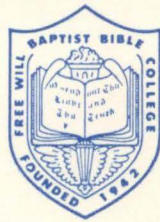

PROCEEDINGS OF THE STATE ASSOCIATION

THEME: "SOWING AND REAPING" (2 Cor. 9:6)

Tuesday Evening, October 21, 1975

The 67th Annual Session of the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists convened for the keynote message and worship in the Activities Building of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Moore, Oklahoma at 7:30 p.m.

David Parish led the congregation in singing "Amazing Grace." Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College Choir sang "Let Thy Holy Presence Come Upon Us," a call to worship. Earnest Harrison, Sr., led the Association in prayer.

Jerry Dudley, Clerk of the Association, called the Association into official session and introduced the officers who are to lead this convening of the Association.

Homer Young, Moderator, welcomed all delegates and visitors, giving a special recognition of visiting brethren from outside the Association.

Bill Jones, President of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, gave welcome to the convention and made special announcements.

In recognition of special efforts in giving to Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, plaques were awarded to the three churches with highest giving to Hillsdale. First place, Southern Oaks Church, Oklahoma City; Second place, Webb Church, Webb, Okla.; Third place, First Church, Ada, Okla.

Harvester's Quartet from Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College brought special music. The College Choir sang a medley of thrilling songs which warmed the hearts of the congregation.

David Joslin, Executive Secretary of Arkansas Free Will Baptists delivered the keynote message from the texts: 2 Cor. 9:6 and Haggai 2:15-19, from the theme, "Sowing and Reaping" with the message titled "Is the Seed Yet in the Barn." A challenging message was followed by souls at the altar.

An offering for a closed circuit television system for Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College was received in the amount of \$694.57.

The Assistant Moderator, Earnest Harrison, Sr., made announcements and read the appointment of committees. (See committees)

The benedictory prayer was led by Harry Lee.

Wednesday Morning Session, October 22, 1975

The Wednesday morning session opened with a musical prelude by Mrs. David (Karen) Parish. David Archer led the congregation in singing "Stand Up, Stand Up for Jesus" followed by prayer by Bob Followwill. The congregation then sang "I Love to Tell the Story."

The Moderator's admonition and morning devotion was delivered by Homer Young from 2 Cor. 9:6 developing the concept of "The Law of Sowing and Reaping." The admonition was closed in prayer.

Moderator then read Article III of the Constitution determining the standing delegates and who would constitute the voting body.

A welcome was given to the Association by O. T. Dixon, pastor of the host church, emphasizing "Peace and grace be multiplied to you" (Gal. 1:1-5).

The Association business session began with the Clerk reading a partial report of the General Board with all items related to seating of delegates. (The General Board is the credentials committee of the Association.)

All delegates representing the twenty-two (22) Associations seated and

recognized by the Moderator and advised of their voting rights and speaking privileges.

Rufus Coffey, Executive Secretary of the National Association of Free Will Baptists reported to the body the work of Executive Department of the National Association. (See Reports)

Moderator recognized Rev. and Mrs. E. M. Kennedy, former Executive Secretary of Oklahoma Free Will Baptists, who gave greetings to the body. Moderator appointed a steering committee of ministers from the Tulsa area who will serve in preparation for the National Association meeting in Tulsa, July 1976. (See Committees)

Herman Hersey, Director of Board of Retirement and Insurance of the National Association reported on the work of that Department. (See Reports)

Motion carried to adopt the printed program with the time element flexible. Rev. Herman Hersey presented a piano solo at the request of the Moderator, playing a beautiful arrangement of "When They Ring Those Golden Bells."

Cleo Pursell, Executive Secretary of the Woman's National Auxiliary Convention, gave an oral report of the Women's Auxiliary with glowing successes in almost every area of endeavor. This Department registered a \$15,000.00 increase in giving to missions.

Paul Kettelman, Director of Public Relations for Free Will Baptist Bible College, Nashville, Tennessee, gave a report of that institution and the Lord's blessings upon it. (see Reports)

James Earl Raper, Superintendent of Free Will Baptist Home for Children, Greenville, Tennessee, brought greetings and reported on the ministry of the home and its availability. (see Reports)

Moderator recognized all of the Ministerial Interns from Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College.

Earnie Deeds, Missionary to Brazil, who is home for the funeral of his father, was recognized and brought greetings and reported on the ministry God has given him in Brazil. Rev. Lonnie DaVoult led in prayer for God's comfort and provision for Earnie and his family in this hour of loss and sorrow.

Wednesday, October 22, 1975, 11:00 A.M. Worship Hour

Following a musical prelude by Nadine Followwill, Ollie Wright called the congregation into the worship hour. Bob Followwill led the convention in singing "Wonderful Grace of Jesus." Prayer was offered by Burton Perry. The Oklahoma Ministers Quartet sang "Because He Lives" and "His Grace Is Sufficient." Bob and Nadine Followwill sang a medley of "Sheltered in the Arms of God" and "I Should Have Been Crucified."

Ollie Wright, presiding over the worship hour, introduced the speaker of the hour, Jim Williams, Executive Secretary of Texas Free Will Baptists. Mr. Williams developed the theme of "Sowing and Reaping" and spoke from the message titled "The Stewardship of Sowing and Reaping." A fine gospel message which challenged each one was delivered. W. T. Roberts closed the worship in a benedictory prayer.

Wednesday Afternoon, October 22, 1975

After the musical prelude by Marion Pilgrim, Buddy Drake led the congregation in singing "Amazing Grace." Following prayer by David Sutton, the congregation sang "What a Friend We Have in Jesus."

Keith Burden presented the afternoon devotions from James 1:5 and Prov. 30:24 urging consideration of "Godly Characteristics."

Aileen Calvery, Missionary to Japan, brought greetings and information from her field of service.

Milburn Wilson gave report of State Sunday School Board. Plaques were awarded to Sunday School winning State Sunday School contest. (see Reports) Sunday School Board members elected: Edmond Warner, 7 year; Keith Burden, 6 year; Jim Haas, 1 year. Harold Harrison reported the work of the National Sunday School Department. (see Reports)

Board of Church Extension, Missions and Evangelism report given by Delbert Akin. Buddy Drake reported the progress of mission work in Enid. (see Reports)

Motion carried to accept the resignation of Delbert Akin from the Mission Board. A rising vote of thanks for twenty (20) years of service was given to Brother Delbert Akin. Roy Thomas led the convention in prayer for our mission churches. W. T. Roberts gave a report on the mission established in Claremore, Oklahoma. Mission Board members elected: 7 year—Berton Perry; 6 year—Ron Carner.

Henry Van Kluyve, Director of Deputational Ministries for Foreign Missions Department brought greetings from that Department and challenged Oklahoma to extended support and thanksgiving for the level achieved.

The Executive Board report was given by Clarence Shepherd. The report was received paragraph by paragraph. Recommendation No. 1 re: cooperative plan percentage allocation postponed for budget committee report. Paragraph 7 re: Article IV of the Constitution tabled until Thursday as it contains a constitutional change. (see Reports)

Executive Board members elected: 7 year—Dan Farmer; 2 year—David McDougal.

Executive Secretary's report was given by Lonnie DaVault. The report adopted. (see Reports)

Free Will Baptist Bookstore report given by Ray Martin. The report adopted. (see Reports)

Church Training Service Board report given by Louis Wickham. The report adopted. (see Reports) C.T.S. Board members elected: 7 year—Charles Bigger; 6 year—Richard Rust; 4 year—Orville Romine.

Committee set to study meeting time report read by Clerk. The recommended change of meeting time lost.

Study Committee on Promotional Programs report read by Clerk.

Item No. 1 re: size of "Promoter" carried.

Item No. 2 tabled indefinitely.

Motion carried to adjourn. Closing prayer led by Bailey Thompson.

Wednesday Evening, Worship Hour, October 22, 1975

The Evening Worship hour called to order by Executive Secretary, Lonnie DaVault. David Sutton introduced as presiding through the worship service.

Ted Davis led the congregation in prayer.

Frank Giles led the congregation in singing "To God Be the Glory." Following the song all guests and visitors were welcomed.

The congregation then sang "'Tis So Sweet to Trust in Jesus."

Northwest Oklahoma City Church choir sang "Oh What Grace" and "Come, Holy Spirit."

Delbert Akin, representing the Oklahoma State Mission Board presented awards to Western Avenue Free Will Baptist Church, Oklahoma City, and Robert Duncan as Director; and Jenks Free Will Baptist Church, Jenks, and David Sutton as Director, for completion of the projects to establish these churches.

Congregation sang "At the Cross." Frank Giles soloed "Calvary Conquered My Heart."

All of the Ordained ministers joined in a United prayer for the preaching of the Word which was led by Bill Jones.

Jim McAllister, Pastor of Farmington, Mo., Free Will Baptist Church and Moderator of Missouri State Association introduced as the speaker of the hour. His subject followed the theme "Sowing and Reaping" using the title "The Task of the Church." A great message was delivered and a good response to the invitation was evidenced with souls at the altar.

An offering was received for the "land fund" of the Enid Mission. Following announcements, the benediction was prayed by Clarence Shepherd.

