## PROCEEDINGS

TUESDAY EVENING, October 14, 1980

The 72nd annual meeting of the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists meeting in the Civic Center Auditorium, Muskogee, Oklahoma began with a music interlude by the "Harvester's Quartet" of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College singing "Praise the Lord" and "He Wore My Crown."

Jerry Pilgrim led the congregation in singing "Jesus Saves" and "Stand up, Stand Up for Jesus" with Beverly Welch at the piano.

Jerry Dudley, Clerk, called the Association into official session and introduced the officers who will serve during this meeting: Odie Nunley, Assistant Clerk; Frank Giles, Assistant Moderator; and James Murray, Moderator.

James Murray brought the Moderator's message from the theme scripture, Esther 4:14, "Who knoweth whether thou art come to the kingdom for such a time as this." He developed the theme, "Decade of Destiny", closing with prayer for the session of the Association.

Jess D. Stepp, a local pastor, brought greetings and welcome to the Muskogee area.

Joe Conn, presiding over the service, introduced Joe Cutler for a special number in song, "I Will Go On" and then introduced the messenger of the hour, James Cearley.

After introductory remarks, E. E. Morris led the Association in prayer.

Using the theme scripture as a text, the sermon was delivered, "Destined to Maturity Through Consecration." A good message was received emphasizing Christian love, Christian dedication and consecration, leading us toward growth and maturity.

Leroy Welch led in prayer as the benediction.

## THE WEDNESDAY MORNING SESSION

The Wednesday morning session, October 15, 1980 was called to order with Jerry Pilgrim leading the Association in singing "Love Lifted Me" accompanied by Velma Cox at the piano.

Larry Haggard led in prayer for the Lord's blessing and guidance. The Association then sang "At the Cross."

Lonnie DaVoult made pertinent announcements regarding parking, registering, etc.

James Murray, Moderator, led in morning devotions using Matt. 7:28-29 as the scriptural basis. The devotional message "Why People Follow Jesus" was

most apt in the beginning of the business session emphasizing our need to follow the leadings of the Lord in all matters.

Jerry Dudley, Clerk, read Article III of the Constitution regarding representation, standing delegates and elected delegates. The Clerk then read the listed delegates from the member Associations and corrections as necessary were made. Motion carried to seat the delegates.

Visiting brethren from various states and messengers from other Associations and our National Offices were recognized and welcomed to sit in counsel with us.

A partial report of the General Board was read. Motion carried to adopt items one (1) and two (2). (See General Board report)

Clarence Shepherd, Chairman, gave the report of the Executive Board. Motion carried to receive the report and consider the recommendations item by item.

Recommendation No. 8. (delayed to election of officers)

(See General Board report)

Motion and second received that the Executive Board be instructed to relocate the Bookstore during the next year. Motion carried to amend by adding "and Executive Office." Motion carried to amend by adding "and a report be made item by item on location and all pertinent information at the next session." Motion carried to amend by deleting, "during the next year." The amended motion thus reads: "The Executive Board be instructed to relocate the Bookstore and Executive Office and a report be made item by item on location and all pertinent information at the next session."

Lonnie DaVoult, Executive Secretary, gave the report of the Executive Department. Motion carried to adopt the report.

The business session was recessed for Morning Worship and lunch.

### WEDNESDAY MORNING WORSHIP SERVICE

The Wednesday morning worship hour was called into service with Jerry Pilgrim leading the congregation in singing "Joy Unspeakable" with Velma Cox accompanying at the piano.

Edmond Warner, presiding, led the Association in prayer and then introduced Delbert Akin who delivered a special song, "Each Step I Take."

Roger Reed, Director of the National Association Sunday School Department, was introduced as the speaker for the service. From the theme, "Decade of Destiny" he developed the message "Destined to Minister through Proclama-

tion" using the scripture text of Matthew 28:19-20. A challenging message was delivered.

Announcements of available luncheon establishments were made.

A prayer of benediction was offered by Odie Nunley.

### WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON

The Wednesday afternoon business session was called together with singing "Leaning On Jesus" led by Jerry Pilgrim, accompanied by Ann Ketchum at the piano.

Danny Hester led in the afternoon devotions. He delivered a good devotional message from Acts 3:6 emphasizing "God is with us, touching, healing, empowering, and leading His servants." He closed by leading the Association in prayer.

The Moderator introduced Dr. Charles Thigpen, President of Free Will Baptist Bible College, who reported on the college and the anticipated opening of the "Graduate School of Theology" in the fall of 1982.

Ray Martin gave the report of Free Will Baptist Book Store. Motion carried to adopt the report.

Resolution No. 1 from the Resolution Committee was read. Motion and second was received to adopt the report. A motion to amend was received "that a nominating committee be utilized to screen nominees and make nominations." Motion carried to refer the resolution and the amendment to the Executive Board for study and report their recommendations to the Association in one (1) year. (See Resolution)

Bill Jones was elected as seven (7) year member of the Executive Board.

Dr. Melvin Worthington, Executive Secretary of the National Association, gave a report of the National Executive Department.

James Puckett gave the report of the State Sunday School Board. Motion carried to adopt the report. The Board announced that the 1981 Sunday School Convention is scheduled for September 18-19, 1981 with program personalities and placement to be announced later.

Dr. Roger Reed, Director of our National Sunday School Department, gave a report of that department, its literature, format, book publishing and printing facilities.

Vacancies on the Sunday School Board were filled with the election of: Richard Terry, 1 year member and Danny Hester, 7 year member.

Burton Perry gave the report of the State Home Mission, Church Extension and Evangelism Board. Home Missionaries, Buddy Drake, David Bigger, Curtis Linton, Gary Thomas and Jimmy Smith were introduced and each gave a brief report of their respective mission labors. Motion carried to adopt the report.

Trymon Messer, Assistant Director of National Home Missions Department, gave a glowing report of that department's ministries. He reported that Oklahoma was No. 1 in giving to National Home Missions.

Rolla Smith, Director of National Foreign Missions Department, gave a report of our Foreign Missions Department. A list of Oklahomans serving in foreign service was read. Deficits and exchange problems were noted as worldwide inflation has soared and dollar value shrinking in some areas has produced

a strain on the assets and abilities of the Board to minister in some areas. He reported that Oklahoma was No. 2 in giving to Foreign Missions.

Bob Ketchum was elected as the seven (7) year member to the State Mission Board. Upon election to this Board, Bob Ketchum resigned as six (6) year member of the Sunday School Board.

Earl Scroggins was elected as the six (6) year member to the Sunday School Board.

Charles Bigger gave the report of the C. T. S. Board. Motion carried to receive the report with the recommendation concerning the combination of the C. T. S. Board and the Sunday School Board to be considered separately. Motion carried to adopt the report and the recommendation. (See C. T. S. Board Report) The Moderator appointed the officers of each of the two (2) boards to serve as the committee requested.

Vacancies on the C. T. S. Board were filled. The Clerk read the resignation of Dennis Cariker from the Board. Elected to the Board were: Kent Hubbard, one (1) year member to fill the unexpired term of Richard Rust who had resigned during the year, Roger Ballard to fill the six (6) year term and Glenn Hood as the seven (7) year member.

