PROCEEDINGS

The 71st annual meeting of the Oklahoma State Association met at Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College in the Activities Building for the opening session on October 16, 1979.

David Archer was director of music with Marian Pilgrim pianist. A musical prelude was offered with a piano selection by Marian Pilgrim. The Sunnyside Free Will Baptist Church Choir prepared our hearts for worship with tremendous renditions of the hymns of praise, "He Set Me Free" and "His Grace is Sufficient."

David Archer led the congregation in singing, "O, How I Love Jesus." Dale Smith, presiding, made pertinent announcements. The congregation sang "I Have Decided to Follow Jesus" and "There is Power in the Blood." A womens ensemble from Sunnyside sang "The Lord is in This Place."

Jerry Dudley, Clerk, called the Association into official session and introduced the officers of the Association.

Ray Gwartney, Chairman of the Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College Board of Trustees, was introduced and he led in an inaugural ceremony of Don Elkins as President of Hillsdale.

The Oklahoma State Ministers Quartet was introduced and blessed our hearts by singing "Jesus is Mine" and a medley of praise that brought shouts of joy.

Dale Smith introduced Charles Bigger as the messenger of the hour. From the theme "Building THE Church" the sermon was delivered entitled "The Message of the Church." Based on the theme scripture of Matthew 16:18 the message emphasized "Jesus, the message of God to man."

Following the necessary announcements, Tommy Brashears led in a prayer of benediction.

THE WEDNESDAY MORNING SESSION

The Wednesday morning session, October 17, 1979, was called to order with David Archer leading the Association in singing "Have His Way with Thee." Muril Wilson led the body in prayer.

The delegates from all district associations were seated with necessary changes noted. The standing delegates were recognized and the voting bloc was established.

Visitors from several states and the National offices were recognized and invited to seat in counsel with the Association.

A partial report of the General Board was read with items voted on individually. Item No. 1 was read. Motion was seconded and carried to adopt. Item No. 2 was read. Motion was seconded and carried to receive. (See General Board Report)

Clarence Shepherd, Chairman, gave the report of the Executive Board. Motion was seconded and carried to receive the report and consider the recommendations item by item. Recommendation No. 1 (lost). Recommendation No. 2 (carried). Recommendations Nos. 3, 4, and 5 were tabled for consideration with the budget report. (See Executive Board Report)

Lonnie DaVoult gave the Executive Secretary's report. Motion was seconded and carried to receive the report.

Ray Martin, Store Manager, gave the report of Free Will Baptist Book Store. Motion and second carried to receive the report.

Jack Williams, Editor of CONTACT magazine, gave a report of the National Association Executive Department.

The Association was declared in recess until 1:30 p.m.

WEDNESDAY MORNING WORSHIP SERVICE

The worship hour was called into service with David Archer leading the Association in singing "Blessed Assurance." Francis Berka led the body in prayer.

With John Staggs presiding, the worship continued with the Watchmen Quarter singing "I Believe in a Hill Called Mount Calvary" and a medley of gospel songs.

Eddie Pack sang "Love Grew Where the Blood Fell."

John Staggs introduced Jerry Dudley for the morning message. From the theme "Building THE Church" the message entitled, "The Ministry of the Church" was developed from Matthew 16:18 & 1 Peter 1:3-10. The message emphasized the ministry committed to the church and God-called men to through service to Christ and lost mankind.

Announcements concerning availability of luncheon establishments was made.

A prayer of benediction was offered by Ralph Hampton, Sr.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON

The Wednesday afternoon business session was called together with singing "'Tis so Sweet to Trust in Jesus" led by David Archer with Marian Pilgrim at the piano and Debbie Burden at the organ.

Ron Carner led the Association in prayer for the business session following.

The "New Life Singers" from Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College sang, "Learning to Lean", a medley of "Heavenly Sunlight", and "We Shall Rise."

Leroy Holman led in our afternoon devotions. Using Matthew 22:34-40 as a basis, "Love" was clearly set before us. The devotion was closed with prayer.

James Murray, Moderator, declared the Association in business session.

A seven year member vacancy on the Executive Board was filled. J. C. Morgan was elected.

Keith Burden, Chairman, gave the Sunday School Board report. Motion and second carried to receive the report. Bob Ketchum was elected to fill the seven year position on the Sunday School Board.

Roger Reed, Director of National Sunday School Department, gave a report of Randall House Publications.

A partial report of the Resolutions Committee was read. Resolutions no. 1, no. 2, and no. 3 were read. Motion and second carried to receive these and lay them on the table as per constitutional requirement inasmuch as they concerned constitutional changes. (See Resolutions Committee Report)

Berton Perry, Chairman, gave the report of the State Mission Board. State Missionaries Curtis Linton, Lawton; Gary Thomas, Bartlesville; Buddy Drake, Enid; and David Bigger, Ponca City were introduced and reports of these mission works were given. Motion and second carried to receive the report.

Trymon Messer, Assistant Director of National Homes Missions Department, gave a report of that department and reported that the Oklahoma State Association was number one in support of this area of ministry.

Rolla Smith, General Director of National Foreign Missions Department reported the current conditions of our world-wide ministry. Areas of great need contrasted with God's abundant blessings was reported. The Oklahoma State Association is currently ranked second in support of this missions department.

A moment of respite was enjoyed and the Association sang, "To God Be the Glory."

Charles Bigger, Vice Chairman, gave the Church Training Service Board report. Special note was given of the recent death of Doyle Cox, Chairman of this board. Motion and second carried to receive the report.

Three vacancies on the membership of this board were filled as follows: Jerry Pilgrim, 1 year member; Roma Stewart, 5 year member; and Dennis Cariker, 7 year member.

Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College report was given with Bailey Thompson giving a report of the call-a-thon results and the budgetary and recruiting efforts and current needs. Don Elkins, President, gave a report of current conditions and goals set for coming months and years. Orville Hood gave the financial report. Motion and second carried to receive this report.

Two vacancies for 5 year members were filled. Waldo Young and Earnest Harrison, Sr. were elected to these positions.

Ronald Creech, Director of Development, gave a report of Free Will Baptist Bible College, Nashville, Tennessee.

James Murray, Moderator, declared business closed for the day as the time allotted was elapsed. James Cearley led in a prayer of benediction.

WEDNESDAY EVENING WORSHIP SERVICE

At 7:15 Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College presented a prelude of music. A men's quartet sang "Pilot Me." A ladies quartet sang, "I Believe." The College Choir sang, "You Gotta' Keep Your Faith" and "It May Be Today."

David Archer led the Association in singing "Amazing Grace." Delbert Akin, presiding, made pertinent announcements. Bill Jones led in prayer.

Kyler Welch sang, "My House is Full."

The Association sang "Learning to Lean" and "When We All Get to Heaven."

The Hillsdale College Choir sang "Joy in the Morning," "When I Survey the Wondrous Cross" and "It is Finished."

Delbert Akin introduced Lonnie Sparks, Missionary to Spain, as the messenger of the Hour. From the theme "Building THE Church" and using the title "The Mission of the Church" a tremendous and challenging message was delivered using Luke 24:45-47 as a text.

An offering was received for missions in the amount of \$745.00. The offering is to be divided equally in 3 parts with the National Foreign Mission Board, National Home Mission Board and the Oklahoma State Mission Board.

The service was closed in prayer led by James Puckett.

THURSDAY MORNING BUSINESS SESSION

The Thursday morning business session was opened with singing led by David Archer with Marian Pilgrim at the piano. The Association sang "He Brought Me Out."

J. B. Chism led the Association in prayer.

The Harvesters Quartet from Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College sang, "I Just Love Loving the Lord"; "Sometimes Allelujah"; and "See My Jesus." David McDougal led in morning devotions emphasizing the church at prayer. The Harvesters Quartet sang, "Love Grew Where the Blood Fell."

Earnest Harrison, Sr. gave a report of the National Retirement and Insurance Department. He informed the ministers of the availability of life, health and retirement insurance and reported the department now has in excess of \$1,000,000 in assets.

The General Board partial report was read. Recommendation No. 3 concerning the budget was read by the clerk. Motion and second carried that Item No. 1 of Recommendation No. 3 be adopted.

