#### **PROCEEDINGS**

### TUESDAY EVENING, OCTOBER 12, 1982

The Seventy-Fourth Annual Session of the Oklahoma State Association meeting in the field house of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Moore, Oklahoma opened with singing a soul stirring rendition of "How Great Thou Art."

Rolla Smith invoked the Lord's blessings upon the session in leading the congregation in prayer.

Ed Pack, serving as music director for the entire session, directed the Association in singing "Power in the Blood."

Edwin Wade, President of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, gave a warm welcome to the campus of Hillsdale and to the college facilities.

Ed Pack then directed the Association in singing "He Keeps Me Singing."

Hillsdale's concert choir rendered praise in singing "Praise the Lord,

Allelujah!" and "Happy Is the Man."

Jerry Dudley, Clerk, called the Association into official session and introduced the officers of the Association: Lonnie DaVoult, Executive Secretary; Richard Pressnell, Assistant Clerk; Earl Scroggins, Assistant Moderator and James Murray, Moderator.

James Murray, Moderator, delivered the Moderator's message from the text of Ephesians 2:11-14. The message emphasized "God's People, God's Word, and God's Work" which together produce a "Fundamental Fellowship."

O. T. Dixon introduced the speaker, Odell Nunley, who brought to us a message from the theme of the Association "Fundamental Truths" entitled "The Doctrine of God" using the text Luke 1:1-4. A good, Bible centered, instructive message was received.

The clerk read the appointment of all committees. (See Committees) The worship hour was dismissed in prayer led by Roy Thomas.

#### THE WEDNESDAY MORNING SESSION

' The Wednesday morning session, October 13, 1982, was called to order with Larry Wetwiska leading the Association in singing "There Is Power In the Blood" accompanied by Waldo Young at the piano.

Frank Young led the Association in prayer for the session. The Moderator received special prayer requests. A host of requests were listed. Lonnie DaVoult then led the Association in a season of prayer for these requests.

Larry Wetwiska led the Association in singing "Take the Name of Jesus

With You."

James Murray, Moderator, brought the morning devotion from Ephesians 2:11-19 emphasizing "Our Fellowship in God's Family" by grace and God's sovereign control.

Visitors from other bodies were recognized and invited to be seated in counsel with the Association.

A partial report of the General Board, acting as credentials committee, was given by the clerk. (See General Board Report)

A motion and second carried to receive Item No. 1 of the General Board report and seat the delegates from each Association. Corrections in the listing of delegates was made and alternates were seated.

Jerry Dudley, President of the Greater Oklahoma City Ministers Fellowship speaking in behalf of the churches of the area and especially the Capitol Hill Church, welcomed the Association to Oklahoma City.

A motion and second carried to adopt the printed program, leaving the time element flexible.

The Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College report containing some recommended changes in the constitution of the college was called for to provide for the recommended changes to be received and lay on the table for the required time for later consideration. A partial report of the Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College Trustees was given as related to the constitutional changes. (See Hillsdale FWB College Report)

A motion and second carried to amend the proposed constitutional

change by adding "or dismissed" after the phrase ".. shall be appointed ..."

A motion and second carried to lay the item as amended on the table for the required time and later discussion.

David McDougal, Chairman of the Executive Board, gave the Executive Board report. Motion and second carried to receive the report. Inasmuch as the General Board report contained a recommendation relating to the Executive Board report, the Moderator requested the reading of that recommendation.

Following the Clerk's reading of the recommendation contained in item II of the General Board Report, second paragraph, a motion and second carried to receive this partial report of the General Board. (See General Board Report)

A motion and second carried to amend the Executive Board Report.

A motion and second carried to adopt the Executive Board Report item by item as amended. Items (1), (2), and (3) were adopted.

Resolution No. 1 from the Resolution Committee was read by the clerk. A motion and second carried to adopt resolution No. 1. (See Resolution Committee Report)

A motion and second carried to amend the Executive Board Report by substituting Resolution No. 1 for Item No. 2 in the Executive Board report.

A motion and second carried to lay the proposed constitutional changes in the Executive Board Report on the table as required for later discussion. The Moderator then called a recess in the business for morning worship.

#### WEDNESDAY MORNING WORSHIP SERVICE

The Wednesday morning worship hour was called to order by the Moderator, James Murray. Glenn Hood opened the worship as he led the Association in prayer.

Ed Pack led the Association in singing, "He Led Me Out."

The Harvesters Quartet from Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College sang "God's Forever Family" and "Promises."

Tracey Cariker blessed all hearts by singing "He Was Seeking for Me."

Gene Thomas was introduced and he delivered the morning message "The Doctrine of Salvation" from the theme "Fundamental Truths." From the text Luke 1:1-4, he emphasized "The Plan, the Promise, and the Power of Salvation." We received an excellent message of instruction, challenge and piety with great emphasis upon our absolute need for salvation from the Lord.

The worship hour was dismissed in prayer led by Sherman Webb.

#### WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON SESSION

The Wednesday afternoon session was called to order with singing led by Ed Pack, accompanied by Sue Mullins at the piano, singing "My Saviour's Love."

Joe Blair brought the afternoon devotions from I Timothy 1:4-6 with the emphasis being that the purpose of the gospel is to change man's life and give him a pure conscience by being led by the Holy Spirit. Perseverance in the faith is essential for us to experience the purposes of God. The devotion was closed in prayer. The Moderator declared the Association back into official session.

A motion and second carried to adopt Item No. 3 of the Executive Board Report.

A resolution from the Dibble Association which was not enclosed with their letter was read by the clerk wherein the Association was requested to employ and dismiss every employee of every department of the Association.

A motion and second carried to not discuss the resolution.

Lonnie DaVoult gave the Executive Department report. A motion and second carried to receive the report.

Melvin Worthington, Executive Secretary of the National Association of Free Will Baptists gave a report of the National Executive Department expressing appreciation for Oklahoma's "Leadership, Loyalty, and Love." The report was received as information.

Ray Martin, Manager, gave a report of Oklahoma Free Will Baptist Book Store. A motion and second carried to adopt the report.

Frank Giles was elected to fill the unexpired term of 5 years formerly held by Bill Jones who moved from the state on the Executive Board.

Roy Bingham was elected to serve a 7 year term as a member of the Executive Board.

Tom Ballard gave the report of the State Sunday School Board. A motion and second carried to adopt the report.

Danny Hester, Vice Chairman of the Sunday School Board, presented a plaque to Edmond Warner for 28 years of faithful service on the Sunday School Board.

Joel Kircher was elected as 7 year member to the Sunday School Board. Harold Harrison, Assistant Director of Randall House Publications, gave a report of the National Sunday School and Church Training Service Department. The report was received as information.

Berton Perry, Chairman, gave a report of the State Mission Board. David Bigger gave a report stating that the Ponca City mission has reached the level of self-supporting and expressed appreciation for the support from the Association. A rising vote of "thanks" was given to the David Bigger family for their faithful labor in planting and bringing the church to this place.

Jim Smith of Weatherford; Gary Thomas of Bartlesville; and Curtis Linton of Lawton gave a report on the progress of the work in each of their places of labor.

A motion and second carried to adopt the report.

Ron Carner presented a plaque to Berton Perry for 17 years of faithful service on the State Mission Board.

Roy Thomas, General Director of National Home Mission Department, gave a report of National Home Mission works throughout North America. The report was received as information.

Rolla Smith, General Director of National Foreign Missions Department, gave a report of that department, listing all missionaries from Oklahoma and new appointees, pointing out that this is the largest number of new appointees in some years.

Eddie Payne, missionary to Ivory Coast, Africa, reported on the progress

The New Life Singers from Hillsdale sang "Family of God."

The Oklahoma Ministers quartet sang "The Prodigal."

Brenda Webb sang "We Shall Behold Him."

Ted Davis, presiding, introduced Charles Murphy for our morning message. From the text of 2 Peter 3:9-13 the message was delivered entitled "The Doctrine of Eschatology (the second coming) relating to "the Person of His coming; the Positiveness of His coming; the Prededure of His coming; the Power of His Coming; and the Prospect of His coming. #### RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE REPORT

Resolution No. 1

BE IT RESOLVED that the Constitution of the Oklahoma State Association be amended by substitution the following as (3) under B. of Article VI.

