These goals will be ours who labor with your support at the Oklahoma Bible College. Pray for us in our task. Øklahoma Bible College



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# BOARD ESTABLISHES SCHOLARSHIPS; SEEKS SUGGESTIONS FOR NEW NAME

In their first meeting of the new year January 12, the Oklahoma Bible College Board of Trustees approved tuition scholarships for academically qualified high

### HIGH SCHOOL ACADEMIC SCHOLARSHIPS APPROVED

After several months of discussion, tuition scholarships were approved for high school seniors who have maintained a 3.5 grade point average during the fouryears of their high school work and who are members in good standing of a Free Will Baptist church. Applications are available from the President's office.

### SUGGESTIONS SOUGHT

Feeling that those who faithfully support OBC might like an opportunity to propose a new name for the College, the Board voted to allow suggestions to be submitted to President J.D. O'Donnell before April 15, 1971. The proposed names will be screened by a committee of the Board before the meeting of the trustees scheduled for late April. The Board is expected to recommend another name since the use of the name approved in the 1970 meeting of the State Association was denied by Secretary of State John Rodgers. As was noted in an earlier issue, the Board of Trustees deemed that a name change for the College would be advantageous since the program of general education was being expanded.
