PROCEEDINGS

TUESDAY EVENING, OCTOBER 13, 1981

The Seventy-Third Annual Session of the Oklahoma State Association meeting in the Tulsa Assembly Center, Tulsa, Oklahoma opened with singing "Victory in Jesus" led by Doug Little with Waldo Young at the piano. The Association then sang "Power in the Blood." Good spiritual singing thrilled the hearts of those present.

Bob Ketchum, presiding, introduced Richard Gallant, Chairman of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College Board of Trustees, who challenged the Association to respond to the need of \$15,000.00 to complete the paving fund for surfacing streets and parking areas at the college.

The convention was called to prayer and was led by Joe Haas, Missionary to France.

Doug Little then led the convention in singing "How Great Thou Art."

Jerry Dudley, Clerk of the Association, called the seventy-third annual meeting into official session, and introduced the other officers who will serve during this session: Lonnie DeVault, Executive Secretary; Richard Pressnell, Assistant Clerk; Frank Giles, Assistant Moderator; and James Murray, Moderator.

The Moderator brought the Moderator's message from Psalm 27, "The Lord Is My Light and My Salvation" urging each person present to make this a reality in our hearts and in practice.

Special prayer was offered for many requests including Allen Moore, Exec. Secretary of the Texas State Association of Free Will Baptists critically ill from a heart attack; infant child of Missionary Curtis Linton of Lawton; Daniel Coffee, a small boy from Northwest Church, Oklahoma City; Jeffry Shade; Gene Andrews; Barbara Palmer; Chuck Falls; father of David Sutton; Willard Day and a goodly number of others whose names the clerk was unable to record. A season of prayer was observed as these were lifted up for healing and comfort along with Frank Giles, Assistant Moderator who will serve as Moderator on Wednesday and for all of the speakers of this convention.

Don Payne, President of the Tulsa Area Ministers Conference, came to welcome all delegates and visitors to Tulsa for this convention. Members of the various District Associations were recognized with all visitors from out of state and our visitors from other religious bodies.

A trio from Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College cheered our hearts with an excellent rendition of "I Will Sing A New Song" and "Christ In Me."

Bob Ketchum introduced David Sutton for the evening message.

David Sutton came and delivered a message from Jude 1:3, entitled "Contending for the Principles of the Faith." A mighty, scriptural and spiritual message was received by the Association.

Following announcements the convention worship was closed in prayer led by Bob Ketchum.

THE WEDNESDAY MORNING SESSION

The Wednesday morning session, October 14, 1981 was called to order with Curt Gwartney leading the Association in singing "The Sweetest Name I Know" accompanied by Waldo Young at the piano.

Frank Giles, Assistant Moderator, brought morning devotions from Hebrews 11:1-4 emphasizing "Walking by Faith" and then led the Association in prayer. Moderator, James Murray, was called from the Association to be with a family from the Northwest Oklahoma City Church during a crisis time for them.

Jerry Dudley, Clerk, read Article III of the Oklahoma State Association regarding delegates. All standing delegates were recognized. All elected delegates from the District Associations were recognized by roll-call of delegates from the letters with corrections noted from the floor. Motion and second carried to seat all delegates and the voting bloc was established.

Visitors from other bodies were recognized and invited to a seat in council with the Association but voting rights limited to the delegates.

Motion and second carried to recess for morning worship.

Following announcements, Richard Pressnell prayed God's blessing and direction as the benediction.

WEDNESDAY MORNING WORSHIP SERVICE

The Wednesday morning worship hour was called to order with Joel Kircher, presiding. He led the Association in prayer for the worship hour.

Curt Gwartney led the Association in singing "O How I Love Jesus" with Waldo Young at the piano.

Jerry Pilgrim came and blessed our hearts singing a medley of songs about "Jesus" beginning with "Tell Me that Name Again."

Delbert Akin came and offered prayer for the messenger of the hour.

Jack Richey then delivered a message "Contending for Perseverance In the Faith." A tremendous message of faith and service producing perseverance as the answer to the manifold temptations of our day was delivered.

The worship hour was dismissed in prayer led by Richard Terry.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON SESSION

The Wednesday afternoon business session was called to order with singing "He Lives" led by Curt Gwartney and accompanied by Waldo Young at the piano.

Edward E. Morris brought afternoon devotions from Philemon 1:1-19, emphasizing brotherly love and care for one another and closed the devotion in prayer.

Motion and second carried "inasmuch as recommendation No. 5 of the Executive Board report requires constitutional change, that the recommendation already approved be recalled to the floor and laid on the table for later consideration."

Discussion of the Executive Board Report was resumed where it was when the Association recessed for worship.

Recommendation No. 2 (recommendation was provisional in the event Recommendation No. 1 did not carry and thus became of no merit and not considered)

James Puckett, Chairman, gave the report of the Sunday School Board. Motion and second carried to receive the report. (see Sunday School Board report)

Earnest Harrison, Sr., gave a report of the National Retirement and Insurance Board report. The report was received as information.

Lonnie DaVoult gave the Executive Department report. Motion and second carried to receive the report.

Melvin Worthington, Executive Secretary of the National Association of Free Will Baptists gave a report of the National Executive Department. The report was received as information.

David Joslin, Executive Secretary of the Arkansas State Association brought greetings from the Arkansas brethren.

Ray Martin, Manager, gave a report of Free Will Baptist Book Store. Motion and second carried to receive the report.

Nominations were declared in order to elect the members to the boards having given their reports.

Clarence Shepherd was elected as seven (7) year member to the Executive Board.

Kent Hubbard was elected as seven (7) year member of the Church Training Service Board.

Richard Terry was elected as seven (7) year member of the Sunday School Board.

Richard Gallant, Chairman, gave the report of the Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College Board of Trustees. N. R. Smith gave a report of response to fund raising efforts and student recruitment. Don Elkins, President, reported on the current status of the college with enrolment, property improvements and financial status being much improved.

Motion and second carried to receive the reports.

Election of College Board of Trustees was as follows:

J. C. Morgan elected to one (1) year membership to fill unexpired term of Jim Shepherd who has moved from the State.

Ray Gwartney was elected as five (5) year member.

Delbert Akin was elected as five (5) year member.

Ronald Creech gave a report of Free Will Baptist Bible College, Nashville, Tennessee and the planned opening of the graduate study program designated to begin with the fall semester of 1982. The report was received as information.

J. C. Morgan, elected to the College Board of Trustees, resigned from the Executive Board.

Bailey Thompson was elected as five (5) year member of the Executive Board.

Berton Perry, Chairman, gave the report of the State Mission Board. He reported on the problems of Missionary Curtis Linton family in the medical problems of their new born child and the progress of the work in Lawton. Missionaries David Bigger of Ponca City; Gary Thomas of Bartlesville; and Jim Smith of Weatherford reported on the progress and status of their respective works.

Motion and second carried to adopt the report.

John Gibbs, from the National Home Mission Board, reported to the Association that Oklahoma Free Will Baptists were No. 1 in giving to that department. A good report on home missions was received as information.

Rolla Smith, General Director of National Foreign Missions Department reported on that department, listing each foreign missionary from Oklahoma and the international problems confronting foreign personnel. The report was received as information.

Ron Carner was elected as seven (7) year member of the State Mission Board.

Motion and second carried to adjourn the business session for the day. The days business was closed in prayer led by Mike Fields.

WEDNESDAY EVENING WORSHIP, OCTOBER 15, 1981

The Wednesday evening worship was called to order at 7:30 p.m. by Allen Wood, presiding. The Association delegates and all visitors were welcomed to the worship. A goodly number, estimated at near 800, was present for the worship.

Prayer requests were made by a great number for persons having need. Albert Collier led the congregation as prayer was mounted for the requests and for this hours worship.

David Archer led the congregation in singing "At Calvary," "All That Thrills My Soul" and the choruses "God Is So Good" and "Coming Again."

An offering was received for missions, to be divided equally between Oklahoma State Missions, National Home Missions and National Foreign Missions. An offering of \$648.08 was received.

The West Tulsa Free Will Baptist Church youth choir sang, "Redemption Draweth Nigh" and "It's Just Like My Lord."

