PROCEEDINGS OF THE STATE ASSOCIATION

The 59th annual session of the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists met October 17-19, 1967, in Ada, Oklahoma. The theme of the convention was "Retaining Our Heritage," with II Timothy 2:2 as the Scripture basis.

The opening hymn of the Association was "Jesus Saves," directed by Rev. Delbert Akin, with Lolita Kindrick as organist.

"Praise Him, Praise Him" and "Amazing Grace, were sung by the congregation.

The clerk, Rev. Waldo Young, introduced the officers of the State Association and called the convention into official session.

The moderator, Rev. Lonnie DaVoult, introduced the out of state visitors. Baptists met October 17-19, 1967, in Ada, Oklahoma. The theme of the convention theme for his remarks.

The moderator introduced the host pastor, Rev. Lynn Wood, who gave the welcome.

The song, "Blessed Assurance," was sung. A men's quartet from Arkansas composed of Mr. Bob Followwill, Rev. Rupert Pixley, Rev. Gilbert Pixley, and Rev. Lennard Crowder, sang two numbers, "Palms of Victory," and "Little is Much."

Christeen Jones from McAlester First Church sang, "I'm Building a Bridge."

Rev. E. E. Morris was introduced as the introductory speaker. He used I Timothy 4:16 and II Timothy 2:2 as a text, and brought the message on "Retaining Our Heritage Through Our Doctrine."

"How Firm A Foundation," was sung as a closing hymn. An offering was received for the expense of the association. After announcements were made, the benediction was prayed by Mr. Pete Connor.

The Wednesday morning session was called to order by the moderator. The song, "This is My Father's World," was directed by Rev. Delbert Akin, with Rev. Waldo Young as pianist. "The Light of the World is Jesus," was also sung.

The devotion was given by Rev. Scott Jones who read Isaiah 35:8-10. The moderator's admonition was based on I Corinthians 14:40.

The names of the delegates were read from the 16 associations. After corrections were made, the motion carried to seat the delegates.

Visiting brethren were introduced and welcomed.

Motion carried that the moderator appoint an assistant clerk for this session. Rev. Connie Cariker was appointed.

The host pastor was introduced, who introduced Mr. Ross Badgett, Mayor of Ada, who gave the welcome address.

Motion carried to adopt the program, with the time flexible.

The committees for this session of the state association were appointed as follows: Resolution Committee; Rev. Burton Perry, Rev. Kermit Argo, Rev. Albert Collier, Rev. Gayle Gardner, and Rev. Bill Ketchum. Obituary Committee; Rev. Carl Hembree, Mr. Bill Hunt, Rev. Willard Day, Rev. Clyde Hamar, and Rev. Ralph Hampton. The Temperance Committee; Rev. Earnest Harrison, Mr. Marvin Hawkins, Mr. Sonny Rose, Rev. Ray Gwartney, and Rev. Bob Ketchum. Placement Committee; Rev. Lynn Wood, Rev. Bailey Thompson, Rev. Roma Stewart, Rev. James Murray, and Rev. Buddy Biggs.

A statistical report was given by the clerk.

The report of the General Board was given by the clerk. Motion carried to receive the report and adopt it item by item. Item #1 was tabled. Motion carried to amend Item #2 to read, "The Executive Board and the Executive Secretary be instructed to enlarge the book store as soon as possible." Item #2 carried as amended. Item #3 was tabled.

The report of the Sunday School Board was given by Rev. Earnest Harrison. Motion carried to adopt the report.

Rev. James Murray gave the report of the Board of Church Extension and Missions. The report was adopted.

Rev. Henry Van Kluyve, Director of Deputation of the Foreign Missions Department, gave a report of National Foreign Missions.

The business meeting adjourned for the morning.

The Wednesday morning worship service opened with the congregation singing, "I Love to Tell The Story," and "How Great Thou Art." Rev. Jack Richey led in prayer. Mrs. Sue Wilcox sang, "Win the Lost at Any Cost."

Rev. Bob Shockey brought the message, using I Timothy 2:3-4, and the subject, "Retaining Our Heritage Through Evangelism." The Benediction was by Rev. J. B. Fletcher.

The Wednesday afternoon session opened with the song, "At the Cross," and prayer by Rev. Eugene Workman.

Rev. Lionel Cooksey brought the devotion from Isaiah 40: 28-31:

Rev. Clarence Shepherd gave the report of the State Executive Board. Motion carried to adopt the report item by item. Item #1 was adopted. Motion carried to make item #1 of the Executive Board report an article of Faith, placing it as #13 of the Articles of faith. Motion carried to defer items 2 and 3 until after the report of the Executive Secretary and the Book Store reports.

Rev. Rufus Coffey, National Association Executive Secretary, gave a report of the National work.

The report of the National Home Mission Department was given by Rev. Bob Shockey, Field Secretary.

Rev. N. R. Smith gave the report of the State Executive Secretary and the Bookstore. Motion carried to accept the report and adopt the budget.

The Wednesday afternoon session was adjourned.

The Wednesday evening service opened with the congregation singing, "I Love to Tell the Story," and "Glory to His Name," directed by Rev. Delbert Akin. Rev. W. V. McPhail led in prayer. Rev. Earnest Harrison presided over the Wednesday evening service. The offeratory prayer was led by Dr. J. D. O'Donnell.

Two other congregational songs were sung. They were, "At The Cross," and, "All The Way My Saviour Leads Me."

The State Ministers Quartet sang, "Until You've Known the Love of and, "All The Way My Saviour Leads Me."

Mr. Don Clark sang, "How Great Thou Art."

Rev. John H. West brought the message using II Timothy 2:15 as a text, preaching on the subject, "Retaining Our Heritage Through Training." The closing song was "Blest Be The Tie," with the benediction by Rev. Lonnie Sparks.

The Thursday morning session was called to order by the moderator. The congregation sang, "I Will Sing the Wondrous Story," and "Solid Rock."

Rev. Homer Young gave the morning Devotion, reading Isaiah 55: 1, 2.

Rev. Roma Stewart gave the Church Training Service Board Report. Motion carried to adopt the report with its budget.

Mr. Sam Johnson, Director of the National Church Training Service, gave a report of this work.

The Oklahoma Bible College Board of Trustees report was given by Rev. Jerry Rhoades, Chairman. Motion carried to adopt the report, the budget, and the building committee proposals.

Dr. Robert Picirilli, College Registrar, gave a report of the Free Will Baptist Bible College, Nashville, Tennessee.

The Superannuation Board report was given by Rev. Connie Cariker and adopted by the body, with the exception of the budget.

The report of the Coordinating Board was read by Rev. N. R. Smith. Motion carried to adopt the report.

Motion carried to take from the table the budget items of the Executive Department and the Superannuation Board. The cooperative allocation to the Executive Department was changed to 31%, and the allocation to the Superannuation Board was canceled.

Item #2 of the General Board report was taken from the table. The item carried.

Motion made to abolish the Superannuation Board and give all money in their treasure to Oklahoma Bible College. Motion carried to refer this to the resolution committee.

Members to the standing boards were elected as follows; Executive Board, Rev. Clarence Shepherd as the 7 year man and Rev. Connie Cariker as the 5 year man. Rev. Gayle Gardner was elected as the 7 year man to the CTS Board. To the Church Extension and Mission Board Rev. Delbert Akin was elected as the 7 year man, Rev. Burton Perry the 6 year man, and Rev. Jack Richey as the 2 year man.

The meeting was adjourned until the afternoon session.

Rev. Clarence Shepherd presided over the Thursday morning Worship service. The service was opened with singing, "Victory in Jesus," and "Have Faith in God." Rev. Bailey Thompson led in prayer. Rev. Thompson sang a solo, "Til the Storm Passes Over," The Ministers Quartet sang, "What a Day that will be," and "O, The Glory Did Roll." Rev. Vard Wood brought the morning message taken from II Timothy 4:8, "Retaining Our Heritage Through the Eminent Return of Christ." The benediction and blessing on the noon meal was by Dr. Robert Picirilli.

The Thursday afternoon session opened with the congregation singing, "Christ Returneth." The devotion was given by Rev. Carl Sharp. He read Isaiah 61: 1-3.

The election of the members to the standing boards resumed. Rev. Earnest Harrison was elected to the College Board of Trustees as the 7 year man and Mr. Bill Barber was elected as the 5 year man to this board.

It was necessary to elect four members to the Sunday School Board. They were elected as follows; Rev. Willard Day 7 year member, Mr. Wyman Straughan 4 year member, Rev. Milburn Wilson 2 year member, and Rev. Lonnie McAlister as 5 year member.

Rev. Lonnie DaVoult was elected to the Superannuation Board as the 7 year member.

Rev. Lonnie DaVoult was elected as the National Association General Board Member from Oklahoma.

The Woman's Auxiliary report was given by Mrs. Marguerite Hinesley. Motion carried to receive the report as information and enter it into the minutes.

Rev. Roger Reeds gave a report of the work of the National Sunday School Department.

Missionaries Lonnie Sparks and Earnie Deeds gave greetings from the fields where they are serving.

The report of the Master's Men was given by Wyman Straughan. Motion carried to accept the report and record it in the minutes.

The report of the Obituary Committee was read and approved. Rev. Willard Day led the congregation in prayer.

The report of the Temperance Committee was read and adopted.

The report of the Placement Committee was given. Motion carried that its recommendations be adopted.

The report of the Resolution Committee was given. Item #1 was adopted. Item #2 was referred to the Executive Board for their consideration. Item #3 was adopted. Item #4 was adopted.

The recommendation from the State Ministers Conference was read and adopted.

Motion carried to take from the table item #1 of the General Board report. The item was adopted.

Motion made to recommend to the National Association that the statement on backsliding and apostasy be placed in the Treatise. The motion was adopted.

The election of the officers was as follows;

Rev. Don Payne was elected Parliamentarian, Rev. Odell Nunley was elected as assistant clerk, Rev. Waldo Young was elected clerk, Rev. Homer Young was elected as Assistant Moderator, and Rev. Lynn Wood was elected as Moderator.

Motion carried to give the officers a standing vote of thanks.

After announcements were made, a motion was adopted to adjourn.

The Registration showed 436 visitors, 137 delegates, and 138 ministers registered for the State Association for a total of 711 in attendance.

THE REPORT OF THE GENERAL BOARD

The General Board of the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists met at Ada, Oklahoma, October 16, 1967. The meeting was opened with prayer by Rev. Roma Stewart.

Letters were read from 16 District Associations. A motion carried to accept the letters and seat the delegates.

The report of the State Sunday School Board was read by Rev. Earnest Harrison. Motion carried to accept the report.

The Executive Board Report was read by Rev. Clarence Shepherd. Motion carried to elect a committee of three to study the statement included in the report, and report back in the afternoon with a recommendation. The committee elected was Carl Hembree, Lonnie DaVoult, and Jerry Rhoades. A motion carried to table the Executive Board Report.

Rev. N. R. Smith gave the Report the Executive Office. The General Board recommends to the State Association that the delegate fee be raised from \$5.00 to \$10.00. Motion carried to accept the report of the Executive Office.

The first item of the afternoon was the reading of the report of the Bookstore by Rev. N. R. Smith. Motion carried that the Executive Board and the Executive Secretary be instructed to enlarge the bookstore as soon as possible. The Bookstore report was approved.

The Superannuation Board report was read by the clerk. Motion carried to accept the report.

The Church Training Service Board report was given by Rev. Roma Stewart. Motion carried to accept the report.

The report of the special committee was given. Motion carried to amend the statement in the Executive Board report to conform to the special committee report.

Motion carried to accept the entire Executive Board report.

The report of the Oklahoma Bible College Board of Trustees was read. The proposed expansion of facilities was explained. Motion carried to accept these reports.

The report of the Coordinating Board was read. Motion carried to accept the report.

Motion carried that the cooperative percentage now given to the Superannuation Board be given to the Executive Department as of November 1, 1967, changing the Superannuation allocation to nothing, and the Executive Department to 31%.

Motion carried to adjourn.

