

### **PROCEEDINGS**

The 70th session of the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists met in the Sheraton Inn East, Tulsa, Oklahoma, on October 10-12, 1978.

David Archer was director of music, with Debbie Burden serving as organist and Marion Pilgrim as pianist.

Stand Up, Stand Up for Jesus," was the opening hymn. Jerry Pilgrim, assistant moderator and presiding officer for the service, led in prayer.

The choir from the First Church, Poteau, presented special music. The choir sang "My Anchor Holds," "Amazing Grace," and "It Is Well-With My Soul.

Tis So Sweet to Trust in Jesus," and "I Am Thine, Oh Lord," were sung

by the congregation. The chorus "Hallelujah," was also sung.

The clerk, Waldo Young, called the association into official session. He read the theme verse, I Timothy 6:20a, and brought comments on the theme, "Total Commitment." He also led in prayer.

A trio from Locust Grove composed of Dennis and Marguerite Kern and Howard Gwartney sang "I'm Looking for Jesus," and "He Cared That Much for Me."

Number of Churches

Don Payne, president of the Tulsa Area Ministerial Alliance, was intro-

duced to bring the welcome address.

Keith Burden, pastor of the Locust Grove Church, was introduced to bring the message. Just before he preached the Watchman Quartet, composed of David Archer, Buddy Drake, Frank Giles, and Jerry Pilgrim, sang "I'm Standing on the Solid Rock," and "Jesus is the Cornerstone."

Keith Burden led in prayer, read Acts 27:21-40, and brought the message on "Total Commitment to Christ."

The message was closed with prayer.

The committees to serve during the convention were announced. Richard

Gallant, Francis Berka, Bob Ketchum, Jimmy Shepherd, and J. B. Chism were appointed as the Resolutions Committee.

The Obituary Committee was composed of Ron Carner, Terrell Holland.

and John Bullard.

Frank Giles, Leonard Pirtle, Doc Caton, Joel Kircher, and Odie Nunley were appointed to the Public Morals Committee.

Announcements were made. Jim Haas led in the closing prayer.

### THE WEDNESDAY MORNING SESSION

The Wednesday morning session opened with the congregation singing "Showers of Blessing."

Frank Giles sang a song entitled "Wonderful."

The moderator read Romans 1:14-15, and continuing the convention

theme of committment, brought comments on these verses.

The delegates names were read from the association letters. Additions and changes were allowed. A motion carried to adopt item I, of the General Board report and seat the delegates as listed.

Visitors were introduced and welcomed.

A motion carried to adopt the program leaving the time element flexible.

James Earl Raper, representing the Children's Home, Greenville, Tennessee, spoke in behalf of that home.

Item II, of the General Board Report was read. A motion carried to

adopt it.

Item III, was tabled until Thursday after the reports were given.

Item IV, was adopted.

Items 2 and 3, of the Resolution Committee report, were read. A motion carried to table these resolutions because they require a constitutional change.

Clarence Shepherd gave the report of the Executive Board. At the close of the report he gave special recognition to Rev. John H. West for many

years of service to the state association and on the Executive Board.

A recommendation, left off by oversight, was added to the Executive Board Report, recommending Muskogee as the site for the 1980 convention. A motion carried to receive the report of the Executive Board and adopt it item by item.

Item I, dealing with the balance from the delegate fee, was adopted.

Item II, recommending Lonnie DaVoult as Executive Secretary, was postponed until the election of officers.

Item III, was adopted.

A motion carried to adopt the rest of the report as information, including the recommendation to meet in Muskogee in 1980.

Allen Moore, Executive Secretary from Texas, brought greetings.

Lonnie DaVoult gave the report of the Executive Secretary, including the financial report. A motion was made and seconded to receive the report and postpone the budget items to the giving of the budget report.

The meeting was recessed for a few minutes just before the worship

service.

### WEDNESDAY MORNING WORSHIP SERVICE

The congregation sang "Onward Christian Soldiers," to open the worship service. Sam Gober led in prayer.

Charles Brazeal presided over the service. He read John 3:1-3.

Gene Jackson, pastor of the Bristow Church, was introduced to bring the message. He led in prayer, read Luke 14:25-35 as his text, then brought the message on "Total Commitment to the Church." He closed the message with prayer.

Glenn Hood led in prayer to close the service.

### WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON

The session opened with the congregation singing "Oh, How I Love Jesus," and "Tis So Sweet to Trust in Jesus."

Jim Puckett led in prayer.

Jean Wilson and Becky Reddick sang two songs, "Deep Down in My Heart," and "Down From His Glory."

E. E. Morris read Isaiah 54:1-2, and brought devotional thoughts. The

moderator led in prayer.

Rufus Coffey, Executive Secretary of the National Association, gave a report of the National Executive Department and related work.

Herman Hersey gave the report of the National Retirement and Insurance

Department.

The attention of the body was turned back to the report of the State

Executive Secretary. The report was adopted.

Ray Martin, manager, gave the report of the Free Will Baptist Book Store, with the financial report and budget. A motion carried to adopt the report:

Jim Haas was elected to the Executive Board for a 7-year term.

Keith Burden gave the report of the Sunday School Board. A motion carried to adopt the report.

Connie Cariker was elected to the Sunday School Board for a 7-year term. Harold Harrison gave the report of the National Sunday School and CTS

Department.

Malcolm Fry gave a report pertaining to the National Youth Conference. Berton Perry gave the report of the State Mission Board. David Bigger and Buddy Drake, mission workers in Ponca City and Enid, gave reports of those works. A motion carried to adopt the report.

Gene Jackson was elected as the 7-year member of the State Mission

Board.

Trymon Messer, Associate Director, gave the report of the National Home Mission Department.

Rolla Smith, General Director, gave the report of the National Foreign Missions Department.

The meeting was recessed. The closing prayer was led by Don Brewer.

### WEDNESDAY EVENING SERVICE

The West Tulsa Youth Choir and Chorale provided pre-service music. Also a chorale from the Southeast Church, Tulsa, sang two numbers.

The opening congregational song was "Jesus Saves." Jerry Dudley led in prayer.

The congregation also sung "Blessed Assurance" and "At the Cross." The choir from Hillsdale FWB College, was introduced. They sang "I Will Sing of My Redeemer," "Walk With Me," "The Hymn of Fire," and "Onward Christian Soldiers."

Bill Jones, President of Hillsdale College, and presiding officer of the service, introduced Bailey Thompson as the speaker. Just before the message the Harvesters and New Life Singers from Hillsdale sang "Love Grew Where the Blood Fell."

Bailey Thompson's subject was "Total Commitment to the Community." He read from Acts 3 and 4. He read Matthew 14:35-36, as a text. The mes-

sage was closed with prayer.

Richard Gallant presided over the receiving of the offering which was for Hillsdale College. As the offering was being received, the Harvesters and New Life Singers sang "Take My Life and Let It Be." The offering was \$1,200.00.

The benediction was prayed by Bill Jones.

### THURSDAY MORNING

The session on Thursday morning opened with the congregation singing "Amazing Grace." Henry Braisher led in prayer.

Tracy Cariker sang "My House is Full but My Field is Empty."

Howard Gage read Matthew 28:19-20, brought devotional thoughts and led in prayer.

Doyle Cox gave the report of the State CTS Board. A motion carried to

adopt the report.

Leroy Welch was elected as the 7-year member of the CTS Board.

Ray Gwartney, chairman of the board of trustees, gave the report of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College. He called on Frank Wiley to lead in prayer in behalf of Jack Richey who is undergoing an arteriogram in St. Anthony Hospital this day. Bill Jones, president of the school, shared in the report.

A motion carried to adopt the report.

Resolution I, pertaining to Hillsdale College and a revised budget, was read and considered. A motion was made and seconded to adopt the resolution. A motion to amend lost. The question was discussed. The previous question was moved. The motion carried to approve resolution I.