J. C. Morgan was introduced to bring the evening message. From Jude 3-5, 20-23 the message "Contending for the Projection of our Faith" was developed and clearly set forth the necessity and obligation to project our faith in such manner as to effect our world. A challenging message was received.

The evening worship was dismissed in prayer led by Earl Scroggins.

THE THURSDAY MORNING SESSION

The Thursday morning session, October 15, 1981 was called to order at 9:15 a.m. with John Metcalf leading the Association in singing "All That Thrills My Soul." Dale Vanderburg led the Association in prayer.

John Metcalf rendered a stirring song "My House Is Full."

Howard Gage brought the morning devotions from Ephesians 2:5-8 reminding us of the abundance of God's grace, goodness and kindness shown us through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Malcolm Fry brought greetings from the National Sunday School and Church Training Service Department. An award for achieving an average attendance exceeding 300 for 13 weeks was presented to Dick Shade, pastor of Northside Free Will Baptist Church of Tulsa. The report was received as information.

Motion and second carried to take Executive Board Report, recommendation No. 5 from the table. Motion and second carried to adopt the recommendation.

Motion and second carried to recess for morning worship.

THURSDAY MORNING WORSHIP

The Thursday morning worship was called to order at 11:00 a.m. with singing led by John Metcalf and accompanied by Waldo Young. The Association sang "My Savior's Love."

Charles Brazeal, presiding, led the Association in prayer.

John Metcalf led the Association in singing "Saved By the Blood."

Dan Davis beautifully sang "Love Grew Where the Blood Fell."

Charles Brazeal then introduced Clarence Shepherd as the speaker for the morning worship hour. From John 13:17, the message "Contending for the Practice of our Faith" set forth the implications of "If ye know these things, happy are ye if ye do them." The theme of the message was the practice of the ordinances of the gospel. A resounding affirmation of our denominational practices was gladly received.

Bailey Thompson led the Association in prayer as our benediction.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON SESSION

The afternoon session of Thursday, October 15, 1981 came to order with singing "Amazing Grace" led by John Metcalf and Waldo Young accompanying.

Roy Bingham led in prayer invoking our Lord's blessing on the afternoon session.

Harry Staires brought the afternoon devotions from Hebrews 11 and pointed out the necessity of faith and faithfulness.

The afternoon business session began with resuming discussion on the motion to amend the distribution of cooperative funds of General Board Recommendation No. 3.

Motion and second carried to take resolution No. 1 from the table. Moderator James Murray ruled that if carried, the effect of the resolution would be effective in the 1982 session of the Association.

Motion and second to adopt carried by more than two-thirds (2/3) majority.

Motion and second to ratify the Moderator's ruling on effective date carried.

Resolution No. 2 (carried)

Resolution No. 3 (carried)

Resolution No. 4 (carried) (see Resolutions Committee report)

Motion and second carried to take General Board recommendation No. 4 from the table. A motion and second was made to refer the recommendation to the Executive Board for further study. Motion to refer lost.

Motion and second to adopt the General Board recommendation No. 4 carried by more than two-thirds (2/3) majority.

Motion and second carried to instruct the Executive Board to establish procedural guidelines in the event the Executive Secretary should be dismissed and a full report be made at the 1982 session of the Association for its approval.

Motion and second carried to make General Board recommendation No. 4 effective immediately and apply to the present Executive Secretary.

In response to a request from the floor, National Executive Secretary, Melvin Worthington explained the distribution of cooperative plan funds at the national level.

The General Board acting as budget committee report was given as a partial report of the General Board.

Motion and second made to amend the cooperative plan funds distribution as follows: Executive Department 22%; Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College 28%; State Mission Board 9%; Church Training Service Board 2%; Sunday School Board 1%; and the National Association 38%.

A motion and second was received to amend the amendment to read: Church Training Service 1% and Executive Department 23%. Motion lost.

Motion and second for the previous question carried. The motion to amend carried. Recommendation No. 3 of the General Board report was adopted as amended.

Motion and second carried to rescind previous action on Executive Board Recommendation No. 8.

Motion and second carried to reconsider amended budget.

Motion and second carried to amend General Board report. Recommendation No. 3 to read: Sunday School Board 2% and Executive Department 21%.

Motion and second carried to adopt the Obituary Committee report.

Motion and second carried to adopt the Public Morals Committee report.

Motion and second carried that the Clerk of the Association forward this report to the outstanding newspapers in the State.

Richard Terry gave the report of the State Ministers Conference. The report was received as information.

Joe Haas, Missionary to France, gave a glowing report of "mission accomplished." The church at Rennes, France is an indigenous, self-supporting and native pastored church. Deep appreciation expressed for the continued support and prayers of Oklahoma Free Will Baptists marked this report. The report was received as information.

General Board members were elected as they were reported on the letters with two (2) exceptions where apparent misunderstanding of the members being elected at this session serve at the next annual session. Members elected in 1980 serve at this 1981 session. Corrections in these cases noted and the members elected. (see listing of General Board members)

Nominations were declared in order to elect a member to be recommended to the National Association in 1982 to serve for two years on that bodies General Board. Jack Richey elected.

The Clerk read the accumulated report.

Motion and second carried to replace a member of the Mission Board who has not been active.

WHEREAS, the staggered terms of office assure continuity within every board, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED that ARTICLE VII of the Oklahoma State Association Constitution be amended as follows: "All standing boards shall be composed of seven (7) elected members who shall serve terms of 7, 6, 5, 4, 3, 2 and 1 years with such ex-officio members as may be provided for elsewhere, with no member serving more than two (2) consecutive terms of office or portion thereof, except: (1) the General Board shall be composed of one (1) member from each affiliated association, the chairman of each standing board, and the current general officers of this association, and (2) the College Board of Trustees which shall be composed as provided for in the Articles of Incorporation of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc. (The remaining paragraphs of this Article VII shall remain unchanged.) (carried)

RESOLUTION NO. 2

Be it resolved that the Oklahoma State Association invite the National Association to meet in Oklahoma for the 1986 session. (carried)

RESOLUTION NO. 3

Be it resolved that honorariums for the State Association be set as follows: Moderator — \$100.00; Clerk — \$200.00; Assistant Moderator — \$25.00; Assistant Clerk — \$25.00; Principal Speakers — \$50.00.

If the case should be that the Assistant Clerk does the work of the Clerk, or the Assistant Moderator does the work of the Moderator, the honorarium should be distributed accordingly. (carried)

RESOLUTION NO. 4

Be it resolved that we give a rising vote of appreciation to the Tulsa Area Churches for hosting the 1981 session of the State Association. (carried)

OBITUARY COMMITTEE REPORT

The Obituary Committee received reports of 142 deaths in the various associations this past year, among them the Rev. John West, a great loss to our denomination. (carried)

PUBLIC MORALS COMMITTEE REPORT

1. We recommend that the State Association reaffirm our stand on the use of alcohol and drugs as stated in the Church Covenant regarding the use and sale of such. We encourage our people to continue the support of S.A.N.E.

2. Paramutual Betting

We recommend that the State Association go on record opposing the legalization of gambling in any form in that the Bible addresses it as sin.

3. Television

We recommend that we reaffirm the resolution concerning T.V. that was approved in the National Association of Free Will Baptists while meeting in Louisville, Kentucky, July 1981. Whereas, obvious advancements have been made in accomplishing the goals of the "Clean Up TV" campaign, Be It Resolved, that we continue to press for a higher moral standard through the "Clean Up" of Television.

4. Abortion

We recommend that we reaffirm our stand on the sanctity of life and our opposition to abortion on demand. We heartily endorse the stand of the National Association adopted in Anaheim, California in July 1980.

5. Equal Rights Amendment

We recommend that we go on record as standing opposed to the ratification of the "Equal Rights Amendment."

6. Moral Standards

Due to the continuing lowering of social moral standards across our country with the "new morality"; public school's "sex education"; the general public's acceptance of "gay rights"; the abandonment of the conventional marriage and the break-down of the family; the epidemic proportions of "illegitimate teenage pregnancies"; we recommend:

Our churches, membership and ministers, re-establish a thorough teaching and preaching of the scriptural standards of living, both in and out of the church.

