#### **BY-LAWS OF MINISTER'S CONFERENCE**

#### Article 1

The clerk or asistant clerk, or in their absence the senior minister in years, shall call the ministers into conference. If a quorum is present the President or in his absence the Vice president shall moderate the meeting. If neither of these are present, the senior minister in years shall be in charge.

#### Article 2

It shall be the duty of the clerk to enroll the ministers of the conference. Ministers shall present themselves with proper evidence of their rights to seats therein, and those enrolled by the clerk shall compose the conference. In case of questionable representation the case under question shall be referred to the Credential Committee.

#### Article 3

It shall be the duty of each minister belonging to this conference, to be active in pastoral or evangelistic services (disabled

and retired ministers excepted). Any minister belonging to this conference shall report in each session in person or by letter, and failing to do so for two successive sessions shall be subject to discipline.

#### Article 4

Each conference shall be opened by reading a portion of God's word and prayer, and each session shall be closed with prayer.

#### Article 5

By a two-thirds vote of the members present a ruling of the President may be overruled.

#### Article 6

This conference shall sit with open doors, except when it shall go into a committee as a whole.

#### Article 7

No member shall absent himself from the conference during its meeting without permission from the President.

#### Article 8

No person shall be allowed to nominate more than one member of a committee, unless person nominated is not elected.

#### Article 9

The President shall not allow discussions when not carried on in a Christian Spirit, or when he thinks it will cause discord. .

#### Article 10

Anyone desiring to speak shall rise and address the President by the appelation, "Brother President," but shall not speak further until recognized.

#### Article 11

No member of this conference shall be allowed to speak more than five minutes, nor twice on the same subject without permission from the President.

#### Article 12

These By-Laws may be altered or amended at any regular or adjourned session of this conference by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

### CONSTITUTION OF MINISTER'S CONFERENCE

#### Article 1

This Minister's Conference shall be called The Oklahoma State Free Will Baptist Minister's Conference, and shall be composed of Ordained Free Will Baptist Ministers who are regular members of some Orthodox Free Will Baptist church in the State of Oklahoma.

#### Article 2

The officers of this conference shall be President, Vice-President, Clerk, Asst. Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be elected annually.

#### Article 3

This conference shall have the power to discipline its members.

#### Article 4

Every ordained minister in the State of Oklahoma should be a member of this conference and is required to report in each session in person or by letter. Every member shall be required to carry a card of identification, and recommendation from this conference, and said card to be issued annually.

#### Article 5

This conference shall meet Semi-Annually.

#### Article 6

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any regular session.

#### ARTICLES OF FAITH OF STATE ASSSOCIATION

#### Articles Of Faith Of State Association

- 1. THE BIBLE—The Scriptures of the Old and New Testament were given by the inspiration of God, and are our infallible rule of faith and practice.
- 2. GOD—There is one living and true God, revealed in nature as the Creator, Preserver and Righteous Governor of the Universe, and in the Scriptures as the Father, Son and Holy Ghost, yet as one God, infinitely wise and good, whom all intelligent creatures are supremely to love, adore and obey.
- 3. CHRIST Christ is God manifest in the flesh: in His divine nature truly God, in His human nature truly man. The mediator between God and man, once crucified. He is now risen and glorified is our ever-present Saviour and Lord.

- 4. THE HOLY SPIRIT The Scriptures assigns to the Holy Spirit all the attributes of God. He is the Reprover, Comforter, Guide and Sanctifier of men.
- 5. THE GOVERNMENT OF GOD—God exercises a wise and benevolent providence over all beings and all things by maintaining the constitution and laws of nature. He also performs special acts of Grace, not otherwise provided for as highest welfare of man requires.
- 6. THE SINFULNESS OF MAN—Man was created innocent, but by disobedience fell into a state of sin and condemnation. His posterity, therefore, inherited a fallen nature of such tendencies that all who come to years of accountability, sin and become guilty before God.
- 7. THE WORK OF CHRIST—The Son of God, by His incarnation, life, sufferings, death, and resurrection effected for all a redemption from sin that is full and free and is the ground of salvation by faith.
- 8. THE TERMS OF SALVATION The conditions of salvation are: 1. Repentance or sincere sorrow for sin and the hearty renuciation of it. 2. Faith or the unreserved committal of one's self to Christ as Saviour and Lord, with purpose to love and obey Him in all things. In the exercise of saving faith the soul is renewed by the Holy Spirit; freed from the dominion of sin and becomes a child of God. 3. Continuance in faith and obedience until death.
- 9. ELECTION—God determined from the beginning to save all who should comply with the conditions of salvation. Hence by faith in Christ, men become His elect.
- 10. FREEDOM OF WILL—The Human wall is free and self controlled, having power to yield to the influence of the truth and the Spirit and live, or to resist them and perish.
- 11. SALVATION FREE—God desires the salvation of all, the Gospel invites all, the Holy Spirit strives with all, and whosoever will may come and take of the water of Life freely.
- 12. PERSEVERANCE—All believers in Christ, who through grace persevere in holiness to the end of life, have the promise of eternal salvation.
- 13. GOSPEL ORDINANCE—Baptism, or the immersion of believers in water, and the Lord's Supper, are ordinances to be

