



#### PROCEEDINGS OF THE STATE ASSOCIATION

Theme: "Proclaim liberty throughout all the land" (Lev. 25:10)

Tuesday Evening, October 19, 1976

The 68th Annual Session of the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists convened for worship and to hear the keynote message in the Civic Center of Muskogee, Oklahoma at 7:30 p.m., October 19, 1976.

Joe Cutler, accompanied by Starlett Shipp, led the convention in singing "Blessed Assurance." Clarence Campbell led in the invocation of God's blessings upon this meeting. The convention then sang, "I Love to Tell the Story."

Jerry Dudley, Clerk of the Association, called the 68th annual meeting of the Association into official session and introduced the officers. Homer Young, Moderator of the Association, gave greetings and recognized all of the delegates and visitors by recognizing each district and the many visitors and messengers from around the world.

Lonnie DaVoult, presiding over the service, received the convention offering which was designated a "land fund for Ponca City." Convention announcements were made by Lonnie DaVoult.

Joe Cutler sang, "God's Amazing Grace." The convention joined in singing "Amazing Grace."

The Moderator introduced the speaker, Rev. Connie Cariker, speaking from the theme with a message entitled, "Proclaiming Liberty in Our Jerusalem" (Acts 1:8). A challenging message was delivered. Bailey Thompson led the convention in prayer.

Committee appointments were announced by the Asst. Moderator, Ernest Harrison, Sr. (see Committees). Benediction led by Jerry Rhoades.

#### Wednesday, Morning Session, October 20, 1976

The Wednesday morning session opened with a musical prelude by Roger Jones. Frank Giles led the convention in singing "'Tis So Sweet to Trust In Jesus." Milburn Wilson led in the opening prayer. The congregation then sang "To God Be the Glory" and "I Love to Tell the Story."

The Moderator's admonition and morning devotion was given by Homer Young using Mark 10:35-45 and Galations 6:1-3 as the Scripture text. Harry Staires voiced a special prayer for the deliberations of the business sessions.

Moderator reminded the convention of the conditions for voting, citing Article III of the Constitution. Alternate delegates were seated from the Associations desiring to do so.

Moderator recognized visitors in the session inviting visiting brethren to seat in counsel with us.

The Clerk read a partial report from the General Board. (See Board Reports)

The Clerk read the accumulated report from the letters from the 23 reporting member Associations as information.

James Earl Raper, Superintendent of Free Will Baptist Children's Home, Greenville, Tennessee, gave greetings and information concerning the children's home and the support received from Oklahoma and the eligibility of Oklahoma children for the home. (See Reports)

Herman Hersey, Director of the Board of Retirement and Insurance of the National Association reported on the work of that department and its availability to Oklahoma ministers and the need for participation. (See Reports)

Malcolm Fry, Director of the National Church Training Service department reported on the plans for 1977 National Youth Conference in Detroit,

Michigan and the work of the department. (See Reports)

The printed program was adopted as the agenda for the convention with the time to remain flexible as need may occur.

The Executive Board report was given by Clarence Shepherd. Motion carried to adopt the report item by item.

Item No. 1—Referred to the Budget Committee by ruling of the Moderator. Item No. 2—Motion carried to adopt.

Item No. 3-Deferred until the election of all officers.

Item No. 4-Motion carried to adopt.

Item No. 5-Motion carried to adopt in conformity with Item No. 6 of General Board report. (See General Board Report) Motion carried to amend, "All Associational meetings will convene on Tuesday night after the second Sunday in October after the 1977 session."

Item No. 6-Motion carried to adopt.

Jim Williams, Executive Secretary of Texas Free Will Baptists gave greetings and shared the burden of his heart in the need for mission workers in the State of Texas. A special request for prayer for the mission works now active was honored as James Earl Raper led in this special prayer.

Moderator recessed the business session until afternoon to allow a rest

time for preparation to worship.

## Wednesday Morning Worship, October 20, 1976 – 11:00 A.M.

Howard Ray Gwartney, with Patsy Gwartney accompanying, led the convention in singing "Jesus Saves." Milburn Wilson voiced prayer for the hour of worship.

With Buddy Drake directing the service, Herman Hersey rendered a piano solo arrangement of "When They Ring Those Golden Bells." The congregation sang "I am Thine, O Lord" and "There Is A Fountain." Howard Ray Gwartney rendered a solo "Let the Whole World Know" which touched many hearts.

David Biggers, Missionary to Ponca City, Oklahoma was introduced for the morning message. He delivered a tremendous message from the convention theme, entitled "Proclaiming Liberty Throughout Our Judea."

Following pertinent announcements, the convention was dismissed for lunch.

## Wednesday Afternoon, October 20, 1976 – 1:30 P.M.

The afternoon business session was called to order the convention singing "Battle Hymn of the Republic" led by Delbert Akin. Mrs. Pat Thomas of Nashville, Tennessee, sang, "I Know A Man Who Can." The Oklahoma Ministers Quartet sang "Anywhere Is Home" and "Touring that City."

Lonnie DaVoult introduced Mr. Newman Douglas, a field representative of the Social Betterment Council, dedicated to the defeat of "Liquor by the drink." (State Question 515 on the ballot for November 2, 1976).

Lonnie DaVoult gave the report of the Executive Secretary. Motion

carried that the report be received and the budget be referred to the Budget Committee. (See Committee Reports)

Ray Martin gave the report of Free Will Baptist Bookstore. Motion carried that report be received and the budget be referred to the Budget Committee. (See Committee Reports) David Sutton was elected as seven (7) year member of the Executive Board.

Berton Perry gave the report of the Board of Church Extension, Missions and Evangelism. Motion carried that the report be received and the budget be referred to the Budget Committee. (See Committee Reports) David Biggers of Ponca City, Oklahoma and Buddy Drake of Enid, Oklahoma, each reported on the work in their mission endeavors. Jerry Rhoades was elected as seven (7) year member of the Mission Board.

Harley Bennet, Home Missionary to Idaho, reported on the work at Pocatello, Idaho and brought greetings from the National Home Mission Board.

Rolla Smith, Director of Foreign Mission Department of the National Association reported on the missionary endeavors around the world.

Milburn Wilson gave the report of the State Sunday School Board. Keith Burden presented plaques to winners of the 1976 Spring Sunday School Campaign. Dr. Roger Reed gave a report of the Sunday School Department of the National Association.

Motion carried to recess business until Thursday morning. Dismissed in prayer by Delbert Akin.

#### Wednesday Evening, October 20, 1976 – 7:30 P.M.

The convention was called to order and the evening worship was begun with David Parrish leading the congregation in singing "Great Things He Hath Promised." Ray Gwartney, presiding over the service, introduced Jake Gage, a pioneer pastor, who offered the invocation.

A quartet from Mineral Springs Free Will Baptist Church, Muldrow, Oklahoma sang "Stepping On the Clouds" and "The Trumpet May Be the Next Sound You Hear."

The convention sang "Blessed Assurance."

Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College Concert Choir sang "Psalm 130", "Jesus Bids Us Shine", and "Lord, Lay Some Soul Upon My Heart."

President Bill Jones presented plaques to the three churches giving most to Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College in the past year. First, West Tulsa FWB Church; Second, First Free Will Baptist, Ada; Third, Southern Oaks FWB Church, Oklahoma City.

Special recognition was given to James Cearly and Francis Boyle for outstanding service to Hillsdale FWB College. James Cearley has returned to the pastorate and Francis Boyle is taking a leave for health reasons.

The convention offering dedicated to Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College was received while the "Harvester's Quartet" from Hillsdale blessed the congregation with two songs. The "New Life Singers" then thrilled our souls with "His Grace is Sufficient for Me."

#### **RESOLUTION NO. 1**

Be it resolved that the Executive Board be directed to study the feasibility of purchasing a midsize automobile for use of the Executive Secretary, and, that the Executive Board report their findings and make recommendations at the next state meeting. (carried)

#### **RESOLUTION NO. 2**

Be it resolved that the State Association meet annually on the Tuesday following the second Sunday in October, and that this resolution be placed as item No. 14 in the By-Laws and that the current item No. 14 be moved and become item No. 15, beginning with the 1978 session.

#### **RESOLUTION NO. 3**

#### Whereas,

There continues to be need to state the position of the National Association of Free Will Baptists on the proper marital status of ministers and deacons; and

#### Whereas.

Each body comprising said National Association is hereby encouraged to adopt the herein presented statement or a similar position on marriage for ministers and deacons; while not insisting that any new position be made retroactive but rather established as a standard to be upheld for all new candidates for ministers and deacons; therefore,

#### Be it resolved:

- 1. That Paul's statements in I Timothy 3:2, 12 and Titus 1:6, namely "the husband of one wife," be looked upon as making ineligible as ministers or deacons anyone who has been divorced and remarried, regardless of the cause of divorce or the guilt or innocence of either partner.
- 2. That said persons, whose marital state disqualifies them to be elders or deacons, not be discouraged in their Christian service, but that they be encouraged to live faithfully for Christ and serve Him in the education, music, youth, or any other department or activity of the local church; and that such be reminded that deacons and elders are the only church officers for whom the "husband of one wife" prohibition is given (while certainly it is the ideal for all believers it is Biblically insisted upon as a requirement for deacons and elders). (carried).

