## PROCEEDINGS OF THE STATE ASSOCIATION

The 57th annual session of the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptist convened in Ardmore, Oklahoma, October 12, 13, and 14, 1965. The convention theme was, "To Finish His Work." taken from John 4: 34b.

The introductory service opened by singing "Blessed Assurance." Music Director, Rev. Homer Young; Organist, Mrs. Winnie Yandell; Pianist, Mrs. Velma Cox.

Rev. Arthur Billows led in prayer followed by two congregational songs, "Bring Them In," and "Send the Light."

In the absence of the clerk, the assistant Clerk Rev. Waldo Young called the Association in official session. He then introduced the officers of the State Association.

Rev. Lonnie DaVoult brought the Moderators message based on John 16: 1-14, and led in prayer.

The pastor of the host Church, Rev. Jerry Rhoades, was presented to the congregation. He brought the welcome, speaking in behalf of the Ardmore Church and the Hopewell No. 2 Association. He then introduced Mr. Frank Thomas, Judge of Ardmore, who welcomed the Association to the City of Ardmore.

An offering was received for the expense of the Association.

The Carter County Four, a mens quartet from Ardmore, sang, "What a wonderful Savior is He,," and "I Know He Heard My Prayer."

The moderator introduced Dr. Laverne Miley, Missionary from Africa, who brought the message. The subject was, 'To Finish His Work Through Evangelism," reading Matthew 28: 18-20.

After an invitation hymn was sung, Rev. E. E. Morris prayed the benediction.

The Wednesday Morning session was opened with the congregation singing "Amazing Grace," and prayer by Rev. Kenneth Walker. Two other songs by the congregation, "We'll Work Till Jesus comes," and "To God Be the Glory," were sung.

The devotion was given by Rev. Doyle Cox who read Exodus 39:32 and 43. Rev. Lynn Wood led in prayer.

Rev. DaVoult brought the Moderator's Admontion from I Cor. 14:40. The Partial report of the General Board was read. Motion sustained to accept the partial report.

Motion sustained that only the delegates and pertinent information be read from letters.

Letters were read from all of the sixteen Associations.

Motion sustained to receive the letters and seat delegates.

Visitors were recognized and welcomed to the Association.

Rev. Arthur Billows brought greetings from Old Mexico.

The Commitees were appointed as follows;

Resolution Committee: Rev. H. E. Staires, Rev. Doyle Cox, Rev. Roma Stewart, Rev. Adrain Condit, and Rev. James Murray. Temperance Committee: Rev. Ken Elledge, Mr. John Wood, Mr. Jim Martin, Mr. Earl Erwin, and Rev. Clayton Moore.

Obituary Committee: Mrs. Mildred Hicks, Mrs. Enola Martin, Mrs. Marguerite Hinesley,, and Mrs. Sue Jenkins.

Place Committee: Rev. Paul Inbody, Rev. Ernest Harrison, Rev. Delbert

Akin, Rev. Joe Haas, and Rev. Clarence Shepherd.

Motion sustained to adopt the program with the time flexible.

The report of the General Board was given. Motion sustained to accept the report and adopt item by item.

Motion sustained to recess business until 1:30 P.M. The Benediction was by the Moderator.

The 11:00 o'clock worship was opened by singing "Leaning on the Everlasting Arms." with Rev. Connie Cariker presiding. Prayer was given by Rev. Fred McCoy. The congregation sang, "I am Thine, O Lord."

The Oklahoma State Minister's Quartet sang two numbers, "Born to Serve The Lord," and "Bread Sent from Heaven."

Rev. Joe Haas was introduced to bring the Message. He read Colossians 1:19-20, and brought the message on "To Finish His Work Through Christian Growth."

The Bendiction was given by Rev. Bailey Thompson.

The afternoon session opened with the congregation singing "Where He Leads I'll Follow," and 'Lead On, O King Eternal.'

The devotion was brought by Rev. Eugene Hawkins. He read from Luke 14: 25-33, and lead in prayer.

Business was resumed on the motion to accept the General Board report. The previous quesion was moved and carried. The motion carried.

Motion made that the individual reports be heard and acted upon, taking recommendations of the General Board into consideration, exclusive of the items pertaining to the budget, and these items be heard after the Coordinating Board report is given. The motion carried.

Rev. L. C. Johnson, President of the Free Will Baptist Bible College of Nashville, Tennessee, was introduced and spoke briefly concerning the work of the school.

The Oklahoma Bible College report was given in three parts. Part one was given by Rev. J. B. Fletcher, which was the minutes of the board. Part two was given by Rev. Danny Farmer, which was the financial report. Part three was given by Dr. J. D. O'Donnell, which was the proposed plan for incorporation of OBC and financing the building program. Motion made by Rev. E. E. Morris and seconded by Rev. A. L. McAffrey to accept the report as corrected by the Board of Trustees, the General Board, and amended by the body. The motion carried with no opposing vote.

Because of the Constitutional change involved, Resolution No. 2 was read. Motion sustained to table Resolution No. 2 until tomorrow.

Motion made and seconded that Article VIII, No. 4, of the Constitution be amended to read as follows:

"It shall be the duty of this board to supervise and promote Oklahoma Bible College, Inc., and the function of this board shall be governed by the Articles of Incorporation and By-Laws adopted by the State Association of Free Will Baptists presented at the 1965 session."

Motion sustained to table the motion for one day.

The report of the Sunday School Board was given by Rev. Ernest Harrison. Motion sustained to receive the report, exclusive of the budget.

Motion sustained to recess business until 9:15 A.M. Thursday.

The Bendiction was by Rev. Lynn Wood.

Rev. Delbert Akin presided at the Wednesday evening service. The service opened with congregational singing: "There Is A Name I Love to Hear," and "At the Cross" was directed by Rev. Homer Young. Rev. Don Payne led in prayer. "All Hail the Power" was sung by the congregation, followed by two specials by the Duncan Quartet, "He Can Never Fail," and 'To Walk as close as I can." An offering of \$110.68 was received for Oklahoma Bible College.

The Minister's Quartet sang, "I've Been To Calvary."

Rev. and Mrs. Don Jones sang, "Without Him"

Dr. J. D. O'Donnell was introduced to bring the message. He read John 12: 23-32, and brought the message on "To Finish His Work Through Christian Education." Rev. Delbert Akin led in prayer.

The closing hymn was "Amazing Grace," and the Benediction was by Rev. J. Reford Wilson.

The Moderator called the Thursday morning session to order. The congregation sang "Bring Them In," and "Work for the Night is Coming." The devotion was given by Rev. Frank Young who read Acts 20:17-24.

Motion sustained to take Resolution No. 2 from the table.

Motion sustained to amend the resolution by inserting the words, "Ex-officio members shall not have a vote."