(3) Any time a majority of the Executive Board, or seven (7) members of the General Board requests a vote of confidence on the Executive Secretary, a vote shall be taken. If such action results in the termination of the Executive Secretary, he shall be given sixty (60) days severance pay.

In the event of immorality on the part of the Executive Secretary, or of him teaching or preaching doctrine contrary to the Free Will Baptist Treatise, he may be dismissed by a majority vote of the Executive Board with no severance pay.

#### Resolution No. 2

The Capitol Hill Church, its pastor and people, have been excellent hosts. Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College has been gracious to host the two evening services. The officers have served well. We appreciate all of these. Therefore, BE IT RESOLVED that a rising vote of appreciation be given the above mentioned.

#### **OBITUARY COMMITTEE REPORT**

The Obituary Committee received reports of 199 deaths in the various Associations during this past year, among them were: Rev. Noah Smith of Hopewell Association No. 2; Rev. Ale (Doc) Reynold of South Grand River Association and Rev. Alfred Coussey also of South Grand River Association.

#### PUBLIC MORALS COMMITTEE

- 1. We recommend that the State Association reaffirm our stand on the use of alcohol and drugs as stated in the Church Covenant regarding the use and sale of such. We encourage our people to continue the support of S.A.N.E.
- 2. We recommend that the State Association reaffirm its opposition to the legalization of gambling in any form. We further recommend actively opposing para-mutuel gambling when it is presented for county option.
- 3. Television: We recommend that we reaffirm the resolution concerning TV that was approved in the National Association of Free Will Baptists while meeting in Louisville, Kentucky, July 1981. Whereas, obvious advancements have been made in accomplishing the goals of the "Clean Up TV" campaign. Be it resolved that we continue to press for a higher moral standard through the "Clean Up" of television.
- 4. Abortion: We recommend that we reaffirm our stand on the sanctity of life and our opposition to abortion on demand. We heartily endorse the stand of the National Association adopted in Anaheim, California in July 1980.
- 5. Moral Standards: Due to the continuing lowering of social moral standards across our country with the "new morality"; public school's sex

education"; the general public's acceptance of "gay rights"; the abandonment of the conventional marriage and the break-down of the family; the epidemic proportions of "illegitimate teenage pregnancies"; we recommend:

Our churches, membership and ministers, re-establish a thorough teaching and preaching of the scriptural standards of living, both in and out of the church. We further recommend that pastors voice opposition to the increasing problem of women wearing slacks in church worship services.

#### THE GENERAL BOARD REPORT

The General Board of the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists met October 11, 1982 at the Capitol Hill Free Will Baptist Church, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. As a result of that meeting, we offer the following items for your consideration.

- I. We received communication from twenty-three (23) district associations holding membership in this body. We recommend that their letters be received and their delegates be seated. (Adopted)
- II. We heard the reports of the Executive Board, the Executive Secretary, the Free Will Baptist Book Store, Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, the Church Training Service Board, and the Sunday School Board and the State Mission Board.

We recommend that each of these reports be adopted as given with one (1) exception. We recommend that item (c) [last sentence] of recommendation number 2 be amended by adding "with no severance pay." (Adopted and then replaced by substitution of Resolution No. 1)

We recommend the Resolutions Committee present Recommendation No. 2 in a form to be added to Article VI of the State Constitution.

III. Serving as Budget Committee, we offer the following:

(1) We recommend a Cooperative Budget of \$275,000 to be distrited as follows:

#### STATE EXECUTIVE BOARD REPORT

The State Executive Board met three times this year.

The Board authorized the spending of money by the Executive Secretary to a set amount when he feels it necessary for the promotion of Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists.

The Executive Secretary was authorized to purchase a new addressing machine.

We recommend the adoption of the budget.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS:

1) The State Executive Board met on Sept. 21, 1982 and made the following recommendation.

Motion carried to present to the State Association the proposed State Office Building of approximately 3,000 sq. ft., to be constructed at an estimated cost not to exceed \$125,000.00.

If this proposal is approved by the State Association the Executive Board will get the specifications at a cost of \$3,500.00 and after getting bids, if it cannot be built for \$125,000.00 then the Executive Board will not proceed with the building.

We propose it be financed as follows:

\$25,000.00 to come from the State Office (Executive);

\$25,000.00 in gifts from churches;

\$75,000.00 loan

The monthly payment of approximately \$1,200 on a 10-year loan will be paid from the following sources:

\$500.00 monthly from the Bookstore

\$400.00 from the Executive Office

and the additional income from the coop by changing the following:

1% of Hillsdale coop

@ \$230.00

1% of Sunday School coop 1% of C.T.S. coop

(a) \$230.00(a) \$230.00

with the balance or additional funds of \$390 for operational expense, insurance and utilities, misc.

Motion carried that additional available office space will be made available to Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College. (Adopted)

2) We present the following recommendation to the State Association for acceptance as procedural guidelines in the event the Executive Secretary should be dismissed:

We recommend that a vote of confidence may be taken concerning the employment of the Executive Secretary only when recommended by the Executive Board or General Board.

In the event he is terminated by the State Association he will be given 60 days severance pay.

In the event of immorality or teaching contrary to Free Will Baptist Treatises he may be dismissed by the Executive Board. (Replaced by Resolution No. 1)

3) We recommend the State Association go to Ada in 1983 for our 75th Anniversary Association instead of Muskogee and go to Muskogee in 1984. (Adopted)

#### EXECUTIVE SECRETARY'S REPORT

# STATE ASSOCIATION OF FREE WILL BAPTISTS NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS JUNE 30, 1982

## (1) SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The State Association of Free Will Baptists is a non-profit organization designed to provide central leadership and representation for the Free Will Baptists of Oklahoma and to handle certain receipts and disbursements of the Free Will Baptist Church. The Association uses the fund method of accounting, whereby the fund balance represents the equity the Association has in its assets. This accounting method is generally accepted among non-profit organizations as the most feasible way of reflecting their financial activity and position.

The Association's property and equipment is depreciated on the straight-line basis using the following estimated useful lives:

Furniture, fixtures and equipment acquired subsequent to July 1, 1972 \_\_\_\_\_\_8 years Furniture, fixtures and equipment acquired prior to July 1, 1972 \_\_\_\_\_\_3 years

# (2) MORTGAGE RECEIVABLE

The executive residence was sold on May 30, 1974 for \$20,500. The buyer assumed the mortgage on the property and gave the Association a second mortgage on the property for \$10,300. Payments were to begin on July 1, 1974. The rate of interest is 8% and the mortgage is for thirty years.

### (3) COOPERATIVE CONTRIBUTIONS

The Executive Office of the State Association was allocated 21% in 1982 and 21% in 1981 of cooperative contributions for the financing of its operations for the fiscal year.

Curtis Linton has led the Lawton Church into a building program. They are at the present time meeting in their new church building. Much of the work on their new building has been done with donated labor.

The mission board has set some goals for the 80's which we hope to accomplish. We have adopted the slogan "8 in the 80's" for this decade. We hope to build eight new churches in Oklahoma in the next eight years. Too, we hope to employ a full-time missions promoter as soon as we are able to do so. We feel these are realistic goals which should be easily accomplished if our people continue to help as they have in the past.

We want to thank the people of the state for the way they have responded to our mission program. We have some fine churches we would not have had if they had not helped.

Greetings from the National Home Missions Department. 1981 is now history. I trust that it was a good year for you folks and that 1982 is also a challenging one for you.

1981 was an outstanding year for National Home Missions! Our missionaries and staff members saw a record number of over 1,500 souls saved and gave \$106,386.66 from their mission churches to outside causes! Twelve new missionary couples were approved and sent to the field in 1981, as in 1980. Eight mission churches became self-supporting and one new state was entered in 1981—Wisconsin!

A new record was set in giving to National Home Missions! The total gifts to the National Home Missions Department was \$1,314,-896.74. This was the second year in a row that we reached over a million dollars in gifts to our Department!

Twenty-six states and the Virgin Islands exceeded their quotas for 1981. Oklahoma gave \$143,588.63, which was \$23,588.63 over your quota of \$120,000.00. This letter is to say thanks to you and all the wonderful people in Oklahoma. Without your giving, praying, and helping in so many other ways, this could not have been possible.