#### **OBITUARY COMMITTEE**

We the Obituary Committee, wish to report that 151 of our beloved brothers and sisters in Christ have gone home to be with the Lord this past year.

We recommend that we stand for a moment of silent prayer in memory of those loved ones and the dedication of ourselves to further strive toward the goal that they have attained. (carried)

#### PUBLIC MORALS COMMITTEE REPORT

#### We recommend:

1) That our churches cooperate with the Sooner Alcoholic and Narcotic Education, Inc., and with the Social Betterment Council, in a financial way, and that our pastors warn our people, especially the youth, of the

dangers of misusing any type of drugs; and preach total abstinence of alcohol in any form. We stand in opposition to Liquor by the drink and encourage our membership to vote against state question 515 on November 2, 1976. We recommend an offering be received in our churches and forwarded to the Social Betterment Council to assist them in their advertising on this issue.

2) That we go on record against the use of tobacco in any form and that our

pastors set the example.

3) That we actively oppose any type of gambling.

4) That the people of our churches conform to a more modest dress using I Peter 3:3-7 as a guide.

5) That we go on record as opposing pornography and that we make every effort possible to halt the distribution of pornographic materials in any form, in any way open to us.

6) That we stand opposed to the teaching of sex education in public schools

because of the lack of moral application.

- 7) That we publicly deplore corruption in Government and oppose any candidate involved in or favoring any immoral issue.
- 8) That we challenge our public schools to present the Biblical account of creation in contrast to the evolutionistic theory.
- 9) That we stand in opposition to television programming which presents an immoral, worldly standard of conduct and to any movie showing which tends toward immorality, regardless of the rating.
- 10) That we adhere to the principles of our Free Will Baptist Church Covenant with special attention given to "avoid all appearances of evil."

11) That we publicly oppose divorce as is commonly practiced today.

12) That the Clerk of the State Association of Free Will Baptists in Oklahoma be commissioned to write letters to Governmental officials (state legislators, governors, etc.) and FCC opposing: (a) legalized liquor by the drink, (b) legalized gambling, (c) legalized marijuana, (d) television programming which lends itself toward immoral content, (e) sale of any poronographic material; and that he stipulate that his letter represents 23,000 plus Free Will Baptists in Oklahoma.

#### BOARD REPORTS

#### GENERAL BOARD REPORT

The General Board of the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists met Monday, October 18, 1976 at 9:00 a.m. in the Civic Center of Muskogee, Oklahoma and as a result of that meeting, we offer the following items for your consideration:

1. Correspondence was received from twenty-one (21) District Associations holding membership in this body. We recommend that the delegates from these associations be seated with one (1) exception as noted in item number three (3) of this report, (carried)

2. Two (2) petitionary letters were received. Arbuckle Association and Kiamichi Association having been examined and organized by the Executive Board of this Association are recommended for membership in this body and their delegates seated, (carried)

3. Whereas this State Association set forth that no Association's delegates

would be seated without proper associational costs and fees, and whereas Hopewell No. 1 Association forwarded only the representative fee of two (2) churchs and has ten (10) member churches, therefore, until the fees are received, the delegates from this association will not be seated. All other reports and conditions in Hopewell No. 1 Association are in order. (carried)

- 4. This Board heard the reports of (1) Executive Board; (2) Executive Secretary; (3) Free Will Baptist Book Store; (4) State Mission Board; (5) State Sunday School Board; (6) State Church Training Service Board; and (7) Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College Board of Trustees. We recommend their adoption as printed. (carried)
- 5. We recommend the adoption of the Executive Board's recommendation that the 1978 session of the Oklahoma State Association be moved forward one week to clear conflicting dates with the Oklahoma Education Association, (referred to the resolutions committee)
- 6. We recommend that the \$1,900.00 remaining from the funds collected for entertaining the National Association be transferred to the State Mission Board to begin a land fund for Ponca City mission. (carried)

#### STATE EXECUTIVE BOARD REPORT

The State Executive Board met three times this year. A summary of some of the things considered is: The Portable building purchased for the bookstore to use in shipping Sunday School literature had to be moved because of a violation in a zoning ordinance and efforts are being made to move it back or solve the problem in some other way. Appreciation is expressed to the Southern Oaks Church for allowing the building to be moved on their property. The operation and service of the bookstore is a concern to us and we try to work with the manager to seek ways to improve our service. Ways of changing and improving our state paper were discussed and we feel improvements have been made. Additional equipment has been purchased to update and serve boards better in making mailings.

The Executive Board Chairman and Executive Secretary invited the Chairmen and promotional men from all Oklahoma Boards to a meeting to coordinate and unify the work of all boards concerning plans for the current year.

The Executive Board members signed the note along with the Mission Board to secure funds for the new church building in Enid.

Rev. Orville J. Hood resigned as bookkeeper and editor of the Promoter and a part-time secretary is now working and keeping books.

In our December 19, 1975 meeting we organized the Arbuckle Association and voted to accept them into the State Association in order for them to be represented at the National Association in July in Tulsa.

From our August 24, 1976 meeting the following recommendations are made:

- 1. That the Executive Department give up 1% more of its share of the Cooperative giving (from 23% to 22%) and that the 1% go to State Missions; (Referred to Budget Committee).
- 2. That the 1978 State Association be held in Tulsa at the Sheritan Skyline East Motel which has accommodations and parking; (carried)
- 3. That Reverend Lonnie DaVoult be elected as Executive Secretary for the coming two years; (Deferred to election of officers)
- 4. That since the Executive Department has been able to save and accumulate some additional funds that the Executive Department give \$2,000.00 to Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College and give \$2,000.00 to State Missions; (carried)
- 5. That the \$1,900.00 left from the State Delegate fees after the National be designated by the State Association as to its use. (carried)
  - 6. That the Kiamichi Association be received. (carried)

#### **EXECUTIVE SECRETARY REPORT**

The Office of Executive Secretary for the State Association of Free Will Baptist has been an honorable position and yet one of many varied responsibilities. It has been my responsibility to represent our State in many varied capacities. I attended a luncheon given by our Governor in behalf of the

religious bodies of our state. I was impressed by his concern for the religious strength of our state. It was also my privilege to represent our State again at the National Association of Evangelical meeting. A supplemental report of this meeting is included in the Digest. I have been very actively involved in the work of the Committee on Social Betterment in our state which is fighting the liquor-by-the-drink legislation. The SANE organization has highly favored us in their comments concerning our stand against alcohol and narcotics. I have met with them on several occassions. I appreciate our Moderator. Bro. Homer Young, filling in sometimes when I was not able to attend.

I have traveled some 29,900 miles, been in 135 meetings, which I have had some part in, 37 Associational Quarterly meetings and annual sessions, 9 Ministerial Alliance Meetings, 16 youth camps, four revivals, National Convention, our Promotional Mens Seminars and many other varied meetings. We are thrilled to report that once again we have set records. Our income has been far above even our expectations. We received \$405.892.00 through our state office, which give us a net gain of \$64,273,00. Of this amount \$28.600.00 was Coop and \$35.693.00 was designated, giving us a 19% overall increase.

Once again our Historical report is brief. I have inquired at many different meetings and of some individuals about Historical material but have not been able to obtain any. I am still working on a Historical survey of all of our present ministers and would appreciate a little better cooperation from them. It could be a significant work if we can get most of our preachers to participate. I would recommend that all our preachers fill out and send in their forms to the WHO'S WHO IN FREE WILL BAPTIST sponsored by the National Sunday School Department.

#### STATE ASSOCIATION OF FREE WILL BAPTISTS NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS JUNE 30, 1976

#### (1) SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The State Association of Free Will Baptists is a non-profit organization designed to provide central leadership and representation for the Free Will Baptists of Oklahoma and to handle certain receipts and disbursements of the Free Will Baptist Church. The Association uses the fund method of accounting, whereby the fund balance represents the equity the Association has in its assets. This accounting method is generally accepted among non-profit organizations as the most feasible way of reflecting their financial activity and position.

The Association's property and equipment is depreciated on the straight-line basis using the following estimated useful lives:

Furniture, fixtures and equipment acquired subsequent to July 1, 1972	8 years

#### (2). MORTGAGE RECEIVABLE

The executive residence was sold on May 30, 1974, for \$20,500. The buyer assumed the mortgage on the property and gave the Association a second mortgage on the property for \$10,300. Payments are to begin on July 1, 1974. The rate of interest is 8% and the mortgage is for 30 years.

#### (3) COOPERATIVE CONTRIBUTIONS

The Executive Office of the State Association was allocated 25% of cooperative contributions for the financing of its operation for the fiscal year.

