# CONTRACT FOR NEW DORM LET

The construction of the new men's dormitory on the Oklahoma Bible College campus is to begin by April 22 according to terms negotiated by the Board of Trustees with the W. D. Douglas Construction Company of Oklahoma City. The Douglas firm was awarded the contract in a meeting of the Board of Trustees Thursday, April 11. Douglas was the low of five bidders who presented their bids for opening April 10.

The three-story structure is the first building of three to be included in Phase A of the campus expansion plans. In addition to providing housing for menstudents, the dormitory will contain laundry facilities, a lounge area, maintenance quarters, and a counselor's apartment. The structure will be located just north of the road which crosses the campus. The excessive cost prohibited the construction of a lower level which the Board had hoped could be included in the building.

Each of the rooms, which are designed for two occupants, will contain a built-in closet, dresser, and desk. A large bathroom area will be located on each floor.

A decline in the monthly support of Oklahoma Bible College's general fund resulted in the decision of College officials to launch a special Spring Offering Drive in an effort to rally the many friends of the College to her aid.

This decline of financial support has resulted in a marked deficit in the income received at the College over the expenditures of the past two months. This is a reversal of the trend of last fall when monthly support increased, according to Business Manager Dan Farmer. A decline in giving generally occurs during the summer months, Mr. Farmer noted. This early drop in support for the current year has caused added concern to the Administration of the College.

# OBC Students To Give Play, Musical Program

A one-act play and a program of music will be presented by members of the Oklahoma Bible College student body at the opening session of the First Oklahoma Association, Friday night, May 17, at the Northwest Free Will Baptist Church in Oklahoma City.

The program, which will preceed the introductory message of the evening, is the College's Fine Arts Night for the current school year. In reaching the decision to present the program as a part of the opening session of the associational meeting, College officials and Associational officers were in agreement that the presentation would allow more Free Will Baptist people the opportunity to appreciate the efforts of the students. The presentations will involve members of the OBC choir and the speech class.

The program will begin at 7:30 p.m.

Mr. Farmer urged both churches and individuals to be faithful in their monthly support of the College and to be prompt in sending their designated gifts for the school. "Apparently many of the churches have suffered financially during the winter months; and in turn gifts to the College have been less than normal. Monthly support to the general fund is urgently needed if we are to meet the quotas set forth in the budget adopted for the College by the State Association. The monthly support must be increased during each of the coming months because of the additional expense involved in the current building program."

and a \$150,000 gift drive to be staged by the College within the near future. The sale of bonds continue; however, a report from the business office of the College shows that sales have been very slow thus far for the month of April. At this writing, a total of \$165,000 has been placed during the current investment program.