THE GENERAL BOARD REPORT

The General Board of the Oklahoma State Association met October 12, 1981 at the Assembly Center, Tulsa, Oklahoma. As a result of that meeting, we offer the following items for your consideration.

- I. We received correspondence from twenty-three (23) district associations holding membership in this body. We recommend that these letters be received and the delegates seated.
- II. We heard the reports of the Executive Board, the Executive Secretary, the Free Will Baptist Book Store, Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, the Church Training Service Board, and the Sunday School Board.

We recommend each of these reports be adopted as given with one (1) exception. Recommendation No. Four (4) of the Executive Board is forwarded with a negative recommendation.

- III. Serving as Budget Committee, we offer the following:

1. We recommend a Cooperative Budget of \$240,000 to be distributed as follows:

IV. A recommendation from First Oklahoma Association recommending ARTICLE VI, Section B, Item (1) be amended as follows: The first sentence of item be changed to read, "The Executive Secretary shall be elected to serve an indefinite term of office."

V. We recommend that the College Board of Trustees be encouraged in receiving cash and pledges in the amount of \$15,000 to pay the balance due on paying at Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College.

REPORT OF THE STATE EXECUTIVE BOARD TO THE STATE ASSOCIATION

The State Executive Board met three times during the past year. We submit the following recommendations:

1. We recommend to the General Board and State Association that the 1983 State Convention be in Muskogee. (Carried)
2. We recommend a Cooperative budget of \$240,000 for 1982-83. (Carried)
3. We recommend the adoption of the Bookstore budget (as presented). (Carried)
4. We recommend to the 1981 State Convention that we have a nominating committee consisting of the chairman of the standing boards, and that they nominate all board members and officers except the

Executive Secretary, and if this recommendation passes that it be added to the by-laws. (Postponed Indefinitely)

5. We recommend to the State Association that each District Association be responsible for sending \$35.00 per church to the State Association, for State and National Convention fee, of this \$35.00—\$25.00 to the State and \$10.00 to the National. (Carried)
 6. We recommend that each District Association be responsible for \$10.00 per church to be sent to the State Office before July 1, 1982 for the 1982 National Convention expenses. (Carried)
 7. We recommend the relocation of the State Office Headquarters to the Hillsdale Campus. (Lost)
 8. We recommend a Building Complex of 2800 sq. ft., compatible with existing buildings on Hillsdale Campus, at an estimated cost of \$125,000 (parking, utility hook-up, and furniture included). (Does not apply, No. 7 lost)
 9. We recommend the following guidelines for financing this building project:
 - \$25,000 to come from the State Office
 - \$50,000 in gifts from churches
 - \$50,000 loanBuilding will not begin until we have received at least \$25,000 in gifts. A loan will be secured for the balance that is not received in gifts. (Does not apply, No. 7 lost)
 10. We recommend an additional 4% of Coop to make the payments. (Lost)
 11. We recommend to the State Association to leave the Bookstore at the present location. (Carried)
- A detailed report to be given by research Committee.

STATE ASSOCIATION OF FREE WILL BAPTISTS NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

JUNE 30, 1981

(1) SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The State Association of Free Will Baptists is a non-profit organization designed to provide central leadership and representation for the Free Will Baptists of Oklahoma and to handle certain receipts and disbursements of the Free Will Baptist Church. The Association uses the fund method of accounting, whereby the fund balance represents the equity the association has in its assets. This accounting method is generally accepted among non-profit organizations as the most feasible way of reflecting their financial activity and position.

The Association's property and equipment is depreciated on the straight-line basis using the following estimated useful lives:

Furniture, fixtures and equipment acquired subsequent to July 1, 1972 -----	8 years
Furniture, fixtures and equipment acquired prior to July 1, 1972 -----	3 years

(2) MORTGAGE RECEIVABLE

The executive residence was sold on May 30, 1974 for \$20,500. The buyer assumed the mortgage on the property and gave the Association a second mortgage on the property for \$10,300. Payments were to begin on July 1, 1974. The rate of interest is 8% and the mortgage is for thirty years. The Association does not have an amortization schedule on this loan and we were unable to verify the exact balance on this mortgage receivable.

(3) COOPERATIVE CONTRIBUTIONS

The Executive Office of the State Association was allocated 21% in 1981 and 21% in 1980 of cooperative contributions for the financing of its operations for the fiscal year.

ITS START

The Executive Office was born between the fourth (1940) and fifth (1941) sessions of the National Association. Its first report was delivered to the National Convention at the fifth annual session in Drumright, Oklahoma, July 13-18, 1941.

During its 40-year history, eight men have served as Executive Secretary—L. R. Ennis (1941-1944), Robert Crawford (1944-1948), Ralph Lightsey (1948-1949), Damon Dodd (1949-1953), W. S. Mooneyham (1953-1959), Billy Melvin (1959-1967), Rufus Coffey (1967-1979), Melvin Worthington (1979-).

ITS SERVICE

CONTACT Magazine, the official voice of the National Association of Free Will Baptists, is published monthly by the Executive Office. CONTACT has a circulation of approximately 8,600.

The COOPERATIVE PLAN OF SUPPORT is promoted by the Executive Office. This plan serves as an equitable means to undergird the total ministry of the National Association. For those who choose to designate their gifts, we encourage them to include all national departments. COOP receipts totaled \$312,805.58 in 1980.

The annual national convention is planned, programmed and promoted by the Executive Office. The 1981 convention convened July 19-23 in Louisville, Kentucky. Each year, every local church should send its pastor and a lay delegate to this annual gathering.

The Executive Office COORDINATES the work of the National Association. This office is to the national body what a pastor is to a local church. It coordinates the work of the denomination by promoting and presenting impartially the total ministry of all departments. The correlation and interrelation of all the national ministries are shown through general promotion.

ITS SUPPORT

The Executive Office is supported by gifts which are sent directly to the office. Every Free Will Baptist Church has an obligation to financially support each department of the National Association.

A church's denominational obligation is not met until it has included an equitable gift to each national department. The simplest way to do this is by giving through the COOP PLAN.

Gifts through the COOPERATIVE PLAN equitably undergird all national ministries with the exception of the Sunday School and Church Training Department which is self-supporting. If you prefer designating your gifts, remember your obligation to support every national department.

(1) SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The College uses the fund method of accounting whereby an individual fund is a separate accounting entity made up of assets, liabilities, revenues, expenditures, transfers and a fund balance. This method of accounting is generally accepted among colleges and universities as the most effective means of controlling financial data.

Buildings and equipment are not depreciated by the College, which is an acceptable procedure for a non-profit organization.

Dear Friends in Oklahoma:

Greetings from the National Home Missions Department. 1980 is now history, and 1981 is reaching the final months. I trust that 1980 was a good year for you folks and that you have met the challenges of 1981 with excitement!

1980 was an outstanding year for National Home Missions! Our missionaries saw a record number of over 1,600 souls saved and more than \$100,000 given to outside causes from the mission churches. Twelve new missionary families were approved and sent to the field. One new state was entered last year—Rhode Island, and in 1981 Wisconsin was entered.

A new record was set in giving to National Home Missions in 1980! The total income to the National Home Missions Department was \$1,031,214.42. This is the first time in our history we have reached over a million dollars in gifts to our Department.

Seventeen states exceeded their quotas for 1980. Oklahoma gave \$127,967.91, which was \$27,967.91 above your quota of \$100,000. This letter is to say thanks to you and all the wonderful people in Oklahoma. Without your giving, praying, and helping in so many other ways, this could not have been possible.

Your quota for 1981 is \$120,000. We hope the people and churches of Oklahoma will continue to work hard to reach your quota, so that the National Home Missions Department can reach its quota for 1981 of \$1,050,000.

We are thankful for Joint Project workers David Bigger of Ponca City, Curtis Linton of Lawton, and Gary Thomas of Bartlesville. We are also thankful that Joint Project worker Buddy Drake of Enid has now gone self supporting. We ask that you please continue to pray for all of our missionaries and for us here in the office that 1981 will prove to be the most effective year that we have ever had for our Lord.

Please pray for our General Director, Rev. Roy Thomas, our Director of Development, Rev. John Gibbs, for our Director of Evangelism, Rev. Don Pegram, and for me as the Associate Director, that God will use us to be a blessing to the people in our denomination. If the Home Missions Department can ever be of help to you and your churches, please feel free to call upon us. We are here to serve and we want to help.

