BY-LAWS OF MINISTER'S CONFERENCE

Article 1

The clerk or asistant clerk, or in their absence the senior minister in years, shall call the ministers into conference. quorum is present the President or in his absence the Vice president shall moderate the meeting. If neither of these are present. the senior minister in years shall be in charge.

Article 2

It shall be the duty of the clerk to enroll the ministers of the conference. Ministers shall present themselves with proper evidence of their rights to seats therein, and those enrolled by the clerk shall compose the conference. In case of questionable representation the case under question shall be referred to the Credential Committee.

Article 3

It shall be the duty of each minister belonging to this conference, to be active in pastoral or evangelistic services (disabled and retired ministers excepted). Any minister belonging to this conference shall report in each session in person or by letter, and failing to do so for two successive sessions shall be subject to discipline.

Article 4

Each conference shall be opened by reading a portion of God's word and prayer, and each session shall be closed with prayer.

Article 5

By a two-thirds vote of the members present a ruling of the President may be overruled.

Article 6

This conference shall sit with open doors, except when it shall go into a committee as a whole.

Article 7

No member shall absent himself from the conference during its meeting without permission from the President.

Article 8

No person shall be allowed to nominate more than one member of a committee, unless person nominated is not elected.

Article 9

The President shall not allow discussions when not carried on in a Christian Spirit, or when he thinks it will cause discord.

Article 10

Anyone desiring to speak shall rise and address the President by the appelation, "Brother Presdent," but shall not speak further until recognized.

Article 11

No member of this conference shall be allowed to speak more than five minutes, nor twice on the same subject without permission from the President.

Article 12

These By-Laws may be altered or amended at any regular or adjourned session of this conference by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

CONSTITUTION OF MINISTER'S CONFERENCE

Article 1

This Minister's Conference shall be called The Oklahoma State Free Will Baptist Minister's Conference, and shall be composed of Ordained Free Will Baptist Ministers who are regular members of some Orthodox Free Will Baptist church in the State of Oklahoma.

Article 2

The officers of this conference shall be President, Vice-President, Clerk, Asst. Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be elected annually.

Article 3

This conference shall have the power to discipline its members.

Article 4

Every ordained minister in the State of Oklahoma should be a member of this conference and is required to report in each session in person or by letter. Every member shall be required to carry a card of identification, and recommendation from this conference, and said card to be issued annually.

Article 5

This conference shall meet Semi-Annually.

Article 6

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any regular session.

ARTICLES OF FAITH OF STATE ASSSOCIATION

Articles Of Faith Of State Association

- 1. THE BIBLE—The Scriptures of the Old and New Testament were given by the inspiration of God, and are our infallible rule of faith and practice.
- 2. GOD—There is one living and true God, revealed in nature as the Creator, Preserver and Righteous Governor of the Universe, and in the Scriptures as the Father, Son and Holy Ghost, yet as one God, infinitely wise and good, whom all intelligent creatures are supremely to love, adore and obey.
- 3. CHRIST Christ is God manifest in the flesh: in His divine nature truly God, in His human nature truly man. The mediator between God and man, once crucified. He is now risen and glorified is our ever-present Saviour and Lord.

- 4. THE HOLY SPIRIT The Scriptures assigns to the Holy Spirit all the attributes of God. He is the Reprover, Comforter, Guide and Sanctifier of men.
- 5. THE GOVERNMENT OF GOD—God exercises a wise and benevolent providence over all beings and all things by maintaining the constitution and laws of nature. He also performs special acts of Grace, not otherwise provided for as highest welfare of man requires.
- 6. THE SINFULNESS OF MAN—Man was created innocent, but by disobedience fell into a state of sin and condemnation. His posterity, therefore, inherited a fallen nature of such tendencies that all who come to years of accountability, sin and become guilty before God.
- 7. THE WORK OF CHRIST—The Son of God, by His incarnation, life, sufferings, death, and resurrection effected for all a redemption from sin that is full and free and is the ground of salvation by faith.
- 8. THE TERMS OF SALVATION The conditions of salvation are: 1. Repentance or sincere sorrow for sin and the hearty renuciation of it. 2. Faith or the unreserved committal of one's self to Christ as Saviour and Lord, with purpose to love and obey Him in all things. In the exercise of saving faith the soul is renewed by the Holy Spirit; freed from the dominion of sin and becomes a child of God. 3. Continuance in faith and obedience until death.
- 9. ELECTION—God determined from the beginning to save all who should comply with the conditions of salvation. Hence by faith in Christ, men become His elect.
- 10. FREEDOM OF WILL—The Human wall is free and self controlled, having power to yield to the influence of the truth and the Spirit and live, or to resist them and perish.
- 11. SALVATION FREE—God desires the salvation of all, the Gospel invites all, the Holy Spirit strives with all, and whosoever will may come and take of the water of Life freely.
- 12. PERSEVERANCE—All believers in Christ, who through grace persevere in holiness to the end of life, have the promise of eternal salvation.
- 13. GOSPEL ORDINANCE—Baptism, or the immersion of believers in water, and the Lord's Supper, are ordinances to be

