INTRODUCTION TO OBC

Since many of those receiving this bulletin will be visitors stopping by the Oklahoma Bible College booth at the National Association meeting in Little Rock, Arkansas, this issue is especially designed to introduce the College to Free Will Baptists who are not too well acquainted with the school.

Oklahoma Bible College is a two-year junior college organized by the State Association of Free Will Baptists in Oklahoma. With several hundred high school youths graduating and only a score attending our denominational school each year, the college was organized to bring two years of

Bible college training to Free Will Baptist young people in the Mid-West.

HISTORY

This fall the college will hold its first session on its permanent campus located on Interstate Highway 35, two miles south of Moore, Oklahoma. In its move from temporary quarters at the Capitol Hill Church in Oklahoma City, the college will remain within the metropolitan area of (continued inside)

ADDITIONS TO FACULTY AND STAFF

The president of Oklahoma Bible College, Dr. J. D. O'Donnell, has announced the addition of four new members to the faculty and staff of Oklahoma Bible College. They are Reverend Clarence Hearron of Bowie, Texas; Reverend and Mrs. Eugene Workman of Glasgow, Kentucky; and Mrs. Joyce Farmer of Oklahoma City.

Mr. Hearron is the moderator of the state association of Free Will Baptists in Texas and has been a pastor in that state since 1946. He received his bachelor's degree from Baylor University and his master's degree from Texas Wesleyan College. Mr. Hearron has several years experience as a teacher. He will serve as academic dean of the school and as a teacher.

Mr. Workman will become the registrar for the school and serve as teacher and counsellor of men students. At the present he is the pastor of the First Free Will Baptist Church of Glasgow. Mr. Workman is a graduate of Free Will Baptist Bible College and has two years experience in the field of journalism.

Mrs. Workman is also a graduate of Free Will Baptist Bible College. Besides her teaching duties, she will serve as counsellor of women students. She is a native of North Carolina.

Mrs. Farmer is the wife of the business manager of the College, Dan L. Farmer. She will assume the posttion of food service manager.

BOND PROGRAM NEARS COMPLETION


Free Will Baptists have responded well to the bond program to finance the building program of Oklahoma Bible College. Sales have run well ahead of the building program. With two months of the building program remaining, around \$105,000.00 of the original \$140,000.00 program has been sold. This leaves approximately \$35,000.00 to be sold. Most of these bonds have been sold to members



of Free Will Baptist churches or to people who attend Free Will Baptist churches in Oklahoma, Texas, and Kansas. Those who have promised to invest in the bond program are urged to do so immediately so that the program can be closed out soon. At present pastors are being urged to sell at least one more bond to one of their members. About fifty bonds remain to be sold. They are \$500 and \$1,000 bonds. Sell one today.

Oklahoma Bible College has built a new campus. This new campus will be ready for occupancy on September 6. It was built for STUDENTS and has no other reason for existence. Phase One in the building program is nearing an end and is expected to house the student body for only two years before further housing is needed.

Applications have been approved for the 1966-67 school year for students from Texas, Arkansas, Arizona, Kansas, and Oklahoma, but like the Biblical parable, "still there is room." In 1958 at the state meeting in Ada, interest in an educational institution had grown to the point that the Board of Christian Education was authorized to do preparatory work

toward organizing a college. It was in the fall of 1959 that the Bible College opened its doors for its first semester of work. Moving the next year to Wagoner, the school eventually settled in Oklahoma City for its third year of operation. The school was first at Northwest Church but later settled at Capitol Hill Church through the spring semester of 1966.

Response to a Free Will Baptist college in the Mid-West will determine future plans. If response is as anticipated, the Board of Trustees plans to launch immediately into a second phase of building and expansion. As the student body demands it, the school expects to enter a four-year Bible college program. New departments will be added and old ones strengthened each year. The school hopes to acquire accept-