Motion sustained to take from the table the motion pertaining to Article VIII, Section 4 of the Constitution

Motion sustained to amend the motion by substituting "adopted," in place of "presented." Motion carried as amended.

Motion sustained that board members be elected with the giving of each board's report.

Rev. Kenneth Elledge was elected as the 7 year Sunday School Board member.

Rev. Bailey Thompson was elected to the Sunday School Board for 5 years.

Motion sustained to reinstate the College Board of Trustees with the exception of the member who was to go off this year.

Bob Followwill was elected as the 7 year member of the College Board of Trustees.

The report of the Church Extension and Mission Board was given by Rev. James Murray. Motion sustained to accept the report with the exception of the budget items.

Rev. Lynn Wood was elected as the 7 year member of the mission Board

Motion sustained to recess business until 1:30 P.M. Benediction by Rev. Bill Hall.

Rev. Roma Stewart presided over the Thursday Morning Worship service. The service was opened with prayer by Rev. Kermit Argo.

Rev. Homer Young directed the congregation in singing "Jesus Saves," and "Wonderful Grace of Jesus." Rev. James Cearlev led in prayer.

The Minister's Quartet sang, I'm Bound for that City."

Homer, Waldo and JoAnn Young sang, 'Jesus Use Me."

Rev. Lynn Wood was introduced to bring the message on "To Finish His Work Through Service." He read Matthew 25: 14.30.

The benediction was prayed by Rev. Casey Adams.

The moderator called the Thursday afternoon session to order at 1:30 P.M. Two hymns were sung by the congregation. They were, "Blessed Be the Name," and "My Wonderful Lord."

Rev. Terrell Holland brought the devotion from II Corinthians 8: 1-7. Rev. J. Reford Wilson, General Director of the National Foreign Missions spoke to the body concerning the Foreign Missions program.

Motion sustained to send a telegram to Rev. T. H. Willey to assure him of our prayers and concern in his illness.

Rev. H. E. Staires gave a report of the National Home Mission program.

Rev. N. R. Smith gave a report of the National Sunday School Board. The Report of the Loan Commission was given by Rev Adrain Condit. Motion sustained that report be accepted, that the Wetumka balance be collected by the Executive office, and the net gain be given to Oklahoma Bible College for office equipment and supplies, an the board be dissolved.

Rev. Clarence Shepherd gave the report of the Executive Board. Motion sustained to adopt the report exclusive of the budget items.

Rev. L. A. Yandell was elected as the 7 year member of the Executive Board.

The report of the Church Training Service Board was given by Rev. Roma Stewart. Motion sustained to accept this partial report and grant their requests to conduct VBS workshops.

Motion sustained that this body recommend to the National C.T.S. board that the age limits on the competitive activities be changed from July 1, to October 1.

Rev. J. C. Morgan was elected as the 7 year member of the C.T.S. Board.

Rev. Doyle Cox was elected as the 5 year member of the C.T.S. Board.

Mr. Sam Johnson gave the report of the National Chuch Training Service Board.

The report of the Superannuation Board was given by Rev. Eugene Hawkins. Motion sustained that we accept this partial report as recommended by the General Board. The body stood in prayer on behalf of the election of members of this board.

Members of the Superannuation Board were elected as follows; 7 year member, Earl Collings; 5 year member, Dennis Kern; 3 year member, Rev. Bob Gilliam.

Rev. Carl Shivers offered his resignation from the Superannuation

board. Motion sustained to accept the resignation. Rev. Earl Jensen was elected to replace Rev. Carl Shivers as the 1 year member..

The report of the Executive Secretary was given by Rev. N. R. Smith. The Bookstore report was also given by Rev. Smith. Motion sustained to accept the report of the Executive Secretary and Bookstore report.

Mrs. Joan Wood gave the report of the Woman's Auxiliary. The report was accepted as information.

Mr. Howard Gwartney gave the report of the Master's Men, and the report was accepted as information.

A hymn, "Lead On, O King Eternal," was directed by Rev. Young. Rev. Kenneth Walker led in prayer.

The report of the Coordinating Board was given by Rev. N. R. Smith. Motion made to accept the report as amended by the General Board. Motion sustained to amend the report to read as it was originally made by the coordinating board.

Motion sustained that we accept the financial reports of the boards and adopt the budgets as amended.

The Obituary Committee report was read by the clerk. Motion susstained to accept the report. Prayer in behalf of the families of those deceased was led by Mrs. Marguerite Hinesly.

The report of the Temperance Committee was read by the Clerk. Motion sustained to accept the report.

The report of the Resolution Committee was read by the Clerk. Motion sustained to adopt the report item by item.

Resolution No. 1, adopted. Resolution No. 3 adopted.

The resolution committee who served during this State Association was appointed to carry out Resolution No. 3. Resolution No. 4, adopted. Motion sustained to amend Resolution No. 5 to read, "At the descretion of the board." Resolution No. 5, adopted as amended. Resolution No. 6

The report of the Placement Committee was given by the clerk.

Motion made to accept the report.

Motion sustained to amend the report to read "Ada," instead of "Tulsa."

Motion sustained to refer the Polity Committee report back to the Committee.

Rev. Joe Haas was elected as National General Board Member for 1967.

Motion sustained to give a rising vote of thanks to Hopewell No 2 Association and the Ardmore Church for their fine hospitality.

Motion sustained to elect the General Board members as submitted. (See General Board in front of minutes.)

Officers of the Association were elected as follows:

Rev. Don Payne was elected Parlimentarian.

Rev. Clarence Campbell was elected Assistant Clerk.

Rev. Waldo Young was elected Clerk.

Rev. Jerry Rhoades was elected Assistant Moderator.

Rev. Lonnie DaVoult was elected Moderator.

Motion sustained that a rising vote of thanks be given to the officers.

Motion sustained to adjourn.

Benediction by the moderator, Rev. Lonnie DaVoult.

## MINUTES OF THE CALLED STATE ASSOCIATION

The called session of the Oklahoma State Association met at the Capitol Hill Church, Oklahoma City, on June 5, 1965.

The Church Training Service Board report was given by Rev. Roma Stewart. They were allowed to insert their request of 1 per cent of the cooperative receipts. This board was also instructed to prepare a proposed budget to add to their report.

# STATE MISSION BOARD REPORT 1964 - 1965

Since the last report the Board has met ten times during the year. The regular meeting date is on the 3rd Tuesday of each month. Bro. James Murray has served as chairman, Bro. Bob Duncan as Vice-chairman, and Bro. Delbert Akin as Clerk and treasurer.

The past year has been a period of strengthening the work of the churches that have been organized in recent years. New organizations that have faltered and suffered set backs were given further assistance. Much of this work has been done through local associations and their missions boards. There have been three churches assisted in this way. They include

Durant, Ponca City and Enid.