A motion carried to give \$1,000.00 to the "Founders Club of the Graduate School of Theology." Lonnie DaVoult explained that there are funds in the Executive Department to comply.

Following announcements, Richard Terry led the body in prayer as a benediction on the afternoon business session which recessed for the day.

#### WEDNESDAY EVENING, October 15, 1980

A musical prelude to the evening service was provided by Ed Pack at the piano.

Don Payne, presiding, called the evening worship to order. Roy Bingham led the Association in prayer.

Ed Pack led the Association in singing, "There is Power in the Blood."

New Life Singers from Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College sang "Jesus is Coming," "God's Family," "The Day He Wore My Crown." Their tremendous rendition stirred many hearts by Spirit filled singing.

Ted Davis led the Association in prayer for a special outpouring of the Holy Spirit upon this hour's worship.

Don Payne recognized all former and present students, faculty, staff and board members of Hillsdale F.W.B. College. These were a majority of those present in this particular service. Reflections from former years were focused in the introduction of the speaker of the hour, a graduate of Hillsdale.

Jim Shepherd led in prayer for the message he was to deliver. From the theme "Decade of Destiny" and scripture theme of Esther 4:14a, he developed the message "Destined to Motivation through Education." Basing the text from Ezra 7:6-9, a tremendous, searching, stirring message was delivered.

An offering was received for Hillsdale F.W.B. College.

Prayer requests were shared and Roy Shepherd led all hearts in prayer for the Lord's benediction upon the hour of service.

## THURSDAY MORNING, October 16, 1980

The Moderator called the Association to order.

Jerry Pilgrim led the congregation in singing "Draw Me Nearer" with Waldo Young accompanying at the piano.

Bill Pitts led the Association in prayer.

Kenneth Brandon led our morning devotions. Using Luke 13:6-10 he brought forth the need for retrenching and getting about the business of bearing fruit for our Lord.

Herman Hersey, Director of the National Retirement and Insurance Department, gave a report of that department and announced that the department now had near \$2,000,000.00 in force. He announced that he and Bill Gardner would be traveling throughout the denomination giving concerts in behalf of the Department. At the end of his report, he gave a piano solo rendition of "When They Ring Those Golden Bells."

Ray Gwartney, Chairman, gave a report of the Hillsdale Board of Trustees.

Orville Hood, Business Administrator, gave the financial report of the college.

Don Elkins, President, gave a report of the current status and needs of Hillsdale. Motion carried to adopt the report.

Vacancies on the Board of Trustees were filled with the election of Richard Gallant and Jack Richey as five (5) year members to the Board.

Question raised from the floor as to whether an employee of a district association is an employee of an agency of the State Association. Motion carried to interpret a 1973 resolution concerning employees serving on boards to apply to State Association boards only.

The Clerk read the final report of the General Board. Motion carried to receive the report and adopt it item by item.

Item No. 3 (carried)

Item No. 4, Section 1 Motion and second that Hillsdale receive 28% and the State Mission Board receive 9%. (motion lost). Motion and second that Hillsdale receive 29% and the State Mission Board 8%. (motion lost) Motion and second that the State Mission Board receive 16% of the cooperative funds and reduce the National Association allocation to 30%. (Time lapsed for morning business during debate and business was declared in recess until after lunch by the Moderator.)

## THURSDAY MORNING WORSHIP SERVICE

Bill Pitts led the Association in singing "Victory in Jesus" accompanied by Waldo Young at the piano.

J. B. Chism, presiding, called the worship service to order and Leroy Welch led the Association in prayer.

J. B. Chism introduced the speaker of the hour, Rolla Smith, Director of the National Foreign Mission Department. The scripture theme Esther 4:13-14 was used to give basis to the overall theme "Decade of Destiny." The message entitled "Destined to Missions through Dedication" was thoughtful, scriptural

Whereas, there has been a problem in securing an appropriate date each year, and

Whereas, there are, at this time, adequate kitchen, dining, dormitory, recreational, and worship facilities available to the state, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED that the C. T. S. Board be instructed to work with the administration and the Board of Trustees of Hillsdale F. W. B. College to determine the feasibility and possibility of conducting state youth camps utilizing the facilities of the college. (Carried)

The Public Morals Committee makes the following report to the association.

1. We recommend that the State Association reaffirm our stand on alcohol and drugs as stated in the Treatise regarding the use and sale of alcohol and drugs, and that we continue our support for S.A.N.E.

2. Paramutual Betting

We recommend that the State Association go on record opposing the legalization of gambling in any form in that the Bible addresses it as sin.

3. Television

We recommend that we reaffirm the resolution concerning T.V. that was approved by the National Association of Free Will Baptists while meeting in Anaheim, California, 1980.

4. Abortion

We recommend that we affirm our stand on the sanctity of life and our opposition to abortion on demand. We heartily endorse the stand of the National Association adopted in the National Association in Anaheim, California, 1980.

5. Moral Standards

JUNE 30, 1980

(1). SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The State Association of Free Will Baptists is a non-profit organization designed to provide central leadership and representation for the Free Will Baptists of Oklahoma and to handle certain receipts and disbursements of the Free Will Baptist Church. The Association uses the fund method of accounting, whereby the fund balance represents the equity the Association has in its assets. This accounting method is generally accepted among non-profit organizations as the most feasible way of reflecting their financial activity and position.

The Association's property and equipment is depreciated on the straight-line basis using the following estimated useful lives:

Furniture, fixtures and equipment acquired subsequent to July 1, 1972	8 years
Furniture, fixtures and equipment acquired prior to July 1, 1972	3 years

(2) MORTGAGE RECEIVABLE

The executive residence was sold on May 30, 1974 for \$20,500. The buyer assumed the mortgage on the property and gave the Association a second mortgage on the property for \$10,300. Payments were to begin on July 1, 1974. The rate of interest is 8% and the mortgage is for thirty years. The Association does not have an amortization schedule on this loan and we were unable to verify the exact balance on this mortgage receivable.

(3) COOPERATIVE CONTRIBUTIONS

The Executive Office of the State Association was allocated 22% in 1980 and 22% in 1979 of cooperative contributions for the financing of its operations for the fiscal year.

## HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE BOARD OF TRUSTEES REPORT TO THE OKLAHOMA STATE ASSOCIATION

The 1979-80 school year at Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College will always be remembered by me. It marked my first year as President. I have certainly enjoyed the opportunity to serve the Lord and you in this capacity. It is great to have the privilege of meeting the people of this great state and the surrounding states. You have been so gracious in helping me to become orientated to the work here at Hillsdale College. I appreciate so much your prayers and thoughtfulness during the past school year. The future looks bright for the ministry here at Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College. Please pray for all of us as we labor for the cause of Christ.

Members of the faculty and librarian continue to develop their academic qualifications and skills. This is an important factor in maintaining a priority of academic excellence, and improving the status of our library.