National Home Missions is rejoicing over the blessings of last year! Twelve new missionary families were sent out by National Home Missions. This caused income to break all records, and also to break the

one million dollar goal, with \$1,031,214.42 in total receipts. This was an increase of \$43,686.20 over the previous year.

Several states exceeded their quotas. These were led by Oklahoma, which has been number one in giving to National Home Missions for several years now. Below is a record of Oklahoma's giving for the past ten years:

The officers of the CTS Board met with the officers of the Sunday School Board as directed by the State Association last year and offer the following recommendation.

Joint meeting of Executive Committees of the Oklahoma State CTS and Sunday School Boards, August 25, 1981.

Sunday School Board members present: Jim Puckett and Richard Terry.

C.T.S. Board Members present: Charles Bigger and Leroy Welch.

We submit the following recommendations:

1. We recommend that the State Sunday School Board and the State CTS Board remain intact as presently provided for in the Constitution.
2. Should the boards be changed by the body, we recommend the Constitution be changed to read as follows:

A. Article VII, Sections 5 and 6 be changed to read:

Section 5. SUNDAY SCHOOL AND C.T.S. BOARD: This board shall be composed of seven members who are members of affiliated associations and in good standing with the associations of which they are members. They shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

The duties of this board shall be to plan and assist in organizing and sustaining a strong Christian Education program through the Sunday School and Church Training Service. This board shall use every available means to promote educational clinics, seminars, institutes, and conventions on local, district and state-wide level to plan, organize and conduct state-wide youth camps and competitive activities.

This board shall organize itself and elect such officers as necessary to the orderly conduct of its affairs and labors. This board shall keep an accurate record of all meetings, decisions, work done, funds received and disbursed and shall make a report in writing at each annual session of this association. All records shall be available to this association at its request.

- B. We further recommend that the Sunday School and Church Training Service Boards be dissolved and seven members be elected from the floor.

We request 2% of the cooperative budget.

THE FREE WILL BAPTIST MASTER'S MEN State of Oklahoma CONSTITUTION

PREAMBLE

The purpose of the Free Will Baptist Master's Men, state of Oklahoma is to provide a means of Christian fellowship and to deepen the spiritual lives of the laymen of the local church. Also, to provide a means of developing the abilities and talents of the laymen, and to promote the cause of Christ through a complete, "total church program," as prescribed by Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists.

ARTICLE I NAME

The name of this organization shall be known as the Free Will Baptist Master's Men, State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE II MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. The membership of this organization shall be composed of the district associations of Master's Men, and any local chapters where there is only

one chapter in the district, within the state of Oklahoma.

Section 2. Every member in good standing of an affiliated district association of Master's Men, or any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district, is entitled to the full benefits of membership.

Section 3. Each district association, or any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district, shall submit an annual, written report to this body, (as a matter of information).

ARTICLE III OFFICERS

The officers of this organization shall consist of a president, vice-president and a secretary-treasurer.

The officers of this organization shall be elected annually and may succeed themselves, at this level.

ARTICLE IV EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The executive committee shall consist of the elected officers of this organization and they shall serve as the program committee for each annual convention.

Section 2. Ex-officio members of the executive committee shall be the presidents of the district associations of Master's Men, presidents of any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district, and the state executive secretary of the State Association of Free Will Baptists.

ARTICLE V MEETINGS

This organization shall meet annually at 7:30 P.M. on the Monday night before the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists convenes.

ARTICLE VI AMENDMENTS

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of any regular meeting.

BY-LAWS

VOTING RIGHTS

Section 1. Every member of each affiliated district association, or any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district, is eligible to vote on all questions and matters that might come before the Free Will Baptist Master's Men, State of Oklahoma.

COMMITTEES

Section 2. The executive committee shall transact all routine business and shall act for the organization in the interim between meetings.

Section 3. The executive committee shall meet at the call of the president.

Section 4. A nominating committee, for the annual election of officers, shall be composed of the presidents of each district association, and the president of any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district.

Section 5. The president shall appoint all other committees, subject to the approval of the body.

FINANCE

Section 6. This organization shall be financed on the basis of offerings, dues and assessments.

QUORUM

Section 7. One-tenth of the members of this organization shall constitute a quorum at any regular meeting.

AMENDMENTS

Section 8. These by-laws may be amended at any regular meeting by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

As adopted by the Free Will Baptist Master's Men, State of Oklahoma annual session, in Muskogee, Oklahoma October 19, 1970.

CONSTITUTION OF MINISTER'S CONFERENCE

ARTICLE 1

The Minister's Conference shall be called the Oklahoma State Free Will Baptist Minister's Conference, and shall be composed of Ordained Free Will Baptist Ministers who are regular members of some Orthodox Free Will Baptist church in the State of Oklahoma who have paid their \$1.00 dues.

ARTICLE 2

The officers for this conference shall be President, Vice-President, and Clerk Treasurer, who shall be elected annually.

ARTICLE 3

This conference shall have the power to discipline its members.

ARTICLE 4

Members of this organization shall be all ordained ministers who participate in the benefits and activities of this body, and associate members who become members by payment of the \$1.00 annual dues.

ARTICLE 5

This conference shall meet Semi-Annually.

ARTICLE 6

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any regular session.

BY-LAWS OF MINISTER'S CONFERENCE

ARTICLE 1

The clerk or assistant clerk, or in their absence the senior minister in years shall call the ministers into conference. If a quorum is present the President or in his absence the Vice-President shall moderate the meeting. If neither of these are present, the senior minister in years shall be in charge.

ARTICLE 2

It shall be the duty of the clerk to enroll the ministers of the conference. Ministers shall present themselves with proper evidence of their rights to seats therein, and those enrolled by the clerk shall compose the conference. In case of questionable representation the case under question shall be referred to the Credential Committee.

ARTICLE 3

It shall be the duty of each minister belonging to this conference, to be active in pastoral or evangelistic services (disabled or retired ministers excepted). Any minister belonging to this conference shall report in each session in person or by letter, and failing to do so for two successive sessions shall be subject to discipline.

ARTICLE 4

Each conference shall be opened by reading a portion of God's word and prayer, and each session shall be closed with prayer.

ARTICLE 5

By a two-thirds vote of the members present ruling of the President may be overruled.

ARTICLE 6

This conference shall sit with open doors, except when it shall go into a committee as a whole.

ARTICLE 7

No member shall absent himself from the conference during its meeting without permission from the President.

ARTICLE 8

No person shall be allowed to nominate more than one member of a committee, unless person nominated is not elected.

ARTICLE 9

The President shall not allow discussion when not carried on in a Christian Spirit, or when he thinks it will cause discord.

ARTICLE 10

Anyone desiring to speak shall rise and address the President by the appellation "Brother President," but shall not speak further until recognized.

ARTICLE 11

No member of this conference shall be allowed to speak more than five minutes, nor twice on the same subject without permission from the President.

ARTICLE 12

These By-Laws may be altered or amended at any regular or adjourned session of this conference by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE, INC.

BY-LAWS

BOARD OF TRUSTEES

SECTION I

The Board of Trustees of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc., an Oklahoma corporation, shall be composed of fifteen members, elected as provided in the Articles of Incorporation of said College, as amended:

ARTICLE A—OFFICERS: The officers of the Board of Trustees shall be a Chairman, an Assistant Chairman, and a Secretary, each of whom shall be elected by the Board for a term of one year. They shall continue in office until their successors have been chosen:

Item 1—CHAIRMAN: The chairman of the Board of Trustees or his assistant shall preside at all meetings of the Board. He shall be an ex-officio member of the Executive Committee.

Item 2—SECRETARY: The Secretary shall record and preserve minutes of all meetings and acts of the Board of Trustees and countersign all deeds, conveyances, and other papers authorized by the Board. He shall have authority to call special meetings of the Trustees of the College upon the written request of two-thirds of the members of the Board; he shall mail notice of said meeting to the trustees ten (10) days in advance.