Motion and second carried to delete the 3 percent allocation to the National Youth Conference and give 13 percent to the Executive Department. Item No. 2 was adopted as amended.

Motion and second carried that Item No. 3 be adopted. (See General Board Report)

Motion and second carried that the revised budget of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College for 1979-80 be printed in 1979 Minutes of the Association. (See Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College Report)

Motion and second carried that the Obituary Committee report be adopted. (See Obituary Committee Report)

Motion and second carried that the Public Morals Committee report be adopted. (See Public Morals Committee Report)

Motion and second carried that the Executive Secretary be instructed to inform our churches as completely as possible of offensive television programming and pornographic movies.

Moderator James Murray declared business in recess until 1:30 p.m.

THURSDAY MORNING WORSHIP SERVICE

With David Archer leading, Marian Pilgrim at the piano and Debbie Burden at the organ, the Association sang "Ring the Bells of Heaven."

Gene Bishop led us in prayer.

A trio from Southern Oaks Free Will Baptist Church sang "Sheltered In the Arms of God."

The Association sang, "I know Whom I Have Believed."

Jerry Pilgrim sang, "Then Jesus Came."

Robert Duncan, presiding, presented Dan Harper as the messenger of the hour. Using the theme, "Building THE Church" and a message entitled "The Methods of the Church" the text was Matthew 16:18 and Matthew 28:19-20. A challenging message was delivered emphasizing that God's method given the church was to use His people.

Following needed announcements Bob Duncan led in a prayer of benediction.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON BUSINESS SESSION

Motion and second carried that the resolution on the table be taken from the table and the entire Resolution Committee report be received and voted item by item.

Resolution No. 2 lost.

Resolution No. 3. Motion and second carried that this be tabled for one year with both the Sunday School Board and Church Training Service Board to study the resolution and report their findings next year.

Resolution No. 4. Motion and second carried that it be adopted as corrected.

Resolution No. 5 carried.

Resolution No. 6 lost.

Resolution No. 7 carried.

Resolution No. 8. Motion and second carried to refer this to the Executive Board for their information and study.

Resolution No. 9. Motion and second carried to table.

General Board members were elected as recommended from each district association with those making no recommendations filled by nomination. (See General Board members listing)

Jack Richey was elected as this Association recommendation to the National Association for election to the National Association General Board.

Motion and second carried to give a rising vote of commendation and appreciation to Capitol Hill Church and Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College for the splendid manner in which they hosted this session of the Association.

Officers for 1980 were elected.

Assistant Clerk, Odie Nunley; Clerk, Jerry Dudley; Assistant Moderator, Frank Giles; Moderator, James Murray.

A motion and second carried to give this years officers a rising vote of appreciation for their work.

Following announcements, the final benediction was given by Charles Murphy upon the unanimous vote to adjourn.

RESOLUTION COMMITTEE REPORT

RESOLUTION NO. 1.

WHEREAS: the provision for election of the officers of the State Association also should give the body full choice of those who are selected to be voted on by the body, and,

WHEREAS: the present method provided by the constitution of the State Association limits the selection of candidates for the office of Executive Secretary to the nomination of the Executive Board of the Association on the first ballot and deprives the body of the right to nominate other candidates on the first ballot, therefore;

BE IT RESOLVED* that Article VI, entitled OFFICERS, of the constitution of the State Association of Free Will Baptists be amended as follows:

Section B, Item 1 be amended by deleting the last phrase and substituting, "with privilege of nominations from the floor." (carried as amended)

RESOLUTION NO. 2.

WHEREAS: two states have never represented on the Hillsdale Board of Trustees with a member, and

WHEREAS: These two states are quite a distance, making it more expensive for a Board member to attend meetings, and

WHEREAS: these two states have only approximately 200 and 700 Free Will Baptist members respectively, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED: that Colorado and New Mexico be deleted from the states allowed to send Board members on the Hillsdale Board of Trustees. (Lost)

RESOLUTION NO. 3.

WHEREAS: the National Sunday School Board and the National C.T.S. Board have been combined,

BE IT RESOLVED: that the Oklahoma State Sunday School Board and the Oklahoma State C.T.S. Board be combined. (Referred to the Sunday School Board and the Church Training Service Board for study and to report their findings in one year)

RESOLUTION NO. 4

WHEREAS: the State Association has the expense of the State Association underwritten by ALL associations paying a fee, with privilege of being seated given to those associations who pay,

BE IT RESOLVED: we recommend to the National Association of Free Will Baptists that ALL states bear the expense of the National Convention through state fees, with privilege of vote accompanying the fee. (carried)

RESOLUTION NO. 5.

WHEREAS: different departments of the state are paying different amounts for mileage, and

WHEREAS: there is a need of uniformity in this, where every department should pay the same amount, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED: that all departments be instructed to pay 18 cents per mile for 1979-80, and that the General Board, along with its duties as Budget Committee, set the mileage for every department of the State. (carried)

RESOLUTION NO. 6.

BE IT RESOLVED: that the Executive Board be informed of all uncollectable accounts with any department of the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists and that the Executive Board be charged with the responsibility of corresponding with said accounts.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: that all accounts not satisfied within a reasonable period of time shall be published in the "PROMOTER" and the Digest of Reports, including the name of person or church owing such bill, also, that the church or district association be requested to take appropriate action against such. If action not taken against person or church by their local association or church that they not be seated in the State Association. (lost)

RESOLUTION NO. 7.

WHEREAS: the Brookside Chapel Church has no Mission Board backing, and

WHEREAS: the church is not strong enough to get a loan for building, and

WHEREAS: Mr. J. B. Tate, a loan broker, insists the Executive Board and Executive Secretary stand behind the church in a loan, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED: that the State Executive Board and Executive Secretary meet with Pastor Homer Young to see the plans and if deemed financially advisable, sign the paper with the church for a loan of \$100,000.00. (carried)

RESOLUTION NO. 8.

WHEREAS: the State Free Will Baptist Book Store has no walk-in trade, and

WHEREAS: the property for the Book Store is not zoned for business, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED: the State Executive Board be authorized to relocate Free Will Baptist Bookstore and to sell, lease, or rent the existing property. (referred to the Executive Board)

RESOLUTION NO. 9.

BE IT RESOLVED: that all state meetings be held at Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College and that monies that would be spent on the convention hall be given to the college. (Lost)

OBITUARY COMMITTEE REPORT

We the Obituary Committee have noted we have had 141 deaths in the State Association. We recommend a standing silent prayer in memory of all who have passed on and afterward Rev. E. E. Morris to lead us in a closing prayer.

We also note by the State Minutes that several of our deceased ministers names still appear. We recommend that the ministers list be corrected annually.

We pray the Lord to richly bless the families of the deceased members.

PUBLIC MORALS COMMITTEE REPORT

We recommend in the light of our nations lowering morals, that our preachers emphasize more the commandments of God concerning sin and the coming doom of judgment for sinners.

We recommend that our people be more discriminating in their viewing of television programs. We do this because of the low moral standards of many of the programs presented.

THE GENERAL BOARD REPORT

The General Board of the Oklahoma State Association met October 15, 1979 in the Capitol Hill Free Will Baptist Church, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. As a result of this meeting we offer the following items for your consideration.

- I. We received correspondence from twenty-three (23) district Associations holding membership in this body. We recommend that these letters be received and the delegates seated.
- II. We heard the reports of the Executive Board, the Executive Secretary, the Free Will Baptist Book Store, the Sunday school Board, the Mission Board, the Church Training Service Board, and Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College. We recommend that these reports be adopted as each is presented with one exception. Recommendation No. 1 of the Executive Board report is forwarded with a negative recommendation.
- III. Serving as Budget Committee, we offer the following recommendation:

1. We recommend a cooperative budget of \$175,000.00 to be distributed according to the following percentages:

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
JUNE 30, 1979**

(1) SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The State Association of Free Will Baptists is a non-profit organization designed to provide central leadership and representation for the Free Will Baptists of Oklahoma and to handle certain receipts and disbursements of the Free Will Baptist Church. The Association uses the fund method of accounting, whereby the fund balance represents the equity the Association has in its assets. This accounting method is generally accepted among non-profit organizations as the most feasible way of reflecting their financial activity and position.

