Mr. Cook, who formerly pastored in Florida, will bring a series of three messages beginning Monday night, August 25, at 8:00 p.m. and continuing nightly through August 27. The services will be held in the College chapel.

The calendar of activities will commence officially Monday, August 25, at 2:00 p.m. when the dormitories will open for all students who will be residing on campus.

President To Share In Evangelism Meeting

OBC President Dr. J. D. O'Donnell will be a mong the special speakers scheduled to participate in the Conference on Church Evangelism which will be conducted September 15-17 at the First Free Will Baptist Church, 4001 Armour Avenue, Fort Smith, Arkansas.

The conference, which is expected to attract many Oklahoma pastors and lay workers, is being sponsored by the National Home Mission Department of Evangelism. Special services for the pastors' wives are also being arranged for all day Tuesday, September 16.

The orientation and registration periods for day students will be held on Tuesday and Wednesday, August 26 and 27. All new and returning students, whether residing on campus or off campus, will be expected to be present for all orientation and registration sessions. Night classes will begin on Monday, September 1; however, the first class sessions will be abbreviated to allow evening students to participate in the required Bible test. The altered schedule for the opening session of evening classes calls for the first class to meet at the regular 6:45 p.m. hour and conclude by 8:00 p.m. at which time the Bible test will

182 Decisions Reported

A total of 182 persons were won to the Lord through the Christian Service Department of OBC during the 1968-69 college year, according to a report by Director Eugene Workman. These decisions were witnessed by students as they engaged in various phases of the Christian Service Department as reported for the first eight months of the school year.

A total of 2,933 tracts were distributed by students during this period. They also delivered a total of 864 messages, lessons and songs while engaged in their Christian Service assignment or in regular worship

SEVEN CHURCHES SET PACE IN GIVING

Seven Oklahoma churches have consistently supported Oklahoma Bible College with an average monthly designated gift of one hundred or more dollars during the 1968-69 fiscal year, according to information released by Director of Promotions Lynn Wood. Mr. Wood stated that these monthly gifts included special giving to such campaigns as Operation Participation, Harvest Day and S.O.S.

Leading all churches in designated giving for the fiscal year just ended was First Church, Ada, which gave \$300.00 or more per month. The other six churches gave as follows:

\$200.00 to \$250.00 per month: Capitol Hill Church, Oklahoma City; First Church, Norman.

\$150.00 to \$175.00 per month: New Home Church, Tulsa.

\$125.00 to \$150.00 per month: First Church, Poteau.

\$100.00 to \$125.00 per month: First Church, Moore; Lewis Avenue, Tulsa.

These figures do not include Cooperative giving but simply give the totals for designated giving. Many churches within the state of Oklahoma choose only to support OBC through the Cooperative Plan.

Ten churches gave \$50.00 or more in monthly designated support of the Christian education ministry of OBC. They were as follows:
