PROCEEDINGS OF THE STATE ASSOCIATION

The 62nd annual session of the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists met October 20-22, 1970 in the Civic Center, Muskogee, Oklahoma, with the theme "The Good Shepherd," and the bible text John

The musicians for the session were Mrs. Sue Wilcox, pianist, and Mrs. Ann Ketchum, organist. All music was under the direction of Ted Wilbanks.

"All Hail the Power," was the opening hymn, and Lonnie DaVoult led the opening prayer. The congregation also sang "Amazing Grace," and "Glory to His Name."

The clerk called the convention into official session and introduced the

officers.

Psalm 23 was read by the moderator, Bailey Thompson, after which he brought remarks as the Moderator's Message.

Jess Stepp, moderator of the host association, welcomed the state association to Muskogee, and to the South Grand River Association area.

The Men's Quartet from Oklahoma Bible College sang two numbers, "A

New Name in Glory," and "Take the Name of Jesus With You."

Jack Richey was introduced to bring the message. His subject was,"The Good Shepherd Giveth His Life for the Sheep," taken from John 10:11-18.

An offering was received for the expense of the convention.

After the announcements the closing prayer was given by Dugan McDonald.

"At the Cross," and "I am Thine, O Lord," were the songs used to open the Wednesday morning session. The devotion was brought by Carl Shivers who read John 10:11-12, and led in prayer.

The moderator opened the business session with his admonition. The clerk read a partial report of the General Board along with the names of the delegates representing the several associations.

A motion carried to adopt the partial report of the General Board and

seat the delegates.

A motion carried to adopt the program leaving the time flexible.

Tom Malone was introduced to represent the Free Will Baptist Bible College with a report from this school.

The mayor of Muskogee, Mr. Elmo Madwell, was introduced to bring the welcome from Muskogee. A standing ovation was given him for his

Christian welcome to the city.

The following committees were appointed by the moderator and assistant moderator: Resolution Committee; Lynn Wood, Bob Duncan, J. C. Morgan, David Sutton, and O. T. Dixon: Temperance Committee; Berton Perry, Albert Collier, Connie Cariker, Wayne Patton, and J. B. Chism: Obituary Committee; Carl Shivers, Herman Wood, Sherman Webb, Floyd Wolfenbarger, and Doyle Cox; Placement Committee; Dugan McDonald, Ernest Harrison Jr., Jerry Dudley, Delbert Akin, and Ray Gwartney.

The rest of the General Board report was given. A motion carried to receive the report and adopt the budget.

N. R. Smith was introduced to bring a report from the National Sunday School Department.

A telegram from the Fred McCoys was read by the moderator.

The report of the Board of Church Extension, Missions, and Evangelism was given by Delbert Akin, chairman. The budget of \$12,500.00 was added to this report. A motion carried to adopt the report.

The body was dismissed for recess with a prayer led by Ernest Harrison

Sr.

Ray Gwartney presided at the Wednesday morning worship service. "We're Marching to Zion," and "Stand Up, Stand Up for Jesus," were the songs directed by Ted Wilbanks.

Mrs. Jean Wilson, Nashville, Tennessee, sang "Only One Life."

J. B. Chism brought the message on "The Good Shepherd Commands, 'Feed My Sheep'." He read John 21:15-17, and Acts 20:28.

The service closed with prayer by Bob Ketchum.

The Wednesday afternoon session opened with the congregation singing, "Tis so Sweet to Trust in Jesus." Pete Butler brought the

devotion. He read John 10:11-14, and led in prayer.

James Murray gave a partial report of the College Board of Trustees, withholding the financial report until the Thursday session. A motion was made and seconded to receive the report and adopt the recommendation concerning the name change. A motion carried to table the motion because of the required constitutional change.

Ted Wilbanks gave the report of the National C. T. S. Department.

The congregation stood and sang "Stand Up for Jesus."

J. Reford Wilson gave the report of the National Foreign Missions Department.

Homer Willis gave the report of the National Home Missions, Church

Extension, and Evangelism Board.

Clarence Shepherd, chairman, gave the report of the Executive Board. A motion carried to adopt the report.

Homer Young gave the report of the Executive Secretary. A motion

carried to adopt the report.

The report of the Free Will Baptist Book Store was given by Curtis

Hogue. A motion carried to adopt the report.

Rufus Coffey, National Executive Secretary, gave a report of the National Executive Department. It was noted that the National Association will be July 12-15, 1971, in Nashville, Tennessee.

Francis Boyle gave the report of the Executive Church Bonds,

Nashville, Tennessee.

A rising vote of thanks was given for the representatives from the

national departments who had given reports in this session.

Milburn Wilson gave the report of the State Sunday School Board, along with a notice that they are returning \$1,000.00 to the state with the recommendation that it be given to Oklahoma Bible College.

Ollie Wright gave the benediction.

Delbert Akin presided at the Wednesday evening missionary service. The congregation sang "Jesus Saves," and "Praise Him, Praise Him." J. Reford Wilson led in the opening prayer.

The moderator, Bailey Thompson, mentioned the fact that telegrams

had been received from the Gage and the Haas families.

The congregation sang "I Love to Tell the Story."

The choir of Oklahoma Bible College sang three numbers; "Come Thou Fount," "I have come from the Darkness," and "Give me a Vision."

The Wesley Calvary family sang some special music, after which Wesley

Calvary brought the message on "Other Sheep I Have."

After the invitation and response, Bob Followwill led in the closing

prayer.

Thursday morning the meeting opened with the congregation singing "Glory to His Name," and "There shall be Showers of Blessing." E. E. Morris led in the opening prayer.

Ernest Harrison Jr. led in the opening prayer.

The Church Training Service Board report was given by J. C. Morgan, chairman. A motion was made and seconded to accept the report. A motion carried to amend the report by adding the names of the winners in the state competitive activities. The motion carried as amended.

The National Retirement and Insurance department was represented with a report by Ernest Harrison Sr.

David Bandimere of Child Evangelism Fellowship gave information about a weekly television program for children that would be seen in Oklahoma soon.

A motion carried to take from the table the constitutional amendment concerning renaming the Oklahoma Bible College. The name "Trinity College Inc." was recommended by the College Board of Trustees. The motion to close debate carried. The motion to change the name to "Trinity College Inc." carried.

Dan Farmer, business manager, gave the financial report of Oklahoma Bible College. A motion was made to accept the report. Response to the financial needs of the school came in form of faith promises. Because time came for the recess before the worship service, responses were discontinued until the afternoon session.

The body was recessed to come back in a few minutes for the worship service.

The Thursday morning worship service opened with the song "Blessed Assurance." Dugan McDonald led the opening prayer. John West presided.

The Ministers Quartet sang "What a Savior," "Let Me Touch Him," and "I'm Bound for that City."

F. A. McCage brought the morning message on "When the Chief Shepherd shall Appear." The Ministers Quartet closed the service by singing "Jesus Is Coming Again."

The Thursday afternoon session was opened with the congregation singing "Tis so Sweet to Trust in Jesus," and "Stand Up, Stand Up for

Jesus." Floyd Wolfenbarger brought the devotion.

The motion to accept the financial report of Oklahoma Bible College carried.

A motion was made and seconded to cancel the \$40,000.00 of unsold OBC bonds. Whereas resolution No. 3, of the Resolution Committee report was concerning this, it was read. The resolution was amended to read "That we reserve \$20,000.00 of the unsold Oklahoma Bible College bonds to be used as needed for the school to connect to the Moore sewer system, and that the rest of the unsold bonds be canceled and the monthly payment be adjusted accordingly."

