The Association met by singing and prayer by Moderator, Rev. M. L. Hollis, after which Rev. J. M. Haas took the stand and read I John, 4th chapter, and took text from St. John, 13th chapter, 35th verse: "By this shall all men know that ye are my diciples if you have love one to another." Adjourned for dinner.

FIRST DAY—AFTERNOON SESSION

The Association met by singing by W. G. Prude and prayer, after which the Moderator took his seat and called for the church letters from the different churches, and the following reported: Beech Springs, New Macedonia, Bethlehem, Antioch, Gauley, Damascus, Springdale, Pleasant Grove, Fawn Grove, Stetson Chapel, East Tupelo, Columbus, Union Hill, Oak Ridge, New Life, (Pearce Chapel's letter was received on Monday, the third day of the Association.)

Corresponding Delegates were called for and Rev. G. P. Mayo, of Little Brown Creek Association, was seated as Delegates from that

Association.

Rev. D. W. Jones was also with us Saturday night and till Sunday noon, as a corresponding representative from the Little Brown Creek Association, and was given hand of welcome by the Clerk on behalf of the Association.

The Association met by singing and reading and prayer by Rev. Hollis—Sister Nanie Poste leading prayer.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

We, your Committee on Ladies' Aid Work, beg leave to make the following report: We find from the various letters from the churches of this Association, only two report Ladies' Aid Societies in their churches, and they are as follows: Columbus and Pearce Chapel. Feeling the need of a greater interest in this phase of our work, we recommend that a strong effort be put forth by the Pastors and Church Leagues to organize Aids in all the churches during this associational year. Literature on how to organize and carry on this work of a Ladies' Aid can be had from the Free Will Baptist Press, Ayden, N. C., and at a very small cost. We also recommend to our ladies the organization of a district meeting, where all Aids in the Association can come together at least once a year and plan the work in general.

We, your Committee on League Work, make our report as follows: Knowing that the church of tomorrow depends upon the young people of today, and feeling the need of a better trained leadership to carry on our work in a more efficient way, we recommend that more Free Will Baptist Leagues be organized in churches where there is none, and that a greater interest be taken among Leaguers where they are organized in extending this work into new fields, for no church can be at its best without a F.W.B. League—it is the training service for the church and helps our people to learn the importance of "Putting the Kingdom of God First." in their lives. We insist on our young people to see to it that there is a League in each church in this Association as early as possible. We also recommend that the League Convention begin to form plans for a field worker, to be supported by contributions from the various Leagues.

Sunday School Report—Realizing that the Sunday School of today

will be the church of tomorrow, and knowing that if the church is perpetuated, we must interest the youth of today in Sunday School work, thereby laying the foundation for this effective evangelizing agency of the church, it behooves the ministers and laymen to do everything within their power to see that the youth of their respective communities are given the opportunity to learn more about the principles and teachings of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. We urge that during the coming year a special effort be made to build bigger and better Sunday Schools, where already organized, and organize where there are none. May we awake to the crying need of the hour. We respectfully suggest, first, that the Sunday Schools within our Association, who have not yet joined the North-East Mississippi Sunday School Association, do so at its next session, which will be held with Fawn Grove Church on the fifth Sunday in June, 1939. or get in touch with the Secretary, Mr. John Brown, at Dorsey, Miss., for information concerning same. Second, that the churches that have no Sunday Schools and would be interested in organization of same, contact Mr. Brown and ask that the Executive Committee of the Association aid them. Praying that all Christians will do just what Christ leads them to do in this matter, and knowing if they will listen to His commands, the next session of this Association will find each church reporting the greatest year in the Master's service ever experienced, we respectfully submit to you this report. We find that 12 of our churches report Sunday Schools, and 4 do not.

We, your Committee on Education, respectfully ask that all our people study and read the principles set forth in the Holy Word of God. We also recommend that each member of the Free Will Baptist Church read our church paper, printed in North Carolina, (The Free Will Baptist Press, Ayden, N. C.). We should also have an educational fund for the support of the Orphanage. We also recommend that each church have a two or three weeks' study course for Sunday School and League teachers and leaders, at least once a year. Each member should make a greater effort to get our Sunday Schools, Leagues, Ladies' Aids, and weekly prayer meetings upon the highest plan peossible, for through these agencies we can gain much in Christian Education.

CONSTITUTION

Section 1.—This organization shall be known as the North-East Mississippi Association of Free Will Baptist and shall be composed of ministers, deacons, clerks, and delegates of the various churches of this Association.

Section 2.—The purpose of the Association shall be to bring togther our churches throughout North Mississippi for a closer union among our people and the establishement of new churches in our state.

Section 3.—This Association shall be composed of churches of the above named territory together with like bodies of same Faith and

Practice which may be hereafter admitted.

Section 4.—Each church shall be allowed delegated representatives and they must be duly appointed by their church while in conference and bear credentials from the same to this body.

