home Missions Board. It was agreed that we would consider making loans to the NC Home Missions Board whenever they made a formal application for a loan.
- 4) Preliminary work regarding the next NC State Association meeting that is to be held in 2003 was done. Finalization of the plans are to be made in the Feb. 2003 meeting.

The NC Executive Board met the next day for the All Boards Meeting that was held at the Landmark FWB Church in Cary.

Dec. 5, 2003

The Executive Board met in special session via a tele-conference call on the evening of Dec. 5, 2002. The following board members were present for the conference. Rev. Jim Marcum, Rev. Nate Ange, Rev. Robert Harris, Rev. Dean Dobbs, Rev. Doug King, Rev. Lorenza Stox, and Rev. Tim Young.

The purpose of the meeting was in regards to a request by the NC Home Missions Board to loan NC Home Missionary, Bob Edmunson and the Glad Tidings FWB Mission a total of \$179,500.00 at 6% with the mission work paying all legal fees. It was MSC to loan the money to them, with the understanding that the loan would be renegotiated every five years.

Jan. 22, 2003

The Executive Board met in special session again, via a tele-conference call on the evening of Jan. 22, 2003. The following board members were present for the conference: Rev. Nate Ange, Rev. Lorenza Stox, Rev. Robert Harris, Rev. Tim Young, Rev. Wade Parker, and Rev. Jim Marcum. The reason for meeting was that although a loan had been approved to the NC Home Missions Board on behalf of the Glad Tidings FWB Mission in Asheboro, a local bank had been able to offer the church a better rate than what the Executive Board had proposed. As the result, the Executive Board unanimously voted to offer the church a loan at 4%, with the same stipulations that they pay all legal fees and the loan be renegotiated every five years.

February 24, 2003

The Executive Board met Feb. 24, 2003 at the Comfort Suites Hotel in Cary. The following board members were present. Rev. Dean Dobbs, Rev. Wade Parker, Rev. Jim Marcum, Rev. Nate Ange, Rev. Tim Young, Rev. Lorenza Stox, and Rev. Robert Harris.

The following items were discussed:

- 1) Plans were finalized for the NC State Association meeting.
- 2) The Board approved the budget for the Promotional Dept. for the calender year 2004.
- 3) Brother Jim Marcum gave us a report on the Promotional Dept.
- 4) Our Treasure, Brother Dean Dobbs, gave his report.
- 5) The Board discussed the fact that since Brother Rudolph Outlaw had to resign from the NC Home Missions Board due to health reasons, the Board has the responsibility of appoint a member to fill his position until the State meeting. The Board MSC to appoint Rev. Johnny Hudson to the Home Mission Board.

The NC Executive Board met the next day at the Landmark FWB Church in Cary for the All-Boards meeting.

North Carolina Association of Free Will Baptists

Rev. Jim Marcum, Associational Minister

Dear Pastors, Delegates and Fellow Free Will Baptists:

Greetings and welcome to our Forty-First Annual Session of the North Carolina Association of Free Will Baptists. Let me begin by saying thank you, on behalf of our state, to Pastor Doug King, his staff and people for hosting this state meeting. Cramerton Free Will Baptist Church has always been vibrant and friendly, and we are delighted to be here. Thank you for the invitation to come!

Financially, the ministry of the Promotional Department completely depends on the budget giving, love offerings, and special gifts from Free Will Baptist Churches, organizations and individuals. For the year of 2002 our Free Will Baptist churches, individuals, associations and auxiliaries gave a total of \$65,252. Our state is indeed grateful for those who understand, see the importance of, and have a burden for the ministry of the Promotional Department. However, it continues to surprise me to learn how many believe that the Promotional Department operates on funds given by the organization or the Executive Committee of the North Carolina Association of Free Will Baptists. This is not the case. The Promotional Director is responsible for raising all of his pay and operational funds. Therefore, let me encourage you as a pastor or church leader to seriously and prayerfully consider placing the Promotional ministry into your church's budget giving.

