PROCEEDINGS OF THE STATE ASSOCIATION

The 64th annual session of the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists met in the Civic Center Music Hall, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, October 17-19, 1972. Ted Wilbanks directed the music.

"Jesus Saves" was the opening hymn, and Odie Nunley led in the opening

prayer. The congregation then sang "Amazing Grace."

The association was called into official session by the clerk, Waldo Young, who then introduced the officers.

Bailey Thompson brought the moderator's message based on Mark 10:45.

The Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College choir sang four numbers.

Homer Young, moderator of the First Oklahoma Association, gave the welcome to the Oklahoma City area.

The men's quartet from Hillsdale sang "How Long Has It Been," and "Sweeter As The Years Go By."

The moderator led in prayer, after which he introduced Rick Duncan, pastor of the Edmond Free Will Baptist Church, to bring the message. He brought the message on "Receiving the Abundant Life Through Christ." He read John 10:10 as a text.

An offering was received for the expense of the association, after which announcements were made and Malcolm Fry led in the closing prayer.

The Wednesday morning session opened with the congregation singing "At The Cross," and "Tis So Sweet to Trust in Jesus."

Jimmy Shepherd brought devotional thoughts from 2 Corinthians 1:24, and led in prayer.

The moderator's admonition was brought by Bailey Thompson.

The clerk read a partial report of the General Board dealing with the associational letters, and the names of the delegates from the district associations. A motion carried to receive the report and seat the delegates.

The moderator recognized and welcomed visitors from several nearby states.

A motion carried to adopt the program leaving the time element flexible.

The following committees were appointed: Resolution Committee: O. T. Dixon, Roma Stewart, Buddy Drake, Harry Lee, and Dan Farmer; Temperance Committee: John H. West, Clarence Campbell, Jess Stepp, Ollie Wright, and Charlie Christian; Obituary Committee: Sherman Webb, Gene Thomas, David Sutton, Harvey Aguirre, and James Franklin; Placement Committee: James Murray, Kenneth Brandon, Clarence Shepherd, Frank Wiley, and Doyle Cox.

Kenneth Lane gave a report of the National Laymen's Board.

A partial report of the general board was read. A motion carried to receive the report and consider it item by item. Item 2 needed no action. Item 3 was tabled because of a required constitutional change. Item 4 was adopted. Item 5 was referred to the State CTS Board. Item 6 was adopted.

Milburn Wilson gave the report of the State Sunday School board. A motion carried to adopt the report. Bob Ketchum was elected as the 7 year member of the State Sunday school board.

N. R. Smith gave a report of the work of the National Sunday School Department.

A brief recess was observed preceeding the morning worship service.

The Wednesday morning worship service opened with the congregation singing "To God Be the Glory" and "I Love to Tell the Story." David Sutton led in prayer, after which the congregation sang "I Am Thine, Oh Lord."

The Ministers Quartet sang "Something Worth Living For," and "The King is

Coming."

Charles Murphy, pastor of the Free Will Baptist Church, Holdenville, was introduced to bring the message. He spoke on the subject "A Growing Life Through Training," and read 2 Timothy 3:14-17 as a text.

After the announcements were made, Kenneth Brandon led in the closing prayer.

The Wednesday afternoon session opened with the congregation singing "Stand Up, Stand Up for Jesus" and "There Shall Be Showers of Blessings." Rick Young read Joshua 1:1, and brought devotional thoughts. He then led in prayer.

The report of the State Home Mission Board was given by Delbert Akin. Bob Duncan also shared in the report with information on the Church Establishment

Program. A motion carried to accept the report.

Charles Murphy was elected as the 7 year member of the State Mission Board. Herman Wood was elected to the 3 year term, filling a vacancy caused by the resignation of Albert Collier.

David McDaniel, home missions appointee to Billings, Montana, and Larry Powell, home missionary from the Virgin Islands going to Puerto Rico, brought greetings to the congregation.

Harold Critcher gave a report of the work of the Foreign Missions Department.

Earnie Deeds, missionary to Brazil, also brought greetings.

Clarence Shepherd gave the report of the State Executive Board. A motion carried to receive the report and adopt the recommendation. Connie Cariker was elected as the 7 year member of the State Executive Board. Dan Farmer was elected as the 3 year member, replacing Lonnie DaVoult.

Lonnie Sparks, missionary to Africa, brought greetings, telling of his work in

translating the New Testament.

'Lonnie DaVoult gave the report of the Executive Secretary. A motion carried to receive the report.

Ray Martin gave the report of the Oklahoma Free Will Baptist Book Store. A motion carried to receive the report.

Rufus Coffey, National Executive Secretary, gave a report.

Howard Gage, missionary builder to Africa, brought greetings to the body.

The report of the Church Training Service Board was given by Roma Stewart. He also gave recommendations from the board on the items referred to this board by the General Board and by the body. A motion carried to receive the report and adopt the recommendations. J. C. Morgan was elected as the 7 year member of the CTS board.

After announcements were made, Bill Jones led in prayer, closing the afternoon session.

"At the Cross" was the opening hymn of the Thursday morning session. After the hymn "Praise Him, Praise Him" was sung, Bob Thompson brought devotional thoughts from Judges 14:5-7, and led in prayer.

Malcolm Fry, National CTS Director, sang "He Looked Beyond My Faults and Saw My Needs." He then gave a report from the National Church Training Service Department.

Ernest Harrison, member of the board, gave a report of the National Retirement

and Insurance program.

The report of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College Board of Trustees was given by O. T. Dixon, chairman. Bill Jones, president of Hillsdale, also shared in the report. A motion carried to adopt the report.

Ray Gwartney, O. T. Dixon, and Bailey Thompson were elected to the College Board of Trustees for three year terms.

Jack Richey was elected to a one year term on the Executive Board, filling the vacancy created by the resignation of Ray Gwartney.

Dr. Robert Picirilli gave a report of the Free Will Baptist Bible College, Nashville. Tennessee.

The meeting was recessed.

The Thursday morning worship service opened with the congregation singing "Onward Christian Soldiers." Howard Gage led in prayer, followed by the congregation singing "We're Marching to Zion."

The New Life Singers from Hillsdale presented three selections as the special music.

Milburn Wilson, pastor of the First Free Will Baptist Church, Ardmore, was introduced to bring the message. He read John 10:10, and spoke on the subject "Experiencing the Abundant Life in the Local Church."

After the message the closing prayer was by Bob Duncan.

"Tis So Sweet to Trust in Jesus" was the opening song for the Thursday afternoon session. Ronald Carner brought the devotion and led in prayer.

The final item, number 7, of the General Board report was given, which was the budget of the cooperative receipts. A motion carried to adopt the item.

Mrs. Carol Carner, Woman's Auxiliary Vice President, gave the report of the State Woman's Auxiliary. A motion carried to receive the report.

The clerk read the report of the State Master's Men. A motion carried to receive the report.

Doyle Cox gave the report of the State Ministers Conference. A motion carried to receive the report.

The report of the Temperance Committee was read and adopted.

Mr. Douglas Newman, representing Sooner Alcohol-Narcotics Education, spoke oriefly.

The report of the Obituary Committee was given. A motion carried to receive the report, after which Waldo Young led in prayer.