Thursday Morning Business Session, October 23, 1975

Bill Jones, President of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, gave the report of the college. Jack Richey reported on the ministerial intern program. The report was adopted. (see Reports)

Harry Lee spoke encouraging strong support of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College and gave a plea for someone to begin a mission work in Edinburg, Texas.

Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College Board of Trustees members elected: 3 year—Delbert Akin, Milton Ford and Ray Gwartney; 1 year—Frank Wiley.

Billy Melvin, Executive Director of National Association of Evangelicals brought greetings and reported on the work of N.A.E., stressing "Spiritual Oneness."

Lonnie DaVoult reported benefits of N.A.E. membership and the N.A.E. convention, then closed the business session in prayer.

Thursday Morning Worship Hour, October 23, 1975

Following a piano prelude, Jerry Pilgrim led the congregation in singing "He Lives," accompanied by Marion Pilgrim.

Joe N. Conn led in prayer. Jerry Pilgrim soloed "I Find No Fault in Him" and "Come on Down." The congregation was moved to tears and shouting and a resounding Amen.

Joel Kircher, presiding over the worship hour, introduced Grover Terry, Pastor, First Free Will Baptist Church, Wichita, Kansas and Moderator of Kansas State Association of Free Will Baptists.

The morning message was developed from the theme "Sowing and Reaping" with a message entitled "Unity in Sowing and Reaping."

Thursday Afternoon Business Session; October 23

Keith Burden, accompanied by Velma Cox, led the congregation in singing "He Keeps Me Singing." Richard Rust led the congregation in prayer. The congregation then sang "I am Thine, O Lord."

Howard Ray Gwartney led in the afternoon devotions speaking from Phillipians 3:7-14.

The Clerk read the final report of the General Board. Items 6, 7, and 8 were adopted. (see Reports)

The State and National Master's Men report was given by Kenneth Lane. Motion carried to receive the report.

The Oklahoma State Minister's Conference report was given by Joel Kircher. Motion carried to receive the report. (see Reports).

The Clerk read the Obituary Committee report. The report was adopted. Following a moment of silence, J. Reford Wilson led in prayer of praise for having had these to serve with us.

The Clerk read the Public Morals Committee report. Motion carried to adopt the report and print it in a future issue of "The Promoter." (see Reports)

The Resolution Committee Report was read by the Moderator. Motion carried to adopt item by item.

Item No. 2. Amended to read "... a committee of the National Association ..." Carried.

Item No. 3. Carried

Item No. 4. Carried (see Committee Reports)

Motion carried to elect the General Board members as recommended by District Association letter and reported from the floor. (see Boards)

The combined report of all district letters given by clerk. Motion carried to print the report in "The Promoter."

Motion carried to instruct the Clerk to notify all General Board members of meeting time and place at least ten (10) days prior to meeting and the method of seating proxies.

Jack Richey elected as nominee to the General Board of the National Association.

Motion carried to take Item No. 7 of the General Board report from the table. Motion carried to refer to the Executive Board for further study and report back at next annual session.

Motion carried to adjourn.

- I. BE IT RESOLVED: that Free Will Baptist Book Store place a book in Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College library and Free Will Baptist Bible College library in memory of Mrs. Glenara Staires.
- II. WHEREAS, several of the graduates from our schools are enrolling in seminaries of other faiths which evidences a need, and,
WHEREAS, no move has been made toward establishing a seminary of our own denomination,
THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED: the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists recommends to the National Association of Free Will Baptists that a committee of the National Association seriously study the feasibility of establishing a seminary within our denomination, and that they report back to the 1977 convention their findings.
- III. BE IT RESOLVED: we instruct our State Office to close the books on the 25th of each month, and that all funds be forwarded immediately to the respective places.
- IV. BE IT RESOLVED: a proxy on the General Board be seated only in the following ways:
 - 1) If a member is on the General Board by virtue of being chairman of a standing board, a proxy can be seated for him only with a letter from the General Board member, then the proxy must also be a member of that standing board.
 - 2) If a member is on the General Board representing his district association, a proxy can be seated for him only with a letter from the member, and the proxy must of course be from the same district.
 - 3) In the case of a member of the General Board moving from the district he represents, a letter must be received from the district moderator or clerk, stating the action taken in electing a replacement.

PUBLIC MORALS COMMITTEE REPORT

We recommend:

- 1) That our churches cooperate with the Sooner Alcoholic and Narcotic Education, Inc. in a financial way, and that our pastors warn their people, especially the youth, of the dangers of misusing any type of drugs, and total abstinence of alcohol in any form.
- 2) That we go on record against the use of tobacco in any form and that our pastors set the example.
- 3) That we actively oppose any type of gambling.
- 4) That our churches conform to a more modest dress using I Peter 3:3-7 as our guide.
- 5) That we go on record as being opposed to pornography, and that we do all that is possible to stop the distribution of such.

- 6) That we stand opposed to the teaching of sex education in public schools because of the lack of moral application.
- 7) That we go on record deploring corruption in Government and oppose any candidate who stands in favor of any immoral issue.
- 8) That we challenge our public schools to present the biblical account of creation in contrast to the evolutionist theory.
- 9) That we oppose all television programs that present an immoral, worldly picture to our young people; and that we stand opposed to any immoral movie, regardless of the rating.
- 10) That we adhere to the principles of our Free Will Baptist Church Covenant.
- 11) The Clerk of the State Association of Free Will Baptists in Oklahoma be commissioned to write letters to governmental officials (State Legislature, Governor, etc.), and F.C.C. opposing:
 - 1) Legalized liquor by the drink
 - 2) Legalized gambling
 - 3) Immoral television
 - 4) Sale of pornography
 and that he stipulates that his letter represents 20,000 plus Free Will Baptists in Oklahoma.

GENERAL BOARD REPORT

The General Board of the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptist met Monday, October 20, 1975 at the First Free Will Baptist Church of Norman, Oklahoma; and as a result of that meeting we offer the following items for your consideration:

1. Correspondence from twenty-two (22) District Associations was received. Two of these are petitionary letters. We recommend that the delegates from these Associations be seated with one exception as noted in item two (2) of this report.
2. We recommend that the elected delegates from Eureka Association be seated when associational costs and delegate fees are received.
3. We recommend that "Hopewell # 1 Association" be received back into the fellowship of the State Association. We further recommend that the "Greater Tulsa Association" be received into the State Association. The General Board notes that "Tulsa Metropolitan Association" has become defunct with the member churches becoming members of other associations who are affiliated with the State Association.
4. The following correspondence was noted and the information referred to the Association in session:
 - (1) A request by Center Association for consideration in the election of trustees for Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College.
 - (2) A letter of resignation from J. C. Morgan as a member of the State C.T.S. Board.
5. This Board heard the reports of (1) Executive Board; (2) Executive Secretary; (3) Free Will Baptist Bookstore; (4) State Mission Board; (5) State Sunday School Board; (6) State Church Training Service Board; and (7) Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College Board of Trustees. We recommend their adoption as printed.
6. We recommend a cooperative plan budget of one-hundred-twenty-thousand (120,000.00) dollars for 1976-77 and that it be allocated as follows:

Be it resolved that the Executive Secretary call together the Chairman of each Board, plus the Promotional Men, at least annually in January and other times as he deems beneficial, to correlate the work of the different departments, discuss promotional ideas and plans and to better equip the Executive Secretary in his duties of representing the different departments of the State work. (Tabled)

STATE EXECUTIVE BOARD REPORT

The State Executive Board met four times this past year. At the request of the state association, we endeavored to obtain a permit to make the addition onto the bookstore, however, the Building Commission denied us a permit. Therefore, we purchased a 12' x 40' portable building and had it moved in to operate from. The City made us move this off our property. We moved to the Southern Oaks Church where we are presently shipping our Sunday School literature from. We are endeavoring to get a permit to bring this building back onto our property.

We have remodeled the front of the bookstore and have plans for further remodeling inside. Instead of borrowing money to pay for the portable building and the remodeling, we used the money that had been accumulated in the State Office, thus saving a loan and high interest.

The operation of the bookstore has been placed under a bookstore committee composed of three members of the Executive Board with guidelines set up and adopted by the Board.

Whereas the Co-operative budget was exceeded and whereas the executive department stayed within its budget and the results were an accumulation of funds, therefore we recommend the following:

- 1) That the Executive Department percentage of Co-op be changed from 25% to 23%.
- 2) We further recommend that \$2,000 be given to Hillsdale and \$2,000 be given to the CEP program of the State Home Missions from the Executive Department. These funds to be given when the money is available at the due date of the savings certificate. (February 1, 1976)

The Executive Board, at the request of the Hopewell # 1 Association, met with them on August 30 to examine them for membership into our State Association. They voted in conference to accept the Free Will Baptist treatise as their statement of doctrine and purpose. Therefore we recommend that they be accepted into the State Association.

We recommend that the state association meet at the Civic Center in Ardmore for its 1977 session.

In regards to Article IV referred to us from State Association: Motion carried that each association shall pay \$20.00 per church for the expenses of the State Associational meeting and no Association shall be seated until proper fee is received. (Referred back to Board for further study)

EXECUTIVE SECRETARY'S REPORT

Twelve months, 24,701 miles, 150 meetings, plus many blessings have been experienced this past year by me. I have attended 34 associational meetings, 13 Ministerial Alliance meetings, 15 youth camps, 34 preaching appointments, plus many of the quarterly meetings, 23 special services, one national convention, four other state meetings, two revivals, 11 board meetings, a promotional men's seminar, a National Association of Evangelicals national association, a state minister's conference, and a state CTS rally. In my spare time I worked some in the office.