perpetuated under the Gospel; Feet Washing, an ordinance teaching humility, of universal obligation, and to be administered to all true believers.

- 14. TITHING—God commanded tithes and offerings in the Old Testament: Jesus Christ endorsed it in the Gospel (Matt. 23:23) and the Apostle Paul said, "Upon the first day of the week let every one of you lay by him in store as God hath prospered him." I Cor. 16:2.
- 15. THE CHRISTIAN SABBATH—The divine law requires that one day in seven be set apart from secular employment and amusements for rest, worship, holy works and activities, and for personal communion with God.
- 16. RESURRECTION, JUDGMENT AND FINAL RETRIBUTION—The Scriptures teach the resurrection of all men at the last day. They that have done good will come forth to the resurrection of life, and they that have done evil unto the resurrection of damnation: then the wicked shall "go-away into eternal punishment but the righteous into eternal life."

RULES OF ORDER

- 1. At every sitting of the Association, business shall be opened and concluded by prayer by the Moderator or whomsoever he may request.
- 2. Ministers and deacons present are invited to seats, allowed to take part in debates on all subjects, and to vote.
- 3. Those who speak shall rise and address the Moderator. Personal reflections shall be avoided in all debates.
 - 4. No motion may be discussed until made and seconded. .
- 5. When a motion has been made and seconded, and a member opposes its discussion, the Moderator shall put the question, "Shall it be discussed?" If negative, the question shall not be discussed.
- 6. If any proposition or motion under debate contains two or more points, it shall be divided at the request of any member, and the vote taken separately.
 - 7. Motions made and lost shall not be recorded.
- 8. No one shall speak more than twice on the same subject without special leave of the Moderator.
- 9. All questions shall be decided by a majority vote of all Members present.

BY LAWS OF STATE ASSOCIATION

1. The clerk or assistant clerk, or in their absence, the senior minister in years shall call the Association into conference, and if a quorum is present the moderator, or in his absence, the assistant moderator shall take charge; and if neither of them is present the senior minister in years shall act as Moderator.

2. It shall be the duty of the clerk to enroll the delegates to the Association, who shall present themselves with proper evidence of their rights to seats therein, and those enrolled by the clerk

shall compose the Association.

- 3. It shall be the duty of every District belonging to this Association to send a letter to every annual session of this Association, reporting in the same, spiritual condition, benevolent work, and its statistics. Any District belonging to this Association, which shall fail to report itself for two successive sessions, may be dismissed from the Association by a two thirds vote of all members present.
- 4. Each meeting shall be opened by reading a portion of the Bible and with prayer, and shall be closed with prayer.
- 5. By a two-thirds vote of all members present, a ruling of the moderator can be overruled.
- 6. This Association may correspond by messenger or otherwise with other religious bodies.
- 7. This Association shall sit with open doors except when it shall go into a committee of the whole.
- 8. Any person not a member of this Association may be allowed to take part in its discussions by obtaining permission from the moderator.
- 9. It shall be the duty of all of the Association to be present at the time appointed for each meeting, and anyone wishing to retire shall first obtain leave of the moderator.
- 10. No person shall be allowed to nominate more than one member of any committee, provided the person nominated be elected.
- 11. The moderator shall not allow discussions when not carried on in a Christian spirit or when he thinks it will cause discord or division.
- 12. Anyone desiring to speak shall rise to his feet and address the moderator by the appelation, "Brother Moderator," but shall not speak further until recognized by the moderator.
 - 13. No member of this association shall be allowed to speak

more than ten minutes nor twice on the same subject without permission from the moderator.