Rev. Noah Smith was employed by the Board to work with the Durant church in May of 1964 and served there until the decision was made by the Board to close the mission in January of 1965. A note against the property totaling \$867.01 was paid by the Board. The property was then sold for a total of \$2,993.20 and the money was placed in the treasury of the Board. A total of \$1,500.00 was placed in the permanent fund of the New Church Club.

The work at Ponca City and Enid has been aided through the First Mission Association. Rev. E. M. Kennedy is presently working at Ponca City and Rev. Carl Hembree is at Enid. The assistance to these missions has been on an indefinite basis. The Board also was contacted concerning the El Reno Church during the year and gave some assistance in seeking to sustain the church there.

Two newly organized churches were assisted through gifts through the General Fund. They were the First Free Will Baptist Church of Lexington, Oklahoma and Tower Heights Free Will Baptist Church of Ardmore, Oklahoma. Both of these churches are now operating independently. Neither was sponsored by the Board.

Two new missions have been approved for assistance in the coming months. A new mission has been established at Edmond, Oklahoma and is conducting a full schedule of services. This mission is jointly sponsored with the First Oklahoma Association. Rev. Milburn Wilson is serving as the mission director. Bro. Wilson's address is: 14008 Jeffry Drive, Route 3, Edmond, Oklahoma. A new mission is also being started in the Southeast Tulsa area which will be jointly sponsored by the Tulsa Churches, the First Mission Association and the State Board. Rev. Kenneth Walker will serve as the mission director.

Mission giving continued to rise in the past year in Oklahoma. Foreign Mission receipts for 1964 were \$32,483.74 and National Home Mission receipts were \$15,834.53 for an increase of \$2,878.29 in both departments over 1963. Quotas for these departments are as follows: Foreign Missions 1965, \$45,000.00, Foreign Missions 1966, \$45,000.00; National Home Missions 1966, \$20,000.00.

Itinerant services were arranged by the Board during the year for the following missionaries and missionary appointees: Authur Billows and Mexican boys from Mexico; Lloyd and Betty Plunkett, appointees to Seattle, Washington; Roger and Barbara Harwell, Pueblo, Colorado; Patsy Tyson and Ella Rae Jones, South America; Bill and Joy Jones, Ivory Coast, Africa; Lewis and Kathleen Perry, Lincoln, Nebraska; Jerry Ballard, Foreign Missions Literature Director.

A fund raising project to purchase a vehicle for the Mexican work at Monterrey, Mexico was adopted in April 1965. A goal for \$3,500.00 was set to be raised by the State Convention in October, however the project will be continued until the necessary funds have been secured.

Funds for the New Church Club have been small this year, probably due to the fact that no new churches have been aided. However, the Board is projecting plans into the new 1966 budget to raise much more money to help secure property for the new missions that are now started.

At the present time the Board has approximately 500 names on the roll. It is hoped that this can be increased to more than 1,000 in the future. Members pledge to give \$10.00 per calendar year into a permanent fund kept by the Mission Board and used only for purchase of property for newly organized Free Will Baptist Churches in Oklahoma that qualify through the Board.

The Board wishes to express its appreciation to the churches and individuals who cooperated in the State Mission Month offerings during the month of December, 1964. Again, December 1965 will be State Mission Month with Sunday, December 19, as State Mission Sunday. Churches and individuals are urged to help the state Mission program with a gift to this fund.

### **EXECUTIVE BOARD REPORT**

We the Executive Board had seven meetings this past year and are grateful to God for a good year in His service.

We established an "Every Family Plan" PROMOTER subscription whereby every active family in the church can have the PROMOTER sent to their home for \$1.40 annually. We do urge all churches to take advantage of this plan.

We also purchased a Franklin Imprint machine to be used in the bookstore for the imprinting of Bibles, Christmas Cards, and Etc.

On March 30, we met with Rev. J. B. Fletcher, chairman of the College Board of Trustees. Bro. Fletcher presented partial plans for the buildings of O.B.C. to be errected at Moore. At this meeting there was no specific date set for the special called meeting of the State Association.

On May 8, we met in a joint meeting with the College Board of Trustees in the New Home church at Tulsa. At this meeting Bro. Paul Inbody gave a report on the financing of a loan for the building of O.B.C. The note would be made for 15 years at 6% interest and must be 50 percent underwritten by Free Will Baptists or interested parties.

Mr. Kenneth Seikman presented plans and gave report of the structure of the buildings to be constructed.

The chairman of the Executive Board was given authority to call a special called meeting of the State Association at the request of the College Board of Trustees.

We contacted the Eureka Association concerning the credentials of Rev. D. D. Dipboye, former pastor of Stigler, as he had united with another denomination. We were informed by letter to our satisfaction that his credentials had been voided.

We did request that the Executive Secretary be relieved of teaching obligations at O.B.C. that he might be able to devote full time to the promoting of all departments of our state work.

Rev. Curtis Hogue was employed August 23rd as the operator of our bookstore and has moved his family into the apartment above the bookstore. However, we feel our sales at the book store has been curtailed by the street construction in front of the store but believe when this is finished it will be a great asset to us. We would like to take this means and privilege of extending a branch bookstore to Oklahoma Bible College as a service to the students when the College is moved to its permanent buildings.

We recommend to the State Association that the Cooperative budget be disbursed at the same percentage as the previous year.

# STATE CHURCH TRAINING SERVICE BOARD REPORT

We are thankful to God for His blessings this past year and are happy that we were able to extend our services to the Free Will Baptists of Oklahoma in a more effective way this year than ever before. We have assumed several duties and responsibilities. Only God is able to foresee all the areas of need. Pray that we might be able to fill most of them.

This year we have begun a new program of VBS workshops. We held five workshops this past year at Zion Hill, Allen, Healdton, Chickasha and Tecumseh churches. We are aware that the program presented this year has not met the need of most of the churches, however it is the plans of this board to go into a greater and more effective training program for the VBS. We hope to have a workshop for each of the different departments of VBS.

Much emphasis was neglected this year in the program of the Sword Drill and the Declamation Contest by the board. We hope to place a much greater emphasis in these two divisions of the C.T.S. work this coming year.

We have started a greater determination to teach as much as can be taught during the State Youth Camp. We believe that you are demanding a greater and more personal teaching staff. We are happy to report that by increasing the number of teachers by seven times, we have (we believe) a much better teaching program in the camp. We feel that more of God's truth and more of God's example of Christian life has been de-

monstrated in this past youth camp than any previous camp. The enrollment of this years camp was 323. We pray that each of you will pray that the Spirit of God will prevail in each selection of teachers and officers for the coming camp.

We feel that by having a missionary such as Rev. Sammy Wilkinson as the evangelist and the Calvary family in the camp has brought each of us closer to the need of the mission field. We pray that God will direct you as He has directed the young people of the camp to give more (prayer, energy, time and moneys) in order to make each of us more effective in getting the Gospel to the entire world.