We have enjoyed the most productive year in Free Will Baptist history. This includes souls saved, churches brought into the state, and money received through the office. We received \$341,619.00 through our state office which gave us a net gain of \$41,693.00. Of this gain, \$20,216.00 was designated and \$21,477.00 in Co-op. For this we praise the Lord. Each department of our state has enjoyed the greatest response in their own particular fields.

It was my privilege to attend the National Association of Evangelicals'

national conference in April. I have never been in a more harmonious religious service and have never heard as much emphasis placed upon the inspiration of the Bible, the blood atonement, the second coming of our Lord Jesus, and the work and power of the Holy Spirit as I did in this meeting. Two brethren from Missouri, Jim McAllister and Bill Evans, also attended the meeting and gave a glowing report to their annual meeting. I shall send out a supplementary report of this meeting to the ministers in the near future.

The historical report is brief again this year, however, I have come into possession of a nearly complete set of copies of the Eureka association minutes, which Brother Larry Haggard so graciously made for me. I also have a large selection of minutes of the Grand River association which Brother Alvin Baker, deacon of the New Home church at Coweta, gave to the collection.

Oklahoma is taking the lead in many areas of our denominational work and is just at the threshold of doing greater things for God. We became the No. 1 state in cooperative giving and I believe in National Home Missions also. We are ranking third in Foreign Missions, and of course are leading the way in money given for education. I'm glad I'm an Oklahoma Free Will Baptist.

JUNE 30, 1975**

(1) SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The State Association of Free Will Baptists is a non-profit organization designed to provide central leadership and representation for the Free Will Baptists of Oklahoma and to handle certain receipts and disbursements of the Free Will Baptist church. The Association uses the fund method of accounting, whereby the fund balance represents the equity the Association has in its assets. This accounting method is generally accepted among non-profit organizations as the most feasible way of reflecting their financial activity and position.

The Association's property and equipment is depreciated on the straight-line basis using the following estimated useful lives:

Furniture, fixtures and equipment acquired subsequent to July 1, 1972	8 years
Furniture, fixtures and equipment acquired prior to July 1, 1972	3 years

(2) MORTGAGE RECEIVABLE

The executive residence was sold on May 30, 1974, for \$20,500. The buyer assumed the mortgage on the property and gave the Association a second mortgage on the property for \$10,300. Payments are to begin on July 1, 1974. The rate of interest is 8% and the mortgage is for 30 years.

(3) COOPERATIVE CONTRIBUTIONS

The Executive Office of the State Association was allocated 25% of cooperative contributions for the financing of its operation for the fiscal year.

MISSION BOARD REPORT

The mission board met eight times during the past year. We have been busy keeping the Church Establishment Program (CEP) going.

C.E.P. '71. We are glad to announce that our pilot project under the Church Establishment Program—Western Avenue Free Will Baptist Church in Oklahoma City—has reached a self-sustaining basis. As of January 14, 1975, the board has not contributed anything to the maintaining of the church.

We are sure the association would be interested in knowing the cost of this project to Free Will Baptists. We submit the following figures: Receipts from the mission in the two fiscal years 1971-1973 were \$11,771.00. Expenditures were \$45,279.00. This gives a net cost of \$33,508.00. This does not include the amount received and spent from loans to build. It does include payments made back on the money borrowed. During this time the church itself contributed \$3,600.00 to the over-all Free Will Baptist work.

C.E.P. '72. Our project in Jenk has been going well under the leadership of Rev. David Sutton. We feel that this church will soon be able to release itself from the held of the mission board. We would like to submit the following figures to show the cost of this church to Free Will Baptists: Receipts from the mission for the two fiscal years 1973-1975 were \$14,935.00. Expenditures were \$38,368.00 for a net cost to the board of \$23,433.00. This does not include money received and spent from loans for land or buildings which has been secured by mortgage and assumed by the church. Payments on loans while held by the board are included. During the time we have been helping this church they have contributed \$941.43 to the denominational work, last year.

C.E.P. '73. Since our last report to the association we have made considerable progress on C.E.P. '73—our Enid work. Rev. Buddy Drake was chosen as our missionary and held his first service there on April 3, 1975. The progress reports of the work there have been good. Some property has already been considered for purchase so we will soon be hearing that the church there has a permanent location.

C.E.P. '74. The board voted in its July meeting to make Ponca City its next project. As finances and personnel become available we will be moving in this direction.

SUMMARY. In summarizing what we have learned as a board over the past 4 years and 3 C.E.P. Projects, we feel that we can say: (1) That some churches will cost more to get started than others—this is no reflection upon our missionaries. It only shows that the price of land and buildings and the availability of people vary from place to place. (2) That we are going in the right direction. When we consider the limited funds we have at our disposal and the churches the state has reaped from C.E.P., we feel that the state has had a good return on their money invested in the work. (3) How dependent this board is upon the cooperative efforts of the people of Oklahoma. We have seen in a small way what could be done on a large scale if all of our people in the state felt a burden for this work.

GIVING. We are thankful for the growth in giving that our board has seen in the past 5 years. The following figures show it:

We sent a new home missions couple to the field every month last year. The stream continues. *Harley and Sharon Bennett* had their first service in Pocatello, Idaho on September 14 with 27 present. *Karel and Gladys Smith* are now on their way to Albuquerque, New Mexico. We have also entered a new state this year. *Vergel and Alyne Maness* have arrived in Wilmington, Delaware to begin a new work there. "*Butch*" and *Alma Johns* are now doing itinerate work to begin a new work in San Diego, California.

We are still concerned about the many cities of your area without the witness of a Free Will Baptist church. We are still praying for qualified, capable, determined men to go to *Oklahoma* and build churches in your cities. We praise God for *Buddy and Janice Drake* who are now working in Enid, Oklahoma.

A look at our country reveals that not one person in ten is a Christian and not one in one thousand is a Free Will Baptist. Only one church in five preaches the gospel, and five out of six Free Will Baptists who move will find no Free Will Baptist church in their new city.

Eleven states are without any Free Will Baptist churches, 7 states have only 1 church, and 12 states have less than 8. There are 26 capitals and thousands of other large cities where Free Will Baptists are doing nothing to keep people from going to hell.

Will you help us by praying for God to give more laborers and by supporting those we have. Our budget for this year is \$581,000.00. Your state has given \$40,673.49 toward its quota of \$50,000.00. Will you make a personal gift now to help reach souls?

Thank you for your gifts and prayers. We hope to see many of you at your convention.

Oklahoma State Association—Moore, Oklahoma—October 21-23, 1975
Greetings—To Each of you from your Foreign Missions Staff at home and abroad.

Gratitude—Is expressed to the churches of Oklahoma for their gifts to the work of overseas. Evangelism as carried on through the Free Will Baptist Foreign Missions Department.

Giving—From your state for the past five years stands as follows.
1970, \$63,809.72; 1971, \$76,691.16; 1972, \$72,619.75; 1973, \$91,383.98; 1974, \$92,196.64; 1975 through August, \$81,034.90.

—(Your state quota for 1974 was \$88,000.00. Receipts for 1974 totaled \$92,196.64. You exceeded your quota by \$4,196.64. Your 1975 quota is \$100,000.00. Receipts thus far are ahead of those recorded for the same period last year.)

—Overall inspires our hearts. Foreign Missions receipts for the first six months of 1975 exceeded those of the same period last year. April's receipts soared to a *record high* of \$117,324.63. May's income also topped the one hundred thousand dollar mark with \$100,149.79. We recorded another thrilling response in July by reaching \$111,122.47. Praise the Lord!

—From individual churches using the faith promise plan has been thrilling. More churches are mobilizing to "act out" the great commission of our Lord Jesus. My personal itinerary alone saw \$4,767.20 faith promised monthly from 17 churches January through April, 1975. Of this amount \$4,267.20 is new support. Praise the Lord!

Growth—Is quite evident as we now have 93 missionaries serving Christ in eight countries. In addition—

—Recently four couples departed the states for language study. They are Dale and Sandra Bishop (Japan), Lynn and Ramona Wiley (Ivory

Coast), Dennis and Carol Teague (France), and Jerry and Janice Webb (France).

—Three new couples and four single girls graduated from missionary internship this past May. Patrick and Susan Dickens (unassigned), Allan and Larue Crowson (Ivory Coast), Steve and Judy Lytle (Panama), Sharon Roberts (Ivory Coast), Alice Smith (Ivory Coast), Judy Smith (Japan), and Arilla Wode (unassigned) are now on active deputation.

—Another three couples and a single girl entered missionary internship in September. Jim and Susan Moser (Brazil), Clint and Lynette Morgan (Ivory Coast), Ron and Linda Callaway (Spain), and Mirial Gainer (Japan) are anxious to begin their specialized studies.

—Last but not least we are happy to report that five summer missionaries have served in Africa and Brazil this year. Pearlene Derosssett, Kathy Reeds, and Margaret Sutherland worked in Ivory Coast. Wayne and Miriam Whittaker assisted missionaries in Brazil.