perpetuated under the Gospel; Feet Washing, an ordinance teaching humility, of universal obligation, and to be administered to all true believers.

- 14. TITHING—God commanded tithes and offerings in the Old Testament: Jesus Christ endorsed it in the Gospel (Matt. 23:23) and the Apostle Paul said, "Upon the first day of the week let every one of you lay by him in store as God hath prospered him." I Cor. 16:2.
- 15. THE CHRISTIAN SABBATH—The divine law requires that one day in seven be set apart from secular employment and amusements for rest, worship, holy works and activities, and for personal communion with God.
- 16. RESURRECTION, JUDGMENT AND FINAL RETRIBUTION—The Scriptures teach the resurrection of all men at the last day. They that have done good will come forth to the resurrection of life, and they that have done evil unto the resurrection of damnation: then the wicked shall "go-away into eternal punishment but the righteous into eternal life."

#### RULES OF ORDER

- 1. At every sitting of the Association, business shall be opened and concluded by prayer by the Moderator or whomsoever he may request.
- 2. Ministers and deacons present are invited to seats, allowed to take part in debates on all subjects, and to vote.
- 3. Those who speak shall rise and address the Moderator. Personal reflections shall be avoided in all debates.
  - 4. No motion may be discussed until made and seconded.
- 5. When a motion has been made and seconded, and a member opposes its discussion, the Moderator shall put the question, "Shall it be discussed?" If negative, the question shall not be discused.
- 6. If any proposition or motion under debate contains two or more points, it shall be divided at the request of any member, and the vote taken separately.
  - 7. Motions made and lost shall not be recorded.
- 8. No one shall speak more than twice on the same subject without special leave of the Moderator.
- 9. All questions shall be decided by a majority vote of all Members present.

#### BY LAWS OF STATE ASSOCIATION

1. The clerk or assistant clerk, or in their absence, the senior minister in years shall call the Association into conference, and if a quorum is present the moderator, or in his absence, the assistant moderator shall take charge; and if neither of them is present the senior minister in years shall act as Moderator.

2. It shall be the duty of the clerk to enroll the delegates to the Association, who shall present themselves with proper evidence of their rights to seats therein, and those enrolled by the clerk

shall compose the Association.

- 3. It shall be the duty of every District belonging to this Association to send a letter to every annual session of this Association, reporting in the same, spiritual condition, benevolent work, and its statistics. Any District belonging to this Association, which shall fail to report itself for two successive sessions, may be dismissed from the Association by a two thirds vote of all members present.
- 4. Each meeting shall be opened by reading a portion of the Bible and with prayer, and shall be closed with prayer.
- 5. By a two-thirds vote of all members present, a ruling of the moderator can be overruled.
- 6. This Association may correspond by messenger or otherwise with other religious bodies.
- 7. This Association shall sit with open doors except when it shall go into a committee of the whole.
- 8. Any person not a member of this Association may be allowed to take part in its discussions by obtaining permission from the moderator.
- 9. It shall be the duty of all of the Association to be present at the time appointed for each meeting, and anyone wishing to retire shall first obtain leave of the moderator.
- 10. No person shall be allowed to nominate more than one member of any committee, provided the person nominated be elected.
- 11. The moderator shall not allow discussions when not carried on in a Christian spirit or when he thinks it will cause discord or division.
- 12. Anyone desiring to speak shall rise to his feet and address the moderator by the appelation, "Brother Moderator," but shall not speak further until recognized by the moderator.
  - 13. No member of this association shall be allowed to speak

more than ten minutes nor twice on the same subject without permission from the moderator.