So far in 1982 Oklahoma has given \$97,717.76 toward your year's quota of \$130,000.00. We are thankful for this response from your great state, and we ask you to do what you can to help us reach the National Home Missions quota for 1982 of \$1,100,000.00.

We are thankful for David Bigger in Ponca City, Curtis Linton in Lawton, and Gary Thomas in Bartlesville who are working with the National and State Mission Boards as Joint Project workers. They are all doing a fine job in establishing strong churches in their cities. We ask that you please continue to pray for all of our home missionaries and for us here in the office that 1982 will prove to be the most effective year that we have ever had for our Lord.

The world of mankind was the object of God's love when He provided the plan of salvation through the sacrificial death of His only begotten Son.

It is God's will and plan that Christians in each generation share the gospel of Jesus Christ with all nations and peoples. The foreign missions department exists for the purpose of helping Free Will Baptist churches and individuals fulfill our share of that obligation. We count it a high privilege and honor to be thus associated with you and other Free Will Baptists across the country.

Oklahoma's role in foreign missions is noteworthy. Missionaries Elaine Allen, Jerry Banks, Judy Bryan, Dock Caton, Norma Caton, Mike Cousineau, Earnie Deeds, Eddie Payne, Lonnie Sparks and Arilla Wode are natives of your state.

Your financial support is significant and deeply appreciated. Only the Lord knows the full worth and impact of your prayers but I am confident many victories have been won on foreign soil by our missionaries because of your prayers. We sincerely thank each church and individual who helps make this great ministry possible.

As you will note in the chart below, total income was appreciably above that of the previous year. We are thankful that the receipts exceeded the budget. Oklahoma was under the suggested quota by \$25,504.69 but we praise the Lord for gifts totaling \$232,495.31. The table

below gives the amounts Oklahoma has given during the past five years in relation to total income for the department.

This is reason for rejoicing but there is sadness because we and other Christians are reaching so few of the earth's multiplied millions who have no opportunity to hear about Christ.

However, much additional income for missions can be realized through memorial gifts, wills, annuities, deferred giving, special projects, Vacation Bible Schools and Christmas offerings. As time permits, furloughing missionaries and home office personnel are available for missionary conferences, missionary revivals and other

The Hillsdale Board of Trustees recommends the following changes in the Constitution of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College.
SECTION II

#### INTRODUCTION

The Federally funded student aid programs of HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE of Moore, Oklahoma were audited by us for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1982. The fiscal year ended June 30, 1982 was the ninth year the College has been a participant in the National Direct Student Loan, College Work-Study, Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant and Basic Educational Opportunity Grant student aid programs.

Our audit of the National Direct Student Loan Program, College Work-Study Program, Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant Program and Basic Educational Opportunity Grant Program was performed in accordance with "Standards for Audit of Governmental Organizations, Programs, Activities and Functions" issued by the Comptroller General in June 1972 (1974 reprint) and the audit guides prescribed by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare dated June 1980. The purpose of the audit was to formulate an opinion on the basic financial statements taken as a whole and to determine if these programs were administered in accordance with regulations and guidelines set out by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

As part of our review, we obtained confirmations from selected students on SEOG awards, students participating in the CWS Program and student NDSL loan balances. We mailed out thirty requests for confirmations to students participating in the campus base programs. This is about 30% of the total number of students receiving student aid funds. We received twenty-five confirmations back from the students, all of which were in agreement. The remaining confirmations were not returned by the students.

The review included:

1. Evaluation of the institution's policies, procedures and practices

used to administer the program.

2. Determination of compliance with applicable sections of the acts, related Federal regulations and Office of Education policies and procedures.

3. Evaluation of the institution's systems of internal control, accounting and reporting, and the controls maintained in the operation of and accounting for the funds provided for the programs. Also the appropriate financial statements, ED Form 646 were reviewed.

The audit covered the period of July 1, 1981 through June 30, 1982 and field work was performed during the period of July 2, 1982 through July 22, 1982 at the institution's business and student financial aid offices.

Our unqualified opinion on the basic financial statements appears elsewhere in this report. During the audit, nothing came to our attention which caused us to believe that the Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College had not generally administered its student aid programs (CWS, SEOG), BEOG and NDSL) in accordance with the Department of Health, Education and Welfare Audit Guide for the NDSL, CWS, BEOG, and SEOG programs.

We have examined the balance sheets of the National Direct Student Loan, College Work-Study, Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grants and Basic Educational Opportunity Grants Programs of HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE at June 30, 1982, and the related statements of income and expenditures and fund balances for the year then ended. Our examination was made in accordance with the financial and compliance elements of the Standards for Audits of Governmental Organizations, Programs, Activities and Functions, issued by the U.S. Comptroller General in 1972 (1974 reprint). Accordingly, we conducted such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances. The Guides for Audits of NDS, CWS and SEOG Programs, Department of Health, Education and Welfare, dated June 1980 and BEOG, dated June 1981, were used as guides in the examination.

In our opinion, the above mentioned financial statements present fairly the financial position of the College Work-Study, Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grants, Basic Educational Opportunity Grants and the National Direct Student Loan Programs of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College at June 30, 1982 and the results of their operations for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of

the preceding year.

Our examination referred to above was directed primarily toward formulating an opinion on the aforementioned financial statements as of and for the year ended June 30, 1982 taken as a whole. The supplementary data included in Schedules 1 and 2 are presented for supplementary analysis purposes and are not necessary for a fair presentation of the financial position as of June 30, 1982 and the changes in fund balances for the year then ended. The supplementary data included in Schedules 1 and 2 have been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the examination of the basic financial statements and, in our opinion, are stated fairly in all material respects only when considered in conjunction with the financial statements of the NDSL, CWS, SEOG and BEOG programs taken as a whole.

#### HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE

We have examined the financial statements of the National Direct Student Loans, College Work-Study, Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grants and Basic Educational Opportunity Grant Programs, HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE, for the year ended June 30, 1982. As a part of our examination, we reviewed and tested the College's system of internal accounting control to the extent we considered necessary to evaluate the system as required by "Standards for Audits of Governmental Organizations, Programs, Activities and Functions" issued by the Comptroller General (GAO) in June 1972 (1974 reprint). Under these standards, the purpose of such evaluation is to establish a basis for reliance thereon in determining the nature, timing and extent of other auditing procedures that are necessary for expressing an opinion on the financial statements.

We have also made a study of those internal accounting control and administrative control procedures of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College that we considered relevant to the criteria established by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare as set forth in Sections 3.2, 3.3 and 3.4 of its Audit Guide issued June 1980. Our study included tests of compliance with such procedures for the year ended June 30,

1982.

The objective of internal accounting control is to provide reasonable, but not absolute, assurance as to the safeguarding of assets against loss

from unauthorized use or disposition, and the reliability of financial records for preparing financial statements and maintaining accountability for assets. We understand that the objective of those administrative control procedures comprehended in the Department of Health, Education and Welfare criteria is to provide similar assurance as to compliance with its related requirements. The concept of reasonable assurance recognizes that the cost of a system of internal control should not exceed the benefits derived and also recognizes that the evaluation of these factors necessarily requires estimates and judgments by management.

There are inherent limitations that should be recognized in considering the potential effectiveness of any system of internal accounting control. In the performance of most control procedures, errors can result from misunderstanding of instructions, mistakes of judgment, carelessness, or other personal factors. Control procedures whose effectiveness depends upon segregation of duties can be circumvented by collusion. Similarly, control procedures can be circumvented intentionally by management with respect either to the execution and recording of transactions or with respect to the estimates and judgments required in the preparation of financial statements. Further, projection of any evaluation of internal accounting control to future periods is subject to the risk that the procedures may become inadequate because of changes in conditions and that the degree of compliance with the procedures may deteriorate.

We understand that procedures in conformity with the criteria referred to in the second paragraph of this report are considered by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare to be adequate for its purposes in accordance with the provisions of the Higher Education Act of 1965 and related regulations, and that procedures not in conformity therewith indicate some inadequacy for such purposes. Based on this understanding and on our study, which would not necessarily disclose all weaknesses in the system, we believe the Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College procedures were adequate for the Department's purposes, except for the condition described below which we believe is not in conformity with the criteria referred to above.