Gearing—for future needs we are attempting to enlist 200 churches which are willing to give \$500.00 per year (payable any time during the year) for the cash needs of new missionaries. In this way when the appointee's monthly support need is realized, cash made available from the 200 churches can be deposited in their accounts and final approval can then be given for departure. It is virtually impossible for the appointee to accumulate the required \$15,000.00 in 12 months of deputation. We need your prayers—and your help!

SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD REPORT

The Board met five times this year. As we close out this year's work we feel that God has given us the best year we have ever had. The Board conducted five institutes and two Sunday School Seminars this year. The Spring of 1975 shows growth among Free Will Baptist Churches in Oklahoma. It was our privilege as State Sunday School Board to co-sponsor with Hillsdale and individual churches Sunday School Revivals all across the state. We felt Bro. Keith Kenemer did an outstanding job in motivating the churches where he was involved.

Out of sixteen churches directly involved, eleven set new attendance records on Easter Sunday. A goal was set for Four Thousand in Sunday

School in these churches, and we passed this goal by six hundred. The percentage of increased growth with all the churches involved was 45.5%. But the greatest miracle of all was that over three hundred decisions for Christ were accounted for in these sixteen churches.

It was also a joy for the state Sunday School Board to receive the response of all Free Will Baptist Churches of Oklahoma in cooperating in the Spring Enlargement Campaign. Eighty-six churches entered the campaign, and at the deadline for turning in final results sixty-three churches returned their results. Over the state the average increase gain for all the churches was 22.8% for which we thank God. The winners of the State Enlargement campaign are as follows:

Numerically, the Youth Conference has tripled in the last three years and spiritually we felt that this year's Conference was the ultimate thus far. During the Youth Banquet, at which over 1,200 attended, the Holy Spirit moved sweetly upon the scene and many young people slowly but surely stood silently, unashamed at their tears, as they committed their lives to the Lord Jesus, especially in the realm of personal witnessing.

Though our resources are limited and our staff is small, we are constantly striving to meet the needs of our people as well as present the total concept of our department's ministries: (1) A 25-minute, full color sight and sound slide presentation titled "CTS IS THE FAMILY PLACE" is available now for showing at area youth rallies or district meetings. the traditional approach and is tremendously evangelistic. Our Christmas programs are written with the average Free Will Baptist church in mind, consequently characters are flexible and suggested scenery and costumes are simple.

Report to the Oklahoma State Association

September 9, 1975

Another-record enrollment! At the beginning of the 1975-1976 academic year, 195 students enrolled, a 23% increase over 1974.

Graduates of Hillsdale have now been accepted at Southwestern Seminary as well as many other schools both in and outside Oklahoma. More and more Free Will Baptists are expressing interest in the concept of external studies. An intense investigation is now underway to see how we can best meet the very real needs in this area.

Gift income for the past year totaled over \$250,000. This included approximately \$55,000 for the four-plex. This building is now complete and debt free—a real tribute to the vision and concern of the 67 individuals and churches who made it possible. The following associations are to be especially commended for having attained their suggested goal: Eureka, Fellowship, Gaines Creek, Poteau River Valley, Roberts-McGee, South Grand River, and Union. Suggested goals for this fiscal year are listed following the auditor's report.

The summer project this year was the four-plex, a unit apartment that is designed for married students but will temporarily house part of our men students. The house in Moore formerly used as the president's home has been sold and the money placed in our building fund.

Several new faculty members joined Hillsdale this fall. Mr. Edwin Wade is the new (Acting) Academic Dean. He is from Mountain Grove, Missouri, but has pastored the Garden Grove, California church for the past eight years. Dr. J. Reford Wilson is our new missions and Bible instructor. He has been director of Free Will Baptists Foreign Missions for 13½ years. Mr. Thomas Marberry, an alumnus of Hillsdale, has returned as instructor of New Testament Greek and Church History. He will complete his doctoral program soon at Baylor University in Waco, Texas. Dr. Bailey Thompson comes to us after 17 years at Poteau, Oklahoma. As Dean of Men, Bailey will be counselling and supervising on-campus students and will be assisting in the internship program for all ministerial students.

The future holds great promise. With qualified leadership, dedicated to the task and not afraid of anything, we can fully expect God to use these men and women to instruct, encourage and direct Hillsdale students into their being developed to attain their full potential.

Our budget for 1976-77 totals \$565,597.98.

This report is submitted with thanksgiving to God who has done wonderful things in our midst.

In our opinion, except for the effect of any adjustments that might be required with respect to the fund balances at June 30, 1972, the accompanying financial statements present fairly the financial position of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College as of June 30, 1975, and results of its operations for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

Free Will Baptist College was begun and continues as a work of faith. This passage in Hebrews has been made very vivid to the administration of Free Will Baptist Bible College. God has proved that He honors the faith of His people. In a year of financial reverses and recession across our nation, God has made it possible for the college to receive "exceeding abundantly above all" we asked or thought. We join you in praise to Him that we are able to bring you this "good report."

The number of your state's churches who support Free Will Baptist Bible College continues to grow. More and more people across the denomination recognize the need of providing Bible-centered disciplined training for our denominational workers. The term "workers" includes Sunday School teachers, youth directors, pastors, teachers for public schools and Christian day schools, missionaries, musicians and other vital leaders of our people. The personnel at the college wishes to thank you as individuals and congregations for your willingness to share in this costly ministry that pays such dividends.

Total general fund gifts of \$297,231.15 for the 1974-75 year exceeded the previous years gifts by \$40,063.93. Monthly general fund gifts averaged \$24,769.26 or a daily gift flow of \$814.33 from our churches and their people.

OKLAHOMA STATE'S gifts to the general fund decreased \$2,000.13 this past year. \$15,000.00 is suggested as your state's quota during 1975-76 as compared to last year's \$14,000.00.

Library volumes total 23,235, an increase of 835 volumes during the year. Of this number, the historical collection now numbers 625 volumes. The average Bible College in the United States has approximately 32,381 library volumes.

Your state students are listed in this report along with other vital statistics of interest to you.

May we remind you that "except the Lord build the house, they labor in vain that build it." Your continued prayers and support are needed again this year. Thank you for letting us know we can count on you.

Usually their lives have been bruised and scarred by the tragedies of life that have come their way, and we try to pick up the broken pieces and restore purpose and meaning to life for them.

Family and friends give a home to some children like this, the welfare department makes provision for some, but there are some we can help that would not be reached by any other agency. The most important part is the difference in the service rendered. That difference is that we not only provide for the physical needs, but also the spiritual needs, which is far greater.

Regardless of how they have been treated, these children love their families. At the best we are a substitute for home and family for them. We cannot give them back their home and family, but we can provide for them while they are in our care. Free Will Baptist Home For Children is endeavoring to bridge the gap and meet the needs of a child during this crisis period of life.

Your prayers and support are vital to our work. We invite you to visit the Home. Thank you and God bless you for the part you have had in this work of providing a home for needy children. The Home has cared for children from 13 states since its beginning in 1939. We have a ten year old boy in the Home from Locust Grove, Oklahoma. Gifts from your state to the Home are as follows: 1972—\$328.22; 1973—\$329.45; 1974—\$1,100.99; and gifts through August in 1975—\$778.99.

**OKLAHOMA STATE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY CONVENTION
CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS**

ARTICLE I

NAME

This organization shall be known as the Oklahoma State Woman's Auxiliary Convention.

ARTICLE II

PURPOSE

The purpose of this convention shall be to bring the women of each district convention together for fellowship, sharing information, and encouraging one another in the work of the Lord.

ARTICLE III

OFFICERS

The officers of this convention shall be a president, vice president, secretary, treasurer, and field worker. These shall serve on the state executive committee together with three members elected by the convention as desired. These shall serve for a period of 2 years.

ARTICLE IV

MEMBERSHIP

This convention shall be composed of the officers of the convention together with each active auxiliary member of the district or local (duly accredited by the credentials committee).

ARTICLE V

MEETINGS

The annual meeting shall be held each year on the day preceding the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists and at the place designated by said Association.

ARTICLE VI

AMENDMENTS

This constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the convention by a two-thirds vote of members present.

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1, President. The president shall preside over all meetings, appoint such committees as may be needed, call the executive committee together when necessary, be ex-officio member of all committees, and serve as chairman of the executive committee, see that reports are made promptly to the national secretary and perform all duties usually pertaining to such an office.

Section 2, Vice President. The vice president shall preside in the absence of the president or by her request and otherwise assist her in the overseeing of the work in general.

Section 3, Secretary. The secretary shall keep an accurate record of all proceedings of the convention and executive meetings, preserve all valuable papers and turn same over to her successor in office, and make an annual report to the national secretary on a form available from the WNAC office. She shall compile the districts slates of officers and addresses immediately after the convention. She shall also send a slate of state officers and addresses to the national executive secretary. She is chairman of the Credentials Committee.

The secretary shall also serve as historian keeping an historical record and submitting historical information to the national executive secretary annually.

Section 4, Treasurer. The treasurer shall have charge of all funds belonging to this convention and shall pay out same only when authorized by the convention. The treasurer shall keep an accurate account and shall give a written report of all funds received and disbursed at each annual meeting of the convention. She shall also send an annual report to the WNAC office (executive secretary-treasurer) at least ten days before the end of the fiscal year. She shall encourage support of missions through the WNAC Gift Plan, individual giving and special offerings.