STATE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD REPORT

The Sunday School Board completed another successful year. Accomplishing many things in the churches of the Oklahoma State Association. The fine spirit of co-operation and continued interest shown this past year has been greatly appreciated.

The Sunday School Board conducted eleven institutes during the past year. Any church that would like the Board to conduct an institute or leadership development in your church or area should contact any member of the Board and they will be happy to make the necessary arrangements.

We want to emphasize that local pastors should be encouraged to qualify to teach the E.T.T.A. courses to their Sunday School and church leaders. Tentative plans for an area-wide Sunday School Rally are being considered for sometime next spring. We desire your prayers and continued support that our efforts will help to develop better Sunday Schools and church administrators within the churches of the State Association.

STATE MISSION BOARD REPORT

The State Mission Board has held eleven (11) meetings since our last report was given. We meet once a month unless a special called meeting is necessary.

Missions giving in the state of Oklahoma continues to increase. The amount given in 1966 was as follows: Foreign Missions, \$45,527.52 and Home Missions \$22,023.28. Quotas for the state are: Foreign Missions 1966, \$45,000. Foreign Missions 1967, \$45,000.00; National Home Missions 1966, \$21,000.00 and National Home Missions 1967, \$21,000.00.

We have continued to assist in arranging itinerant services when our help was needed.

The Board has continued supporting the work in Southeast Tulsa in co-operation with the First Mission Association. Our support is \$35.00 per week of a \$100.00 per week salary. Last year our report stated the Church was in process of purchasing land for a permanent building site. The land was purchased at 1801 South Garnett Road. Our Board wrote a check for \$1,500.00 to help in the purchase of this land. A letter was mailed to members of the New Church Club to assist in the \$1,500.00. The Southeast Church is meeting in Cooper Elementary School, 1808 South 123 East Ave., Tulsa, Oklahoma.

A request for assistance in securing a pastor was received by the Board in our October meeting from the Altus Church. We worked in co-operation with the Union Association in securing Rev. Allen Wood. We paid \$125.00 toward Rev. Wood's moving expense and a salary of \$100.00 per week for four weeks to give him time to get settled and find a job. The Board has stayed in close contact with the Church since that time. In our July meeting of this year we received and accepted a request to assume the financial responsibilities of the Church since only one family was left and they were planning to leave soon.

Rev. Homer Willis, National Home Director, met with our Board at Oklahoma Bible College. He brought greetings from the National Office and expressed appreciation to the State of Oklahoma for their giving to National Home Missions.

We are still considering a full time man to work in church extension, promotion and missionary conference and revival work. His title would be State Missions Director. No set time has been decided for the beginning of this office. Securing the right man and some plan of finance will be necessary before we begin.

The work in Yukon is in co-operation with the First Oklahoma Association. Rev. Clarence Bruce, Jr. has moved to Yukon as pastor. The board is paying \$35.00 per week of a \$105.00 per week salary. They are presently holding services in the IOOF Lodge building until a permanent site is secured. Attendance to date is an average of 35. This group now has in excess of \$500.00 in their building fund. If you know of any Free Will Baptist living in Yukon please contact us.

State Missions Month is December. State Missions Sunday is December 17th this year. We encourage each church to receive an offering for State Missions on this Sunday. Our appreciation is expressed to the churches and individuals for your co-operation the past year.

We request 6% of the Co-operative receipts.

EXECUTIVE BOARD REPORT

The Oklahoma State Executive Board met five times during the year. We have lost one member of our board, Rev. Fred McCoy, who moved to Nashville, Tennessee.

The new PROMOTER is now being mailed to approximately 6,000 homes. It has had good reception.

The Free Will Baptist Bookstore has had over \$41,000.00 in gross sales which is a record. We feel the bookstore has rendered a needed service to the Free Will Baptists of this area. We commend Brother Curtis Hogue in a job well done.

An Executive Typewriter and a Headliner have been purchased for use in the publication of the PROMOTER. Address plates, storage cabinets for the plates, and a folding machine have been purchased jointly with the Oklahoma Bible College for use by the Bible College and the Executive Department.

The Executive Board adopted a statement in its August meeting concerning backsliding and apostasy. This is the statement the Board adopted.

Be it resolved that we, the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists, go on record that we believe a person who has been regenerated or born again and is living in unconfessed, unforgiven sin, is rebellious to the principles of the Kingdom of God and His righteousness, and therefore is a backslider in a lost condition who must repent and be restored to the right relationship with God, or be eternally lost.

We recognize, according to Hebrews 6:4-6, that it is possible for a person to get in the condition that he could never return to Christ. This, we believe, is apostasy. However, we also recognize that a regenerate person can fall into sin, be in a lost condition and still not be an apostate. This person, through repentance, can be reconciled to God.

PRESENT SITUATION

- Dormitory: Space built to accommodate 30 students now housing 36.
- Classroom: Number of classrooms sufficient for this year, but area too small. Three classes with 37, 39, 41 in attendance are meeting in classroom built to seat around 25.
- Kitchen: Insufficient storage, refrigeration, and food preparation space.
- Dining hall: Sufficient for dormitory student body. Insufficient for special occasions or any number of visitors.
- Music education: Disturbs all areas of work because of its adjacency to administrative offices, library, and other classes.
- Lounge space: Very cramped. Students must have space to move around.
- Recreation facilities: These are nil. Must make some arrangements to fill recreation needs.

CONSTRUCTION NEEDS

A construction program which would house 144 students on campus when completed. This will give needed facilities for all areas of academic work and a student body of 200. This would require the following in addition to present facilities:

- 1 men's dormitory to house 60 students
- 1 women's dormitory to house 60 students
- 1 multi-purpose building to house kitchen, dining hall, chapel and library (or classrooms).

No. 6. That we as Free Will Baptists go on record that we are opposed to any type of gambling, whether raffles, Pari-mutuel betting, questionable contests and card playing.

No. 7. Since we are confronted with a break down in moral fiber of the family life, we recommend that the State Association of Free Will Baptists go on record encouraging our members to be temperate in television viewing, movies and that we not patronize any business who sells filthy literature.

