MINUTES

FIRST DAY-MORNING SESSION

The North East Mississippi Aassociation of Free Will Baptist met in its eighth annual session with Gauley Church on Thursday morning, the 24th day of September, 1942.

The first day opened the sessions by song service, conducted by Rev. Geo. C. Lee. Prayer offered by Rev. J. M. Haas.

The welcome address by the local pastor, and the Moderator called for church letters and the following churches were represented by letters and delegates: East Tupelo, Columbus, Springdale, Antioch, Gauley, Bethelehem, Damascus, Pleasant Grove, Union Hill, New Life, Priceville, and Stetson Chapel, and the followink churches were represented by letter only: Fawn Grove, Pierce's Chapel, and Beech Springs. Twelve by delegates and three by letters. Every church in the Association representing.

Bro. L. E. Duncan and Sister Nola Bevill were appointed as reading clerks for the assistance of the clerk. These church delegations were received and seated, and the body was declared ready for business by the Moderator.

The following visiting ministers were present and recognized by officials and body and given seats with us as such: Rev. G. R. Meadows, pastor of the Methodist Church of Shannon, Miss.; Rev. Ralph Staten, of Pocahontas, Ark.; and Rev. L. Q. Lorwood, of Cheyenne, Wyoming, minister of the Faith.

Adjourned for preaching hour and Rev. G. R. Meadows filled the pulpit and brought a wonderful and inspiring message from God's Word. Adjourned for lunch.

FIRST DAY—AFTERNOON SESSION

We were called together by singing. Rev. D. M. Smitherman conducted devotion, reading Psa. 103 chapter.

We, your committee on Sunday Schools, beg leave to report as follows: We believe that every church should have a good Sunday School, and that young and old alike should support it, by their at-

tendance as well as their finance. We believe that churches without a Sunday School should organize and strive to build to it by inviting every one often and promote interest by good singing and Sunday School programs.

Praying that in the coming year more of our churches will organize and support a Sunday School.

LADIES' AID REPORT

We, the Ladies' Aid, that worship at Pearce's Chapel F. W. B.

Church, send the following report:

Balance in treasury, \$6.24; amount collected up 'till September, \$35.72; amount expended, \$27.28; balance in treasury, \$14.68; number on roll, 6; number meetings, monthly; chapters read in Bible, 141; sick visits, 100; trays, 70; flowers, 11; Xmas boxes, \$12.70; medical supplies, \$1.96; education, \$3.00.

We, your Comittee on F. W. B. Leagues, make our report: Knowing that the future of our church depends on the youth, we urge that each church organize a League for the purpose of training of the young people for future church work. We also urge that the churches having Leagues begin to work toward a standard of excellence. We suggest that the pastors of our various churches be responsible in organizing the Leagues, until the Leagues are financially able to select and support a field worker for the purpose of organizing Leagues. We recommend that all Leagues keep in contact with all boys leaving the various communities by correspondence and the sending of Tracts and Testaments. The following churches have Leagues: East Tupelo, Pearce Chapel, Beech Springs, Columbus, Fawn Grove. Mrs. Forrest Benning, J. R. Strube, J. D. Step, Committee.

Assignment of homes at this time. Adjourned 'till Friday morning at 9:00 o'clock. Supper was served on the church yard.

By the request of New Life Church that Bro. Oliver Wages be ordained as a minister of the Gospel, the Moderator appointed an Investigation Committee to inquire of Bro. Wages as to the doctrine, and the following committee was appointed: Rev. Geo. C. Lee, Rev. E. A. Lewis and Rev. Dee Hollis, and after making investigation found the Brother true in the Faith and recommended that the Brother be ordained, and the Association selected ordaining counsel as follows, to meet with New Life Church at some early date to lay hands on the Brother: The Moderator, Rev. J. M. Haas; the Clerk, Rev. Geo. C. Lee, and Rev. E. A. Lewis, who agreed on the time to meet and ordain Brother Wages.

Devotion for the night service was conducted by Rev. W. H. Fon-

dren, reading from Heb. 12 chapter. Prayer by Rev. Haas.