Section 5, Field Worker. The field worker shall have charge of all field work pertaining to, or necessary to, the promotion of the work of the convention and keep the national program before the district officers.

ARTICLE II

ELECTIONS

The general officers shall be nominated by a nominating committee and shall be elected by acclamation, unless there are other nominations. In case of more than one nominee for any particular office, a vote will be taken on each. All elections shall be held at the closing business session of the convention.

ARTICLE III

EXPENSES

Section 1. An appropriation of 10 cents per mile toward the expense of the general officers, when called upon to attend the executive committee meeting to plan program, secretary's expenses, phone calls, postage and stationery for officers will be paid by the convention. All field promotional work is subject to the state executive committee, who should approve all work done by state officers in the interest of state work, as well as expenses of the same.

Section 2. An amount of \$50.00 shall be paid on the expense of the state president to attend WNAC.

ARTICLE IV

COMMITTEES

Section 1. Executive Committee—The executive committee shall be composed of the five officers and three members elected by the convention. Five of these shall compose a quorum. They shall hold meetings for the transaction of business as often as necessary. It shall be the duty of the executive committee to maintain an overseeing of the work at large. They shall act for the convention when necessary. They shall meet with district presidents the night preceding the state auxiliary convention.

Section 2. Resolutions Committee—A resolutions committee of five members shall be appointed by the president as needed.

Section 3. Nominating Committee—The nominating committee shall be composed of at least one member from each district convention. Nominations shall be submitted by district with their annual report. These elected by the body at the annual meeting.

Section 4. Credentials Committee—The secretary shall be chairman of the credentials committee, and other members may be appointed by the president. The treasurer shall be a standing member of this committee.

Section 5. Finance Committee—The finance committee shall be appointed by the president. This committee audits the financial records of the year and reports on same to the convention.

Section 6. Student Loan Committee—State Auxiliary President and 2

elected members to serve 2 years each. They shall be elected on alternate years.

Section 7. Registration committee shall be provided by the district convention which is host to state convention.

ARTICLE V

FEES AND REPORTS

Active members shall pay dues of \$1.50 per year. With 25 cents remaining in the district. \$1.25 to be forwarded to state where 25 cents shall be retained, and \$1.00 forwarded to WNAC as required for membership fees. It shall be the duty of each body directly affiliated with the State Auxiliary Convention to send a report to every annual session.

ARTICLE VI

AMENDMENTS

These by-laws may be amended by a two-thirds vote of members present at regular meeting of the state auxiliary convention.

ARTICLE VII

GIFTS

The desired plans for giving in the Woman's Auxiliary are those adopted by WNAC as follows:

1. Mission offerings following each special season of prayer
2. Co-Laborer offering (monthly or quarterly designated to WNAC General Fund)
3. WNAC Emphasis Month in August or other time more convenient to help in support of WNAC General Fund
4. Memorial Student Loan Fund (special program and offering in September to assist worthy and needy students at FWBBC in Nashville)
5. Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College Student Loan Fund. (Special program and offering in September to assist worthy and needy students at Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College)
6. Tithes—Pay tithes on all undesignated money received
7. All offerings are to be forwarded through regular channels

ARTICLE VIII

WNAC DELEGATE

Each district convention shall submit one nomination for a State delegate to WNAC with their annual report. This nomination (along with others as needed to make up 15 delegates to WNAC) shall be elected by the body at the annual meeting. It shall be the duty of delegates elected to notify president if they cannot attend WNAC. President shall appoint delegates as needed in absence of regular elected delegates.

THE FREE WILL BAPTIST MASTER'S MEN

State of Oklahoma CONSTITUTION

PREAMBLE

The purpose of the Free Will Baptist Master's Men, state of Oklahoma is to provide a means of Christian fellowship and to deepen the spiritual lives of the laymen of the local church. Also, to provide a means of developing the abilities and talents of the laymen, and to promote the cause of Christ through a complete, "total church program," as prescribed by Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists.

ARTICLE I

NAME

The name of this organization shall be known as the Free Will Baptist Master's Men, State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE II

MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. The membership of this organization shall be composed of the district associations of Master's Men, and any local chapters where there is only one chapter in the district, within the state of Oklahoma.

Section 2. Every member in good standing of an affiliated district association of Master's Men, or any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district, is entitled to the full benefits of membership.

Section 3. Each district association, or any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district, shall submit an annual, written report to this body, (as a matter of information).

ARTICLE III

OFFICERS

The officers of this organization shall consist of a president, vice-president and a secretary-treasurer.

The officers of this organization shall be elected annually and may succeed themselves, at this level.

ARTICLE IV

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The executive committee shall consist of the elected officers of this organization and they shall serve as the program committee for each annual convention.

Section 2. Ex-officio members of the executive committee shall be the presidents of the district associations of Master's Men, presidents of any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district, and the state executive secretary of the State Association of Free Will Baptists.

ARTICLE V

MEETINGS

This organization shall meet annually at 7:30 P.M. on the Monday night before the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists convenes.

ARTICLE VI

AMENDMENTS

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of any regular meeting.

BY-LAWS

VOTING RIGHTS

Section 1. Every member of each affiliated district association, or any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district, is eligible to vote on all questions and matters that might come before the Free Will Baptist Master's Men, State of Oklahoma.

COMMITTEES

Section 2. The executive committee shall transact all routine business and shall act for the organization in the interim between meetings.

Section 3. The executive committee shall meet at the call of the president.

Section 4. A nominating committee, for the annual election of officers, shall be composed of the presidents of each district association, and the president of any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district.

Section 5. The president shall appoint all other committees, subject to the approval of the body.

FINANCE

Section 6. This organization shall be financed on the basis of offerings, dues and assessments.

QUORUM

Section 7. One-tenth of the members of this organization shall constitute a quorum at any regular meeting.

AMENDMENTS

Section 8. These by-laws may be amended at any regular meeting by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

As adopted by the Free Will Baptist Master's Men, State of Oklahoma annual session, in Muskogee, Oklahoma October 19, 1970.

HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE, INC. BY-LAWS BOARD OF TRUSTEES

SECTION I

The Board of Trustees of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc., an Oklahoma corporation, shall be composed of fifteen members, elected as provided in the Articles of Incorporation of said College, as amended:

ARTICLE A—OFFICERS: The officers of the board of Trustees shall be a Chairman, an Assistant Chairman, and a Secretary, each of whom shall be elected by the Board for a term of one year. They shall continue in office until their successors have been chosen:

Item 1—CHAIRMAN: The chairman of the Board of Trustees or his assistant shall preside at all meetings of the Board. He shall be an ex-officio member of the Executive Committee.

Item 2—SECRETARY: The Secretary shall record and preserve minutes of all meetings and acts of the Board of Trustees and countersign all deeds, conveyances, and other papers authorized by the Board. He shall have authority to call special meetings of the Trustees of the College upon the written request of two-thirds of the members of the Board; he shall mail notice of said meeting to the trustees ten (10) days in advance.

Item 3—EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE: The Executive Committee shall consist of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, the Vice-Chairman of the Board, the Secretary of the Board. The Executive Committee shall have authority to consider and act upon all questions affecting the College which may be brought before it between the stated meetings of the Board, or a quorum of the Board fails to attend a called or regular meeting. It shall transact such business as may be committed to it by the Board and shall act for the College on such matters as it may submit to it. The Committee shall meet at the call of the Chairman or the President of the College.

ARTICLE B—MEETINGS: The Board of Trustees shall meet each year at a time and place agreed upon by the Board. It shall, also, hold special meetings whenever called in accordance with the By-Laws of the Board. Such special meetings may be called by either the chairman of the Board, or the President of the College.

ARTICLE C—QUORUM: A majority of the members or the Board of Trustees of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc. in attendance at any called or regular meeting, written notice of which has been mailed by the

Secretary to each trustee, shall constitute a quorum. No proxy votes shall be permitted. No ex-officio member shall be entitled to vote at meetings of the Board of Trustees.

ARTICLE D—ELECTIONS: In all elections held by the Board of Trustees each member present except ex-officio members shall be entitled to one vote, and the result shall be determined by a majority of the votes cast. Due notice of any election must be personal notice to the members or a day on the minutes of the Board not less than one week preceding the election.

SECTION II

OFFICERS OF HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE

The officers of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College shall be a President, Vice-President, Dean, and a Business Manager, each of whom shall be elected by the Board of Trustees to hold office for two years exclusive of the President whose term of office shall be indefinite. It is provided, however, that retirement of any one of the officers herein named may occur at any time upon the resignation of the officer or the request of the Board. In either case, notice shall be given six weeks before the date of the proposed retirement unless otherwise agreed upon by the concerned parties.

ITEM ONE—PRESIDENT: The President shall be executive officer of the Board of Trustees and shall have general control of the College including its officers, teachers, students, and business. He shall render to the Board complete annual reports and to its chairman, Executive Committee or other committees such information as may be deemed essential to a thorough knowledge of the operation of the College and its promotion. He shall be a member of the Board of Trustees ex-officio and the Executive Committee ex-officio and shall have the rights and privileges of a member of the Board except voting. The President shall execute all documents, instruments, and conveyances on behalf of the College. Duties of the president and working relationship shall be further detailed in a format approved by the Board of Trustees.