The report of the Placement Committee, recommending Tulsa as the site of the 1974 state convention, was adopted.

A motion carried to remove from the table item 3 of the General Board report. The item was approved.

The report of the Resolution Committee was given. Items 1, 2, and 3 were adopted.

John H. West was elected to gather historical information for the National Historical Commission, as was called for in Resolution No. 3.

A motion carried that the State Mission Board budget for 1972-73, (page 14 of 1971 minutes) be amended to read \$60,000.00 for land investment rather than \$10,000.00.

A motion carried that the report of the book store in the digest of reports print only the totals of accounts receivable, accounts payable, and bad debts, and not in itemized form.

The members of the General Board were elected. (see them listed on page 3) The officers of the state association were elected. Lonnie DaVoult was elected as Executive Secretary. Odie Nunley was elected as Assistant Clerk. Jerry Dudley was elected as Clerk. Ernest Harrison Sr. was elected as Assistant Moderator, and Bailey Thompson was elected as Moderator.

A motion carried to give the officers a standing vote of appreciation. A motion carried to give a standing vote of thanks to the First Oklahoma Association for hosting the state convention.

A motion carried to adjourn. Ernest Harrison led in the closing prayer.

GENERAL BOARD REPORT

The General Board of the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists met Monday, October 16, 1972, in the Capitol Hill Free Will Baptist Church, Oklahoma City, and as a result of this meeting we offer the following items for your consideration.

1. Letters were read from eighteen district associations, and found to be in order. We recommend that these letters be received and the delegates seated.

- 2. This board heard the reports of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, the Sunday School Board, State Mission Board, Master's Men, the Executive Board, the Executive Secretary, Free Will Baptist Book Store, and the Church Training Service Board. We recommend their adoption as they are presented.
- 3. We heard the report of the committee appointed last year to study the method of hiring the Executive Secretary. We recommend that this report be adopted.
- 4. We heard the report of the special committee on finance called for in resolution No. 4, of last years minutes. We recommend that this report be adopted.
- 5. We heard a recommendation from the First Oklahoma Association, which contained two items. We referred item one to the state CTS board for further study, such item to be brought to the state association from the CTS board. We recommend the adoption of item two which reads as follows:

That the Oklahoma State Association present a plan to the National Association in Macon, Georgia in July of 1973, recommending that the National Association adopt a plan for a National CTS competition scholarship in the amount of \$100.00 for each person winning first place at the national level of competition, to be funded from the national association general fund.

- We recommend that the Oklahoma State Association invite the National Association of Free Will Baptists to meet in Oklahoma for the 1976 or 1977 session.
- 7. We recommend a cooperative plan budget of \$67,500.00, to be allocated as it has been during the past year which is:

National Association	43%	State Mission Board	5%
State Executive Dept.	28%	State Sunday School	2%
Hillsdale FWB College	21%	CTS Board	1%

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD

The Sunday School Board met five times this past year. The board sponsored two training institutes and assisted the Oklahoma City ministers with another one. Also, the Sunday School Board sponsored a State Sunday School Convention. The results of the convention, it is felt, were very profitable, as some key church leaders went home and put to work those things they had learned.

In addition to traveling over 5,000 miles, the board is compiling some statistics concerning the local Sunday Schools. This should aid it in being of better service to the local congregation.

We request that the Sunday School Board continue to receive 2% of the Co-op receipts for the next year.

STATE MISSION BOARD REPORT

The board has met eight times during the past year. Though we have not met as often as in past years we feel we have been able to accomplish much.

C.E.P. '71. We have been very busy this year getting our C.E.P. '71 project off the ground. We have given guidance to them as they have sought to get a building erected on the property and get it furnished. We are glad to report that they met for their first services in their new building on August 28, 1972, and then had their organizational service on September 16, 1972. Since this has been a pilot project for future C.E.P. projects we have endeavored to establish guidelines that will help us in establishing future churches. We feel that our thrust into the northern Oklahoma City area has been a great success. This project has been made possible only because of the hard work of our mission worker and the cooperation and support of our people.

C.E.P. '72. The Tulsa area has been chosen as the site for our next C.E.P. thrust. Contacts are being made in the Jenks area with the anticipation of establishing a church there. We ask our people to pray and give that this project might be successful.

EVANGELISM CONFERENCE. The mission board sponsored an evangelism conference for our people of the state at the Ada Church during the month of April. Reverend Raymond Riggs and Dr. Walter Beebe were the principal speakers.

The board will take the initiative in soliciting the cooperation of the other state boards in having a joint conference for next year. In this conference the work of all our boards will be high lighted.

NEW MEMBER. Reverend Albert Collier, who has served faithfully on the mission board, resigned due to ill health. Reverend Hermon Wood was appointed to

fill his unexpired term.

PRAY FOR AN AWAKENING. We feel that the time is drawing near when our work here on earth will be completed. EXECUTIVE BOARD REPORT

The Oklahoma State Executive Board held four meetings this year and feel that God has blessed our state in many ways.

On October 12, 1971 we the Executive Board received the resignation of Rev. Homer Young as our Executive Secretary and after much prayer and consideration we hired Rev. Lonnie DaVoult to fill the unexpired time as Executive Secretary. We appreciate both of these men and feel they have done their job well in promoting all departments of our State Association and that we have made great strides together.

Our Cooperative plan of support continues to be the undergirding of our whole state program and reached another all time high of \$63,483.76. This was made possible through the efforts of our Executive Secretary, the concern and support of our Free Will Baptist people. Our State office handled a total of \$292,214.51 for the year of 1971—1972.

Brother Ray Martin, a layman from the North West Free Will Baptist Church in Oklahoma City, assumed his duties as Book Store manager July 1, 1971. Brother Martin has done a tremendous job this past year with a total income for the Book Store of \$124,824.90. Our Sunday School literature sales was \$42,871.05 of this amount.

In accordance with the directions given by the General Board while in session Oct. 16, 1972, the Okla. State Church Training Service Board recommends that:

A college scholarship in the amount of \$50.00 be awarded to each first place winner in the Oklahoma CTS competitive activities. The Sword Drill, Adventurers Declamation, Crusaders Declamation, and Heralds Declamation first place contestants shall respectively receive a \$50.00 scholarship. Since the Bible Tic Tac Toe and Bible Bowl require contestants to compete as teams, a \$50.00 scholarship shall be given to each member of the first place team in these two events.

The following procedures shall be followed in issuing scholarship to individual winners: (1) at the close of annual competitive CTS activities the Oklahoma CTS Board shall issue a scholarship certificate to the above named activity winners; (2) following the issuance of these certificates the Okla. State CTS Board shall deposit in a savings account the amount of monies won by each contestant; (3) upon enrollment in a Free Will Baptist college by a scholarship holder the scholarship awarded by the Okla. State CTS Board shall be issued.

The following requirements must be met by each scholarship winner before the money is granted. First, the scholarship holder must enroll in a Free Will Baptist college by age 25. Second, one-half of the money held by the Okla. State CTS Board for an individual winner shall be awarded for the first semester of study and one-half for the second semester of study.

If an individual scholarship winner fails to use his scholarship by age 25, the money held for him by the Okla. CTS Board shall revert to said Board.

An individual contestant is eligible to win an unlimited number of scholarship certificates during his competive years.