14. These By-Laws may be altered or amended at any regular or adjourned session of this Association by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

#### CONSTITUTION OF STATE ASSOCIATION

PERAMBLE: From long experience, we the members of the Free Will Baptist denominations, being regularly baptised upon a profession of our faith in Jesus Christ, and realizing the necessity of a bond of union and fellowship among us as a church: and to preserve and maintain correspondence and co-ordination with us, do therefore ordain this Constitution for our better denominational government.

#### Article I

Name: This organization shall be known as the OKLA-HOMA STATE ASSOCIATION OF FREE WILL BAPTIST.

#### Article II

PURPOSE: the object and purpose of this organization shall be to unify the work of the various bodies composing this State Association, and to devise and execute measures for the extension of the Kingdom of God in connection with the various bodies in the Association, or that may hereafter be represented therein.

#### Article III

REPRESENTATION: Section 1: This Association shall be composed of all ordained ministers and deacons with membership in some local church which is a member of a district Association with membership in the State Association.

Secton 2: Each District Association shall be entitled to a number of elected delegates equal with the number of churches composing said Association. These delegates may be recommended by the local churches and shall be endorsed by their district association. Five delegates from the League, Women's Auxiliary, and Master's Men.

#### Article IV

FINANCE: Each elected delegate shall be represented with a fee of Five dollars.

#### Article V

DISCIPLINE: This State Association shall have the right to settle any question of discipline, doctrine or practices that may properly come before it from any of the bodies composing said organization, furthermore if there be any question of discipline, doctrine or practices on the part of a subordinate association, delegates of that association shall not be seated until these questions have been settled to the satisfaction of the Credential Committee.

Section 2: Decisions of the Credential Committee may be appealed. All appeals coming before the State Association when sitting in a Committee as a whole. (2) by a Special committee whose report shall be voted on without discussion.

#### Article VI

OFFICERS: The officers of the State Association shall consist of a Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk and Assistant Clerk, Parliamentarian, and an Executive Secretary, each of whom shall be elected at the close of each regular session, except the Executive Secretary, who shall be elected every two years.

Section 2: Committees, as necessary, shall be appointed by the moderator, unless otherwise provided for, and shall hold office until their work is completed, or until their successors are elected.

#### Article VII

BOARDS: All standing boards shall be composed of five members who shall serve terms of 5, 4, 3, 2, 1 years, exclusive of the College Board of Trustees. The General Board shall be composed of one member from each subordinate association and the chairman of each standing board and the state officers. The College Board of Trustees shall be composed of seven members who shall serve terms of 5, 4, 3, 2, 1 and 1 years. The standing boards shall include the Executive Board, Mission Board, College Board of Trustees, Superannuation Board, Sunday School Board, League Board and Church Loan Extension Service Board. The Coordinating Board shall be composed of the Executive Secretary and the chairman from each standing board.

#### Article VIII

DUTIES AND RULES OF STANDING BOARDS: 1 Executive Board. To this board is delegated the power to act in behalf of and for the State Association from one meeting to an-

other for said Association, and shall have power and authority to select such officers as might be deemed best for its own government and to carry out the plans and undertakings of the State Association. The board shall have power to fill vacancies that may occur in its own body. To this Executive Board is further designated power to collect funds and employ superintend such work for the field as may seem best, and the means on hand may warrant. They shall deliver Oil and Gas leases upon any real property owned by the association, for such bonuses and rentals as in the discretion of the board.

This Executive Board shall keep a record of all work done, money raised, meetings held, and make a full and complete report to the regular meeting of the association and shall further receive, hold, manage, use, control, and convey any property entrusted to said State Association.

. The chairman and secretary of said Executive Board shall sign all deeds, bonds and notes, etc., and any other papers by which the State Association is to become legally responsible, exclusive of those documents pertaining to Oklahoma Free Will Baptist Bible College which shall be signed by the College Board of Trustees.

The board shall have the power to call the association in conference by notifying each subordinate association at least ten (10) days prior to conference.

- 2. General Board: It shall be the duty of this board to meet with the executive board one day preceding the State Association to hear reports of the standing boards and to make recommendations to the state associations. They also serve as credential committee.
- 3. Mission Board: It shall be the duty of this board to work in connection with the national foreign and home mission boards, and to promote an active missionary program in and for the state of Oklahoma. They shall elect a treasurer who shall handle all mission money.

It will also be their responsibility to investigate and assist, if necessary any new church. This board should thoroughly investigate the ability of a church to support an organization before asstance is pledged.