The total number of students enrolled at Hillsdale during the fall semester of 1979 was 153. The total enrollment for the spring semester of 1980 was 150 students. A total of 52 students received degrees during the May 1980 Commencement exercises, making this Hillsdale's largest graduating class. Thirty-one students received their Associate in Arts degree, and twenty-one students received their Bachelor of Arts degree in Theology. (1) SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The College uses the fund method of accounting whereby an individual fund is a separate accounting entity made up of assets, liabilities, revenues, expenditures, transfers and a fund balance. This method of accounting is generally accepted among colleges and universities as the most effective means of controlling financial data.

Buildings and equipment are not depreciated by the College, which is an acceptable procedure for a non-profit organization.

It is with a great deal of appreciation that I send you this letter of thanks for what you have done for the Development Program of Free Will Baptist Bible College over the years. We are indeed grateful for every dollar you have invested here and for every prayer that you have prayed for this school.

Last year was a special year for us here in the Development Program. We had decided to take the year 1979 to raise \$225,000 in order to retire our short-term debts. Our people responded well and by the end of September we had gone over the \$225,000 figure with cash, commitments and checkbooks.

We are grateful to our people for this response. The great state of Oklahoma helped us and we are grateful to you.

This year and next year we are seeking to raise \$400,000 for a major expansion of Memorial Auditorium. The Auditorium has been extended in the back and front with a balcony installed, which has increased our seating capacity more than 50%.

The board has been busy. We have had six meetings with the full board and two conference calls arranged for the entire board plus countless committee activities to keep the work going and in good order.

The board is now responsible for five projects that are under way in Oklahoma. The missionary families who are on location are: Reverend and Mrs. Buddy Drake in Enid, Reverend and Mrs. David Bigger in Ponca City, Reverend and Mrs. Gary Thomas in Bartlesville, Reverend and Mrs. Curtis Linton in Lawton, and Reverend and Mrs. Jimmy Smith who are presently doing itinerant work to raise support with plans to go to Weatherford. We feel that we have a fine missionary family that is doing a superior work here in our state.

By the end of the year Enid will be on a self-sustaining basis. We are pleased with the progress of the work there. We have a beautiful church building and a valuable work. Our other churches are making great strides also. Property has been purchased in both Lawton and Bartlesville and construction should begin in

a few months on buildings there. We hope in the coming year we can report the other churches have reached a self-supporting level.

We want to urge you to give and pray for the Church Establishment Program (CEP). As you know, it is expensive to put a missionary on the field. Every year the cost goes up. We must pay the price, however, for souls are the most valuable possessions on this earth. The Lord emphasized this when He said, "What should it profit a man if he gain the whole world and lose his own soul." We must continue to win souls and establish churches if we are to fulfill the Great Commission.

We are thankful for the way our people have responded to our mission program. There is no way we could establish churches without your help. Your giving has placed Oklahoma in the forefront in giving to home missions among Free Will Baptists. We are proud of our people for this. YOUR MISSIONARIES serving in 8 foreign countries express their heartfelt thanks for your prayers and financial support. There are 94 foreign missionaries currently on the field and making Christ known in the regions beyond.

ALONG WITH General Director Rolla Smith, Director of Communications Don Robirds, Director of Finance Harold Critcher and the rest of our office staff, I want, once again, to say "thank you" for standing with us as we have labored to reach more of the world's population with the truth of God's redemptive plan through Jesus Christ our Lord.

TOTAL RECEIPTS FOR 1979 came to \$1,608,574.08. While we praise the Lord for an increase in income over that of 1978—we regret to inform you that we missed our 1979 quota by \$292,481.59.

MY PERSONAL ITINERARY saw many new churches joining in regular foreign missions support. Monthly faith promises from churches totaled \$10,941.23. Nearly half of this amount was new support. In addition to the monthly promises \$19,052.25 in cash was received during my travels. The missionaries deputation ministry during 1979 also brought gratifying results.

WOE be unto North American Christians if they forbear to deliver those of other lands who are "*slipping to the slaughter!*" Abraham Lincoln said, "*Those who deny freedom to others deserve it not for themselves, and under a just God cannot long retain it.*"

WOE be unto any church or denomination that builds great stately monuments of stone in this country, instead of sending the Gospel to the dark parts of the earth "to win for the Lamb the reward of His sufferings." A great evangelist says: "After fifty generations, only thirty-five per cent of the people on the earth have heard the Gospel. . . # **THE FREE WILL BAPTIST MASTER'S MEN State of Oklahoma CONSTITUTION**

## **PREAMBLE**

The purpose of the Free Will Baptist Master's Men, state of Oklahoma is to provide a means of Christian fellowship and to deepen the spiritual lives of the laymen of the local church. Also, to provide a means of developing the abilities and talents of the laymen, and to promote the cause of Christ through a complete, "total church program," as prescribed by Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists.

## **ARTICLE I NAME**

The name of this organization shall be known as the Free Will Baptist Master's Men, State of Oklahoma.

## **ARTICLE II MEMBERSHIP**

Section 1. The membership of this organization shall be composed of the district associations of Master's Men, and any local chapters where there is only

one chapter in the district, within the state of Oklahoma.

Section 2. Every member in good standing of an affiliated district association of Master's Men, or any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district, is entitled to the full benefits of membership.

Section 3. Each district association, or any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district, shall submit an annual, written report to this body, (as a matter of information).

### ARTICLE III OFFICERS

The officers of this organization shall consist of a president, vice-president and a secretary-treasurer.

The officers of this organization shall be elected annually and may succeed themselves, at this level.

### ARTICLE IV EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The executive committee shall consist of the elected officers of this organization and they shall serve as the program committee for each annual convention.

Section 2. Ex-officio members of the executive committee shall be the presidents of the district associations of Master's Men, presidents of any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district, and the state executive secretary of the State Association of Free Will Baptists.

### ARTICLE V MEETINGS

This organization shall meet annually at 7:30 P.M. on the Monday night before the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists convenes.

### ARTICLE VI AMENDMENTS

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of any regular meeting.

### BY-LAWS

#### VOTING RIGHTS

Section 1. Every member of each affiliated district association, or any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district, is eligible to vote on all questions and matters that might come before the Free Will Baptist Master's Men, State of Oklahoma.

## COMMITTEES

Section 2. The executive committee shall transact all routine business and shall act for the organization in the interim between meetings.

Section 3. The executive committee shall meet at the call of the president.

Section 4. A nominating committee, for the annual election of officers, shall be composed of the presidents of each district association, and the president of any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district.

Section 5. The president shall appoint all other committees, subject to the approval of the body.

## FINANCE

Section 6. This organization shall be financed on the basis of offerings, dues and assessments.

## QUORUM

Section 7. One-tenth of the members of this organization shall constitute a quorum at any regular meeting.

## AMENDMENTS

Section 8. These by-laws may be amended at any regular meeting by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

As adopted by the Free Will Baptist Master's Men, State of Oklahoma annual session, in Muskogee, Oklahoma October 19, 1970.

## CONSTITUTION OF MINISTER'S CONFERENCE

### ARTICLE 1

The Minister's Conference shall be called the Oklahoma State Free Will Baptist Minister's Conference, and shall be composed of Ordained Free Will Baptist Ministers who are regular members of some Orthodox Free Will Baptist church in the State of Oklahoma who have paid their \$1.00 dues.