All interest on said scholarship deposit shall revert to the Oklahoma CTS Board general fund annually.

5. We recommend that the Oklahoma State Association recommend to the National Association of Free Will Baptists that the national association provide a scholar-ship of \$100.00 for each winner in the national CTS competition.

HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE

September 14, 1972

More than 100 students are enrolled and attending Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College. Over 19 faculty and staff members are employed by the College. The campus is indeed an exciting place this year.

The brilliant personalities with unlimited potential that the students offer moves one to a complete and total commitment to the on-going of the College. God has given us a sign, and we should follow through in the perfecting of one of the best Christian colleges in America today.

Let's look at the facts. We have the highest registration in the history of the school with 115 students plus an extension school located in the Tulsa-Claremore area with 37 enrolled. We have an expanded curriculum including business and a third year ministerial preparation school. These two fields have greatly enhanced the entire outlook for our College. One of the brightest pictures to be seen was that which took place during the fall enrollment with the highest number of returning students in the history of the school. This, of course, was a testimony to the successful administration of the entire school system.

Possibly the high point of the year would be the building of our new Activities Building which houses the gymnasium, library, and cafeteria along with other class-room space and offices. We thank God for this much-needed building. However, it must be pointed out that the expense is much higher than was at first anticipated.

We must remember that it is a two-story building, and it has doubled our space for the library, cafeteria, and classrooms. Plus, it contains a gymnasium which also affords a large assembly hall.

We were very elated to get the report from the Oklahoma State Board of Regents concerning their approval of our accreditation. They approved our accreditation enthusiastically. Give God praise for this accomplishment. We are indeed an accredited college.

We give heartfelt thanks to God for the increased support. Individuals and churches have responded to a clarion call, and we have been blessed. However, herein lies the burden of our hearts. We must dedicate ourselves to the proposition that funds must be sent in for the operation of the school. The total program may be affected if we fail in this field. The cooperative giving offers a base support, but Hillsdale needs much more. This coming year we need in gifts approximately \$1,750 per full time student. This is necessary, you see, if we are to meet our budget. The amount thus figured would be close to \$150,000 in gifts.

Let it be stated clearly to each one of you that God is moving in the hearts of your youth at Hillsdale. Last year seven young men were called into the ministry, with others being touched of God for missionary service. This year the spiritual concern expressed by the students would thrill the heart of any parent or pastor.

Finally, the proposed budget for 1973-74 is \$380,488.00; and for 1974-75, \$425,000.00.

The above report is submitted with grateful hearts to God and His people who make Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College a true reality.

We recommend that we stand for a moment of silent prayer in commemoration of these loved ones whom God has called from our midst.

The Obituary Committee

We the Temperance Committee recommend the following:

- 1. That our churches cooperate with the Sooner Alcoholic and Narcotic Education, Inc., in a financial way, and that our pastors warn their people, especially the youth, of the dangers of using narcotics, barbituates, glue-sniffing, or any harmful drugs.
- 2. That we go on record as being opposed to the use or sale of tobacco in any form, and that our ministers set the example of total abstinence.
- 3. That our churches conform to a more modest dress using I Peter 3:3-7 as our guide.
- 4. That we go on record as being opposed to any type of gambling, whether raffles, pari-mutuel betting, questionable contests, and card playing.
- 5. That we go on record as being opposed to pornography, and that we do all possible to stop the sale and distribution of this type of literature.
- 6. That we stand opposed to the teaching of sex education in the public schools because of the lack of moral application.
- 7. That our people encourage their grocery store to delete alcoholic beverages from their shelves.
- 8. That we, the state association, go on record that we do not support liquor by the drink.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON HIRING THE EXECUTIVE SECRETARY

We recommend that Article VI of the constitution (page 64 of the 1971 minutes) be amended to read as follows:

OFFICERS: A. The officers of the state association shall consist of a Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, and an Executive Secretary. Each of these shall be elected at the close of each regular session except the Executive Secretary.

- B. (1) The Executive Secretary shall be elected for a two year tenure. It shall be the responsibility of the Executive Board to seek out a prospective candidate and make their recommendation to the body at the state association in its annual session, with primary consideration given to the recommendation prior to any nominations.
- (2) In the event of a vacancy occurring during the course of the year, the Executive Board shall fill the vacancy until the annual setting of the association.

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON FINANCE

- 2. The committee recommends that the State Executive Office prepare and make available to all churches in the State Association a brochure showing the overall total of approved quotas from the budgets of all State and National Departments which is to be called World-wide Outreach Giving.
- 3. The committee recommends that the State Association suggests that all local churches prepare and adopt an annual budget.
- 4. The committee recommends that the State Association recommend that each district association send at least 85% of all cooperative fund receipts into the State Cooperative Fund.

OKLAHOMA STATE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY CONVENTION CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I

NAME

This organization shall be known as the Oklahoma State Woman's Auxiliary Convention.

ARTICLE II

PURPOSE

The purpose of this convention shall be to bring the women of each district convention together for fellowship, sharing information, and encouraging one another in the work of the Lord.

ARTICLE III

OFFICERS

The officers of this convention shall be a president, vice president, secretary, treasurer, and field worker. These shall serve on the state executive committee together with three members elected by the convention as desired. These shall serve for a period of 2 years.

ARTICLE IV

MEMBERSHIP

This convention shall be composed of the officers of the convention together with each active auxiliary member of the district or local (duly accredited by the credentials committee).

ARTICLE V

MEETINGS

The annual meeting shall be held each year on the day preceding the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists and at the place designated by said association.

ARTICLE VI

AMENDMENTS

This constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the convention by a two-thirds vote of members present.

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1, President. The president shall preside over all meetings, appoint such committees as may be needed, call the executive committee together when necessary, be ex-officio member of all committees, and serve as chairman of the executive committee, see that reports are made promptly to the national secretary and perform all duties usually pertaining to such an office.

Section 2, Vice President. The vice president shall preside in the absence of the president or by her request and otherwise assist her in the

overseeing of the work in general.

Section 3, Secretary. The secretary shall keep an accurate record of all proceedings of the convention and executive committee meetings, preserve all valuable papers and turn same over to her successor in office, and make an annual report to the national secretary on a form available from the WNAC office. She shall compile the districts slates of officers and

addresses immediately after the convention. She shall also send a slate of state officers and addresses to the national executive secretary. She is chairman of the Credentials Committee.

The secretary shall also serve as historian keeping an historical record and submitting historical information to the national executive secretary

annually.

Section 4. Treasurer. The treasurer shall have charge of all funds belonging to this convention and shall pay out same only when authorized by the convention. The treasurer shall keep an accurate account and shall give a written report of all funds received and disbursed at each annual meeting of the convention. She shall also send an annual report to the WNAC office (executive secretary-treasurer) at least ten days before the end of the fiscal year. She shall encourage support of missions through the WNAC Gift Plan, individual giving and special offerings.

Section 5, Field Worker. The field worker shall have charge of all field work pertaining to, or necessary to, the promotion of the work of the convention and keep the national program before the district officers.

ARTICLE II

ELECTIONS

The general officers shall be nominated by a nominating committee and shall be elected by acclamation, unless there are other nominations. In case of more than one nominee for any particular office, a vote will be taken on each. All elections shall be held at the closing business session of the convention.