- 4. College Board of Trustees: It shall be the duty of this board to supervise and promote the Oklahoma Free Will Baptist Bible College.
- 5. League Board. It shall be the duty of the state league board to plan and assist in every way possible the League work throughout the state. It will also be their responsibility to promote and active league work in each subordinate association and to encourage League Rallies.
- 6. Sunday School Board. Their duties shall include the planning and operation of the State Sunday School Conventions, and the encouragement of the organization of district conventions. They may carry through any plans they think wise to actively promote Sunday school work in the state, and publishing any literature deemed advisable.
- 7. Superannuation Board. This board working in cooperation with the National superannuation board and district boards, shall provide a definite program of support for ministers.
- 8. Co-ordinating Board: This board shall be charged with the responsibility of co-ordinating and promoting the work of the other standing boards, and shall also act as Budget Committee. The Executive Secretary shall serve as chairman and the board shall meet at his discretion.
- 10. Working agreement between the state association and the Executive Secretary of the State Association: That the Executive Secretary be paid a set salary and mileage and a two week paid vacation and all money received by him for speaking engagements, revivals and etc., shall be turned in by him to the Executive Office for the support of this office. He shall be ex-office member of all standing boards.

#### Article IX

This constitution may be amended or altered at any regular session of the State Association by a two-thirds vote of members present, provided proposed amendment or alteration be presented in writing to the body one day in advance.

#### Article X

Elected delegates to State Association shall be retained as standing delegates for special called meetings.

#### MISSION BOARD REPORT

The Mission Board submits the following report of its activities for the year 1961-1962.

We have held thirteen meetings during the year and traveled a total of 12,481 miles during the period from September, 1961, to June, 1962. The members of the Board have been very co-operative in giving their time to the work necessary to promote the activities of the Board. We praise the Lord for the opportunities and the blessings that have been afforded us.

We have sponsored the organization of three new churches in the past year. These include El Reno, Bartlesville and Altus.

The El Reno church was organized in December 14, 1961, with 15 charter members. The Board worked with the First Oklahoma Association Mission Board in this organization and the new church known as the First Free Will Baptist Church of El Reno, united with that association. Rev. Orville Carpenter of Norman, Oklahoma, was called as the first pastor. He has served as the mission worker prior to the organization. The church purchased property that formerly was owned by another denomination, which is located at the corner of London and Williams Streets in El Reno. Funds contributed through the New Church club were used to help purchase the property.

The Bartlesville Mission was organized on February 22, 1962. The organization climaxed some 16 months of effort by the Board, which first began in September, 1960, under the direction of Rev. Harry Beatty. Bro. Beatty left the work to go to Missouri as State Promotional Secretary, in September, 1961. No other full time worker was employed from this time until the organization. The church was organized with 25 charter members and voted to petition the Arkansas Valley Association for membership. Rev. Arnold J. Fannings was elected as the first pastor.

The First Free Will Baptist Church of Altus was organized on August 24, 1962, with 20 charter members. The organization was the result of an effort began on April 1, 1962, by Rev. Major Followwill, who was employed by the Board to serve as a mission worker. Services were first held in the IOOF Lodge Hall and izational meeting was held during the week of August 19-24, 1962, with Bro. Followwill as the speaker. The Church elected

Bro. Followwill as the speaker. The church elected Bro. Followwill as the first pastor and voted to petition the Union Association for membership.

On August 3, 1962, the Board voted to employ Rev. Allen Moore as a full time mission worker to work in Ponca City. Bro. Moore moved to Ponce City the last week in August and first services were held on September 3, 1962. The Board is hoping to organize a new Free Will Baptist Church there in the near future.

#### MISSION BOARD

The effort of the Board for 1962-1963 will be centered around Ponca City, Woodward, Anadarko and Hugo. We hope to see new organizations, in these towns and cities as well as in other places where the opportunity might arise.

Mission giving in Oklahoma took another step upward in 1961-1962, with a total of \$12,771.94 given to Foreign Missions and a total of \$7,090.24 given to National Home Missions. State Mission giving totaled \$5,563.00 for the year. This is a grand total of \$25,425.18. The Board wishes to thank all the churches and individuals in the State who have given to make this amount possible. We are thankful for the work of the missionaries representing our National Boards and have been happy to work in cooperation with them to work out itinerate services in State churches.

We praise the Lord also for the increase in Missionary Conferences being held throughout the State which is a strong indication of an increased missionary vision and zeal. We stand ready to assist in any way possible in conducting these missionary conferences held in any church or association in the State.