# REPORT OF THE 1976 NATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF EVANGELICALS' CONVENTION

The N.A.E. Convention was held February 22-25, 1976, at the Shoreham American Hotel in Washington, D.C. Those representing Oklahoma Free Will Baptists at this annual N.A.E. Convention was Lonnie DaVoult, and our Missouri Brethren Andy Lay, R.B. Spurgeon, Millard Sasser, Edwin Bowden, and Clarence Burton. Also accompanying this group representation at the convention was Donald Lombard, Missouri Free Will Baptist Pastor having personal membership with N.A.E. Some of the observations of those attending were:

There was a good spirit prevailing throughout the conventions of some 4,000 Evangelicals and the worship services would be acceptable to Free Will Baptists. The opening Worship Service on Sunday evening was especially noted as gathering members and guests were called to prayer for the nation for at least 45 minutes.

The theme, "Let Freedom Ring", for the joint convention of N.A.E. and N.R.B. (National Religious Broadcasters) was very well developed by the practical messages of the guest speakers among whom were: Congressman John B. Conlan of Arizona; Dr. Harold J. Ockenga, President of Gordon-Conwell Theological Seminary; Dr. Joseph Jackson, President of the National Baptist Convention, and Dr. Francis Shaeffer, author and theologian of L'Abri, Switzerland. Congressman Conlan was noted in urging Evangelical involvement at the polls, "The nation's 40 million evangelicals are the largest single block of votes in the nation, but over 15 million are not registered to vote". Dr. Joseph Jackson called for national repentance. Dr. Francis Schaeffer closed the convention with an inspiring message dealing with the unchanging nature and authority of the Holy Scriptures.

There were several informative workshops held during the afternoon session of the convention for those interested, such as: Decency in Media, Organizing for Church Growth, and Training Laymen to Counsel.

In closing, it was good to be able to cross denominational lines and barriers and join with other evangelicals in prayer and concern for the issues of both church and state within this great nation.

# BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION MISSIONS AND EVANGELISM

The Mission Board met eight times during the past year, and we are thankful to God for the progress that has been made. We have seen one mission church go on a full-time basis and have seen another one built and ready for full speed ahead.

We would like to share with you the progress made by our Church

Establishment Program (CEP).

C.E.P. '71. As we reported to the Oklahoma State Association last year our pilot project, Western Avenue Free Will Baptist Church in Oklahoma City has been on a self-sustaining basis since January 1975.

C.E.P. '72. Our '72 project, Jenks Free Will Baptist Church, voted to go on a self-sustaining basis as of January 1, 1976. We are thankful for the progress of the work there under the leadership of Rev. David Sutton.

C.E.P. '73. Our '73 project, Enid Free Will Baptist Church, has made rapid progress. Land has been purchased and a lovely church building is under construction. Our Missionary, Rev. Buddy Drake, reports that they are planning their first services in the building on September 12, 1976. We are thankful for the way God has moved obstacles in preparation for building a strong Free Will Baptist witness in Enid.

C.E.P. '74. Ponca City was chosen as C.E.P. '74. Rev. David Bigger was selected as our missionary to Ponca City, and we are glad to report that the first services were held in the Fine Arts Building of the local high school on July 11, 1976. Many good contacts have been made, and we are hoping that in the spring of 1977 a new Free Will Baptist Church building will be under

construction.

FUTURE C.E.P.'s — Where we will go from here and when is still undecided. As you know we are already behind with our plans for future C.E.P. projects. We had hoped to establish one church per year somewhere in the State of Oklahoma from the beginning of the C.E.P. in 1971. This would be easy to realize for the Free Will Baptists of Oklahoma if we could all be made to see the need.

We would like for the people of our state to give careful consideration to the following suggestions about helping our mission work:

- 1. Please put the work on your prayer list. We want you to pray for the mission board, the people of Oklahoma, and our missionaries to the various cities where we are attempting to establish churches.
- 2. We want you to get behind C.E.P. Put the work in your church budget so we can have a sustained income.
- 3. Please respond to the board's efforts to raise money to buy land and build buildings. An effort was made in the past year to raise money for Enid. A project called "Enid Land Fund" was launched. Our chairman wrote letters to many of you in the state and asked that you please join in our efforts to build churches by promising, with the Lord's help, that you would give \$10.00 to the "Enid Land Fund" and \$10.00 per year to other future projects as launched by the board. We appreciate the response to the project but as usual our needs far outstripped our giving.
- 4. Pray that God will give wisdom in future projects. We are considering hiring a "builder missionary" to work with the board on future building projects, thus saving money and making it possible for our dollars to go further in establishing new churches.

The members of the board feel that we are going in the right direction with C.E.P. We feel that we have seen in a small way what could be done on a large scale if our people felt a burden for the work of missions in the State of Oklahoma.

OUR FAMILY: Missionaries, chaplains, Board members, and staff send our warmest greetings.

OUR FIELD: The continent of North America. We are thankful for our missionaries serving in 21 states, Mexico, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands. We would also like to express our gratitude to REV. AND MRS. BUDDY DRAKE and REV. AND MRS, DAVID BIGGER for their faithfulness while they are serving as Joint Project workers.

OUR FIGURES: 1975 was our greatest year! Five churches became self supporting. Eight new missionaries went to the field. Property was purchased. building projects were completed, and 885 CONVERSIONS were reported by Home Missions churches! Income passed the half million dollar mark -\$528,150.49. This was made possible because dedicated pastors, churches, and laymen faithfully supported Home Missions!

OUR FINANCES: Home Missions receipts by August first totaled \$339,575.59 toward our quota of \$608,500.00. Your state has given \$43,070.58 toward its quota \$55,000.00, making it the number one giving state so far in 1976! Our entire family thanks you. We will see that your gifts are used to reach souls for Christ and build Free Will Baptist Churches in needy places.

OUR FEAR: A look at our country reveals that not one person in ten is a Christian, and not one in a thousand is a Free Will Baptist. Only one church in five preaches the gospel, and churches are closing at the rate of one every hour - 9,000 last year.

GREETINGS to you our friends and co-workers of the Oklahoma State Association from your missionaries across the world and from your home office staff.

GRATITUDE is expressed once again to the churches of Oklahoma for the generous gifts given for the cause of overseas evangelism.

GIVING from Oklahoma to Foreign Missions over the past five years is as follows:

Your state quota for 1975 was \$100,000.00. Receipts for that year totaled \$117,032.25. You exceeded your quota by \$17,032.25. Praise the Lord! Your state quota for 1976 is \$100,000.00. Receipts thus far are ahead of those recorded for the same period last year.

- Glowing results were evidenced as the gifts to Foreign Missions were tallied for the first seven months of 1976. The average monthly income for this period amounted to \$101,562,14.
- Glowing results were also recorded from my personal itinerary in response to our faith promise missionary conferences and rally days. We extend Christian greetings to you from Dr. Roger C. Reeds, our General Director, and the entire Sunday School Department staff. We wish for you a successful state meeting.

This has been an exceptional year for us in outreach with Sunday School curriculum materials, teacher training, enlargement campaigns, and our expanding book ministry. Please take the opportunity to look through the catalog of new and regular offerings from the Sunday School Department. Some of the newer items are Systematics, A Survey of the Pentateuch, The Unsealed Book, The Apocalypse, A Survey of the Gospels, Perseverance in Preservation, A Survey of the Books of History, The Bicentennial of the Sunday School, Volume III of Romans in paperback, and the complete hardback edition of Romans. Since the printing of the catalog, these additional titles have been published. A Survey of the Books of Poetry, A Survey of the Major Prophets, A Survey of the Pauline Epistles, A Survey of the General Epistles and Revelation, The Second Man, Christian Education — The Total Task of the Church, and Pupils Activity Handwork which correlates with Children's Church Guide. These items are available from your state bookstore or from us.

Of special interest to every pastor and layperson will be the *History of Free Will Baptist State Association* and the soon to be published volume entitled *Who's Who Among Free Will Baptists*. Let me encourage you to complete your questionnaire and place your order early for this important historical edition.

The purchase of curriculum materials from the Sunday School Department by Oklahoma Book and Bible Supplies store amounted to \$58,195.54 in 1975. This represents an increase of \$5,992.54 over the previous year. General merchandise purchases for this same period totaled \$4,871.75. This reflects a decrease of \$909.54.

We are presently producing in excess of 385,000 pieces of Christ-exalting Free Will Baptists materials per quarter. That is in excess of one and one-half million pieces per year. Pray for us in this ministry as we seek to get His Word out through the printed page.

At the National Association which met in Tulsa this year, Dr. Reeds launched the Twenty-Five Year Challenge plan. In this long-range enlargement drive the denomination has been challenged to increase its Sunday School enrollment from 200,000 to 1,000,000 by the year A.D. 2000. Thus, the motto "From 2 to 1 by 2." Materials are already available for use in this program. We challenge the Free Will Baptist pastors of the great state of Oklahoma to do their part in doubling their enrollment by 1980, and then do it again each succeeding decade.