ITEM TWO—VICE PRESIDENT: The Vice-President shall perform all the duties of the President in the absence of the latter.

ITEM THREE—DEAN: The Academic Dean of the College shall, under the President, fix the hours of recitation, govern, control, and regulate the conduct of the students, have general oversight of curriculum, student's records, and such other internal details and administrative duties as may be delegated to him by the President of the College.

ITEM FOUR—BUSINESS MANAGER: The Treasurer shall keep an accurate record of all accounts of the College and shall receive and expend as directed by the Board of Trustees and President, all money for the expenses of the institution. He shall make an annual report to the Board and furnish the Executive Committee with such information pertaining to his office as may be requested. He shall provide bond in whatever amount the Board may require. Until such times as the Board of Trustees may deem different the Treasurer's office shall be contained within the Business Manager's Office. The Business Manager may at the direction of the administration designate this duty to a subordinate officer. The Business Manager shall have general supervision of the financial business of the College, and shall, at the direction of the President, be responsible for the upkeep of all the physical facilities and premises of the College. His detailed duties are directed in a format approved by the Board of Trustees.

SECTION III

FACULTY

The faculty shall consist of the President, the Dean, and all teachers of

Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College. Instructors and assistant teachers shall have the privilege of sitting with the faculty in stated meetings but shall not have the right of voting.

It shall be the policy of the College to employ on its faculty those who are members of Free Will Baptist churches that are affiliated with the National Association. Emergencies, however arising from the resignation, illness, death, or approved leaves of absence of faculty members may be relieved by the temporary employment of instructors who are affiliated with any evangelical denomination. Part-time or short-term instructors, deemed essential to the successful prosecution of a consistent education program, may be employed at the discretion of the President without respect of denominational affiliation.

The faculty, under the authority and jurisdiction of the President, shall have general charge of instruction, attendance of students, examinations, administration of curriculum, discipline, and all matters involving the spiritual, physical, and social welfare of the College. The faculty shall be hired upon recommendation of the President.

In the selection of the faculty qualitative factors shall be kept in mind. All faculty members shall be urged to pursue graduate programs in their respective fields. Except in special cases no faculty member will be required to teach courses outside of his field.

SECTION IV ACADEMIC COUNCIL

The Academic Council shall consist of the President, the Dean and the heads of the departments of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College: It shall determine the curriculum and academic policy of the College, prescribe requirements for admission, certificates, diplomas, and degrees, and supervise the courses of instruction offered by the various departments of the College.

SECTION V CONTRACTS

The Board of Trustees shall establish the College policy involving the execution of contracts, deeds of conveyance, the determination of salaries, and employment of all officers, representatives, faculty members and essential domestic and maintenance employees. The President of the College shall negotiate agreements, executive contracts, employ representatives, and supply vacancies incurred by the termination of contracts, resignations, or death of any essential employees. All contracts for building construction shall be let only to persons or corporations posting a valid performance bond and recording the same in the Office of the County Clerk of Cleveland County, Oklahoma.

SECTION VI ADVISORY COUNCIL

An advisory council shall be formed which is to be composed of interested, qualified persons in the various fields which will be of value in building and maintaining a strong academic program to carry out the educational program stated in the charter.

SECTION VII AMENDMENT

These By-Laws may be amended by a favorable vote of two-thirds of the qualified members of the Board of Trustees of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College at any meeting of the Board, provided that the proposed amend-

ment has been submitted in writing to each Trustee one month in advance. This change to be subject to the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists.

SECTION VIII ADMINISTRATIVE FUNCTIONS

The President of the Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College shall be elected by the Board of Trustees, and he shall act for and on behalf of the Board in the conduct and management of the institution. He shall also be a member of the Board of Trustees ex-officio and of the Executive committee, ex-officio, and his duties, powers and term of office shall be prescribed in the by-laws of the College and a format approved by the Board of Trustees.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF THE HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE, INC.

Know all men by these presents, that, we whose names are hereunto subscribed, do hereby associate ourselves together for the purpose of forming a corporation under the provisions of the corporation laws of the State of Oklahoma, and for that purpose state:

ARTICLE ONE

The name of this corporation shall be **HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE, INC.**

ARTICLE TWO

The purpose of this corporation shall be the creation, establishment and maintenance of a college and institution of higher learning devoted to the promotion and impartation of higher learning, Christian education and such other education, instruction, learning, training and research as may be deemed essential for the cause of Christ and to that end prescribe courses of study and grant degrees. The doctrinal and theological position of this institution shall be that of the sponsoring denomination, Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists and the treatise of the National Association of Free Will Baptist as endorsed by the state body, and in connection therewith, in accordance with the stipulation of the Constitution and By-laws of the State Association of Free Will Baptists, Inc.

(a.) To prescribe courses of study for both resident and correspondence students, which shall include general education in the arts, Christian Ministries of Service and Biblical studies for wisdom; said courses to be taught in both a Junior College Division and a Bible College Division, and to award degrees, either graduate or post-graduate, to those persons satisfactorily completing the prescribed courses of study and to grant such other literary honors, including honorary degrees, as shall be deemed advisable.

(b.) To charge and collect tuition as determined by the Board of Trustees and to create scholarships.

(c.) To employ professors, instructors and other subordinate employees as may be necessary for the proper conduct of the college under the direction and control of the President of the College, with the advice and consent of the majority of the Board of Trustees.

(d.) To institute and carry on missions and commissions for missionary purposes and investigations.

(e.) To publish and distribute such pamphlets, literature or books as may be required in the conduct of such work and the general promotion of the College.

(f.) To sue and be sued in its corporate name and to enter into contracts of every type and nature.

(g.) To solicit support, receive, collect, hold and receive by gift or bequest personal property in any amount, money or other thing of value; to purchase real estate, to receive real estate that may be given, or devised to the college for achieving the legitimate ends of the college and to sell or mortgage the same as the need arises.

(h.) To borrow money in payment of property for erecting buildings and making improvements and for any other purpose germane to the objectives and purposes of the college.

(i.) To issue notes, bonds, debentures and other evidences of indebtedness and execute mortgages, liens and other incumbrances upon the property of the corporation, real or otherwise, to secure the payment of any such evidences of indebtedness.

(j.) To transact any and all business connected with said College as may be necessary to achieve the purposes of said College.

(k.) To obtain under Internal Revenue Laws of the United States and of the Revenue Laws of the State of Oklahoma exemption from income property and other forms of taxation.

ARTICLE THREE

The location of this corporation shall be in Norman, Oklahoma.

ARTICLE FOUR

The duration of this corporation shall be perpetual.

ARTICLE FIVE

The general control of this corporation shall be vested in a Board of Trustees consisting of 15 members, 9 of which trustees shall be elected by the delegates to the annual Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists—each of which shall serve for a term of three years and until his successor is elected and qualified, and one member each shall be elected by the delegates to the annual meeting of the state association of Free Will Baptists of the States of Arkansas, Colorado, Kansas, Missouri, New Mexico and Texas, each of which shall serve for a term of six years and until his successor is elected and qualified. Initially, the 9 trustees elected by said Oklahoma Association shall include 3 elected for three years, three elected for two years, and 3 elected for one year but their successors shall all be elected for a term of three years and until their successors are elected and qualified. Initially, said trustee elected by said Arkansas Association shall be elected for a term of six years, said trustee elected by said Colorado Association shall be elected for a term of five years, said trustee elected by said Kansas Association shall be elected for a term of four years, said trustee elected by said Missouri Association shall be elected for a term of three years, said trustee elected by said New Mexico Association shall be elected for a term of two years, and said trustee elected by said Texas Association shall be elected for a term of one year but their successors shall be elected for a term of six years. The Chairman of said Corporation shall be one of the trustees elected by said Oklahoma Association.

ARTICLE SIX

An executive committee consisting of the Chairman, Vice Chairman, and Secretary of the Board of Trustees shall possess all powers of the Board of Trustees between the stated meetings of the Board of Trustees.

ARTICLE SEVEN

All contracts for building construction shall be let only to persons or corporations posting a valid performance bond and recording the same in the office of the County Clerk of Cleveland County, Oklahoma.

**SECTION IX
AMENDMENTS**

This charter may be hereafter amended subject to the provisions contained herein and the laws of the State of Oklahoma. It is provided, however, that the Trustees of the College shall not propose or apply for any amendment which has not been previously authorized by an act of the Oklahoma State Association.

CONSTITUTION OF MINISTER'S CONFERENCE

ARTICLE 1

The Minister's Conference shall be called the Oklahoma State Free Will Baptist Minister's Conference, and shall be composed of Ordained Free Will Baptist Ministers who are regular members of some Orthodox Free Will Baptist church in the State of Oklahoma who have paid their \$1.00 dues.

ARTICLE 2

The officers for this conference shall be President, Vice-President, and Clerk Treasurer, who shall be elected annually.

ARTICLE 3

This conference shall have the power to discipline its members.

ARTICLE 4

Members of this organization shall be all ordained ministers who participate in the benefits and activities of this body, and associate members who become members by payment of the \$1.00 annual dues.