By contributing to this ministry pastors and their congregations partner with the Promotional Director, not only in the organizational functions of the state work, but to provide critical support for our churches, preachers, pastors and their families. Preaching and pastoring are vocations that are filled with pressure and problems. As the Promotional Director, and having pastored sixteen and a half years, I am committed to helping our men and their families to endure and survive these pressures. Many men call my office bruised and battered spiritually. In many of these cases their wife and children have been wounded and hurt. Having experienced such heartache, I try to provide what I did not enjoy during such an experience: a fellow laborer who cares, a spiritual shoulder to lean on, and a listening ear!

The ministry of the Promotional Director also provides an avenue for a pastor to find a church and a church to find a pastor. It has been a privilege to help a number of our churches and men to find compatibility. This part of the Promotional ministry has even extended to preachers and churches from other states.

The daily work of the Promotional ministry involves depositing and distributing funds to the different ministries of our state. There is the 30,000+ miles on the road, preaching more than 93 times, which includes 10 revival meetings. The Promotional Office is responsible for publishing *The* Witness, maintaining constant correspondence by email, snail mail and telephone. The Promotional Office participates in association meetings, state meetings, and national meetings.

In my opinion, supporting the ministry of the Promotional Department is similar to the churches in the New Testament supporting the work of the Apostle Paul. The Apostle's second and third missionary journeys were primarily spent visiting and helping establish congregations, pastors, preachers and church leaders. During these trips, the Apostle encouraged and commended others such as Phebe...a "servant of the church which is at Cenchrea," Priscilla and Aquilla, Andronicus and Junia, "who are of note among the apostles," and he says to "Salute Ubane, our helper in Christ..." As I read Colossians 4:7-17, I see a similarity to the Promotional ministry. Therefore, as Paul thanked the Philippians for giving to his ministry in 4:15-17, I sincerely thank you as well.

2002 MANAGER'S REPORT

Every day I praise God for the ministry of the written message of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. I believe God has abundantly and mercifully blessed the Bible Book Store ministry because we have remained faithful and true to His Word. Someone has said, "Never cease to give praise to God who in loving mercy has breathed upon the message in print and has won to Himself, and continues to win, thousands by the Gospel in paper! Praise the Lord!" Only God can measure the true spiritual impact that the Bible Book Store has had in its 37 years of ministry. It has been instrumental in helping to touch thousands of lives with the Gospel.

Knowing that thousands of our greeting cards have been sent to comfort and to give hope to those who are suffering and in need, enriches our own spirits. Placing teaching tools into the hands of hundreds of Sunday School teachers to build and strengthen the kingdom of God is our motivation to keep on, keeping on. Placing hundreds of study books on the pastor's desk keeps us on our knees praying for spiritual discernment in the titles we offer through the bookstore. As we pack VBS materials to be shipped to a church, our childhood memories recall the excitement of summertime VBS and boys and girls giving their hearts to Jesus. It is our joy to love and encourage our fellow Christians when they visit the bookstore. Then there are those who come in who stand on the brink of hell. Our hearts go out to them. When allowed, we witness to the Jehovah's Witness, the Mormon, and to the Muslim who is unhappy about not finding the Koran in our store. These are only a few of the opportunities shared in service to others. The bookstore is a vital ministry of the printed page. God forbid that we should ever cease to give thanks and praise to our most loving and merciful God.

From a business perspective, 2002 was a difficult year financially. Sometimes it takes adverse circumstances to remind us who is in charge. As always our Heavenly Father never lets us down. Week by week He met the financial needs of the ministry.

