No. 3: Whereas, the National Association has a training program known as the Christian Workers Institute, We resolve that our State Association shall sponser an institute, all details to be worked out through the State League Committee and State Executive Board.

No. 4: Be it resolved, that we have a historian, who shall collect and compile historical record of the Free Will Baptist of the State of Oklahoma.

No. 5: Be it resolved, that we give this church a standing vote of thanks for their good care and hospitality shown to this State Association Finance. We have a report of \$105.00 which has been received from the different associations, \$5 from the women's auxiliary, and \$5 from the league, a total of \$115.

Obituary Committee: We, your committee, wish to report that God in his infinite wisdom has called from our midst the following: First

Report of the Oklahoma Superanuation Board: The board met Oct. 26, 1944, and organized. Eld. Harry Staires elected chairman, Eld. F. A. McCage elected clerk and treasurer. Report of the Committee on Music: We, your Committee on Music recommend that a choir director be appointed by the moderator at each session of the association, who will have charge of the singing in each service. We also recommend that our young people be encouraged to render special numbers—duets, solos, or quartetts in our church services, as we feel that the music program of our church is essential

to promoting the cause of Christ.

We further recommend that singing of the old time hymns be a part of each service, and encourage congregational singing; and, if possible, select a choir director who is a Christian and a member of our denomination.

Report of State Sunday School Superintendent: I beg leave to report. The first half of the year, because of ill health, I was not permitted to go and do the work I wanted to do. My health being improved, I visited some Sunday schools in different associations. Seeing the work was too great under conditions of tire and gas rationing, I confined my work to the First Mission Association. The Sunday schools work is a great work and we need a state Sunday school superintendent. The Sunday schools I visited have gained in attendance and I feel the Lord has blessed my efforts in this great work.

Balance in treasury...

Rules and By-Laws Governing the State Executive Board This board shall be composed of five members to serve for five consecutive years, one member to retire at each sitting of the annual session of the State Association.

The board has power to act in behalf of the State Association during adjourned sessions from annual meeting to another; and shall have power to elect such officers as may be deemed necessary for its own government, or any other officers needed to carry out the plans of the State Program.

The chairman of the board shall preside over all meetings of the board, said meetings to be called by the clerk of the board. No meeting will be legal unless board members are notified in advance.

The board shall have power to fill all vacancies occurring in its

own body. The state executive board shall have power to collect funds for any project for the best interest of the state work. Also to employ and superintend work now in progress.

The board shall not have the power of conveyance of any real estate, or personal property held in trust by the state; unless authorized by the State Association at its regular annual session.

All expenses incurred by the officers of the State Association shall be submitted and passed on by the executive board before claim

is paid. The executive board shall keep a written record of all work done, money raised, meetings held, and make a full report at the ensuing session of State Association.

The executive board shall receive; held in trust, supervise, control and convey any property entrusted to said association; said property must not be diverted to any other purpose, other than the one for which it was donated.

The chairman and the clerk of the executive board shall sign all deeds, bonds, notes, mortgages, and any other legal papers for which the State Association may be held responsible.

Any member of the executive board who absents himself three times in succession from meetings of this body shall be dropped from the board and his place filled by electing another.

No meeting of the board shall be legal unless there is at least three members present, and all transactions of the board shall be by

the majority vote of all members present.

No member of the executive board shall delegate authority for any other member to cast his vote for him for anything.

Rules Governing the Free Will Baptist State Orphange

Any child who is in need of a home may be admitted to the or-

phanage, if accepted by property authority.

The Orphanage Committees of the various associations will make investigation, and if the applicant is found in need of a home, they shall be recommended to the superintendent, who shall present the case to the state board. Their decision shall settle the matter.

All applicants must be examined by the physician in charge. If they are suffering from any physical or mental ailment, steps should be taken to correct the trouble before they are permitted to enter the

Children accepted shall become wards of the home, and will remain as such until they can be placed in a position to take care of themselves.

Children will not be permitted to leave the premises to visit friends or relatives; to remain overnight or to spend the week-end.

No child shall receive gifts from any source other than through the superintendent. All gifts must be made to the home, to insure that all share alike.

No parent of children adopted shall be eligible for employment

at the orphanage.

Purebred stock will be kept on the farm and each boy or girl that is eligible for 4-H or F. F. A. farm programs shall be given a project. The purchasing and selling of stock and equipment must be done through the Executive Board after being recommended by the super-

intendent.

A superintendent will be selected by the state board. He will supervise the home and farm and purchase food, clothing and other supplies necessary to keep the home in operation. He must keep a daily record of all receipts and expenditures (such as donations made to the home or produce sold from the farm) and make his report to the clerk of the Executive Board not later than the 10th of each month.