### ARTICLE 2

The officers for this conference shall be President, Vice-President, and Clerk Treasurer, who shall be elected annually.

### ARTICLE 3

This conference shall have the power to discipline its members.

### ARTICLE 4

Members of this organization shall be all ordained ministers who participate in the benefits and activities of this body, and associate members who become members by payment of the \$1.00 annual dues.

## ARTICLE 5

This conference shall meet Semi-Annually.

## ARTICLE 6

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any regular session.

# BY-LAWS OF MINISTER'S CONFERENCE

## ARTICLE 1

The clerk or assistant clerk, or in their absence the senior minister in years shall call the ministers into conference. If a quorum is present the President or in his absence the Vice-President shall moderate the meeting. If neither of these are present, the senior minister in years shall be in charge.

## ARTICLE 2

It shall be the duty of the clerk to enroll the ministers of the conference. Ministers shall present themselves with proper evidence of their rights to seats therein, and those enrolled by the clerk shall compose the conference. In case of questionable representation the case under question shall be referred to the Credential Committee.

## ARTICLE 3

It shall be the duty of each minister belonging to this conference, to be active in pastoral or evangelistic services (disabled or retired ministers excepted). Any minister belonging to this conference shall report in each session in person or by letter, and failing to do so for two successive sessions shall be subject to discipline.

## ARTICLE 4

Each conference shall be opened by reading a portion of God's word and prayer, and each session shall be closed with prayer.

## ARTICLE 5

By a two-thirds vote of the members present ruling of the President may be overruled.

## ARTICLE 6

This conference shall sit with open doors, except when it shall go into a committee as a whole.

## ARTICLE 7

No member shall absent himself from the conference during its meeting without permission from the President.

## ARTICLE 8

No person shall be allowed to nominate more than one member of a committee, unless person nominated is not elected.

## ARTICLE 9

The President shall not allow discussion when not carried on in a Christian Spirit, or when he thinks it will cause discord.

## ARTICLE 10

Anyone desiring to speak shall rise and address the President by the appellation "Brother President," but shall not speak further until recognized.

## ARTICLE 11

No member of this conference shall be allowed to speak more than five minutes, nor twice on the same subject without permission from the President.

## ARTICLE 12

These By-Laws may be altered or amended at any regular or adjourned session of this conference by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

# **HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE, INC. BY-LAWS BOARD OF TRUSTEES**

## SECTION I

The Board of Trustees of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc., an Oklahoma corporation, shall be composed of fifteen members, elected as provided in the Articles of Incorporation of said College, as amended:

**ARTICLE A—OFFICERS:** The officers of the Board of Trustees shall be a Chairman, an Assistant Chairman, and a Secretary, each of whom shall be elected by the Board for a term of one year. They shall continue in office until their successors have been chosen:

**Item 1—CHAIRMAN:** The chairman of the Board of Trustees or his assistant shall preside at all meetings of the Board. He shall be an ex-officio member of the Executive Committee.

**Item 2—SECRETARY:** The Secretary shall record and preserve minutes of all meetings and acts of the Board of Trustees and countersign all deeds, conveyances, and other papers authorized by the Board. He shall have authority to call special meetings of the Trustees of the College upon the written request of two-thirds of the members of the Board; he shall mail notice of said meeting to the trustees ten (10) days in advance.



Item 3—EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE: The Executive Committee shall consist of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, the Vice-Chairman of the Board, the Secretary of the Board. The Executive Committee shall have authority to consider and act upon all questions affecting the College which may be brought before it between the stated meetings of the Board, or a quorum of the Board fails to attend a called or regular meeting. It shall transact such business as may be committed to it by the Board and shall act for the College on such matters as it may submit to it. The Committee shall meet at the call of the Chairman or the President of the College.

ARTICLE B—MEETINGS: The Board of Trustees shall meet each year at a time and place agreed upon by the Board. It shall, also, hold special meetings whenever called in accordance with the By-Laws of the Board. Such special meetings may be called by either the chairman of the Board, or the President of the College.

ARTICLE C—QUORUM: A majority of the members or the Board of Trustees of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc. in attendance at any called or regular meeting, written notice of which has been mailed by the Secretary to each trustee, shall constitute a quorum. No proxy votes shall be permitted. No ex-officio member shall be entitled to vote at meetings of the Board of Trustees.

ARTICLE D—ELECTIONS: In all elections held by the Board of Trustees each member present except ex-officio members shall be entitled to one vote, and the result shall be determined by a majority of the votes cast. Due notice of any election must be personal notice to the members or a day on the minutes of the Board not less than one week preceding the election.

## SECTION II

### OFFICERS OF HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE

The officers of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College shall be a President, Vice-President, Dean, and a Business Manager, each of whom shall be elected by the Board of Trustees to hold office for two years exclusive of the President whose term of office shall be indefinite. It is provided, however, that retirement of any one of the officers herein named may occur at any time upon the resignation of the officer or the request of the Board. In either case, notice shall be given six weeks before the date of the proposed retirement unless otherwise agreed upon by the concerned parties.

ITEM ONE—PRESIDENT: The President shall be executive officer of the Board of Trustees and shall have general control of the College including its officers, teachers, students, and business. He shall render to the Board complete annual reports and to its chairman, Executive Committee or other committees such information as may be deemed essential to a thorough knowledge of the operation of the College and its promotion. He shall be a member of the Board of Trustees ex-officio and the Executive Committee ex-officio and shall have the rights and privileges of a member of the Board except voting. The President shall execute all documents, instruments, and conveyances on behalf of the College. Duties of the president and working relationship shall be further detailed in a format approved by the Board of Trustees.

ITEM TWO—VICE PRESIDENT: The Vice-President shall perform all the duties of the President in the absence of the latter.

**ITEM THREE—DEAN:** The Academic Dean of the College shall, under the President, fix the hours of recitation, govern, control, and regulate the conduct of the students, have general oversight of curriculum, student's records, and such other internal details and administrative duties as may be delegated to him by the President of the College.

**ITEM FOUR—BUSINESS MANAGER:** The Treasurer shall keep an accurate record of all accounts of the College and shall receive and expend as directed by the Board of Trustees and President, all money for the expenses of the institution. He shall make an annual report to the Board and furnish the Executive Committee with such information pertaining to his office as may be requested. He shall provide bond in whatever amount the Board may require. Until such times as the Board of Trustees may deem different the Treasurer's office shall be contained within the Business Manager's Office. The Business Manager may at the direction of the administration designate this duty to a subordinate officer. The Business Manager shall have general supervision of the financial business of the College, and shall, at the direction of the President, be responsible for the upkeep of all the physical facilities and premises of the College. His detailed duties are directed in a format approved by the Board of Trustees.

### **SECTION III FACULTY**

The faculty shall consist of the President, the Dean, and all teachers of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College. Instructors and assistant teachers shall have the privilege of sitting with the faculty in stated meetings but shall not have the right of voting.

