WINDERS ON THENTELIES ANNUAL SESSION NOMERRAST MISSISSIPPI ASSOCIATION

The session was opened Friday morning, September 30, at 10:00 a.m. with singing 1cd by Rev. M. H. Hollis. After prayer Rev. George Lee made a move to open the session for business. After a second to the move it was passed.

Mrs. Ralph Riley and Mrs. Ruby Burkes were appointed reading clerks by the moderator, Rev. Luther Gibson. They proceeded to read the letters of the 22 churches represented. It was then moved by Rev. Herbert Stalnaker and seconded that we accept the letters and seat the delegates. Passed. The following committee on committees was appointed and approved by the body: L. E. Duncan, Milton Smith, and W. M. Johnson.

The pastor of Beech Springs Church, the Rev. L. D. Gibson, gave a hearty welcome to all attending the association. The moderator then recognized the following visiting delegates: Bro. and Sister J. L. Brown, R. C. McCoy, and J. A. Whittemore, and others from Little Brown Creek Association whose names were not turned in to the clerk.

After extending an invitation for membership in the association and receiving no response the body was recessed until eleven o'clock after the singing of "Amazing Grace".

After recess the committee on committees gave a partial report and it was accepted. The appointments made at this time were the resolution and credential committees. The moderator then introduced the morning speaker, Rev. J. D. O'Donnell. He brought a message from Genesis 5:24 and Heb. 11:5-6 using the topic, "By Faith, Enoch."

Rev. M. H. Hollis led us in the singing of a hymn and we were dismissed for lunch. The ladies of the church served a very delicious meal.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON

After a period of singing the moderator introduced the devotional speaker, Rev. Herbert Stalnaker, who brought an inspiring devotional. The body once again entered into a business session. The report of the Committee on Committees was read and adopted. (see COTMITTEE REPORTS)

The minister's reports were read and adopted (see MINISTER'S REPORTS). After this the Gredentials Committee's report was read and adopted (see COMMITTEE REPORTS). A partial report of the Resolutions Committee was made and Articles 1 and 2 were rejected; articles 3 and 4 were passed (seeCOMMITTEE REPORTS).

The Home Mission Board and the following committees made their reports and they were accepted: Women's Auxiliary, League, and the Temperance Committees. (see COMMITTEE REPORTS).

Rev. M. L. Hollis gave an oral description of the three revivals that had been sponsored by the Board in Memphis, Aberdeen, and Sulligent. He said that much lasting good had been accomplished at all places at though there were no churches organized at the two latter places. Bro. Boyd Jones moved that the Board be authorized to give the trailer to the Youth Camp. Passed.

Ero. H. A. Roberts gave an oral statement of the amount of money in the supergranuation treasury. The amount was \$1061.63. It was moved and seconded and passed to accept this report. The paster of the church then appointed delegates places to stay for the night. The delegates were served a nice supper by the ladies of the church after the session was dismissed.

THURSDAY EVENING

The evening service was opened with singing led by Bro. Prude. This was followed by an interesting devotional delivered by Bro. Lec. This was followed by a hearty testimony meeting. Bro. Prude and Bro. Stembridge led us in more congregational singing before the message.

The moderator introduced the evening speaker, the Rev. W. S. Mooneyham, National Executive Secretary of the National Association. He brought a great message on the subject, The Odds are Against Us. We were then dismissed until the next morning.

FRIDAY MORNING

The session was opened at 8:30 a.m. with singing led by Bro. M. H. Hollis and prayer by Bro. C. J. Ard. Bro. L. E. Winters delivered the morning devotional.

After a move and second to enter business the following reports were given and accepted: Christian Literature, Finance, and final report of Resolution committees (see COMMITTEE REPORTS).

The following Ordaining Council was elected: Rev. M. L. Hollis, Rev. George Lee, Rev. W. O. Knight, Bros. Roy Brown and L. E. Duncan. Rev. H. L. Hollis and Bro. John Brown were appointed as the program committee for the coming year.

After a move and second was passed to enter into the organization of a quarterly meeting, the assistant moderator took charge and the following business was presented:

1. Move and second to have one quarterly meeting. Passed

2. Move and second to meet Thursday night and Friday before the first Sunday in each quarter. Passed.

3. The following places were chosen as hosts for the coming year:

Columbus, East Tupclo, and New Gauley,

4. The following officers were elected for the quarterly meeting: Moderator, Rev. George Lee; Clerk and Treasurer, Bro. L. E. Duncan. These officers were to be the program committee.

5. Move and second to accept the constitution and by-laws in the

After this business was finished a move and second was made to make provisions in our constitution for an Executive Committee. This was passed but must be voted again at the next session. The following officers were elected for the coming year: Moderator, Luther Cibsen; Assistant Moderator, Rev. M. L. Hollis; Clerk, J. D. Compoll; Assistant Clerk, M. H. Hollis; Treasurer, W. G. Prude; Evangelist, M. L. Hollis; Assistant Evangelist, L. E. Winters. Elected as members of Beards: Superannuation, Edgar Stembridge; Home Mission, Leonard Hill.

After a short recess a move and second was made to print the constitution and by-laws of the minister's conference in the minutes and that the association take care of the expense of printing of the minutes. Passed.

After singing led by Bro. Prude and prayer by W. M. Johnson the ordaining council took charge of the service and ordained the following: Bros. Oscar McCrory and Edgar Stembridge as deacons; and Rev. Joyce Gore as a minister. Rev. Gore and wife were given an encouraging handshake by the congregation.

Bro. Lee asked permission to take an offering for Bro. Price. The offering was \$37.70. Bro. M. L. Hollis then brought the closing message of the association. After his message the obituary report was read and accepted. After a moment of silence in memory of those who had left our midst during the year, a move and second was made to adjourn.

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS OF THE NORTHEAST MISSISSIPPI FREE WILL BAPTIST MINISTER'S CONFERENCE

PREAMBLE: In order to labor together in unity, to co-ordinate our efforts in evangelism and pastoral work, to engage in a more definite plan of work, and to get to know each other better, we, the ministers of this association do hereby organize this ministers conference.

ARTICLE ONE-NAME--This organization shall be known as the Northeast

Mississippi Free Will Baptist Minister's Conference.

ARTICLE TWO-PURPOSE--It shall be the purpose of this conference to unite our ministers in evangelistic work, to arouse our sentiments against worldliness, to work together to spread the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ wherever He shall lead.

ARTICLE THREE-MEMBERSHIP--The members of this conference shall be the liscensed and ordained ministers in good standing belonging to the churches composing the Northeast Mississippi Association of Free Will Baptists. Visiting ministers of sound Christian character shall have a hearty welcome as advisory members in any session of this conference.

ARTICLE FOUR-OFFICERS--The officers of this conference shall be President, Vice-President, and a Secretary-treasurer. These shall be elected at the end of each associational year to serve one year.

ARTICLE FIVE-MEETINGS - This conference shall meet at least twice a year; one meeting being held during the association each year; and others being set during the year by the officers of this conference.

ARTICLE SIX-This constitution may be altered or amended by a two-thirds vote of members present at any regular business meeting.

BY-LAWS

1. This conference of ministers shall recommend to the association which of its member shall receive certificates of standing each year.

2. Each member or minister belonging to the Northeast Mississippi Association of Free Will Baptists shall report to this conference yearly in person or by letter to be recommended for certificate of standing.

3. By-laws may be added to or taken from these by a majority vote

of members present at any regular business meeting.