ARTICLE III

EXPENSES

Section 1. An appropriation of 6 cents per mile toward the expense of the general officers, when called upon to attend the executive committee meeting to plan program, secretary's expenses, phone calls, postage and stationery for officers will be paid by the convention. All field promotional work is subject to the state executive committee, who should approve all work done by state officers in the interest of state work, as well as expenses of the same.

Section 2. An amount of \$50.00 shall be paid on the expense of the

state president to attend WNAC.

ARTICLE IV

COMMITTEES

Section 1. Executive Committee — The executive committee shall be composed of the five officers and three members elected by the convention. Five of these shall compose a quorum. They shall hold meetings for the transaction of business as often as necessary. It shall be the duty of the executive committee to maintain an overseeing of the work at large. They shall act for the convention when necessary. They shall meet with district presidents night preceding the state auxiliary convention.

Section 2. Resolutions Committee — A resolutions committee of five

members shall be appointed by the president as needed.

Section 3. Nominating Committee — The nominating committee shall be composed of at least one member from each district convention. Nominations shall be submitted by district with their annual report. These elected by the body at the annual meeting.

Section 4. Credentials Committee — The secretary shall be chairman of the credentials committee, and other members may be appointed by the

president. The treasurer shall be a standing member of this committee.

Section 5. Finance Committee — The finance committee shall be appointed by the president. This committee audits the financial records of the year and reports on same to the convention.

Section 6. Student Loan Committee — State Auxiliary President and 2 elected members to serve 2 years each. They shall be elected on alternate years

Section 7. Registration committee shall be provided by the district convention which is host to state convention.

ARTICLE V

FEES AND REPORTS

Active members shall pay dues of \$1.25 per year. With 25 cents remaining in the district. \$1.00 to be forwarded to state where 25 cents shall be retained, and 75 cents forwarded to WNAC as required for membership fees. It shall be the duty of each body directly affiliated with the State Auxiliary Convention to send a report to every annual session.

ARTICLE VI

AMENDMENTS

These by-laws may be amended by a two-thirds vote of members present at regular meeting of the state auxiliary convention.

ARTICLE VII

GIFTS

The desired plans for giving in the Woman's Auxiliary are those adopted by WNAC as follows:

1. Mission offerings following each special season of prayer

- Co-Laborer offering (monthly or quarterly designated to WNAC General Fund)
- WNAC Emphasis Month in August or other time more convenient to help in support of WNAC General Fund
- 4. Memorial Student Loan Fund (special program and offering in September to assist worthy and needy students at FWBBC in Nashville)
- 5. Trinity College Student Loan Fund. (Special program and offering in September to assist worthy and needy students at Trinity College)
- 6. Tithes Pay tithes on all undesignated money received
- 7. All offerings are to be forwarded through regular channels

ARTICLE VIII

WNAC DELEGATE

Each district convention shall submit one nomination for a State delegate to WNAC with their annual report. This nomination (along with others as needed to make up 15 delegates to WNAC) shall be elected by the body at the annual meeting. THE FREE WILL BAPTIST MASTER'S MEN State of Oklahoma

CONSTITUTION

Preamble

The purpose of the Free Will Baptist Master's Men, state of Oklahoma is to provide a means of Christian fellowship and to deepen the spiritual lives of the laymen of the local church. Also, to provide a means of developing the abilities and talents of the laymen, and to promote the cause of Christ through a complete, "total church program", as prescribed by Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists.

ARTICLE I

Name

The name of this organization shall be known as the Free Will Baptist Master's Men, State of Oklahoma,

ARTICLE II

Membership

Section 1. The membership of this organization shall be composed of the district associations of Master's Men, and any local chapters where there is only one chapter in the district, within the state of Oklahoma.

Section 2. Every member in good standing of an affiliated district association of Master's Men, or any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district, is entitled to the full benefits of membership.

Section 3. Each district association, or any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district, shall submit an annual, written report to this body, (as a matter of information).

ARTICLE III

Officers

The officers of this organization shall consist of a president, vice-president and a secretary-treasurer.

The officers of this organization shall be elected annually and may succeed themselves, at this level.

ARTICLE IV

Executive Committee

Section 1. The executive committee shall consist of the elected officers of this organization and they shall serve as the program committee for each annual convention.

Section 2. Ex-officio members of the executive committee shall be the presidents of the district associations of Master's Men, presidents of any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district, and the state executive secretary of the State Association of Free Will Baptists.

ARTICLE V

Meetings

This organization shall meet annually at 7:30 PM on the Monday night before the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists convenes.

ARTICLE VI

Amendments

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of any regular meeting.

BY-LAWS

Voting Rights

Section 1. Every member of each affiliated district association, or any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district, is eligible to vote on all questions and matters that might come before the Free Will Baptist Master's Men, State of Oklahoma.

Committees

Section 2. The executive committee shall transact all routine business and shall act for the organization in the interim between meetings.

Section 3. The executive committee shall meet at the call of the president. Section 4. A nominating committee, for the annual election of officers, shall be composed of the presidents of each district association, and the president of any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district.

Section 5. The president shall appoint all other committees, subject to the approval of the body.

Finance

Section 6. This organization shall be financed on the basis of offerings, dues and assessments.

Quorum

Section 7. One-tenth of the members of this organization shall constitute a quorum at any regular meeting.

Amendments

Section 8. These bylaws may be amended at any regular meeting by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

As adopted by the Free Will Baptist Master's Men, State of Oklahoma annual session, in Muskogee, Oklahoma October 19, 1970.

HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE, INC. BY-LAWS BOARD OF TRUSTEES

SECTION I

The Board of Trustees of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc., an Oklahoma corporation, shall be composed of fifteen members, elected as provided in the Articles of Incorporation of said College, as amended:

ARTICLE A-OFFICERS: The officers of the board of Trustees shall be a Chairman, an Assistant Chairman, and a Secretary, each of whom shall be elected by the Board for a term of one year. They shall continue in office until their successors have been chosen:

Item 1—CHAIRMAN: The chairman of the Board of Trustees or his assistant shall preside at all meetings of the Board. He shall be an ex-officio member of the Executive Committee.

Item 2—SECRETARY: The Secretary shall record and preserve minutes of all meetings and acts of the Board of Trustees and countersign all deeds, conveyances, and other papers authorized by the Board. He shall have authority to call special meetings of the Trustees of the College upon the written request of two-thirds of the members of the Board; he shall mail

notice of said meeting to the trustees ten (10) days in advance.

Item 3—EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE: The Executive Committee shall consist of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, the Vice-Chairman of the Board, the Secretary of the Board. The Executive Committee shall have authority to consider and act upon all questions affecting the College which may be brought before it between the stated meetings of the Board, or whenever it is deemed impractical to convene the entire Board, or a quorum of the Board fails to attend a called or regular meeting. It shall transact such business as may be committed to it by the Board and shall act for the College on such matters as it may submit to it. The Committee shall meet at the call of the Chairman or the President of the College.

ARTICLE B-MEETINGS: The Board of Trustees shall meet each year at a time and place agreed upon by the Board. It shall, also, hold special meetings whenever called in accordance with the By-Laws of the Board. Such special meetings may be called by either the chairman of the Board,

or the President of the College.