The election of board members was held. J. R. Hall was elected to the

Executive Board for 7 years.

To the Church Training Service Board Doyle Cox was elected as the 7 year member, Charles Biggers the 5 year member, and David Sutton the 3 vear member.

Bob Duncan was elected to the Mission Board as the 7 year member,

and Charles Murphy was elected to a 2 year term.

James Murray, Jerry Rhoades, and Bill Barber were elected to the College Board of Trustees for 3 year terms. Wesley Jarman was elected to this board for a 1 year term.

Milburn Wilson was elected to the Sunday School Board for a 7 year term. Albert C. McDonald Jr. and Ernest Harrison Jr. were elected to this board for 4 year and 2 year terms respectively.

Marguerite Hinesley gave the report of the State Woman's Auxiliary. A

motion carried to accept the report as information.

The report of the Master's Men was given by Mr. Kenneth Lane, and a motion carried to receive this report.

O. T. Dixon gave the report of the State Minister's Conference. A motion carried to receive the report.

The report of the Temperance Committee was read by the clerk, and a

motion carried to adopt the report.

The report of the Obituary Committee was read. A motion carried to accept the report. Ernest Harrison Sr. led the congregation in prayer in memory of those who departed.

The Resolution Committee report was read. Resolutions No. 1, 2, and 4

were adopted. Resolution No. 3 had been adopted earlier.

The report of the Placement Committee was read. A motion carried to adopt the recommendation of this committee to meet in Oklahoma City in 1972.

The General Board members, one from each of the associations forming the state association, were elected. Whereas each of the associations had nominated a member, a motion carried to elect these nominated by the associations as the General Board for 1971.

In the election of officers the following were elected; Homer Young, Executive Secretary; Odie Nunley, Assistant Clerk; Waldo Young, Clerk; Ernest Harrison, Assistant Moderator; and Bailey Thompson, Moderator.

A motion carried to give the officers a rising vote of thanks.

A motion carried to adjourn.

Sunday School Board

The State Sunday School Board has had quite an active year. It sponsored two area-wide seminars, two training institutes, four oneweek training courses and co-sponsored a city-wide Sunday School Rally in the Tulsa area. Members of the board assisted a number of churches in individual requests and provided a representative to the National Minister's Conference.

The board in cooperation with the State Executive Secretary began the publication of a monthly news sheet "The Communicator". Current plans are to consolidate this monthly into the "Promoter" be-

ginning late this year.

A new approach to Sunday School work with the Churches within the State of Oklahoma is under study. In conjunction with the Sunday School Department of the National Association it is hoped that efforts of the board can be more effective in the future.

The Sunday School Board requests 2% of the cooperative receipts to support our program for the next year.

STATE MISSION BOARD REPORT

The State Mission Board has met eleven times during the past year. The regular meeting date is the second Tuesday of the month.

BOISE CITY: The mission board assisted the Boise City work during the past year. The board gave financial assistance to the pastor and helped in getting the church property. Members of the board assisted in the organizational meeting of the church. The first service was held in their newly acquired building on February 8, 1970.

EVANGELISM CONFERENCE: Since the board felt it was their responsibility to assist in every way possible the establishing of churches in Oklahoma and inspiring our ministers and laity to win lost souls, an evangelism conference was launched by the board. Our first one was held at Purcell, Oklahoma, April 20-22. We can report that the response was so good that we plan to have another one this year on April 19-21, 1971 in the South Grand River Association. Brother Bob Shockey from the National Home Missions Department assisted with the planning of the conference.

VINITA: The board in conjunction with members of the executive committee of the Northeast Association met in Vinita, November 11, 1970, and assisted with the organization of a new church. The mission board gave financial assistance to them.

REPORT BLANK: The board felt that those who were receiving financial assistance from the State Missions Department should give a monthly report. A report blank was adopted. It is now required from all churches and ministers receiving regular financial assistance from the board that they give a monthly report of the condition of the church under their care and to report the work the minister has done.

PLAZA TOWERS: Permission was granted for Brother Charles Gann to use the Plaza Towers property for a mission. After some months of struggle the project was abandoned. The property has now been put into the hands of the Scott Realty Company for disposal.

STATE MISSION DIRECTOR: A great deal of consideration has been given this past year by the board to the hiring of a full-time state

missions worker and evangelist. After much prayerful consideration this step has been postponed for the present time.

HAILEYVILLE—HARTSHORNE: The board has given financial assistance to the Haileyville-Hartshorne mission over the past few months. A lot has been purchased and they are well on the way to establishing a church.

ATOKA CHURCH: Some financial assistance has been given to

the work at Atoka during the past year.

HAWKINS RESIGNS: It was with regrets that the board accepted

the resignation of Brother Eugene Hawkins on May 19.

PROJECTED PLANS: In the past years Free Will Baptists have been known as a rural denomination. By this, we mean that the bulk of our churches have been in the country out of the highly populated areas. The mission board has thought long and seriously about this problem. We feel that in order to do the most good with the limited funds we have available, to keep up with the shift in population, to get where our "mite" will do the most good, we must change our approach to the task of mission work. Therefore we propose to do the following:

First: To assist only in a limited way a district in the starting of new churches, where we feel the population would only allow a very limited success. By doing this we are not frowning upon the organizing of new churches in less populated areas. We, in fact, encourage local churches and districts to launch out wherever resources are available and establish churches in any areas.

Second: A survey be made of the populas and needy areas and that prime consideration be given to these areas in establishing of new churches.

Third: That a concentration of funds and efforts be poured into the project selected by the board to assure their success.

Our total giving to Home and Foreign Missions showed a good increase in 1969 over the 1968 totals. The following information shows receipts recorded by the National Boards for the past five years:

The Oklahoma State Executive Board held four meetings this past year. We are grateful to God for another good year in His service. We are trusting God to bless every effort of our State Association.

We feel deeply indebted to our Executive Secretary, Rev. Homer Young, and would like to express our deep appreciation for his dedication and concern in promoting all departments of our State Association. We also appreciate the cooperation of all the other boards of our Association and feel that we have made great strides together.

Our Cooperative Plan of Support reached an all time high of \$51,211.60 or an increase of \$7,357.65 over last years report. This was made possible through the efforts of our Executive Secretary and the concern of our Free Will Baptist people.

We also would like to report our Free Will Baptist Book Store at 4801 South Walker in Oklahoma City reached another goal for gross sales of \$66,277.81. This represents an increase of \$14,788.81 over the

EXECUTIVE SECRETARY REPORT

God has blessed Oklahoma in many ways over the past year. Our financial record reveals His blessings in that area.

Total giving through the state office reached \$181,885.95 or \$27,841.68 above the record set last year. This was short of our \$200.000.00 goal. However, we praise the Lord for what was accomplished and trust Him for the \$200,000.00 this year. Cooperative giving reached a new high of \$51,211.60. The Cooperative Budget for 1969-1970 is \$55,000.00

The state office has helped in arranging tours for Sam Johnson, C.T.S., Jack Paramore and J. D. O'Donnell, Christian Education, and Herman Hersey, Retirement and Insurance. Also the publicity and promotion for the Conference on Evangelism sponsored by the State Mission Board at Purcell was handled through the state office.

The Promoter mailing list is over 6500 and continues to increase. Each church should see that new members are added to the mailing list.

Forty-two pastors are in the Hospitalization Program. The premium has increased to \$31.92—family, and \$14.09—individual. This program has met with good success.

REPORT OF THE COLLEGE BOARD OF TRUSTEES:

The year of 1969 and 1970 has been busy times for the Trustee Board. Since the State Meeting one of the pressing things to be worked out was how to include the new states and their new Trustee Members. This has been done and all but one state has had at least one representive to meet with us one time.