THE PLACEMENT COMMITTEE REPORT

Having received a request from the Free Will Baptist Church of Guymon asking that the State Association be relocated for 1968 session, we recommend that this Association meet with the Southern Oaks Free Will Baptist Church (Formerly Central Avenue) of Oklahoma City for the 1968 session and Tulsa for the 1969 session.

RECOMMENDATION FROM THE STATE MINISTERS CONFERENCE

The State Ministers Conference of Oklahoma Free Will Baptist recommend to the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists the following resolution:

Be it resolved that the State Executive Board investigate the possibilities of a ministers group hospitalization program.

Be it further resolved that when a suitable program is found that they begin such a program with the State Executive Office as the collecting agency with the recommendation that each church provide this benefit for the pastor. If the church does not provide this service for their pastor, the pastor may provide it personally.

Be it further resolved that the individual participating be responsible to see that funds are collected on or before the date set by the State Executive Office and the State Association is not responsible for late or uncollected funds.

OKLAHOMA BIBLE COLLEGE, INC.

BY-LAWS

BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The Board of Trustees of Oklahoma Bible College shall be composed of nine members, as provided in the charter of the College:

ARTICLE A—OFFICERS: The officers of the board of Trustees shall be a chairman, an Assistant Chairman, and a Secretary, each of whom shall be elected by the Board for a term of one year. They shall continue in office until their successors have been chosen:

Item 1—CHAIRMAN: The chairman of the Board of Trustees or his assistant shall preside at all meetings of the Board. He shall be an ex-officio member of the Executive Committee.

Item 2—SECRETARY: The Secretary shall record and preserve minutes of all meetings and acts of the Board of Trustees and countersign all deeds, conveyances, and other papers authorized by the Board. He shall have authority to call special meetings of the Trustees of the College upon the written request of two-thirds of the members of the Board; he shall mail notice of said meeting to the trustees ten (10) days in advance.

Item 3—EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE: The Executive Committee shall consist of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, the Vice-Chairman of the Board, the Secretary of the Board. The Executive Committee shall have authority to consider and act upon all questions affecting the Bible College which may be brought before it between the stated meetings of the Board, or whenever it is deemed impractical to convene the entire Board, or a quorum of the Board fails to attend a called or regular meeting. It shall transact such business as may be committed to it by the Board and shall act for the College on such matters as it may submit to it. The Committee shall meet at the call of the Chairman or the President of the College.

ARTICLE B—MEETINGS: The Board of Trustees shall meet each year at a time and place agreed upon by the Board. It shall, also, hold

special meetings whenever called in accordance with the By-Laws of the Board. Such special meetings may be called by either the chairman of the Board, or the President of the College.

ARTICLE C—QUORUM: A majority of the members of the Board of Trustees of Oklahoma Bible College in attendance at any called or regular meeting, written notice of which has been mailed by the Secretary to each trustee, shall constitute a quorum. No proxy votes shall be permitted. No ex-officio member shall be entitled to vote at meetings of the Board of Trustees.

ARTICLE D—ELECTIONS: In all elections held by the Board of Trustees each member present except ex-officio members shall be entitled to one vote, and the result shall be determined by a majority of the votes cast. Due notice of any election must be personal notice to the members or a day on the minutes of the Board not less than one week preceding the election.

TERMS

SECTION II OFFICERS OF THE BIBLE COLLEGE

The officers of Oklahoma Bible College shall be a President, Vice-President, Dean, and a Business Manager, each of whom shall be elected by the Board of Trustees to hold office for two years exclusive of the President whose term of office shall be indefinite. It is provided, however, that retirement of any one of the officers herein named may occur at any time upon the resignation of the officer or the request of the Board. In either case, notice shall be given six weeks before the date of the proposed retirement unless otherwise agreed upon by the concerned parties.

ITEM ONE—PRESIDENT: The President shall be executive officer of the Board of Trustees and shall have general control of the College including its officers, teachers, students, and business. He shall render to the Board complete annual reports and to its chairman, Executive Committee or other committees such information as may be deemed essential to a thorough knowledge of the operation of the College and its promotion. He shall be a member of the Board of Trustees ex-officio and the Executive Committee ex-officio and shall have the rights and privileges of a member of the Board except voting. The President shall execute all documents, instruments, and conveyances on behalf of the College. Duties of the president and working relationship shall be further detailed in a format approved by the Board of Trustees.

ITEM TWO—VICE PRESIDENT: The Vice-President shall perform all the duties of the President in the absence of the later.

ITEM THREE—DEAN: The Academic Dean of the Bible College shall, under the President, fix the hours of recitation, govern, control, and regulate the conduct of the students, have general oversight of curriculum, student's records, and such other internal details and administrative duties as may be delegated to him by the President of the College.

ITEM FOUR—BUSINESS MANAGER: The Treasurer shall keep an accurate record of all accounts of the College and shall receive and expend as directed by the Board of Trustees and President, all money for the expenses of the institution. He shall make an annual report to the Board and furnish the Executive Committee with such information pertaining to his office as may be requested. He shall provide bond in whatever amount the Board may require. Until such times as the Board of Trustees may deem

different the Treasurer's office shall be contained within the Business Manager's Office. The Business Manager may at the direction of the administration designate this duty to a subordinate officer. The Business Manager shall have general supervision of the financial business of the College, and shall, at the direction of the President, be responsible for the upkeep of all the physical facilities and premises of the College. His detailed duties are directed in a format approved by the Board of Trustees.

SECTION III FACULTY

The faculty shall consist of the President, the Dean, and all teachers of Oklahoma Bible College. Instructors and assistant teachers shall have the privilege of sitting with the faculty in stated meetings but shall not have the right of voting.

It shall be the policy of the Oklahoma Bible College to employ on its faculty those who are members of Free Will Baptist churches that are affiliated with the National Association. Emergencies, however arising from the resignation, illness, death, or approved leaves of absence of faculty members may be relieved by the temporary employment of instructors who are affiliated with any evangelical denomination. Part-time or short-term instructors, deemed essential to the successful prosecution of a consistent education program, may be employed at the discretion of the President without respect of denominational affiliation.