Section 5.—Visiting ministers and delegates may be seated as ad-

visory members in this body.

Section 6.—It shall not be the purpose of this Association to usurp authority over the churches but to recommend such measures as would promote unity of action among the churches, to harmonize the efforts of individual churches to one another in their efforts to accomplish good, and make each other more proficient in their undertakings for good.

Section 7.—This constitution may be altered or amended by a vote of the yearly meeting at any session, notice of such intended alteration having been given in writing, and recorded at the next previous session.

RULES OF DECORUM

Section 1.—The officers of this Association shall consist of a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be elected at the close of each session by a majority vote of the delegates present.

Section 2.—This Association shall rold its "essions annually beginnin on Thursday and continue through Friday before the fourth Sun-

day in September.

Section 3.—The Moderator shall have the right to appoint all com-

mittees.

Section 4.—The Clerk shall have the right to supervise the printing of the minutes and shall be allowed \$10.00 for his service; Treasurer, \$5.00, and Moderator, \$5.00 for their services.

Section 5.—No member shall absent himself from the body without

leave of the Moderator.

Section 6.—All members desiring to speak shall arise, address the

Moderator, and personal reflections shall be avoided.

Section 7.—All motions made and seconded shall be open for discussion, but debate may be shut off at any time by a majority of the members of the Association.

Section 8.—If any proposition or motion under debate contain two or more points, it shall be divided at the request of any member and the vote taken separately.

Section 9.—Motions made and lost shall not be recorded on the min-

utes unless so ordered at the time.

Section 10.—No one shall be allowed to speak more than twice on the same subject, and not more than ten minutes at a time; without special leave from the body.

Section 11.—All questions shall be decided by a majority of the

members present.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

Article 1.—THE BIBLE—The Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments were given by inspiration of God and the Scriptures of the New Testament are our infalible rule of Faith and Practice.

Article 2.—GOD—There is one living and true God, revealed in nature as the Creator, Preserver, and Righteous Governor of the universe, and in the Scriptures as Father, Son and Holy Spirit, yet as one God, infinitely wise and good, whom all intelligent creatures are

to love, adore, and obey.

Article 3.—CHRIST—Christ is God manifest in the flesh; in His divine nature truly God, in His human nature truly man. The mediator between God and man, once crucified, He is now risen and glorified and is our ever present Saviour and Lord.

Article 4.—THE HOLY SPIRIT—The Scriptures assign to the Holy Spirit all attributes of God. He is the reprover, comforter, guide and sanctifier of men.

Article 5.—THE GOVERNMENT OF GOD—God exercises a wise and benevolent providence over all beings and all things by maintaining the constitution and the laws of nature. He also performs special acts of grace, not otherwise provided for, as the highest welfare of man requires.

Article 6.—THE SINFULNESS OF MAN—Man was created innocent but by disobedience fell into a state of sin and condemnation. His posterity therefore inherit a fallen nature of such tendencies that all who come to years of accountability sin, and become guilty before God.

Article 7.—THE WORK OF CHRIST—The Son of God by His incarnation, life, sufferings, death and resurrection effected for all a redemption from sin that is full and free and is the ground of salvation by faith.

vation are: 1. Repentence or sincere sorrow for sin and hearty renunciation of it. 2. Faith or the unreserved committal of one's self to Christ as Saviour and Lord with purpose to love and obey Him in all things. In the exercise of saving faith the soul is renewed by the Holy Spirit, freed from the dominion of sin and becomes a child of God. 3. Continuance in faith and obedience until death.

Article 9.—ELECTION—God determined from the beginning to save all who should comply with the condition of salvation. Hence by faith in Christ men become His elect.

Article 10.—FREEDOM OF THE WILL—The human will is free and self-controlled, having power to yield to the influence of the truth and the Spirit, or to resist them and perish.

Article 11.—SALVATION FREE—God desires the salvation of all, the Gospel invites all, the Holy Spirit strives with all, and whosoever will may come and take the water of life freely.

Article 12.—PERSEVERENCE—All believers in Christ, who through grace persevere in holiness to the end of life, have promise of eternal salvation.

Article 13.—GOSPEL ORDINANCES—Baptism, or the immersion of believers in water, and the Lord's Supper, are ordinances to be perpetuated under the Gospel. Feet Washing, an ordinance teaching humility, of universal obligation, and to be administered to all true believers.

Article 14.—THE CHRISTIAN SABBATH—The divine law requires that one day in seven be set apart from secular employments and amusements, for rest, worship, holy works and activities, and for personal communion with God.

Article 15.—RESURRECTION, JUDGMENT AND FINAL RETRIBUTION—The Scriptures teach the resurrection of all men at the last day. They that have done good will come forth to the resurrection of life, and they that have done ill unto the resurrection of judgment; then the wicked will "go away into eternal punishment but the rightous into eternal life."