A special project adopted by the board in July of this year was the "Pick-up for Palmer" fund which was a goal of \$3,000.00 was set to be raised by the time of the State meeting in October The moneys raised will be be channelled through the Foreign Mission Department to be used in the purchase of a vehicle for the Lonnie Palmer family now on duty in the Ivory Coast section of Africa. We hope to be able to sponsor more of these special projects in the future in order to stimulate giving to the missionary program.

We again wish to express our appreciation to all the churches and individuals who gave special offerings during the State Mission month program last December. These funds were used to support mission workers who go under the direction and employment of the Board. We urge each church to consider this

opportunity again this year and receive an offering for State Missions some time during the month of December. Sunday, December 23, 1962, was designated as State Mission Sunday.

We are asking for eight percent of the Cooperative Budget

#### AN INTRODUCTION TO OKLAHOMA BIBLE COLLEGE

LOCATION— In Metropolitan Oklahoma City area affording the student ample employment opportunity. As well as cultural advantages. In the heart of the Free Will Baptist work there is a tremendous avenue of Christian service.

HISTORY—Voted into existence by the Oklahoma State Association in 1958 while in session at Ada, Oklahoma. Our people have accepted the college and are enthuastic about its program.

GOVERNING POLICY—A seven man board of trustees with two elected annually while the state meeting is in session, comprise the ruling body. A president operates the school under the board.

DOCTRINE—Free Will Baptist as it is owned and operated by the State Association of Free Will Baptists. As to fundamental principles, the college unreservedly endorses the fundamental position.

PURPOSE—"To know Him and make Him known"....
OBC has one basic purpose and that is to help its students know
God's will and serve it.

PROGRAM—We operate a basic two year curriculum at the present with departments in English, Bible, Social Science, Science, Pastoral Training, Missions, Christian Education, and History. We offer an Associate of Arts Degree.

FACULTY—In our resident school our faculty is composed of men with accredited degrees in their field. As to administration procedures, we comply with state and regional criterion to date. All of our faculty members have been Free Will Beptist ministers.

FEES—These are kept low, the national figure is \$22.00 per semester hour and OBC operates at \$2.00 per hour. Plus scholarships are available. It is our stated policy that none should be denied education because of financial problems.

SUPPORT—The students fees account for approximately 20 percent of the income. Thus the local church group accounts for 80 percent. We must depend on you for our support. The State Cooperative program contributes 13 percent annually. This provides a basic undergirding of the educational ministry of OBC.

CALENDAR—We operate on a 16-18 week semester with the fall semester beginning in September and the spring semester beginning in January and ending in May. The class periods are 50 minutes in length.

FUTURE PLANS—At the present they are many. 1. To develop fully our cirriculum. 2. Gain state recognition. 3. Build on the campus property in Moore, as God leads OBC will follow in this new area of service.

#### TEMPERANCE COMMITTEE

We your committee on temperance wish to present the following report. In noting the ever increasing scenes of intemperance among church people of moral character, in the appearance of dress, habits, time, activities and service; we recommend the following items be taught, preached and practiced as well as be dealt with to a greater degree by our local churches and pastors in the receiving of members and the various fields of service or Auxiliaries within our church. In as much as we are taught to let our lights so shine before men that they might see our good works and glorify our Father which is in Heaven, we recommend the following:

No. 1. The temperance use of all things good and total abstinence from all things hamful.

No. 2. That our churches cooperate with the Sooner Alcoholic and Narcotic Education Inc.

No. 3. The total abstinence from the use of alcoholic beverages.

- No. 4. That our state body recognize the standard which has been passed by the National Convention of Free Will Baptists. That we go on record as being opposed to the use of tobacco in any form among Christians everywhere.
- No. 5. That a more modest dress be observed by both men and women.
- No. 6. A more temperate use be made of television, in view of a greater need for home and family devotion with encouragement for more family altars.
- No. 7. That we be more temperate in our outside activities, especially during spare time and more so, the appointed time of worship. That we may live, walk and be led in and by the Holy Spirit, and not just to satisfy the use of the flesh. That we may devote more earnest time to our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. In as much as Christians should be lovers of God more than lovers of pleasure.
- No. 8. That a study of Narcotic education be referred to the local associations, and that each association be encouraged to have one service during their youth encampment on the harmful effects of Narcotics. We further recommend that a qualified speaker with complete information of facts, figures and results be contacted to speak at each district and state youth encampment on this subject.

No. 9. That our people set the example of a temperate use of the Automobile, in observing all traffic regulations, especially to the speeding on the highways and courtesy in our Cities.