The meeting was recessed for the morning worship service.

### WORSHIP SERVICE

The Thursday morning worship service was opened with the congregation singing "All the Way My Savior Leads Me." Bob Thompson led in prayer.

Mike Garner sang "Rise Again."

Joe Grizzle, pastor of the First Church, Norman, was introduced as the speaker. Before he brought the message, Jerry Pilgrim sang, "I Find No Fault in Him."

Mr. Grizzle read I Peter 3:1-4, and 7, as a text. His subject was "Commitment to Companion and Children." He closed the message with prayer. Gene Bishop led in the benediction.

### THURSDAY AFTERNOON

The congregation singing "Victory in Jesus" opened the Thursday afternoon session. Charles Bigger led in prayer.

The Ministers Quartet sang. "What a Beautiful Day for the Lord to Come Again."

John H. West brought devotional thoughts from Exodus 4:1-4, and led in prayer.

A motion carried to take resolution IV from the table.

A motion carried to amend the resolution by adding after the words "Each annual sitting of the state association," the words "for the expiring five year terms and vacancies that occur on the board." The resolution was adopted as amended.

Members of the Hillsdale College Board of Trustees were elected as follows: 3-year members, Ray Gwartney and Delbert Akin; 4-year members, Jim Shepherd and Don Payne; 5-year members, Howard Gage and Frank Wiley.

Jim Puckett was elected as the 6-year member of the Sunday School Board replacing Frank Wiley.

Paul Ketteman spoke in behalf of Free Will Baptist Bible College, sharing

the report with Ronald Creech.

The budget, which is item III of the General Board report, was brought from the table and considered. A motion carried to adopt item III, part 1, of the General Board Report. Part 2 of item III, was also adopted.

Lila Faye Morgan gave the report of the Woman's Auxiliary. A motion

carried to receive this report.

Joel Kircher gave the report of the Ministers Conference. A motion car-

ried to receive the report.

Lloyd Olson, Director of the National Master's Men, gave a report. Jack Eslick gave the report of the State Master's Men. A motion carried to receive the report.

The report of the Public Morals Committee was read and approved.

The Obituary Committee reported that 163 of our members were deceased during the past year. Clarence Shepherd led in prayer in remembrance of these.

Resolution 2, was brought from the table and considered. The resolution was defeated.

Resolution 3, was brought from the table. This resolution also was defeated.

Resolution 5, was considered. A motion carried to table it indefinitely.

Members of the General Board were elected. See page 3, of the minutes

for those elected from the different district associations.

The election of officers was held. Lonnie DaVoult was elected as Executive Secretary. Odie Nunley was elected as Assistant Clerk. Jerry Dudley was elected as Clerk. Jerry Dudley resigned from the Hillsdale Board of Trustees and Waldo Young was elected to replace him there, a 1-year term. Jerry Pilgrim was elected as Assistant Moderator. James Murray was elected as Moderator.

A motion carried to give a standing vote of thanks for the officers of this

association. It was given.

A motion carried to purchase a plaque for Waldo Young honoring him for his service as clerk.

for his service as cierk.

A motion carried to give a rising vote of thanks for the Tulsa Area Ministerial Alliance for their hospitality in entertaining the state association. It was done.

After announcements were made, a motion carried to adjourn.

R. D. Hester led in the closing prayer.

### **RESOLUTION NO. 1**

Whereas, the Hillsdale budget must be revised, and Whereas, budgets are to be approved by the state association, and Whereas, the Hillsdale revised budget is not ready to be approved. Therefore, be it resolved that after the said budget is prepared in revised form, that the Executive Board, serving in place of the state association. study, consider, and approve or disapprove it. (Adopted)

### **RESOLUTION NO. 2**

Whereas, every association in the state either sponsors a youth camp or is within reach of a youth camp, and

Whereas, it has come to the place that pastors and churches must choose to either support the state camp or their district camp, and

Whereas, this situation has lowered the attendance in both district and state camps, putting them in competition with each other.

Therefore, be it resolved that we instruct the state CTS board to no longer

plan and sponsor a state camp.

(Note: This would necessitate dropping a sentence from the constitution, page 61, of the 1977 minutes, "This board shall plan, coordinate and conduct statewide youth camps or camp.") (Defeated)

### RESOLUTION NO.3

Be it resolved that Article VI of the Constitution, entitled "Officers," page 59 of the 1977 minutes, be amended to read as follows:

OFFICERS: The officers of this State Association shall consist of a moderator, assistant moderator, clerk, assistant clerk, and an executive secretary who shall also serve as treasurer, each of whom shall be elected at the close of each regular session, except the executive secretary who shall be elected every two years.

In the event of a vacancy occurring during the course of the year, the General Board of the State Association will meet in a called meeting to elect an Executive Secretary for the remainder of that term.

NOTE: This would provide for the election of the Executive Secretary just as we elect other officers, except for two years. It would do away with the Executive Board recommending a person.

The provision of the vacancy being filled by the General Board would in-

volve a more representative body of the state.

It might involve a change in the constitution like inserting a statement under General Board stating, "This board shall also elect the Executive Secretary when a vacancy shall occur between sessions of the state association, being called into special session by the moderator and clerk of the association. (Defeated)

### **RESOLUTION NO. 4**

Whereas, there has been a lack of continuity in membership on the Board of Trustees of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, and

Whereas, the terms of office of the other standing boards of the state association are seven (7) years as opposing three (3) years on the Hillsdale College Board,

Therefore, be it resolved that the articles of incorporation of Hillsdale Free

Will Baptist College be amended to read as follows:

"The general control of this corporation shall be vested in a Board of Trustees consisting of 16 members, 10 of which shall be elected by the delegates to the annual Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists—each of which shall serve for a term of 5 years, and until his successor is elected and qualified. Two members shall be elected at each annual sitting of the State Association for the expiring five-year term and vacancies that occur on the board. One member each shall be elected by the delegates to the annual meeting of the state association of Free Will Baptists of the states of Arkansas, Colorado, Kansas, Missouri, New Mexico, and Texas, each of which serve for a term designated by the states they represent. (Adopted)

### **RESOLUTION NO. 5**

Be it resolved that the association authorize the State Mission Board to work in a joint project with the National Home Mission Board to establish a church in Omaha, Nebraska, or some other area outside of Oklahoma using CEP funds to underwrite the program. (Defeated)

### **PUBLIC MORALS COMMITTEE REPORT**

 We would like to make an addition to the 1977 minutes on page 12, of Public Morals Committee Report.

We would like to make an amendment to No. 8, by placing a comma

instead of the period, and adding the following:

"... and that we encourage each pastor to make it known in their churches that all public school teachers know their rights according to Oklahoma state law, article 11, Section 166, which grants the right to the reading of the Holy Scriptures, and that it is lawful for a teacher, when pupils are in the classroom, acting upon his or her own authority, without express permission, direction or requirement of a superior whose authority is derived from the sovereign, to recite or cause to be recited, a prayer and/or read or cause to be read, passages from the Holy Scriptures."

II. We recommend that we adopt the National Association stand against ERA, educating our people on the total family concept of God through the scriptures, and teaching that man's rights are to be recognized only

in the light of God's Word.

III. We recommend that preachers take heed unto themselves according to I Timothy 4:6; and be careful to guard the character of the ministry in relation to the responsibility of personal debts and finances.

### THE REPORT OF THE GENERAL BOARD

The General Board of the Oklahoma State Association met October 9, 1978, in Tulsa, Oklahoma. As a result of this meeting we offer the following items for your consideration.

I. We received letters from 23 district associations holding membership in this body. We recommend that these letters be received and the

### STATE EXECUTIVE BOARD REPORT

The State Executive Board met three times during the past year.

The business discussed in these meetings concerned primarily the work of State Office and that of the Oklahoma Free Will Baptist Book and Bible

Supply.