In June of 1970 the Board held its annual meeting on the 4th and 5th to lay plans for the next year. Our student body is still small. It would help greatly if we could reach more of our young people. Our budget was planned with almost 100 students in mind; and when this was not reached this caused our budget to be short. Because of this we had to borrow \$17,500.00. Help us pray that this can be paid this year.

Many of our churches continue to do an excellent job in supporting the school on a monthly basis. However as an average only 25% of our churches support the school regularly. When you know this, it helps to see what could be done if more of our churches would enter into a faithful monthly support of the school. We are asking you to help our promotional department by asking your church to support the school on a regular basis.

Two members of the Board resigned this year. Rev. J. B. Fletcher and Mr. Charles Hinsley. We wish to express our appreciation to these men for their service to the Board.

We want to welcome the new faculty members to the school. We would also like to express our appreciation to the Rev Lonnie DaVoult for his eight years of faithful service in teaching at the school.

We still have about \$40,000.00 worth of 6% Bonds to sell.

The Board voted to give the faculty at least a 5% cost of living raise in salary.

A proposed budget of \$207,255.00 was adopted for 1971-1972.

In its meeting in January of 1970, the Board clarified the purpose of the College which before had generally been accepted but had not been so specifically stated. It moved to perfect a program which will demonstrate that Oklahoma Bible College has as its purpose the Christian education of students in a liberal arts context. The goal of this program is to meet the standard of the Oklahoma Higher Education Code. The long range purpose or goal is to meet the standards prescribed by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. The College sees itself as an institution in the mainstream of liberal arts education especially as these disciplines may be represented in a small private college.

Therefore we are recommending that the name of the school be changed to TRINITY COLLEGE, INC.

RESOLUTION COMMITTEE REPORT

I. Be it resolved that this body authorize the Executive Board to set up a State Historical Commission. Said commission will seek to compile historical items and documents depicting the colorful heritage of Oklahoma Free Will Baptist and establish a program that will preserve present and future activities of our State Association.

II. Be it resolved that we urge pastors to promote "Contact" by leading the church to adopt the Family Plan or Individual subscription policies.

III. Be it resolved that this body authorize the OBC Board of Trustees to meet pressing obligation by using building funds that have been accumulated and are not being used. Said funds will be replaced as soon as possible and records adjusted accordingly. This is necessary because of an immediate deficit which has occurred because of a small student enrollment. That we reserve \$20,000.00 of the unsold OBC bonds to be used as needed for the school to connect to the Moore sewer system, and that the rest of the unsold bonds be canceled and the monthly payment be adjusted accordingly.

OBITUARY COMMITTEE REPORT

OKLAHOMA STATE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY CONVENTION CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I

NAME

This organization shall be known as the Oklahoma State Woman's Auxiliary Convention.

ARTICLE II

PURPOSE

The purpose of this convention shall be to bring the women of each district convention together for fellowship, sharing information, and encouraging one another in the work of the Lord.

ARTICLE III

OFFICERS

The officers of this convention shall be a president, vice president, secretary, treasurer, and field worker. These shall serve on the state executive committee together with three members elected by the convention as desired. These shall serve for a period of 2 years.

ARTICLE IV

MEMBERSHIP

This convention shall be composed of the officers of the convention together with each active auxiliary member of the district or local (duly accredited by the credentials committee).

ARTICLE V

MEETINGS

The annual meeting shall be held each year on the day preceeding the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists and at the place designated by said association.

ARTICLE VI

AMENDMENTS

This constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the convention by a two-thirds vote of members present.

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1, President. The president shall preside over all meetings, appoint such committees as may be needed, call the executive committee together when necessary, be ex-officio member of all committees, and serve as chairman of the executive committee, see that reports are made promptly to the national secretary and perform all duties usually pertaining to such an office.

Section 2, Vice President. The vice president shall preside in the absence of the president or by her request and otherwise assist her in the

overseeing of the work in general.

Section 3, Secretary. The secretary shall keep an accurate record of all proceedings of the convention and executive committee meetings, preserve all valuable papers and turn same over to her successor in office, and make an annual report to the national secretary on a form available from the WNAC office. She shall compile the districts slates of officers and addresses immediately after the convention. She shall also send a slate of state officers and addresses to the national executive secretary. She is chairman of the Credentials Committee.

The secretary shall also serve as historian keeping an historical record and submitting historical information to the national executive secretary

annually.

Section 4. Treasurer. The treasurer shall have charge of all funds belonging to this convention and shall pay out same only when authorized by the convention. The treasurer shall keep an accurate account and shall give a written report of all funds received and disbursed at each annual meeting of the convention. She shall also send an annual report to the WNAC office (executive secretary-treasurer) at least ten days before the end of the fiscal year. She shall encourage support of missions through the WNAC Gift Plan, individual giving and special offerings.

Section 5, Field Worker. The field worker shall have charge of all field work pertaining to, or necessary to, the promotion of the work of the convention and keep the national program before the district officers.

ARTICLE II

ELECTIONS

The general officers shall be nominated by a nominating committee and shall be elected by acclamation, unless there are other nominations. In case of more than one nominee for any particular office, a vote will be taken on each. All elections shall be held at the closing business session of the convention.

ARTICLE III

EXPENSES

Section 1. An appropriation of 6 cents per mile toward the expense of the general officers, when called upon to attend the executive committee meeting to plan program, secretary's expenses, phone calls, postage and stationery for officers will be paid by the convention. All field promotional work is subject to the state executive committee, who should approve all work done by state officers in the interest of state work, as well as expenses of the same.

Section 2. An amount of \$50,00 shall be paid on the expense of the state president to attend WNAC.

ARTICLE IV

COMMITTEES

Section 1. Executive Committee - The executive committee shall be

composed of the five officers and three members elected by the convention. Five of these shall compose a quorum. They shall hold meetings for the transaction of business as often as necessary. It shall be the duty of the executive committee to maintain an overseeing of the work at large. They shall act for the convention when necessary. They shall meet with district presidents night preceding the state auxiliary convention.

Section 2. Resolutions Committee - A resolutions committee of five

members shall be appointed by the president as needed.

Section 3. Nominating Committee - The nominating committee shall be composed of at least one member from each district convention. Nominations shall be submitted by district with their annual report. These elected by the body at the annual meeting.

Section 4. Credentials Committee - The secretary shall be chairman of the credentials committee, and other members may be appointed by the president. The treasurer shall be a standing member of this committee.

Section 5. Finance Committee - The finance committee shall be appointed by the president. This committee audits the financial records of the year and reports on same to the convention.

Section 6. Student Loan Committee - State Auxiliary President and 2 elected members to serve 2 years each. They shall be elected on alternate

years.

Section 7. Registeration committee shall be provided by the district convention which is host to state convention.

ARTICLE V

FEES AND REPORTS

Active members shall pay dues of \$1.25 per year. With 25 cents remaining in the district. \$1.00 to be forwarded to state where 25 cents shall be retained, and 75 cents forwarded to WNAC as required for membership fees. It shall be the duty of each body directly affiliated with the State Auxiliary Convention to send a report to every annual session.

ARTICLE VI

AMENDMENTS

These by-laws may be amended by a two-thirds vote of members present at regular meeting of the state auxiliary convention.