Item 3—EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE: The Executive Committee shall consist of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, the Vice-Chairman of the Board, the Secretary of the Board. The Executive Committee shall have authority to consider and act upon all questions affecting the College which may be brought before it between the stated meetings of the Board, or a quorum of the Board fails to attend a called or regular meeting. It shall transact such business as may be committee to it by the Board and shall act for the College on such matters as it may submit to it. The Committee shall meet at the call of the Chairman or the President of the College.

ARTICLE B—MEETINGS: The Board of Trustees shall meet each year at a time and place agreed upon by the Board. It shall, also, hold special meetings whenever called in accordance with the By-Laws of the Board. Such special meetings may be called by either the chairman of the Board, or the President of the College.

ARTICLE C—QUORUM: A majority of the members or the Board of Trustees of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc. in attendance at any called or regular meeting, written notice of which has been mailed by the Secretary to each trustee, shall constitute a quorum. No proxy votes shall be permitted. No ex-officio member shall be entitled to vote at meetings of the Board of Trustees.

ARTICLE D—ELECTIONS: In all elections held by the Board of Trustees each member present except ex-officio members shall be entitled to one vote, and the result shall be determined by a majority of the votes cast. Due notice of any election must be personal notice to the members or a day on the minutes of the Board not less than one week preceding the election.

SECTION II

OFFICERS OF HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE

The officers of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College shall be a President, Vice-President, Dean, and a Business Manager, each of whom shall be elected by the Board of Trustees to hold office for two years exclusive of the President whose term of office shall be indefinite. It is provided, however, that retirement of any one of the officers herein named may occur at any time upon the resignation of the officer or the request of the Board. In either case, notice shall be given six weeks before the date of the proposed retirement unless otherwise agreed upon by the concerned parties.

ITEM ONE—PRESIDENT: The President shall be executive officer of the Board of Trustees and shall have general control of the College including its officers, teachers, students, and business. He shall render to the Board complete annual reports and to its chairman, Executive Committee or other committees such information as may be deemed essential to a thorough knowledge of the operation of the College and its promotion. He shall be a member of the Board of Trustees ex-officio and the Executive Committee ex-officio and shall have the rights and privileges of a member of the Board except voting. The President shall execute all documents, instruments, and conveyances on behalf of the College. Duties of the president and working relationship shall be further detailed in a format approved by the Board of Trustees.

ITEM TWO—VICE PRESIDENT: The Vice-President shall perform all the duties of the President in the absence of the latter.

ITEM THREE—DEAN: The Academic Dean of the College shall, under the President, fix the hours of recitation, govern, control, and regulate the conduct of the students, have general oversight of curriculum, student's records, and such other internal details and administrative duties as may be delegated to him by the President of the College.

ITEM FOUR—BUSINESS MANAGER: The Treasurer shall keep an accurate record of all accounts of the College and shall receive and expend as directed by the Board of Trustees and President, all money for the expenses of the institution. He shall make an annual report to the Board and furnish the Executive Committee with such information pertaining to his office as may be requested. He shall provide bond in whatever amount the Board may require. Until such times as the Board of Trustees may deem different the Treasurer's office shall be contained within the Business Manager's Office. The Business Manager may at the direction of the administration designate this duty to a subordinate officer. The Business Manager shall have general supervision of the financial business of the College, and shall, at the direction of the President, be responsible for the upkeep of all the physical facilities and premises of the College. His detailed duties are directed in a format approved by the Board of Trustees.

SECTION III FACULTY

The faculty shall consist of the President, the Dean, and all teachers of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College. Instructors and assistant teachers shall have the privilege of sitting with the faculty in stated meetings but shall not have the right of voting.

It shall be the policy of the College to employ on its faculty those who are members of Free Will Baptist churches that are affiliated with the National Association. Emergencies, however arising from the resignation, illness, death, or approved leaves of absence of faculty members may be relieved by the temporary employment of instructors who are affiliated with any evangelical denomination. Part-time or short-term instructors, deemed essential to the successful prosecution of a consistent education program, may be employed at the discretion of the President without respect of denominational affiliation.

The faculty, under the authority and jurisdiction of the President, shall have general charge of instruction, attendance of students, examinations, administration of curriculum, discipline, and all matters involving the spiritual, physical, and social welfare of the College. The faculty shall be hired upon recommendation of the President.

In the selection of the faculty qualitative factors shall be kept in mind. All faculty members shall be urged to pursue graduate programs in their respective fields. Except in special cases no faculty member will be required to teach courses outside of his field.

SECTION IV ACADEMIC COUNCIL

The Academic Council shall consist of the President, the Dean and the heads of the departments of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College: It shall deter-

mine the curriculum and academic policy of the College, prescribe requirements for admissions, certificates, diplomas, and degrees, and supervise the courses of instruction offered by the various departments of the College.

SECTION V CONTRACTS

The Board of Trustees shall establish the College policy involving the execution of contracts, deeds of conveyance, the determination of salaries, and employment of all officers, representatives, faculty members and essential domestic and maintenance employees. The President of the College shall negotiate agreements, executive contracts, employ representatives, and supply vacancies incurred by the termination of contracts, resignations, or death of any essential employees. All contracts for building construction shall be let only to persons or corporations posting a valid performance bond and recording the same in the Office of the County Clerk of Cleveland County, Oklahoma.

SECTION VI ADVISORY COUNCIL

An advisory council shall be formed which is to be composed of interested, qualified persons in the various fields which will be of value in building and maintaining a strong academic program to carry out the educational program stated in the charter.

SECTION VII AMENDMENT

These By-Laws may be amended by a favorable vote of two-thirds of the qualified members of the Board of Trustees of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College at any meeting of the Board, provided that the proposed amendment has been submitted in writing to each Trustee one month in advance. This change to be subject to the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists.

SECTION VIII ADMINISTRATIVE FUNCTIONS

The President of the Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College shall be elected by the Board of Trustees, and he shall act for and on behalf of the Board in the conduct and management of the institution. He shall also be a member of the Board of Trustees ex-officio and of the Executive committee, ex-officio, and his duties, powers and term of office shall be prescribed in the by-laws of the College and a format approved by the Board of Trustees.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF THE HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE, INC.

Know all men by these presents, that, we whose names are hereunto subscribed, do hereby associate ourselves together for the purpose of forming a cor-

poration under the provisions of the corporation laws of the State of Oklahoma, and for that purpose state:

ARTICLE ONE

The name of this corporation shall be HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE, INC.

ARTICLE TWO

The purpose of this corporation shall be the creation, establishment and maintenance of a college and institution of higher learning devoted to the promotion and impartation of higher learning, Christian education and such other education, instruction, learning, training and research as may be deemed essential for the cause of Christ and to that end prescribe courses of study and grant degrees. The doctrinal and theological position of this institution shall be that of the sponsoring denomination, Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists and the treatise of the National Association of Free Will Baptist as endorsed by the state body, and in connection therewith, in accordance with the stipulation of the Constitution and By-laws of the State Association of Free Will Baptists, Inc.

(a.) To prescribe courses of study for both resident and correspondence students, which shall include general education in the arts, Christian Ministries of Service and Biblical studies for wisdom; said courses to be taught in both a Junior College Division and a Bible College Division, and to award degrees, either graduate or post-graduate, to those persons satisfactorily completing the prescribed courses of study and to grant such other literary honors, including honorary degrees, as shall be deemed advisable.

(b.) To charge and collect tuition as determined by the Board of Trustees and to create scholarships.

(c.) To employ professors, instructors and other subordinate employees as may be necessary for the proper conduct of the college under the direction and control of the President of the College, with the advice and consent of the majority of the Board of Trustees.

(d.) To institute and carry on missions and commissions for missionary purposes and investigations.

(e.) To publish and distribute such pamphlets, literature or books as may be required in the conduct of such work and the general promotion of the College.

(f.) To sue and be sued in its corporate name and to enter into contracts of every type and nature.

(g.) To solicit support, receive, collect, hold and receive by gift or bequest personal property in any amount, money or other thing of value; to purchase real estate, to receive real estate that may be given, or devised to the college for achieving the legitimate ends of the college and to sell or mortgage the same as the need arises.

(h.) To borrow money in payment of property for erecting buildings and making improvements and for any other purpose germane to the objectives and purposes of the college.