It shall be the policy of the College to employ on its faculty those who are members of Free Will Baptist churches that are affiliated with the National Association. Emergencies, however arising from the resignation, illness, death, or approved leaves of absence of faculty members may be relieved by the temporary employment of instructors who are affiliated with any evangelical denomination. Part-time or short-term instructors, deemed essential to the successful prosecution of a consistent education program, may be employed at the discretion of the President without respect of denominational affiliation.

The faculty, under the authority and jurisdiction of the President, shall have general charge of instruction, attendance of students, examinations, administration of curriculum, discipline, and all matters involving the spiritual, physical, and social welfare of the College. The faculty shall be hired upon recommendation of the President.

In the selection of the faculty qualitative factors shall be kept in mind. All faculty members shall be urged to pursue graduate programs in their respective fields. Except in special cases no faculty member will be required to teach courses outside of his field.

### **SECTION IV ACADEMIC COUNCIL**

The Academic Council shall consist of the President, the Dean and the heads of the departments of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College: It shall deter-

mine the curriculum and academic policy of the College, prescribe requirements for admissions, certificates, diplomas, and degrees, and supervise the courses of instruction offered by the various departments of the College.

## **SECTION V CONTRACTS**

The Board of Trustees shall establish the College policy involving the execution of contracts, deeds of conveyance, the determination of salaries, and employment of all officers, representatives, faculty members and essential domestic and maintenance employees. The President of the College shall negotiate agreements, executive contracts, employ representatives, and supply vacancies incurred by the termination of contracts, resignations, or death of any essential employees. All contracts for building construction shall be let only to persons or corporations posting a valid performance bond and recording the same in the Office of the County Clerk of Cleveland County, Oklahoma.

## **SECTION VI ADVISORY COUNCIL**

An advisory council shall be formed which is to be composed of interested, qualified persons in the various fields which will be of value in building and maintaining a strong academic program to carry out the educational program stated in the charter.

## **SECTION VII AMENDMENT**

These By-Laws may be amended by a favorable vote of two-thirds of the qualified members of the Board of Trustees of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College at any meeting of the Board, provided that the proposed amendment has been submitted in writing to each Trustee one month in advance. This change to be subject to the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists.

## **SECTION VIII ADMINISTRATIVE FUNCTIONS**

The President of the Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College shall be elected by the Board of Trustees, and he shall act for and on behalf of the Board in the conduct and management of the institution. He shall also be a member of the Board of Trustees ex-officio and of the Executive committee, ex-officio, and his duties, powers and term of office shall be prescribed in the by-laws of the College and a format approved by the Board of Trustees.

## **ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF THE HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE, INC.**

Know all men by these presents, that, we whose names are hereunto subscribed, do hereby associate ourselves together for the purpose of forming a cor-

poration under the provisions of the corporation laws of the State of Oklahoma, and for that purpose state:

## ARTICLE ONE

The name of this corporation shall be HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE, INC.

## ARTICLE TWO

The purpose of this corporation shall be the creation, establishment and maintenance of a college and institution of higher learning devoted to the promotion and impartation of higher learning, Christian education and such other education, instruction, learning, training and research as may be deemed essential for the cause of Christ and to that end prescribe courses of study and grant degrees. The doctrinal and theological position of this institution shall be that of the sponsoring denomination, Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists and the treatise of the National Association of Free Will Baptist as endorsed by the state body, and in connection therewith, in accordance with the stipulation of the Constitution and By-laws of the State Association of Free Will Baptists, Inc.

(a.) To prescribe courses of study for both resident and correspondence students, which shall include general education in the arts, Christian Ministries of Service and Biblical studies for wisdom; said courses to be taught in both a Junior College Division and a Bible College Division, and to award degrees, either graduate or post-graduate, to those persons satisfactorily completing the prescribed courses of study and to grant such other literary honors, including honorary degrees, as shall be deemed advisable.

(b.) To charge and collect tuition as determined by the Board of Trustees and to create scholarships.

(c.) To employ professors, instructors and other subordinate employees as may be necessary for the proper conduct of the college under the direction and control of the President of the College, with the advice and consent of the majority of the Board of Trustees.

(d.) To institute and carry on missions and commissions for missionary purposes and investigations.

(e.) To publish and distribute such pamphlets, literature or books as may be required in the conduct of such work and the general promotion of the College.

(f.) To sue and be sued in its corporate name and to enter into contracts of every type and nature.

(g.) To solicit support, receive, collect, hold and receive by gift or bequest personal property in any amount, money or other thing of value; to purchase real estate, to receive real estate that may be given, or devised to the college for achieving the legitimate ends of the college and to sell or mortgage the same as the need arises.

(h.) To borrow money in payment of property for erecting buildings and making improvements and for any other purpose germane to the objectives and purposes of the college.

(i.) To issue notes, bonds, debentures and other evidences of indebtedness and execute mortgages, liens and other incumbrances upon the property of the

corporation, real or otherwise, to secure the payment of any such evidences of indebtedness.

(j.) To transact any and all business connected with said College as may be necessary to achieve the purposes of said College.

(k.) To obtain under Internal Revenue Laws of the United States and of the Revenue Laws of the State of Oklahoma exemption from income property and other forms of taxation.

### ARTICLE THREE

The location of this corporation shall be in Moore, Oklahoma.

### ARTICLE FOUR

The duration of this corporation shall be perpetual.

### ARTICLE FIVE

The general control of this corporation shall be vested in a Board of Trustees consisting of 16 members, 10 of which shall be elected by the delegates to the annual Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists—each of which shall serve for a term of 5 years, and until his successor is elected and qualified. Two members shall be elected at each annual sitting of the State Association for the expiring five year term and vacancies that occur on the board. One member each shall be elected by the delegates to the annual meeting of the State Association of Free Will Baptists of the states of Arkansas, Colorado, Kansas, Missouri, New Mexico, and Texas, each of which serve for a term designated by the states they represent.

### ARTICLE SIX

An executive committee consisting of the Chairman, Vice Chairman, and Secretary of the Board of Trustees shall possess all powers of the Board of Trustees between the stated meetings of the Board of Trustees.

### ARTICLE SEVEN

All contracts for building construction shall be let only to persons or corporations posting a valid performance bond and recording the same in the office of the County Clerk of Cleveland County, Oklahoma.

### SECTION IX AMENDMENTS

This charter may be hereafter amended subject to the provisions contained herein and the laws of the State of Oklahoma. It is provided, however, that the Trustees of the College shall not propose or apply for any amendment which has not been previously authorized by an act of the Oklahoma State Association.

# **OKLAHOMA STATE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY CONVENTION CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS**

## **ARTICLE I**

### **NAME**

This organization shall be known as the Oklahoma State Woman's Auxiliary Convention.

## **ARTICLE II**

### **PURPOSE**

The purpose of this convention shall be to bring the women of each district convention together for fellowship, sharing information, and encouraging one another in the work of the Lord.

## **ARTICLE III**

### **OFFICERS**

The Officers of this convention shall be a president, vice president, secretary, assistant secretary, treasurer, and field worker. These shall serve on the state executive committee together with three members elected by the convention as desired. These shall serve for a period of 2 years.

## **ARTICLE IV**

### **MEMBERSHIP**

This convention shall be composed of the officers of the convention together with each active auxiliary member of the district or local (duly accredited by the credentials committee).