ARTICLE VII

GIFTS

The desired plans for giving in the Woman's Auxiliary are those adopted by WNAC as follows:

1. Mission offerings following each special season of prayer

- Co-Laborer offering (monthly or quarterly designated to WNAC General Fund)
- 3. WNAC Emphasis Month in August or other time more convenient to help in support of WNAC General Fund

ARTICLE VIII

WNAC DELEGATE

ONSTITUTION Preamble

The purpose of the Free Will Baptist Master's Men, state of Oklahoma is to provide a means of Christian fellowship and to deepen the spiritual lives of the laymen of the local church. Also, to provide a means of developing the abilities and talents of the laymen, and to promote the cause of Christ through a complete, "total church program", as prescribed by Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists.

ARTICLE I

Name

The name of this organization shall be known as the Free Will Baptist Master's Men, State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE II Membership

Section 1. The membership of this organization shall be composed of the district associations of Master's Men, and any local chapters where there is only one chapter in the district, within the state of Oklahoma.

Section 2. Every member in good standing of an affiliated district association of Master's Men, or any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district, is entitled to the full benefits of membership. Section 3. Each district association, or any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district, shall submit an annual, written report to this body, (as a matter of information).

ARTICLE III Officers

The officers of this organization shall consist of a president, vice-president and a secretary-treasurer.

The officers of this organization shall be elected annually and may succeed themselves, at this level.

ARTICLE IV

Executive Committee

Section 1. The executive committee shall consist of the elected officers of this organization and they shall serve as the program committee for each annual convention.

Section 2. Ex-officio members of the executive committee shall be the presidents of the district associations of Master's Men, presidents of any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district, and the state executive secretary of the State Association of Free Will Baptists.

ARTICLE V

Meetings

This organization shall meet annually at 7:30 PM on the Monday night before the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists convenes.

ARTICLE VI Amendments

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of any regular meeting.

BYLAWS

Voting Rights

Section 1. Every member of each affiliated district association, or any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district, is eligible to vote on all questions and matters that might come before the Free Will Baptist Master's Men, State of Oklahoma.

Committees

Section 2. The executive committee shall transact all routine business and shall act for the organization in the interim between meetings.

Section 3. The executive committee shall meet at the call of the president. Section 4. A nominating committee, for the annual election of officers, shall be composed of the presidents of each district association, and the president of any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district.

Section 5. The president shall appoint all other committees, subject to the approval of the body.

Finance

Section 6. This organization shall be financed on the basis of offerings, dues and assessments.

Quorum

Section 7. One-tenth of the members of this organization shall constitute a quorum at any regular meeting.

Amendments

Section 8. These bylaws may be amended at any regular meeting by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

As adopted by the Free Will Baptist Master's Men, State of Oklahoma annual session, in Muskogee, Oklahoma October 19, 1970.

REPORT OF THE GENERAL BOARD

The General Board of the Oklahoma State Association met in Muskogee, Oklahoma, on Monday, October 19, 1970.

Clarence Shepherd led in the opening prayer.

The roll call was given by the clerk.

The names of the delegates from the sixteen associations were read, along with other information from the letters. We find these letters in order, and recommend that they be accepted and the delegates be seated in the state association.

It was noted that Hopewell No. 1 Association has withdrawn from the State association. A motion carried that this General Board send a letter, along with representatives from the State Executive Board, to this association to express our desire for their reconciliation with the state association.

The report of the Sunday School Board was given by Milburn Wilson. It was noted that the Sunday School Board is giving \$1,000.00 back to the state association with the recommendation that it be given to Oklahoma Bible College. The General Board expresses its desire to carry out the recommendation of the Sunday School Board.

The report of the Board of Church Extension, Missions, and Evangelism was given by Delbert Akin. A motion carried to adopt this report and

recommend it to the state association.

The reports of the Executive Board, the Executive Secretary, and the Book Store were given. A motion carried to adopt these reports and recommend them to the state association.

The report of the Church Training Service Board was given by J. C. Morgan. A motion carried to adopt the report and recommend it to the State association.

The afternoon session of the board meeting opened with prayer by Jess

Stepp.

The report of the College Board of Trustees was given by James Murray and Dan Farmer. A motion carried that this report be adopted and recommended to the state association.

The General Board, acting as a budget committee, recommends that the cooperative budget for 1970-1971 year be set at \$60,000.00. We also recommend that it be allocated as follows:

OKLAHOMA BIBLE COLLEGE, INC. BY-LAWS BOARD OF TRUSTEES

SECTION I

The Board of Trustees of Oklahoma Bible College, Inc., an Oklahoma corporation, shall be composed of fifteen members, elected as provided in the Articles of Incorporation of said College, as amended:

ARTICLE A—OFFICERS: The officers of the board of Trustees shall be a Chairman, an Assistant Chairman, and a Secretary, each of whom shall be elected by the Board for a term of one year. They shall continue in office until their successors have been chosen:

Item 1—CHAIRMAN: The chairman of the Board of Trustees or his assistant shall preside at all meetings of the Board. He shall be an exofficio member of the Executive Committee.

Item 2—SECRETARY: The Secretary shall record and preserve minutes of all meetings and acts of the Board of Trustees and countersign all deeds, conveyances, and other papers authorized by the Board. He shall have authority to call special meetings of the Trustees of the College upon the written request of two-thirds of the members of the Board; he shall mail notice of said meeting to the trustees ten (10) days in advance.

Item 3—EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE: The Executive Committee shall consist of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, the Vice-Chairman of the Board, the Secretary of the Board. The Executive Committee shall have authority to consider and act upon all questions affecting the Bible College which may be brought before it between the stated meetings of the Board, or whenever it is deemed impractical to convene the entire Board, or a quorum of the Board fails to attend a called or regular meeting. It shall transact such business as may be committed to it by the Board and Shall act for the College on such matters as it may submit to it. The Committee shall meet at the call of the Chairman or the President of the College.

ARTICLE B—MEETINGS: The Board of Trustees shall meet each year at a time and place agreed upon by the Board. It shall, also, hold special meetings whenever called in accordance with the By-Laws of the Board. Such special meetings may be called by either the chairman of the Board, or the President of the College.

ARTICLE C—QUORUM: A majority of the members or the Board of Trustees of Oklahoma Bible College in attendance at any called or regular meeting, written notice of which has been mailed by the Secretary to each trustee, shall constitute a quorum. No proxy votes shall be permitted. No ex-officio member shall be entitled to vote at meetings of the Board of Trustees.

ARTICLE D—ELECTIONS: In all elections held by the Board of Trustees each member present except ex-officio members shall be entitled to one vote, and the result shall be determined by a majority of the votes cast. Due notice of any election must be personal notice to the members or a day on the minutes of the Board not less than one week preceding the election.

SECTION II

OFFICERS OF THE BIBLE COLLEGE

The officers of Oklahoma Bible College shall be a President, Vice-President, Dean, and a Business Manager, each of whom shall be elected by the Board of Trustees to hold office for two years exclusive of the President whose term of office shall be indefinite. It is provided, however, that retirement of any one of the officers herein named may occur at any time upon the resignation of the officer or the request of the Board. In either case, notice shall be given six weeks before the date of the proposed retirement unless otherwise agreed upon by the concerned parties.

ITEM ONE—PRESIDENT: The President shall be executive officer of the Board of Trustees and shall have general control of the College including its officers, teachers, students, and business. He shall render to the Board complete annual reports and to its chairman, Executive Commit-

tee or other committees such information as may be deemed essential to a thorough knowledge of the operation of the College and its promotion. He shall be a member of the Board of Trustees ex-officio and the Executive Committee ex-officio and shall have the rights and privileges of a member of the Board except voting. The President shall execute all documents, instruments, and conveyances on behalf of the College. Duties of the president and working relationship shall be further detailed in a format approved by the Board of Trustees.