(i.) To issue notes, bonds, debentures and other evidences of indebtedness and execute mortgages, liens and other incumbrances upon the property of the

corporation, real or otherwise, to secure the payment of any such evidences of indebtedness.

(j.) To transact any and all business connected with said College as may be necessary to achieve the purposes of said College.

(k.) To obtain under Internal Revenue Laws of the United States and of the Revenue Laws of the State of Oklahoma exemption from income property and other forms of taxation.

ARTICLE THREE

The location of this corporation shall be in Moore, Oklahoma.

ARTICLE FOUR

The duration of this corporation shall be perpetual.

ARTICLE FIVE

The general control of this corporation shall be vested in a Board of Trustees consisting of 16 members, 10 of which shall be elected by the delegates to the annual Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists—each of which shall serve for a term of 5 years, and until his successor is elected and qualified. Two members shall be elected at each annual sitting of the State Association for the expiring five year term and vacancies that occur on the board. One member each shall be elected by the delegates to the annual meeting of the State Association of Free Will Baptists of the states of Arkansas, Colorado, Kansas, Missouri, New Mexico, and Texas, each of which serve for a term designated by the states they represent.

ARTICLE SIX

An executive committee consisting of the Chairman, Vice Chairman, and Secretary of the Board of Trustees shall possess all powers of the Board of Trustees between the stated meetings of the Board of Trustees.

ARTICLE SEVEN

All contracts for building construction shall be let only to persons or corporations posting a valid performance bond and recording the same in the office of the County Clerk of Cleveland County, Oklahoma.

SECTION IX AMENDMENTS

This charter may be hereafter amended subject to the provisions contained herein and the laws of the State of Oklahoma. It is provided, however, that the Trustees of the College shall not propose or apply for any amendment which has not been previously authorized by an act of the Oklahoma State Association.

OKLAHOMA STATE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY CONVENTION CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I

NAME

This organization shall be known as the Oklahoma State Woman's Auxiliary Convention.

ARTICLE II

PURPOSE

The purpose of this convention shall be to bring the women of each district convention together for fellowship, sharing information, and encouraging one another in the work of the Lord.

ARTICLE III

OFFICERS

The Officers of this convention shall be a president, vice president, secretary, assistant secretary, treasurer, and field worker. These shall serve on the state executive committee together with three members elected by the convention as desired. These shall serve for a period of 2 years.

ARTICLE IV

MEMBERSHIP

This convention shall be composed of the officers of the convention together with each active auxiliary member of the district or local (duly accredited by the credentials committee).

ARTICLE V

MEETINGS

The annual meeting shall be held each year on the day preceding the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists and at the place designated by said Association.

ARTICLE VI

AMENDMENTS

This constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the convention by a two-thirds vote of members present.

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1, President. The president shall preside over all meetings, appoint such committees as may be needed, call the executive committee together when necessary, be ex-officio member of all committees, and serve as chairman of the executive committee, see that reports are made promptly to the national secretary and perform all duties usually pertaining to such an office.

Section 2, Vice President. The vice president shall preside in the absence of the president or by her request and otherwise assist her in the overseeing of the work in general.

Section 3, Secretary. The secretary shall keep an accurate record of all proceedings of the convention and executive meetings, preserve all valuable papers and turn same over to her successor in office, and make an annual report to the national secretary on a form available from the NWAC office. She shall compile the districts slates of officers and addresses immediately after the convention. She shall also send a slate of state officers and addresses to the national executive secretary. She is chairman of the Credentials Committee.

The secretary shall also serve as historian keeping an historical record and submitting historical information to the national executive secretary annually.

Section 4, Assistant Secretary. The assistant Secretary shall assist the secretary in recording proceedings of convention and executive committee meetings and shall aid the secretary in all her work as needed.

Section 5, Treasurer. The treasurer shall have charge of all funds belonging to this convention and shall pay out same only when authorized by the convention. The treasurer shall keep an accurate account and shall give a written report of all funds received and disbursed at each annual meeting of the convention. She shall also send an annual report to the WNAC office (executive secretary-treasurer) at least ten days before the end of the fiscal year. She shall encourage support of missions through the WNAC Gift Plan, individual giving and special offerings.

Section 6, Field Worker. The field worker shall have charge of all field work pertaining to, or necessary to, the promotion of the work of the convention and keep the national program before the district officers.

ARTICLE II

ELECTIONS

The general officers shall be nominated by a nominating committee and shall be elected by acclamation, unless there are other nominations. In case of more than one nominee for any particular office, a vote will be taken on each. All elections shall be held at the closing business session of the convention.

ARTICLE III

EXPENSES

Section 1. An appropriation of 18 cents per mile toward the expense of the general officers, when called upon to attend the executive committee meeting to plan program, secretary's expenses, phone calls, postage and stationery for officers will be paid by the convention. All field promotional work is subject to the state executive committee, who should approve all work done by state officers in the interest of state work, as well as expenses of the same.

Section 2. An amount of \$100.00 shall be paid on the expense of the state president to attend WNAC. If the president is unable to go to WNAC that we give the \$100.00 for this purpose to whomever goes in her place providing she is a state officer.

Section 3. The auditing committee shall be paid mileage the same as the executive committee.

ARTICLE IV

COMMITTEES

Section 1. Executive Committee—The executive committee shall be composed of the five officers and three members elected by the convention. Five of these shall compose a quorum. They shall hold meetings for the transaction of business as often as necessary. It shall be the duty of the executive committee to maintain an overseeing of the work at large. They shall act for the convention when necessary. They shall meet with district presidents the night preceding the state auxiliary convention. They will send out a newsletter with expenses paid by the State Treasury.

Section 2. Resolutions Committee—A resolutions committee of five members shall be appointed by the president as needed.

Section 3. Nominating Committee—The nominating committee shall be composed of at least one member from each district convention. Nominations shall be submitted by district with their annual report. These elected by the body at the annual meeting.

Section 4. Credentials Committee—The secretary shall be chairman of the credentials committee, and other members may be appointed by the president. The treasurer shall be a standing member of this committee.

Section 5. Finance Committee—The finance committee shall be appointed by the president. This committee audits the financial records of the year and reports on same to the convention.

Section 6. Registration committee shall be provided by the district convention which is host to state convention.

ARTICLE V

FEES AND REPORTS

Active members shall pay dues of \$1.50 per year. With 25 cents remaining in the district, \$1.25 to be forwarded to state where 25 cents shall be retained, and \$1.00 forwarded to WNAC as required for membership fees. It shall be the duty of each body directly affiliated with the State Auxiliary Convention to send a report to every annual session.

ARTICLE VI

AMENDMENTS

These by-laws may be amended by a two-thirds vote of members present at regular meeting of the state auxiliary convention.

ARTICLE VII

GIFTS

The desired plans for giving in the Woman's Auxiliary are those adopted by WNAC as follows:

1. Mission offerings following each special season of prayer
2. Co-Laborer offering (monthly or quarterly designated to WNAC General Fund)
3. WNAC Emphasis Month in August or other time more convenient to help in support of WNAC General Fund

4. Memorial Student Loan Fund (special program and offering in September to assist worthy and needy students at FWBBC in Nashville)
5. Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College Student Loan Fund. (Special program and offering in September to assist worthy and needy students at Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College)
6. Tithes—Pay tithes on all undesignated money received
7. All offerings are to be forwarded through regular channels.

ARTICLE VIII

WNAC DELEGATE

Each district convention shall submit one nomination for a State delegate to WNAC with their annual report. This nomination (along with others as needed to make up 15 delegates to WNAC) shall be elected by the body at the annual meeting. It shall be the duty of delegates elected to notify president if they cannot attend WNAC. President shall appoint delegates as needed in absence of regular elected delegates.

ARTICLES OF FAITH OF STATE ASSOCIATION

1. **THE BIBLE**—The Scriptures of the Old and New Testament were given by the inspiration of God, and are our infallible rules of faith and practice.

2. **GOD**—There is one living and true God, revealed in nature as the Creator, Preserver and Righteous Governor of the Universe, and in the Scriptures as the Father, Son and Holy Ghost, yet as one God, infinitely wise and good, whom all intelligent creatures are supremely to love, adore and obey.

