

The President's Paragraphs

Dr. J. D. O'Donnell



A man who is writing a doctoral thesis on the Bible College movement in America sat in my office and questioned me about the purpose of Oklahoma Bible College recently. He said that it was his belief that the various Bible colleges were started to defend some particular view. He seemed to intimate that this was generally some narrow view. As he pressed me for the purpose of our college and the particular thing that we had to defend, I stopped him and told him that our great purpose was not defensive but offensive.

It is true that the College is set for the defense of the faith and there will come times that it will be very much on the defensive for the faith for which it stands. Even an army on the move in a great offensive is ever on the alert and ready for any countermove that would throw them on the defense of any position gained. But the main purpose of Oklahoma Bible College is not defensive.

One of the greatest offensive moves in Christendom was launched when our Lord Jesus Christ gave the great commission. Surely a defensive movement might have been expected by this small minority group.

But rather than settling down for defense, Christ launched this group offensively to take the world.

It is true that certain circumstances are continuing to call into existence schools such as OBC. Of the more than 2,000 schools begun in America by religious groups, probably less than 200 of these remain true to conservative doctrines. The major trends in theological circles are all toward a liberal theology which denies the authority of the Bible and the true deity of Christ. The New morality is bringing lower standards even in Christian circles. Materialism is encroaching so on people's minds that spiritual things are being relegated to a minor position.

Oklahoma Bible College is engaged in a positive program of training young people to meet the challenge of Christian commitment to every area of life. It is our purpose to train missionaries, ministers, Christian education directors, and laymen for positions in secular life. In each student who receives his education on our campus, we hope to instill a desire to carry out the great commission wherever his life is spent.

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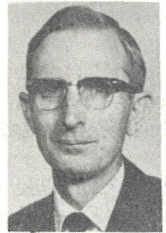
MISSIONARY CONFERENCE THEME EMPHASIZES NEED OF LABORERS

First Mission C.T.S. Groups Boost Library Fund

The young people's C.T.S. groups in First Mission Association set a goal of \$3,000 in a drive for funds for the Oklahoma Bible College library. These drives were climaxed in recent Sweetheart Banquets in the various quarterly meetings.

At the banquet held in Oilton at the grammar school on the night of February 11, the Central Quarterly Meeting young people found that they had raised over \$700. Two nights later at a banquet at Borden's Cafeteria in Tulsa, the young people of the Tulsa Area Quarterly Meeting climaxed their drive with the announcement they they had raised over \$2,000. Thus, over \$2,700 had been raised in the two quarterly meetings.

Kings and queens were chosen at both banquets. In the Central Quarterly Meeting banquet, the king and queen from the Allen

Church near Sapulpa was winner. In the Tulsa area the king and queen from the Airport Church, Tulsa, were crowned. Dr. J. D. O'Donnell, president of Oklahoma Bible College was speaker at both banquets.