ITEM TWO—VICE PRESIDENT: The Vice-President shall perform all the duties of the President in the absence of the latter.

ITEM THREE—DEAN: The Academic Dean of the Bible College shall, under the President, fix the hours of recitation, govern, control, and regulate the conduct of the students, have general oversight of curriculum, student's records, and such other internal details and administrative duties as may be delegated to him by the President of the College.

ITEM FOUR—BUSINESS MANAGER: The Treasurer shall keep an accurate record of all accounts of the College and shall receive and expend as directed by the Board of Trustees and President, all money for the expenses of the institution. He shall make an annual report to the Board and furnish the Executive Committee with such information pertaining to his office as may be requested. He shall provide bond in whatever amount the Board may require. Until such times as the Board of Trustees may deem different the Treasurer's office shall be contained within the Business Manager's Office. The Business Manager may at the direction of the administration designate this duty to a subordinate officer. The Business Manager shall have general supervision of the financial business of the College, and shall, at the direction of the President, be responsible for the upkeep of all the physical facilities and premises of the College. His detailed duties are directed in a format approved by the Board of Trustees.

SECTION III

FACULTY

The faculty shall consist of the President, the Dean, and all teachers of Oklahoma Bible College. Instructors and assistant teachers shall have the privilege of sitting with the faculty in stated meetings but shall not have the right of voting.

It shall be the policy of the Oklahoma Bible College to employ on its faculty those who are members of Free Will Baptist churches that are affiliated with the National Association. Emergencies, however arising from the resignation, illness, death, or approved leaves of absence of faculty members may be relieved by the temporary employment of instructors who are affiliated with any evangelical denomination. Part-time or short-term instructors, deemed essential to the successful prosecution of a consistent education program, may be employed at the discretion of the President without respect of denominational affiliation.

The faculty, under the authority and jurisdiction of the President, shall have general charge of instruction, attendance of students, examinations, administration of curriculum, discipline, and all matters involving the spiritual, physical, and social welfare of the Bible College. The faculty shall be hired upon recommendation of the President.

In the selection of the faculty qualitative factors shall be kept in mind. All faculty members shall be urged to pursue graduate programs in their respective fields. Except in special cases no faculty member will be required to teach courses outside of his field.

SECTION IV

ACADEMIC COUNCIL

The Academic Council shall consist of the President, the Dean and the heads of the departments of Oklahoma Bible College: It shall determine the curriculum and academic policy of the College, prescribe requirements for admission, certificates, diplomas, and degrees, and supervise the courses of instruction offered by the various departments of the College.

SECTION V

CONTRACTS

The Board of Trustees shall establish the College policy involving the execution of contracts, deeds of conveyance, the determination of salaries, and employment of all officers, representatives, faculty members and essential domestic and maintenance employees. The President of the College shall negotiate agreements, executive contracts, employ representatives, and supply vacancies incurred by the termination of contracts, resignations, or death of any essential employees. All contracts for building construction shall be let only to persons or corporations posting a valid performance bond and recording the same in the Office of the County Clerk of Cleveland County, Oklahoma.

SECTION VI

ADVISORY COUNCIL

An advisory council shall be formed which is to be composed of interested, qualified persons in the various fields which will be of value in building and maintaining a strong academic program to carry out the educational program stated in the charter.

SECTION VII

AMENDMENT

These By-Laws may be amended by a favorable vote of two-thirds of the qualified members of the Board of Trustees of Oklahoma Bible College at any meeting of the Board, provided that the proposed amendment has been submitted in writing to each Trustee one month in advance. This change to be subject to the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists.

SECTION VIII

ADMINISTRATIVE FUNCTIONS

The President of the Oklahoma Bible College shall be elected by the Board of Trustees, and he shall act for and on behalf of the Board in the Conduct and management of the institution. He shall also be a member of the Board of Trustees ex-officio and of the Executive committee ex-officio, and his duties, powers and term of office shall be prescribed in the by-laws of the College and a format approved by the Board of Trustees.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF THE OKLAHOMA BIBLE COLLEGE INC.

Know all men by these presents, that, we whose names are hereunto subscribed, do hereby associate ourselves together for the purpose of forming a corporation under the provisions of the corporation laws of the State of Oklahoma, and for that purpose state:

ARTICLE ONE

The name of this corporation shall be OKLAHOMA BIBLE COLLEGE, INC.

ARTICLE TWO

The purpose of this corporation shall be the creation, establishment and maintenance of a college and institution of higher learning devoted to the promotion and impartation of higher learning, Christian education and such other education, instruction, learning, training and research as may be deemed essential for the cause of Christ and to that end prescribe courses of study and grant degrees. The doctrinal and theological position of this institution shall be that of the sponsoring denomination, Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists and the treatise of the National Association of Free Will Baptist as endorsed by the state body, and in connection therewith, in accordance with the stipulation of the Constitution and By-Laws of the State Association of Free Will Baptists, Inc.

- (a.) To prescribe courses of study for both resident and correspondence students, which shall include general education in the arts, Christian Ministries of Service and Biblical studies for wisdom; said courses to be taught in both a Junior College Division and a Bible College Division, and to award degrees, either graduate or post-graduate, to those persons satisfactorily completing the prescribed courses of study and to grant such other literary honors, including honorary degrees, as shall be deemed advisable.
- (b.) To charge and collect tuition as determined by the Board of Trustees and to create scholarships.
- (c.) To employ professors, instructors and other subordinate employees as may be necessary for the proper conduct of the college under the direction and control of the President of the College, with the advice and consent of the majority of the Board of Trustees.
- (d.) To institute and carry on missions and commissions for missionary purposes and investigations.
- (e.) To publish and distribute such pamphlets, literature or books as may be required in the conduct of such work and the general promotion of the Bible College.
- (f.) To sue and be sued in its corporate name and to enter into contracts of every type and nature.
- (g.) To solicit support, receive, collect, hold and receive by gift or bequest personal property in any amount, money or other thing of value; to purchase real estate, to receive real estate that may be given, or devised to the college for achieving the legitimate ends of the college and to sell or mortgage the same as the need arises.
- (h.) To borrow money in payment of property for erecting buildings and making improvements and for any other purpose germane to the objectives and purposes of the college.
- (i.) To issue notes, bonds, debentures and other evidences of indebtedness and execute mortgages, liens and other incumbrances upon the property of the corporation, real or otherwise, to secure the payment of any such evidences of indebtedness.

(j.) To transact any and all business connected with said College as

may be necessary to achieve the purposes of said College.

(k.) To obtain under Internal Revenue Laws of the United States and of the Revenue Laws of the State of Oklahoma exemption from income property and other forms of taxation.

ARTICLE THREE

The location of this corporation shall be in Norman, Oklahoma.

ARTICLE FOUR

The duration of this corporation shall be perpetual.

ARTICLE FIVE

The general control of this corporation shall be vested in a Board of Trustees consisting of 15 members, 9 of which trustees shall be elected by the delegates to the annual Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists-each of which shall serve for a term of three years and until his successor is elected and qualified, and one member each shall be elected by the delegates to the annual meeting of the state association of Free Will Baptists of the States of Arkansas, Colorado, Kansas, Missouri, New Mexico and Texas, each of which shall serve for a term of six years and until his successor is elected and qualified. Initially, the 9 trustees elected by said Oklahoma Association shall include 3 elected for three years, three elected for two years, and 3 elected for one year but their successors shall all be elected for a term of three years and until their successors are elected and qualified. Initially, said trustee elected by said Arkansas Association shall be elected for a term of six years, said trustee elected by said Colorado Association shall be elected for a term of five years, said trustee elected by said Kansas Association shall be elected for a term of four years, said trustee elected by said Missouri Association shall be elected for a term of three years, said trustee elected by said New Mexico Association shall be elected for a term of two years, and said trustee elected by said Texas Association shall be elected for a term one year but their successors shall be elected for a term of six years. The Chairman of said Corporation shall be one of the trustees elected by said Oklahoma Association.