The faculty, under the authority and jurisdiction of the President, shall have general charge of instruction, attendance of students, examinations, administration of curriculum, discipline, and all matters involving the spiritual, physical, and social welfare of the Bible College. The faculty shall be hired upon recommendation of the President.

In the selection of the faculty qualitative factors shall be kept in mind. All faculty members shall be urged to pursue graduate programs in their respective fields. Except in special cases no faculty member will be required to teach courses outside of his field.

SECTION IV ACADEMIC COUNCIL

The Academic Council shall consist of the President, the Dean and the heads of the departments of Oklahoma Bible College: It shall determine the curriculum and academic policy of the College, prescribe requirements for admission, certificates, diplomas, and degrees, and supervise the courses of instruction offered by the various departments of the College.

SECTION V CONTRACTS

The Board of Trustees shall establish the College policy involving the execution of contracts, deeds of conveyance, the determination of salaries, and employment of all officers, representatives, faculty members and essential domestic and maintenance employees. The President of the College shall negotiate agreements, execute contracts, employ representatives, and supply vacancies incurred by the termination of contracts, resignations, or death of any essential employees. All contracts for building construction shall be let only to persons or corporations posting a valid performance bond and recording the same in the Office of the County Clerk of Cleveland County, Oklahoma.

SECTION VI ADVISORY COUNCIL

An advisory council shall be formed which is to be composed of interested, qualified persons in the various fields which will be of value in building and maintaining a strong academic program to carry out the educational program stated in the charter.

SECTION VII AMENDMENT

These By-Laws may be amended by a favorable vote of two-thirds of the qualified members of the Board of Trustees of Oklahoma Bible College at any meeting of the Board, provided that the proposed amendment has been submitted in writing to each Trustee one month in advance. This change to be subject to the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists.

SECTION VIII ADMINISTRATIVE FUNCTIONS

The President of the Oklahoma Bible College shall be elected by the Board of Trustees, and he shall act for and on behalf of the Board in the Conduct and management of the institution. He shall also be a member of the Board of Trustees ex-officio and of the Executive committee ex-officio, and his duties, powers and term of office shall be prescribed in the by-laws of the College and a format approved by the Board of Trustees.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF THE OKLAHOMA BIBLE COLLEGE INC.

Know all men by these presents, that, we whose names are hereunto subscribed, do hereby associate ourselves together for the purpose of forming a corporation under the provisions of the corporation laws of the State of Oklahoma, and for that purpose state:

ARTICLE ONE

The name of this corporation shall be OKLAHOMA BIBLE COLLEGE, INC.

ARTICLE TWO

The purpose of this corporation shall be the creation, establishment and maintenance of a college and institution of higher learning devoted to the promotion and impartation of higher learning, Christian education and such other education, instruction, learning, training and research as may be deemed essential for the cause of Christ and to that end prescribe courses of study and grant degrees. The doctrinal and theological position of this institution shall be that of the sponsoring denomination, Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists and the treatise of the National Association of Free Will Baptist as endorsed by the state body, and in connection therewith, in accordance with the stipulation of the Constitution and By-Laws of the State Association of Free Will Baptists, Inc.

(a.) To prescribe courses of study for both resident and correspondence students, which shall include general education in the arts, Christian Ministries of Service and Biblical studies for wisdom; said courses to be taught in both a Junior College Division and a Bible College Division, and to award degrees, either graduate or post-graduate, to those persons satis-

DISSOLUTION

factorily completing the prescribed courses of study and to grant such other literary honors, including honorary degrees, as shall be deemed advisable.

(b.) To charge and collect tuition as determined by the Board of Trustees and to create scholarships.

(c.) To employ professors, instructors and other subordinate employees as may be necessary for the proper conduct of the college under the direction and control of the President of the College, with the advice and consent of the majority of the Board of Trustees.

(d.) To institute and carry on missions and commissions for missionary purposes and investigations.

(e.) To publish and distribute such pamphlets, literature or books as may be required in the conduct of such work and the general promotion of the Bible College.

(f.) To sue and be sued in its corporate name and to enter into contracts of every type and nature.

(g.) To solicit support, receive, collect, hold and receive by gift or bequest personal property in any amount, money or other thing of value; to purchase real estate, to receive real estate that may be given, or devised to the college for achieving the legitimate ends of the college and to sell or mortgage the same as the need arises.

(h.) To borrow money in payment of property for erecting buildings and making improvements and for any other purpose germane to the objectives and purposes of the college.

(i.) To issue notes, bonds, debentures and other evidences of indebtedness and execute mortgages, liens and other incumbrances upon the property of the corporation, real or otherwise, to secure the payment of any such evidences of indebtedness.

(j.) To transact any and all business connected with said College as may be necessary to achieve the purposes of said College.

(k.) To obtain under Internal Revenue Laws of the United States and of the Revenue Laws of the State of Oklahoma exemption from income property and other forms of taxation.

ARTICLE THREE

The location of this corporation shall be in Norman, Oklahoma.

ARTICLE FOUR

The duration of this corporation shall be perpetual.

ARTICLE FIVE

The general control of this corporation shall be vested in a Board of Trustees consisting of nine members, seven of which shall be elected by the delegates to the annual association of the Oklahoma Free Will Baptists: the elected members of said Board shall be elected to terms of seven years, six, five, four, three, two and one year respectively, provided, that each elected Trustee shall be a resident of a regular Free Will Baptist church that is in good standing with the state association. The remaining two members, which are ex-officio, shall be the president of the College and the Executive Secretary of the State Association of Free Will Baptist of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE SIX

An executive committee consisting of the Chairman, Vice Chairman, and

Secretary of the Board of Trustees shall possess all powers of the Board of Trustees between the stated meetings of the Board of Trustees.

ARTICLE SEVEN

All contracts for building construction shall be let only to persons or corporations posting a valid performance bond and recording the same in the office of the County Clerk of Cleveland County, Oklahoma.

ARTICLE EIGHT

The College Board of Trustees shall be empowered to call special or extraordinary meetings of the State Association of Free Will Baptists of Oklahoma by mailing written notice to each delegate to the previous meeting of said Association or to the delegate's sponsoring church. Such notice shall be mailed not less than ten (10) days prior to the date of said meeting. At such meetings, any matter stipulated in the notice, concerning the welfare of the College may be considered, including, but not limited to, finances, new bond issues, vacancies on the Board of Trustees and approval of new construction.