# BOARD OF TRUSTEES REPORT TO OKLAHOMA STATE ASSOCIATION

Criteria used to evaluate a college vary widely. Enrollment statistics reveal one facet of an institution. Gift income and general reputation are other criteria that are used. Also, the people employed at a college reveal both emphasis and interest of the school.

Using these criteria and the past five or six years as guides, Free Will Baptists must conclude one important fact — Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College is permanent! The steady increase in every area by which we measure growth reveals the firmness of the foundation and the sureness of the superstructure being built.

These same statistics make clear other facts. Subsidy for students is also permanent. And, because we do not accept aid from either the State or Federal Government agencies, this means Free Will Baptists will have to continue meeting this need. We have done well without government aid. We have paid for our land and built some beautiful structures. We are operating

in the "black". But this is possible because Free Will Baptists give annually over \$200,000 to make up the difference between what the students pay and what it costs to operate a school. Again this next year, Hillsdale will need approximately \$250,000 in gift income to educate the students of 1976-77.

Four new faculty joined the Hillsdale staff this fall. They include: Reverend O. T. Dixon, M.A.T. in Education; Reverend Derrell Clark, B.A. in P.E.; Mrs. Dorothy Harris, M.A. in Journalism; Miss Geri Ann Ross, M.A. in History and Speech. Mrs. Rita Jane Wilson joined our staff as dean of women. Reverand Roy Norie has joined our staff as maintenance director.

The future holds great challenge. More dormitory space is needed. A classroom-library building is needed. Equipment is needed for certain courses. But even more, the same emphasis needs to be communicated to these students that they will place the will of God pre-eminent.

Many people have helped bring Hillsdale to where it is. The church member who prayed and gave money who has never been on campus. The pastor who has received our singing groups and been generous even when he or his church was in need. The teachers on campus who tightened their budget so they could get along on less in order to participate in a ministry they loved. And men like Marvin Hawkins, who, on his own, comes out to campus and does whatever needs doing — from building shelves to mowing grass. He and many others like him — George Plunkett, Melvin Tyson, Preach McGuire, and many others — have left their fingerprints on Hillsdale. To all of them, thanks!

And to one in particular who was with Hillsdale five years. Jim Cearley could never tear himself away from the pastorate, attempting to pastor while he was doing three jobs on campus. He has decided to return to the pastorate full-time. We shall miss him on campus but wish him the very best in the days ahead. We appreciate him and his work.

Our budget for 1977-78 totals \$632,000.

This report is submitted with thanks to God who has done wonderful things in our midst.

Recommendations by Board of Trustees:

- 1. Construction of two four-plexes at a cost of approximately \$120,000.
- 2. Adoption of 77-78 budget.
- 3. Recommendation that priority be given to the planning for a  $100^{\circ}$  x  $100^{\circ}$  three-storied classroom building.

# (1) SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The College uses the fund method of accounting, whereby an individual fund is a separate accounting entity made up of assets, liabilities, revenues, expenditures, transfers and a fund balance. This method of accounting is generally accepted among colleges and universities as the most effective means of controlling financial data.

Buildings and equipment are not depreciated by the College, which is an acceptable procedure for a non-profit organization.

# (3) LOAN FUNDS

Loan funds reflect the remaining cash balance at June 30, 1976 in the National Direct Student Loan program funded primarily by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare. The College provides matching funds equal to 1/9 of the Federal funds received. This program, along with other Federal programs have been reported under separate audit to the Department of Health, Education and Welfare in accordance with their regulations. Loans receivable from students are not shown as a

part of the fund balance on the balance sheet of the College, but are presented below as supplementary information.

\* The Restricted and Plant Funds are special funds that do not enter into the operational picture of the college. They are certainly helpful, especially the Plant Funds, which enable us to erect new buildings and improve our facilities. However, only current operational funds can be used to operate the college on a day-to-day basis. Therefore, they are the real "measure" of the college's financial operations.

As can be seen from last chart, there has been a steady growth of approximately 17% in current operational funds over the past two years. 1973 saw an erratic increase of 70.4%. This tremendous increase was due no doubt to the urgent plea for funds during the financial "crisis" of that period. In 1976 a healthy increase of \$118,061 in current operational funds was realized. The source of these funds were as follows:

# GENERAL FUND REPORT TO THE BRETHREN OF OKLAHOMA STATE ASSOCIATION FROM FREE WILL BAPTIST BIBLE COLLEGE

Brethren,

Your Bible College in Nashville began this year with an enrollment slightly increased over last year. Basic enrollment difference was seen in the increased number of single students. This filled all dormitories to capacity.

During the month of August Free Will Baptist Bible College received official sanction for teacher certification for elementary education graduates. This will strengthen the hand of the Christian day school movement which is enlarging across our denomination. It further evidences the alertness of our Board of Trustees and administration in meeting whatever worthwhile demands are made upon the institution.

Free Will Baptist Bible College is committed to training Christian workers. It continues to give a missionary emphasis in the classroom and chapel services. Young men are challenged daily to answer the call of God to preach the Gospel.

On May 1, there were 25,000 catalogued volumes in the campus library. Seven hundred forty-two of these volumes are in the Free Will Baptist Historical collection. Eight hundred twelve volumes make up the curriculum laboratory. This leaves 23,446 volumes in the regular library. During the 1975-76 year a total of 1,739 books were added as follows: 70 Historical collection; 812 Curriculum laboratory; and 857 in the regular library.

# OKLAHOMA STATE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY CONVENTION CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

## ARTICLE I

# NAME

This organization shall be known as the Oklahoma State Woman's Auxiliary Convention.

#### ARTICLE II

## **PURPOSE**

The purpose of this convention shall be to bring the women of each district convention together for fellowship, sharing information, and encouraging one another in the work of the Lord.

## ARTICLE III

## **OFFICERS**

The officers of this convention shall be a president, vice president, secretary, treasurer, and field worker. These shall serve on the state executive committee together with three membrs elected by the convention as desired. These shall serve for a period of 2 years.

#### ARTICLE IV

# **MEMBERSHIP**

This convention shall be composed of the officers of the convention together with each active auxiliary member of the district or local (duly accredited by the credentials committee).

#### ARTICLE V

#### **MEETINGS**

The annual meeting shall be held each year on the day preceding the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists and at the place designated by said Association.

#### ARTICLE VI

#### **AMENDMENTS**

This constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the convention by a two-thirds vote of members present.

## **BY-LAWS**

# ARTICLE I

# **DUTIES OF OFFICERS**

Section 1, President. The president shall preside over all meetings, appoint such committees as may be needed, call the executive committee together when necessary, be ex-officio member of all committees, and serve as chairman of the executive committee, see that reports are made promptly to the national secretary and perform all duties usually pertaining to such an office.

Section 2, Vice President. The vice president shall preside in the absence of the president or by her request and otherwise assist her in the overseeing

of the work in general.

Section 3, Secretary. The secretary shall keep an accurate record of all proceedings of the convention and executive meetings, preserve all valuable papers and turn same over to her successor in office, and make an annual report to the national secretary on a form available from the WNAC office. She shall compile the districts slates of officers and addresses immediately after the convention. She shall also send a slate of state officers and addresses to the national executive secretary. She is chairman of the Credentials Committee.

The secretary shall also serve as historian keeping an historical record and submitting historical information to the national executive secretary

annually.

Section 4, Treasurer. The treasurer shall have charge of all funds belonging to this convention and shall pay out same only when authorized by the convention. The treasurer shall keep an accurate account and shall give a written report of all funds received and disbursed at each annual meeting of the convention. She shall also send an annual report to the WNAC office (executive secretary-treasurer) at least ten days before the end of the fiscal year. She shall encourage support of missions through the WNAC Gift Plan, individual giving and special offerings.

Section 5, Field Worker. The field worker shall have charge of all field work pertaining to, or necessary to, the promotion of the work of the con-

vention and keep the national program before the district officers.

# ARTICLE II

# **ELECTIONS**

The general officers shall be nominated by a nominating committee and shall be elected by acclamation, unless there are other nominations. In case of more than one nominee for any particular office, a vote will be taken on each. All elections shall be held at the closing business session of the convention.

## ARTICLE III

# **EXPENSES**

Section 1. An appropriation of 10 cents per mile toward the expense of the general officers, when called upon to attend the executive committee meeting to plan program, secretary's expenses, phone calls, postage and stationery for officers will be paid by the convention. All field promotional work is subject to the state executive committee, who should approve all work done by state officers in the interest of state work, as well as expenses of the same.

Section 2. An amount of \$50.00 shall be paid on the expense of the state president to attend WNAC.

## ARTICLE IV

#### COMMITTEES

Section 1. Executive Committee—The executive committee shall be composed of the five officers and three members elected by the convention. Five of these shall compose a quorum. They shall hold meetings for the transaction of business as often as necessary. It shall be the duty of the executive committee to maintain an overseeing of the work at large. They shall act for the convention when necessary. They shall meet with district presidents the night preceding the state auxiliary convention.

