One minister in recent years gained notoriety for his article giving testimony why he quit the ministry.

Why this despondency in Christian service and why is there a drop in attendance at religious services? These are questions that need to be considered carefully. The answer many times has been that the church has a lack of relevance to human needs. For this reason many churches have changed the emphasis in their programs almost totally to social emphases. However, it is in these churches that it would appear that the greatest depletion among their ranks is taking place.

The great commission gives us the program of the church--to preach the Gospel. Everything else is secondary. Jesus, when He had fed the multitudes, healed the sick, and raised the dead, said to the disciples that they would do "greater works" than these. He was referring to their spiritual ministry. To win souls is the task of the church.

The relevance to human needs that is talked about so much can be found in the accomplishment of this goal. Men have spiritual needs just as they have always had them. In fact the fast pace of today's world and the increase in materialistic attitudes has cause an increase in the depth of man's spiritual needs.

The Free Will Baptist denomination should dedicate its efforts to filling these needs of man. No, we cannot close our eyes to the other needs, but we can place each need in proper perspective. As citizens of a great nation, believers can work toward social betterment of man. As a Christian the emphasis must remain first and foremost on winning souls.

The ministry of your Oklahoma Bible College is to train young people for various positions in life who will maintain that emphasis. If you believe this is the proper emphasis, give your full support to this work.

There is concern, not for the fear of sinking as could be true of a ship which flys the international distress signal, but for the decline in General Fund giving to the College. According to a report from the office of Business Manager Dan Farmer, \$5,890.00 is still needed to meet the \$104,100.00 budget to date. Gifts at this time are not meeting the expenditures. Cooperative and designated giving for the month of March totaled \$3,300.00; yet this is only 1/3 of the amount needed to operate the College each month.

Director of Promotions Lynn Wood is seeking to offset this decline in giving with an SOS (Support Our School) campaign appealing to all Sunday School members to make a contribution to OBC through their Sunday School on May 4. In a recent letter to pastors, Mr. Wood noted that this spring drive comes at a time when the general operating expenses have never been greater. In recent months, when the emphasis has been on raising funds for the building program, the general operational income to the College has declined. Each month there is a \$3, 100.00 payment to be made on the indebtedness of campus facilities. Utility expenses have (Continued Inside)