ARTICLE SIX

An executive committee consisting of the Chairman, Vice Chairman, and Secretary of the Board of Trustees shall possess all powers of the Board of Trustees between the stated meetings of the Board of Trustees.

ARTICLE SEVEN

All contracts for building construction shall be let only to persons or corporations posting a valid performance bond and recording the same in the office of the County Clerk of Cleveland, Oklahoma.

SECTION IX

AMENDMENTS

This charter may be hereafter amended subject to the provisions contained herein and the laws of the State of Oklahoma. It is provided, however, that the Trustees of the Bible College shall not propose or apply for any amendment which has not been previously authorized by an act of the Oklahoma State Association.

CONSTITUTION OF MINISTER'S CONFERENCE

ARTICLE 1

This Minister's Conference shall be called the Oklahoma State Free Will Baptist Minister's Conference, and shall be composed of Ordained Free Will Baptist Ministers who are regular members of some Orthodox Free Will Baptist church in the State of Oklahoma who have paid their \$1.00 dues.

ARTICLE 2

The officers for this conference shall be President, Vice-President, Clerk, Assist. Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be elected annually.

ARTICLE 3

This conference shall have the power to discipline its members.

ARTICLE 4

Members of this organization shall be all ordained ministers who participate in the benefits and activities of this body, and associate members who become members by payment of the \$1.00 annual dues.

ARTICLE 5

This conference shall meet Semi-Annually.

ARTICLE 6

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any regular session.

BY-LAWS OF MINISTER'S CONFERENCE

ARTICLE I

The clerk or assistant clerk, or in their absence the senior minister in years shall call the ministers into conference. If a quorum is present the President or in his absence the Vice-President shall moderate the meet-

ing. If neither of these are present, the senior minister in years shall be in charge.

ARTICLE 2

It shall be the duty of the clerk to enroll the ministers of the conference. Ministers shall present themselves with proper evidence of their rights to seats therein, and those enrolled by the clerk shall compose the conference. In case of questionable representation the case under question shall be referred to the Credential Committee.

ARTICLE 3

It shall be the duty of each minister belonging to this conference, to be active in pastoral or evangelistic services (disabled or retired ministers excepted). Any minister belonging to this conference shall report in each session in person or by letter, and failing to do so for two successive sessions shall be subject to discipline.

ARTICLE 4

Each conference shall be opened by reading a portion of God's word and prayer, and each session shall be closed with prayer.

ARTICLE 5

By a two-mirds vote of the members present ruling of the President may be overruled.

ARTICLE 6

This conference shall sit with open doors, except when it shall go into a committee as a whole.

ARTICLE 7

No member shall absent himself from the conference during its meeting without permission from the President.

ARTICLE 8

No person shall be allowed to nominate more than one member of a committee, unless person nominated is not elected.

ARTICLE 9

The President shall not allow discussion when not carried on in a Christian Spirit, or when he thinks it will cause discord.

ARTICLE 10

Anyone desiring to speak shall rise and address the President by the appelation "Brother President," But shall not speak further until recognized.

ARTICLE 11

No member of this conference shall be allowed to speak more than five minutes, nor twice on the same subject without permission from the President.

ARTICLE 12

These By-Laws may be altered or amended at any regular or adjourned session of this conference by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

MINISTERS CONFERENCE REPORT

The Oklahoma State Ministers Conference convened last May 12, (1970) at the First FWB Church, Clinton, Oklahoma. The President, Rev. O. T. Dixon, welcomed everyone and introduced the host pastor Rev. Clarence Shepherd, who in turn extended a hearty invitation to the Oklahoma ministers offering the complete use of the church facilities.

The Ministers Quartet furnished the music for the day. An unusual moving of the Spirit of God seemed to prevail through the entire services

of the day as the following speakers were heard: Rev. Bill Jones spoke on the subject "The School of the Prophets;" Rev. Berton Perry spoke on the subject "The Power of the Holy Spirit;" Rev. Homer Young, State Executive Secretary, spoke on the subject "The Logic of the Evangelical Mind;" and Rev. Floyd Wolfenbarger used the subject "The Faith and Scientific Sense of the Evangelical Mind." The president and vice president led in a panel discussion and the business session then was held which is reported in the minutes.

The Annual meeting of the Oklahoma Ministers Conference convened in Muskogee, Oklahoma, October 20, 1970, in conjunction with the state

meeting.

The president presided and Rev. Rick Duncan arranged the music which

featured the Ministers Quartet.

Special speaker for the morning session was Rev. Homer Willis, Director of the National Home Missions Department. Bro. Willis gave a timely charge to the ministers and there was a real spirit of Christian love and fellowship.

The afternoon session was opened by Rev. Carl Hembre giving an

outstanding devotional from the Word of God.

An open statement and testimony was given by Rev. Jake Gage, pioneer preacher. The "preaching time" featured Rev. T. H. Dixon who spoke on the subject "Jesus Christ the Same Yesterday, Today, and Forever." An overpowering of the Spirit of God melted hearts in this outstanding service.

The business session which concluded the activities featured a special report about the State Ministers Conference insurance program by the

state Executive Secretary.

The election of officers was held. O. T. Dixon, pastor of the First Free Will Baptist Church, Norman, Oklahoma, was elected president. Doyle Cox, pastor of the First FWB Church, Sulphur, was elected Vice President. Bob Ketchum, pastor of the Owasso church, was elected Secretary-Treasurer, and Wayne Bookout, Garden Heights pastor, Sand Springs, was elected Assistant Secretary-Treasurer.

The next meeting will be held May 11, at the Checotah Church.

ARTICLES OF FAITH OF STATE ASSOCIATION

- 1. THE BIBLE—The Scriptures of the Old and New Testament were given by the inspiration of God, and are our infallible rules of faith and practice.
- 2. GOD—There is one living and true God, revealed in nature as the Creator, Preserver and Righteous Governor of the Universe, and in the Scriptures as the Father, Son and Holy Ghost, yet as one God, infinitely wise and good, whom all intelligent creatures are supremely to love, adore and obey.
- 3. CHRIST—Christ is God manifest in the flesh: in His divine nature truly God, in His human nature truly man. The mediator between God and man, once crucified. He is now risen and glorified is our ever-present Saviour and Lord.
- 4. THE HOLY SPIRIT—The Scriptures assigns to the Holy Spirit all the attributes of God. He is the Reprover, Comforter, Guide and Sanctifier of all men.
- 5. THE GOVERNMENT OF GOD—God exercises a wise and benevolent providence over all beings and all things by maintaining the constitution and laws of nature. He also performs special acts of Grace, not otherwise provided for as highest welfare of man requires.
- 6. THE SINFULNESS OF MAN—Man was created innocent, but by disobedience fell into a state of sin and condemnation. His posterity, there-

fore inherited a fallen nature of such tendencies that all who come to years of accountability, sin and become guilty before God.

