


By now you have probably noted the change of the name of the College. Your College is now Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College. The change of the name was brought up at the last state meeting, but the use of the name chosen was turned down by Oklahoma's Secretary of State. The new name that was approved by near unanimous action of the called session of the state association had already been reserved by the Secretary of State.

The reason for the change of the name is to give one that is more descriptive of the overall program of Christian education. The intent of the College for some time had been to present a program of general education rather than limiting it to a Bible College education.

Our purpose remains the same. It is to offer two years of training to young people in a Christian atmosphere in preparation for any profession they desire. Emphasis will still be given to those planning to enter the Christian ministries. There will be no diminishing of that program. A broader range of subjects will be offered in other fields.

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Our standards will remain the same. Believing that Christian youth are different, the College will always support high moral and ethical standards for its students. Emphasis will be given to Christian purity and example in all things.

How have we changed? The only thing that has changed in reality is the name. The name was changed to show that the College was a Christian institution offering courses in general education as well as religious education.

To those who have grown to love OBC, our sincere trust is that Hillsdale College will become just as revered. Hillsdale College will need your same prayer and financial support.

College Day Seeks To Break 'Tradition'

Realizing that the summer months traditionally have been low-revenue months, the administration of Oklahoma Bible College has designed College Day '71 as a means of breaking tradition to allow the College to finish the fiscal year without a budget deficit. At the same time, the administration desires to increase student recruitment efforts which also will involve additional finances.

For the first time, College Day actually covers a period of four months, May through August. However, the drive will be launched initially on Sunday, May 2. On this day, the friends of Christian education are asked to give at least \$5.00 through their church and pledge to give a like amount during the months of June, July, and August. This would be a total gift of \$20.00 from each of the College's many friends and would provide insurance against inadequate funds during the summer months.

Business Manager Dan Farmer reports an encouraging financial picture during the first three months of this year. This is why the administration believes it is possible with the aid of individuals and (Continued Inside) Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, the newly-chosen name for Oklahoma Bible College, rings with historical significance for those who are familiar with Free Will Baptist history. From a field of twenty-seven suggestions, the Board of Trustees selected and recommended the name to the Oklahoma State Association in a special-called session April 17. The use of the name will be effective with the new fiscal year July 1, 1971.

According to associational minutes which have been reprinted, the first Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College was chartered in 1855 in Hillsdale, Michigan. The college originally had been founded in 1847 but under another name and in another location. Free Will Baptists lost this college and other educational institutions in the ill-fated merger of 1911. There still remains a Hillsdale College in Hillsdale, Michigan, but it is not connected with the Free Will Baptists denomination.

The prime reason for changing the name of the College was to remove the misconception held by many prospective students that the College's program of education is designed only for those entering full-time Christian vocations. This conception is unfounded as a program of general education has been available since the College moved to its permanent campus.