Motion carried to recommend to the State that the balance of \$3,412.09 left in the State Convention Expense as of June 30, 1978, be given to Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College for the use on a public address system or to upgrade the present one.

The State Executive Board recommends by vote of acclamation of the Board the nomination for election of Reverend Lonnie DaVoult as Execu-

tive Secretary.

Motion carried to recommend adoption of a cooperative budget for 1979-80 of \$160,000.

Motion carried to give Reverend John West proper recognition for serving several terms over a period of 40 years on the Executive Board.

Motion carried that the State Executive Secretary be allowed to purchase necessary audio-visual equipment for use in promotion, as proposed.

Motion carried that the State Office loan the Bookstore \$8,277.88 of the

\$15,277.88 long term loan due and this amount be applied to the loan with the Bookstore paying back the State Office the amount at \$300 per month. interest free, when balance of the note for \$7,000.00 made at Capitol Hill State, Bank is paid off by the Bookstore. The interest is 9% for 2 years.

The Executive Board voted on a recommendation for the purchase of a NCR Electronic cash register which would also do part of the posting

operation for the bookstore.

Other items concerning the adoption of the Bookstore and State Office budget, that the State Office share in utility expense monthly, the purchase of a time clock for the bookstore and that the manager regulate hours of employees as necessary were all items of business passed.

### REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE SECRETARY TO THE OKLAHOMA STATE ASSOCIATION OF FREE WILL BAPTISTS

Oklahoma Free Will Baptist have experienced their greatest year of growth in all departments. We have had an above average increase in our giving which simply means we have beaten the inflationary rate. There is evidence of concern among all of our people in the total program than has ever been manifested before. I am glad to be a part of it and count it an

honor to be your representative in all of the state affairs.

Here is a resume of my activities for the associational year 1977-78. I represented you at the National Association of Free Will Baptist in Detroit, Michigan and the National Association of Evangelicals. I attended the Free Will Baptist Leadership Convention in Nashville, Tennessee and have logged 26,647 miles to these out of town meetings: 33 church services, 12 special services, 4 revivals, 19 youth camps, 8 ministerial meetings, 28 quarterly meetings and 32 board meetings.

At the National Convention in Kansas City this year there was a plea given by the National Historical Commission for minutes of all State and District Associations. If you have ANY minutes of any quarterly meetings, associations or state please send them to my office that I may assimilate and preserve them. ### STATE ASSOCIATION OF FREE WILL BAPTISTS NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS JUNE 30, 1978

(1) SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The State Association of Free Will Baptists is a non-profit organization designed to provide central leadership and representation for the

Free Will Baptists of Oklahoma and to handle certain receipts and disbursements of the Free Will Baptist Church. The Association uses the fund method of accounting, whereby the fund balance represents the equity the Association has in its assets. This accounting method is generally accepted among non-profit organizations as the most feasible way of reflecting their financial activity and position.

The Association's property and equipment is depreciated on the

straight-line basis using the following estimated useful lives:

Furniture, fixtures and equipment

acquired subsequent to July 1, 1972 8 years Furniture, fixtures and equipment acquired prior to July 1, 1972 3 years

(2) MORTGAGE RECEIVABLE

The executive residence was sold on May 30, 1974 for \$20,500. The buyer assumed the mortgage on the property and gave the Association a second mortgage on the property for \$10,300. Payments were to begin on July 1, 1974. The rate of interest is 8% and the mortgage is for thirty years. The Association does not have an amortization schedule on this loan and we were unable to verify the exact balance on this mortgage receivable.

(3) COOPERATIVE CONTRIBUTIONS

The Executive Office of the State Association was allocated 22% in 1978 and 22% in 1977 of cooperative contributions for the financing of its operations for the fiscal year.

### STATE MISSION BOARD REPORT

The Department of Church Extension, Missions, and Evangelism has made several significant steps in obeying the commission of the Lord Jesus Christ "to go into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature."

We are glad to report that our present C.E.P. projects are going well. Each board meeting has brought glowing reports of people being saved and other victories won in both Enid and Ponca City. Ponca City has completed its building program this past year. We now have two thriving churches in Ponca City and Enid which is a tribute to the efforts of Free Will Baptist

people of Oklahoma.

Over the past year the board has met six times and held one telephone conference in an effort to carry on the work of missions in the state. Members of the board have made investigative trips to at least six different locations trying to determine where we will plant our next C.E.P. project. We feel led of the Lord to announce that our next venture will be launched in the Lawton area. Lawton is a city of approximately 87,000 people and affords an excellent opportunity to begin a new church. Many problems, however, have to be overcome before this can be a reality.

In recent months the First Free Will Baptist Church of Bartlesville closed its doors and, without strings attached, deeded its property to the mission board. Poor location, no doubt, contributed to its demise. The board felt that Free Will Baptists need a witness in that thriving northeast Oklahoma city so it voted to sell the property and take the money and buy some land in a new location with the hope of beginning a work there in the not too distant future. Please pray for this city and the work that will some day be

established there.

It is not necessary to inform you that we are falling behind in planting churches in the thriving areas of our state. When C.E.P. was launched, it was the goal of the board to establish at least one new church each year somewhere in the state. Such a lofty goal is certainly within the scope of possibility for the people of Oklahoma. However, due to the lack of finances and qualified available personnel, we have had to slow our thrust to keep pace with the response of our people.

There are many cities and towns in Oklahoma which do not have a Free Will Baptist Church. We would like to offer the following suggestions that

more might be done in our state for the cause of missions:

Pray for the work of the board and the missionaries who are on location in our state. Pray also for a revival among our people.

2. See that your church does something for C.E.P. and does it regularly. You can do this by putting us in your budget, designating vacation Bible school offerings, having C.E.P. Sundays, opening your church to our missionary appointees for a service, giving emphasis to the work in your regular church services, etc.

3. Pray that our present projects which are receiving funds will become

self-supporting in the coming year.

- 4. Pray for our next C.E.P. church: Lawton, Many decisions have to be made before a church there becomes a reality. A missionary will have to be selected, land will have to be purchased, etc.
- 5. Please be responsive to the board's efforts to raise money for land and other special projects. As you know, land is very high in these cities, and it is next to impossible for a struggling mission church to go to a new city and purchase a choice piece of property. Please do what you can when an appeal comes from the board to help in these areas.

6. Pray that our budget for the new year will be met.

The needs of our day demand the best of all of us. God never gives a man or a church a job that cannot be done with His help. The cause of missions in our state is overwhelming for one man or one church, but with all of us doing our part the success of our missionary effort becomes a reality.

### HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE BOARD OF TRUSTEES REPORT TO THE OKLAHOMA STATE ASSOCIATION

The beginning of the 1977-78 year was marked by the naming of campus buildings. The A-building became the John H. West Administration Building. The Oller Annex, Yandell Hall, Barnard Hall, Willey Hall, Friends Hall, Palmer Hall and Randell now identify all but one of the buildings on campus.

Enrollment was down at the beginning of the year as compared with the previous fall. However, the spring semester saw enrollment the same as the previous spring. To remedy this, a concentrated effort was made to gain the names and addresses of potential students and to encourage each student to send in an early application. This resulted in a record number of applications.

Construction continued throughout the year on the 16 apartment complex. Occupied in the summer of 1978, the total cost has been nearly \$280,000. This figures out to be approximately \$35 per sq. ft. This includes approximately \$10,000 for the water line across campus. It also includes gravel and dirt work, plus an electric stove and an individual AC/heater in each unit.

The changeover to Moore's sewer system was also completed during the year. The lagoons have been drained and partially filled. Final landscaping awaits the time when money is available.

During the year, three members of the administration and faculty resigned. Reverend Jim Amick was replaced by Reverend Bailey Thompson. Mr. Estil Oliver and Reverend O. T. Dixon resigned but were not replaced. Part-time teachers are carrying their teaching load and other responsibilities were shared by present employees.