ARTICLE C-QUORUM: A majority of the members or the Board of Trustees of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc. in attendance at any called or regular meeting, written notice of which has been mailed by the Secretary to each trustee, shall constitute a quorum. No proxy votes shall be permitted. No ex-officio member shall be entitled to vote at meetings of the Board of Trustees.

ARTICLE D—ELECTIONS: In all elections held by the Board of Trustees each member present except ex-officio members shall be entitled to one vote, and the result shall be determined by a majority of the votes cast. Due notice of any election must be personal notice to the members or a day on the minutes of the Board not less than one week preceding the election.

SECTION II

OFFICERS OF HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE

The officers of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College shall be a President, Vice-President, Dean, and a Business Manager, each of whom shall be elected by the Board of Trustees to hold office for two years exclusive of the President whose term of office shall be indefinite. It is provided, however, that retirement of any one of the officers herein named may occur at any time upon the resignation of the officer or the request of the Board. In either case, notice shall be given six weeks before the date of the proposed retirement unless otherwise agreed upon by the concerned parties.

ITEM ONE—PRESIDENT: The President shall be executive officer of the Board of Trustees and shall have general control of the College including its officers, teachers, students, and business. He shall render to the Board complete annual reports and to its chairman, Executive Committee or other committees such information as may be deemed essential to a thorough knowledge of the operation of the College and its promotion. He shall be a member of the Board of Trustees ex-officio and the Executive Committee ex-officio and shall have the rights and privileges of a member of the Board except voting. The President shall execute all documents, instruments, and conveyances on behalf of the College. Duties of the president and working relationship shall be further detailed in a format approved by the Board of Trustees.

ITEM TWO-VICE PRESIDENT: The Vice-President shall perform all

the duties of the President in the absence of the latter.

ITEM THREE—DEAN: The Academic Dean of the College shall, under the President, fix the hours of recitation, govern, control, and regulate the conduct of the students, have general oversight of curriculum, student's records, and such other internal details and administrative duties as may be

delegated to him by the President of the College.

ITEM FOUR—BUSINESS MANAGER: The Treasurer shall keep an accurate record of all accounts of the College and shall receive and expend as directed by the Board of Trustees and President, all money for the expenses of the institution. He shall make an annual report to the Board and furnish the Executive Committee with such information pertaining to his office as may be requested. He shall provide bond in whatever amount the Board may require. Until such times as the Board of Trustees may deem different the Treasurer's office shall be contained within the Business Manager's Office. The Business Manager may at the direction of the administration designate this duty to a subordinate officer. The Business Manager shall have general supervision of the financial business of the College, and shall, at the direction of the President, be responsible for the upkeep of all the physical facilities and premises of the College. His detailed duties are directed in a format approved by the Board of Trustees.

SECTION III

FACULTY

The faculty shall consist of the President, the Dean, and all teachers of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College. Instructors and assistant teachers shall have the privilege of sitting with the faculty in stated meetings but shall not have the right of voting.

It shall be the policy of the College to employ on its faculty those who are members of Free Will Baptist churches that are affiliated with the National Association. Emergencies, however arising from the resignation, illness, death, or approved leaves of absence of faculty members may be relieved by the temporary employment of instructors who are affiliated with any evangelical denomination. Part-time or short-term instructors, deemed essential to the successful prosecution of a consistent education program, may be employed at the discretion of the President without respect of denominational affiliation.

The faculty, under the authority and jurisdiction of the President, shall have general charge of instruction, attendance of students, examinations, administration of curriculum, discipline, and all matters involving the spiritual, physical, and social welfare of the College. The faculty shall be hired upon recommendation of the President.

In the selection of the faculty qualitative factors shall be kept in mind. All faculty members shall be urged to pursue graduate programs in their respective fields. Except in special cases no faculty member will be required to teach courses outside of his field.

SECTION IV

ACADEMIC COUNCIL

The Academic Council shall consist of the President, the Dean and the heads of the departments of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College: It shall determine the curriculum and academic policy of the College, prescribe requirements for admission, certificates, diplomas, and degrees, and supervise the courses of instruction offered by the various departments of the College.

SECTION V

CONTRACTS

The Board of Trustees shall establish the College policy involving the execution of contracts, deeds of conveyance, the determination of salaries, and employment of all officers, representatives, faculty members and essential domestic and maintenance employees. The President of the College shall negotiate agreements, executive contracts, employ representatives, and supply vacancies incurred by the termination of contracts, resignations, or death of any essential employees. All contracts for building construction shall be let only to persons or corporations posting a valid performance bond and recording the same in the Office of the County Clerk of Cleveland County, Oklahoma.

SECTION VI

ADVISORY COUNCIL

An advisory council shall be formed which is to be composed of interested, qualified persons in the various fields which will be of value in building and maintaining a strong academic program to carry out the educational program stated in the charter.

SECTION VII

AMENDMENT

These By-Laws may be amended by a favorable vote of two-thirds of the qualified members of the Board of Trustees of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College at any meeting of the Board, provided that the proposed amendment has been submitted in writing to each Trustee one month in advance. This change to be subject to the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists.

SECTION VIII

ADMINISTRATIVE FUNCTIONS

The President of the Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College shall be elected by the Board of Trustees, and he shall act for and on behalf of the Board in the conduct and management of the institution. He shall also be a member of the Board of Trustees ex-officio and of the Executive committee, ex-officio, and his duties, powers and term of office shall be prescribed in the by-laws of the College and a format approved by the Board of Trustees.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF THE HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE, INC.

Know all men by these presents, that, we whose names are hereunto subscribed, do hereby associate ourselves together for the purpose of forming a corporation under the provisions of the corporation laws of the State of Oklahoma, and for that purpose state:

ARTICLE ONE

The name of this corporation shall be HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE, INC.

ARTICLE TWO

The purpose of this corporation shall be the creation, establishment and maintenance of a college and institution of higher learning devoted to the promotion and impartation of higher learning, Christian education and such other education, instruction, learning, training and research as may be deemed essential for the cause of Christ and to that end prescribe courses of study and grant degrees. The doctrinal and theological position of this institution shall be that of the sponsoring denomination, Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists and the treatise of the National Association of Free Will Baptists as endorsed by the state body, and in connection therewith, in accordance with the stipulation of the Constitution and By-Laws of the State Association of Free Will Baptists, Inc.

- (a.) To prescribe courses of study for both resident and correspondence students, which shall include general education in the arts, Christian Ministries of Service and Biblical studies for wisdom; said courses to be taught in both'a Junior College Division and a Bible College Division, and to award degrees, either graduate or post-graduate, to those persons satisfactorily completing the prescribed courses of study and to grant such other literary honors, including honorary degrees, as shall be deemed advisable.
- (b.) To charge and collect tuition as determined by the Board of Trustees and to create scholarships.
- (c.) To employ professors, instructors and other subordinate employees as may be necessary for the proper conduct of the college under the direction and control of the President of the College, with the advice and consent of the majority of the Board of Trustees,
- (d.) To institute and carry on missions and commissions for missionary purposes and investigations.
- (e.) To publish and distribute such pamphlets, literature or books as may be required in the conduct of such work and the general promotion of the College.
- (f.) To sue and be sued in its corporate name and to enter into contracts of every type and nature.
- (g.) To solicit support, receive, collect, hold and receive by gift or bequest personal property in any amount, money or other thing of value; to purchase real estate, to receive real estate that may be given, or devised to the college for achieving the legitimate ends of the college and to sell or mortgage the same as the need arises.