14. These By-Laws may be altered or amended at any regular or adjourned session of this Association by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

CONSTITUTION OF STATE ASSOCIATION

PERAMBLE: From long experience, we the members of the Free Will Baptist denominations, being regularly baptised upon a profession of our faith in Jesus Christ, and realizing the necessity of a bond of union and fellowship among us as a church: and to preserve and maintain correspondence and co-ordination with us, do therefore ordain this Constitution for our better denominational government.

Article I

Name: This organization shall be known as the OKLA-HOMA STATE ASSOCIATION OF FREE WILL BAPTIST.

Article II

PURPOSE: the object and purpose of this organization shall be to unify the work of the various bodies composing this State Association, and to devise and execute measures for the extension of the Kingdom of God in connection with the various bodies in the Association, or that may hereafter be represented therein.

Article III

REPRESENTATION: Section 1: This Association shall be composed of all ordained ministers and deacons with membership in some local church which is a member of a district Association with membership in the State Association.

Secton 2: Each District Association shall be entitled to a number of elected delegates equal with the number of churches composing said Association. These delegates may be recommended by the local churches and shall be endorsed by their district association. Five delegates from the League, Women's Auxiliary, and Master's Men.

Article IV

FINANCE: Each elected delegate shall be represented with a fee of Five dollars.

Article V

DISCIPLINE: This State Association shall have the right to settle any question of discipline, doctrine or practices that may properly come before it from any of the bodies composing said organization, furthermore if there be any question of discipline, doctrine or practices on the part of a subordinate association, delegates of that association shall not be seated until these questions have been settled to the satisfaction of the Credential Committee.

Section 2: Decisions of the Credential Committee may be appealed. All appeals coming before the State Association when sitting in a Committee as a whole. (2) by a Special committee whose report shall be voted on without discussion.

Article VI

OFFICERS: The officers of the State Association shall consist of a Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk and Assistant Clerk, Parliamentarian, and an Executive Secretary, each of whom shall be elected at the close of each regular session, except the Executive Secretary, who shall be elected every two years.

Section 2: Committees, as necessary, shall be appointed by the moderator, unless otherwise provided for, and shall hold office until their work is completed, or until their successors are elected.

Article VII

BOARDS: All standing boards shall be composed of five members who shall serve terms of 5, 4, 3, 2, 1 years, exclusive of the College Board of Trustees. The General Board shall be composed of one member from each subordinate association and the chairman of each standing board and the state officers. The College Board of Trustees shall be composed of seven members who shall serve terms of 5, 4, 3, 2, 1 and 1 years. The standing boards shall include the Executive Board, Mission Board, College Board of Trustees, Superannuation Board, Sunday School Board, League Board and Church Loan Extension Service Board. The Coordinating Board shall be composed of the Executive Secretary and the chairman from each standing board.

Article VIII

DUTIES AND RULES OF STANDING BOARDS: 1 Executive Board. To this board is delegated the power to act in behalf of and for the State Association from one meeting to an-

other for said Association, and shall have power and authority to select such officers as might be deemed best for its own government and to carry out the plans and undertakings of the State Association. The board shall have power to fill vacancies that may occur in its own body. To this Executive Board is further designated power to collect funds and employ superintend such work for the field as may seem best, and the means on hand may warrant. They shall deliver Oil and Gas leases upon any real property owned by the association, for such bonuses and rentals as in the discretion of the board.

This Executive Board shall keep a record of all work done, money raised, meetings held, and make a full and complete report to the regular meeting of the association and shall further receive, hold, manage, use, control, and convey any property entrusted to said State Association.

The chairman and secretary of said Executive Board shall sign all deeds, bonds and notes, etc., and any other papers by which the State Association is to become legally responsible, exclusive of those documents pertaining to Oklahoma Free Will Baptist Bible College which shall be signed by the College Board of Trustees.

The board shall have the power to call the association in conference by notifying each subordinate association at least ten (10) days prior to conference.

- 2. General Board: It shall be the duty of this board to meet with the executive board one day preceeding the State Association to hear reports of the standing boards and to make recommendations to the state associations. They also serve as credential committee.
- 3. Mission Board: It shall be the duty of this board to work in connection with the national foreign and home mission boards, and to promote an active missionary program in and for the state of Oklahoma. They shall elect a treasurer who shall handle all mission money.

It will also be their responsibility to investigate and assist, if necessary any new church. This board should thoroughly investigate the ability of a church to support an organization before asstance is pledged.