- 7. THE WORK OF CHRIST—The Son of God, by His incarnation, life, suffering, death, and resurrection effected for all a redemption from sin that is full and free and is the ground of salvation by faith.
- 8. THE WORK OF SALVATION—The conditions of salvation are:
 1. Repentance or sincere sorrow for sin and the hearty renunciations of it.
- 2. Faith or the unreserved committal of one's self to Christ as Saviour and Lord, with purpose to love and obey Him in all things. In the exercise of saving faith the soul is renewed by the Holy Spirit; freed from the dominion of sin and becomes a child of God. 3. Continuance in faith and obedience until death.
- 9. ELECTION—God determined from the beginning to save all who should comply with the conditions of salvation. Hence by faith in Christ, men become His elect.
- 10. FREEDOM OF WILL—The Human will is free and self controlled, having power to yield to the influence of the truth and the Spirit and live, or to resist them and perish.
- 11. SALVATION FREE—God desires the salvation of all, the Gospel invites all, the Holy Spirit strives with all, and whosoever will may come and take of the water of life freely.
 - 12. PERSEVERENCE—All believers in Christ, who through grace persevere in holiness to the end of life, have the promise of eternal salvation.
 - 13. BACKSLIDING AND APOSTASY—A person who has been regenerated or born again and is living in unconfessed, unforgiven sin, is rebellious to the principles of the Kingdom of God and His righteousness, and therefore is a backslider in a lost condition who must repent and be restored to the right relationship with God or be eternally lost.

We recognize, according to Hebrews 6: 4-6, that it is possible for a person to get in the condition that he could never return to Christ. This, we believe, is Apostasy. However, we also recognize that a regenerate person can fall into sin, be in a lost condition and still not be an Apostate. This person, through repentance, can be reconciled to God.

- 14. GOSPEL ORDINANCES—Baptism, or the immersion of believers in water, and the Lord's Supper, are ordinances to be perpetuated under the Gospel: Feet Washing, an ordinance teaching humility, of universal obligation, and to be administered to all true believers.
- 15. TITHING—God commanded tithes and offerings in the Old Testament: Jesus Christ endorsed in the Gospel (Matt. 23: 23), and the Apostle Paul said, "Upon the first day of the week let every one of you lay by him in store as God hath prospered him." I Cor. 16: 2.
- 16. THE CHRISTIAN SABBATH—The divine law requires that one day in seven be set apart from the secular employment and amusements for rest, worship, holy works and activities, and for personal communion with God.
- 17. RESURRECTION, JUDGMENT, AND FINAL RETRIBUTION The Scriptures teach the resurrection of all men at the last day. They that have done good will come forth to the resurrection of life, and they that have done evil unto the resurrection of damnation: then the wicked shall "Go away into eternal punishment but the righteous into eternal life."

RULES OF ORDER

1. At every sitting of the Association, business shall be opened and concluded by prayer by the Moderator or whomever he may request.

2. Ministers and deacons present are invited to seats, allowed to take part in debates on all subjects, and to vote.

- 3. Those who speak shall rise and address the Moderator. Personal reflections shall be avoided in all debates.
 - 4. No motion may be discussed until made and seconded.
- 5. When a motion has been made and seconded, and a member opposes its discussion, the Moderator shall put the question. "Shall it be discussed?" if negative, the question shall not be discussed.
- 6. If any proposition or motion under debate contains two or more points, it shall be divided at the request of any member, and the vote taken separately.
 - 7. Motions made and lost shall not be recorded.
- 8. No one shall speak more than twice on the same subject without special leave of the Moderator.
- 9. All questions shall be decided by a majority vote of all Members present.

BY LAWS OF STATE ASSOCIATION

- 1. The Clerk or assistant clerk, or in their absence, the senior minister in years shall call the Association into conference, and if a quorum is present the moderator, or in his absence, the assistant moderator shall take charge; and if neither of them is present the senior minister in years shall act as Moderator.
- 2. It shall be the duty of the clerk to enroll the delegates to the Association, who shall present themselves with proper evidence of their rights to seats therein, and those enrolled by the clerk shall compose the Association.
- 3. It shall be the duty of every District belonging to this Association to send a letter to every annual session of this Association reporting in the same, spiritual condition, benevolent work, and its statistics. Any District belonging to this Association, which shall fail to report itself for two successive sessions, may be dismissed from the Association by a two thirds vote of all members present.
- 4. Each meeting shall be opened by reading a portion of the Bible and with prayer, and shall be closed with prayer.
- 5. By a two-thirds vote of members present, a ruling of the moderator can be overruled.
- 6. This Association may correspond by messenger or otherwise with other religious bodies.
- 7. This Association shall sit with open doors except when it shall go into a committee of the whole.
- 8. Any person not a member of this Association may be allowed to take part in its discussions by obtaining permission from the moderator.
- 9. It shall be the duty of all the Association to be present at the time appointed for each meeting, and anyone wishing to retire shall first obtain leave of the moderator.
- 10. No person shall be allowed to nominate more than one member of any committee, provided the person nominated be elected.
- 11. The moderator shall not allow discussions when not carried on in a Christian spirit or when he thinks it will cause discord or division.
- 12. Anyone desiring to speak shall rise to his feet and address the moderator by the appelation "Brother Moderator," but shall not speak further until recognized by the moderator.
- 13. No member of this association shall be allowed to speak more than ten minutes nor twice on the same subject without permission from the moderator.
- 14. These By-Laws may be altered or amended at any regular or adjourned session of this Association by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

CONSTITUTION OF STATE ASSOCIATION

PREAMBLE: From long experience, we the members of the Free Will Baptists denomination, being regularly baptized upon a profession of our faith in Jesus Christ, and realizing the necessity of a bond of union and fellowship among us as a church; and to preserve and maintain correspondence and co-ordination with us, do therefore ordain this Constitution for our better denomination government.

ARTICLE I

NAME: This organization shall be known as the OKLAHOMA STATE ASSOCIATION OF FREE WILL BAPTISTS.

ARTICLE II

PURPOSE: The object and purpose of this organization shall be to unify the work of the various bodies composing this State Association, and to devise and execute measures for the extension of the Kingdom of God in connection with the various bodies in the Association, or that may hereafter be represented therein.

ARTICLE III

REPRESENTATION: Section 1. This Association shall be composed of all ordained ministers and deacons with membership in some local church which is a member of a district Association with membership in the State Association.

Section 2: Each District Association shall be entitled to a number of elected delegates equal with the number of churches composing said Association. These delegates may be recommended by the local churches and shall be endorsed by their district association.

ARTICLE IV

FINANCE: Each elected delegate shall be represented with a fee of ten dollars.

ARTICLE V

DISCIPLINE: This State Association shall have the right to settle any question of discipline, doctrine or practices that may properly come before it from any of the bodies composing said organization; furthermore, if there be any question of discipline, doctrine or practices on the part of an affiliated association, delegates of that association shall not be seated until these questions have been settled to the satisfaction of the General Board.

Section 2: Decisions of the General Board may be appealed in this manner. All appeals shall come before the State Association when sitting in a committee as a whole.

ARTICLE VI

OFFICERS: The officers of the State Association shall consist of a Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, and an Executive Secretary. Each of these shall be elected at the close of each regular session except the Executive Secretary, who shall be elected every two years. These officers shall serve as the program committee for the State Association.

Section 2. COMMITTEES: Committees as necessary shall be appointed by the moderator, unless otherwise provided for, and shall hold office until their work is completed or until their successors are elected.

ARTICLE VII

BOARDS: All standing boards shall be composed of seven (7) elected members who shall serve terms of 7, 6, 5, 4, 3, 2 and 1 years with such ex-officio members as may be provided elsewhere, except: (1) the General

Board which shall be composed of one (1) member from each affiliated association, the chairman of each standing board, and the current general officers of this association, and (2) the College Board of Trustees which shall be composed as provided for in the Articles of Incorporation of Oklahoma Bible College, Inc.