SECTION IX AMENDMENTS

This charter may be hereafter amended subject to the provisions contained herein and the laws of the State of Oklahoma. It is provided, however, that the Trustees of the Bible College shall not propose or apply for any amendment which has not been previously authorized by an act of the Oklahoma State Association.

CONSTITUTION OF MINISTER'S CONFERENCE

ARTICLE 1

This Minister's Conference shall be called the Oklahoma State Free Will Baptist Minister's Conference, and shall be composed of Ordained Free Will Baptist Ministers who are regular members of some Orthodox Free Will Baptist church in the State of Oklahoma who have paid their \$1.00 dues.

ARTICLE 2

The officers for this conference shall be President, Vice-President, Clerk, Assist. Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be elected annually.

ARTICLE 3

This conference shall have the power to discipline its members.

ARTICLE 4

Every ordained minister in the State of Oklahoma should be a member of this conference and is required to report in each session in person or by letter. Every member shall be required to carry a card of indentification, and recommendation from this conference, and said card to be issued annually.

ARTICLE 5

This conference shall meet Semi-Annually.

ARTICLE 6

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any regular session.

BY-LAWS OF MINISTER'S CONFERENCE

ARTICLE 1

The clerk or assistant clerk, or in their absence the senior minister in years shall call the ministers into conference. If a quorum is present the President or in his absence the Vice President shall moderate the meeting. If neither of these are present, the senior minister in years shall be in charge.

ARTICLE 2

It shall be the duty of the clerk to enroll the ministers of the conference. Ministers shall present themselves with proper evidence of their rights to seats therein, and those enrolled by the clerk shall compose the conference. In case of questionable representation the case under question shall be referred to the Credential Committee.

ARTICLE 3

It shall be the duty of each minister belonging to this conference, to be active in pastoral or evangelistic services (disabled or retired ministers

excepted.) Any minister belonging to this conference shall report in each session in person or by letter, and failing to do so for two successive sessions shall be subject to discipline.

ARTICLE 4

Each conference shall be opened by reading a portion of God's word and prayer, and each session shall be closed with prayer.

ARTICLE 5

By a two-thirds vote of the members present ruling of the President may be overruled.

ARTICLE 6

This conference shall sit with open doors, except when it shall go into a committee as a whole.

ARTICLE 7

No member shall absent himself from the conference during its meeting without permission from the President.

ARTICLE 8

No person shall be allowed to nominate more than one member of a committee, unless person nominated is not elected.

ARTICLE 9

The President shall not allow discussion when not carried on in a Christian Spirit, or when he thinks it will cause discord.

ARTICLE 10

Anyone desiring to speak shall rise and address the President by the appellation "Brother President," But shall not speak further until recognized.

ARTICLE 11

No member of this conference shall be allowed to speak more than five minutes, nor twice on the same subject without permission from the President.

ARTICLE 12

These By-Laws may be altered or amended at any regular or adjourned session of this conference by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

OKLAHOMA MINISTERS CONFERENCE MINUTES

The Oklahoma State Ministers Conference convened with the Tulsa First Free Will Baptist Church May 9, 1967. The meeting was called to order by the President, Rev. James Cearley.

The congregational singing was directed by Rev. Delbert Akin. The morning devotion was given by Rev. Buddy Biggs. The Messangers Quartet provided special music.

The messages of the morning were:

"The Word of God and Prayer," by Rev. Joe Haas, and "The Word of God and Stewardship," by Rev. N. R. Smith.

Special music for the Morning Worship service was by Rev. Delbert Akin. Rev. John West brought the message on, "The Church Reflects the Word of God."

The afternoon session was opened by Rev. James Cearley, president. Special music was provided by Rev. Delbert Akin, Rev. Homer Young, and Rev. Waldo Young. The afternoon devotion was given by Rev. John McAlester.

The messages of the afternoon were; "The Word of God and Education," by Dr. J. D. O'Donnell, and "The Word of God, My Community and Missions," by Rev. James Murray.

The minutes were read and approved. Finance report was given. A motion carried to give \$40.00 to O. B. C.

45 ministers were present for the meeting

The State Ministers Conference met at Ada, Oklahoma, October 17, 1967. The meeting was called to order by Rev. James Cearley, president. Rev. Delbert Akin led in congregational singing and arranged the special music.

Rev. Rufus Coffey, National Executive Secretary, spoke on, "The Outreach of the National Association of Free Will Baptists."

The afternoon session opened with singing. Rev. Kermit Argo brought the afternoon devotion. Rev. Lonnie Sparks, missionary to Africa, brought a message on, "The Outreach of Free Will Baptists in Africa. Rev. Earnie Deeds, Missionary to Brazil, brought a message on "The Outreach of Free Will Baptists in South America."

The minutes and the treasurer's report was given and approved. The next meeting will be at the Lewis Avenue Free Will Baptist Church in Tulsa, on May 14, 1968.

A motion was approved to recommend to the State Association that a group hospitalization plan be started for the ministers of the state. (see the recommendation in this minutes).

The officers elected were; Rev. F. A. McCage, President; Rev. Floyd Vulgamore, Vice President; and Rev. Charles A Bigger, Secretary-Treasurer. The Meeting adjourned.

ARTICLES OF FAITH OF STATE ASSOCIATION

1. THE BIBLE—The Scriptures of the Old and New Testament were given by the inspiration of God, and are our infallible rules of faith and practice.

2. GOD—There is one living and true God, revealed in nature as the Creator, Preserver and Righteous Governor of the Universe, and in the Scriptures as the Father, Son and Holy Ghost, yet as one God, infinitely wise and good, whom all intelligent creatures are supremely to love, adore and obey.

3. CHRIST—Christ is God manifest in the flesh: in His divine nature truly God, in His human nature truly man. The mediator between God and man, once crucified. He is now risen and glorified is our ever-present Saviour and Lord.