The Association's property and equipment is depreciated on the straight-line basis using the following estimated useful lives:

Furniture, fixtures and equipment	
acquired subsequent to July 1, 1972	8 years
Furniture, fixtures and equipment	
acquired prior to July 1, 1972	3 years

(2) MORTGAGE RECEIVABLE

The executive residence was sold on May 30, 1974 for \$20,500. The buyer assumed the mortgage on the property and gave the Association a second mortgage on the property for \$10,300. Payments were to begin on July 1, 1974. The rate of interest is 8 percent and the mortgage is for thirty years. The Association does not have an amortization schedule on this loan and we were unable to verify the exact balance on this mortgage receivable.

(3) COOPERATIVE CONTRIBUTIONS

The Executive Office of the State Association was allocated 22 percent in 1979 and 22 percent in 1978 of cooperative contributions for the financing of its operations for the fiscal year.

3. NATIONAL CONVENTION. Highlighting our denominational year is the gathering of representatives from almost 2500 churches in the United States as well as nine foreign countries. This international assembly, for which the Executive Office is directly responsible to plan and promote guarantees opportunity for fellowship, inspiration and enlarged vision of world missions. Business sessions provide a forum for discussing contemporary issues and establishing policies designed to strengthen our fellowship. This is why every Oklahoma church ought to send its pastor and a lay delegate to the national body which meets next July 20-24 in Anaheim, California.

4. RECORD KEEPING. Accurate records are essential to evaluate our growth and preserve our history. Unfortunately churches have been negligent in keeping proper records. We appeal to our pastors and church clerks to maintain accurate records and report the same to district, state and national associations.

MISSION BOARD REPORT FOR 1979

The board has met five times during the past year. We also held one telephone conference in an effort to save time and money. Several committees have worked on various occasions to assure that the work was done with maximum efficiency at the least cost.

We are again thankful for the response of our people toward the Church Establishment Program (CEP). The concern and giving of our Oklahoma people has catapulted our state into the number one place in giving to National Home Mission work. Much of this is due to the response of our people to CEP. This shows that we are not only concerned for our own missionaries but it shows that we are concerned for others also.

Two new missionaries were appointed this past year. Curtis Linton was approved in March for work in Lawton. He has presently moved to the city and land has been purchased. Ground work has been laid for building a new church building in a fast growing section of this beautiful Oklahoma city. Gary Thomas was approved in May to begin a new work in Bartlesville. Both of these men have been doing itinerate work to raise their support. Both are fine young men and the board feels they will soon have their works on a good footing.

Our work in Enid and Ponca City is continuing to do well. One and perhaps both of them will be on a self-sustaining basis possibly within the next year.

Four works are a tremendous load with the present flow of finances into our department. We are putting forth an urgent plea to all our churches that they get behind the Church Establishment Program (CEP). Our missionaries are out "beating the bushes," but it is impossible to beat them all. We urge you to help support the work whether you have been prodded into doing so or not. As you know it is expensive to put a missionary on the field. Too, every Sunday he is delayed from preaching and serving in his chosen city makes him just that much further from establishing a church on his location. We are urgently calling upon our people to put CEP in their budgets and do something consistently for this worthy and important cause.

During the past year our board authorized three of its members to attend a meeting in Nashville, Tennessee, of state mission boards from all over the nation sponsored by the National Home Missions Department. All of us profited from sharing ideas and feel that we have gained some valuable insight on how to do a more effective job.

We have formulated some basic guidelines relating to the hiring of new missionaries. We have worked out some specific qualifications that a candidate must possess before he is considered as a serious contender for employment by the board. We feel this is important in helping choose our missionaries for future work.

We want to ask our people to please pray for our new churches and missionaries. We have a right to be proud of a program that has met with success. However, we should be humbled as we remember there are still towns in Oklahoma and many in our nation that does not have a Free Will Baptist witness. As we look upon our nation we should be reminded that not one in ten people are Christians, not one in a thousand is a Free Will Baptist, only one church in five preaches the Gospel, and churches are closing all over our

nation. The needs of our day demands that we do more and do our best for the cause of Christ.

YOU, YOUR CHURCH, AND YOUR STATE made possible another record year in world outreach through the Free Will Baptist Foreign Missions Department. Total receipts for 1978 came to \$1,633,920.82. Praise God for this accomplishment. Amid an uncertain world economy the Lord's unusual blessings and gracious provisions were again realized. TO HIM BE ALL THE HONOR AND GLORY!

ALONG WITH General Director Rolla Smith, Director of Communications Don Robirds, Director of Finance Harold Critcher and the rest of our office staff, I want, once again, to say "THANK YOU" for standing with us as we have labored to reach more of the world's population with the truth of God's redemptive plan through Jesus Christ, our Lord.

RESPONSE FROM CHURCHES during my personal itinerary was gratifying indeed. Monthly, faith promises from 37 churches totaled \$14,325.75. Of this amount \$3,853.24 was new support. In addition to this \$17,122.12 in cash was received from the services. The missionaries' deputational ministry also saw record responses from across the denomination.

They are: Patti Hiltibidal - Illinois (Brazil), Valarie Riley - Arkansas (Brazil), Gary Silence - North Carolina (Brazil), Pam Wilson - California (Ivory Coast), Sandra England - Ohio (Ivory Coast), Tommy and Deborah Allen - Oklahoma (Panama), James Hanniford - Arizona (France), Joseph Govreau - Missouri (France). Remember them when you pray.

THREE APPOINTEES graduated from Missionary Internship in May of this year. Tom and Patti McCullough have begun their deputational ministry. Tom and Patti will need at least \$1,500.00 per month for their Total Ministry Cost and \$25,000.00 in accumulated cash before being approved for departure. Miss Allen has completed her deputation.

Elaine along with Mike and Deleen Cousineau are now in New York for a month's language study. Then they will go to France to further their language study.

MORE CHURCHES are needed to stand with us in carrying out God's mandate for all of us — to preach to the gospel to "All the World" and "To every Creature."

ADDITIONAL INCOME IS NEEDED if we are to continue our witness to the ends of the earth. PASTOR, do you have Foreign Missions in your church budget? Even if your church gives through faith promise offerings, why not also lead your church to allocate monthly through the church budget? This budgeted amount allows each giving church member to share in world outreach. (Some do not give through faith promise.)

FINALLY — Want to share several brief excerpts from L. E. Maxwell's Book, "World Missions — Total War."

"World Missions under Christ's captaincy means war, total mobilization for total conflict — armed with complete steel.

Missionary zeal is slacking off in many of our evangelical churches. It might be expected that missionary interest would be minimal among the liberals as a natural consequence of their false theology. But when fundamental folk fail to fulfil the Great Commission, we must needs ferret out the cause thereof. Such a blight does not just happen any more than the curse causless does not come. In the scriptures must be found the cause and the cure.

The whole Bible, read aright, is a missionary book. Bible teaching, expounded aright, begets missionary going and missionary giving. The Gospel message, proclaimed aright, produces missionary outreach 'among all nations.'

Oh, fellow-ministers, and missionaries, and church elders, and Sunday School teachers, Hearken! Let our teaching and preaching be crammed

with Scripture expositions setting forth God's ultimate purpose to reach the regions beyond. Then, having laid well those foundations in fresh 'opening of our understanding to understand the Scriptures,' let those expositions be supplemented and illustrated with fresh facts and figures from foreign fields."

1978-79 school year at Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College ranks among the finest we have ever experienced. Young men and young ladies have responded to the call of the ministry and the mission field. Many others have been active in the local church outreach and are developing a tremendous concern to extend the Kingdom of God.

Academically our faculty has gained in experience and stature as teachers. And that experience is translated into learning for the students.

The library has added to its book collection the beginning of a microfiche collection that will double the resources available without having to expand a single bookshelf.

Student involvement in activities to promote the school have been the best that have ever been. Students have acted as hosts at the missions conference and the Bible conference. They have raised money by special projects. But

even more they have begun to discern the excellency in Christianity and reach for it.