Section 2. Resolutions Committee—A resolutions committee of five

members shall be appointed by the president as needed.

Section 3. Nominating Committee—The nominating committee shall be composed of at least one member from each district convention. Nominations shall be submitted by district with their annual report. These elected by the body at the annual meeting.

Section 4. Credentials Committee—The secretary shall be chairman of the credentials committee, and other members may be appointed by the president. The treasurer shall be a standing member of this committee.

Section 5. Finance Committee—The finance committee shall be appointed by the president. This committee audits the financial records of the year and reports on same to the convention.

Section 6. Student Loan Committee-State Auxiliary President and 2

elected members to serve 2 years each. They shall be elected on alternate years.

Section 7. Registration committee shall be provided by the district convention which is host to state convention.

ARTICLE V

#### men is nost to state convention.

# FEES AND REPORTS

Active members shall pay dues of \$1.50 per year. With 25 cents remaining in the district. \$1.25 to be forwarded to state where 25 cents shall be retained, and \$1.00 forwarded to WNAC as required for membership fees. It shall be the duty of each body directly affiliated with the State Auxiliary Convention to send a report to every annual session.

## ARTICLE VI

## **AMENDMENTS**

These by-laws may be amended by a two-thirds vote of members present at regular meeting of the state auxiliary convention.

# ARTICLE VII

#### **GIFTS**

The desired plans for giving in the Woman's Auxiliary are those adopted by WNAC as follows:

1. Mission offerings following each special season of prayer

- Co-Laborer offering (monthly or quarterly designated to WNAC General Fund)
- 3. WNAC Emphasis Month in August or other time more convenient to help in support of WNAC General Fund

4. Memorial Student Loan Fund (special program and offering in September to assist worthy and needy students at FWBBC in Nashville)

- 5. Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College Student Loan Fund. (Special program and offering in September to assist worthy and needy students at Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College)
- 6. Tithes—Pay tithes on all undesignated money received
- 7. All offerings are to be forwarded through regular channels

# ARTICLE VIII

# WNAC DELEGATE

Each district convention shall submit one nomination for a State delegate to WNAC with their annual report. This nomination (along with others as needed to make up 15 delegates to WNAC) shall be elected by the body at the annual meeting. It shall be the duty of delegates elected to notify president if they cannot attend WNAC. President shall appoint delegates as needed in absence of regular elected delegates.

# THE FREE WILL BAPTIST MASTER'S MEN State of Oklahoma CONSTITUTION

#### PREAMBLE

The purpose of the Free Will Baptist Master's Men, state of Oklahoma is to provide a means of Christian fellowship and to deepen the spiritual lives of the laymen of the local church. Also, to provide a means of developing the abilities and talents of the laymen, and to promote the cause of Christ through a complete, "total church program," as prescribed by Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists.

# ARTICLE I

The name of this organization shall be known as the Free Will Baptist Master's Men. State of Oklahoma.

# ARTICLE II

Section 1. The membership of this organization shall be composed of the district associations of Master's Men, and any local chapters where there is only one chapter in the district, within the state of Oklahoma.

Section 2. Every member in good standing of an affiliated district association of Master's Men, or any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district, is entitled to the full benefits of membership.

Section 3. Each district association, or any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district, shall submit an annual, written report to this body, (as a matter of information).

# ARTICLE III OFFICERS

The officers of this organization shall consist of a president, vice-president and a secretary-treasurer.

The officers of this organization shall be elected annually and may succeed themselves, at this level.

# ARTICLE IV EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The executive committee shall consist of the elected officers of this organization and they shall serve as the program committee for each annual convention.

Section 2. Ex-officio members of the executive committee shall be the presidents of the district associations of Master's Men, presidents of any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district, and the state executive secretary of the State Association of Free Will Baptists.

# ARTICLE V MEETINGS

This organization shall meet annually at 7:30 P.M. on the Monday night before the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists convenes.

# ARTICLE VI AMENDMENTS

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of any regular meeting.

# **BY-LAWS**

# **VOTING RIGHTS**

Section 1. Every member of each affiliated district association, or any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district, is eligible to vote on all questions and matters that might come before the Free Will Baptist Master's Men, State of Oklahoma.

#### COMMITTEES

Section 2. The executive committee shall transact all routine business and shall act for the organization in the interim between meetings.

Section 3. The executive committee shall meet at the call of the president.

Section 4. A nominating committee, for the annual election of officers, shall be composed of the presidents of each district association, and the president of any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district.

Section 5. The president shall appoint all other committees, subject to the

approval of the body.

# **FINANCE**

Section 6. This organization shall be financed on the basis of offerings, dues and assessments.

#### OUORUM

Section 7. One-tenth of the members of this organization shall constitute a quorum at any regular meeting.

# **AMENDMENTS**

Section 8. These by-laws may be amended at any regular meeting by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

# HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE, INC. BY-LAWS BOARD OF TRUSTEES

#### SECTION I

The Board of Trustees of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc., an Oklahoma corporation, shall be composed of fifteen members, elected as provided in the Articles of Incorporation of said College, as amended:

ARTICLE A—OFFICERS: The officers of the board of Trustees shall be a Chairman, an Assistant Chairman, and a Secretary, each of whom shall be elected by the Board for a term of one year. They shall continue in office until their successors have been chosen:

Item 1—CHAIRMAN: The chairman of the Board of Trustees or his assistant shall preside at all meetings of the Board. He shall be an ex-officio

member of the Executive Committee.

Item 2—SECRETARY: The Secretary shall record and preserve minutes of all meetings and acts of the Board of Trustees and countersign all deeds, conveyances, and other papers authorized by the Board. He shall have authority to call special meetings of the Trustees of the College upon the written request of two-thirds of the members of the Board; he shall mail

notice of said meeting to the trustees ten (10) days in advance.

Item 3—EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE: The Executive Committee shall consist of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, the Vice-Chairman of the Board, the Secretary of the Board. The Executive Committee shall have authority to consider and act upon all questions affecting the College which may be brought before it between the stated meetings of the Board, or a quorum of the Board fails to attend a called or regular meeting. It shall transact such business as may be committed to it by the Board and shall act for the College on such matters as it may submit to it. The Committee shall meet at the call of the Chairman or the President of the College.

ARTICLE B—MEETINGS: The Board of Trustees shall meet each year at a time and place agreed upon by the Board. It shall, also, hold special meetings whenever called in accordance with the By-Laws of the Board. Such special meetings may be called by either the chairman of the Board, or

the President of the College.

ARTICLE C—QUORUM: A majority of the members or the Board of Trustees of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc. in attendance at any called or regular meeting, written notice of which has been mailed by the

Secretary to each trustee, shall constitute a quorum. No proxy votes shall be permitted. No ex-officio member shall be entitled to vote at meetings of the Board of Trustees.

ARTICLE D—ELECTIONS: In all elections held by the Board of Trustees each member present except ex-officio members shall be entitled to one vote, and the result shall be determined by a majority of the votes cast. Due notice of any election must be personal notice to the members or a day on the minutes of the Board not less than one week preceding the election.

# SECTION II OFFICERS OF HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE

The officers of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College shall be a President, Vice-President, Dean, and a Business Manager, each of whom shall be elected by the Board of Trustees to hold office for two years exclusive of the President whose term of office shall be indefinite. It is provided, however, that retirement of any one of the officers herein named may occur at any time upon the resignation of the officer or the request of the Board. In either case, notice shall be given six weeks before the date of the proposed

retirement unless otherwise agreed upon by the concerned parties.

ITEM ONE—PRESIDENT: The President shall be executive officer of the Board of Trustees and shall have general control of the College including its officers, teachers, students, and business. He shall render to the Board complete annual reports and to its chairman, Executive Committee or other committees such information as may be deemed essential to a thorough knowledge of the operation of the College and its promotion. He shall be a member of the Board of Trustees ex-officio and the Executive Committee ex-officio and shall have the rights and privileges of a member of the Board except voting. The President shall execute all documents, instruments, and conveyances on behalf of the College. Duties of the president and working relationship shall be further detailed in a format approved by the Board of Trustees.

ITEM TWO-VICE PRESIDENT: The Vice-President shall perform all

the duties of the President in the absence of the latter.

ITEM THREE—DEAN: The Academic Dean of the College shall, under the President, fix the hours of recitation, govern, control, and regulate the conduct of the students, have general oversight of curriculum, student's records, and such other internal details and administrative duties as may be

delegated to him by the President of the College.

ITEM FOUR—BUSINESS MANAGER: The Treasurer shall keep an accurate record of all accounts of the College and shall receive and expend as directed by the Board of Trustees and President, all money for the expenses of the institution. He shall make an annual report to the Board and furnish the Executive Committee with such information pertaining to his office as may be requested. He shall provide bond in whatever amount the Board may require. Until such times as the Board of Trustees may deem different the Treasurer's office shall be contained within the Business Manager's Office. The Business Manager may at the direction of the administration designate this duty to a subordinate officer. The Business Manager shall have general supervision of the financial business of the College, and shall, at the direction of the President, be responsible for the upkeep of all the physical facilities and premises of the College. His detailed duties are directed in a format approved by the Board of Trustees.