(h.) To borrow money in payment of property for erecting buildings and making improvements and for any other purpose germane to the

objectives and purposes of the college,

(i.) To issue notes, bonds, debentures and other evidences of indebtedness and execute mortgages, liens and other incumbrances upon the property of the corporation, real or otherwise, to secure the payment of any such evidences of indebtedness.

(j.) To transact any and all business connected with said College as may

be necessary to achieve the purposes of said College.

(k.) To obtain under Internal Revenue Laws of the United States and of the Revenue Laws of the State of Oklahoma exemption from income property and other forms of taxation.

ARTICLE THREE

The location of this corporation shall be in Norman, Oklahoma.

ARTICLE FOUR

The duration of this corporation shall be perpetual.

ARTICLE FIVE

The general control of this corporation shall be vested in a Board of Trustees consisting of 15 members, 9 of which trustees shall be elected by the delegates to the annual Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists—each of which shall serve for a term of three years and until his successor is elected and qualified, and one member each shall be elected by the delegates to the annual meeting of the state association of Free Will Baptists of the States of Arkansas, Colorado, Kansas, Missouri, New Mexico and Texas, each of which shall serve for a term of six years and until his successor is elected and qualified. Initially, the 9 trustees elected by said Oklahoma Association shall include 3 elected for three years, three elected for two years, and 3 elected for one year but their successors shall all be elected for a term of three years and until their successors are elected and qualified. Initially, said trustee elected by said Arkansas Association shall be elected for a term of six years, said trustee elected by said Colorado Association shall be elected for a term of five years, said trustee elected by said Kansas Association shall be elected for a term of four years, said trustee elected by said Missouri Association shall be elected for a term of three years, said trustee elected by said New Mexico Association shall be elected for a term of two years, and said trustee elected by said Texas Association shall be elected for a term of one year but their successors shall be elected for a term of six years. The Chairman of said Corporation shall be one of the trustees elected by said Oklahoma Association.

ARTICLE SIX

An executive committee consisting of the Chairman, Vice Chairman, and Secretary of the Board of Trustees shall possess all powers of the Board of Trustees between the stated meetings of the Board of Trustees.

ARTICLE SEVEN

All contracts for building construction shall be let only to persons or corporations posting a valid performance bond and recording the same in the office of the County Clerk of Cleveland, Oklahoma,

SECTION IX

AMENDMENTS

This charter may be hereafter amended subject to the provisions contained herein and the laws of the State of Oklahoma. It is provided, however, that the Trustees of the College shall not propose or apply for any amendment which has not been previously authorized by an act of the Oklahoma State Association.

CONSTITUTION OF MINISTER'S CONFERENCE

ARTICLE 1

Members of this organization shall be all ordained ministers who participate in the benefits and activities of this body, and associate members who become members by payment of the \$1.00 annual dues.

ARTICLE 5

This conference shall meet Semi-Annually.

ARTICLE 6

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any regular session.

BY-LAWS OF MINISTER'S CONFERENCE

ARTICLE 1

The clerk or assistant clerk, or in their absence the senior minister in years shall call the ministers into conference. If a quorum is present the President or in his absence the Vice-President shall moderate the meeting. If neither of these are present, the senior minister in years shall be in charge.

ARTICLE 2

It shall be the duty of the clerk to enroll the ministers of the conference. Ministers shall present themselves with proper evidence of their rights to seats therein, and those enrolled by the clerk shall compose the conference. In case of questionable representation the case under question shall be referred to the Credential Committee.

ARTICLE 3

It shall be the duty of each minister belonging to this conference, to be active in pastoral or evangelistic services (disabled or retired ministers excepted). Any minister belonging to this conference shall report in each session in person or by letter, and failing to do so for two successive sessions shall be subject to discipline.

ARTICLE 4

Each conference shall be opened by reading a portion of God's word and prayer, and each session shall be closed with prayer.

ARTICLE 5

By a two-thirds vote of the members present ruling of the President may be overruled.

ARTICLE 6

This conference shall sit with open doors, except when it shall go into a committee as a whole.

ARTICLE 7

No member shall absent himself from the conference during its meeting without permission from the President.

ARTICLE 8

No person shall be allowed to nominate more than one member of a committee, unless person nominated is not elected.

ARTICLE 9

The President shall not allow discussion when not carried on in a Christian Spirit, or when he thinks it will cause discord.

ARTICLE 10

Anyone desiring to speak shall rise and address the President by the appelation "Brother President," but shall not speak further until recognized.

ARTICLE 11

No member of this conference shall be allowed to speak more than five minutes, nor twice on the same subject without permission from the President.

ARTICLE 12

These By-Laws may be altered or amended at any regular or adjourned session of this conference by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

ARTICLES OF FAITH OF STATE ASSOCIATION

1. THE BIBLE — The Scriptures of the Old and New Testament were given by the inspiration of God, and are our infallible rules of faith and

practice.

2. GOD — There is one living and true God, revealed in nature as the Creator, Preserver and Righteous Governor of the Universe, and in the Scriptures as the Father, Son and Holy Ghost, yet as one God, infinitely wise and good, whom all intelligent creatures are supremely to love, adore and obey.

3. CHRIST — Christ is God manifest in the flesh: in His divine nature truly God, in His human nature truly man. The mediator between God and man, once crucified. He is now risen and glorified is our ever-present

Saviour and Lord.

4. THE HOLY SPIRIT — The Scriptures assigns to the Holy Spirit all the attributes of God. He is the Reprover, Comforter, Guide and Sanctifier of all men.

5. THE GOVERNMENT OF GOD — God exercises a wise and benevolent providence over all beings and all things by maintaining the constitution and laws of nature. He also performs special acts of Grace,

not otherwise provided for as highest welfare of man requires.

6. THE SINFULNESS OF MAN — Man was created innocent, but by disobedience fell into a state of sin and condemnation. His posterity, therefore inherited a fallen nature of such tendencies that all who come to years of accountability, sin and become guilty before God.

7. THE WORK OF CHRIST — The Son of God, by His incarnation, life, suffering, death, and resurrection effected for all a redemption from sir

that is full and free and is the ground of salvation by faith.

- 8. THE WORK OF SALVATION The conditions of salvation are: 1. Repentance or sincere sorrow for sin and the hearty renunciations of it. 2. Faith or the unreserved committal of one's self to Christ as Saviour and Lord, with purpose to love and obey Him in all things. In the exercise of saving faith the soul is renewed by the Holy Spirit; freed from the dominion of sin and becomes a child of God. 3. Continuance in faith and obedience until death.
- 9. ELECTION God determined from the beginning to save all who should comply with the conditions of salvation. Hence by faith in Christ, men become His elect.
- 10. FREEDOM OF WILL The Human will is free and self controlled, having power to yield to the influence of the truth and the Spirit and live, or to resist them and perish.

11. SALVATION FREE – God desires the salvation of all, the Gospel invites all, the Holy Spirit strives with all, and whosoever will may come

and take of the water of life freely.