Several churches adopted goals during the year and this resulted in a record gift income from January to June. Plans call for this to be continued through the coming year.

Special thanks to all those who contributed their time, energy and creativity in helping us complete the dormitory complex. They have made a valuable contribution to that which Hillsdale stands for: Integrity in the midst of deceit; love and concern in the midst of apathy and indifference; excellence in the midst of mediocrity. May God bless each one.

The budget submitted for approval for 1979-80 was approved by the Board before enrollment figures for the 1978-79 school year were available. In light of these figures, the budget will be revised taking into account the cuts into the 1978-79 budget.\*

The College uses the fund method of accounting, whereby an individual fund is a separate accounting entity made up of assets, liabilities, revenues, expenditures, transfers and a fund balance. This method of accounting is generally accepted among colleges and universities as the most effective means of controlling financial data.

Buildings and equipment are not depreciated by the College, which

is an acceptable procedure for a non-profit organization.

### (3) LOAN FUNDS

### OKLAHOMA STATE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY CONVENTION CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

### ARTICLE I

### NAME

### ARTICLE II

### **PURPOSE**

### ARTICLE V

### **MEETINGS**

The annual meeting shall be held each year on the day preceding the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists and at the place designated by said Association.

### **AMENDMENTS**

This constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the convention by a two-thirds vote of members present.

### **BY-LAWS**

### ARTICLE I

### **DUTIES OF OFFICERS**

Section 1, President. The president shall preside over all meetings, appoint such committees as may be needed, call the executive committee together when necessary, be ex-officio member of all committees, and serve as chairman of the executive committee, see that reports are made promptly to the national secretary and perform all duties usually pertaining to such an office.

Section 2, Vice President. The vice president shall preside in the absence of the president or by her request and otherwise assist her in the overseeing

of the work in general.

Section 3, Secretary. The secretary shall keep an accurate record of all proceedings of the convention and executive meetings, preserve all valuable papers and turn same over to her successor in office, and make an annual report to the national secretary on a form available from the WNAC office. She shall compile the districts slates of officers and addresses immediately after the convention. She shall also send a slate of state officers and addresses to the national executive secretary. She is chairman of the Credentials Committee.

The secretary shall also serve as historian keeping an historical record and submitting historical information to the national executive secretary

annually.

Section 4, Treasurer. The treasurer shall have charge of all funds belonging to this convention and shall pay out same only when authorized by the convention. The treasurer shall keep an accurate account and shall give a written report of all funds received and disbursed at each annual meeting of the convention. She shall also send an annual report to the WNAC office (executive secretary-treasurer) at least ten days before the end of the fiscal year. She shall encourage support of missions through the WNAC Gift Plan, individual giving and special offerings.

Section 5, Field Worker. The field worker shall have charge of all field work pertaining to, or necessary to, the promotion of the work of the convention and keep the national program before the district officers.

### ARTICLE II

### **ELECTIONS**

The general officers shall be nominated by a nominating committee and shall be elected by acclamation, unless there are other nominations. In case of more than one nominee for any particular office, a vote will be taken on each. All elections shall be held at the closing business session of the convention.

### ARTICLE III

### **EXPENSES**

Section 1. An appropriation of 10 cents per mile toward the expense of the general officers, when called upon to attend the executive committee meeting to plan program, secretary's expenses, phone calls, postage and stationery for officers will be paid by the convention. All field promotional work is subject to the state executive committee, who should approve all work done by state officers in the interest of state work, as well as expenses of the same.

Section 2. An amount of \$50.00 shall be paid on the expense of the state president to attend WNAC.

### ARTICLE IV

### COMMITTEES

Section 1. Executive Committee—The executive committee shall be composed of the five officers and three members elected by the convention. Five of these shall compose a quorum. They shall hold meetings for the transaction of business as often as necessary. It shall be the duty of the executive committee to maintain an overseeing of the work at large. They shall act for the convention when necessary. They shall meet with district presidents the night preceding the state auxiliary convention.

Section 2. Resolutions Committee—A resolutions committee of five

members shall be appointed by the president as needed.

Section 3. Nominating Committee—The nominating committee shall be composed of at least one member from each district convention. Nominations shall be submitted by district with their annual report. These elected by the body at the annual meeting.

Section 4. Credentials Committee—The secretary shall be chairman of the credentials committee, and other members may be appointed by the president. The treasurer shall be a standing member of this committee.

Section 5. Finance Committee—The finance committee shall be appointed by the president. This committee audits the financial records of the year and reports on same to the convention.

Section 6. Student Loan Committee—State Auxiliary President and 2 elected members to serve 2 years each. They shall be elected on alternate years.

Section 7. Registration committee shall be provided by the district convention which is host to state convention.

### ARTICLE V

### FEES AND REPORTS

Active members shall pay dues of \$1.50 per year. With 25 cents remaining in the district. \$1.25 to be forwarded to state where 25 cents shall be retained, and \$1.00 forwarded to WNAC as required for membership fees. It shall be the duty of each body directly affiliated with the State Auxiliary Convention to send a report to every annual session.

### ARTICLE VI

### **AMENDMENTS**

These by-laws may be amended by a two-thirds vote of members present at regular meeting of the state auxiliary convention.

### ARTICLE VII

### GIFTS

The desired plans for giving in the Woman's Auxiliary are those adopted by WNAC as follows:

1. Mission offerings following each special season of prayer

Co-Laborer offering (monthly or quarterly designated to WNAC General Fund)

3. WNAC Emphasis Month in August or other time more convenient to help in support of WNAC General Fund

4. Memorial Student Loan Fund (special program and offering in September to assist worthy and needy students at FWBBC in Nashville)

ber to assist worthy and needy students at FWBBC in Nashville)
5. Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College Student Loan Fund. (Special program and offering in September to assist worthy and needy students at Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College)

6. Tithes—Pay tithes on all undesignated money received

7. All offerings are to be forwarded through regular channels

### ARTICLE VIII

### WNAC DELEGATE

Each district convention shall submit one nomination for a State delegate to WNAC with their annual report. This nomination (along with others as needed to make up 15 delegates to WNAC) shall be elected by the body at the annual meeting. It shall be the duty of delegates elected to notify president if they cannot attend WNAC. President shall appoint delegates as needed in absence of regular elected delegates.

### THE FREE WILL BAPTIST MASTER'S MEN State of Oklahoma CONSTITUTION

### **PREAMBLE**

The purpose of the Free Will Baptist Master's Men, state of Oklahoma is to provide a means of Christian fellowship and to deepen the spiritual lives of the laymen of the local church. Also, to provide a means of developing the abilities and talents of the laymen, and to promote the cause of Christ through a complete, "total church program," as prescribed by Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists.

## ARTICLE I

The name of this organization shall be known as the Free Will Baptist Master's Men, State of Oklahoma.

## ARTICLE II MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. The membership of this organization shall be composed of the district associations of Master's Men, and any local chapters where there is only one chapter in the district, within the state of Oklahoma.

Section 2. Every member in good standing of an affiliated district association of Master's Men, or any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district, is entitled to the full benefits of membership.

Section 3. Each district association, or any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district, shall submit an annual, written report to this body, (as a matter of information).

### ARTICLE III OFFICERS

The officers of this organization shall consist of a president, vice-president and a secretary-treasurer.

The officers of this organization shall be elected annually and may suc-

ceed themselves, at this level.

# ARTICLE IV EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The executive committee shall consist of the elected officers of this organization and they shall serve as the program committee for each annual convention.

Section 2. Ex-officio members of the executive committee shall be the presidents of the district associations of Master's Men, presidents of any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district, and the state executive secretary of the State Association of Free Will Baptists.

### ARTICLE V MEETINGS

This organization shall meet annually at 7:30 P.M. on the Monday night before the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists convenes.