## **ARTICLE V**

### **MEETINGS**

The annual meeting shall be held each year on the day preceding the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists and at the place designated by said Association.

## **ARTICLE VI**

### **AMENDMENTS**

This constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the convention by a two-thirds vote of members present.

## **BY-LAWS**

## **ARTICLE I**

### **DUTIES OF OFFICERS**

Section 1, President. The president shall preside over all meetings, appoint such committees as may be needed, call the executive committee together when necessary, be ex-officio member of all committees, and serve as chairman of the executive committee, see that reports are made promptly to the national secretary and perform all duties usually pertaining to such an office.

Section 2, Vice President. The vice president shall preside in the absence of the president or by her request and otherwise assist her in the overseeing of the work in general.

Section 3, Secretary. The secretary shall keep an accurate record of all proceedings of the convention and executive meetings, preserve all valuable papers and turn same over to her successor in office, and make an annual report to the national secretary on a form available from the WNAC office. She shall compile the districts slates of officers and addresses immediately after the convention. She shall also send a slate of state officers and addresses to the national executive secretary. She is chairman of the Credentials Committee.

The secretary shall also serve as historian keeping an historical record and submitting historical information to the national executive secretary annually.

Section 4, Assistant Secretary. The assistant Secretary shall assist the secretary in recording proceedings of convention and executive committee meetings and shall aid the secretary in all her work as needed.

Section 5, Treasurer. The treasurer shall have charge of all funds belonging to this convention and shall pay out same only when authorized by the convention. The treasurer shall keep an accurate account and shall give a written report of all funds received and disbursed at each annual meeting of the convention. She shall also send an annual report to the WNAC office (executive secretary-treasurer) at least ten days before the end of the fiscal year. She shall encourage support of missions through the WNAC Gift Plan, individual giving and special offerings.

Section 6, Field Worker. The field worker shall have charge of all field work pertaining to, or necessary to, the promotion of the work of the convention and keep the national program before the district officers.

## ARTICLE II

### ELECTIONS

The general officers shall be nominated by a nominating committee and shall be elected by acclamation, unless there are other nominations. In case of more than one nominee for any particular office, a vote will be taken on each. All elections shall be held at the closing business session of the convention.

## ARTICLE III

### EXPENSES

Section 1. An appropriation of 18 cents per mile toward the expense of the general officers, when called upon to attend the executive committee meeting to plan program, secretary's expenses, phone calls, postage and stationery for officers will be paid by the convention. All field promotional work is subject to the state executive committee, who should approve all work done by state officers in the interest of state work, as well as expenses of the same.

Section 2. An amount of \$100.00 shall be paid on the expense of the state president to attend WNAC. If the president is unable to go to WNAC that we give the \$100.00 for this purpose to whomever goes in her place providing she is a state officer.

Section 3. The auditing committee shall be paid mileage the same as the executive committee.

## ARTICLE IV

### COMMITTEES

Section 1. Executive Committee—The executive committee shall be composed of the five officers and three members elected by the convention. Five of these shall compose a quorum. They shall hold meetings for the transaction of business as often as necessary. It shall be the duty of the executive committee to maintain an overseeing of the work at large. They shall act for the convention when necessary. They shall meet with district presidents the night preceding the state auxiliary convention. They will send out a newsletter with expenses paid by the State Treasury.

Section 2. Resolutions Committee—A resolutions committee of five members shall be appointed by the president as needed.

Section 3. Nominating Committee—The nominating committee shall be composed of at least one member from each district convention. Nominations shall be submitted by district with their annual report. These elected by the body at the annual meeting.

Section 4. Credentials Committee—The secretary shall be chairman of the credentials committee, and other members may be appointed by the president. The treasurer shall be a standing member of this committee.

Section 5. Finance Committee—The finance committee shall be appointed by the president. This committee audits the financial records of the year and reports on same to the convention.

Section 6. Registration committee shall be provided by the district convention which is host to state convention.

## ARTICLE V

### FEES AND REPORTS

Active members shall pay dues of \$1.50 per year. With 25 cents remaining in the district, \$1.25 to be forwarded to state where 25 cents shall be retained, and \$1.00 forwarded to WNAC as required for membership fees. It shall be the duty of each body directly affiliated with the State Auxiliary Convention to send a report to every annual session.

## ARTICLE VI

### AMENDMENTS

These by-laws may be amended by a two-thirds vote of members present at regular meeting of the state auxiliary convention.

## ARTICLE VII

### GIFTS

The desired plans for giving in the Woman's Auxiliary are those adopted by WNAC as follows:

1. Mission offerings following each special season of prayer
2. Co-Laborer offering (monthly or quarterly designated to WNAC General Fund)
3. WNAC Emphasis Month in August or other time more convenient to help in support of WNAC General Fund



4. Memorial Student Loan Fund (special program and offering in September to assist worthy and needy students at FWBBC in Nashville)
5. Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College Student Loan Fund. (Special program and offering in September to assist worthy and needy students at Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College)
6. Tithes—Pay tithes on all undesignated money received
7. All offerings are to be forwarded through regular channels.

## ARTICLE VIII

### WNAC DELEGATE

Each district convention shall submit one nomination for a State delegate to WNAC with their annual report. This nomination (along with others as needed to make up 15 delegates to WNAC) shall be elected by the body at the annual meeting. It shall be the duty of delegates elected to notify president if they cannot attend WNAC. President shall appoint delegates as needed in absence of regular elected delegates.

## ARTICLES OF FAITH OF STATE ASSOCIATION

6. **THE SINFULNESS OF MAN**—Man was created innocent, but by disobedience fell into a state of sin and condemnation. His posterity, therefore inherited a fallen nature of such tendencies that all who come to years of accountability, sin and become guilty before God.

7. **THE WORK OF CHRIST**—The Son of God, by His incarnation, life, suffering, death, and resurrection effected for all a redemption from sin that is full and free and is the ground of salvation by faith.

8. **THE WORK OF SALVATION**—The conditions of salvation are:

1. Repentance or sincere sorrow for sin and the hearty renunciations of it.
2. Faith or the unreserved committal of one's self to Christ as Saviour and Lord, with purpose to love and obey Him in all things. In the exercise of saving faith the soul is renewed by the Holy Spirit; freed from the dominion of sin and becomes a child of God.
3. Continuance in faith and obedience until death.

9. **ELECTION**—God determined from the beginning to save all who should comply with the conditions of salvation. Hence by faith in Christ, men become His elect.

10. **FREEDOM OF WILL**—The Human will is free and self controlled, having power to yield to the influence of the truth and the Spirit and live, or to resist them and perish.

11. **SALVATION FREE**—God desires the salvation of all, the Gospel invites all, the Holy Spirit strives with all, and whosoever will may come and take the water of life freely.

12. **PERSEVERENCE**—All believers in Christ, who through grace persevere in holiness to the end of life, have the promise of eternal salvation.

13. **BACKSLIDING AND APOSTASY**—A person who has been regenerated or born again and is living in unconfessed, unforgiven sin, is rebellious to the principles of the Kingdom of God and His righteousness, and therefore is a backslider in a lost condition who must repent and be restored to the right relationship with God or be eternally lost.