We had a very inspiring feast in song at this time, led by Brother Prude. The congregation stood in silent prayer for a moment in honor and remembrance of our dear boys who have gone and those who shall go and their ones who love them so dearly and hate to give them up. But for home's sake, country's sake, and God's sake, we bow to His will. Prayer concluded by Rev. Meadows, after which the pulpit was filled by the pastor, Brother Lee, who used for foundation for remarks Jno. 21st chapter, 15 to 18. Text: "Feed My Sheep." Subject: "The Divine Ordnances." At the close of this message some seventy-five or more partook of the Lord's Supper. After supper some where near the same number came to the altar and washed one another's feet, as the Lord has said, if "I then, your Lord and Master, have washed your feet: Ye also ought to wash one another's feet," and that the Lord also said, "If ye know these things, happy are ye if ye do them." In much love and rejoicing did we observe the Lord's Supper and in brotherly and sisterly love wash feet, and were happy. Then we sang the wonderful old hymn: "Oh How I Love Jesus," and went out. Mark 14-26.

FRIDAY MORNING—SECOND DAY

Met by singing. Devotional by Brother L. E. Duncan, reading Psa. 1st chapter. Prayer by Rev. Ralph Staten. Minutes read and adopted.

The following preachers made their annual reports:

Greetings to the North East Mississippi Association of Free Will Baptist: I regret very much that I will not be able to be with you all in this sitting of the Association, as my labors in the Lord have called me so far away. I hope and pray that you may have the most harmonious and successful session that has ever been held. I ask the prayers of every one of God's children, that He may continue to bless me in His work. The Lord is blessing our laborers in a wonderful way here in the old North State, Greenville, N. C. I closed a week' meeting yesterday (Sunday) afternoon at the waters, baptizing eighteen. Have had large numbers for baptism each week since I have been here. I have three more weeks' revival work here and then will be on my way back home, the Lord being willing. The following is my report of work for year:

I have pastored as best I could nine churches, and two of these half time—that is, preaching to them two Sundays out of the month—namely, Red Bay and Pierce's Chapel. I have also preached at Vernon two Sunday afternoons in each month. I have traveled more than thirty-five thousand miles. I have held twelve revivals in the follow-

ings states: Alabama, Mississippi, Florida, Arkansas, and North Carolina, and still in revival work at this time with many more to hold. I have preached 432 times; one commencement sermon, 4 memorial sermons; married two couples, baptized 193, received from churches pastored, \$1,670.00; received from revivals held, \$931.43; total received, \$2,601.43.

M. L. HOLLIS, Red Bay, Ala.

Greetings to North East Mississippi Association of Free Will Baptist, when convened with the Gauley Church on September 24, 1942: It is with true thankfulness of heart to God that I make my report of my year's work to September 23, 1942. I have preached 182 sermons, prayed many prayers, visited a number of sick people, baptized 19 converts, received 24 into church, assisted in 4 revivals, preached one memorial sermon, pastored 4 churches, conducted 5 revivals, married one couple, conducted 7 funerals, received from churches pastored, \$546.52; received from revival work, \$243.00; total, \$789.72. J. M. HAAS, Tupelo, Miss.

I am delighted to make my report to the 1942 session of the North East Mississippi Association when convened with Gauley, September 24, 1942. I have preached since last Association, 166 sermons; pastored 4 churches, held and helped in 8 revivals; had 31 public professions of salvation; received into church, 45; baptized 20, had 11 reclaimed, held 11 funerals, married four couples, licensed 2 preachers, traveled 4,881 miles, received from pastoral work, \$402.85; from revivals, \$156.64; total, \$559.49.

CONSTITUTION

Section 1.—This organization shall be known as the North-East Mississippi Association of Free Will Baptist and shall be composed of ministers, deacons, clerk and delegates of the various churches of

this Association.

Section 2.—The purpose of the Association shall be to bring together our churches throughout North Mississippi for a closer union among our people and the establishment of new churches in our state.

Section 3.—This Association shall be composed of churches of the above named territory together with like bedies of same Faith and

Practice which may be hereafter admitted.

Section 4.—Each church shall be allowed delegated representatives and they must be duly appointed by their church while in conference and bear credentials from the same to this body.

Section 5.—Visiting ministers and delegates may be seated as ad-

visory members in this body.

Section 6.—It shall not be the purpose of this Association to usurp authority over the churches but to recommend such measures as would promote unity of action among the churches, to harmonize the efforts of individual churches to one another in their efforts to accomplish good, and make each other more proficient in their undertakings for good.

Section 7.—This constitution may be altered or amended by a vote of the yearly meeting at any session, notice of such intended alteration having been given in writing, and recorded at the next previous session.