### ARTICLE VI AMENDMENTS

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of any regular meeting.

## BY-LAWS VOTING RIGHTS

Section 1. Every member of each affiliated district association, or any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district, is eligible to vote on all questions and matters that might come before the Free Will Baptist Master's Men, State of Oklahoma.

### COMMITTEES

Section 2. The executive committee shall transact all routine business and shall act for the organization in the interim between meetings.

Section 3. The executive committee shall meet at the call of the president. Section 4. A nominating committee, for the annual election of officers, shall be composed of the presidents of each district association, and the president of any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district.

Section 5. The president shall appoint all other committees, subject to the approval of the body.

### **FINANCE**

Section 6. This organization shall be financed on the basis of offerings, dues and assessments.

### **OUORUM**

Section 7. One-tenth of the members of this organization shall constitute a quorum at any regular meeting.

### AMENDMENTS

Section 8. These by-laws may be amended at any regular meeting by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

# HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE, INC. BY-LAWS BOARD OF TRUSTEES

### SECTION I

The Board of Trustees of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc., an Oklahoma corporation, shall be composed of fifteen members, elected as provided in the Articles of Incorporation of said College, as amended:

ARTICLE A—OFFICERS: The officers of the board of Trustees shall be a Chairman, an Assistant Chairman, and a Secretary, each of whom shall be elected by the Board for a term of one year. They shall continue in office until their successors have been chosen:

Item 1—CHAIRMAN: The chairman of the Board of Trustees or his assistant shall preside at all meetings of the Board. He shall be an ex-officio member of the Executive Committee.

Item 2—SECRETARY: The Secretary shall record and preserve minutes of all meetings and acts of the Board of Trustees and countersign all deeds, conveyances, and other papers authorized by the Board. He shall have authority to call special meetings of the Trustees of the College upon the written request of two-thirds of the members of the Board; he shall mail notice of said meeting to the trustees ten (10) days in advance.

Item 3—EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE: The Executive Committee shall consist of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, the Vice-Chairman of the Board, the Secretary of the Board. The Executive Committee shall have authority to consider and act upon all questions affecting the College which may be brought before it between the stated meetings of the Board, or a quorum of the Board fails to attend a called or regular meeting. It shall transact such business as may be committed to it by the Board and shall act for the College on such matters as it may submit to it. The Committee shall meet at the call of the Chairman or the President of the College.

ARTICLE B—MEETINGS: The Board of Trustees shall meet each year at a time and place agreed upon by the Board. It shall, also, hold special meetings whenever called in accordance with the By-Laws of the Board. Such special meetings may be called by either the chairman of the Board, or the President of the College.

ARTICLE C—QUORUM: A majority of the members or the Board of Trustees of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc. in attendance at any called or regular meeting, written notice of which has been mailed by the

Secretary to each trustee, shall constitute a quorum. No proxy votes shall be permitted. No ex-officio member shall be entitled to vote at meetings of the Board of Trustees.

ARTICLE D—ELECTIONS: In all elections held by the Board of Trustees each member present except ex-officio members shall be entitled to one vote, and the result shall be determined by a majority of the votes cast. Due notice of any election must be personal notice to the members or a day on the minutes of the Board not less than one week preceding the election.

### SECTION II OFFICERS OF HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE

The officers of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College shall be a President, Vice-President, Dean, and a Business Manager, each of whom shall be elected by the Board of Trustees to hold office for two years exclusive of the President whose term of office shall be indefinite. It is provided, however, that retirement of any one of the officers herein named may occur at any time upon the resignation of the officer or the request of the Board. In either case, notice shall be given six weeks before the date of the proposed

retirement unless otherwise agreed upon by the concerned parties.

ITEM ONE—PRESIDENT: The President shall be executive officer of the Board of Trustees and shall have general control of the College including its officers, teachers, students, and business. He shall render to the Board complete annual reports and to its chairman, Executive Committee or other committees such information as may be deemed essential to a thorough knowledge of the operation of the College and its promotion. He shall be a member of the Board of Trustees ex-officio and the Executive Committee ex-officio and shall have the rights and privileges of a member of the Board except voting. The President shall execute all documents, instruments, and conveyances on behalf of the College. Duties of the president and working relationship shall be further detailed in a format approved by the Board of Trustees.

ITEM TWO—VICE PRESIDENT: The Vice-President shall perform all

the duties of the President in the absence of the latter.

ITEM THREE—DEAN: The Academic Dean of the College shall, under the President, fix the hours of recitation, govern, control, and regulate the conduct of the students, have general oversight of curriculum, student's records, and such other internal details and administrative duties as may be

delegated to him by the President of the College.

accurate record of all accounts of the College and shall receive and expend as directed by the Board of Trustees and President, all money for the expenses of the institution. He shall make an annual report to the Board and furnish the Executive Committee with such information pertaining to his office as may be requested. He shall provide bond in whatever amount the Board may require. Until such times as the Board of Trustees may deem different the Treasurer's office shall be contained within the Business Manager's Office. The Business Manager may at the direction of the administration designate this duty to a subordinate officer. The Business Manager shall have general supervision of the financial business of the College, and shall, at the direction of the President, be responsible for the upkeep of all the physical facilities and premises of the College. His detailed duties are directed in a format approved by the Board of Trustees.

### SECTION III FACULTY

The faculty shall consist of the President, the Dean, and all teachers of

Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College. Instructors and assistant teachers shall have the privilege of sitting with the faculty in stated meetings but shall

not have the right of voting.

It shall be the policy of the College to employ on its faculty those who are members of Free Will Baptist churches that are affiliated with the National Association. Emergencies, however arising from the resignation, illness, death, or approved leaves of absence of faculty members may be relieved by the temporary employment of instructors who are affiliated with any evangelical denomination. Part-time or short-term instructors, deemed essential to the successful prosecution of a consistent education program, may be employed at the discretion of the President without respect of denominational affiliation.

The faculty, under the authority and jurisdiction of the President, shall have general charge of instruction, attendance of students, examinations, administration of curriculum, discipline, and all matters involving the spiritual, physical, and social welfare of the College. The faculty shall be

hired upon recommendation of the President.

In the selection of the faculty qualitative factors shall be kept in mind. All faculty members shall be urged to pursue graduate programs in their respective fields. Except in special cases no faculty member will be required to teach courses outside of his field.

### SECTION IV ACADEMIC COUNCIL

The Academic Council shall consist of the President, the Dean and the heads of the departments of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College: It shall determine the curriculum and academic policy of the College, prescribe requirements for admission, certificates, diplomas, and degrees, and supervise the courses of instruction offered by the various departments of the College.

### SECTION V CONTRACTS

The Board of Trustees shall establish the College policy involving the execution of contracts, deeds of conveyance, the determination of salaries, and employment of all officers. representatives, faculty members and essential domestic and maintenance employees. The President of the College shall negotiate agreements, executive contracts, employ representatives, and supply vacancies incurred by the termination of contracts, resignations, or death of any essential employees. All contracts for building construction shall be let only to persons or corporations posting a valid performance bond and recording the same in the Office of the County Clerk of Cleveland County, Oklahoma.

### SECTION VI ADVISORY COUNCIL

An advisory council shall be formed which is to be composed of interested, qualified persons in the various fields which will be of value in building and maintaining a strong academic program to carry out the educational program stated in the charter.

### SECTION VII

These By-Laws may be amended by a favorable vote of two-thirds of the qualified members of the Board of Trustees of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College at any meeting of the Board, provided that the proposed amend-

ment has been submitted in writing to each Trustee one month in advance. This change to be subject to the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists.

### SECTION VIII ADMINISTRATIVE FUNCTIONS

The President of the Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College shall be elected by the Board of Trustees, and he shall act for and on behalf of the Board in the conduct and management of the institution. He shall also be a member of the Board of Trustees ex-officio and of the Executive committee, exofficio, and his duties, powers and term of office shall be prescribed in the by-laws of the College and a format approved by the Board of Trustees.

# ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF THE HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE, INC.

Know all men by these presents, that, we whose names are hereunto subscribed, do hereby associate ourselves together for the purpose of forming a corporation under the provisions of the corporation laws of the State of Oklahoma, and for that purpose state:

### ARTICLE ONE

The name of this corporation shall be HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE, INC.

### ARTICLE TWO

The purpose of this corporation shall be the creation, establishment and maintenance of a college and institution of higher learning devoted to the promotion and impartation of higher learning, Christian education and such other education, instruction, learning, training and research as may be deemed essential for the cause of Christ and to that end prescribe courses of study and grant degrees. The doctrinal and theological position of this institution shall be that of the sponsoring denomination, Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists and the treatise of the National Association of Free Will Baptist as endorsed by the state body, and in connection therewith, in accordance with the stipulation of the Constitution and Byaws of the State Association of Free Will Baptists, Inc.

(a.) To prescribe courses of study for both resident and correspondence students, which shall include general education in the arts, Christian Ministries of Service and Biblical studies for wisdom; said courses to be taught in both a Junior College Division and a Bible College Division, and to award degrees, either graduate or post-graduate, to those persons satisfactorily completing the prescribed couses of study and to grant such other literary honors, including honorary degrees, as shall be deemed advisable.

(b.) To charge and collect tuition as determined by the Board of Trus-

tees and to create scholarships.

(c.) To employ professors, instructors and other subordinate employees as may be necessary for the proper conduct of the college under the direction and control of the President of the College, with the advice and consent of the majority of the Board of Trustees.

(d.) To institute and carry on missions and commissions for missionary

purposes and investigations.

(e.) To publish and distribute such pamphlets, literature or books as may be required in the conduct of such work and the general promotion of the College.

(f.) To sue and be sued in its corporate name and to enter into contracts

of every type and nature.

(g.) To solicit support, receive, collect, hold and receive by gift or bequest personal property in any amount, money or other thing of value; to purchase real estate, to receive real estate that may be given, or devised to the college for achieving the legitimate ends of the college and to sell or mortgage the same as the need arises.

(h.) To borrow money in payment of property for erecting buildings and making improvements and for any other purpose germane to the ob-

jecitves and purposes of the college.

(i.) To issue notes, bonds, debentures and other evidences of indebtedness and execute mortgages, liens and other incumbrances upon the property of the corporation, real or otherwise, to secure the payment of any such evidences of indebtedness.

(i.) To transact any and all business connected with said College as may

be necessary to achieve the purposes of said College.

(k.) To obtain under Internal Revenue Laws of the United States and of the Revenue Laws of the State of Oklahoma exemption from income property and other forms of taxation.

### ARTICLE THREE

The location of this corporation shall be in Moore, Oklahoma.

### ARTICLE FOUR

The duration of this corporation shall be perpetual.

### ARTICLE FIVE

The general control of this corporation shall be vested in a Board of Trustees consisting of 16 members, 10 of which shall be elected by the delegates to the annual Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists—each of which shall serve for a term of 5 years, and until his successor is elected and qualified. Two members shall be elected at each annual sitting of the State Association for the expiring five year term and vacancies that occur on the board. One member each shall be elected by the delegates to the annual meeting of the State Association of Free Will Baptists of the states of Arkansas, Colorado, Kansas, Missouri, New Mexico, and Texas, each of which serve for a term designated by the states they represent.

### ARTICLE SIX

An executive committee consisting of the Chairman, Vice Chairman, and Secretary of the Board of Trustees shall possess all powers of the Board of Trustees between the stated meetings of the Board of Trustees.

#### ARTICLE SEVEN

All contracts for building construction shall be let only to persons or corporations posting a valid performance bond and recording the same in the office of the County Clerk of Cleveland County, Oklahoma.

### SECTION IX AMENDMENTS

This charter may be hereafter amended subject to the provisions contained herein and the laws of the State of Oklahoma. It is provided, however, that the Trustees of the College shall not propose or apply for any amendment which has not been previously authorized by an act of the Oklahoma State Association.

### CONSTITUTION OF MINISTER'S CONFERENCE

### ARTICLE 1

The Minister's Conference shall be called the Oklahoma State Free Will Baptist Minister's Conference, and shall be composed of Ordained Free Will Baptist Ministers who are regular members of some Orthodox Free Will Baptist church in the State of Oklahoma who have paid their \$1.00 dues.

### ARTICLE 2

The officers for this conference shall be President, Vice-President, and Clerk Treasurer, who shall be elected annually.

### ARTICLE 3

This conference shall have the power to discipline its members.

### ARTICLE 4

Members of this organization shall be all ordained ministers who participate in the benefits and activities of this body, and associate members who become members by payment of the \$1.00 annual dues.

### ARTICLE 5

This conference shall meet Semi-Annually.

### ARTICLE 6

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any regular session.

### BY-LAWS OF MINISTER'S CONFERENCE

### ARTICLE 1

The clerk or assistant clerk, or in their absence the senior minister in years shall call the ministers into conference. If a quorum is present the President or in his absence the Vice-President shall moderate the meeting. If neither of these are present, the senior minister in years shall be in charge.

ARTICLE 2

It shall be the duty of the clerk to enroll the ministers of the conference. Ministers shall present themselves with proper evidence of their rights to seats therein, and those enrolled by the clerk shall compose the conference. In case of questionable representation the case under question shall be referred to the Credential Committee.

ARTICLE 3

It shall be the duty of each minister belonging to this conference, to be active in pastoral or evangelistic services (disabled or retired ministers excepted). Any minister belonging to this conference shall report in each session in person or by letter, and failing to do so for two successive sessions shall be subject to discipline.

ARTICLE 4

Each conference shall be opened by reading a portion of God's word and prayer, and each session shall be closed with prayer.

ARTICLE 5

By a two-thirds vote of the members present ruling of the President may be overruled.

ARTICLE 6

This conference shall sit with open doors, except when it shall go into a committee as a whole.

ARTICLE 7

No member shall absent himself from the conference during its meeting without permission from the President.

ARTICLE 8

No person shall be allowed to nominate more than one member of a committee, unless person nominated is not elected.

ARTICLE 9

The President shall not allow discussion when not carried on in a Christian Spirit, or when he thinks it will cause discord.

ARTICLE 10

Anyone desiring to speak shall rise and address the President by the appelation "Brother President," but shall not speak further until recognized.

ARTICLE 11

No member of this conference shall be allowed to speak more than five minutes, nor twice on the same subject without permission from the President.

ARTICLE 12

These By-Laws may be altered or amended at any regular or adjourned session of this conference by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

ARTICLES OF FAITH OF STATE ASSOCIATION

1. THE BIBLE—The Scriptures of the Old and New Testament were given by the inspiration of God, and are our infallible rules of faith and practice.

