MINUTES

OF THE FOURTEENTH ANNUAL SESSION OF NORTHEAST MISSISSIPPI FREE WILL BAPTIST ASSOCIATION WHEN CONVENED WITH DAMASCUS CHURCH OCTOBER 7-8, 1948

Session opened with song led by Bro. W. G. Prude. Rev. L. D. Gibson led in prayer.

Rev. L. E. Winter brought the devotions using as a basis for his comment Gen. 13:8, "Let there be no strife—between me and thee—for we be brethren."

The delegates and visitors were given a warm welcome by the Pastor, Rev. G. C. Price. Bro. Milton Crowson made the response.

Rev. Luther Gibson, Moderator, took the chair and appointed Sisters Wayne Haas and Dorothy Robinson as reading clerks. Rev. T. L. Walker read from 1 Cor. 15th Chapter, using as a text 1 Cor. 15:10, and for a subject, "Things That Make a Man." He brought to our attention many things that help in making a man, but reminded us that only God could complete the job.

Friday Morning Session

After a good night's rest what would be better than thinking of our Heavenly Father's care of us and singing "Glory To His Name" as we begin another day.

Rev. Milton Crowson read for our meditation Psalm 133 and asked Bro. George Lee to lead our prayer.

REPORT OF MEN'S FELLOWSHIP OF EAST TUPELO CHURCH

From October 1, 1947 to Sept. 30, 1948

The Men's Fellowship of East Tupelo Church have been meeting regularly twice a month since its organization on December 17, 1946. The purpose of the organization is, "To unite ourselves together for the mutual good of the members, the church and the community in Christian service." We have a devotional program at each meeting which is a source of inspiration to help us meet the problems of the day.