RULES OF DECORUM

Section 1.—The officers of this Association shall consist of a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be elected at the close of each session by a majority vote of the delegates present.

Section 2.—This Association shall hold its sessions annually beginning on Thursday and continue through Friday before the fourth

Sunday in September.

Section 3.—The Moderator shall have the right to appoint all

committees.

Section 4.—The Clerk shall have the right to supervise the printing of the minutes and shall be allowed \$10.00 for his service; Treasurer, \$5.00; and Moderator, \$5.00 for their services.

Section 5.—No member shall absent himself from the body. with-

out leave of the Moderator.

Section 6.—All members desiring to speak shall arise, address the

Moderator, and personal reflections shall be avoided.

Section 7.—All motions made and seconded shall be open for discussion, but debate may be shut off at any time by a majority of the members of the Association.

Section 8.—If any proposition or motion under debate contain two or more points, it shall be divided at the request of any member and the vote taken separately.

Section 9.—Motions made and lost shall not be recorded on the

minutes unless so ordered at the time.

Section 10.—No one shall be allowed to speak more than twice on the same subject, and not more than ten minutes at a time; without special leave from the body.

Section 11.—All questions shall be decided by a majority of the

members present.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

Article 1.—THE BIBLE—The Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments were given by inspiration of God and the Scriptures of the New Testament are our infalible rule of Faith and Practice.

Article 2.—GOD—There is one living and true God, revealed in nature as the Creator, Preserver, and Righteous Governor of the universe, and in the Scriptures as Father, Son and Holy Spirit, yet as one

God, infinitely wise and good, whom all intelligent creatures are to love, adore, and obey.

Article 3.—CHRIST—Christ is God manifest in the flesh; in His divine nature truly God, in His human nature truly man. The mediator between God and man, once crucified, He is now risen and glorified and is our ever present Saviour and Lord.

Article 4.—THE HOLY SPIRIT—The Scriptures assign to the Holy Spirit all attributes of God. He is the reprover, comforter, guide and sanctifier of men.

Article 5.—THE GOVERNMENT OF GOD—God exercises a wise and benevolent providence over all beings and all things by maintaining the constitution and the laws of nature. He also performs special acts of grace, not otherwise provided for, as the highest welfare of man requires.

Article 6.—THE SINFULNESS OF MAN—Man was created innocent but by disobedience fell into a state of sin and condemnation. His posterity therefore inherit a fallen nature of such tendencies that all who come to years of accountability sin, and become guilty before God.

Article 7.—THE WORK OF CHRIST—The Son of God by His incarnation, life, sufferings, death and resurrection affected for all a redemption from sin that is full and free and is the ground of salvation by faith.

Article 8.—THE TERMS OF SALVATION—The conditions of salvation are: 1. Repentence or sincere sorrow for sin and hearty renunciation of it. 2. Faith or the unreserved committal of one's self to Christ as Saviour and Lord with purpose to love and obey Him in all things. In the exercise of saving faith the soul is renewed by the Holy Spirit, freed from the domination of sin and becomes a child of God. 3. Continuance in faith and obedience until death.

Article 9.—ELECTION—God determined from the beginning to save all who should comply with the condition of salvation. Hence by faith in Christ men become His elect.

Article 10.—FREEDOM OF THE WILL—The human will is free and self-controlled, having power to yield to the influence of the truth and the spirit, or to resist them and perish.

Article 11.—SALVATION FREE—God desires the salvation of all, the Gospel invites all, the Holy Spirit strives with all, and whosoever will may come and take the water of life freely.

Article 12.—PERSEVERENCE—All believers in Christ, who through grace persevere in holiness to the end of life, have promise of eternal salvation.

Article 13.—GOSPEL ORDINANCES—Baptism, or the immersion of believers in water, and the Lord's Supper, are ordinances to be perpetuated under the Gospel. Feet Washing, an ordinance teaching humility, of universal obligation, and to be administered to all true believers.

Article 14.—THE CHRISTIAN SABBATH—The divine law requires that one day in seven be set apart from secular employments and amusements, for rest, worship, holy works and activities, and for personal communion with God.

Article 15.—RESURRECTION, JUDGMENT AND FINAL RETRIBUTION—The Scriptures teach the resurrection of all men at the last day. They that have done good will come forth to the resurrection of life, and they that have done ill unto the resurrection of punishment but the righteous into eternal life.