Much has been accomplished since relocating in 1966 — buildings have been built, staff has been expanded, and our student body has grown. Both parents and pastors tell of the progress made in the lives of our young people.

There is still much to be done. More buildings to be built. More programs to be developed. And more high school seniors who need to be challenged with the possibility of a Hillsdale education. If we as Free Will Baptists are to ever accomplish anything for God, we must develop our young people into the image of Christ and help them to develop their potential to extend the Kingdom.

Last fall 183 students enrolled at Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College. Another 15 joined them in January for a total enrollment of 198.

Please pray with us that students in our seven state area will seriously consider the rewards of a Hillsdale education and will direct their steps that way. Pray also that the increasing financial needs may be met, that God's people will respond to the challenge of building the kind of school He desires.

We have examined the balance sheet of the HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE (an Oklahoma corporation, not for profit), as of June 30, 1979, and the related statements of revenue, expenditures and transfers and changes in fund balance for the year then ended. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances except that, because of the inadequacy of prior year records, we were unable to obtain sufficient evidence to form an opinion as to the basis on which the plant and equipment is stated.

In our opinion, except for the effect of any adjustments which might be required with respect to plant and equipment accounts, the accompanying financial statements present fairly the financial position of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College as of June 30, 1979, and the results of its operations for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

(1) SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The College uses the fund method of accounting whereby individual fund is a separate accounting entity made up of assets, liabilities, revenues, expenditures, transfers and a fund balance. This method of accounting is generally accepted among colleges and universities as the most effective means of controlling financial data.

Buildings and equipment are not depreciated by the College, which is an acceptable procedure for a non-profit organization.

THE FREE WILL BAPTIST MASTER'S MEN

State of Oklahoma

CONSTITUTION

PREAMBLE

The purpose of the Free Will Baptist Master's Men, state of Oklahoma is to provide a means of Christian fellowship and to deepen the spiritual lives of the laymen of the local church. Also, to provide a means of developing the abilities and talents of the laymen, and to promote the cause of Christ through a complete, "total church program," as prescribed by Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists.

ARTICLE I

NAME

The name of this organization shall be known as the Free Will Baptist Master's Men, State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE II

MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. The membership of this organization shall be composed of the district associations of Master's Men, and any local chapters where there is only one chapter in the district, within the state of Oklahoma.

Section 2. Every member in good standing of an affiliated district association of Master's Men, or any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district, is entitled to the full benefits of membership.

Section 3. Each district association, or any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district, shall submit an annual, written report to this body, (as a matter of information).

ARTICLE III

OFFICERS

The officers of this organization shall consist of a president, vice-president and a secretary-treasurer.

The officers of this organization shall be elected annually and may succeed themselves, at this level.

ARTICLE IV

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The executive committee shall consist of the elected officers of this organization and they shall serve as the program committee for each annual convention.

Section 2. Ex-officio members of the executive committee shall be the presidents of the district associations of Master's Men, presidents of any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district, and the state executive secretary of the State Association of Free Will Baptists.

ARTICLE V

MEETINGS

This organization shall meet annually at 7:30 P.M. on the Monday night before the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists convenes.

ARTICLE VI

AMENDMENTS

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of any regular meeting.

BY-LAWS

VOTING RIGHTS

Section 1. Every member of each affiliated district association, or any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district, is eligible to vote on all questions and matters that might come before the Free Will Baptist Master's Men, State of Oklahoma.

COMMITTEES

Section 2. The executive committee shall transact all routine business and shall act for the organization in the interim between meetings.

Section 3. The executive committee shall meet at the call of the president.

Section 4. A nominating committee, for the annual election of officers, shall be composed of the presidents of each district association, and the president of any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district.

Section 5. The president shall appoint all other committees, subject to the approval of the body.

FINANCE

Section 6. This organization shall be financed on the basis of offerings, dues and assessments.

QUORUM

Section 7. One-tenth of the members of this organization shall constitute a quorum at any regular meeting.

AMENDMENTS

Section 8. These by-laws may be amended at any regular meeting by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

As adopted by the Free Will Baptist Master's Men, State of Oklahoma annual session, in Muskogee, Oklahoma October 19, 1970.

MINUTES OF THE OKLAHOMA FREE WILL BAPTIST MINISTER'S CONFERENCE

Several announcements were made concerning insurance coverage available to the ministers and their churches. A motion to adjourn was made. The motion was seconded and carried. The meeting was closed with prayer.

CONSTITUTION OF MINISTER'S CONFERENCE

ARTICLE 1

The Minister's Conference shall be called the Oklahoma State Free Will Baptist Minister's Conference, and shall be composed of Ordained Free Will Baptist Ministers who are regular members of some Orthodox Free Will Baptist church in the State of Oklahoma who have paid their \$1.00 dues.

ARTICLE 2

The officers for this conference shall be President, Vice-President, and Clerk Treasurer, who shall be elected annually.

ARTICLE 3

This conference shall have the power to discipline its members.

ARTICLE 4

Members of this organization shall be all ordained ministers who participate in the benefits and activities of this body, and associate members who become members by payment of the \$1.00 annual dues.

ARTICLE 5

This conference shall meet Semi-Annually.

ARTICLE 6

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any regular session.

BY-LAWS OF MINISTER'S CONFERENCE

ARTICLE 1

The clerk or assistant clerk, or in their absence the senior minister in years shall call the ministers into conference. If a quorum is present the President or in his absence the Vice-President shall moderate the meeting. If neither of these are present, the senior minister in years shall be in charge.

ARTICLE 2

It shall be the duty of the clerk to enroll the ministers of the conference. Ministers shall present themselves with proper evidence of their rights to seats therein, and those enrolled by the clerk shall compose the conference. In case of questionable representation the case under question shall be referred to the Credential Committee.

ARTICLE 3

It shall be the duty of each minister belonging to this conference, to be active in pastoral or evangelistic services (disabled or retired ministers excepted). Any minister belonging to this conference shall report in each session in person or by letter, and failing to do so for two successive sessions shall be subject to discipline.

ARTICLE 4

Each conference shall be opened by reading a portion of God's word and prayer, and each session shall be closed with prayer.

ARTICLE 5

By a two-thirds vote of the members present ruling of the President may be overruled.

ARTICLE 6

This conference shall sit with open doors, except when it shall go into a committee as a whole.

ARTICLE 7

No member shall absent himself from the conference during its meeting without permission from the President.

ARTICLE 8

No person shall be allowed to nominate more than one member of a committee, unless person nominated is not elected.

ARTICLE 9

The President shall not allow discussion when not carried on in a Christian Spirit, or when he thinks it will cause discord.

ARTICLE 10

Anyone desiring to speak shall rise and address the President by the appellation "Brother President," but shall not speak further until recognized.

ARTICLE 11

No member of this conference shall be allowed to speak more than five minutes, nor twice on the same subject without permission from the President.

ARTICLE 12

These By-Laws may be altered or amended at any regular or adjourned session of this conference by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE, INC.

BY-LAWS

BOARD OF TRUSTEES

SECTION I

The Board of Trustees of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc., an Oklahoma corporation, shall be composed of fifteen members, elected as provided in the Articles of Incorporation of said College, as amended:

ARTICLE A—OFFICERS: The officers of the board of Trustees shall be a Chairman, an Assistant Chairman, and a Secretary, each of whom shall be elected by the Board for a term of one year. They shall continue in office until their successors have been chosen:

Item 1—CHAIRMAN: The chairman of the Board of Trustees or his assistant shall preside at all meetings of the Board. He shall be an ex-officio member of the Executive Committee.

Item 2—SECRETARY: The Secretary shall record and preserve minutes of all meetings and acts of the Board of Trustees and countersign all deeds, conveyances, and other papers authorized by the Board. He shall have authority to call special meetings of the Trustees of the College upon the written request of two-thirds of the members of the Board; he shall mail notice of said meeting to the trustees ten (10) days in advance.

