


The President's Paragraphs





Before me today are facts and figures on a large eastern university which has a faculty of 1300 and a staff of over 3000. The budget of this university is \$55 million. Student aid alone amounts to almost \$5 million. These figures dwarf the work being done at Oklahoma Bible College if material values are the only means of measurement which you use.

Presently, the Oklahoma Bible College is in a half a million dollars development program. Of this amount \$300,000 will come from a bond program now in progress. The remaining \$200,000 is to be raised by gifts from Free Will Baptists. Our annual budget will go beyond the \$100,000 mark for the first time this year.

Even these figures stagger our minds until we measure them against the need which exists for Christian education. A friend of the College recently said, 'I'm glad to support the College when I see what is happening to our young people in other colleges across the country." Oklahoma Bible College is training tomorrow's spiritual leadership. The greater our investment in this leadership, the greater

the dividends for tomorrow. At the present we cannot match the \$55 million per year investment that is being made in the institution mentioned above; however, the development program and budget of OBC are within our reach as we all work together.

An expanding education program should characterize Free Will Baptists for the next several years. A strong foundation in education will help insure the supply of adequate leadership in our expanding work. The present programs of expansion at OBC are steps toward the goal of ever reaching more souls for Christ. Join in this work with us.

DORM CONSTRUCTION CONTINUES

Construction on the new dormitory has continued at a good pace since the plumbers strike was settled in mid-August. This delay prevented the contractors from having a portion of the structure ready for occupancy by the opening of school. The men students are being housed temporarily in a large dwelling in southwest Oklahoma City.

FALL TERM SEES INCREASES IN **OBC ENROLLMENT AND STAFF**

For the third consecutive fall term, Oklahoma Bible College has experienced an increase in the enrollment of day students. However, different from the preceding years is the fact that the faculty and staff have also increased.

An unofficial report from the office of Registrar Eugene Workman shows that of the total enrollment of eighty-four, registration for the day classes numbers sixtynine students with fifteen students enrolled in the evening school division. Of the day students, sixty-one are carrying twelve or more credit hours. Last fall only fifty students were enrolled full time.

A breakdown of the total enrollment finds the freshmen class with fifty members, the sophomore class with twentytwo members, while twelve students are classified as special students. Represented on campus are the states of Ohio, Washington, Texas, Arkansas, Missouri, Kansas, California, Colorado and Oklahoma.

Additions to the OBC staff are the Reverend Lynn Wood who is serving as the full time Promotional Director for the College and the Reverend Ted Wilbanks who is teaching private music.

The Reverend Wood, who is currently serving as moderator of the Oklahoma

State Association of Free Will Baptists, will coordinate the efforts of the College in the promotion of all phases of the College work. During the next few months, a large portion of his time will be devoted to the promotion of Operation Participation, the \$200,000 gift campaign officially launched September 1 to raise the remainder of the construction costs for the dormitory now being built and the one scheduled to be completed by the fall of 1969. Mr. Wood will soon be developing an itinerary of speaking engagements at churches and associations in the midwestern states.

The new Promotional Director, who holds a B. S. degree from Grand Canyon College in Phoenix, Arizona, has just resigned a five-year tenure as pastor of the First Free Will Baptist Church of Ada.
