MINUTES-FIRST DAY-MORNING SESSION

THE NORTHEAST MISSISSIPPI ASSOCIATION OF FREE WILL BAPTISTS met in its Ninth annual session, with Priceville church on Thursday morning Sept. 23, 1943.

The association was opened by singing led by Geo. C. Lee, using Nos. 26 and 88 from "Favorite Songs and Hymns," Prayer led by Rev. J. S. Frederick of the Vernon Association. Bro. W. G. FRIDAY AFTERNOON SESSION

Report of Home Mission Board

During the past year there has been only one tent meeting held, this being at Caledonia, Miss., where we carried the new tent and equipment.

In this meeting, despite very inclement weather, the attendance was good and an outpouring of the Holy Spirit was shown by the number that accepted Christ as their person Saviour and many who rededicated themselves in His service. Many of our people from Columbus and Depriest attend the services. At present we are planning two other meetings, one at Philadelphia, Miss., and the other in Zicn's Rest Association.

We respectfully ask that the association grant us the privilege of visiting each church, at a convenient time for them, and explain in detail the work of our Board, its program and a suggested plan for making this work more efficient.

Home Mission Board.

A talk was made at this time by the clerk, G. C. Lee, in behalf of funds for the carrying on of Home Mission work and particularly of needed funds to pay off the indebtedness on the new tent. After the talk and offering was taken amounting to \$77.45.

Christian Education report came up for adoption and talks were made by the following brethren: Bros. Charlie Hollis and L. E. Duncan, Rev. D. M. Smitherman and J. R. Davidson.

We, your committee on Christian Education, beg leave to submit the following: By a survey of the status of our cause we are convinced that there is a need of revival of concern for a constructive plan for improving our status in general. We discover the fact that there is seldom ever found an adequate supply of constructive Christian literature for use in our churches or homes, however we are fully appreciative of the fact that there is a growing interest in all phases of Christian Education among our people.

We wish to offer the following recommendations:

That our people be encouraged to subscribe to and read denominational periodicals, such as the FWB Messenger printed at Tupelo, Miss., The Free Will Baptist printed at Ayden, N. C. and the Free Will Baptist Gem printed at Monett, Mo.

That Women's Auxiliary, Sunday School and FWB League may contact the proper authorities for the purpose of availing themselves of the best literature that they may attain a greater efficiency in these fields of Christian Education.

That in cases where available supplies prove to be inadequate to meet the needs that the matter be taken up with the National Board of Publications and Literature of our denomination, of which Rev. J. C. Griffin of New Bern, N. C. is chairman.

That each church begin as early as possible building a library for the use of teachers and leaders in the plan of our denomination.

CONSTITUTION

Section 1.—This organization shall be known as the North-East Mississippi Association of Free Will Baptists and shall be composed of ministers, deacons, clerks, and delegates of the various churches of this Association.

Section 2.—The purpose of the Association shall be to bring together our churches throughout North Mississippi for a closer union among our people and the establishment of new churches in our state.

Section 3.—This Association shall be composed of churches of the above named territory together with like bodies of same Faith and Practice which may be hereafter admitted.

Section 4.—Each church shall be allowed three delegated representatives and they must be duly appointed by their church while in conference and bear credentials from the same to this body.

Section 5.—Visiting ministers and delegates may be seated as advisory members in this body.

Section 6.—It shall not be the purpose of this Association to usurp authority over the churches but to recommend such measures as would promote unity of action among the churches, to harmonize the efforts of individual churches to one another in their efforts to accomplish good, and make each other more proficient in their undertakings for good.

Section 7.—This constitution may be altered or amended by a vote of the yearly meeting at any session, notice of such intended alterations having been given in writing, and recorded at the next previous session.

RULES OF DECORUM

Section 1.—The officers of this association shall consist of a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be elected at the close of each session by a majority of the delegates present.

Section 2.—This Association shall hold its session annually beginning on Thursday and continue through Friday before the fourth Sunday in September.

Section 3.—The Moderator shall have the right to appoint all committees.