We are happy to report that since July 1, 1965 we have taken a project in the name of Oklahoma Bible College, to purchase a part of the needed press in conjunction with the Mission Board.

A contract for Robbers Cave State Camp has been signed for June 13-17, 1966.

#### OKLAHOMA BIBLE COLLEGE

Due to the fact that the bank which had tentatively approved finance for the building program did not grant us the loan, the Board of Trustees has found it necessary to secure other means of finance. Since the refusal stemmed from lack of established income over an extended period and to a lack of reserves, the Board has voted to issue \$140,000.00 worth of first mortgage bonds to finance the building program. Executive Church bonds, Incorporated, of Nashville, Tennessee has been employed to issue bonds and to guide us in this program of finance. Construction of the building is expected to begin shortly.

Various means of raising the support for Oklahoma Bible College will be proposed during the year. We trust that every pastor will respond with his church in a liberal way to support this cause of Christian Education.

The new school year is off to a good start. Fourteen dormitory students are being housed in adequate lodging in rented buildings which are sufficient until the new campus is ready for occupancy.

# Resolutions Of Incorporation Of OBC

#### Resolution

697 Be, It Resolved that the By-Laws of Oklahoma Bible College, Inc., the Pre-Incorporation Agreement of Oklahoma Bible College, Inc. and the Corporate Seal of Oklahoma Bible College, Inc. be and the same hereby are approved, ratified and adopted by this body politic.

#### Resolution

Be It Resolved by the Delegates of the Fifty-Seventh Annual Session of the State Association of the Free Will Baptists of Oklahoma that the Articles of Incorporation of Oklahoma Bible College, Inc. be, and they hereby are approved to be filed with the Secretary of State of Oklahoma and Brother J. D. O'Donnell is hereby instructed to file said Articles of Incorporation with the Secretary of State of Oklahoma.

#### Resolution

Whereas the Delegates to the annual State Association of Free Will Baptists of Oklahoma, also Oklahoma Bible College, Inc., city of Norman and the state of Oklahoma met in regular conference on the 13, day of October, 1965 with Rev. Lonnie DaVoult, presiding as Moderator.

The matter of appointing a trustee for the purpose of holding a mortgage against the property of the College for the benefit of the bond holders, present and future, under bond issue resolution of the \_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_ and the matter of giving such a mortgage, coming on for consideration of the membership, and discussion being had, it was resolved on motion duly made and carried, as follows:

RESOLVED, that Oklahoma Bible College, Inc. name and appoint as Trustee for the benefit of the bond holders of the bonds issued, and to be issued hereafter, under the resolution of the 13, day of October, 1965, authorizing the issuance of bonds; and the College grant a mortgage to the said Trustee for the purposes of securing the said bonds and the interest thereon: and that said mortgage be payable upon demand at any time that the said Trustee deems the security of said issue to be imperiled, either by the action or non-action of the College; and that said Trustee have all the powers provided by law; and that the said mortgage cover the following described real property:

FURTHER RESOLVED, that J. D. O'Donnell, President of the Oklahoma Bible College, Inc. and Charles Hinesley, Secretary, of the Board of Trustees of Oklahoma Bible College, Inc. shall sign said mortgage for the College.

# OKLAHOMA BIBLE COLLEGE, INC. BY-LAWS

## **BOARD OF TRUSTEES**

The Board of Trustees of Oklahoma Bible College shall be composed of nine members, as provided in the charter of the College:

ARTICLE A. OFFICERS: The officers of the board of Trustees shall be a Chairman, an Assistant Chairman, and a Secretary, each of whom shall be elected by the Board for a term of one year. They shall continue in office until their successors have been chosen:

ITEM ONE CHAIRMAN: The chairman of the Board of Trustees or his assistant shall preside at all meetings of the Board. He shall be an ex-officio member of the Executive Committee.

ITEM TWO SECRETARY: The Secretary shall record and preserve minutes of all meetings and acts of the Board of Trustees and countersign all deeds, conveyances, and other papers authorized by the Board. He shall have authority to call special meetings of the Trustees of the College upon the written request of two-thirds of the members of the Board; he shall mail notice of said meeting to the trustees ten (10) days in advance.

ITEM THREE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE: The Executive Committee shall consist of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, the Vice-Chairman of the Board, the Secretary of the Board. The Executice Committee shall have authority to consider and act upon all questions affecting the Bible College which may be brought before it between the stated meetings of the Board, or whenever it is deemed impractical to convene the entire Board, or a quorum of the Board fails to attend a called or regular meeting. It shall transact such business as may be committed to it

by the Board and shall act for the College on such matters as it may submit to it. The Committee shall meet at the call of the Chairman or the President of the College.

ARTICLE B MEETINGS: The Board of Trustees shall meet each year at a time and place agreed upon by the Board. It shall, also, hold special meetings whenever called in accordance with the By-Laws of the Board. Such special meetings may be called by either the chairman of the Board, or the President of the College.

ARTICLE C QUORUM: A majority of the members of the Board of Trustees of Oklahoma Bible College in attendance at any called or regular meeting, written notice of which has been mailed by the Secretary to each trustee, shall constitute a quorum. No proxy votes shall be permitted. No ex-officio member shall be enitled to vote at meetings of the Board of Trustees.

ARTICLE D ELECTIONS: In all elections held by the Board of Trustees each member present except ex-officio members shall be entitled to one vote, and the result shall be determined by a majority of the votes cast. Due notice of any election must be personal notice to the members, or a day on the minutes of the Board not less than one week preceding the election.

# SECTION II OFFICERS OF THE BIBLE COLLEGE

The officers of Oklahoma Bible College shall be a President, Vice-President, Dean, and a Business Manager, each of whom shall be elected by the Board of Trustees to hold office for two year, exclusive of the President whose term of office shall be indefinite. It is provided, however, that retirement of anyone of the officers herein named may occur at any time upon the resignation of the officer or the request of the Board. In either case, notice shall be given six weeks before the date of the proposed retirement unless otherwise agreed upon by the concerned parties.

ITEM ONE PRESIDENT: The President shall be executive officer of the Board of Trustees and shall have general control of the College including its officers, teachers, students, and business. He shall render to the Board complete annual reports and to its chairman, Executive Committee or other committees such information as may be deemed essential to a thorough knowledge of the operation of the College and its promotion. He shall be a member of the Board of Trustees ex-officio and of the Executive Committee ex-officio and shall have all the rights and privileges of a member of the Board except voting. The President shall execute all documents, instruments, and conveyances on behalf of the College. Duties of the president and working relationship shall be further detailed in a format approved by the Board of Trustees.