The standing boards of this association shall be: Executive Board; Board of Church Extension, Missions and Evangelism; Sunday School Board; Church Training Service Board; and College Board of Trustees.

No standing board shall meet in a functional meeting during the session of this association.

ARTICLE VIII

DUTIES, SCOPE OF ENDEAVOR AND QUALIFICATIONS OF STANDING BOARDS

Section 1. EXECUTIVE BOARD: The Executive Board shall be composed of seven (7) members who are members of an affiliated association and in good standing with the association of which they are members. They shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

It shall be the duty of this board to act in behalf of the association when it is not in session. It shall be bound to carry out the directions of the association and shall hold itself bound by every consideration of morality and honor to carry out the wishes of this association and to act under its instructions in whatever technical rights, civil laws and the decisions of courts may give it in certain emergencies. It shall be the duty of this board to sign their signatures to any and all papers concerning properties, indebtedness, bonds, or other legal documents pertaining to the execution of the will of this association, exclusive of the College Board of Trustees and the Board of Church Extension, Missions and Evangelism.

This board shall have the oversight of the Executive Department of this association. The members shall assist and direct such work for the general promotion of this association as is deemed needful or necessary as the means available shall permit. The Executive Department shall serve as the coordinating agency of this association to correlate the work of all standing boards and agencies.

This board shall have the oversight of Free Will Baptist Book Store and shall endeavor to serve affiliated associations and churches and the community with literature and church supplies. Merchandising procedures shall be those accepted as normal retail procedures with the board being cognizant of the spiritual contribution of the store in distributing Christian literature.

All decisions of this board shall be governed by the general tenets of this association and shall not violate this constitution.

This board shall not incur indebtedness, sell or convey real property without the express direction of this association. This board shall organize itself and elect such officers as necessary to the orderly conduct of its affairs and labors. This board shall keep an accurate record of all meetings, decisions, and work done and shall make a report in writing at each annual session of this association. All records shall be available to this association at its request.

Whereas this board represents the association when not in session, it and it alone shall have the power to call the association into special conference provided each affiliated association shall be given notice at least ten (10) days prior to the meeting of such special conference.

Section 2. GENERAL BOARD: This board shall be composed of one

(1) member from each affiliated association, the chairman of each standing board, and the current general officers of this association. Each member must be a member of an affiliated association and in good standing with the association of which he is a member. The members shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

The duties of this board shall be to meet one (1) day preceeding the annual session of this association. This board shall serve as the credential committee with the duties and responsibilities assigned by Article V of this constitution. This board shall hear reports of all standing boards. It shall serve as budget committee and shall make such recommendations as deemed pertinent to this association. A complete and accurate record shall be kept of meetings of this board and a report shall be made in writing to this association in its annual session.

The moderator of the association shall serve as chairman of this board, and the clerk of the association shall serve as its clerk.

Section 3. BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION, MISSIONS AND EVAN-GELISM: This board shall be composed of seven (7) members who are members of affiliated associations and in good standing with the associations of which they are members. They shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

It shall be the duty of this board to labor to further the Gospel of Jesus Christ into the uttermost parts of the earth. In accomplishing this, they are to endeavor to establish missions and churches in communities within the bounds of this association with whatever moral and financial assistance that may be theirs. In cases of small churches failing to function, whatever assistance deemed appropriate shall be rendered to maintain the effective witness of that church by either direct labor with the church or with an associational board in instances where the affiliated association has a functional board or agency.

This board shall be empowered to receive and convey title to real property in the area of its labors.

The promotion of missionary endeavors from a local, state or national level shall come within the scope of endeavor of this board. This board shall assist in maintaining prayer and financial support of missionary enterprizes through whatever channels available.

Whereas missionary and evangelistic labors are so intimately related, this board shall assist through participation or assistance in maintaining a strong evangelistic thrust in the life of affiliated association.

This board shall organize itself and elect such officers as necessary to the orderly conduct of its affairs and labors. This board shall keep an accurate record of all meetings, decisions, work done, funds received and disbursed and shall make a report in writing at each annual session of this association. All records shall be available to this association at its request.

Section 4. COLLEGE BOARD OF TRUSTEES: The College Board of Trustees shall be composed as provided for in the Articles of Incorporation of Oklahoma Bible College.

Oklahoma Bible College is an agency of the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists and is incorporated under the corporate laws of the State of Oklahoma. The articles of incorporation are a part of this association's record and delineate the purpose, duty and scope of endeavor of the members of this board.

Section 5. CHURCH TRAINING SERVICE BOARD: This board shall be composed of seven members who are members of affiliated associations

and in good standing with the associations of which they are members. They shall be elected at the discretion of this association:

The duties of this board shall be to plan and assist in organizing and sustaining a strong Church Training Service in every church in each association affiliated with this association with every means of promotion and assistance available to them. This board shall plan, coordinate and conduct state-wide youth camps or camp.

This board shall organize itself and elect such officers as necessary to the orderly conduct of its affairs and labors. This board shall keep an accurate record of all meetings, decisions, work done, funds received and disbursed and shall make a report in writing at each annual session of this association. All records shall be available to this association at its request.

Section 6. SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD: This board shall be composed of seven (7) members who are members of affiliated associations and in good standing with the associations of which they are members. They shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

The duties of this board shall be to plan and promote Sunday schools in every church in each association affiliated with this association. This board shall use every available means to promote Sunday school clinics, seminars, institutes and conventions on local, district and state-wide basis, working with local agencies to distribute and employ all effective methods and material available.

This board shall organize itself and elect such officers as necessary to the orderly conduct of its affairs and labors. This board shall keep an accurate record of all meetings, decisions, work done, funds received and disbursed and shall make a report in writing at each annual session of this association. All records shall be available to this association at its request.

Section 7. VACANCIES: Vacancies shall occur when a member moves from the territorial bounds of this association, by death, by resignation or by removal from office by this association. In the event of disciplinary action where charges concerning misconduct, doctrine or practice shall have been lodged against a member of any board, his office shall be held in abeyance until such charges shall be concluded or as determined by this association.

All boards shall have power to fill vacancies arising between sessions of this association. Such appointment shall terminate at the next session of the association and shall be filled by this association.

Section 8. EMPLOYEES: All employees of boards or agencies of this association shall be employed by agreement or contract with employing board or agency upon approval of this association except those elected by this association and the conditions of their employment shall be those approved by this association.

The duties of the Executive Secretary of this association shall be:

- (1) He is to represent, or cause to be represented, the association at all affairs of interest to the association.
- (2) He is to promote the work of the association in such a manner so as to unify the efforts of the association.
- (3) He is to serve with all standing boards and committees of the association in an ex-officio capacity.

- (4) He is to aid in planning the work of the association by relating the activities and plans of one board to another.
- (5) He is to report to the association during each annual session.
- (6) He is to communicate to the affiliated members of this association the pressing causes and events before the association. This can be in person or by means of a periodical bulletin or both.
- (7) He shall serve as treasurer of this association. An accurate and complete record of all funds received and disbursed shall be kept and a written report shall be included in his report to this association in its annual session.
- (8) The conditions of employment shall be determined by the Executive Board.

ARTICLE IX

DISSOLUTION: Should this association cease to function, all properties and holdings shall go to the National Association of Free Will Baptists after all creditors are satisfied and indebtedness cleared.

ARTICLE X

AMENDMENTS: This constitution may be amended or altered at any regular session of the association by a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of members present and voting, provided proposed amendment or alteration be presented in writing to the body one (1) day in advance.

ARTICLE XI

SPECIAL SESSIONS: Elected delegates to the last session of this association shall be retained as standing delegates for special called sessions.