Section 4.—The Clerk shall have the right to supervise the printing of the minutes and shall be allowed \$10.00 for his service; Treasurer \$5.00; and Moderator, \$5.00 for their services.

Section 5.—No member shall absent himself from the body without leave of the Moderator.

Section 6.—All members desiring to speak shall arise, address the Moderator, and personal reflection shall be avoided.

Section 7.—All motions made and seconded shall be open for discussion, but debate may be shut off at any time by a majority of the members of the Association.

Section 8.—If any proposition or motion under debate contain two or more points, it shall be divided at the request of any member and the vote taken separately.

Section 9.—Motions made and lost shall not be recorded on the minutes unless so ordered at the time.

Section 10.—No one shall be allowed to speak more than twice on the same subject, and not more than ten minutes at a time; without special leave from the body.

Section 11.—All question shall be decided by a majority of the members present.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

Article 1.—THE BIBLE—The Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments were given by inspiration of God and the Scriptures of the New Testament are our infallible rule of Faith and Practice.

Article 2.—GOD—There is one living and true God, revealed in nature as the Creator, Preserver, and Righteous Governor of the universe, and in the Scriptures as Father, Son and Holy Spirit, yet as one God, infinitely wise and good, whom all intelligent creatures are to love, adore, and obey.

Article 3.—CHRIST is God manifest in the flesh; in His divine nature truly God, in His human nature truly man. The mediator between God and man, once crucified, He is now risen and glorified and is our ever present Saviour and Lord.

Article 4.—THE HOLY SPIRIT—The Scripture assigns to the Holy Spirit all attributes of God. He is the reprover, comforter, guide and sanctifier of men.

Article 5.—THE GOVERNMENT OF GOD—God exercises a wise and benevolent providence over all beings and all things by maintaining the constitution and the laws of nature. He also performs special acts of grace, not otherwise provided for, as the highest welfare of manrequires.

Article 6.—THE SINFULNESS OF MAN—Man was created innocent but by disobedience fell into a state of sin and condemnation. His posterity therefore inherit a fallen nature of such tendencies that all

who come to years of accountability sin, and become guilty before God.

Article 7.—THE WORK OF CHRIST—The Son of God by His incarnation, life, suffering, death and resurrection affected for all a redemption from sin that is full and free and is the ground of salvation by faith.

Article 8.—THE TERMS OF SALVATION—The conditions of salvation are: 1. Repentence or sincere sorrow for sin and hearty renunciation of it. 2. Faith or the unreserved committal of one's self to Christ as Saviour and Lord with purpose to live and obey Him in all things. In the exercise of saving faith the soul is renewed by the Holy Spirit, freed from the domination of sin and becomes a child of God. 3. Continuance in faith and obedience until death.

Article 9.—ELECTION—God determined from the beginning to save all who should comply with the condition of salvation. Hence by faith in Christ men become His elect.

Article 10.—FREEDOM OF THE WILL—The human will is free and self-controlled, having power to yield to the influence of the truth and the spirit, or to resist them and perish.

Article 11—SALVATION FREE—God desires the salvation of all, the Gospel invites all, the Holy Spirit strives with all, and whosoever will come and take the water of life freely.

Article12.—PERSEVERENCE—All believers in Christ, who through grace persevere in holiness to the end of life, have promise of eternal salvation.

Article 13.—GOSPEL ORDINANCES—Baptism, or the immersion of believers in water, and the Lord's Supper, are ordinances to be perpetuated under the Gospel. Feet washing, an ordinance teaching humility, of universal obligation, and to be administered to all true believers.

Article 14.—THE CHRISTIAN SABBATH—The divine law requires that one day in seven be set apart from peculiar employments and amusements, for rest, worship, holy works and activities, and for personal communion with God.

Article 15.—RESURRECTION, JUDGMENT AND FINAL RETRIBUTION—The Scriptures teach the resurrection of all men at the last day. They that have done good will come forth to the resurrection of life, and they that have done ill unto the resurrection of punishment but the righteous into eternal life."