# SECTION III FACULTY

The faculty shall consist of the President, the Dean, and all teachers of

Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College. Instructors and assistant teachers shall have the privilege of sitting with the faculty in stated meetings but shall

not have the right of voting.

It shall be the policy of the College to employ on its faculty those who are members of Free Will Baptist churches that are affiliated with the National Association. Emergencies, however arising from the resignation, illness, death, or approved leaves of absence of faculty members may be relieved by the temporary employment of instructors who are affiliated with any evangelical denomination. Part-time or short-term instructors, deemed essential to the successful prosecution of a consistent education program, may be employed at the discretion of the President without respect of denominational affiliation.

The faculty, under the authority and jurisdiction of the President, shall have general charge of instruction, attendance of students, examinations, administration of curriculum, discipline, and all matters involving the spiritual, physical, and social welfare of the College. The faculty shall be

hired upon recommendation of the President.

In the selection of the faculty qualitative factors shall be kept in mind. All faculty members shall be urged to pursue graduate programs in their respective fields. Except in special cases no faculty member will be required to teach courses outside of his field.

## SECTION IV ACADEMIC COUNCIL

The Academic Council shall consist of the President, the Dean and the heads of the departments of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College: It shall determine the curriculum and academic policy of the College, prescribe requirements for admission, certificates, diplomas, and degrees, and supervise the courses of instruction offered by the various departments of the College.

# SECTION V CONTRACTS

The Board of Trustees shall establish the College policy involving the execution of contracts, deeds of conveyance, the determination of salaries, and employment of all officers, representatives, faculty members and essential domestic and maintenance employees. The President of the College shall negotiate agreements, executive contracts, employ representatives, and supply vacancies incurred by the termination of contracts, resignations, or death of any essential employees. All contracts for building construction shall be let only to persons or corporations posting a valid performance bond and recording the same in the Office of the County Clerk of Cleveland County, Oklahoma.

## SECTION VI ADVISORY COUNCIL

An advisory council shall be formed which is to be composed of interested, qualified persons in the various fields which will be of value in building and maintaining a strong academic program to carry out the educational program stated in the charter.

# SECTION VII

These By-Laws may be amended by a favorable vote of two-thirds of the qualified members of the Board of Trustees of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College at any meeting of the Board, provided that the proposed amend-

ment has been submitted in writing to each Trustee one month in advance. This change to be subject to the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists.

# SECTION VIII ADMINISTRATIVE FUNCTIONS

The President of the Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College shall be elected by the Board of Trustees, and he shall act for and on behalf of the Board in the conduct and management of the institution. He shall also be a member of the Board of Trustees ex-officio and of the Executive committee, exofficio, and his duties, powers and term of office shall be prescribed in the by-laws of the College and a format approved by the Board of Trustees.

# ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF THE HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE, INC.

Know all men by these presents, that, we whose names are hereunto subscribed, do hereby associate ourselves together for the purpose of forming a corporation under the provisions of the corporation laws of the State of Oklahoma, and for that purpose state:

# ARTICLE ONE

The name of this corporation shall be HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE, INC.

## ARTICLE TWO

The purpose of this corporation shall be the creation, establishment and maintenance of a college and institution of higher learning devoted to the promotion and impartation of higher learning, Christian education and such other education, instruction, learning, training and research as may be deemed essential for the cause of Christ and to that end prescribe courses of study and grant degrees. The doctrinal and theological position of this institution shall be that of the sponsoring denomination, Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists and the treatise of the National Association of Free Will Baptist as endorsed by the state body, and in connection therewith, in accordance with the stipulation of the Constitution and Byaws of the State Association of Free Will Baptists, Inc.

(a.) To prescribe courses of study for both resident and correspondence students, which shall include general education in the arts, Christian Ministries of Service and Biblical studies for wisdom; said courses to be taught in both a Junior College Division and a Bible College Division, and to award degrees, either graduate or post-graduate, to those persons satisfactorily completing the prescribed couses of study and to grant such other literary honors, including honorary degrees, as shall be deemed advisable.

(b.) To charge and collect tuition as determined by the Board of Trus-

tees and to create scholarships.

(c.) To employ professors, instructors and other subordinate employees as may be necessary for the proper conduct of the college under the direction and control of the President of the College, with the advice and consent of the majority of the Board of Trustees.

(d.) To institute and carry on missions and commissions for missionary

purposes and investigations.

(e.) To publish and distribute such pamphlets, literature or books as may be required in the conduct of such work and the general promotion of the College.

(f.) To sue and be sued in its corporate name and to enter into contracts

of every type and nature.

(g.) To solicit support, receive, collect, hold and receive by gift or bequest personal property in any amount, money or other thing of value; to purchase real estate, to receive real estate that may be given, or devised to the college for achieving the legitimate ends of the college and to sell or mortgage the same as the need arises.

(h.) To borrow money in payment of property for erecting buildings and making improvements and for any other purpose germane to the ob-

jecitves and purposes of the college.

(i.) To issue notes, bonds, debentures and other evidences of indebtedness and execute mortgages, liens and other incumbrances upon the property of the corporation, real or otherwise, to secure the payment of any such evidences of indebtedness.

(j.) To transact any and all business connected with said College as may

be necessary to achieve the purposes of said College.

(k.) To obtain under Internal Revenue Laws of the United States and of the Revenue Laws of the State of Oklahoma exemption from income property and other forms of taxation.

## ARTICLE THREE

The location of this corporation shall be in Norman, Oklahoma.

# ARTICLE FOUR

The duration of this corporation shall be perpetual.

# ARTICLE FIVE

The general control of this corporation shall be vested in a Board of Trustees consisting of 15 members, 9 of which trustees shall be elected by the delegates to the annual Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Bantists—each of which shall serve for a term of three years and until his successor is elected and qualified, and one member each shall be elected by the delegates to the annual meeting of the state association of Free Will Baptists of the States of Arkansas, Colorado, Kansas, Missouri, New Mexico and Texas, each of which shall serve for a term of six years and until his successor is elected and qualified. Initially, the 9 trustees elected by said Oklahoma Association shall include 3 elected for three years, three elected for two years, and 3 elected for one year but their successors shall all be elected for a term of three years and until their successors are elected and qualified. Initially, said trustee elected by said Arkansas Association shall be elected for a term of six years, said trustee elected by said Colorado Association shall be elected for a term of five years, said trustee elected by said Kansas Association shall be elected for a term of four years, said trustee elected by said Missouri Association shall be elected for a term of three years, said trustee elected by said New Mexico Association shall be elected for a term of two years, and said trustee elected by said Texas Association shall be elected for a term of one year but their successors shall be elected for a term of six years. The Chairman of said Corporation shall be one of the trustees elected by said Oklahoma Association.

#### ARTICLE SIX

An executive committee consisting of the Chairman, Vice Chairman, and Secretary of the Board of Trustees shall possess all powers of the Board of Trustees between the stated meetings of the Board of Trustees.

# ARTICLE SEVEN

All contracts for building construction shall be let only to persons or corporations posting a valid performance bond and recording the same in the office of the County Clerk of Cleveland County, Oklahoma.

# SECTION IX

This charter may be hereafter amended subject to the provisions contained herein and the laws of the State of Oklahoma. It is provided, however, that the Trustees of the College shall not propose or apply for any amendment which has not been previously authorized by an act of the Oklahoma State Association.

#### CONSTITUTION OF MINISTER'S CONFERENCE

#### ARTICLE 1

The Minister's Conference shall be called the Oklahoma State Free Will Baptist Minister's Conference, and shall be composed of Ordained Free Will Baptist Ministers who are regular members of some Orthodox Free Will Baptist church in the State of Oklahoma who have paid their \$1.00 dues.

# ARTICLE 2

The officers for this conference shall be President, Vice-President, and Clerk Treasurer, who shall be elected annually.

#### ARTICLE 3

This conference shall have the power to discipline its members.

#### ARTICLE 4

Members of this organization shall be all ordained ministers who participate in the benefits and activities of this body, and associate members who become members by payment of the \$1.00 annual dues.

#### ARTICLE 5

This conference shall meet Semi-Annually.

## ARTICLE 6

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any regular session.

# BY-LAWS OF MINISTER'S CONFERENCE

# ARTICLE 1

The clerk or assistant clerk, or in their absence the senior minister in years shall call the ministers into conference. If a quorum is present the President or in his absence the Vice-President shall moderate the meeting. If neither of these are present, the senior minister in years shall be in charge.

## ARTICLE 2

It shall be the duty of the clerk to enroll the ministers of the conference. Ministers shall present themselves with proper evidence of their rights to seats therein, and those enrolled by the clerk shall compose the conference. In case of questionable representation the case under question shall be referred to the Credential Committee.