Signed notes for the National Direct Student Loan Fund are maintained in a locked, fireproof file cabinet in accordance with HEW regulations. However, due to space problems the detail loan ledger is not kept in a fireproof or locked area. In the event of a fire, reconstruction of individual account balances would be extremely difficult. We recommend the acquisition of an additional fireproof file cabinet for safe-keeping of the detail loan ledger.

We hope the above recommendation will be helpful in providing the proper accounting records and internal control needed to effectively administer the Student Aid Programs of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College. If you have any questions, please do not hesitate to call.

Appreciations were extended to (1) Capitol Hill Church, (2) Special thanks to each speaker, each missionary, (3) Pianist, song director, and those who rendered special music, (4) State Officers, (5) State Officers expressed thanks to First Oklahoma Association for the corrages and for the lunch

they prepared, (6) Nursery provided by the Capitol Hill ladies.

Audit Committee report was presented with motion and second to accept. Carried. Margurite Kern gave a report on their church auxiliary and projects. (Hodge Podge Report) Greetings from Jimmy Smith and Weatherford Church. Greetings from Rolla Smith with the Foreign Mission Department. Special need was presented by Sister Jean Deeds of a Japanese girl who is training for mission work in Christian literature, Heloise Inagaki. Motion and second to send \$250.00 from general fund to Heloisa Inagaki. Carried. Motion and second that the convention adjourn. Carried. Dismissed in circle prayer led by President Carole Carner.

### THE FREE WILL BAPTIST MASTER'S MEN State of Oklahoma CONSTITUTION

### **PREAMBLE**

The purpose of the Free Will Baptist Master's Men, state of Oklahoma is to provide a means of Christian fellowship and to deepen the spiritual lives of the laymen of the local church. Also, to provide a means of developing the abilities and talents of the laymen, and to promote the cause of Christ through a complete, 'total church program,' as prescribed by Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists.

### ARTICLE I NAME

The name of this organization shall be known as the Free Will Baptist Master's Men, State of Oklahoma.

### ARTICLE II MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. The membership of this organization shall be composed of the district associations of Master's Men, and any local chapters where there is only

one chapter in the district, within the state of Oklahoma.

Section 2. Every member in good standing of an affiliated district association of Master's Men, or any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district, is entitled to the full benefits of membership.

Section 3. Each district association, or any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district, shall submit an annual, written report to this body, (as a matter of information).

# ARTICLE III OFFICERS

The officers of this organization shall consist of a president, vice-president and a secretary-treasurer.

The officers of this organization shall be elected annually and may succeed themselves, at this level.

# ARTICLE IV EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The executive committee shall consist of the elected officers of this organization and they shall serve as the program committee for each annual convention.

Section 2. Ex-officio members of the executive committee shall be the presidents of the district associations of Master's Men, presidents of any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district, and the state executive secretary of the State Association of Free Will Baptists.

### ARTICLE V MEETINGS

This organization shall meet annually at 7:30 P.M. on the Monday night before the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists convenes.

### ARTICLE VI AMENDMENTS

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of any regular meeting.

### BY-LAWS

### VOTING RIGHTS

Section 1. Every member of each affiliated district association, or any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district, is eligible to vote on all questions and matters that might come before the Free Will Baptist Master's Men, State of Oklahoma.

### COMMITTEES

Section 2. The executive committee shall transact all routine business and shall act for the organization in the interim between meetings.

Section 3. The executive committee shall meet at the call of the president.

Section 4. A nominating committee, for the annual election of officers, shall be composed of the presidents of each district association, and the president of any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district.

Section 5. The president shall appoint all other committees, subject to the approval of the body.

### FINANCE

Section 6. This organization shall be financed on the basis of offerings, dues and assessments.

### **QUORUM**

Section 7. One-tenth of the members of this organization shall constitute a quorum at any regular meeting.

### **AMENDMENTS**

Section 8. These by-laws may be amended at any regular meeting by a twothirds vote of the members present.

As adopted by the Free Will Baptist Master's Men, State of Oklahoma annual session, in Muskogee, Oklahoma October 19, 1970.

### CONSTITUTION OF MINISTER'S CONFERENCE

### **ARTICLE 1**

The Minister's Conference shall be called the Oklahoma State Free Will Baptist Minister's Conference, and shall be composed of Ordained Free Will Baptist Ministers who are regular members of some Orthodox Free Will Baptist church in the State of Oklahoma who have paid their \$1.00 dues.

### ARTICLE 2

The officers for this conference shall be President, Vice-President, and Clerk Treasurer, who shall be elected annually.

### **ARTICLE 3**

This conference shall have the power to discipline its members.

### **ARTICLE 4**

Members of this organization shall be all ordained ministers who participate in the benefits and activities of this body, and associate members who become members by payment of the \$1.00 annual dues.

### **ARTICLE 5**

This conference shall meet Semi-Annually.

### **ARTICLE 6**

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any regular session.

### BY-LAWS OF MINISTER'S CONFERENCE

### ARTICLE 1

The clerk or assistant clerk, or in their absence the senior minister in years shall call the ministers into conference. If a quorum is present the President or in his absence the Vice-President shall moderate the meeting. If neither of these are present, the senior minister in years shall be in charge.

### **ARTICLE 2**

It shall be the duty of the clerk to enroll the ministers of the conference. Ministers shall present themselves with proper evidence of their rights to seats therein, and those enrolled by the clerk shall compose the conference. In case of questionable representation the case under question shall be referred to the Credential Committee.

### **ARTICLE 3**

It shall be the duty of each minister belonging to this conference, to be active in pastoral or evangelistic services (disabled or retired ministers excepted). Any minister belonging to this conference shall report in each session in person or by letter, and failing to do so for two successive sessions shall be subject to discipline.

### **ARTICLE 4**

Each conference shall be opened by reading a portion of God's word and prayer, and each session shall be closed with prayer.

### **ARTICLE 5**

By a two-thirds vote of the members present ruling of the President may be overruled.

### ARTICLE 6

This conference shall sit with open doors, except when it shall go into a committee as a whole.

### **ARTICLE 7**

No member shall absent himself from the conference during its meeting without permission from the President.

### **ARTICLE 8**

No person shall be allowed to nominate more than one member of a committee, unless person nominated is not elected.

### ARTICLE 9

The President shall not allow discussion when not carried on in a Christian Spirit, or when he thinks it will cause discord.

### ARTICLE 10

Anyone desiring to speak shall rise and address the President by the appelation "Brother President," but shall not speak further until recognized.

### **ARTICLE 11**

No member of this conference shall be allowed to speak more than five minutes, nor twice on the same subject without permission from the President.

### **ARTICLE 12**

These By-Laws may be altered or amended at any regular or adjourned session of this conference by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

# HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE, INC. BY-LAWS BOARD OF TRUSTEES

### SECTION I

The Board of Trustees of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc., an Oklahoma corporation, shall be composed of fifteen members, elected as provided in the Articles of Incorporation of said College, as amended:

ARTICLE A—OFFICERS: The officers of the Board of Trustees shall be a Chairman, an Assistant Chairman, and a Secretary, each of whom shall be elected by the Board for a term of one year. They shall continue in office until their successors have been chosen:

Item 1—CHAIRMAN: The chairman of the Board of Trustees or his assistant shall preside at all meetings of the Board. He shall be an ex-officio member of the Executive Committee.

Item 2—SECRETARY: The Secretary shall record and preserve minutes of all meetings and acts of the Board of Trustees and countersign all deeds, conveyances, and other papers authorized by the Board. He shall have authority to call special meetings of the Trustees of the College upon the written request of two-thirds of the members of the Board; he shall mail notice of said meeting to the trustees ten (10) days in advance.

Item 3—EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE: The Executive Committee shall consist of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, the Vice-Chairman of the Board, the Secretary of the Board. The Executive Committee shall have authority to consider and act upon all questions affecting the College which may be brought before it between the stated meetings of the Board, or a quorum of the Board fails to attend a called or regular meeting. It shall transact such business as may be committee to it by the Board and shall act for the College on such matters as it may submit to it. The Committee shall meet at the call of the Chairman or the President of the College.

ARTICLE B—MEETINGS: The Board of Trustees shall meet each year at a time and place agreed upon by the Board. It shall, also, hold special meetings whenever called in accordance with the By-Laws of the Board. Such special meetings may be called by either the chairman of the Board, or the President of the College.