Item 3—EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE: The Executive Committee shall consist of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, the Vice-Chairman of the Board, the Secretary of the Board. The Executive Committee shall have authority to consider and act upon all questions affecting the College which may be brought before it between the stated meetings of the Board, or a quorum of the Board fails to attend a called or regular meeting. It shall transact such business as may be committed to it by the Board and shall act for the College on such matters as it may submit to it. The Committee shall meet at the call of the Chairman or the President of the College.

ARTICLE B—MEETINGS: The Board of Trustees shall meet each year at a time and place agreed upon by the Board. It shall, also, hold special meetings whenever called in accordance with the By-Laws of the Board. Such special meetings may be called by either the chairman of the Board, or the President of the College.

ARTICLE C—QUORUM: A majority of the members or the Board of Trustees of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc. in attendance at any called or regular meeting, written notice of which has been mailed by the

Secretary to each trustee, shall constitute a quorum. No proxy votes shall be permitted. No ex-officio member shall be entitled to vote at meetings of the Board of Trustees.

ARTICLE D—ELECTIONS: In all elections held by the Board of Trustees each member present except ex-officio members shall be entitled to one vote, and the result shall be determined by a majority of the votes cast. Due notice of any election must be personal notice to the members or a day on the minutes of the Board not less than one week preceding the election.

SECTION II OFFICERS OF HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE

The officers of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College shall be a President, Vice-President, Dean, and a Business Manager, each of whom shall be elected by the Board of Trustees to hold office for two years exclusive of the President whose term of office shall be indefinite. It is provided, however, that retirement of any one of the officers herein named may occur at any time upon the resignation of the officer or the request of the Board. In either case, notice shall be given six weeks before the date of the proposed retirement unless otherwise agreed upon by the concerned parties.

ITEM ONE—PRESIDENT: The President shall be executive officer of the Board of Trustees and shall have general control of the College including its officers, teachers, students, and business. He shall render to the Board complete annual reports and to its chairman, Executive Committee or other committees such information as may be deemed essential to a thorough knowledge of the operation of the College and its promotion. He shall be a member of the Board of Trustees ex-officio and the Executive Committee ex-officio and shall have the rights and privileges of a member of the Board except voting. The President shall execute all documents, instruments, and conveyances on behalf of the College. Duties of the president and working relationship shall be further detailed in a format approved by the Board of Trustees.

ITEM TWO—VICE PRESIDENT: The Vice-President shall perform all the duties of the President in the absence of the latter.

ITEM THREE—DEAN: The Academic Dean of the College shall, under the President, fix the hours of recitation, govern, control, and regulate the conduct of the students, have general oversight of curriculum, student's records, and such other internal details and administrative duties as may be delegated to him by the President of the College.

ITEM FOUR—BUSINESS MANAGER: The Treasurer shall keep an accurate record of all accounts of the College and shall receive and expend as directed by the Board of Trustees and President, all money for the expenses of the institution. He shall make an annual report to the Board and furnish the Executive Committee with such information pertaining to his office as may be requested. He shall provide bond in whatever amount the Board may require. Until such times as the Board of Trustees may deem different the Treasurer's office shall be contained within the Business Manager's Office. The Business Manager may at the direction of the administration designate this duty to a subordinate officer. The Business Manager shall have general supervision of the financial business of the College, and shall, at the direction of the President, be responsible for the upkeep of all the physical facilities and premises of the College. His detailed duties are directed in a format approved by the Board of Trustees.

SECTION III FACULTY

The faculty shall consist of the President, the Dean, and all teachers of

Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College. Instructors and assistant teachers shall have the privilege of sitting with the faculty in stated meetings but shall not have the right of voting.

It shall be the policy of the College to employ on its faculty those who are members of Free Will Baptist churches that are affiliated with the National Association. Emergencies, however arising from the resignation, illness, death, or approved leaves of absence of faculty members may be relieved by the temporary employment of instructors who are affiliated with any evangelical denomination. Part-time or short-term instructors, deemed essential to the successful prosecution of a consistent education program, may be employed at the discretion of the President without respect of denominational affiliation.

The faculty, under the authority and jurisdiction of the President, shall have general charge of instruction, attendance of students, examinations, administration of curriculum, discipline, and all matters involving the spiritual, physical, and social welfare of the College. The faculty shall be hired upon recommendation of the President.

In the selection of the faculty qualitative factors shall be kept in mind. All faculty members shall be urged to pursue graduate programs in their respective fields. Except in special cases no faculty member will be required to teach courses outside of his field.

SECTION IV ACADEMIC COUNCIL

The Academic Council shall consist of the President, the Dean and the heads of the departments of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College: It shall determine the curriculum and academic policy of the College, prescribe requirements for admission, certificates, diplomas, and degrees, and supervise the courses of instruction offered by the various departments of the College.

SECTION V CONTRACTS

The Board of Trustees shall establish the College policy involving the execution of contracts, deeds of conveyance, the determination of salaries, and employment of all officers, representatives, faculty members and essential domestic and maintenance employees. The President of the College shall negotiate agreements, executive contracts, employ representatives, and supply vacancies incurred by the termination of contracts, resignations, or death of any essential employees. All contracts for building construction shall be let only to persons or corporations posting a valid performance bond and recording the same in the Office of the County Clerk of Cleveland County, Oklahoma.

SECTION VI ADVISORY COUNCIL

An advisory council shall be formed which is to be composed of interested, qualified persons in the various fields which will be of value in building and maintaining a strong academic program to carry out the educational program stated in the charter.

SECTION VII AMENDMENT

These By-Laws may be amended by a favorable vote of two-thirds of the qualified members of the Board of Trustees of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College at any meeting of the Board, provided that the proposed amend-

ment has been submitted in writing to each Trustee one month in advance. This change to be subject to the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists.

SECTION VIII ADMINISTRATIVE FUNCTIONS

The President of the Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College shall be elected by the Board of Trustees, and he shall act for and on behalf of the Board in the conduct and management of the institution. He shall also be a member of the Board of Trustees ex-officio and of the Executive committee, ex-officio, and his duties, powers and term of office shall be prescribed in the by-laws of the College and a format approved by the Board of Trustees.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF THE HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE, INC.

Know all men by these presents, that, we whose names are hereunto subscribed, do hereby associate ourselves together for the purpose of forming a corporation under the provisions of the corporation laws of the State of Oklahoma, and for that purpose state:

ARTICLE ONE

The name of this corporation shall be HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE, INC.

ARTICLE TWO

The purpose of this corporation shall be the creation, establishment and maintenance of a college and institution of higher learning devoted to the promotion and impartation of higher learning, Christian education and such other education, instruction, learning, training and research as may be deemed essential for the cause of Christ and to that end prescribe courses of study and grant degrees. The doctrinal and theological position of this institution shall be that of the sponsoring denomination, Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists and the treatise of the National Association of Free Will Baptist as endorsed by the state body, and in connection therewith, in accordance with the stipulation of the Constitution and By-laws of the State Association of Free Will Baptists, Inc.

(a.) To prescribe courses of study for both resident and correspondence students, which shall include general education in the arts, Christian Ministries of Service and Biblical studies for wisdom; said courses to be taught in both a Junior College Division and a Bible College Division, and to award degrees, either graduate or post-graduate, to those persons satisfactorily completing the prescribed courses of study and to grant such other literary honors, including honorary degrees, as shall be deemed advisable.

(b.) To charge and collect tuition as determined by the Board of Trustees and to create scholarships.

(c.) To employ professors, instructors and other subordinate employees as may be necessary for the proper conduct of the college under the direction and control of the President of the College, with the advice and consent of the majority of the Board of Trustees.

(d.) To institute and carry on missions and commissions for missionary purposes and investigations.

(e.) To publish and distribute such pamphlets, literature or books as may be required in the conduct of such work and the general promotion of the College.

(f.) To sue and be sued in its corporate name and to enter into contracts of every type and nature.

(g.) To solicit support, receive, collect, hold and receive by gift or bequest personal property in any amount, money or other thing of value; to purchase real estate, to receive real estate that may be given, or devised to the college for achieving the legitimate ends of the college and to sell or mortgage the same as the need arises.