ARTICLE 5

This conference shall meet Semi-Annually.

ARTICLE 6

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any regular session.

BY-LAWS OF MINISTER'S CONFERENCE

ARTICLE 1

The clerk or assistant clerk, or in their absence the senior minister in years shall call the ministers into conference. If a quorum is present the President or in his absence the Vice-President shall moderate the meeting. If neither of these are present, the senior minister in years shall be in charge.

ARTICLE 2

It shall be the duty of the clerk to enroll the ministers of the conference. Ministers shall present themselves with proper evidence of their rights to seats therein, and those enrolled by the clerk shall compose the conference. In case of questionable representation the case under question shall be referred to the Credential Committee.

ARTICLE 3

It shall be the duty of each minister belonging to this conference, to be active in pastoral or evangelistic services (disabled or retired ministers excepted). Any minister belonging to this conference shall report in each session in person or by letter, and failing to do so for two successive sessions shall be subject to discipline.

ARTICLE 4

Each conference shall be opened by reading a portion of God's word and prayer, and each session shall be closed with prayer.

ARTICLE 5

By a two-thirds vote of the members present ruling of the President may be overruled.

ARTICLE 6

This conference shall sit with open doors, except when it shall go into a committee as a whole.

ARTICLE 7

No member shall absent himself from the conference during its meeting without permission from the President.

ARTICLE 8

No person shall be allowed to nominate more than one member of a committee, unless person nominated is not elected.

ARTICLE 9

The President shall not allow discussion when not carried on in a Christian Spirit, or when he thinks it will cause discord.

ARTICLE 10

Anyone desiring to speak shall rise and address the President by the appellation "Brother President," but shall not speak further until recognized.

ARTICLE 11

No member of this conference shall be allowed to speak more than five minutes, nor twice on the same subject without permission from the President.

ARTICLE 12

These By-Laws may be altered or amended at any regular or adjourned session of this conference by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

ARTICLES OF FAITH OF STATE ASSOCIATION

1. THE BIBLE—The Scriptures of the Old and New Testament were given by the inspiration of God, and are our infallible rules of faith and practice.

2. **GOD**—There is one living and true God, revealed in nature as the Creator, Preserver and Righteous Governor of the Universe, and in the Scriptures as the Father, Son and Holy Ghost, yet as one God, infinitely wise and good, whom all intelligent creatures are supremely to love, adore and obey.

3. **CHRIST**—Christ is God manifest in the flesh: in His divine nature truly God, in His human nature truly man. The mediator between God and man, once crucified. He is now risen and glorified is our ever-present Saviour and Lord.

4. **THE HOLY SPIRIT**—The Scriptures assigns to the Holy Spirit all the attributes of God. He is the Reprover, Comforter, Guide and Sanctifier of all men.

5. **THE GOVERNMENT OF GOD**—God exercises a wise and benevolent providence over all beings and all things by maintaining the constitution and laws of nature. He also performs special acts of Grace, not otherwise provided for as highest welfare of man requires.

6. **THE SINFULNESS OF MAN**—Man was created innocent, but by disobedience fell into a state of sin and condemnation. His posterity, therefore inherited a fallen nature of such tendencies that all who come to years of accountability, sin and become guilty before God.

7. **THE WORK OF CHRIST**—The Son of God, by His incarnation, life, suffering, death, and resurrection effected for all a redemption from sin that is full and free and is the ground of salvation by faith.

8. **THE WORK OF SALVATION**—The conditions of salvation are: 1. Repentance or sincere sorrow for sin and the hearty renunciations of it. 2. Faith or the unreserved committal of one's self to Christ as Saviour and Lord, with purpose to love and obey Him in all things. In the exercise of saving faith the soul is renewed by the Holy Spirit; freed from the dominion of sin and becomes a child of God. 3. Continuance in faith and obedience until death.

9. **ELECTION**—God determined from the beginning to save all who should comply with the conditions of salvation. Hence by faith in Christ, men become His elect.

10. **FREEDOM OF WILL**—The Human will is free and self controlled, having power to yield to the influence of the truth and the Spirit and live, or to resist them and perish.

11. **SALVATION FREE**—God desires the salvation of all, the Gospel invites all, the Holy Spirit strives with all, and whosoever will may come and take of the water of life freely.

12. **PERSEVERENCE**—All believers in Christ, who through grace persevere in holiness to the end of life, have the promise of eternal salvation.

13. **BACKSLIDING AND APOSTASY**—A person who has been regenerated or born again and is living in unconfessed, unforgiven sin, is rebellious to the principles of the Kingdom of God and His righteousness, and therefore is a backslider in a lost condition who must repent and be restored to the right relationship with God or be eternally lost.

We recognize, according to Hebrews 6:4-6, that it is possible for a person to get in the condition that he could never return to Christ. This, we believe, is Apostasy; However, we also recognize that a regenerate person can fall into sin, be in a lost condition and still not be an Apostate. This person, through repentance, can be reconciled to God.

14. **GOSPEL ORDINANCES**—Baptism, or the immersion of believers in water, and the Lord's Supper, are ordinances to be perpetuated under the Gospel: Feet Washing, an ordinance teaching humility, of universal obligation, and to be administered to all true believers.

15. **TITHING**—God commanded tithes and offerings in the Old Testament: Jesus Christ endorsed in the Gospel (Matt. 23:23), and the Apostle Paul said, "Upon the first day of the week let every one of you lay by him in store as God hath prospered him." I Cor. 16:2.

16. **THE CHRISTIAN SABBATH**—The divine law requires that one day in seven be set apart from the secular employment and amusements for rest, worship, holy works and activities, and for personal communion with God.

17. **RESURRECTION, JUDGMENT, AND FINAL RETRIBUTION**—The Scriptures teach the resurrection of all men at the last day. They that have done good will come forth to the resurrection of life, and they that have done evil unto the resurrection of damnation: then the wicked shall "Go away into eternal punishment but the righteous into eternal life."

RULES OF ORDER

1. At every sitting of the Association, business shall be opened and concluded by prayer by the Moderator or whomever he may request.

2. Ministers and deacons present are invited to seats, allowed to take part in debates on all subjects, and to vote.

3. Those who speak shall rise and address the Moderator. Personal reflections shall be avoided in all debates.

4. No motion may be discussed until made and seconded.

5. When a motion has been made and seconded, and a member opposes its discussion, the Moderator shall put the question, "Shall it be discussed?" If negative, the question shall not be discussed.

6. If any proposition or motion under debate contains two or more points, it shall be divided at the request of any member, and the vote taken separately.

7. Motions made and lost shall not be recorded.

8. No one shall speak more than twice on the same subject without special leave of the Moderator.

9. All questions shall be decided by a majority vote of all Members present.

BY-LAWS OF STATE ASSOCIATION

1. The Clerk or assistant clerk, or in their absence, the senior minister in years shall call the Association into conference, and if a quorum is present the moderator, or in his absence, the assistant moderator shall take charge; and if neither of them is present the senior minister in years shall act as Moderator.

2. It shall be the duty of the clerk to enroll the delegates to the Association, who shall present themselves with proper evidence of their rights to seats therein, and those enrolled by the clerk shall compose the Association.

3. It shall be the duty of every District belonging to this Association to send a letter to every annual session of this Association reporting in the same spiritual condition, benevolent work, and its statistics. Any District belonging to this Association, which shall fail to report itself for two successive sessions, may be dismissed from the Association by a two thirds vote of all members present.

4. Each meeting shall be opened by reading a portion of the Bible and with prayer, and shall be closed with prayer.

5. By a two-thirds vote of members present, a ruling of the moderator can be overruled.

6. This Association may correspond by messenger or otherwise with other religious bodies.

7. This Association shall sit with open doors except when it shall go into a committee of the whole.

8. Any person not a member of this Association may be allowed to take part in its discussions by obtaining permission from the moderator.

9. It shall be the duty of all the Association to be present at the time appointed for each meeting, and anyone wishing to retire shall first obtain leave of the moderator.

10. No person shall be allowed to nominate more than one member of any committee, provided the person nominated be elected.

11. The moderator shall not allow discussions when not carried on in a Christian spirit or when he thinks it will cause discord or division.

12. Anyone desiring to speak shall rise to his feet and address the moderator by the appellation "Brother Moderator," but shall not speak further until recognized by the moderator.

13. No member of this association shall be allowed to speak more than ten minutes nor twice on the same subject without permission from the moderator.

14. These By-Laws may be altered or amended at any regular or adjourned session of this Association by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

CONSTITUTION OF STATE ASSOCIATION

PREAMBLE: From long experience, we the members of the Free Will Baptist denomination, being regularly baptized upon a profession of our faith in Jesus Christ, and realizing the necessity of a bond of union and fellowship among us as a church; and to preserve and maintain correspondence and co-ordination with us, do therefore ordain this Constitution for our better denomination government.

ARTICLE I

NAME: This organization shall be known as the OKLAHOMA STATE ASSOCIATION OF FREE WILL BAPTISTS.

ARTICLE II

PURPOSE: The object and purpose of this organization shall be to unify the work of the various bodies composing this State Association, and to devise and execute measures for the extension of the Kingdom of God in connection with the various bodies in the Association, or that may hereafter be represented therein.