3. **CHRIST**—Christ is God manifest in the flesh: in His divine nature truly God, in His human nature truly man. The mediator between God and man, once crucified. He is now risen and glorified as our ever-present Saviour and Lord.

4. **THE HOLY SPIRIT**—The Scriptures assigns to the Holy Spirit all the attributes of God. He is the Reprover, Comforter, Guide and Sanctifier of all men.

5. **THE GOVERNMENT OF GOD**—God exercises a wise and benevolent providence over all beings and all things by maintaining the constitution and laws of nature. He also performs special acts of Grace, not otherwise provided for as highest welfare of man requires.

6. **THE SINFULNESS OF MAN**—Man was created innocent, but by disobedience fell into a state of sin and condemnation. His posterity, therefore inherited a fallen nature of such tendencies that all who come to years of accountability, sin and become guilty before God.

7. **THE WORK OF CHRIST**—The Son of God, by His incarnation, life, suffering, death, and resurrection effected for all a redemption from sin that is full and free and is the ground of salvation by faith.

8. **THE WORK OF SALVATION**—The conditions of salvation are:
1. Repentance or sincere sorrow for sin and the hearty renunciations of it.
2. Faith or the unreserved committal of one's self to Christ as Saviour and Lord, with purpose to love and obey Him in all things. In the exercise of saving faith the soul is renewed by the Holy Spirit; freed from the dominion of sin and becomes a child of God.
3. Continuance in faith and obedience until death.

9. **ELECTION**—God determined from the beginning to save all who should comply with the conditions of salvation. Hence by faith in Christ, men become His elect.

10. **FREEDOM OF WILL**—The Human will is free and self controlled, having power to yield to the influence of the truth and the Spirit and live, or to resist them and perish.

11. **SALVATION FREE**—God desires the salvation of all, the Gospel invites all, the Holy Spirit strives with all, and whosoever will may come and take the water of life freely.

12. **PERSEVERENCE**—All believers in Christ, who through grace persevere in holiness to the end of life, have the promise of eternal salvation.

13. **BACKSLIDING AND APOSTASY**—A person who has been regenerated or born again and is living in unconfessed, unforgiven sin, is rebellious to the principles of the Kingdom of God and His righteousness, and therefore is a backslider in a lost condition who must repent and be restored to the right relationship with God or be eternally lost.

We recognize, according to Hebrews 6:4-6, that it is possible for a person to get in the condition that he could never return to Christ. This, we believe, is Apostasy; However, we also recognize that a regenerate person can fall into sin, be in a lost condition and still not be an Apostate. This person, through repentance, can be reconciled to God.

14. **GOSPEL ORDINANCES**—Baptism, or the immersion of believers in water, and the Lord's Supper, are ordinances to be perpetuated under the Gospel; Feet Washing, an ordinance teaching humility, of universal obligation, and to be administered to all true believers.

15. **TITHING**—God commanded tithes and offerings in the Old Testament; Jesus Christ endorsed in the Gospel (Matt. 23:23), and the Apostle Paul said, "Upon the first day of the week let every one of you lay by him in store as God hath prospered him." 1 Cor. 16:2.

16. **THE CHRISTIAN SABBATH**—The divine law requires that one day in seven be set apart from the secular employment and amusements for rest, worship, holy works and activities, and for personal communion with God.

17. **RESURRECTION, JUDGMENT, AND FINAL RETRIBUTION**—The Scriptures teach the resurrection of all men at the last day. They that have done good will come forth to the resurrection of life, and they that have done evil unto the resurrection of damnation: then the wicked shall "Go away into eternal punishment but the righteous into eternal life."

RULES OF ORDER

1. At every sitting of the Association, business shall be opened and concluded by prayer by the Moderator or whomever he may request.

2. Ministers and deacons present are invited to seats, allowed to take part in debates on all subjects, and to vote.

3. Those who speak shall rise and address the Moderator. Personal reflections shall be avoided in all debates.

4. No motion may be discussed until made and seconded.

5. When a motion has been made and seconded, and a member opposes its discussion, the Moderator shall put the question, "Shall it be discussed?" If negative, the question shall not be discussed.

6. If any proposition or motion under debate contains two or more points, it shall be divided at the request of any member, and the vote taken separately.

7. Motions made and lost shall not be recorded.

8. No one shall speak more than twice on the same subject without special leave of the Moderator.

9. All questions shall be decided by a majority vote of all Members present.

BY-LAWS OF STATE ASSOCIATION

1. The Clerk or assistant clerk, or in their absence, the senior minister in years shall call the Association into conference, and if a quorum is present the moderator, or in his absence, the assistant moderator shall take charge; and if neither of them is present the senior minister in years shall act as Moderator.

2. It shall be the duty of the clerk to enroll the delegates to the Association, who shall present themselves with proper evidence of their rights to seats therein, and those enrolled by the clerk shall compose the Association.

3. It shall be the duty of every District belonging to this Association to send a letter to every annual session of this Association reporting in the same spiritual condition, benevolent work, and its statistics. Any District belonging to this Association, which shall fail to report itself for two successive sessions, may be dismissed from the Association by a two thirds vote of all members present.

4. Each meeting shall be opened by reading a portion of the Bible and with prayer, and shall be closed with prayer.

5. By a two-thirds vote of members present, a ruling of the moderator can be overruled.

6. This Association may correspond by messenger or otherwise with other religious bodies.

7. This Association shall sit with open doors except when it shall go into a committee of the whole.

8. Any person not a member of this Association may be allowed to take part in its discussions by obtaining permission from the moderator.

9. It shall be the duty of all the Association to be present at the time appointed for each meeting, and anyone wishing to retire shall first obtain leave of the moderator.

10. No person shall be allowed to nominate more than one member of any committee, provided the person nominated be elected.

11. The moderator shall not allow discussions when not carried on in a Christian spirit or when he thinks it will cause discord or division.

12. Anyone desiring to speak shall rise to his feet and address the moderator by the appellation "Brother Moderator," but shall not speak further until recognized by the moderator.

13. No member of this association shall be allowed to speak more than ten minutes nor twice on the same subject without permission from the moderator.

14. This association shall meet annually beginning on Tuesday following the second Sunday in October.

15. These By-Laws may be altered or amended at any regular or adjourned session of this Association by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

CONSTITUTION OF STATE ASSOCIATION

PREAMBLE: From long experience, we the members of the Free Will Baptist denomination, being regularly baptized upon a profession of our faith in Jesus Christ, and realizing the necessity of a bond in union and fellowship among us as a church; and to preserve and maintain correspondence and co-ordination with us, do therefore ordain this Constitution for our better denomination government.

ARTICLE I

NAME: This organization shall be known as the OKLAHOMA STATE ASSOCIATION OF FREE WILL BAPTISTS.

ARTICLE II

PURPOSE: The object and purpose of this organization shall be to unify the work of the various bodies composing this State Association, and to devise and execute measures for the extension of the Kingdom of God in connection with the various bodies in the Association, or that may hereafter be represented therein.

ARTICLE III

REPRESENTATION: Section 1. This Association shall be composed of all ordained ministers and deacons with membership in some local church which is a member of a district Association with membership in the State Association.

Section 2: Each District Association shall be entitled to a number of elected delegates equal with the number of churches composing said Association. These delegates may be recommended by the local churches and shall be endorsed by their district association.

ARTICLE IV

FINANCE: Each district association shall be responsible for sending \$35.00 per church to the State Association for State and National Convention fee, of this \$35.00, \$25.00 shall go to the State Association and \$10.00 to the National Association.

ARTICLE V

DISCIPLINE: This State Association shall have the right to settle any question of discipline, doctrine or practices that may properly come before it from any of the bodies composing said organization; furthermore, if there be any question

of discipline, doctrine or practices on the part of an affiliated association, delegates of that association shall not be seated until these questions have been settled to the satisfaction of the General Board.

Section 2: Decisions of the General Board may be appealed in this manner. All appeals shall come before the State Association when sitting in a committee as a whole.

ARTICLE VI

OFFICERS: A. The officers of the State Association shall consist of a Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, and an Executive Secretary. Each of these shall be elected at the close of each regular session except the Executive Secretary.