ITEM TWO VICE PRESIDENT: The Vice-President shall perform all the duties of the President in the absence of the latter.

ITEM THREE DEAN: The Academic Dean of the Bible College shall, under the President, fix the hours of recitation, govern, control, and regulate the conduct of the students, have general oversight of curriculum,

student's records, and such other internal details and administrative duties as may be delegated to him by the President of the College.

ITEM FOUR BUSINESS MANAGER: The Treasurer shall keep an accurate record of all accounts of the College and shall receive and expend, as directed by the Board of Trustees and the President, all money for the expenses of the institution. He shall make an annual report to the Board and furnish the Executive Committee with such information pertaining to his office as may be requested. He shall provide bond in whatever amount the Board may require. Until such time as the Board of Trustees may deem different the Treasurer's office shall be contained with in the Business Manager's Office. The Business Manager may at the direction of the administration designate this duty to a subordinate officer. The Business Manager shall have general supervision of the financial business of the College, and shall, at the direction of the President, be responsible for the upkeep of all the physical facilities and premises of the College. His detailed duties are directed in a format approved by the Board of Trustees.

#### SECTION III

#### **FACULTY**

este of potential and a second

The faculty shall consist of the President, the Dean, and all teachers of Oklahoma Bible College. Instructors & assistant teachers shall have the privilege of sitting with the faculty in stated meetings but shall not have the right of voting.

It shall be the policy of Oklahoma Bible College to employ on its faculty those who are members of Free Will Baptist churches that are affiliated with the National Association. Emergencies, however, arising from the resignation, illness, death, or approved leaves of absence of faculty members may be relieved by the temporary employment of instructors who are affiliated with any evangelical denomination. Part-time or short-term instructors, deemed essential to the successful prosecution of a consistent education program, may be employed at the discretion of the President without respect of denominational affiliation.

The faculty, under the authority and jurisdiction of the President, shall have general charge of instruction, attendance of students, examinations, administration of curriculum, discipline, and all matters involving the spiritual, physical, and social welfare of the Bible College. The faculty shall be hired upon recommendation of the President.

In the selection of the faculty qualitative factors shall be kept in mind. All faculty members shall be urged to pursue graduate programs in their respective fields. Except in special cases no faculty member will be required to teach courses outside of his field.

#### SECTION IV ACADEMIC COUNCIL

The Acadmeic Council shall consist of the President, the Dean and the heads of the departments of Oklahoma Bible College. It shall determine the curriculum and academic policy of the College, prescrible reuirements for admission, certificates, diplomas, and degrees, and supervise the courses of instruction offered by the various departments of the College.

#### SECTION V CONTRACTS

The Board of Trustees shall establish the College policy involving the execution of contracts, deeds of conveyance, the determination of salaries, and employment of all officers, representatives, faculty members and essential domestic and maintenance employees. The President of the College shall negotiate agreemeents, execute contracts, employ representatives, and supply vacancies incurred by the termination of contracts, resignations, or death of any essential employees. All contracts for building construction shall be let only to persons or corporations posting a valid performance bond and recording the same in the Office of the County Clerk of Cleveland County, Oklahoma.

#### SECTION VI ADVISORY COUNCIL

An advisory council shall be formed which is to be composed of interested, qualified persons in the various fields which will be of value in building and maintaining a strong academic program to carry out the educaional program stated in the charter.

#### SECTION VII AMENDMENT

These By-Laws may be amended by a favorable vote of two-thirds of the qualified members of the Board of Trustees of the Oklahoma Bible College at any meetings of the Board, provided that the proposed amendment has been submitted in writing to each Trustee one month in advance. This change to be subject to the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists.

## SECTION VIII ADMINSTRATIVE FUNCTIONS

The President of the Oklahoma Bible College shall be elected by the Board of Trustees, and he shall act for and on behalf of the Board in the conduct and management of the institution. He shall also be a member of the Board of Trustees ex-officio and of the Executive committee exofficio, and his duties, powers and term of office shall be prescribed in the by-laws of the College and a format approved by the Board of Trustees.

## SECTION IX AMENDMENTS

This charter may be here after amended subject to the provisions contained herein and the laws of the State of Oklahoma. It is provided, however, that the trustees of the Bible College shall not propose or apply

for any amendment which has not been previously authorized by an act of the Oklahoma State Association.

# ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF THE OKLAHOMA BIBLE COLLEGE, INC.

Know all men by these presents, that, we, whose names are here unto subscribed, do hereby associate ourselves together for the purpose of forming a corporation under the provisions of the corporation laws of the State of Oklahoma, and for that purpose state:

#### ARTICLE ONE

The name of this corporation shall be OKLAHOMA BIBLE COLLEGE, INC.

#### ARTICLE TWO

The purpose of this corporation shall be the creation, establishment and maintenance of a college and institution of higher learning devoted to the promotion and impartation of higher learning, Christian education and such other education, instruction, learning, training and research as may be deemed essential for the cause of Christ and to that end prescribe courses of study and grant degrees. The doctrinal and theological position of this institution shall be that of the sponsoring denomination, Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists and the treatise of the National Association of Free Will Baptists as endorsed by the state body, and in connection therewith, in accordance with the stipulation of the Constitution and By-Laws of the State Association of Free Will Baptsts, Inc.

- (a) To prescribe courses of study for both resident and correspondence students, which shall include general education in the arts, Christion Ministries of Service and Biblical studies for wisdom; said courses to be taught in both a Junior College Division and a Bible College Division, and to award degrees, either graduate or post-graduate, to those persons satisfactorily completing the prescribed courses of study and to grant such other literary honors, including honorary degrees, as shall be deemed advisable.
- (b) To charge and collect tuition as determined by the Board of Trustees and to create scholarships.
- (c) To employ professors, instructors and other subordinate employees as may be necessary for the proper conduct of the college under the direction and control of the President of the College, with the advice and consent of the majority of the Board of Trustees.
- (d) To institute and carry on missions and commissions for missionary purposes and investigations.
- (e) To publish and distribute such pamphlets, literature or books as may be required in the conduct of such work and the general promotion of the Bible College.
- (f) To sue and be sued in its corporate name and to enter into contracts of every type and nature.
  - (g) To solicit support, receive, collect, hold and receive by gift or

bequest personal property in any amount, money or other thing of value; to purchase real estate, to receive real estate that may be given, or devised to the college for achieving the legitimate ends of the college and to sell or mortgage the same as the need arises.

(h) To borrow money in payment of property; for erecting buildings and making improvements and for any other purpose germane to the

objectives and purposes of the college.

(i) To issue notes, bonds, debentures and other evidences of indebtedness and execute mortgages, liens and other incumbrances upon the property of the corporation, real or otherwise, to secure the payment of any such evidences of indebtedness.

(j) To transact any and all business connected with said College as

may be necessary to achieve the purposes of said College.