We recognize, according to Hebrews 6:4-6, that it is possible for a person to get in the condition that he could never return to Christ. This, we believe, is Apostasy; However, we also recognize that a regenerate person can fall into sin, be in a lost condition and still not be an Apostate. This person, through repentance, can be reconciled to God.

14. **GOSPEL ORDINANCES**—Baptism, or the immersion of believers in water, and the Lord's Supper, are ordinances to be perpetuated under the Gospel; Feet Washing, an ordinance teaching humility, of universal obligation, and to be administered to all true believers.

15. **TITHING**—God commanded tithes and offerings in the Old Testament; Jesus Christ endorsed in the Gospel (Matt. 23:23), and the Apostle Paul said, "Upon the first day of the week let every one of you lay by him in store as God hath prospered him." 1 Cor. 16:2.

16. **THE CHRISTIAN SABBATH**—The divine law requires that one day in seven be set apart from the secular employment and amusements for rest, worship, holy works and activities, and for personal communion with God.

17. **RESURRECTION, JUDGMENT, AND FINAL RETRIBUTION**—The Scriptures teach the resurrection of all men at the last day. They that have done good will come forth to the resurrection of life, and they that have done evil unto the resurrection of damnation: then the wicked shall "Go away into eternal punishment but the righteous into eternal life."

## **RULES OF ORDER**

1. At every sitting of the Association, business shall be opened and concluded by prayer by the Moderator or whomever he may request.

2. Ministers and deacons present are invited to seats, allowed to take part in debates on all subjects, and to vote.
3. Those who speak shall rise and address the Moderator. Personal reflections shall be avoided in all debates.
4. No motion may be discussed until made and seconded.
5. When a motion has been made and seconded, and a member opposes its discussion, the Moderator shall put the question, "Shall it be discussed?" If negative, the question shall not be discussed.
6. If any proposition or motion under debate contains two or more points, it shall be divided at the request of any member, and the vote taken separately.
7. Motions made and lost shall not be recorded.
8. No one shall speak more than twice on the same subject without special leave of the Moderator.
9. All questions shall be decided by a majority vote of all Members present.

## BY-LAWS OF STATE ASSOCIATION

1. The Clerk or assistant clerk, or in their absence, the senior minister in years shall call the Association into conference, and if a quorum is present the moderator, or in his absence, the assistant moderator shall take charge; and if neither of them is present the senior minister in years shall act as Moderator.
2. It shall be the duty of the clerk to enroll the delegates to the Association, who shall present themselves with proper evidence of their rights to seats therein, and those enrolled by the clerk shall compose the Association.
3. It shall be the duty of every District belonging to this Association to send a letter to every annual session of this Association reporting in the same spiritual condition, benevolent work, and its statistics. Any District belonging to this Association, which shall fail to report itself for two successive sessions, may be dismissed from the Association by a two thirds vote of all members present.
4. Each meeting shall be opened by reading a portion of the Bible and with prayer, and shall be closed with prayer.
5. By a two-thirds vote of members present, a ruling of the moderator can be overruled.
6. This Association may correspond by messenger or otherwise with other religious bodies.
7. This Association shall sit with open doors except when it shall go into a committee of the whole.
8. Any person not a member of this Association may be allowed to take part in its discussions by obtaining permission from the moderator.
9. It shall be the duty of all the Association to be present at the time appointed for each meeting, and anyone wishing to retire shall first obtain leave of the moderator.
10. No person shall be allowed to nominate more than one member of any committee, provided the person nominated be elected.
11. The moderator shall not allow discussions when not carried on in a Christian spirit or when he thinks it will cause discord or division.

12. Anyone desiring to speak shall rise to his feet and address the moderator by the appellation "Brother Moderator," but shall not speak further until recognized by the moderator.

13. No member of this association shall be allowed to speak more than ten minutes nor twice on the same subject without permission from the moderator.

14. This association shall meet annually beginning on Tuesday following the second Sunday in October.

15. These By-Laws may be altered or amended at any regular or adjourned session of this Association by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

## **CONSTITUTION OF STATE ASSOCIATION**

**PREAMBLE:** From long experience, we the members of the Free Will Baptist denomination, being regularly baptized upon a profession of our faith in Jesus Christ, and realizing the necessity of a bond in union and fellowship among us as a church; and to preserve and maintain correspondence and co-ordination with us, do therefore ordain this Constitution for our better denomination government.

### **ARTICLE I**

**NAME:** This organization shall be known as the OKLAHOMA STATE ASSOCIATION OF FREE WILL BAPTISTS.

### **ARTICLE II**

**PURPOSE:** The object and purpose of this organization shall be to unify the work of the various bodies composing this State Association, and to devise and execute measures for the extension of the Kingdom of God in connection with the various bodies in the Association, or that may hereafter be represented therein.

### **ARTICLE III**

**REPRESENTATION:** Section 1. This Association shall be composed of all ordained ministers and deacons with membership in some local church which is a member of a district Association with membership in the State Association.

Section 2: Each District Association shall be entitled to a number of elected delegates equal with the number of churches composing said Association. These delegates may be recommended by the local churches and shall be endorsed by their district association.

### **ARTICLE IV**

**FINANCE:** Each Association shall contribute \$20.00 per Church for support of the Association and delegate fees.

### **ARTICLE V**

**DISCIPLINE:** This State Association shall have the right to settle any question of discipline, doctrine or practices that may properly come before it from any of the bodies composing said organization; furthermore, if there be any question

of discipline, doctrine or practices on the part of an affiliated association, delegates of that association shall not be seated until these questions have been settled to the satisfaction of the General Board.

Section 2: Decisions of the General Board may be appealed in this manner. All appeals shall come before the State Association when sitting in a committee as a whole.

## ARTICLE VI

**OFFICERS:** A. The officers of the State Association shall consist of a Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, and an Executive Secretary. Each of these shall be elected at the close of each regular session except the Executive Secretary.

B. (1) The Executive Secretary shall be elected for a two year tenure. It shall be the responsibility of the Executive Board to seek out a prospective candidate and make their recommendation to the body at the state association in its regular session, with privilege of nominations from the floor.

(2) In the event of a vacancy occurring during the course of the year, the Executive Board shall fill the vacancy until the annual setting of the association.

## ARTICLE VII

**BOARDS:** All standing boards shall be composed of seven (7) elected members who shall serve terms of 7, 6, 5, 4, 3, 2 and 1 years with such ex-officio members as may be provided elsewhere, except: (1) the General Board which shall be composed of one (1) member from each affiliated association, the chairman of each standing board, and the current general officers of this association, and (2) the College Board of Trustees which shall be composed as provided for in the Articles of Incorporation of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc.

The standing boards of this association shall be: Executive Board; Board of Church Extension, Missions and Evangelism; Sunday School Board; Church Training Service Board; and College Board of Trustees.

No standing board shall meet in a functional meeting during the session of this association.