4. THE HOLY SPIRIT—The Scriptures assigns to the Holy Spirit all the attributes of God. He is the Reprover, Comforter, Guide and Sanctifier of all men.

5. THE GOVERNMENT OF GOD—God exercises a wise and benevolent providence over all beings and all things by maintaining the constitution and laws of nature. He also performs special acts of Grace, not other-

wise provided for as highest welfare of man requires.

6. **THE SINFULNESS OF MAN**—Man was created innocent, but by disobedience fell into a state of sin and condemnation. His posterity, therefore inherited a fallen nature of such tendencies that all who come to years of accountability, sin and become guilty before God.

7. **THE WORK OF CHRIST**—The Son of God, by His incarnation, life, sufferings, death, and resurrection effected for all a redemption from sin that is full and free and is the ground of salvation by faith.

8. **THE TERMS OF SALVATION**—The conditions of salvation are: 1. Repentance or sincere sorrow for sin and the hearty renunciations of it. 2. Faith or the unreserved committal of one's self to Christ as Saviour and Lord, with purpose to love and obey Him in all things. In the exercise of saving faith the soul is renewed by the Holy Spirit; freed from the dominion of sin and becomes a child of God. 3. Continuance in faith and obedience until death.

9. **ELECTION**—God determined from the beginning to save all who should comply with the conditions of salvation. Hence by faith in Christ, men become His elect.

10. **FREEDOM OF WILL**—The Human will is free and self controlled, having power to yield to the influence of the truth and the Spirit and live, or to resist them and perish.

11. **SALVATION FREE**—God desires the salvation of all, the Gospel invites all, the Holy Spirit strives with all, and whosoever will many come and take of the water of life freely.

12. **PERSEVERANCE**—All believers in Christ, who through grace persevere in holiness to the end of life, have the promise of eternal salvation.

13. **BACKSLIDING AND APOSTASY**—A person who has been regenerated or born again and is living in unconfessed, unforgiven sin, is rebellious to the principles of the Kingdom of God and His righteousness, and therefore is a backslider in a lost condition who must repent and be restored to the right relationship with God or be eternally lost.

We recognize, according to Hebrews 6: 4-6, that it is possible for a person to get in the condition that he could never return to Christ. This, we believe, is Apostasy. However, we also recognize that a regenerate person can fall into sin, be in a lost condition and still not be an Apostate. This person, through repentance, can be reconciled to God.

14. **GOSPEL ORDINANCES**—Baptism, or the immersion of believers in water, and the Lord's Supper, are ordinances to be perpetuated under the Gospel: Feet Washing, an ordinance teaching humility, of universal obligation, and to be administered to all true believers.

15. **TITHING**—God commanded tithes and offerings in the Old Testament: Jesus Christ endorsed it in the Gospel (Matt. 23: 23), and the Apostle Paul said, "Upon the first day of the week let every one of you lay by him in store as God hath prospered him." I Cor. 16: 2.

16. **THE CHRISTIAN SABBATH**—The divine law requires that one day in seven be set apart from the secular employment and amusements for rest, worship, holy works and activities, and for personal communion with God.

17. **RESURRECTION, JUDGEMENT AND FINAL RETRIBUTION**—The Scriptures teach the resurrection of all men at the last day. They that have done good will come forth to the resurrection of life, and they that

have done evil unto the resurrection of damnation: then the wicked shall "Go away into eternal punishment but the righteous into eternal life."

RULES OF ORDER

1. At every sitting of the Association, business shall be opened and concluded by prayer by the Moderator or whomsoever he may request.

2. Ministers and deacons present are invited to seats, allowed to take part in debates on all subjects, and to vote.

3. Those who speak shall rise and address the Moderator. Personal reflections shall be avoided in all debates.

4. No motion may be discussed until made and seconded.

5. When a motion has been made and seconded, and a member opposes its discussion, the Moderator shall put the question. "Shall it be discussed?" if negative, the question shall not be discussed.

6. If any proposition or motion under debate contains two or more points, it shall be divided at the request of any member, and the vote taken separately.

7. Motions made and lost shall not be recorded.

8. No one shall speak more than twice on the same subject without special leave of the Moderator.

9. All questions shall be decided by a majority vote of all Members present.

BY LAWS OF STATE ASSOCIATION

1. The Clerk or assistant clerk, or in their absence, the senior minister in years shall call the Association into conference, and if a quorum is present the moderator, or in his absence, the assistant moderator shall take charge; and if neither of them is present the senior minister in years shall act as Moderator.

2. It shall be the duty of the clerk to enroll the delegates to the Association, who shall present themselves with proper evidence of their rights to seats therein, and those enrolled by the clerk shall compose the Association.

3. It shall be the duty of every District belonging to this Association to send a letter to every annual session of this Association reporting in the same, spiritual condition, benevolent work, and its statistics. Any District belonging to this Association, which shall fail to report itself for two successive sessions, may be dismissed from the Association by a two thirds vote of all members present.

4. Each meeting shall be opened by reading a portion of the Bible and with prayer, and shall be closed with prayer.

5. By a two-thirds vote of members present, a ruling of the moderator can be overruled.

6. This Association may correspond by messenger or otherwise with other religious bodies.

7. This Association shall sit with open doors except when it shall go into a committee of the whole.

8. Any person not a member of this Association may be allowed to take part in its discussions by obtaining permission from the moderator.

9. It shall be the duty of all the Association to be present at the time appointed for each meeting, and anyone wishing to retire shall first obtain leave of the moderator.

10. No person shall be allowed to nominate more than one member of any committee, provided the person nominated be elected.

11. The moderator shall not allow discussions when not carried on in a Christian spirit or when he thinks it will cause discord or division.

12. Anyone desiring to speak shall rise to his feet and address the moderator by the appellation "Brother Moderator," but shall not speak further until recognized by the moderator.

13. No members of this association shall be allowed to speak more than ten minutes nor twice on the same subject without permission from the moderator.

14. These By-Laws may be altered or amended at any regular or adjourned session of this Association by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

CONSTITUTION OF STATE ASSOCIATION

PREAMBLE: From long experience, we the members of the Free Will Baptists denomination, being regularly baptized upon a profession of our faith in Jesus Christ, and realizing the necessity of a bond of union and fellowship among us as a church; and to preserve and maintain correspondence and co-ordination with us, do therefore ordain this Constitution for our better denomination government.