ARTICLE C—QUORUM: A majority of the members or the Board of Trustees of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc. in attendance at any called or regular meeting, written notice of which has been mailed by the Secretary to each trustee, shall constitute a quorum. No proxy votes shall be permitted. No ex-officio member shall be entitled to vote at meetings of the Board of Trustees.

ARTICLE D—ELECTIONS: In all elections held by the Board of Trustees each member present except ex-officio members shall be entitled to one vote, and the result shall be determined by a majority of the votes cast. Due notice of any election must be personal notice to the members or a day on the minutes of the Board not less than one week preceding the election.

# SECTION II OFFICERS OF HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE

The officers of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College shall be a President, Vice-President, Dean, and a Business Manager, each of whom shall be elected by the Board of Trustees to hold office for two years exclusive of the President whose term of office shall be indefinite. It is provided, however, that retirement of any one of the officers herein named may occur at any time upon the resignation of the officer or the request of the Board. In either case, notice shall be given six weeks before the date of the proposed retirement unless otherwise agreed upon by the concerned parties.

ITEM ONE—PRESIDENT: The President shall be executive officer of the Board of Trustees and shall have general control of the College including its officers, teachers, students, and business. He shall render to the Board complete annual reports and to its chairman, Executive Committee or other committees such information as may be deemed essential to a thorough knowledge of the operation of the College and its promotion. He shall be a member of the Board of Trustees ex-officio and the Executive Committee ex-officio and shall have the rights and privileges of a member of the Board except voting. The President shall execute all documents, instruments, and conveyances on behalf of the College. Duties of the president and working relationship shall be further detailed in a format approved by the Board of Trustees.

ITEM TWO—VICE PRESIDENT: The Vice-President shall perform all the duties of the President in the absence of the latter.

ITEM THREE—DEAN: The Academic Dean of the College shall, under the President, fix the hours of recitation, govern, control, and regulate the conduct of the students, have general oversight of curriculum, student's records, and such other internal details and administrative duties as may be delegated to him by the President of the College.

ITEM FOUR—BUSINESS MANAGER: The Treasurer shall keep an accurate record of all accounts of the College and shall receive and expend as directed by the Board of Trustees and President, all money for the expenses of the institution. He shall make an annual report to the Board and furnish the Executive Committee with such information pertaining to his office as may be requested. He shall provide bond in whatever amount the Board may require. Until such times as the Board of Trustees may deem different the Treasurer's office shall be contained within the Business Manager's Office. The Business Manager may at the direction of the administration designate this duty to a subordinate officer. The Business Manager shall have general supervision of the financial business of the College, and shall, at the direction of the President, be responsible for the upkeep of all the physical facilities and premises of the College. His detailed duties are directed in a format approved by the Board of Trustees.

# SECTION III

The faculty shall consist of the President, the Dean, and all teachers of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College. Instructors and assistant teachers shall have the privilege of sitting with the faculty in stated meetings but shall not have the right of voting.

It shall be the policy of the College to employ on its faculty those who are members of Free Will Baptist churches that are affiliated with the National Association. Emergencies, however arising from the resignation, illness, death, or approved leaves of absence of faculty members may be relieved by the temporary employment of instructors who are affiliated with any evangelical denomination. Part-time or short-term instructors, deemed essential to the successful prosecution of a consistent education program, may be employed at the discretion of the President without respect of denominational affiliation.

The faculty, under the authority and jurisdiction of the President, shall have general charge of instruction, attendance of students, examinations, administration of curriculum, discipline, and all matters involving the spiritual, physical, and social welfare of the College. The faculty shall be hired upon recommendation of the President.

In the selection of the faculty qualitative factors shall be kept in mind. All faculty members shall be urged to pursue graduate programs in their respective fields. Except in special cases no faculty member will be required to teach courses outside of his field.

# SECTION IV ACADEMIC COUNCIL

The Academic Council shall consist of the President, the Dean and the heads of the departments of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College: It shall deter-

mine the curriculum and academic policy of the College, prescribe requirements for admissions, certificates, diplomas, and degrees, and supervise the courses of instruction offered by the various departments of the College.

### SECTION V CONTRACTS

The Board of Trustees shall establish the College policy involving the execution of contracts, deeds of conveyance, the determination of salaries, and employment of all officers, representatives, faculty members and essential domestic and maintenance employees. The President of the College shall negotiate agreements, executive contracts, employ representatives, and supply vacancies incurred by the termination of contracts, resignations, or death of any essential employees. All contracts for building construction shall be let only to persons or corporations posting a valid performance bond and recording the same in the Office of the County Clerk of Cleveland County, Oklahoma.

### SECTION VI ADVISORY COUNCIL

An advisory council shall be formed which is to be composed of interested, qualified persons in the various fields which will be of value in building and maintaining a strong academic program to carry out the educational program stated in the charter.

# SECTION VII AMENDMENT

These By-Laws may be amended by a favorable vote of two-thirds of the qualified members of the Board of Trustees of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College at any meeting of the Board, provided that the proposed amendment has been submitted in writing to each Trustee one month in advance. This change to be subject to the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists.

# SECTION VIII ADMINISTRATIVE FUNCTIONS

The President of the Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College shall be elected by the Board of Trustees, and he shall act for and on behalf of the Board in the conduct and management of the institution. He shall also be a member of the Board of Trustees ex-officio and of the Executive committee, ex-officio, and his duties, powers and term of office shall be prescribed in the by-laws of the College and a format approved by the Board of Trustees.

# ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF THE HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE, INC.

Know all men by these presents, that, we whose names are hereunto subscribed, do hereby associate ourselves together for the purpose of forming a cor-

poration under the provisions of the corporation laws of the State of Oklahoma, and for that purpose state:

### ARTICLE ONE

The name of this corporation shall be HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAP-TIST COLLEGE, INC.

### ARTICLE TWO

The purpose of this corporation shall be the creation, establishment and maintenance of a college and institution of higher learning devoted to the promotion and impartation of higher learning, Christian education and such other education, instruction, learning, training and research as may be deemed essential for the cause of Christ and to that end prescribe courses of study and grant degrees. The doctrinal and theological position of this institution shall be that of the sponsoring denomination, Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists and the treatise of the National Association of Free Will Baptist as endorsed by the state body, and in connection therewith, in accordance with the stipulation of the Constitution and By-laws of the State Association of Free Will Baptists, Inc.

- (a.) To prescribe courses of study for both resident and correspondence students, which shall include general education in the arts, Christian Ministries of Service and Biblical studies for wisdom; said courses to be taught in both a Junior College Division and a Bible College Division, and to award degrees, either graduate or post-graduate, to those persons satisfactorily completing the prescribed courses of study and to grant such other literary honors, including honorary degrees, as shall be deemed advisable.
- (b.) To charge and collect tuition as determined by the Board of Trustees and to create scholarships.
- (c.) To employ professors, instructors and other subordinate employees as may be necessary for the proper conduct of the college under the direction and control of the President of the College, with the advice and consent of the majority of the Board of Trustees.
- (d.) To institute and carry on missions and commissions for missionary purposes and investigations.
- (e.) To publish and distribute such pamphlets, literature or books as may be required in the conduct of such work and the general promotion of the College.
- (f.) To sue and be sued in its corporate name and to enter into contracts of every type and nature.
- (g.) To solicit support, receive, collect, hold and receive by gift or bequest personal property in any amount, money or other thing of value; to purchase real estate, to receive real estate that may be given, or devised to the college for achieving the legitimate ends of the college and to sell or mortgage the same as the need arises.
- (h.) To borrow money in payment of property for erecting buildings and making improvements and for any other purpose germane to the objectives and purposes of the college.
- (i.) To issue notes, bonds, debentures and other evidences of indebtedness and execute mortgages, liens and other incumbrances upon the property of the

corporation, real or otherwise, to secure the payment of any such evidences of indebtedness.

(j.) To transact any and all business connected with said College as may be

necessary to achieve the purposes of said College.

(k.) To obtain under Internal Revenue Laws of the United States and of the Revenue Laws of the State of Oklahoma exemption from income property and other forms of taxation.

### ARTICLE THREE

The location of this corporation shall be in Moore, Oklahoma.

### **ARTICLE FOUR**

The duration of this corporation shall be perpetual.