The year began with a snow storm in January. It ended with a crippling ice storm the first week in December. The bookstore was closed and without electric power for days. Inclement weather always costs the bookstore sales. The calendar was not helpful in that there were 6 fewer shopping days between Thanksgiving and Christmas, hurting Christmas sales. The economic climate remained sluggish throughout the year. In

Durham and the surrounding areas, reportedly some 30,000 people have lost jobs and more that 500 companies have either downsized or closed since the economic downturn began in late 1999 and early 2001. Collectively, these factors have cost the bookstore some \$18,000 in lost sales. During the year we made cutbacks, kept expenses down, and stayed some projects and improvements. Elizabeth Perreault worked diligently with sales reps to keep freight costs down and to get the best possible discount margins from vendors. We commend her for a job well done. This was a plus in keeping us financially stable.

Additionally, our DOS-operated computer system was outdated and fast becoming obsolete. It was decided to update with Windows to be more time- and cost-effective. To protect the store's cash flow in a slow economy, we elected for a bank loan of \$8,000 to pay for the Windows update. Approximately \$3,400 remains to be paid on this loan. Had we not incurred the loan, the year would have ended very close to being in the black.

Paul Perreault, our jack-of-all-trades, installed our new hardware and updated our 3-station computer network system to a 5-station network (2 points of sale, 2 offices, and shipping and receiving). Then he patiently taught 2 middle-aged, forgetful adults how to operate the system. Paul is truly a benefit to the bookstore. We appreciate the support he gives to this ministry.

The ministry revenues may be down, but that does not mean that the responsibilities and the workload are any less. So we are truly blessed to have Mrs. Patricia Nolen as a co-laborer. Without fail she cheerfully serves whenever and wherever she is needed. Thank you, Mrs. Pat!

Currently, the bookstore averages over 1,100 shoppers monthly. However, the walk-in traffic is not sufficient to keep the ministry alive and well. What has and does keep the ministry viable are the FWB churches in the State Association. Had we not had the churches' Sunday School sales in 2002, we would have been in a serious situation. Sincerely, from our hearts, we thank you, our churches, pastors, SS superintendents, and church secretaries for supporting *your* bookstore. Because of you and to the glory of God, the bookstore is still operating. We are pleased to note that 95% of our state churches support their state bookstore. We are hoping that others will come on board and allow us to serve their church needs as well.

Mrs. Stancill and I appreciate so much our bookstore board (Bro. Rick Cason, Bro. Virgil Nolen, Bro. William Calvert, Bro. Tim McFatter, and Bro. Brent Patrick) for their support and oversight. We thank them for their concerns in meeting our personal needs. Also we are very appreciative of the anniversary plaque presented to us at Parker's Chapel in 2001, commemorating our 20 years of service at the bookstore. We received 2 gift certificates from our board. Well, we enjoyed the meals and had a good time shopping! God bless you for your thoughtfulness.

Having completed our 21st year, we know the affirming hand of God upon our lives and upon the Bible Book Store ministry. We do not know what tomorrow may bring, but we do know the One who holds tomorrow. There can be no doubt about God's blessing upon the ministry of the printed page. The printed Gospel of Jesus Christ must continue because there are souls to rescue and saints to be discipled.

As always, it is a privilege and our hearts' joy to serve you.

Sales from the prior year were down \$18,117, however, gross profit was only down by only \$2,246. This was due to improved margins. This shows very good control and aggressive work on discounts from vendors. This was very good in the economic climate of calendar year 2002.

Operating expenses were down \$5,423 from the prior year. Again, this shows very good control of expenses in a difficult economic climate.

Inventory remained basically flat from the prior year.

I commend the Board and management for their efforts in maintaining good fiscal control during a very difficult year.

NOTE I - DESCRIPTION OF UNIT

The accompanying financial statements include the accounts of The Bible Store of Durham, Inc., a subordinate member organization of the North Carolina Association of Free Will Baptists. The corporation is exempt from federal income taxes under the Internal Revenue Code Section 501 (c)(3). The primary function of the corporation is supplying Sunday School and other Christian literature to the Free Will Baptist Churches in the southeastern states. The corporation also maintains an inventory of Christian literature for sale to the general public. The offices of The Bible Book Store of Durham. Inc. are located in the North Duke Mall in Durham, North Carolina.