- 12. PERSEVERENCE All believers in Christ, who through grace persevere in holiness to the end of life, have the promise of eternal salvation.
- 13. BACKSLIDING AND APOSTASY A person who has been regenerated or born again and is living in unconfessed, unforgiven sin, is rebellious to the principles of the Kingdom of God and His righteousness, and therefore is a backslider in a lost condition who must repent and be

restored to the right relationship with God or be eternally lost.

We recognize, according to Hebrews 6: 4-6, that it is possible for a person to get in the condition that he could never return to Christ. This, we believe, is Apostasy; However, we also recognize that a regenerate person can fall into sin, be in a lost condition and still not be an Apostate. This person, through repentance, can be reconciled to God.

14. GOSPEL ORDINANCES — Baptism, or the immersion of believers in water, and the Lord's Supper, are ordinances to be perpetuated under the Gospel: Feet Washing, an ordinance teaching humility, of universal

obligation, and to be administered to all true believers.

15. TITHING — God commanded tithes and offerings in the Old Testament: Jesus Christ endorsed in the Gospel (Matt. 23: 23), and the Apostle Paul said, "Upon the first day of the week let every one of you lay by him in store as God hath prospered him." I Cor. 16: 2.

16. THE CHRISTIAN SABBATH — The divine law requires that one day in seven be set apart from the secular employment and amusements for rest, worship, holy works and activities, and for personal communion

with God.

17. RESURRECTION, JUDGMENT, AND FINAL RETRIBUTION—The Scriptures teach the resurrection of all men at the last day. They that have done good will come forth to the resurrection of life, and they that have 'done evil unto the resurrection of damnation: then the wicked shall "Go away into eternal punishment but the righteous into eternal life."

RULES OF ORDER

1. At every sitting of the Association, business shall be opened and concluded by prayer by the Moderator or whomever he may request.

2. Ministers and deacons present are invited to seats, allowed to take

part in debates on all subjects, and to vote.

3. Those who speak shall rise and address the Moderator. Personal reflections shall be avoided in all debates.

4. No motion may be discussed until made and seconded.

5. When a motion has been made and seconded, and a member opposes its discussion, the Moderator shall put the question. "Shall it be discussed?" If negative, the question shall not be discussed.

6. If any proposition or motion under debate contains two or more points, it shall be divided at the request of any member, and the vote

taken separately.

7. Motions made and lost shall not be recorded.

8. No one shall speak more than twice on the same subject without special leave of the Moderator.

9. All questions shall be decided by a majority vote of all Members present.

BY-LAWS OF STATE ASSOCIATION

1. The Clerk or assistant clerk, or in their absence, the senior minister in years shall call the Association into conference, and if a quorum is present the moderator, or in his absence, the assistant moderator shall take charge; and if neither of them is present the senior minister in years shall act as Moderator.

2. It shall be the duty of the clerk to enroll the delegates to the Association, who shall present themselves with proper evidence of their rights to seats therein, and those enrolled by the clerk shall compose the

Association.

- 3. It shall be the duty of every District belonging to this Association to send a letter to every annual session of this Association reporting in the same, spiritual condition, benevolent work, and its statistics. Any District belonging to this Association, which shall fail to report itself for two successive sessions, may be dismissed from the Association by a two thirds yote of all members present.
- 4. Each meeting shall be opened by reading a portion of the Bible and with prayer, and shall be closed with prayer.
- 5. By a two-thirds vote of members present, a ruling of the moderator can be overruled.
- 6. This Association may correspond by messenger or otherwise with other religious bodies.
- 7. This Association shall sit with open doors except when it shall go into a committee of the whole.
- 8. Any person not a member of this Association may be allowed to take part in its discussions by obtaining permission from the moderator.
- 9. It shall be the duty of all the Association to be present at the time appointed for each meeting, and anyone wishing to retire shall first obtain leave of the moderator.
- 10. No person shall be allowed to nominate more than one member of any committee, provided the person nominated be elected.
- 11. The moderator shall not allow discussions when not carried on in a Christian spirit or when he thinks it will cause discord or division.
- 12. Anyone desiring to speak shall rise to his feet and address the moderator by the appelation "Brother Moderator," but shall not speak further until recognized by the moderator.
- 13. No member of this association shall be allowed to speak more than ten minutes nor twice on the same subject without permission from the moderator.
- 14. These By-Laws may be altered or amended at any regular or adjourned session of this Association by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

CONSTITUTION OF STATE ASSOCIATION

PREAMBLE: From long experience, we the members of the Free Will Baptists denomination, being regularly baptized upon a profession of our faith in Jesus Christ, and realizing the necessity of a bond of union and fellowship among us as a church; and to preserve and maintain correspondence and co-ordination with us, do therefore ordain this Constitution for our better denomination government.

ARTICLE I

NAME: This organization shall be known as the OKLAHOMA STATE ASSOCIATION OF FREE WILL BAPTISTS.

ARTICLE II

PURPOSE: The object and purpose of this organization shall be to unify the work of the various bodies composing this State Association, and to devise and execute measures for the extension of the Kingdom of God in connection with the various bodies in the Association, or that may hereafter be represented therein.

ARTICLE III

REPRESENTATION: Section 1. This Association shall be composed of all ordained ministers and deacons with membership in some local church which is a member of a district Association with membership in the State Association.

Section 2: Each District Association shall be entitled to a number of elected delegates equal with the number of churches composing said Association. These delegates may be recommended by the local churches and shall be endorsed by their district association.

ARTICLE IV

FINANCE: Each elected delegate shall be represented with a fee of ten dollars.

ARTICLE V

DISCIPLINE: This State Association shall have the right to settle any question of discipline, doctrine or practices that may properly come before it from any of the bodies composing said organization; furthermore, if there be any question of discipline, doctrine or practices on the part of an affiliated association, delegates of that association shall not be seated until these questions have been settled to the satisfaction of the General Board.

Section 2: Decisions of the General Board may be appealed in this manner. All appeals shall come before the State Association when sitting in a committee as a whole.

ARTICLE VI

OFFICERS: A. The officers of the State Association shall consist of a Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, and an Executive Secretary. Each of these shall be elected at the close of each regular session except the Executive Secretary.

B. (1) The Executive Secretary shall be elected for a two year tenure. It shall be the responsibility of the Executive Board to seek out a prospective candidate and make their recommendation to the body at the state association in its regular session, with primary consideration given to the recommendation prior to any nominations.

(2) In the event of a vacancy occurring during the course of the year, the Executive Board shall fill the vacancy until the annual setting of the association.

ARTICLE VII

BOARDS: All standing boards shall be composed of seven (7) elected members who shall serve terms of 7, 6, 5, 4, 3, 2 and 1 years with such ex-officio members as may be provided elsewhere, except: (1) the General Board which shall be composed of one (1) member from each affiliated association, the chairman of each standing board, and the current general officers of this association, and (2) the College Board of Trustees which shall be composed as provided for in the Articles of Incorporation of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc.

The standing boards of this association shall be: Executive Board; Board of Church Extension, Missions and Evangelism; Sunday School Board; Church Training Service Board; and College Board of Trustees.

No standing board shall meet in a functional meeting during the session of this association.