(k) To obtain under Internal Revenue Laws of the United States and of the Revenue Laws of the State of Oklahoma exmption from income property and other forms of taxation.

#### ARTICLE THREE

The location of this corporation shall be in Norman, Oklahoma.

#### ARTICLE FOUR

The duration of this corporation shall be pertetual.

#### ARTICLE FIVE

The general control of this corporation shall be vested in a Board of Trustees consisting of nine members, seven of which shall be elected by the delegates to the annual association of the Oklahoma Free Will Baptists; the elected members of said Board shall be elected to terms of seven years, six, five, four, three, two and one year respectively, provided, that each elected Trustee shall be a resident member of a regular Free Will Baptist church that is in good standing with the state association. The remaining two members, which are ex-officio, shall be the president of the College and the Executive Secretary of the State Association of Free Will Baptist of Oklahoma.

#### ARTICLE SIX

An executive committee consisting of the Chairman, Vice Chairman, and Secretary of the Board of Trustees shall possess all powers of the Board of Trustees between the stated meetings of the Board of Trustees.

#### ARTICLE SEVEN

All contracts for building construction shall be let only to persons or corporations posting a valid performance bond and recording the same in the Office of the County Clerk of Cleveland County, Oklahoma.

#### ARTICLE EIGHT

The College Board of Trustees shall be empowered to call special or extraordinary meetings of the State Association of Free Will Baptists of Oklahoma by mailing written notice to each delegate to the previous meeting of said Association or to the delegate's sponsoring church. Such notice shall be mailed not less than ten (10) days prior to the date of

said meeting. At such meetings, any matter stipulated in the notice, concerning the welfare of the College may be considered, including, but not limited to, finances, new bond issues, vacancies on the Board of Trustees and approval of new construction.

#### PRE-INCORPORATION AGREEMENT

Know all men by these presents:

WHEREAS, the undersigned are the duly elected Board of Trustees of Oklahoma Bible College, an unincorporated association sponsored by the Oklahoma Association of Free Will Baptists; and

WHEREAS, the advantage of incorporating a non-profit education corporation for the purposes of operating a Bible College dedicated to furthering the cause of Christ having been realized by each of us,

Now, therefore, in consideration of the mutual covenants hereinafter contained we do agree as follows:

- 1. To incorporate under the laws of the State of Oklahoma a non-profit educational corporation to be known as "Oklahoma Bible College, Inc.".
- 2. To file with the Secretary of State Articles of Incorporation that provide, inter alia, as follows:
- (a) The corporation, as a college, shall adhere to the theological position of the Oklahoma Association of Free Will Baptists.
- (b) The Corporation shall have a nine member Board of Trustees, consisting of the President of the College and the Executive Secretary of the State Association of Free Will Baptists of Oklahoma as ex-officio members, and seven members elected by the delegates of the annual sessions of the Oklahoma State Associations of Free Will Baptists. These delegates shall be all ordained ministers and deacons with membership in some local church which is a member of a District Association with membership in the State Association; the elected delegates from the various District Associations; five delegates from the Church Training Service; five delegates from the Woman's Auxiliary and five delegates from the Master's Men.
- (c) An executive committee empowered to set in behalf of the Board of Directors during interim consisting of the Chairman, the Vice Chairman, and the Secretary of the College Board of Trustees shall be created.
- (d) All contracts for building construction shall be let only to persons or corporations posting a valid performance bond and recording the same in the office of the County Clerk in Cleveland County, Oklahoma.
- (e) The College Board of Trustees shall be empowered to call special or extraordinary meetings of the State Association of Free Will Baptists of Oklahoma by mailing written notice to each delegate to the previous meeting of said Association or to the delegates sponsoring church. Such notice shall be mailed not less than ten (10) days prior to the date of said meeting. At such meetings any mater stipulated in the notice concerning the welfare of the College may be considered including, but not limited to, finances, new bond issues, vacancies on the Board of Trustees and approval of new construction.

- 3. To adopt by-laws consistent with the aforesaid Articles of Incorporation.
- 4. All contracts for construction shall, in accordance with the Articles of Incorporation, be let only to persons or corporations that can furnish valid performance bonds and record the same with the office of the County Clerk of Cleveland County, Oklahoma.

#### BY-LAWS OF MINISTER'S CONFERENCE

#### Article 1

The clerk or assistant clerk, or in their absence the senior minister in years, shall call the ministers into conference. If a quorum is present the President or in his absence the Vice President shall moderate the meeting. If neither of these are present, the senior minister in years shall be in charge.

#### Article 2

It shall be the duty of the clerk to enroll the ministers of the conference. Ministers shall present themselves with proper evidence of their rights to seats therein, and those enrolled by the clerk shall compose the conference. In case of questionable representation the case under question shall be referred to the Credential Committee.

#### Article 3

It shall be the duty of each minister belonging to this conference, to be active in pastoral or evangelistic services (disabled and retired ministers excepted.) Any minister belonging to this conference shall report in each session in person or by letter, and failing to do so for two successive sessions shall be subject to discipline.

#### Article 4

Each conference shall be opened by reading a portion of God's word and prayer, and each session shall be closed with prayer.

#### Article 5

By a two-thirds vote of the members present a ruling of the President may be overruled.

#### Article 6

This conference shall sit with open doors, except when it shall go into a committee as a whole.

#### Article 7

No member shall absent himself from the conference during its meeting without permission from the President.

#### Article 8

No person shall be allowed to nominate more than one member of a committee, unless person nominated is not elected.

#### Article 9

The President shall not allow discussion when not carried on in a Christian Spirit, or when he thinks it will cause discord.

#### Article 10

Anyone desiring to speak shall rise and address the President by the appelation "Brother President," But shall not speak further until recognized.

#### Article 11

No member of this conference shall be allowed to speak more than five minutes, nor twice on thesame subject without permission from the President.

#### Article 12

These By-Laws may be altered or amended at any regular or adjourned session of this conference by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

## CONSTITUTION OF MINISTER'S CONFERENCE Article 1

This Minister's Conference shall be called the Oklahoma State Free Will Baptist Minister's Conference, and shall be composed of Ordained Free Will Baptist Ministers who are regular members of some Orthodox Free Will Baptist church in the State of Oklahoma who have paid their \$1.00 ducs.

#### Article 2

The officers for this conference shall be President, Vice-President, Clerk, Asst. Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be elected annually.

#### Article 3

This conference shall have the power to discipline its members.

#### Article 4

Every ordained minister in the State of Oklahoma should be a member of this conference and is required to report in each session in person or by letter. Every member shall be required to carry a card of identification, and recommendation from this conference, and said card to be issued annually.

#### Article 5

This conference shall meet Semi-Annually.

#### Article 6

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any regular session.

