The graduates, who were presented their Associate of Arts degrees by OBC President Dr. J. D. O'Donnell, hold the distinction of being the first class to complete their junior college degree on the present campus. They entered in the fall of 1966 while the existing buildings were in the final stages of construction.

Mr. Edwin Bowden, Booneville, Arkansas, was the recipient of the Outstanding Student Award which is presented annually by the faculty to the individual who, because of his "academic ability, leadership ability, attitude, and general achievement in the area of relationship in