- 2. GOD—There is one living and true God, revealed in nature as the Creator, Preserver and Righteous Governor of the Universe, and in the Scriptures as the Father, Son and Holy Ghost, yet as one God, infinitely wise and good, whom all intelligent creatures are supremely to love, adore and obey.
- 3. CHRIST—Christ is God manifest in the flesh: in His divine nature truly God, in His human nature truly man. The mediator between God and man, once crucified. He is now risen and glorified is our ever-present Saviour and Lord.
- 4. THE HOLY SPIRIT—The Scriptures assigns to the Holy Spirit all the attributes of God. He is the Reprover, Comforter, Guide and Sanctifier of all men.
- 5. THE GOVERNMENT OF GOD—God exercises a wise and benevolent providence over all beings and all things by maintaining the constitution and laws of nature. He also performs special acts of Grace, not otherwise provided for as highest welfare of man requires.
- 6. THE SINFULNESS OF MAN—Man was created innocent, but by disobedience fell into a state of sin and condemnation. His posterity, therefore inherited a fallen nature of such tendencies that all who come to years of accountability, sin and become guilty before God.
- 7. THE WORK OF CHRIST—The Son of God, by His incarnation, life, suffering, death, and resurrection effected for all a redemption from sin that is full and free and is the ground of salvation by faith.
- 8. THE WORK OF SALVATION—The conditions of salvation are:
  1. Repentance or sincere sorrow for sin and the hearty renunciations of it.
  2. Faith or the unreserved committal of one's self to Christ as Saviour and Lord, with purpose to love and obey Him in all things. In the exercise of saving faith the soul is renewed by the Holy Spirit; freed from the dominion of sin and becomes a child of God. 3. Continuance in faith and obedience until death.
- 9. ELECTION—God determined from the beginning to save all who should comply with the conditions of salvation. Hence by faith in Christ, men become His elect.
- 10. FREEDOM OF WILL—The Human will is free and self controlled, having power to yield to the influence of the truth and the Spirit and live, or to resist them and perish.
- 11. SALVATION FREE—God desires the salvation of all, the Gospel invites all, the Holy Spirit strives with all, and whosoever will may come and take of the water of life freely.
- 12. PERSEVERENCE—All believers in Christ, who through grace persevere in holiness to the end of life, have the promise of eternal salvation.
- 13. BACKSLIDING AND APOSTASY—A person who has been regenerated or born again and is living in unconfessed, unforgiven sin, is rebellious to the principles of the Kingdom of God and His righteousness, and therefore is a backslider in a lost condition who must repent and be restored to the right relationship with God or be eternally lost.

We recognize, according to Hebrews 6:4-6, that it is possible for a person to get in the condition that he could never return to Christ. This, we believe, is Apostasy; However, we also recognize that a regenerate person can fall into sin, be in a lost condition and still not be an Apostate. This person, through repentance, can be reconciled to God.

- 14. GOSPEL ORDINANCES—Baptism, or the immersion of believers in water, and the Lord's Supper, are ordinances to be perpetuated under the Gospel: Feet Washing, an ordinance teaching humility, of universal obligation, and to be administered to all true believers.
- 15. TITHING—God commanded tithes and offerings in the Old Testament: Jesus Christ endorsed in the Gospel (Matt. 23:23), and the Apostle Paul said, "Upon the first day of the week let every one of you lay by him in store as God hath prospered him." I Cor. 16:2.
- 16. THE CHRISTIAN SABBATH—The divine law requires that one day in seven be set apart from the secular employment and amusements for rest, worship, holy works and activities, and for personal communion with God.
- 17. RESURRECTION, JUDGMENT, AND FINAL RETRIBUTION—The Scriptures teach the resurrection of all men at the last day. They that have done good will come forth to the resurrection of life, and they that have done evil unto the resurrection of damnation: then the wicked shall "Go away into eternal punishment but the righteous into eternal life."

### RULES OF ORDER

1: At every sitting of the Association, business shall be opened and concluded by prayer by the Moderator or whomever he may request.

2. Ministers and deacons present are invited to seats, allowed to take

part in debates on all subjects, and to vote.

3. Those who speak shall rise and address the Moderator. Personal reflections shall be avoided in all debates.

4. No motion may be discussed until made and seconded.

- 5. When a motion has been made and seconded, and a member opposes its discussion, the Moderator shall put the question, "Shall it be discussed?" If negative, the question shall not be discussed.
- 6. If any proposition or motion under debate contains two or more points, it shall be divided at the request of any member, and the vote taken separately.

7. Motions made and lost shall not be recorded.

8. No one shall speak more than twice on the same subject without special leave of the Moderator.

9. All questions shall be decided by a majority vote of all Members

present.

### BY-LAWS OF STATE ASSOCIATION

1. The Clerk or assistant clerk, or in their absence, the senior minister in years shall call the Association into conference, and if a quorum is present the moderator, or in his absence, the assistant moderator shall take charge; and if neither of them is present the senior minister in years shall act as Moderator.

2. It shall be the duty of the clerk to enroll the delegates to the Association, who shall present themselves with proper evidence of their rights to seats therein, and those enrolled by the clerk shall compose the Association.

3. It shall be the duty of every District belonging to this Association to send a letter to every annual session of this Association reporting in the same spiritual condition, benevolent work, and its statistics. Any District belonging to this Association, which shall fail to report itself for two successive sessions, may be dismissed from the Association by a two thirds vote of all members present.

4. Each meeting shall be opened by reading a portion of the Bible and with prayer, and shall be closed with prayer.

5. By a two-thirds vote of members present, a ruling of the moderator

can be overruled.

- 6. This Association may correspond by messenger or otherwise with other religious bodies.
- 7. This Association shall sit with open doors except when it shall go into a committe of the whole.

8. Any person not a member of this Association may be allowed to take part in its discussions by obtaining permission from the moderator.

- 9. It shall be the duty of all the Association to be present at the time appointed for each meeting, and anyone wishing to retire shall first obtain leave of the moderator.
- 10. No person shall be allowed to nominate more than one member of any committee, provided the person nominated be elected.

11. The moderator shall not allow discussions when not carried on in a Christian spirit or when he thinks it will cause discord or division.

12. Anyone desiring to speak shall rise to his feet and address the moderator by the appelation "Brother Moderator," but shall not speak further until recognized by the moderator.

13. No member of this association shall be allowed to speak more than ten minutes nor twice on the same subject without permission from the

moderator.

14. These By-Laws may be altered or amended at any regular or adjourned session of this Association by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

### CONSTITUTION OF STATE ASSOCIATION

PREAMBLE: From long experience, we the members of the Free Will Baptist denomination, being regularly baptized upon a profession of our faith in Jesus Christ, and realizing the necessity of a bond of union and fellowship among us as a church; and to preserve and maintain correspondence and co-ordination with us, do therefore ordain this Constitution for our better denomination government.

### ARTICLE I

NAME: This organization shall be known as the OKLAHOMA STATE ASSOCIATION OF FREE WILL BAPTISTS.

### ARTICLE II

PURPOSE: The object and purpose of this organization shall be to unify the work of the various bodies composing this State Association, and to devise and execute measures for the extension of the Kingdom of God in connection with the various bodies in the Association, or that may hereafter be represented therein.

### ARTICLE III

REPRESENTATION: Section 1. This Association shall be composed of all ordained ministers and deacons with membership in some local church which is a member of a district Association with membership in the State Association.

Section 2: Each District Association shall be entitled to a number of elected delegates equal with the number of churches composing said Association. These delegates may be recommended by the local churches and shall be endorsed by their district association.

### ARTICLE IV

FINANCE: Each Association shall contribute \$20.00 per Church for support of the Association and delegate fees.

### ARTICLE V

DISCIPLINE: This State Association shall have the right to settle any question of discipline, doctrine or practices that may properly come before it from any of the bodies composing said organization; furthermore, if there be any question of discipline, doctrine or practices on the part of an affiliated association, delegates of that association-shall not be seated until these questions have been settled to the satisfaction of the General Board.

Section 2: Decisions of the General Board may be appealed in this manner. All appeals shall come before the State Association when sitting

in a committee as a whole

### ARTICLE VI

OFFICERS: A. The officers of the State Association shall consist of a Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, and an Executive Secretary. Each of these shall be elected at the close of each regular session

except the Executive Secretary.

B. (1) The Executive Secretary shall be elected for a two year tenure. It shall be the responsibility of the Executive Board to seek out a prospective candidate and make their recommendation to the body at the state association in its regular session, with primary consideration given to the recommendation prior to any nominations.

(2) In the event of a vacancy occurring during the course of the year, the Executive Board shall fill the vacancy until the annual setting of the

association.