## ARTICLE VIII

### DUTIES, SCOPE OF ENDEAVOR AND QUALIFICATIONS OF STANDING BOARDS

Section 1. **EXECUTIVE BOARD:** The Executive Board shall be composed of seven (7) members who are members of an affiliated association and in good standing with the association of which they are members. They shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

It shall be the duty of this board to act in behalf of the association when it is not in session. It shall be bound to carry out the directions of the association and shall hold itself bound by every consideration of morality and honor to carry out the wishes of this association and to act under its instructions in whatever technical rights, civil laws and the decisions of courts may give it in certain emergencies. It shall be the duty of this board to sign their signatures to any and all papers concerning properties, indebtedness, bonds, or other legal documents

pertaining to the execution of the will of this association, exclusive of the College Board of Trustees.

This board shall have the oversight of the Executive Department of this association. The members shall assist and direct such work for the general promotion of this association as is deemed needful or necessary as the means available shall permit. The Executive Department shall serve as the coordinating agency of this association to correlate the work of all standing boards and agencies.

This board shall have the oversight of Free Will Baptist Book Store and shall endeavor to serve affiliated associations and churches and the community with literature and church supplies. Merchandising procedures shall be those accepted as normal retail procedures with the board being cognizant of the spiritual contribution of the store in distributing Christian literature.

All decisions of this board shall be governed by the general tenets of this association and shall not violate this constitution.

This board shall organize itself and elect such officers as necessary to the orderly conduct of its affairs and labors. This board shall keep an accurate record of all meetings, decisions, and work done and shall make a report in writing at each annual session of this association. All records shall be available to this association at its request.

Whereas this board represents the association when not in session, it and it alone shall have the power to call the association into special conference provided each affiliated association shall be given notice at least ten (10) days prior to the meeting of such special conference.

**Section 2. GENERAL BOARD:** This board shall be composed of one (1) member from each affiliated association, the chairman of each standing board, and the current general officers of this association. Each member must be a member of an affiliated association and in good standing with the association of which he is a member. The members shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

The duties of this board shall be to meet one (1) day preceding the annual session of this association. This board shall serve as the credential committee with the duties and responsibilities assigned by Article V of this constitution. This board shall hear reports of all standing boards. It shall serve as budget committee and shall make such recommendations as deemed pertinent to this association. A complete and accurate record shall be kept of meetings of this board and a report shall be made in writing to this association in its annual session.

The moderator of the association shall serve as chairman of this board, and the clerk of the association shall serve as its clerk.

**Section 3. BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION, MISSIONS AND EVANGELISM:** This board shall be composed of seven (7) members who are members of affiliated associations and in good standing with the associations of which they are members. They shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

It shall be the duty of this board to labor to further the Gospel of Jesus Christ into the uttermost parts of the earth. In accomplishing this, they are to endeavor to establish missions and churches in communities within the bounds of



this association with whatever moral and financial assistance that may be theirs. In cases of small churches failing to function, whatever assistance deemed appropriate shall be rendered to maintain the effective witness of that church by either direct labor with the church or with an associational board in instances where the affiliated association has a functional board or agency.

This board shall be empowered to receive and convey title to real property in the area of its labors.

The promotion of missionary endeavors from a local, state or national level shall come within the scope of endeavor of this board. This board shall assist in maintaining prayer and financial support of missionary enterprises through whatever channels available.

Whereas missionary and evangelistic labors are so intimately related, this board shall assist through participation or assistance in maintaining a strong evangelistic thrust in the life of affiliated association.

This board shall organize itself and elect such officers as necessary to the orderly conduct of its affairs and labors. This board shall keep an accurate record of all meetings, decisions, work done, funds received and disbursed and shall make a report in writing at each annual session of this association. All records shall be available to this association at its request.

**Section 4. COLLEGE BOARD OF TRUSTEES:** The College Board of Trustees shall be composed as provided for in the Articles of Incorporation of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc.

Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc. is an agency of the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists and is incorporated under the corporate laws of the State of Oklahoma. The articles of incorporation are a part of this association's record and delineate the purpose, duty and scope of endeavor of the members of this board.

**Section 5. CHURCH TRAINING SERVICE BOARD:** This board shall be composed of seven members who are members of affiliated associations and in good standing with the associations of which they are members. They shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

The duties of this board shall be to plan and assist in organizing and sustaining a strong Church Training Service in every church in each association affiliated with this association with every means of promotion and assistance available to them. This board shall plan, coordinate and conduct state-wide youth camps or camp.

This board shall organize itself and elect such officers as necessary to the orderly conduct of its affairs and labors. This board shall keep an accurate record of all meetings, decisions, work done, funds received and disbursed and shall make a report in writing at each annual session of this association. All records shall be available to this association at its request.

**Section 6. SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD:** This board shall be composed of seven (7) members who are members of affiliated associations and in good standing with the associations of which they are members. They shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

The duties of this board shall be to plan and promote Sunday schools in every church in each association affiliated with this association. This board shall use every available means to promote Sunday school clinics, seminars, institutes

and conventions on local, district and state-wide basis, working with local agencies to distribute and employ all effective methods and material available.

This board shall organize itself and elect such officers as necessary to the orderly conduct of its affairs and labors. This board shall keep an accurate record of all meetings, decisions, work done, funds received and disbursed and shall make a report in writing at each annual session of this association. All records shall be available to this association at its request.

**Section 7. VACANCIES:** Vacancies shall occur when a member moves from the territorial bounds of this association, by death, by resignation or by removal from office by this association. In the event of disciplinary action where charges concerning misconduct, doctrine or practice shall have been lodged against a member of any board, his office shall be held in abeyance until such charges shall be concluded or as determined by this association.

All boards shall have power to fill vacancies arising between sessions of this association. Such appointment shall terminate at the next session of the association and shall be filled by this association.

**Section 8. EMPLOYEES:** All employees of boards or agencies of this association shall be employed by agreement or contract with employing board or agency upon approval of this association except those elected by this association and the conditions of their employment shall be those approved by this association.

The duties of the Executive Secretary of this association shall be:

- (1) He is to represent, or cause to be represented, the association at all affairs of interest to the association.
- (2) He is to promote the work of the association in such a manner so as to unify the efforts of the association.
- (3) He is to serve with all standing boards and committees of the association in an ex-officio capacity.
- (4) He is to aid in planning the work of the association by relating the activities and plans of one board to another.
- (5) He is to report to the association during each annual session.
- (6) He is to communicate to the affiliated members of this association the pressing causes and events before the association. This can be in person or by means of a periodical bulletin or both.
- (7) He shall serve as treasurer of this association. An accurate and complete record of all funds received and disbursed shall be kept and a written report shall be included in his report to this association in its annual session.
- (8) The conditions of employment shall be determined by the Executive Board.

## ARTICLE IX

**DISSOLUTION:** Should this association cease to function, all properties and holdings shall go to the National Association of Free Will Baptists after all creditors are satisfied and indebtedness cleared.

## ARTICLE X

**AMENDMENTS:** This constitution may be amended or altered at any regular session of the association by a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of members

present and voting, provided proposed amendment or alteration be presented in writing to the body one (1) day in advance.

#### ARTICLE XI

**SPECIAL SESSIONS:** Elected delegates to the last session of this association shall be retained as standing delegates for special called sessions.