B. (1) The Executive Secretary shall be elected for an indefinite term. It shall be the responsibility of the Executive Board to seek out a prospective candidate and make their recommendation to the body at the state association in its regular session, with privilege of nominations from the floor.

(2) In the event of a vacancy occurring during the course of the year, the Executive Board shall fill the vacancy until the annual setting of the association.

ARTICLE VII

BOARDS: All standing boards shall be composed of seven (7) elected members who shall serve terms of 7, 6, 5, 4, 3, 2 and 1 years with such ex-officio members as may be provided for elsewhere, with no member serving more than two (2) consecutive terms of office or portion thereof, except: (1) the General Board which shall be composed of one (1) member from each affiliated association, the chairman of each standing board, and the current general officers of this association, and (2) the College Board of Trustees which shall be composed as provided for in the Articles of Incorporation of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc.

The standing boards of this association shall be: Executive Board; Board of Church Extension, Missions and Evangelism; Sunday School Board; Church Training Service Board; and College Board of Trustees.

No standing board shall meet in a functional meeting during the session of this association.

ARTICLE VIII

DUTIES, SCOPE OF ENDEAVOR AND QUALIFICATIONS OF STANDING BOARDS

Section 1. EXECUTIVE BOARD: The Executive Board shall be composed of seven (7) members who are members of an affiliated association and in good standing with the association of which they are members. They shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

It shall be the duty of this board to act in behalf of the association when it is not in session. It shall be bound to carry out the directions of the association and shall hold itself bound by every consideration of morality and honor to carry out the wishes of this association and to act under its instructions in whatever technical rights, civil laws and the decisions of courts may give it in certain emergencies. It shall be the duty of this board to sign their signatures to any and all papers concerning properties, indebtedness, bonds, or other legal documents

pertaining to the execution of the will of this association, exclusive of the College Board of Trustees.

This board shall have the oversight of the Executive Department of this association. The members shall assist and direct such work for the general promotion of this association as is deemed needful or necessary as the means available shall permit. The Executive Department shall serve as the coordinating agency of this association to correlate the work of all standing boards and agencies.

This board shall have the oversight of Free Will Baptist Book Store and shall endeavor to serve affiliated associations and churches and the community with literature and church supplies. Merchandising procedures shall be those accepted as normal retail procedures with the board being cognizant of the spiritual contribution of the store in distributing Christian literature.

All decisions of this board shall be governed by the general tenets of this association and shall not violate this constitution.

This board shall organize itself and elect such officers as necessary to the orderly conduct of its affairs and labors. This board shall keep an accurate record of all meetings, decisions, and work done and shall make a report in writing at each annual session of this association. All records shall be available to this association at its request.

Whereas this board represents the association when not in session, it and it alone shall have the power to call the association into special conference provided each affiliated association shall be given notice at least ten (10) days prior to the meeting of such special conference.

Section 2. GENERAL BOARD: This board shall be composed of one (1) member from each affiliated association, the chairman of each standing board, and the current general officers of this association. Each member must be a member of an affiliated association and in good standing with the association of which he is a member. The members shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

The duties of this board shall be to meet one (1) day preceding the annual session of this association. This board shall serve as the credential committee with the duties and responsibilities assigned by Article V of this constitution. This board shall hear reports of all standing boards. It shall serve as budget committee and shall make such recommendations as deemed pertinent to this association. A complete and accurate record shall be kept of meetings of this board and a report shall be made in writing to this association in its annual session.

The moderator of the association shall serve as chairman of this board, and the clerk of the association shall serve as its clerk.

Section 3. BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION, MISSIONS AND EVANGELISM: This board shall be composed of seven (7) members who are members of affiliated associations and in good standing with the associations of which they are members. They shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

It shall be the duty of this board to labor to further the Gospel of Jesus Christ into the uttermost parts of the earth. In accomplishing this, they are to endeavor to establish missions and churches in communities within the bounds of

this association with whatever moral and financial assistance that may be theirs. In cases of small churches failing to function, whatever assistance deemed appropriate shall be rendered to maintain the effective witness of that church by either direct labor with the church or with an associational board in instances where the affiliated association has a functional board or agency.

This board shall be empowered to receive and convey title to real property in the area of its labors.

The promotion of missionary endeavors from a local, state or national level shall come within the scope of endeavor of this board. This board shall assist in maintaining prayer and financial support of missionary enterprises through whatever channels available.

Whereas missionary and evangelistic labors are so intimately related, this board shall assist through participation or assistance in maintaining a strong evangelistic thrust in the life of affiliated association.

This board shall organize itself and elect such officers as necessary to the orderly conduct of its affairs and labors. This board shall keep an accurate record of all meetings, decisions, work done, funds received and disbursed and shall make a report in writing at each annual session of this association. All records shall be available to this association at its request.

Section 4. COLLEGE BOARD OF TRUSTEES: The College Board of Trustees shall be composed as provided for in the Articles of Incorporation of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc.

Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc. is an agency of the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists and is incorporated under the corporate laws of the State of Oklahoma. The articles of incorporation are a part of this association's record and delineate the purpose, duty and scope of endeavor of the members of this board.

Section 5. CHURCH TRAINING SERVICE BOARD: This board shall be composed of seven members who are members of affiliated associations and in good standing with the associations of which they are members. They shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

The duties of this board shall be to plan and assist in organizing and sustaining a strong Church Training Service in every church in each association affiliated with this association with every means of promotion and assistance available to them. This board shall plan, coordinate and conduct state-wide youth camps or camp.

This board shall organize itself and elect such officers as necessary to the orderly conduct of its affairs and labors. This board shall keep an accurate record of all meetings, decisions, work done, funds received and disbursed and shall make a report in writing at each annual session of this association. All records shall be available to this association at its request.

Section 6. SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD: This board shall be composed of seven (7) members who are members of affiliated associations and in good standing with the associations of which they are members. They shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

The duties of this board shall be to plan and promote Sunday schools in every church in each association affiliated with this association. This board shall use every available means to promote Sunday school clinics, seminars, institutes

and conventions on local, district and state-wide basis, working with local agencies to distribute and employ all effective methods and material available.

This board shall organize itself and elect such officers as necessary to the orderly conduct of its affairs and labors. This board shall keep an accurate record of all meetings, decisions, work done, funds received and disbursed and shall make a report in writing at each annual session of this association. All records shall be available to this association at its request.

Section 7. VACANCIES: Vacancies shall occur when a member moves from the territorial bounds of this association, by death, by resignation or by removal from office by this association. In the event of disciplinary action where charges concerning misconduct, doctrine or practice shall have been lodged against a member of any board, his office shall be held in abeyance until such charges shall be concluded or as determined by this association.

All boards shall have power to fill vacancies arising between sessions of this association. Such appointment shall terminate at the next session of the association and shall be filled by this association.

Section 8. EMPLOYEES: All employees of boards or agencies of this association shall be employed by agreement or contract with employing board or agency upon approval of this association except those elected by this association and the conditions of their employment shall be those approved by this association.

The duties of the Executive Secretary of this association shall be:

- (1) He is to represent, or cause to be represented, the association at all affairs of interest to the association.
- (2) He is to promote the work of the association in such a manner so as to unify the efforts of the association.
- (3) He is to serve with all standing boards and committees of the association in an ex-officio capacity.
- (4) He is to aid in planning the work of the association by relating the activities and plans of one board to another.
- (5) He is to report to the association during each annual session.
- (6) He is to communicate to the affiliated members of this association the pressing causes and events before the association. This can be in person or by means of a periodical bulletin or both.
- (7) He shall serve as treasurer of this association. An accurate and complete record of all funds received and disbursed shall be kept and a written report shall be included in his report to this association in its annual session.
- (8) The conditions of employment shall be determined by the Executive Board.

ARTICLE IX

DISSOLUTION: Should this association cease to function, all properties and holdings shall go to the National Association of Free Will Baptists after all creditors are satisfied and indebtedness cleared.

ARTICLE X

AMENDMENTS: This constitution may be amended or altered at any regular session of the association by a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of members

present and voting, provided proposed amendment or alteration be presented in writing to the body one (1) day in advance.

ARTICLE XI

SPECIAL SESSIONS: Elected delegates to the last session of this association shall be retained as standing delegates for special called sessions.