ARTICLE I

NAME: This organization shall be known as the OKLAHOMA STATE ASSOCIATION OF FREE WILL BAPTISTS.

ARTICLE II

PURPOSE: The object and purpose of this organization shall be to unify the work of the various bodies composing this State Association, and to devise and execute measures for the extension of the Kingdom of God in connection with the various bodies in the Association, or that may hereafter be represented therein.

ARTICLE III

REPRESENTATION: Section 1. This Association shall be composed of all ordained ministers and deacons with membership in some local church which is a member of a district Association with membership in the State Association.

Section 2: Each District Association shall be entitled to a number of elected delegates equal with the number of churches composing said Association. These delegates may be recommended by the local churches and shall be endorsed by their district association.

ARTICLE IV

FINANCE: Each elected delegate shall be represented with a fee of ten dollars.

ARTICLE V

DISCIPLINE: This State Association shall have the right to settle any question of discipline, doctrine or practices that may properly come before it from any of the bodies composing said organization, furthermore if there be any question of discipline, doctrine or practices on the part of a subordinate association, delegates of that association shall not be seated until

these questions have been settled to the satisfaction of the Credential Committee.

Section 2: Decisions of the Credential Committee may be appealed. (1) All appeals coming before the State Association when sitting in a Committee as a whole. (2) by special committee whose report shall be voted on without discussion.

ARTICLE VI

OFFICERS: The officers of the State Association shall consist of a Moderaor, Assistant Moderator, Clerk and Assistant Clerk, Parliamentarian and an Executive Secretary, each of whom shall be elected at the close of each regular session, except the Executive Secretary, who shall be elected every two years.

Section 2: Committees, as necessary, shall be appointed by the moderator, unless otherwise provided for, and shall hold office until their work is completed or until their successors are elected.

ARTICLE VII

BOARDS: All standing boards shall be composed of seven elected members who shall serve terms of 7, 6, 5, 4, 3, 2, and 1 years, and any ex-officio members provided for elsewhere. Ex-officio members shall not have vote. The general board shall be composed of one member from each subordinate association, chairman of each standing board and the state officers. The standing boards shall include the Executive Board, the Church Extension and Mission Board, College Board of Trustees, Superannuation Board, Sunday School Board, and Church Training Service Board. Each board shall elect a chairman and clerk-treasurer to act for one year and to be elected at the close of each annual state association. The Co-ordinating Board shall be composed of the executive secretary and the chairman from each standing board.

ARTICLE VIII

DUTIES AND RULES OF STANDING BOARDS: The Executive Board is elected at the discretion of the State Association of Free Will Baptists and shall act in behalf of the association when not in session, and shall have power and authority to elect such officers as might be deemed best for its own government and to carry out the plans and undertakings of the state association. To this Executive Board is further delegated power to collect funds and report and superintend such work for the field as may seem best and the means on hand may warrant, exclusive of College Board of Trustees.

This Executive Board shall keep a record of all work done, money raised, meetings held, and make a full and complete report to the regular meeting of the association and shall further receive and convey any property entrusted to said state association. They shall not have the power to purchase or sell any real estate property without the voice of the association.

The chairman and the secretary of said Executive Board shall sign all deeds, bonds, and notes, etc., and other papers by which the State Association is to become legally responsible, exclusive of College Board of Trustees.

The board shall have power to call the association in conference by notifying each Subordinating Association at least ten (10) days prior to conference.

(2) **GENERAL BOARD:** It shall be the duty of this board to meet with the Executive Board one day preceding the State Association to hear reports of the standing boards and to make recommendation to the State Association. They shall also serve as Credential Committee.

(3) **CHURCH EXTENSION AND MISSION BOARD:** It shall be the duty of this board to work to promote an active missionary program in and for the State of Oklahoma.

It will also be their responsibility to investigate and assist, if necessary, any new church and, or, a church that cannot maintain itself. This board should thoroughly investigate the ability of a church to support an organization before assistance is pledged.

(4) **COLLEGE BOARD OF TRUSTEES:** It shall be the duty of this board to supervise and promote Oklahoma Bible College, Inc. and the function of this board shall be governed by the Articles of Incorporation and By-laws as adopted by the State Association of Free Will Baptists, adopted at the 1965 session.

(5) **CHURCH TRAINING SERVICE BOARD:** It shall be the duty of this board to plan and assist in every way possible the C.T.S. work throughout the state. It will also be their responsibility to promote an active C.T.S. work in each Subordinate Association and to encourage C.T.S. institutes. It shall also be the duty of this board to plan and direct a State Youth Camp or Camps.

(6) **SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD:** Their duties shall include the planning and operation of the State Sunday School Conventions, Institutes, and the encouragement of the organization of district conventions. They may carry through plans they think wise to actively promote Sunday School work in the state, and the publishing of literature deemed advisable by the State Association of Free Will Baptists.

(7) **SUPERANNUATION BOARD:** This board working in cooperation with the National Superannuation Board and district boards, shall provide a definite program of superannuation for ministers.

(8) **CO-ORDINATING BOARD:** This board shall be charged with the responsibility of co-ordinating the work of the standing boards, and shall also act as Budget Committee. The Executive Secretary shall serve as chairman and the board shall meet at his discretion.

(9) **FILLING OF VACANCIES:** All boards shall have power to fill vacancies that may arise between sessions of the association. Such appointment valid only until next session of association.

(10) **Working agreement between the state association and the Executive Secretary of the State Association:** That the Executive Secretary be paid a set salary and mileage and a two week paid vacation and all money received by him for speaking engagements, revivals and etc. shall be turned in by him to the Executive Office for the support of this office. He shall be ex-officio member of all standing boards.

ARTICLE IX

This constitution may be amended or altered at any regular session of the State Association by a two-thirds vote of members present, provided proposed amendment or alteration be presented in writing to the body one day in advance.

ARTICLE X

Elected delegates to State Association shall be retained as standing delegates for special called meetings.