### ARTICLE FIVE

The general control of this corporation shall be vested in a Board of Trustees consisting of 16 members, 10 of which shall be elected by the delegates to the annual Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists—each of which shall serve for a term of 5 years, and until his successor is elected and qualified. Two members shall be elected at each annual sitting of the State Association for the expiring five year term and vacancies that occur on the board. One member each shall be elected by the delegates to the annual meeting of the State Association of Free Will Baptists of the states of Arkansas, Colorado, Kansas, Missouri, New Mexico, and Texas, each of which serve for a term designated by the states they represent.

### ARTICLE SIX

An executive committee consisting of the Chairman, Vice Chairman, and Secretary of the Board of Trustees shall possess all powers of the Board of Trustees between the stated meetings of the Board of Trustees.

### ARTICLE SEVEN

All contracts for building construction shall be let only to persons or corporations posting a valid performance bond and recording the same in the office of the County Clerk of Cleveland County, Oklahoma.

# SECTION IX AMENDMENTS

This charter may be hereafter amended subject to the provisions contained herein and the laws of the State of Oklahoma. It is provided, however, that the Trustees of the College shall not propose or apply for any amendment which has not been previously authorized by an act of the Oklahoma State Association.

# OKLAHOMA STATE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY CONVENTION CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

### ARTICLE I

### NAME

This organization shall be known as the Oklahoma State Woman's Auxiliary Convention.

### ARTICLE II

### **PURPOSE**

The purpose of this convention shall be to bring the women of each district convention together for fellowship, sharing information, and encouraging one another in the work of the Lord.

### ARTICLE III

### **OFFICERS**

The Officers of this convention shall be a president, vice president, secretary, assistant secretary, treasurer, and field worker. These shall serve on the state executive committee together with three members elected by the convention as desired. These shall serve for a period of 2 years.

### ARTICLE IV

### **MEMBERSHIP**

This convention shall be composed of the officers of the convention together with each active auxiliary member of the district or local (duly accredited by the credentials committee).

### ARTICLE V

### MEETINGS

The annual meeting shall be held each year on the day preceding the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists and at the place designated by said Association.

### **ARTICLE VI**

### AMENDMENTS

This constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the convention by a two-thirds vote of members present.

### **BY-LAWS**

### ARTICLE I

### DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1, President. The president shall preside over all meetings, appoint such committees as may be needed, call the executive committee together when necessary, be ex-officio member of all committees, and serve as chairman of the executive committee, see that reports are made promptly to the national secretary and perform all duties usually pertaining to such an office.

Section 2, Vice President. The vice president shall preside in the absence of the president or by her request and otherwise assist her in the overseeing of the work in general.

Section 3, Secretary. The secretary shall keep an accurate record of all proceedings of the convention and executive meetings, preserve all valuable papers and turn same over to her successor in office, and make an annual report to the national secretary on a form available from the NWAC office. She shall compile the districts slates of officers and addresses immediately after the convention. She shall also send a slate of state officers and addresses to the national executive secretary. She is chairman of the Credentials Committee.

The secretary shall also serve as historian keeping an historical record and submitting historical information to the national executive secretary annually.

Section 4, Assistant Secretary. The assistant Secretary shall assist the secretary in recording proceedings of convention and executive committee meetings and shall aid the secretary in all her work as needed.

Section 5, Treasurer. The treasurer shall have charge of all funds belonging to this convention and shall pay out same only when authorized by the convention. The treasurer shall keep an accurate account and shall give a written report of all funds received and sibursed at each annual meeting of the convention. She shall also send an annual report to the WNAC office (executive secretary-treasurer) at least ten days before the end of the fiscal year. She shall encourage support of missions through the WNAC Gift Plan, individual giving and special offerings.

Section 6, Field Worker. The field worker shall have charge of all field work pertaining to, or necessary to, the promotion of the work of the convention and keep the national program before the district officers.

### ARTICLE II

### **ELECTIONS**

The general officers shall be nominated by a nominating committee and shall be elected by acclamation, unless there are other nominations. In case of more than one nominee for any particular office, a vote will be taken on each. All elections shall be held at the closing business session of the convention.

### ARTICLE III

### **EXPENSES**

Section 1. An appropriation of 18 cents per mile toward the expense of the general officers, when called upon to attend the executive committee meeting to plan program, secretary's expenses, phone calls, postage and stationery for officers will be paid by the convention. All field promotional work is subject to the state executive committee, who should approve all work done by state officers in the interest of state work, as well as expenses of the same.

Section 2. An amount of \$100.00 shall be paid on the expense of the state president to attend WNAC. If the president is unable to go to WNAC that we give the \$100.00 for this purpose to whomever goes in her place providing she is a state officer.

Section 3. The auditing committee shall be paid mileage the same as the executive committee.

### **ARTICLE IV**

### COMMITTEES

Section 1. Executive Committee—The executive committee shall be composed of the five officers and three members elected by the convention. Five of these shall compose a quorum. They shall hold meetings for the transaction of business as often as necessary. It shall be the duty of the executive committee to maintain an overseeing of the work at large. They shall act for the convention when necessary. They shall meet with district presidents the night preceding the state auxiliary convention. They will send out a newsletter with expenses paid by the State Treasury.

Section 2. Resolutions Committee—A resolutions committee of five

members shall be appointed by the president as needed.

Section 3. Nominating Committee—The nominating committee shall be composed of at least one member from each district convention. Nominations shall be submitted by district with their annual report. These elected by the body at the annual meeting.

Section 4. Credentials Committee—The secretary shall be chairman of the credentials committee, and other members may be appointed by the president.

The treasurer shall be a standing member of this committee.

Section 5. Finance Committee—The finance committee shall be appointed by the president. This committee audits the financial records of the year and reports on same to the convention.

Section 6. Registration committee shall be provided by the district convention which is host to state convention.

### ARTICLE V

### FEES AND REPORTS

Active members shall pay dues of \$1.50 per year. With 25 cents remaining in the district, \$1.25 to be forwarded to state where 25 cents shall be retained, and \$1.00 forwarded to WNAC as required for membership fees. It shall be the duty of each body directly affiliated with the State Auxiliary Convention to send a report to every annual session.

### ARTICI F VI

### **AMENDMENTS**

These by-laws may be amended by a two-thirds vote of members present at regular meeting of the state auxiliary convention.

### **ARTICLE VII**

### GIFTS

The desired plans for giving in the Woman's Auxiliary are those adopted by WNAC as follows:

1. Mission offerings following each special season of prayer

- Co-Laborer offering (monthly or quarterly designated to WNAC General Fund)
- 3. WNAC Emphasis Month in August or other time more convenient to help in support of WNAC General Fund

- 4. Memorial Student Loan Fund (special program and offering in September to assist worthy and needy students at FWBBC in Nashville)
- 5. Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College Student Loan Fund. (Special program and offering in September to assist worthy and needy students at Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College)
- 6. Tithes-Pay tithes on all undesignated money received
- 7. All offerings are to be forwarded through regular channels.

### **ARTICLE VIII**

### WNAC DELEGATE

Each district convention shall so' mit one nomination for a State delegate to WNAC with their annual report. This nomination (along with others as needed to make up 15 delegates to WNAC) shall be elected by the body at the annual meeting. It shall be the duty of delegates elected to notify president if they cannot attend WNAC. President shall appoint delegates as needed in absence of regular elected delegates.