(h.) To borrow money in payment of property for erecting buildings and making improvements and for any other purpose germane to the objectives and purposes of the college.

(i.) To issue notes, bonds, debentures and other evidences of indebtedness and execute mortgages, liens and other incumbrances upon the property of the corporation, real or otherwise, to secure the payment of any such evidences of indebtedness.

(j.) To transact any and all business connected with said College as may be necessary to achieve the purposes of said College.

(k.) To obtain under Internal Revenue Laws of the United States and of the Revenue Laws of the State of Oklahoma exemption from income property and other forms of taxation.

ARTICLE THREE

The location of this corporation shall be in Moore, Oklahoma.

ARTICLE FOUR

The duration of this corporation shall be perpetual.

ARTICLE FIVE

The general control of this corporation shall be vested in a Board of Trustees consisting of 16 members, 10 of which shall be elected by the delegates to the annual Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists—each of which shall serve for a term of 5 years, and until his successor is elected and qualified. Two members shall be elected at each annual sitting of the State Association for the expiring five year term and vacancies that occur on the board. One member each shall be elected by the delegates to the annual meeting of the State Association of Free Will Baptists of the states of Arkansas, Colorado, Kansas, Missouri, New Mexico, and Texas, each of which serve for a term designated by the states they represent.

ARTICLE SIX

An executive committee consisting of the Chairman, Vice Chairman, and Secretary of the Board of Trustees shall possess all powers of the Board of Trustees between the stated meetings of the Board of Trustees.

ARTICLE SEVEN

All contracts for building construction shall be let only to persons or corporations posting a valid performance bond and recording the same in the office of the County Clerk of Cleveland County, Oklahoma.

SECTION IX AMENDMENTS

This charter may be hereafter amended subject to the provisions contained herein and the laws of the State of Oklahoma. It is provided, however, that the Trustees of the College shall not propose or apply for any amendment which has not been previously authorized by an act of the Oklahoma State Association.

**OKLAHOMA STATE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY CONVENTION
CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS**

ARTICLE I

NAME

This organization shall be known as the Oklahoma State Woman's Auxiliary Convention.

ARTICLE II

PURPOSE

The purpose of this convention shall be to bring the women of each district convention together for fellowship, sharing information, and encouraging one another in the work of the Lord.

ARTICLE III

OFFICERS

The officers of this convention shall be a president, vice president, secretary, treasurer, and field worker. These shall serve on the state executive committee together with three members elected by the convention as desired. These shall serve for a period of 2 years.

ARTICLE IV

MEMBERSHIP

This convention shall be composed of the officers of the convention together with each active auxiliary member of the district or local (duly accredited by the credentials committee).

ARTICLE V

MEETINGS

The annual meeting shall be held each year on the day preceding the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists and at the place designated by said Association.

ARTICLE VI

AMENDMENTS

This constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the convention by a two-thirds vote of members present.

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1, President. The president shall preside over all meetings, appoint such committees as may be needed, call the executive committee together when necessary, be ex-officio member of all committees, and serve as chairman of the executive committee, see that reports are made promptly to the national secretary and perform all duties usually pertaining to such an office.

Section 2, Vice President. The vice president shall preside in the absence of the president or by her request and otherwise assist her in the overseeing of the work in general.

Section 3, Secretary. The secretary shall keep an accurate record of all proceedings of the convention and executive meetings, preserve all valuable papers and turn same over to her successor in office, and make an annual report to the national secretary on a form available from the WNAC office.

She shall compile the districts slates of officers and addresses immediately after the convention. She shall also send a slate of state officers and addresses to the national executive secretary. She is chairman of the Credentials Committee.

The secretary shall also serve as historian keeping an historical record and submitting historical information to the national executive secretary annually.

Section 4, Treasurer. The treasurer shall have charge of all funds belonging to this convention and shall pay out same only when authorized by the convention. The treasurer shall keep an accurate account and shall give a written report of all funds received and disbursed at each annual meeting of the convention. She shall also send an annual report to the WNAC office (executive secretary-treasurer) at least ten days before the end of the fiscal year. She shall encourage support of missions through the WNAC Gift Plan, individual giving and special offerings.

Section 5, Field Worker. The field worker shall have charge of all field work pertaining to, or necessary to, the promotion of the work of the convention and keep the national program before the district officers.

ARTICLE II

ELECTIONS

The general officers shall be nominated by a nominating committee and shall be elected by acclamation, unless there are other nominations. In case of more than one nominee for any particular office, a vote will be taken on each. All elections shall be held at the closing business session of the convention.

ARTICLE III

EXPENSES

Section 1. An appropriation of 10 cents per mile toward the expense of the general officers, when called upon to attend the executive committee meeting to plan program, secretary's expenses, phone calls, postage and stationery for officers will be paid by the convention. All field promotional work is subject to the state executive committee, who should approve all work done by state officers in the interest of state work, as well as expenses of the same.

Section 2. An amount of \$50.00 shall be paid on the expense of the state president to attend WNAC.

ARTICLE IV

COMMITTEES

Section 1. Executive Committee—The executive committee shall be composed of the five officers and three members elected by the convention. Five of these shall compose a quorum. They shall hold meetings for the transaction of business as often as necessary. It shall be the duty of the executive committee to maintain an overseeing of the work at large. They shall act for the convention when necessary. They shall meet with district presidents the night preceding the state auxiliary convention.

Section 2. Resolutions Committee—A resolutions committee of five members shall be appointed by the president as needed.

Section 3. Nominating Committee—The nominating committee shall be composed of at least one member from each district convention. Nominations shall be submitted by district with their annual report. These elected by the body at the annual meeting.

Section 4. Credentials Committee—The secretary shall be chairman of the credentials committee, and other members may be appointed by the president. The treasurer shall be a standing member of this committee.

Section 5. Finance Committee—The finance committee shall be appointed by the president. This committee audits the financial records of the year and reports on same to the convention.

Section 6. Student Loan Committee—State Auxiliary President and 2 elected members to serve 2 years each. They shall be elected on alternate years.

Section 7. Registration committee shall be provided by the district convention which is host to state convention.

ARTICLE V

FEES AND REPORTS

Active members shall pay dues of \$1.50 per year. With 25 cents remaining in the district. \$1.25 to be forwarded to state where 25 cents shall be retained, and \$1.00 forwarded to WNAC as required for membership fees. It shall be the duty of each body directly affiliated with the State Auxiliary Convention to send a report to every annual session.

ARTICLE VI

AMENDMENTS

These by-laws may be amended by a two-thirds vote of members present at regular meeting of the state auxiliary convention.

ARTICLE VII

GIFTS

The desired plans for giving in the Woman's Auxiliary are those adopted by WNAC as follows:

1. Mission offerings following each special season of prayer
2. Co-Laborer offering (monthly or quarterly designated to WNAC General Fund)
3. WNAC Emphasis Month in August or other time more convenient to help in support of WNAC General Fund
4. Memorial Student Loan Fund (special program and offering in September to assist worthy and needy students at FWBBC in Nashville)
5. Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College Student Loan Fund. (Special program and offering in September to assist worthy and needy students at Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College)
6. Tithes—Pay tithes on all undesignated money received
7. All offerings are to be forwarded through regular channels

ARTICLE VIII

WNAC DELEGATE

Each district convention shall submit one nomination for a State delegate to WNAC with their annual report. This nomination (along with others as needed to make up 15 delegates to WNAC) shall be elected by the body at the annual meeting. It shall be the duty of delegates elected to notify president if they cannot attend WNAC. President shall appoint delegates as needed in absence of regular elected delegates.

ARTICLES OF FAITH OF STATE ASSOCIATION

1. **THE BIBLE**—The Scriptures of the Old and New Testament were given by the inspiration of God, and are our infallible rules of faith, and practice.

2. **GOD**—There is one living and true God, revealed in nature as the Creator, Preserver and Righteous Governor of the Universe, and in the Scriptures as the Father, Son and Holy Ghost, yet as one God, infinitely wise and good, whom all intelligent creatures are supremely to love, adore and obey.