### ARTICLE VII

BOARDS: All standing boards shall be composed of seven (7) elected members who shall serve terms of 7, 6, 5, 4, 3, 2 and 1 years with such ex-officio members as may be provided elsewhere, except: (1) the General Board which shall be composed of one (1) member from each affiliated association, the chairman of each standing board, and the current general officers of this association, and (2) the College Board of Trustees which shall be composed as provided for in the Articles of Incorporation of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College. Inc.

The standing boards of this association shall be: Executive Board: Board of Church Extension, Missions and Evangelism; Sunday School Board; Church Training Service Board; and College Board of Trustees.

No standing board shall meet in a functional meeting during the session of this association.

### ARTICLE VIII

### DUTIES. SCOPE OF ENDEAVOR AND QUALIFICATIONS OF STANDING BOARDS

Section 1. EXECUTIVE BOARD: The Executive Board shall be composed of seven (7) members who are members of an affiliated association and in good standing with the association of which they are members. They shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

It shall be the duty of this board to act in behalf of the association when it is not in session. It shall be bound to carry out the directions of the association and shall hold itself bound by every consideration of morality and honor to carry out the wishes of this association and to act under its instructions in whatever technical rights, civil laws and the decisions of courts may give it in certain emergencies. It shall be the duty of this board

to sign their signatures to any and all papers concerning properties, indebtedness, bonds, or other legal documents pertaining to the execution of the will of this association, exclusive of the College Board of Trustees.

This board shall have the oversight of the Executive Department of this association. The members shall assist and direct such work for the general promotion of this association as is deemed needful or necessary as the means available shall permit. The Executive Department shall serve as the coordinating agency of this association to correlate the work of all standing boards and agencies.

This board shall have the oversight of Free Will Baptist Book Store and shall endeavor to serve affiliated associations and churches and the community with literature and church supplies. Merchandising procedures shall be those accepted as normal retail procedures with the board being cognizant of the spiritual contribution of the store in distributing Christian literature.

All decisions of this board shall be governed by the general tenets of this

association and shall not violate this constitution.

This board shall organize itself and elect such officers as necessary to the orderly conduct of its affairs and labors. This board shall keep an accurate record of all meetings, decisions, and work done and shall make a report in writing at each annual session of this association. All records shall be available to this association at its request.

Whereas this board represents the association when not in session, it and it alone shall have the power to call the association into special conference provided each affiliated association shall be given notice at least ten (10)

days prior to the meeting of such special conference.

Section 2. GENERAL BOARD: This board shall be composed of one (1) member from each affiliated association, the chairman of each standing board, and the current general officers of this association. Each member must be a member of an affiliated association and in good standing with the association of which he is a member. The members shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

The duties of this board shall be to meet one (1) day preceding the annual session of this association. This board shall serve as the credential committee with the duties and responsibilities assigned by Article V of this constitution. This board shall hear reports of all standing boards. It shall serve as budget committee and shall make such recommendations as deemed pertinent to this association. A complete and accurate record shall be kept of meetings of this board and a report shall be made in writing to this association in its annual session.

The moderator of the association shall serve as chairman of this board, and the clerk of the association shall serve as its clerk.

Section 3. BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION, MISSIONS AND EVANGELISM: This board shall be composed of seven (7) members who are members of affiliated associations and in good standing with the associations of which they are members. They shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

It shall be the duty-of this board to labor to further the Gospel of Jesus Christ into the uttermost parts of the earth. In accomplishing this, they are to endeavor to establish missions and churches in communities within the bounds of this association with whatever moral and financial assistance that may be theirs. In cases of small churches failing to function, whatever assistance deemed appropriate shall be rendered to maintain the effective witness of that church by either direct labor with the church or with an associational board in instances where the affiliated association has a functional board or agency.

This board shall be empowered to receive and convey title to real

property in the area of its labors.

The promotion of missionary endeavors from a local, state or national level shall come within the scope of endeavor of this board. This board shall assist in maintaining prayer and financial support of missionary enterprises through whatever channels available.

Whereas missionary and evangelistic labors are so intimately related, this board shall assist through participation or assistance in maintaining a

strong evangelistic thrust in the life of affiliated association.

This board shall organize itself and elect such officers as necessary to the orderly conduct of its affairs and labors. This board shall keep an accurate record of all meetings, decisions, work done, funds received and disbursed and hsall make a report in writing at each annual session of this association. All records shall be available to this association at its request.

Section 4. COLLEGE BOARD OF TRUSTEES: The College Board of Trustees shall be composed as provided for in the Articles of Incorporation of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc.

Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc. is an agency of the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists and is incorporated under the corporate laws of the State of Oklahoma. The articles of incorporation are a part of this association's record and delineate the purpose, duty and scope of endeavor of the members of this board.

Section 5. CHURCH TRAINING SERVICE BOARD: This board shall be composed of seven members who are members of affiliated associations and in good standing with the associations of which they are members. They shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

The duties of this board shall be to plan and assist in organizing and sustaining a strong Church Training Service in every church in each association affiliated with this association with every means of promotion and assistance available to them. This board shall plan, coordiate and conduct state-wide youth camps or camp.

This board shall organize itself and elect such officers as necessary to the orderly conduct of its affairs and labors. This board shall keep an accurate record o fall meetings, decisions, work done, funds received and disbursed and shall make a report in writing at each annual session of this association.

All records shall be available to this association at its request.

Section 6. SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD: This board shall be composed of seven (7) members who are members of affiliated associations and in good standing with the associations of which they are members. They shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

The duties of this board shall be to plan and promote Sunday schools in every church in each association affiliated with this association. This board shall use every available means to promote Sunday school clinics, seminars, institutes and conventions on local, district and state-wide basis, working with local agencies to distribute and employ all effective methods and material available.

This board shall organize itself and elect such officers as necessary to the orderly conduct of its affairs and labors. This board shall keep an accurate record of all meetings, decisions, work done, funds received and disbursed and shall make a report in writing at each annual session of this association. All records shall be available to this association at its request.

Section 7. VACANCIES: Vacancies shall occur when a member moves from the territorial bounds of this association, by death, by resignation or by removal from office by this association. In the event of disciplinary action

where charges concerning misconduct, doctrine or practice shall have been lodged against a member of any board, his office shall be held in abeyance until such charges shall be concluded or as determined by this association.

All boards shall have power to fill vacancies arising between sessions of this association. Such appointment shall terminate at the next session of the association and shall be filled by this association.

Section 8. EMPLOYEES: All employees of boards or agencies of this association shall be employed by agreement or contract with employing board or agency upon approval of this association except those elected by this association and the conditions of their employment shall be those approved by this association.

The duties of the Executive Secretary of this association shall be:

- (1) He is to represent, or cause to be represented, the association at all affairs of interest to the association.
- (2) He is to promote the work of the association in such a manner so as to unify the efforts of the association.
- (3) He is to serve with all standing boards and committees of the association in an ex-officio capacity.
- (4) He is to aid in planning the work of the association by relating the activities and plans of one board to another.
- (5) He is to report to the association during each annual session.
- (6) He is to communicate to the affiliated members of this association the pressing causes and events before the association. This can be in person or by means of a periodical bulletin or both.
- (7) He shall serve as treasurer of this association. An accurate and complete record of all funds received and disbursed shall be kept and a written report shall be included in his report to this association in its annual session.
- (8) The conditions of employment shall be determined by the Executive Board.

### ARTICLE IX

DISSOLUTION: Should this association cease to function, all properties and holdings shall go to the National Association of Free Will Baptists after all creditors are satisfied and indebtedness cleared.

### ARTICLE X

AMENDMENTS: This constitution may be amended or altered at any regular session of the association by a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of members present and voting, provided proposed amendment or alteration be presented in writing to the body one (1) day in advance.

### ARTICLE XI

SPECIAL SESSIONS: Elected delegates to the last session of this association shall be retained as standing delegates for special called sessions.