ARTICLE III

REPRESENTATION: Section 1. This Association shall be composed of all ordained ministers and deacons with membership in some local church which is a member of a district Association with membership in the State Association.

Section 2: Each District Association shall be entitled to a number of elected delegates equal with the number of churches composing said Association. These delegates may be recommended by the local churches and shall be endorsed by their district association.

ARTICLE IV

FINANCE: Each Association shall contribute \$20.00 per Church for support of the Association and delegate fees.

ARTICLE V

DISCIPLINE: This State Association shall have the right to settle any question of discipline, doctrine or practices that may properly come before

it from any of the bodies composing said organization; furthermore, if there be any question of discipline, doctrine or practices on the part of an affiliated association, delegates of that association shall not be seated until these questions have been settled to the satisfaction of the General Board.

Section 2: Decisions of the General Board may be appealed in this manner. All appeals shall come before the State Association when sitting in a committee as a whole.

ARTICLE VI

OFFICERS: A. The officers of the State Association shall consist of a Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, and an Executive Secretary. Each of these shall be elected at the close of each regular session except the Executive Secretary.

B. (1) The Executive Secretary shall be elected for a two year tenure. It shall be the responsibility of the Executive Board to seek out a prospective candidate and make their recommendation to the body at the state association in its regular session, with primary consideration given to the recommendation prior to any nominations.

(2) In the event of a vacancy occurring during the course of the year, the Executive Board shall fill the vacancy until the annual setting of the association.

ARTICLE VII

BOARDS: All standing boards shall be composed of seven (7) elected members who shall serve terms of 7, 6, 5, 4, 3, 2 and 1 years with such ex-officio members as may be provided elsewhere, except: (1) the General Board which shall be composed of one (1) member from each affiliated association, the chairman of each standing board, and the current general officers of this association, and (2) the College Board of Trustees which shall be composed as provided for in the Articles of Incorporation of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc.

The standing boards of this association shall be: Executive Board; Board of Church Extension, Missions and Evangelism; Sunday School Board; Church Training Service Board; and College Board of Trustees.

No standing board shall meet in a functional meeting during the session of this association.

ARTICLE VIII

DUTIES, SCOPE OF ENDEAVOR AND QUALIFICATIONS OF STANDING BOARDS

Section 1. **EXECUTIVE BOARD:** The Executive Board shall be composed of seven (7) members who are members of an affiliated association and in good standing with the association of which they are members. They shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

It shall be the duty of this board to act in behalf of the association when it is not in session. It shall be bound to carry out the directions of the association and shall hold itself bound by every consideration of morality and honor to carry out the wishes of this association and to act under its instructions in whatever technical rights, civil laws and the decisions of courts may give it in certain emergencies. It shall be the duty of this board to sign their signatures to any and all papers concerning properties, indebtedness, bonds, or other legal documents pertaining to the execution of the will of this association, exclusive of the College Board of Trustees.

This board shall have the oversight of the Executive Department of this association. The members shall assist and direct such work for the general promotion of this association as is deemed needful or necessary as the means available shall permit. The Executive Department shall serve as the

coordinating agency of this association to correlate the work of all standing boards and agencies.

This board shall have the oversight of Free Will Baptist Book Store and shall endeavor to serve affiliated associations and churches and the community with literature and church supplies. Merchandising procedures shall be those accepted as normal retail procedures with the board being cognizant of the spiritual contribution of the store in distributing Christian literature.

All decisions of this board shall be governed by the general tenets of this association and shall not violate this constitution.

This board shall organize itself and elect such officers as necessary to the orderly conduct of its affairs and labors. This board shall keep an accurate record of all meetings, decisions, and work done and shall make a report in writing at each annual session of this association. All records shall be available to this association at its request.

Whereas this board represents the association when not in session, it and it alone shall have the power to call the association into special conference provided each affiliated association shall be given notice at least ten (10) days prior to the meeting of such special conference.

Section 2. GENERAL BOARD: This board shall be composed of one (1) member from each affiliated association, the chairman of each standing board, and the current general officers of this association. Each member must be a member of an affiliated association and in good standing with the association of which he is a member. The members shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

The duties of this board shall be to meet one (1) day preceding the annual session of this association. This board shall serve as the credential committee with the duties and responsibilities assigned by Article V of this constitution. This board shall hear reports of all standing boards. It shall serve as budget committee and shall make such recommendations as deemed pertinent to this association. A complete and accurate record shall be kept of meetings of this board and a report shall be made in writing to this association in its annual session.

The moderator of the association shall serve as chairman of this board, and the clerk of the association shall serve as its clerk.

Section 3. BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION, MISSIONS AND EVANGELISM: This board shall be composed of seven (7) members who are members of affiliated associations and in good standing with the associations of which they are members. They shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

It shall be the duty of this board to labor to further the Gospel of Jesus Christ into the uttermost parts of the earth. In accomplishing this, they are to endeavor to establish missions and churches in communities within the bounds of this association with whatever moral and financial assistance that may be theirs. In cases of small churches failing to function, whatever assistance deemed appropriate shall be rendered to maintain the effective witness of that church by either direct labor with the church or with an associational board in instances where the affiliated association has a functional board or agency.

This board shall be empowered to receive and convey title to real property in the area of its labors.

The promotion of missionary endeavors from a local, state or national level shall come within the scope of endeavor of this board. This board shall assist in maintaining prayer and financial support of missionary enterprises through whatever channels available.

Whereas missionary and evangelistic labors are so intimately related,

this board shall assist through participation or assistance in maintaining a strong evangelistic thrust in the life of affiliated association.

This board shall organize itself and elect such officers as necessary to the orderly conduct of its affairs and labors. This board shall keep an accurate record of all meetings, decisions, work done, funds received and disbursed and shall make a report in writing at each annual session of this association. All records shall be available to this association at its request.

Section 4. COLLEGE BOARD OF TRUSTEES: The College Board of Trustees shall be composed as provided for in the Articles of Incorporation of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc.

Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc. is an agency of the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists and is incorporated under the corporate laws of the State of Oklahoma. The articles of incorporation are a part of this association's record and delineate the purpose, duty and scope of endeavor of the members of this board.

Section 5. CHURCH TRAINING SERVICE BOARD: This board shall be composed of seven members who are members of affiliated associations and in good standing with the associations of which they are members. They shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

The duties of this board shall be to plan and assist in organizing and sustaining a strong Church Training Service in every church in each association affiliated with this association with every means of promotion and assistance available to them. This board shall plan, coordinate and conduct state-wide youth camps or camp.

This board shall organize itself and elect such officers as necessary to the orderly conduct of its affairs and labors. This board shall keep an accurate record of all meetings, decisions, work done, funds received and disbursed and shall make a report in writing at each annual session of this association. All records shall be available to this association at its request.

Section 6. SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD: This board shall be composed of seven (7) members who are members of affiliated associations and in good standing with the associations of which they are members. They shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

The duties of this board shall be to plan and promote Sunday schools in every church in each association affiliated with this association. This board shall use every available means to promote Sunday school clinics, seminars, institutes and conventions on local, district and state-wide basis, working with local agencies to distribute and employ all effective methods and material available.

This board shall organize itself and elect such officers as necessary to the orderly conduct of its affairs and labors. This board shall keep an accurate record of all meetings, decisions, work done, funds received and disbursed and shall make a report in writing at each annual session of this association. All records shall be available to this association at its request.

Section 7. VACANCIES: Vacancies shall occur when a member moves from the territorial bounds of this association, by death, by resignation or by removal from office by this association. In the event of disciplinary action where charges concerning misconduct, doctrine or practice shall have been lodged against a member of any board, his office shall be held in abeyance until such charges shall be concluded or as determined by this association.

All boards shall have power to fill vacancies arising between sessions of this association. Such appointment shall terminate at the next session of the association and shall be filled by this association.

Section 8. EMPLOYEES: All employees of boards or agencies of this

association shall be employed by agreement or contract with employing board or agency upon approval of this association except those elected by this association and the conditions of their employment shall be those approved by this association.

The duties of the Executive Secretary of this association shall be:

- (1) He is to represent, or cause to be represented, the association at all affairs of interest to the association.
- (2) He is to promote the work of the association in such a manner so as to unify the efforts of the association.
- (3) He is to serve with all standing boards and committees of the association in an ex-officio capacity.
- (4) He is to aid in planning the work of the association by relating the activities and plans of one board to another.
- (5) He is to report to the association during each annual session.
- (6) He is to communicate to the affiliated members of this association the pressing causes and events before the association. This can be in person or by means of a periodical bulletin or both.
- (7) He shall serve as treasurer of this association. An accurate and complete record of all funds received and disbursed shall be kept and a written report shall be included in his report to this association in its annual session.
- (8) The conditions of employment shall be determined by the Executive Board.

ARTICLE IX

DISSOLUTION: Should this association cease to function, all properties and holdings shall go to the National Association of Free Will Baptists after all creditors are satisfied and indebtedness cleared.

ARTICLE X

AMENDMENTS: This constitution may be amended or altered at any regular session of the association by a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of members present and voting, provided proposed amendment or alteration be presented in writing to the body one (1) day in advance.

ARTICLE XI

SPECIAL SESSIONS: Elected delegates to the last session of this association shall be retained as standing delegates for special called sessions.