# ARTICLE 3

It shall be the duty of each minister belonging to this conference, to be active in pastoral or evangelistic services (disabled or retired ministers excepted). Any minister belonging to this conference shall report in each session in person or by letter, and failing to do so for two successive sessions shall be subject to discipline.

# ARTICLE 4

Each conference shall be opened by reading a portion of God's word and prayer, and each session shall be closed with prayer.

# ARTICLE 5

By a two-thirds vote of the members present ruling of the President may be overruled.

#### ARTICLE 6

This conference shall sit with open doors, except when it shall go into a committee as a whole.

#### ARTICLE 7

No member shall absent himself from the conference during its meeting without permission from the President.

#### ARTICLE 8

No person shall be allowed to nominate more than one member of a committee, unless person nominated is not elected.

## ARTICLE 9

The President shall not allow discussion when not carried on in a Christian Spirit, or when he thinks it will cause discord.

## ARTICLE 10

Anyone desiring to speak shall rise and address the President by the appelation "Brother President," but shall not speak further until recognized.

# ARTICLE 11

No member of this conference shall be allowed to speak more than five minutes, nor twice on the same subject without permission from the President.

# **ARTICLE 12**

These By-Laws may be altered or amended at any regular or adjourned session of this conference by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

# ARTICLES OF FAITH OF STATE ASSOCIATION

1. THE BIBLE—The Scriptures of the Old and New Testament were given by the inspiration of God, and are our infallible rules of faith and practice.

- 2. GOD—There is one living and true God, revealed in nature as the Creator, Preserver and Righteous Governor of the Universe, and in the Scriptures as the Father, Son and Holy Ghost, yet as one God, infinitely wise and good, whom all intelligent creatures are supremely to love, adore and obey.
- 3. CHRIST—Christ is God manifest in the flesh: in His divine nature truly God, in His human nature truly man. The mediator between God and man, once crucified. He is now risen and glorified is our ever-present Saviour and Lord.
- 4. THE HOLY SPIRIT—The Scriptures assigns to the Holy Spirit all the attributes of God. He is the Reprover, Comforter, Guide and Sanctifier of all men.
- 5. THE GOVERNMENT OF GOD—God exercises a wise and benevolent providence over all beings and all things by maintaining the constitution and laws of nature. He also performs special acts of Grace, not otherwise provided for as highest welfare of man requires.
- 6. THE SINFULNESS OF MAN—Man was created innocent, but by disobedience fell into a state of sin and condemnation. His posterity, therefore inherited a fallen nature of such tendencies that all who come to years of accountability, sin and become guilty before God.

7. 'THE WORK OF CHRIST—The Son of God, by His incarnation, life, suffering, death, and resurrection effected for all a redemption from sin that is full and free and is the ground of salvation by faith.

- 8. THE WORK OF SALVATION—The conditions of salvation are:
  1. Repentance or sincere sorrow for sin and the hearty renunciations of it.
  2. Faith or the unreserved committal of one's self to Christ as Saviour and Lord, with purpose to love and obey Him in all things. In the exercise of saving faith the soul is renewed by the Holy Spirit; freed from the dominion of sin and becomes a child of God. 3. Continuance in faith and obedience until death.
- 9. ELECTION—God determined from the beginning to save all who should comply with the conditions of salvation. Hence by faith in Christ, men become His elect.
- 10. FREEDOM OF WILL—The Human will is free and self controlled, having power to yield to the influence of the truth and the Spirit and live, or to resist them and perish.
- 11. SALVATION FREE—God desires the salvation of all, the Gospel invites all, the Holy Spirit strives with all, and whosoever will may come and take of the water of life freely.

12. PERSEVERENCE—All believers in Christ, who through grace persevere in holiness to the end of life, have the promise of eternal salvation.

13. BACKSLIDING AND APOSTASY—A person who has been regenerated or born again and is living in unconfessed, unforgiven sin, is rebellious to the principles of the Kingdom of God and His righteousness, and therefore is a backslider in a lost condition who must repent and be restored to the right relationship with God or be eternally lost.

We recognize, according to Hebrews 6:4-6, that it is possible for a person to get in the condition that he could never return to Christ. This, we believe, is Apostasy; However, we also recognize that a regenerate person can fall into sin, be in a lost condition and still not be an Apostate. This person,

through repentance, can be reconciled to God.

14. GOSPEL ORDINANCES—Baptism, or the immersion of believers in water, and the Lord's Supper, are ordinances to be perpetuated under the Gospel: Feet Washing, an ordinance teaching humility, of universal obligation, and to be administered to all true believers.

15. TITHING—God commanded tithes and offerings in the Old Testament: Jesus Christ endorsed in the Gospel (Matt. 23:23), and the Apostle Paul said, "Upon the first day of the week let every one of you lay by him in store as God hath prospered him." I Cor. 16:2.

16. THE CHRISTIAN SABBATH—The divine law requires that one day in seven be set apart from the secular employment and amusements for rest, worship, holy works and activities, and for personal communion with

God.

17. RESURRECTION, JUDGMENT, AND FINAL RETRIBUTION—The Scriptures teach the resurrection of all men at the last day. They that have done good will come forth to the resurrection of life, and they that have done evil unto the resurrection of damnation: then the wicked shall "Go away into eternal punishment but the righteous into eternal life."

# RULES OF ORDER

1. At every sitting of the Association, business shall be opened and concluded by prayer by the Moderator or whomever he may request.

2. Ministers and deacons present are invited to seats, allowed to take

part in debates on all subjects, and to vote.

3. Those who speak shall rise and address the Moderator. Personal reflections shall be avoided in all debates.

4. No motion may be discussed until made and seconded.

5. When a motion has been made and seconded, and a member opposes its discussion, the Moderator shall put the question, "Shall it be discussed?" If negative, the question shall not be discussed.

6. If any proposition or motion under debate contains two or more points, it shall be divided at the request of any member, and the vote taken

separately.

7. Motions made and lost shall not be recorded.

8. No one shall speak more than twice on the same subject without special leave of the Moderator.

9. All questions shall be decided by a majority vote of all Members present.

## BY-LAWS OF STATE ASSOCIATION

1. The Clerk or assistant clerk, or in their absence, the senior minister in years shall call the Association into conference, and if a quorum is present the moderator, or in his absence, the assistant moderator shall take charge; and if neither of them is present the senior minister in years shall act as Moderator.

2. It shall be the duty of the clerk to enroll the delegates to the Association, who shall present themselves with proper evidence of their rights to seats therein, and those enrolled by the clerk shall compose the Association.

3. It shall be the duty of every District belonging to this Association to send a letter to every annual session of this Association reporting in the same spiritual condition, benevolent work, and its statistics. Any District belonging to this Association, which shall fail to report itself for two successive sessions, may be dismissed from the Association by a two thirds vote of all members present.

4. Each meeting shall be opened by reading a portion of the Bible and with prayer, and shall be closed with prayer.

- 5. By a two-thirds vote of members present, a ruling of the moderator can be overruled.
- 6. This Association may correspond by messenger or otherwise with other religious bodies.

7. This Association shall sit with open doors except when it shall go into a committe of the whole.

8. Any person not a member of this Association may be allowed to take

part in its discussions by obtaining permission from the moderator.

9. It shall be the duty of all the Association to be present at the time appointed for each meeting, and anyone wishing to retire shall first obtain leave of the moderator.

10. No person shall be allowed to nominate more than one member of any committee, provided the person nominated be elected.

11. The moderator shall not allow discussions when not carried on in a

Christian spirit or when he thinks it will cause discord or division.

12. Anyone desiring to speak shall rise to his feet and address the moderator by the appelation "Brother Moderator," but shall not speak further until recognized by the moderator.

13. No member of this association shall be allowed to speak more than ten minutes nor twice on the same subject without permission from the moderator.

14. This Association shall meet annually beginning on the Tuesday

following the second Sunday in October.

15. These By-Laws may be altered or amended at any regular or adjourned session of this Association by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

### CONSTITUTION OF STATE ASSOCIATION

PREAMBLE: From long experience, we the members of the Free Will Baptist denomination, being regularly baptized upon a profession of our faith in Jesus Christ, and realizing the necessity of a bond of union and fellowship among us as a church; and to preserve and maintain correspondence and co-ordination with us, do therefore ordain this Constitution for our better denomination government.

### ARTICLE 1

NAME: This organization shall be known as the OKLAHOMA STATE ASSOCIATION OF FREE WILL BAPTISTS.

#### ARTICLE II

PURPOSE: The object and purpose of this organization shall be to unify the work of the various bodies composing this State Association, and to devise and execute measures for the extension of the Kingdom of God in connection with the various bodies in the Association, or that may hereafter be represented therein.

## ARTICLE III

REPRESENTATION: Section 1. This Association shall be composed of all ordained ministers and deacons with membership in some local church which is a member of a district Association with membership in the State Association.

Section 2: Each District Association shall be entitled to a number of elected delegates equal with the number of churches composing said Association. These delegates may be recommended by the local churches and shall be endorsed by their district association.