- 4. College Board of Trustees: It shall be the duty of this board to supervise and promote the Oklahoma Free Will Baptist Bible College.
- 5. League Board. It shall be the duty of the state league board to plan and assist in every way possible the League work throughout the state. It will also be their responsibility to promote and active league work in each subordinate association and to encourage League Rallies.
- 6. Sunday School Board. Their duties shall include the planning and operation of the State Sunday School Conventions, and the encouragement of the organization of district conventions. They may carry through any plans they think wise to actively promote Sunday school work in the state, and publishing any literature deemed advisable.
- 7. Superannuation Board. This board working in cooperation with the National superannuation board and district boards, shall provide a definite program of support for ministers.
- 8. Co-ordinating Board: This board shall be charged with the responsibility of co-ordinating and promoting the work of the other standing boards, and shall also act as Budget Committee. The Executive Secretary shall serve as chairman and the board shall meet at his discretion.
- 10. Working agreement between the state association and the Executive Secretary of the State Association: That the Executive Secretary be paid a set salary and mileage and a two week paid vacation and all money received by him for speaking engagements, revivals and etc., shall be turned in by him to the Executive Office for the support of this office. He shall be ex-office member of all standing boards.

Article IX

This constitution may be amended or altered at any regular session of the State Association by a two-thirds vote of members present, provided proposed amendment or alteration be presented in writing to the body one day in advance.

Article X

Elected delegates to State Association shall be retained as standing delegates for special called meetings.

STATE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD REPORT

The State Sunday School Board has had a very good year. We have conducted seven institutes throughout the state this past year. We hope to conduct as many this year.

The National Sunday School Board will have a man on the field who will be teaching institutes from December through April. We would like to arrange for this man to teach some institutes in some of our associations in the state. If you would like to make arrangements for one of these institutes, please let any member of the board know.

We have operated this past year without any cooperative money, and we feel that we will be able to operate again this coming year on the \$2,742.94 balance in our treasury.

We have printed the doctrine hand book of Rev. E. S. Morris; it is for sale in the bookstore for \$1.25. We urge everyone to buy a copy of this study course book. We desire your prayers and cooperation for the coming year.

MISSION BOARD REPORT

The following report covers the period from September 1962 to September 1963.

The Board has held eight regular meetings the past year and traveled a total of 9,385 miles. A regular meeting date is scheduled each month, but some meetings have to be cancelled.

A large amount of effort has gone into the working out of itinerant services for missionaries that have come into the State. Missionaries who have held itinerant services which were arranged by the Board include Earnie Deeds, Eddie Payne, Lonnie Sparks, Lee Whaley, Jimmy Aldridge, Lewis Perry and Luther Sanders. The increase in missionary giving can largely be attributed to the efforts of these workers who have come into the State to appeal for funds and present the Missionary challenge. The workers have held services in a number of missionary conferences sponsored by the different associations and churches of the State. The Board wishes to express deep appreciation to all the churches and associations over Oklahoma that have opened their doors to admit these workers and to let them challenge the hearts of their people with their message.

The continued increase of Foreign Mission and National Home Mission giving is encouraging. These gifts showed a substantial increase in 1962.

The "Vehicle for Palmer" drive sponsored by the Board in 1962 resulted in the presentation of a \$3,000.00 check to Rev. Reford Wilson, Foreign Mission Director, at the last Association in Tulsa. The Board has sponsored a follow-up project this year by raising funds for a vehicle for the Lonnie Sparks family. The response has been

gratifying and it is hoped that the goal of \$3,000.00 can be raised by the date of the Association in October. The Sparks family has recently returned to Ivory Coast, West Africa for a new four year tour of duty.

The Board sponsored the organization of one Church the past year. This was at Ponca City. Bro. Allen Moore was employed as mission worker in August of 1962. An organizational revival was conducted in February 1963 by Bro. Delbert Akin and the Church was organized on February 15, 1963. The Church petitioned the First Mission Association for membership.

At the present time the Board is jointly sponsoring mission organizations at Tahlequah and Marietta. The Tahlequah mission is a joint effort with the South Grand River Association. Bro. Gerald Chester was employed in June of 1963 to serve as mission worker. The group is now meeting at 115 East Choctaw, Tahlequah.

The Marietta mission is a joint effort with the Hopewell No. 2 Association. Bro. James Deatherage is serving as the director of the work which held first services in June 1963. The mission is meeting at 504 S.W. 4th St. in Marietta. It is the hope of the Board that these two missions can soon be organized into new Free Will Baptist Churches.