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Presentation - Fund Accounting

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the corporation are maintained on the accrual method. Under this method, revenues are recognized when earned rather than when collected and expenses are recognized when the obligation is incurred rather than when it is paid.

Bad Debts

Bad Debts are written off using the direct write-off method. Therefore, these financial statements do not include any allowance for doubtful accounts.

Contribution

All contributions are considered to be available for unrestricted use unless specifically restricted by the donor. Amounts received that are designated for future periods or restricted by the donor for specific purposes are reported as temporarily restricted or permanently restricted support that increases those net asset classes. When a temporary restriction expires, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets and reported in the statement of activities as net assets released from restrictions. At this time, the Corporation does not have any temporarily or permanently restricted net assets.

Estimates

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

Inventory

Inventory consists of Bibles, Sunday School literature, supplies, cards, musical cassettes, books and other Christian Literature and is valued at cost under the first-in, first-out method. Inventory is taken annually on December 31 of each year.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include all petty cash funds of the corporation and cash deposited with banks in the form of checking accounts, savings accounts, money market accounts and short-term certificates of deposits.

Property and Equipment

Fixed assets are recorded at original cost. Items that do not substantially improve or extend the life of an asset are expensed when paid. Items that do substantially extend the life of an asset and major improvements are capitalized and depreciated over the estimated useful life of an asset. Fixed asset are depreciated under the Straight Line Method over the following estimated useful lives:

Furniture and Fixtures	5 - 7 Years
Office Equipment	5 - 7 Years
Leasehold Improvements	5 - 10 Years

NOTE 3 - LEASE OF BUILDING

The corporation has an operating lease agreement for the store premises expiring in December 2004. In addition to the minimum rent, the lease provides for contingent rentals of 3.5% of gross sales in excess of amounts specified in the lease agreement. No additional rent was required for the lease year ending December 31, 2002. The lease requires specified payments for maintenance, property taxes and insurance. Rent expense amounted to \$23,725 for the year ending December 31, 2002.

Future minimum lease payments, including common area maintenance and taxes, under the non-cancelable operating lease at December 31, 2002, excluding contingent rentals and executory costs, are as follows:

NOTE 4 - EXEMPTION FROM INCOME TAXES

The Bible Book Store of Durham, Inc., a subordinate member organization of the North Carolina Association of Free Will Baptists, is a nonprofit corporation exempt from federal and State income taxes under Internal Revenue code Section 501(c)(3). Therefore, no provision for income taxes has been made in these financial statements.

NOTE 5 - HOUSING, SOCIAL SECURITY, TRAVEL AND RETIREMENT ALLOWANCES

The manager of the Bible Book Store of Durham, Inc. receives an allowance for housing and retirement each month in addition to his salary. The total housing allowance paid to the manager for the year ending December 31, 2001 was \$14,575 and \$1,200 for retirement.

NOTE 6 - DEBT

In October 2002, Bible Book Store, Inc. borrowed money to purchase computer and store fixtures in the amount of \$8,000.00. The note is due on October 7, 2005 with a 7.25 % interest rate. Principal due for 2003, 2004 and 2005 is \$1,362, \$2,279 and \$2,247, respectively.

The Leah Waddell Scholarship Fund Report April 22, 2002 - April 17, 2003

History

The North Carolina State Association established this scholarship fund in 1964. This fund is one of the oldest, if not the oldest, continuously funded scholarships at Free Will Baptist Bible College.

The scholarship is in memory of Mrs. Leah Waddell, the late wife of the Reverend Eugene Waddell. She was a 1954 alumnus of Free Will Baptist Bible College. The amount was set at \$75.00 to be awarded annually to a worthy North Carolina student. The revised guidelines changed the amount to \$500, if funds are available. Descendants of Leah Waddell may be included in the scholarship.

The college administration determines the recipients based on financial need. Usually juniors and seniors are given preference. Approximately 120 students have received aid since the 1964-65 school year.