3. **CHRIST**—Christ is God manifest in the flesh: in His divine nature truly God, in His human nature truly man. The mediator between God and man, once crucified. He is now risen and glorified is our ever-present Saviour and Lord.

4. **THE HOLY SPIRIT**—The Scriptures assigns to the Holy Spirit all the attributes of God. He is the Reprover, Comforter, Guide and Sanctifier of all men.

5. **THE GOVERNMENT OF GOD**—God exercises a wise and benevolent providence over all beings and all things by maintaining the constitution and laws of nature. He also performs special acts of Grace, not otherwise provided for as highest welfare of man requires.

6. **THE SINFULNESS OF MAN**—Man was created innocent, but by disobedience fell into a state of sin and condemnation. His posterity, therefore inherited a fallen nature of such tendencies that all who come to years of accountability, sin and become guilty before God.

7. **THE WORK OF CHRIST**—The Son of God, by His incarnation, life, suffering, death, and resurrection effected for all a redemption from sin that is full and free and is the ground of salvation by faith.

8. **THE WORK OF SALVATION**—The conditions of salvation are: 1. Repentance or sincere sorrow for sin and the hearty renunciations of it. 2. Faith or the unreserved committal of one's self to Christ as Saviour and Lord, with purpose to love and obey Him in all things. In the exercise of saving faith the soul is renewed by the Holy Spirit; freed from the dominion of sin and becomes a child of God. 3. Continuance in faith and obedience until death.

9. **ELECTION**—God determined from the beginning to save all who should comply with the conditions of salvation. Hence by faith in Christ, men become His elect.

10. **FREEDOM OF WILL**—The Human will is free and self controlled, having power to yield to the influence of the truth and the Spirit and live, or to resist them and perish.

11. **SALVATION FREE**—God desires the salvation of all, the Gospel invites all, the Holy Spirit strives with all, and whosoever will may come and take of the water of life freely.

12. **PERSEVERENCE**—All believers in Christ, who through grace persevere in holiness to the end of life, have the promise of eternal salvation.

13. **BACKSLIDING AND APOSTASY**—A person who has been regenerated or born again and is living in unconfessed, unforgiven sin, is rebellious to the principles of the Kingdom of God and His righteousness, and therefore is a backslider in a lost condition who must repent and be restored to the right relationship with God or be eternally lost.

We recognize, according to Hebrews 6:4-6, that it is possible for a person to get in the condition that he could never return to Christ. This, we believe, is Apostasy; However, we also recognize that a regenerate person can fall into sin, be in a lost condition and still not be an Apostate. This person, through repentance, can be reconciled to God.

14. **GOSPEL ORDINANCES**—Baptism, or the immersion of believers in water, and the Lord's Supper, are ordinances to be perpetuated under the Gospel: Feet Washing, an ordinance teaching humility, of universal obligation, and to be administered to all true believers.

15. **TITHING**—God commanded tithes and offerings in the Old Testament: Jesus Christ endorsed in the Gospel (Matt. 23:23), and the Apostle Paul said, "Upon the first day of the week let every one of you lay by him in store as God hath prospered him." 1 Cor. 16:2.

16. **THE CHRISTIAN SABBATH**—The divine law requires that one day in seven be set apart from the secular employment and amusements for rest, worship, holy works and activities, and for personal communion with God.

17. **RESURRECTION, JUDGMENT, AND FINAL RETRIBUTION**—The Scriptures teach the resurrection of all men at the last day. They that have done good will come forth to the resurrection of life, and they that have done evil unto the resurrection of damnation: then the wicked shall "Go away into eternal punishment but the righteous into eternal life."

RULES OF ORDER

1. At every sitting of the Association, business shall be opened and concluded by prayer by the Moderator or whomever he may request.
2. Ministers and deacons present are invited to seats, allowed to take part in debates on all subjects, and to vote.
3. Those who speak shall rise and address the Moderator. Personal reflections shall be avoided in all debates.
4. No motion may be discussed until made and seconded.
5. When a motion has been made and seconded, and a member opposes its discussion, the Moderator shall put the question, "Shall it be discussed?" If negative, the question shall not be discussed.
6. If any proposition or motion under debate contains two or more points, it shall be divided at the request of any member, and the vote taken separately.
7. Motions made and lost shall not be recorded.
8. No one shall speak more than twice on the same subject without special leave of the Moderator.
9. All questions shall be decided by a majority vote of all Members present.

BY-LAWS OF STATE ASSOCIATION

1. The Clerk or assistant clerk, or in their absence, the senior minister in years shall call the Association into conference, and if a quorum is present the moderator, or in his absence, the assistant moderator shall take charge; and if neither of them is present the senior minister in years shall act as Moderator.
2. It shall be the duty of the clerk to enroll the delegates to the Association, who shall present themselves with proper evidence of their rights to seats therein, and those enrolled by the clerk shall compose the Association.
3. It shall be the duty of every District belonging to this Association to send a letter to every annual session of this Association reporting in the same spiritual condition, benevolent work, and its statistics. Any District belonging to this Association, which shall fail to report itself for two successive sessions, may be dismissed from the Association by a two thirds vote of all members present.
4. Each meeting shall be opened by reading a portion of the Bible and with prayer, and shall be closed with prayer.
5. By a two-thirds vote of members present, a ruling of the moderator can be overruled.
6. This Association may correspond by messenger or otherwise with other religious bodies.
7. This Association shall sit with open doors except when it shall go into a committee of the whole.
8. Any person not a member of this Association may be allowed to take part in its discussions by obtaining permission from the moderator.
9. It shall be the duty of all the Association to be present at the time appointed for each meeting, and anyone wishing to retire shall first obtain leave of the moderator.
10. No person shall be allowed to nominate more than one member of any committee, provided the person nominated be elected.
11. The moderator shall not allow discussions when not carried on in a Christian spirit or when he thinks it will cause discord or division.

12. Anyone desiring to speak shall rise to his feet and address the moderator by the appellation "Brother Moderator," but shall not speak further until recognized by the moderator.

13. No member of this association shall be allowed to speak more than ten minutes nor twice on the same subject without permission from the moderator.

14. This association shall meet annually beginning on Tuesday following the second Sunday in October.

15. These By-Laws may be altered or amended at any regular or adjourned session of this Association by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

CONSTITUTION OF STATE ASSOCIATION

PREAMBLE: From long experience, we the members of the Free Will Baptist denomination, being regularly baptized upon a profession of our faith in Jesus Christ, and realizing the necessity of a bond of union and fellowship among us as a church; and to preserve and maintain correspondence and co-ordination with us, do therefore ordain this Constitution for our better denomination government.

ARTICLE I

NAME: This organization shall be known as the OKLAHOMA STATE ASSOCIATION OF FREE WILL BAPTISTS.

ARTICLE II

PURPOSE: The object and purpose of this organization shall be to unify the work of the various bodies composing this State Association, and to devise and execute measures for the extension of the Kingdom of God in connection with the various bodies in the Association, or that may hereafter be represented therein.

ARTICLE III

REPRESENTATION: Section 1. This Association shall be composed of all ordained ministers and deacons with membership in some local church which is a member of a district Association with membership in the State Association.

Section 2: Each District Association shall be entitled to a number of elected delegates equal with the number of churches composing said Association. These delegates may be recommended by the local churches and shall be endorsed by their district association.

ARTICLE IV

FINANCE: Each Association shall contribute \$20.00 per Church for support of the Association and delegate fees.

ARTICLE V

DISCIPLINE: This State Association shall have the right to settle any question of discipline, doctrine or practices that may properly come before it from any of the bodies composing said organization; furthermore, if there be any question of discipline, doctrine or practices on the part of an affiliated association, delegates of that association shall not be seated until these questions have been settled to the satisfaction of the General Board.

Section 2: Decisions of the General Board may be appealed in this manner. All appeals shall come before the State Association when sitting in a committee as a whole.

ARTICLE VI

OFFICERS: A. The officers of the State Association shall consist of a Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, and an Executive Secretary. Each of these shall be elected at the close of each regular session except the Executive Secretary.