Funds for use in State Missions have held fairly steady the past year. However giving to the New Church Club fund has not been as good as in the past. It is the hope of the Board that this very effective means of giving support to new organizations can receive new vitality in the coming year. New members are urgently needed who will pledge at least \$10.00 for the purpose of helping new organizations buy property and buildings.

A number of churches and associations are showing great interest in assisting in the establishment of churches by designating funds to mission churches and by sponsoring mission churches in their areas. The Board wishes to encourage more activity by the larger established churches in this great field of church extension. This need is evident in the heavily populated areas. More

attention is expected to be given to these needs in this field as increased funds are available and the demand decreases for churches in cities and towns where there are no Free Will Baptist Churches.

In the next year efforts will be directed around Woodward and Hugo. A preliminary survey of Woodward has already been authorized. These plans are always subject to change when evident needs arise in other cities or towns where there is opportunity to establish missions and mission workers seem directed of the Holy Spirit to work.

The month of December is again to be designated as State Mission Month with Sunday, December 22 designated as State Missions Sunday. Every church is urged to receive a special offering during this month to be used in establishing new churches over Oklahoma for Free Will Baptists and for promoting the missionary challenge and message.

We are asking for seven (7) percent of the Cooperative budget with an \$8,700.00 overall budget.

PRESIDENT'S LETTER:

O B C has opened for its sixth academic year of operation. The opening is an ominous one as our world and our society is a chaotic confused one in 1963 facing disaster from within and without. Indeed this is a strategic, pivotal year for O B C. We must recognize our identity as a Bible college, a religious school with undergraduate theological training with a core curriculum of general education in the arts. In this year of operation our Bibliocentric philosophy of education must be kept uppermost.

The structure of O B C has emerged with 7 faculty members and 26 course offerings. Programs and structures do not make an institution and we must strengthen our internal procedures from within in this year of operation.

Our institutional objectives were not come upon accidentally, but were developed with a particular type of service to Christ in view. In general: Quality education, academic excellence, second to none was our stated goal. Not stressed academics, but emphasizing scholarship in TRUTH. In particular: a two-fold goal: Firstly: strengthen our curriculum, develop faculty organizations, administrative procedures defined. This is internal strengthening. Secondly: The goal of retiring the debt on the college site in 63. This stands foremost because it is needful and necessary before O B C can proceed further in its program.

The attainment of these goals must be in 1963, this sixth year of operation. In 1964 our student flow will increase with heavier demands of service, this is a most strategic year of preparation for O B C.

Our task in this sixth academic year is to confront the student with the truths of the classroom and transmit this into service at the foot of the cross. "Christian Education should hold up before inquiring minds a vision of greatness, a true North Star for the soul, a confrontation with God and His Word. A true polarization of our life with the life of God in Christ." The task of O B C is to produce Christian leaders to meet the challenge of our times. May this sixth academic year be a full chapter in the continuation of a story of faith and venture predicated upon the command of God to teach and equip our people for service. The story of O B C is a demonstration of the power of the life giving power of God. The world for whom Christ died needs to know the transforming message of the gospel. The church needs to hear prophetic voices from the pulpit to call it in obedience to its Lord. The man of God can only be shaped in heart and mind by an experimental knowledge of the will of God revealed in the word. O B C is indispensible in the preparation of servants to carry out the range of the Christian mission and present Christ to a chaotic, confused age.

May this year be one of service to Christ, yet may these be preparatory for a greater future. May all of these noble ideals be fully attained for Him.

- No. 4. That our state body recognize the standard which has been passed by the National Convention of Free Will Baptists. That we go on record as being opposed to the use of tobacco in any form among Christians everywhere.
- No. 5. That a more modest dress be observed by both men and women.
- No. 6. A more temperate use be made of television, in view of a greater need for home and family devotion with encouragement for more family altars.
- No. 7. That we be more temperate in our outside activities, especially during spare time and more so, the appointed time of worship. That we may live, walk and be led in and by the Holy Spirit, and not just to satisfy the use of the flesh. That we may devote more earnest time to our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. In as much as Christians should be lovers of God more than lovers of pleasure.

- No. 8. That a study of Narcotic education be referred to the local associations, and that each association be encouraged to have one service during their youth encampment on the harmful effects of Narcotics. We further recommend that a qualified speaker with complete information of facts, figures and results be contacted to speak at each district and state youth encampment on this subject.
- No. 9. That our people set the example of a temperate use of the Automobile, in observing all traffic regulations, especially to the speeding on the highways and courtesy in our Cities.