### ARTICLES OF FAITH OF STATE ASSOCIATION

- 1. THE BIBLE—The Scriptures of the Old and New Testament were given by the inspiration of God, and are our infallible rules of faith and practice.
- 2. GOD—There is one living and true God, revealed in nature as the Creator, Preserver and Righteous Governor of the Universe, and in the Scriptures as the Father, Son and Holy Ghost, yet as one God, infinitely wise and good, whom all intelligent creatures are supremely to love, adore and obey.
- 3. CHRIST—Christ is God manifest in the flesh: in His divine nature truly God, in His human nature truly man. The mediator between God and man, once crucified. He is now risen and glorified as our ever-present Saviour and Lord.
- 4. THE HOLY SPIRIT—The Scriptures assigns to the Holy Spirit all the attributes of God. He is the Reprover, Comforter, Guide and Sanctifier of all men.
- 5. THE GOVERNMENT OF GOD—God exercises a wise and benevolent providence over all beings and all things by maintaining the constitution and laws of nature. He also performs special acts of Grace, not otherwise provided for as highest welfare of man requires.
- 6. THE SINFULNESS OF MAN—Man was created innocent, but by disobedience fell into a state of sin and condemnation. His posterity, therefore inherited a fallen nature of such tendencies that all who come to years of accountability, sin and become guilty before God.
- 7. THE WORK OF CHRIST—The Son of God, by His incarnation, life, suffering, death, and resurrection effected for all a redemption from sin that is full and free and is the ground of salvation by faith.
  - 8. THE WORK OF SALVATION—The conditions of salvation are:
- 1. Repentance or sincere sorrow for sin and the hearty renunciations of it.
- 2. Faith or the unreserved committal of one's self to Christ as Saviour and Lord, with purpose to love and obey Him in all things. In the exercise of saving faith the soul is renewed by the Holy Spirit; freed from the dominion of sin and becomes a child of God.
- 3. Continuance in faith and obedience until death.
- 9. ELECTION—God determined from the beginning to save all who should comply with the conditions of salvation. Hence by faith in Christ, men become His elect.

- 10. FREEDOM OF WILL—The Human will is free and self controlled, having power to yield to the influence of the truth and the Spirit and live, or to resist them and perish.
- 11. SALVATION FREE—God desires the salvation of all, the Gospel invites all, the Holy Spirit strives with all, and whosoever will may come and take the water of life freely.
- 12. PERSEVERENCE—All believers in Christ, who through grace persevere in holiness to the end of life, have the promise of eternal salvation.
- 13. BACKSLIDING AND APOSTASY—A person who has been regenerated or born again and is living in unconfessed, unforgiven sin, is rebellious to the principles of the Kingdom of God and His righteousness, and therefore is a backslider in a lost condition who must repent and be restored to the right relationship with God or be eternally lost.

We recognize, according to Hebrews 6:4-6, that it is possible for a person to get in the condition that he could never return to Christ. This, we believe, is Apostasy; However, we also recognize that a regenerate person can fall into sin, be in a lost condition and still not be an Apostate. This person, through repentance, can be reconciled to God.

- 14. GOSPEL ORDINANCES—Baptism, or the immersion of believers in water, and the Lord's Supper, are ordinances to be perpetuated under the Gospel; Feet Washing, an ordinance teaching humility, of universal obligation, and to be administered to all true believers.
- 15. TITHING—God commanded tithes and offerings in the Old Testament; Jesus Christ endorsed in the Gospel (Matt. 23:23), and the Apostle Paul said, "Upon the first day of the week let every one of you lay by him in store as God hath prospered him." 1 Cor. 16:2.
- 16. THE CHRISTIAN SABBATH—The divine law requires that one day in seven be set apart from the secular employment and amusements for rest, worship, holy works and activities, and for personal communion with God.
- 17. RESURRECTION, JUDGMENT, AND FINAL RETRIBUTION—The Scriptures teach the resurrection of all men at the last day. They that have done good will come forth to the resurrection of life, and they that have done evil unto the resurrection of damnation: then the wicked shall "Go away into eternal punishment but the righteous into eternal life."

### RULES OF ORDER

1. At every sitting of the Association, business shall be opened and concluded by prayer by the Moderator or whomever he may request.

- 2. Ministers and deacons present are invited to seats, allowed to take part in debates on all subjects, and to vote.
- 3. Those who speak shall rise and address the Moderator. Personal reflections shall be avoided in all debates.
  - 4. No motion may be discussed until made and seconded.
- 5. When a motion has been made and seconded, and a member opposes its discussion, the Moderator shall put the question, "Shall it be discussed?" If negative, the question shall not be discussed.
- 6. If any proposition or motion under debate contains two or more points, it shall be divided at the request of any member, and the vote taken separately.
  - 7. Motions made and lost shall not be recorded.
- 8. No one shall speak more than twice on the same subject without special leave of the Moderator.
- 9. All questions shall be decided by a majority vote of all Members present.

### **BY-LAWS OF STATE ASSOCIATION**

- 1. The Clerk or assistant clerk, or in their absence, the senior minister in years shall call the Association into conference, and if a quorum is present the moderator, or in his absence, the assistant moderator shall take charge; and if neither of them is present the senior minister in years shall act as Moderator.
- 2. It shall be the duty of the clerk to enroll the delegates to the Association, who shall present themselves with proper evidence of their rights to seats therein, and those enrolled by the clerk shall compose the Association.
- 3. It shall be the duty of every District belonging to this Association to send a letter to every annual session of this Association reporting in the same spiritual condition, benevolent work, and its statistics. Any District belonging to this Association, which shall fail to report itself for two successive sessions, may be dismissed from the Association by a two thirds vote of all members present.
- 4. Each meeting shall be opened by reading a portion of the Bible and with prayer, and shall be closed with prayer.
- 5. By a two-thirds vote of members present, a ruling of the moderator can be overruled.
- 6. This Association may correspond by messenger or otherwise with other religious bodies.
- 7. This Association shall sit with open doors except when it shall go into a committee of the whole.
- 8. Any person not a member of this Association may be allowed to take part in its discussions by obtaining permission from the moderator.
- 9. It shall be the duty of all the Association to be present at the time appointed for each meeting, and anyone wishing to retire shall first obtain leave of the moderator.
- 10. No person shall be allowed to nominate more than one member of any committee, provided the person nominated be elected.
- 11. The moderator shall not allow discussions when not carried on in a Christian spirit or when he thinks it will cause discord or division.

12. Anyone desiring to speak shall rise to his feet and address the moderator by the appelation "Brother Moderator," but shall not speak further until recognized by the moderator.

13. No member of this association shall be allowed to speak more than ten minutes nor twice on the same subject without permission from the moderator.

- 14. This association shall meet annually beginning on Tuesday following the second Sunday in October.
- 15. These By-Laws may be altered or amended at any regular or adjourned session of this Association by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

### **CONSTITUTION OF STATE ASSOCIATION**

PREAMBLE: From long experience, we the members of the Free Will Baptist denomination, being regularly baptized upon a profession of our faith in Jesus Christ, and realizing the necessity of a bond in union and fellowship among us as a church; and to preserve and maintain correspondence and coordination with us, do therefore ordain this Constitution for our better denomination government.

### ARTICLE I

NAME: This organization shall be known as the OKLAHOMA STATE ASSOCIATION OF FREE WILL BAPTISTS.

### ARTICLE II

PURPOSE: The object and purpose of this organization shall be to unify the work of the various bodies composing this State Association, and to devise and execute measures for the extension of the Kingdom of God in connection with the various bodies in the Association, or that may hereafter be represented therein.

### ARTICLE III

REPRESENTATION: Section 1. This Association shall be composed of all ordained ministers and deacons with membership in some local church which is a member of a district Association with membership in the State Association.

Section 2: Each District Association shall be entitled to a number of elected delegates equal with the number of churches composing said Association. These delegates may be recommended by the local churches and shall be endorsed by their district association.

### ARTICLE IV

FINANCE: Each district association shall be responsible for sending \$35.00 per church to the State Association for State and National Convention fee, of this \$35.00, \$25.00 shall go to the State Association and \$10.00 to the National Association.

### ARTICLE V

DISCIPLINE: This State Association shall have the right to settle any question of discipline, doctrine or practices that may properly come before it from any of the bodies composing said organization; furthermore, if there be any question

of discipline, doctrine or practices on the part of an affiliated association, delegates of that association shall not be seated until these questions have been settled to the satisfaction of the General Board.

Section 2: Decisions of the General Board may be appealed in this manner. All appeals shall come before the State Association when sitting in a committee as a whole.

### ARTICLE VI

OFFICERS: A. The officers of the State Association shall consist of a Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, and an Executive Secretary. Each of these shall be elected at the close of each regular session except the Executive Secretary.

B. (1) The Executive Secretary shall be elected for an indefinite term. It shall be the responsibility of the Executive Board to seek out a prospective candidate and make their recommendation to the body at the state association in its regular session, with privilege of nominations from the floor.

(2) In the event of a vacancy occurring during the course of the year, the Execu-

tive Board shall fill the vacancy until the annual setting of the association.