# ARTICLE IV

FINANCE: Each Association shall contribute \$20.00 per Church for support of the Association and delegate fees.

### ARTICLE V

DISCIPLINE: This State Association shall have the right to settle any question of discipline, doctrine or practices that may properly come before

it from any of the bodies composing said organization; furthermore, if there be any question of discipline, doctrine or practices on the part of an affiliated association, delegates of that association shall not be seated until these questions have been settled to the satisfaction of the General Board.

Section 2: Decisions of the General Board may be appealed in this manner. All appeals shall come before the State Association when sitting

in a committee as a whole.

### ARTICLE VI

OFFICERS: A. The officers of the State Association shall consist of a Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, and an Executive Secretary. Each of these shall be elected at the close of each regular session

except the Executive Secretary.

B. (1) The Executive Secretary shall be elected for a two year tenure. It shall be the responsibility of the Executive Board to seek out a prospective candidate and make their recommendation to the body at the state association in its regular session, with primary consideration given to the recommendation prior to any nominations.

(2) In the event of a vacancy occurring during the course of the year, the Executive Board shall fill the vacancy until the annual setting of the

association.

#### ARTICLE VII

BOARDS: All standing boards shall be composed of seven (7) elected members who shall serve terms of 7, 6, 5, 4, 3, 2 and 1 years with such ex-officio members as may be provided elsewhere, except: (1) the General Board which shall be composed of one (1) member from each affiliated association, the chairman of each standing board, and the current general officers of this association, and (2) the College Board of Trustees which shall be composed as provided for in the Articles of Incorporation of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc.

The standing boards of this association shall be: Executive Board; Board of Church Extension, Missions and Evangelism; Sunday School Board; Church Training Service Board; and College Board of Trustees.

No standing board shall meet in a functional meeting during the session

of this association.

## ARTICLE VIII DUTIES, SCOPE OF ENDEAVOR AND QUALIFICATIONS OF STANDING BOARDS

Section 1. EXECUTIVE BOARD: The Executive Board shall be composed of seven (7) members who are members of an affiliated association and in good standing with the association of which they are members. They

shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

It shall be the duty of this board to act in behalf of the association when it is not in session. It shall be bound to carry out the directions of the association and shall hold itself bound by every consideration of morality and honor to carry out the wishes of this association and to act under its instructions in whatever technical rights, civil laws and the decisions of courts may give it in certain emergencies. It shall be the duty of this board to sign their signatures to any and all papers concerning properties, indebtedness, bonds, or other legal documents pertaining to the execution of the will of this association, exclusive of the College Board of Trustees.

This board shall have the oversight of the Executive Department of this association. The members shall assist and direct such work for the general promotion of this association as is deemed needful or necessary as the means available shall permit. The Executive Department shall serve as the

coordinating agency of this association to correlate the work of all standing

boards and agencies.

This board shall have the oversight of Free Will Baptist Book Store and shall endeavor to serve affiliated associations and churches and the community with literature and church supplies. Merchandising procedures shall be those accepted as normal retail procedures with the board being cognizant of the spiritual contribution of the store in distributing Christian literature.

All decisions of this board shall be governed by the general tenets of this

association and shall not violate this constitution.

This board shall organize itself and elect such officers as necessary to the orderly conduct of its affairs and labors. This board shall keep an accurate record of all meetings, decisions, and work done and shall make a report in writing at each annual session of this association. All records shall be available to this association at its request.

Whereas this board represents the association when not in session, it and it alone shall have the power to call the association into special conference provided each affiliated association shall be given notice at least ten (10)

days prior to the meeting of such special conference.

Section 2. GENERAL BOARD: This board shall be composed of one (1) member from each affiliated association, the chairman of each standing board, and the current general officers of this association. Each member must be a member of an affiliated association and in good standing with the association of which he is a member. The members shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

The duties of this board shall be to meet one (1) day preceding the annual session of this association. This board shall serve as the credential committee with the duties and responsibilities assigned by Article V of this constitution. This board shall hear reports of all standing boards. It shall serve as budget committee and shall make such recommendations as deemed pertinent to this association. A complete and accurate record shall be kept of meetings of this board and a report shall be made in writing to this association in its annual session.

The moderator of the association shall serve as chairman of this board, and the clerk of the association shall serve as its clerk.

Section 3. BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION, MISSIONS AND EVANGELISM: This board shall be composed of seven (7) members who are members of affiliated associations and in good standing with the associations of which they are members. They shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

It shall be the duty of this board to labor to further the Gospel of Jesus Christ into the uttermost parts of the earth. In accomplishing this, they are to endeavor to establish missions and churches in communities within the bounds of this association with whatever moral and financial assistance that may be theirs. In cases of small churches failing to function, whatever assistance deemed appropriate shall be rendered to maintain the effective witness of that church by either direct labor with the church or with an associational board in instances where the affiliated association has a functional board or agency.

This board shall be empowered to receive and convey title to real

property in the area of its labors.

The promotion of missionary endeavors from a local, state or national level shall come within the scope of endeavor of this board. This board shall assist in maintaining prayer and financial support of missionary enterprises through whatever channels available.

Whereas missionary and evangelistic labors are so intimately related,

this board shall assist through participation or assistance in maintaining a strong evangelistic thrust in the life of affiliated association.

This board shall organize itself and elect such officers as necessary to the orderly conduct of its affairs and labors. This board shall keep an accurate record of all meetings, decisions, work done, funds received and disbursed and hsall make a report in writing at each annual session of this association. All records shall be available to this association at its request.

Section 4. COLLEGE BOARD OF TRUSTEES: The College Board of Trustees shall be composed as provided for in the Articles of Incorporation of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc.

Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc. is an agency of the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists and is incorporated under the corporate laws of the State of Oklahoma. The articles of incorporation are a part of this association's record and delineate the purpose, duty and scope of endeavor of the members of this board.

Section 5. CHURCH TRAINING SERVICE BOARD: This board shall be composed of seven members who are members of affiliated associations and in good standing with the associations of which they are members. They shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

The duties of this board shall be to plan and assist in organizing and sustaining a strong Church Training Service in every church in each association affiliated with this association with every means of promotion and assistance available to them. This board shall plan, coordiate and conduct state-wide youth camps or camp.

This board shall organize itself and elect such officers as necessary to the orderly conduct of its affairs and labors. This board shall keep an accurate record o fall meetings, decisions, work done, funds received and disbursed and shall make a report in writing at each annual session of this association. All records shall be available to this association at its request.

Section 6. SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD: This board shall be composed of seven (7) members who are members of affiliated associations and in good standing with the associations of which they are members. They shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

The duties of this board shall be to plan and promote Sunday schools in every church in each association affiliated with this association. This board shall use every available means to promote Sunday school clinics, seminars, institutes and conventions on local, district and state-wide basis, working with local agencies to distribute and employ all effective methods and material available.

This board shall organize itself and elect such officers as necessary to the orderly conduct of its affairs and labors. This board shall keep an accurate record of all meetings, decisions, work done, funds received and disbursed and shall make a report in writing at each annual session of this association. All records shall be available to this association at its request.

Section 7. VACANCIES: Vacancies shall occur when a member moves from the territorial bounds of this association, by death, by resignation or by removal from office by this association. In the event of disciplinary action where charges concerning misconduct, doctrine or practice shall have been lodged against a member of any board, his office shall be held in abeyance until such charges shall be concluded or as determined by this association.

All boards shall have power to fill vacancies arising between sessions of this association. Such appointment shall terminate at the next session of the association and shall be filled by this association.

Section 8. EMPLOYEES: All employees of boards or agencies of this

association shall be employed by agreement or contract with employing board or agency upon approval of this association except those elected by this association and the conditions of their employment shall be those approved by this association.

The duties of the Executive Secretary of this association shall be:

- (1) He is to represent, or cause to be represented, the association at all affairs of interest to the association.
- (2) He is to promote the work of the association in such a manner so as to unify the efforts of the association.
- (3) He is to serve with all standing boards and committees of the association in an ex-officio capacity.
- (4) He is to aid in planning the work of the association by relating the activities and plans of one board to another.
- (5) He is to report to the association during each annual session.
- (6) He is to communicate to the affiliated members of this association the pressing causes and events before the association. This can be in person or by means of a periodical bulletin or both.
- (7) He shall serve as treasurer of this association. An accurate and complete record of all funds received and disbursed shall be kept and a written report shall be included in his report to this association in its annual session.
- (8) The conditions of employment shall be determined by the Executive Board.

#### ARTICLE IX

DISSOLUTION: Should this association cease to function, all properties and holdings shall go to the National Association of Free Will Baptists after all creditors are satisfied and indebtedness cleared.

#### ARTICLE X

AMENDMENTS: This constitution may be amended or altered at any regular session of the association by a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of members present and voting, provided proposed amendment or alteration be presented in writing to the body one (1) day in advance.

## ARTICLE XI

SPECIAL SESSIONS: Elected delegates to the last session of this association shall be retained as standing delegates for special called sessions.