B. (1) The Executive Secretary shall be elected for a two year tenure. It shall be the responsibility of the Executive Board to seek out a prospective candidate and make their recommendation to the body at the state association in its regular session, with privilege of nominations from the floor.

(2) In the event of a vacancy occurring during the course of the year, the Executive Board shall fill the vacancy until the annual setting of the association.

ARTICLE VII

BOARDS: All standing boards shall be composed of seven (7) elected members who shall serve terms of 7, 6, 5, 4, 3, 2 and 1 years with such ex-officio members as may be provided elsewhere, except: (1) the General Board which shall be composed of one (1) member from each affiliated association, the chairman of each standing board, and the current general officers of this association, and (2) the College Board of Trustees which shall be composed as provided for in the Articles of Incorporation of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc.

The standing boards of this association shall be: Executive Board; Board of Church Extension, Missions and Evangelism; Sunday School Board; Church Training Service Board; and College Board of Trustees.

No standing board shall meet in a functional meeting during the session of this association.

ARTICLE VIII

DUTIES, SCOPE OF ENDEAVOR AND QUALIFICATIONS OF STANDING BOARDS

Section 1. EXECUTIVE BOARD: The Executive Board shall be composed of seven (7) members who are members of an affiliated association and in good standing with the association of which they are members. They shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

It shall be the duty of this board to act in behalf of the association when it is not in session. It shall be bound to carry out the directions of the association and shall hold itself bound by every consideration of morality and honor to carry out the wishes of this association and to act under its instructions in whatever technical rights, civil laws and the decisions of courts may give it in certain emergencies. It shall be the duty of this board to sign their signatures to any and all papers concerning properties, indebtedness, bonds, or other legal documents pertaining to the execution of the will of this association, exclusive of the College Board of Trustees.

This board shall have the oversight of the Executive Department of this association. The members shall assist and direct such work for the general promotion of this association as is deemed needful or necessary as the means available shall permit. The Executive Department shall serve as the coordinating agency of this association to correlate the work of all standing boards and agencies.

This board shall have the oversight of Free Will Baptist Book Store and shall endeavor to serve affiliated associations and churches and the community with literature and church supplies. Merchandising procedures shall be those accepted as normal retail procedures with the board being cognizant of the spiritual contribution of the store in distributing Christian literature.

All decisions of this board shall be governed by the general tenets of this association and shall not violate this constitution.

This board shall organize itself and elect such officers as necessary to the orderly conduct of its affairs and labors. This board shall keep an accurate record of all meetings, decisions, and work done and shall make a report in writing at each annual session of this association. All records shall be available to this association at its request.

Whereas this board represents the association when not in session, it and it alone shall have the power to call the association into special conference provided each affiliated association shall be given notice at least ten (10) days prior to the meeting of such special conference.

Section 2. GENERAL BOARD: This board shall be composed of one (1) member from each affiliated association, the chairman of each standing board, and the current general officers of this association. Each member must be a member of an affiliated association and in good standing with the association of which he is a member. The members shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

The duties of this board shall be to meet one (1) day preceding the annual session of this association. This board shall serve as the credential committee with the duties and responsibilities assigned by Article V of this constitution. This board shall hear reports of all standing boards. It shall serve as budget committee and shall make such recommendations as deemed pertinent to this association. A complete and accurate record shall be kept of meetings of this board and a report shall be made in writing to this association in its annual session.

The moderator of the association shall serve as chairman of this board, and the clerk of the association shall serve as its clerk.

Section 3. BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION, MISSIONS AND EVANGELISM: This board shall be composed of seven (7) members who are members of affiliated associations and in good standing with the associations of which they are members. They shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

It shall be the duty of this board to labor to further the Gospel of Jesus Christ into the uttermost parts of the earth. In accomplishing this, they are to endeavor to establish missions and churches in communities within the bounds of this association with whatever moral and financial assistance that may be theirs. In cases of small churches failing to function, whatever assistance deemed appropriate shall be rendered to maintain the effective witness of that church by either direct labor with the church or with an associational board in instances where the affiliated association has a functional board or agency.

This board shall be empowered to receive and convey title to real property in the area of its labors.

The promotion of missionary endeavors from a local, state or national level shall come within the scope of endeavor of this board. This board shall assist in maintaining prayer and financial support of missionary enterprises through whatever channels available.

Whereas missionary and evangelistic labors are so intimately related, this board shall assist through participation or assistance in maintaining a strong evangelistic thrust in the life of affiliated association.

This board shall organize itself and elect such officers as necessary to the orderly conduct of its affairs and labors. This board shall keep an accurate record of all meetings, decisions, work done, funds received and disbursed and shall make a report in writing at each annual session of this association. All records shall be available to this association at its request.

Section 4. COLLEGE BOARD OF TRUSTEES: The College Board of Trustees shall be composed as provided for in the Articles of Incorporation of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc.

Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc. is an agency of the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists and is incorporated under the corporate laws of the State of Oklahoma. The articles of incorporation are a part of this association's record and delineate the purpose, duty and scope of endeavor of the members of this board.

Section 5. CHURCH TRAINING SERVICE BOARD: This board shall be composed of seven members who are members of affiliated associations and in good standing with the associations of which they are members. They shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

The duties of this board shall be to plan and assist in organizing and sustaining a strong Church Training Service in every church in each association affiliated with this association with every means of promotion and assistance available to them. This board shall plan, coordinate and conduct state-wide youth camps or camp.

This board shall organize itself and elect such officers as necessary to the orderly conduct of its affairs and labors. This board shall keep an accurate record of all meetings, decisions, work done, funds received and disbursed and shall make a report in writing at each annual session of this association. All records shall be available to this association at its request.

Section 6. SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD: This board shall be composed of seven (7) members who are members of affiliated associations and in good standing with the associations of which they are members. They shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

The duties of this board shall be to plan and promote Sunday schools in every church in each association affiliated with this association. This board shall use every available means to promote Sunday school clinics, seminars, institutes and conventions on local, district and state-wide basis, working with local agencies to distribute and employ all effective methods and material available.

This board shall organize itself and elect such officers as necessary to the orderly conduct of its affairs and labors. This board shall keep an accurate record of all meetings, decisions, work done, funds received and disbursed and shall make a report in writing at each annual session of this association. All records shall be available to this association at its request.

Section 7. VACANCIES: Vacancies shall occur when a member moves from the territorial bounds of this association, by death, by resignation or by removal from office by this association. In the event of disciplinary action where charges concerning misconduct, doctrine or practice shall have been lodged against a member of any board, his office shall be held in abeyance until such charges shall be concluded or as determined by this association.

All boards shall have power to fill vacancies arising between sessions of this association. Such appointment shall terminate at the next session of the association and shall be filled by this association.

Section 8. EMPLOYEES: All employees of boards or agencies of this association shall be employed by agreement or contract with employing board or agency upon approval of this association except those elected by this association and the conditions of their employment shall be those approved by this association.

The duties of the Executive Secretary of this association shall be:

- (1) He is to represent, or cause to be represented, the association at all affairs of interest to the association.

- (2) He is to promote the work of the association in such a manner so as to unify the efforts of the association.
- (3) He is to serve with all standing boards and committees of the association in an ex-officio capacity.
- (4) He is to aid in planning the work of the association by relating the activities and plans of one board to another.
- (5) He is to report to the association during each annual session.
- (6) He is to communicate to the affiliated members of this association the pressing causes and events before the association. This can be in person or by means of a periodical bulletin or both.
- (7) He shall serve as treasurer of this association. An accurate and complete record of all funds received and disbursed shall be kept and a written report shall be included in his report to this association in its annual session.
- (8) The conditions of employment shall be determined by the Executive Board.

ARTICLE IX

DISSOLUTION: Should this association cease to function, all properties and holdings shall go to the National Association of Free Will Baptists after all creditors are satisfied and indebtedness cleared.

ARTICLE X

AMENDMENTS: This constitution may be amended or altered at any regular session of the association by a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of members present and voting, provided proposed amendment or alteration be presented in writing to the body one (1) day in advance.

ARTICLE XI

SPECIAL SESSIONS: Elected delegates to the last session of this association shall be retained as standing delegates for special called sessions.