ARTICLE VIII

DUTIES, SCOPE OF ENDEAVOR AND QUALIFICATIONS OF STANDING BOARDS

Section 1. EXECUTIVE BOARD: The Executive Board shall be composed of seven (7) members who are members of an affiliated association and in good standing with the association of which they are members. They shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

It shall be the duty of this board to act in behalf of the association when it is not in session. It shall be bound to carry out the directions of the association and shall hold itself bound by every consideration of morality and honor to carry out the wishes of this association and to act under its instructions in whatever technical rights, civil laws and the decisions of courts may give it in certain emergencies. It shall be the duty of this board to sign their signatures to any and all papers concerning properties, indebtedness, bonds, or other legal documents pertaining to the execution of the will of this association, exclusive of the College Board of Trustees.

This board shall have the oversight of the Executive Department of this association. The members shall assist and direct such work for the general promotion of this association as is deemed needful or necessary as the means available shall permit. The Executive Department shall serve as the coordinating agency of this association to correlate the work of all standing boards and agencies.

This board shall have the oversight of Free Will Baptist Book Store and shall endeavor to serve affiliated associations and churches and the community with literature and church supplies. Merchandising procedures shall be those accepted as normal retail procedures with the board being cognizant of the spiritual contribution of the store in distributing Christian literature.

All decisions of this board shall be governed by the general tenets of this association and shall not violate this constitution.

This board shall organize itself and elect such officers as necessary to the orderly conduct of its affairs and labors. This board shall keep an accurate record of all meetings, decisions, and work done and shall make a report in writing at each annual session of this association. All records shall be available to this association at its request.

Whereas this board represents the association when not in session, it and it alone shall have the power to call the association into special conference provided each affiliated association shall be given notice at least ten (10) days prior to the meeting of such special conference.

Section 2. GENERAL BOARD: This board shall be composed of one (1) member from each affiliated association, the chairman of each standing board, and the current general officers of this association. Each member must be a member of an affiliated association and in good standing with the association of which he is a member. The members shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

The duties of this board shall be to meet one (1) day preceding the annual session of this association. This board shall serve as the credential committee with the duties and responsibilities assigned by Article V of this constitution. This board shall hear reports of all standing boards. It shall serve as budget committee and shall make such recommendations as deemed pertinent to this association. A complete and accurate record shall

be kept of meetings of this board and a report shall be made in writing to this association in its annual session.

The moderator of the association shall serve as chairman of this board, and the clerk of the association shall serve as its clerk.

Section 3. BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION, MISSIONS AND EVANGELISM: This board shall be composed of seven (7) members who are members of affiliated associations and in good standing with the associations of which they are members. They shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

It shall be the duty of this board to labor to further the Gospel of Jesus Christ into the uttermost parts of the earth. In accomplishing this, they are to endeavor to establish missions and churches in communities within the bounds of this association with whatever moral and financial assistance that may be theirs, In cases of small churches failing to function, whatever assistance deemed appropriate shall be rendered to maintain the effective witness of that church by either direct labor with the church or with an associational board in instances where the affiliated association has a functional board or agency.

This board shall be empowered to receive and convey title to real

property in the area of its labors.

The promotion of missionary endeavors from a local, state or national level shall come within the scope of endeavor of this board. This board shall assist in maintaining prayer and financial support of missionary enterprises through whatever channels available.

Whereas missionary and evangelistic labors are so intimately related, this board shall assist through participation or assistance in maintaining a strong evangelistic thrust in the life of affiliated association.

This board shall organize itself and elect such officers as necessary to the orderly conduct of its affairs and labors. This board shall keep an accurate record of all meetings, decisions, work done, funds received and disbursed and shall make a report in writing at each annual session of this association. All records shall be available to this association at its request.

Section 4. COLLEGE BOARD OF TRUSTEES: The College Board of Trustees shall be composed as provided for in the Articles of Incorporation of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc.

Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc. is an agency of the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists and is incorporated under the corporate laws of the State of Oklahoma. The articles of incorporation are a part of this association's record and delineate the purpose, duty and scope of endeavor of the members of this board.

Section 5. CHURCH TRAINING SERVICE BOARD: This board shall be composed of seven members who are members of affiliated associations and in good standing with the associations of which they are members. They shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

The duties of this board shall be to plan and assist in organizing and sustaining a strong Church Training Service in every church in each association affiliated with this association with every means of promotion and assistance available to them. This board shall plan, coordinate and conduct state-wide youth camps or camp.

This board shall organize itself and elect such officers as necessary to the orderly conduct of its affairs and labors. This board shall keep an accurate record of all meetings, decisions, work done, funds received and disbursed and shall make a report in writing at each annual session of this association. All records shall be available to this association at its request.

Section 6. SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD: This board shall be composed of seven (7) members who are members of affiliated associations and in good standing with the associations of which they are members. They shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

The duties of this board shall be to plan and promote Sunday schools in every church in each association affiliated with this association. This board shall use every available means to promote Sunday school clinics, seminars, institutes and conventions on local, district and state-wide basis, working with local agencies to distribute and employ all effective methods and material available.

This board shall organize itself and elect such officers as necessary to the orderly conduct of its affairs and labors. This board shall keep an accurate record of all meetings, decisions, work done, funds received and disbursed and shall make a report in writing at each annual session of this association, All records shall be available to this association at its request.

Section 7. VACANCIES: Vacancies shall occur when a member moves from the territorial bounds of this association, by death, by resignation or by removal from office by this association. In the event of disciplinary action where charges concerning misconduct, doctrine or practice shall have been lodged against a member of any board, his office shall be held in abeyance until such charges shall be concluded or as determined by this association.

All boards shall have power to fill vacancies arising between sessions of this association. Such appointment shall terminate at the next session of the association and shall be filled by this association.

Section 8. EMPLOYEES: All employees of boards or agencies of this association shall be employed by agreement or contract with employing board or agency upon approval of this association except those elected by this association and the conditions of their employment shall be those approved by this association.

The duties of the Executive Secretary of this association shall be:

- (1) He is to represent, or cause to be represented, the association at all affairs of interest to the association.
- (2) He is to promote the work of the association in such a manner so as to unify the efforts of the association.
- (3) He is to serve with all standing boards and committees of the association in an ex-officio capacity.
- (4) He is to aid in planning the work of the association by relating the activities and plans of one board to another.
- (5) He is to report to the association during each annual session.
- (6) He is to communicate to the affiliated members of this association the pressing causes and events before the association. This can be in person or by means of a periodical bulletin or both.
- (7) He shall serve as treasurer of this association. An accurate and complete record of all funds received and disbursed shall be kept and a written report shall be included in his report to this association in its annual session.
- (8) The conditions of employment shall be determined by the Executive Board,

ARTICLE IX

DISSOLUTION: Should this association cease to function, all properties and holdings shall go to the National Association of Free Will Baptists after all creditors are satisfied and indebtedness cleared.

ARTICLE X

AMENDMENTS: This constitution may be amended or altered at any regular session of the association by a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of members present and voting, provided proposed amendment or alteration be presented in writing to the body one (1) day in advance.

ARTICLE XI

SPECIAL SESSIONS: Elected delegates to the last session of this association shall be retained as standing delegates for special called sessions.