#### MINUTES OF THE 23rd SEMI-ANNUAL OKLAHOMA STATE MINISTER'S CONFERENCE HELD CCTOBER 11, 1965 AT THE TOWER HEIGHTS FREE WILL BAPTIST CHURCH ARDMORE, OKLAHOMA

Mr. Sam Johnson, Director of the National C.T.S. department, informed us of the long range literature program, discussed the competitive activities, and shared the needs of the department with us.

Visiting ministers and laymen were recognized and welcomed.

The minutes and treasurer's report were read and approved.

Motion made and seconded to give a scholarship gift of \$100.00 to a

student of OBC. The receipient to be selected by the administration of OBC. The motion carried.

Rev. Ed Morris discussed the need of strict credential boards at the local level.

The following were elected as officers for the coming year: President, Rev. Jack Richey of Tecumseh, Oklahoma, Vice President, Rev. James Cearley of Wewoka, Oklahoma, and Clerk-Treasurer, Rev. Louis Wickham of Norman, Oklahoma.

The next meeting will be held at the Trinity Free Will Baptist Church, Oklahoma City, the first Tuesday in May.

The meeting adjourned with prayer.

#### ARTICLES OF FAITH OF STATE ASSOCIATION

- 1. THE BIBLE The Scriptures of the Old and New Testament were given by the inspiration of God, and are our infallible rule of faith and practice.
- 2. GOD There is one living and true God, revealed in nature as the Creator, Preserver and Righteous Governor of the Universe, and in the Scriptures as the Father, Son and Holy Ghost, yet as one God, infinitely wise and good, whom all intelligent creatures are supremely to love, adore and obey.
- 3. CHRIST Christ is God manifest in the flesh: in His divine nature truly God, in His human nature truly man. The mediator between God and man, once crucified. He is now risen and glorified is our everpresent Saviour and Lord.
- 4. THE HOLY SPIRIT The Scriptures assigns to the Holy Spirit all the attributes of God. He is the Reprover, Comforter, Guide and Sanctifier of all men.
- 5. THE GOVERNMENT OF GOD—God exercises a wise and benevolent providence over all beings and all things by maintaining the constitution and laws of nature. He also performs special acts of Grace, not otherwise provided for as highest welfare of man requires.
- 6. THE SINFULNESS OF MAN—Man was created innocent, but by disobedience fell into a state of sin and condemnation. His posterity, therefore, inherited a fallen nature of such tendencies that all who come to years of accountability, sin and become guilty before God.
- 7. THE WORK OF CHRIST—The Son of God, by His incarnation, life, sufferings, death, and resurrection effected for all a redemption from sin that is full and free and is the ground of salvation by faith.
- 8. THE TERMS OF SALVATION The conditions of salvation are: 1. Repentance or sincere sorrow for sin and the hearty renunciation of it. 2. Faith or the unreserved committal of one's self to Christ as Saviour and Lord, with purpose to love and obey Him in all things. In the exercise of saving faith the soul is renewed by the Holy Spirit; freed from the dominion of sin and becomes a child of God. 3. Continuance in faith and obedience until death.
- 9. ELECTION God determined from the beginning to save all who should comply with the conditions of salvation. Hence by faith in Christ, men become His elect.

- 10. FREEDOM OF WILL The Human will is free and self controlled, having power to yield to the influence of the truth and the Spirit and live, or to resist them and perish.
- 11. SALVATION FREE God desires the salvation of all, the Gospel invites all, the Holy Spirit strives with all, and whosoever will may come and take of the water of Life freely.
- 12. PERSEVERANCE All believers in Christ, who through grace persevere in holiness to the end of life, have the promise of eternal salvation.
- 13. GOSPEL ORDINANCE Baptism, or the immersion of believers in water, and the Lord's Supper, are ordinances to be perpetuated under the Gospel: Feet Washing, an ordinance teaching humility, of universal obligation, and to be administered to all true believers.
- 14. TITHING God commanded tithes and offerings in the Old Testament: Jesus Christ endorsed it in the Gospel (Matt. 23:23) and the Apostle Paul said, "Upon the first day of the week let every one of you lay by him in store as God hath prospered him." I Cor. 16:2.
- 15. THE CHRISTIAN SABBATH The divine law requires that one day in seven be set apart from secular employment and amusements for rest, worship, holy works and activities, and for personal communion with God.
- 16. RESURRECTION, JUDGMENT AND FINAL RETRIBUTION—The Scriptures teach the resurrection of all men at the last day. They that have done good will come forth to the resurrection of life, and they that have done evil unto the resurrection of damnation: then the wicked shall "go-away into eternal punishment but the righteous into eternal life."

#### RULES OF ORDER

- 1. At every sitting of the Association, business shall be opened and concluded by prayer by the Moderator or whomsoever he may request.
- 2. Ministers and deacons present are invited to seats, allowed to take part in debates on all subjects, and to vote.
- 3. Those who speak shall rise and address the Moderator. Personal reflections shall be avoided in all debates.
  - 4. No motion may be discussed until made and seconded.
- 5. When a motion has been made and seconded, and a member opposes its discussion, the Moderator shall put the question, "Shall it be discussed?" If negative, the question shall not be discussed.
- 6. If any proposition or motion under debate contains two or more points, it shall be divided at the request of any member, and the vote taken separately.
  - 7. Motions made and lost shall not be recorded.
- 8. No one shall speak more than twice on the same subject without special leave of the Moderator.
- 9. All questions shall be decided by a majority vote of all Members present.

#### BY LAWS OF STATE ASSOCIATION

- 1. The clerk or assistant clerk, or in their absence, the senior minister in years shall call the Association into conference, and if a quorum is present the moderator, or in has absence, the assistant moderator shall take charge; and if neither of them is present the senior minister in years shall act as Moderator.
- 2. It shall be the duty of the clerk to enroll the delegates to the Association, who shall present themselves with proper evidence of their rights to seats therein, and those enrolled by the clerk shall compose the Association.
- 3. It shall be the duty of every District belonging to this Association to send a letter to every annual session of this Association, reporting in the same, spiritual condition, benevolent work, and its statistics. Any District belonging to this Association, which shall fail to report itself for two successive sessions, may be dismissed from the Association by a two thirds vote of all members present.
- 4. Each meeting shall be opened by reading a portion of the Bible and with prayer, and shall be closed with prayer.
- 5. By a two-thirds vote of all members present, a ruling of the moderator can be overruled.
- 6. This Association may correspond by messenger or otherwise with other religious bodies.
- 7. This Association shall sit with open doors except when it shall go into a committee of the whole.
- 8. Any person not a member of this Association may be allowed to take part in its discussions by obtaining permission from the moderator.
- 9. It shall be the duty of all the Association to be present at the time appointed for each meeting, and anyone wishing to retire shall first obtain leave of the moderator.
- 10. No person shall be allowed to nominate more than one member of any committee, provided the person nominated be elected.
- 11. The moderator shall not allow discussions when not carried on in a Christian spirit or when he thinks it will cause discord or division.
- 12. Anyone desiring to speak shall rise to his feet and address the moderator by the appelation, "Brother Moderator," but shall not speak further until recognized by the moderator.
- 13. No member of this association shall be allowed to speak more than ten minutes nor twice on the same subject without permission from the moderator.
- 14. These By-Laws may be altered or amended at any regular or adjourned session of this Association by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

#### CONSTITUTION of STATE ASSOCIATION

PREAMBLE: From long experience, we the members of the Free Will Baptist denominations, being regularly baptised upon a profession of our faith in Jesus Christ, and realizing the necessity of a bond of union and fellowship among us as a church; and to preserve and maintain

correspondence and co-ordination with us, do therefore ordain this Constitution for our better denominational government.

#### Article I

NAME: This organization shall be known as the OKLAHOMA STATE ASSOCIATION OF FREE WILL BAPTIST.

#### Article II

PURPOSE: The object and purpose of this organization shall be to unify the work of the various bodies composing this State Association, and to devise and execute measures for the extension of the Kingdom of God in connection with the various bodies in the Association, or that may hereafter be represented therein.

#### Article III

REPRESENTATION: Section 1: This Association shall be composed of all ordained ministers and deacons with membership in some local church which is a member of a district Association with membership in the State Association.

Section 2: Each District Association shall be entitled to a number of elected delegates equal with the number of churches composing said Association. These delegates may be recommended by the local churches and shall be endorsed by their district association. Five delegates from the Church Training Service, Women's Auxiliary, and Master's Men.

#### Article IV

FINANCE: Each elected delegate shall be represented with a fee of Five dollars.

#### Article V

DISCIPLINE: This State Association shall have the right to settle any question of discipline, doctrine or practices that may properly come before it from any of the bodies composing said organization, furthermore if there be any question of discipline, doctrine or practices on the part of a subordinate association, delegates of that association shall not be seated until these questions have been settled to the satisfaction of the Credential Committee.

Section 2: Decisions of the Credential Committee may be appealed. (1) All appeals coming before the State Association when sitting in a Committee as a whole. (2) by special committee whose report shall be voted on without discussion.

#### Article VI

OFFICERS: The officers of the State Association shall consist of a Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk and Assistant Clerk, Parliamentarian, and an Executive Secretary, each of whom shall be elected at the close of each regular session, except the Executive Secretary, who shall be elected every two years.

Section 2: Committees, as necessary, shall be apointed by the moderator, unless otherwise provided for, and shall hold office until their work is completed, or until their successors are elected.

#### Article VII

BOARDS: All standing boards shall be composed of seven elected members who shall serve terms of 7, 6, 5, 4, 3, 2, and 1 years, and any ex-officio members provided for elsewhere. Ex-officio members shall not have a vote. The general board shall be composed of one member from each subordinate association, chairman of each standing board, and the state officers. The standing boards shall include the Executive Board, the Church Extension and Mission Board, College Board of Trustees, Superannuation Board, Sunday School Board, and Church Training Service Board. Each board shall elect a chairman and clerk-treasurer to act for one year and to be elected at the close of each annual state association. The Co-ordinating Board shall be composed of the executive secretary and the chairman from each standing board.

#### Article VIII

DUTIES AND RULES OF STANDING BOARDS: The Executive Board is elected at the discretion of the State Association of Free Will Baptists and shall act in behalf of the association when not in session, and shall have power and authority to elect such officers as might be deemed best for its own government and to carry out the plans and undertakings of the state association. To this Executive Board is further delegated power to collect funds and report and superintend such work for the field as may seem best and the means on hand may warrant, exclusive of College Board of Trustees.

This Executive Board shall keep a record of all work done, money raised, meetings held, and make a full and complete report to the regular meeting of the association and shall further receive and convey any property entrusted to said state association. They shall not have the power to purchase or sell any real estate property without the voice of the association.

The chairman and the secretary of said Executive Board shall sign all deeds, bonds, and notes, etc., and any other papers by which the State Association is to become legally responsible, exclusive of College Board of Trustees.

The board shall have the power to call the association in conference by notifying each Subordinating Association at least ten (10) days prior to conference.

- (2) GENERAL BOARD: It shall be the duty of this board to meet with the Executive Board one day preceeding the State Association to hear reports of the standing boards and to make recommendations to the State Association. They shall also serve as Credential Committee.
- (3) CHURCH EXTENSION AND MISSION BOARD: It shall be the duty of this board to work to promote an active missionary program in and for the State of Oklahoma.

It will also be their responsibility to investigate and assist, if necessary, any new church and, or, a church that cannot maintain itself. This board should thoroughly investigate the ability of a church to support an organization before assistance is pledged.

- COLLEGE BOARD OF TRUSTEES: It shall be the duty of this board to supervise and promote Oklahoma Bible College, Inc. and the function of this board shall be governed by the Articles of Incorporation and By-laws as adopted by the State Association of Free Will Baptists, adopted at the 1965 session.
- (5) CHURCH TRAINING SERVICE BOARD: It shall be the duty of this board to plan and assist in every way possible the C.T.S. work throughout the state. It will also be their responsibility to promote an active C.T.S. work in each Subordinate Association and to encourage C.T.S. institutes. It shall also be the duty of this board to plan and direct a State Youth Camp or Camps.
- (6) SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD: Their duties shall include the planning and operation of the State Sunday School Conventions, Institutes, and the encouragement of the organization of district conventions. They may carry through plans they think wise to actively promote Sunday School work in the state, and the publishing of literature deemed advisable by the State Association of Free Will Baptists.
- (7) SUPERANNUATION BOARD: This board working in cooperation with the National Superannuation Board and district boards, shall provide a definite program of superannuation for ministers.
- CO-ORDINATION BOARD: This board shall be charged with the responsibility of co-ordinating the work of the standing boards, and shall also act as Budget Committee. The Executive Secretary shall serve as chairman and the board shall meet at his discretion.
- FILLING OF VACANCIES: All boards shall have power to fill vacancies that may arise between sessions of the association, Such appointment valid only until next session of association.
- (10) Working agreement between the state association and the Executive Secretary of the State Association: That the Executive Secretary be paid a set salary and mileage and a two week paid vacation and all money received by him for speaking engagements, revivals and etc. shall be turned in by him to the Executive Office for the support of this office. He shall be ex-officio member of all standing boards.

#### Article IX

This constitution may be amended or altered at any regular session of the State Association by a two-thirds vote of members present, provided proposed amendment or alteration be presented in writing to the body one day in advance.

Article X

Elected delegates to State Association shall be retained as standing delegates for special called meetings.