(3) Any time a majority of the Executive Board, or seven (7) members of the General Board requests a vote of confidence on the Executive Secretary, a vote shall be taken. If such action results in the termination of the Executive Secretary, he shall be given sixty (60) days severance pay.

In the event of immorality on the part of the Executive Secretary, or of him teaching or preaching doctrine contrary to the Free Will Baptist Treatise, he may be dis-

missed by a majority vote of the Executive Board with no severance pay.

### ARTICLE VII

BOARDS: All standing boards shall be composed of seven (7) elected members who shall serve terms of 7, 6, 5, 4, 3, 2 and 1 years with such ex-officio members as may be provided for elsewhere, with no member serving more than two (2) consecutive terms of office or portion thereof, except: (1) the General Board which shall be composed of one (1) member from each affiliated association, the chairman of each standing board, and the current general officers of this association, and (2) the College Board of Trustees which shall be composed as provided for in the Articles of Incorporation of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc.

The standing boards of this association shall be: Executive Board; Board of Church Extension, Missions and Evangelism; Sunday School Board; Church Train-

ing Service Board; and College Board of Trustees.

No standing board shall meet in a functional meeting during the session of this association.

### ARTICLE VIII

### DUTIES, SCOPE OF ENDEAVOR AND QUALIFICATIONS OF STANDING BOARDS

Section 1. EXECUTIVE BOARD: The Executive Board shall be composed of seven (7) members who are members of an affiliated association and in good standing with the association of which they are members. They shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

It shall be the duty of this board to act in behalf of the association when it is not in session. It shall be bound to carry out the directions of the association and shall hold itself bound by every consideration of morality and honor to carry out the wishes of this association and to act under its instructions in whatever technical rights, civil laws and the decisions of courts may give it in certain emergencies. It shall be the duty of this board to sign their signatures to any and all papers concerning properties, indebtedness, bonds, or other legal documents

pertaining to the execution of the will of this association, exclusive of the College Board of Trustees.

This board shall have the oversight of the Executive Department of this association. The members shall assist and direct such work for the general promotion of this association as is deemed needful or necessary as the means available shall permit. The Executive Department shall serve as the coordinating agency of this association to correlate the work of all standing boards and agencies.

This board shall have the oversight of Free Will Baptist Book Store and shall endeavor to serve affiliated associations and churches and the community with literature and church supplies. Merchandising procedures shall be those accepted as normal retail procedures with the board being cognizant of the spiritual contribution of the store in distributing Christian literature.

All decisions of this board shall be governed by the general tenets of this association and shall not violate this constitution.

This board shall organize itself and elect such officers as necessary to the orderly conduct of its affairs and labors. This board shall keep an accurate record of all meetings, decisions, and work done and shall make a report in writing at each annual session of this association. All records shall be available to this association at its request.

Whereas this board represents the association when not in session, it and it alone shall have the power to call the association into special conference provided each affiliated association shall be given notice at least ten (10) days prior to the meeting of such special conference.

Section 2. GENERAL BOARD: This board shall be composed of one (1) member from each affiliated association, the chairman of each standing board, and the current general officers of this association. Each member must be a member of an affiliated association and in good standing with the association of which he is a member. The members shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

The duties of this board shall be to meet one (1) day preceding the annual session of this association. This board shall serve as the credential committee with the duties and responsibilities assigned by Article V of this constitution. This board shall hear reports of all standing boards. It shall serve as budget committee and shall make such recommendations as deemed pertinent to this association. A complete and accurate record shall be kept of meetings of this board and a report shall be made in writing to this association in its annual session.

The moderator of the association shall serve as chairman of this board, and the clerk of the association shall serve as its clerk.

Section 3. BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION, MISSIONS AND EVANGELISM: This board shall be composed of seven (7) members who are members of affiliated associations and in good standing with the associations of which they are members. They shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

It shall be the duty of this board to labor to further the Gospel of Jesus Christ into the uttermost parts of the earth. In accomplishing this, they are to endeavor to establish missions and churches in communities within the bounds of

this association with whatever moral and financial assistance that may be theirs. In cases of small churches failing to function, whatever assistance deemed appropriate shall be rendered to maintain the effective witness of that church by either direct labor with the church or with an associational board in instances where the affiliated association has a functional board or agency.

This board shall be empowered to receive and convey title to real property

in the area of its labors.

The promotion of missionary endeavors from a local, state or national level shall come within the scope of endeavor of this board. This board shall assist in maintaining prayer and financial support of missionary enterprises through whatever channels available.

Whereas missionary and evangelistic labors are so intimately related, this board shall assist through participation or assistance in maintaining a strong

evangelistic thrust in the life of affiliated association.

This board shall organize itself and elect such officers as necessary to the orderly conduct of its affairs and labors. This board shall keep an accurate record of all meetings, decisions, work done, funds received and disbursed and shall make a report in writing at each annual session of this association. All records shall be available to this association at its request.

Section 4. COLLEGE BOARD OF TRUSTEES: The College Board of Trustees shall be composed as provided for in the Articles of Incorporation of

Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc.

Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc. is an agency of the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists and is incorporated under the corporate laws of the State of Oklahoma. The articles of incorporation are a part of this association's record and delineate the purpose, duty and scope of endeavor of the members of this board.

Section 5. CHURCH TRAINING SERVICE BOARD: This board shall be composed of seven members who are members of affiliated associations and in good standing with the associations of which they are members. They shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

The duties of this board shall be to plan and assist in organizing and sustaining a strong Church Training Service in every church in each association affiliated with this association with every means of promotion and assistance available to them. This board shall plan, coordinate and conduct state-wide youth camps or camp.

This board shall organize itself and elect such officers as necessary to the orderly conduct of its affairs and labors. This board shall keep an accurate record of all meetings, decisions, work done, funds received and disbursed and shall make a report in writing at each annual session of this association. All records

shall be available to this association at its request.

Section 6. SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD: This board shall be composed of seven (7) members who are members of affiliated associations and in good standing with the associations of which they are members. They shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

The duties of this board shall be to plan and promote Sunday schools in every church in each association affiliated with this association. This board shall use every available means to promote Sunday school clinics, seminars, institutes and conventions on local, district and state-wide basis, working with local agencies to distribute and employ all effective methods and material available.

This board shall organize itself and elect such officers as necessary to the orderly conduct of its affairs and labors. This board shall keep an accurate record of all meetings, decisions, work done, funds received and disbursed and shall make a report in writing at each annual session of this association. All records shall be available to this association at its request.

Section 7. VACANCIES: Vacancies shall occur when a member moves from the territorial bounds of this association, by death, by resignation or by removal from office by this association. In the event of disciplinary action where charges concerning misconduct, doctrine or practice shall have been lodged against a member of any board, his office shall be held in abeyance until such charges shall be concluded or as determined by this association.

All boards shall have power to fill vacancies arising between sessions of this association. Such appointment shall terminate at the next session of the association and shall be filled by this association.

Section 8. EMPLOYEES: All employees of boards or agencies of this association shall be employed by agreement or contract with employing board or agency upon approval of this association except those elected by this association and the conditions of their employment shall be those approved by this association.

The duties of the Executive Secretary of this association shall be:

- (1) He is to represent, or cause to be represented, the association at all affairs of interest to the association.
- (2) He is to promote the work of the association in such a manner so as to unify the efforts of the association.
- (3) He is to serve with all standing boards and committees of the association in an ex-officio capacity.
- (4) He is to aid in planning the work of the association by relating the activities and plans of one board to another.
- (5) He is to report to the association during each annual session.
- (6) He is to communicate to the affiliated members of this association the pressing causes and events before the association. This can be in person or by means of a periodical bulletin or both.
- (7) He shall serve as treasurer of this association. An accurate and complete record of all funds received and disbursed shall be kept and a written report shall be included in his report to this association in its annual session.
- (8) The conditions of employment shall be determined by the Executive Board.

### ARTICLE IX

DISSOLUTION: Should this association cease to function, all properties and holdings shall go to the National Association of Free Will Baptists after all creditors are satisfied and indebtedness cleared.

### ARTICLE X

AMENDMENTS: This constitution may be amended or altered at any regular session of the association by a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of members

present and voting, provided proposed amendment or alteration be presented in writing to the body one (1) day in advance.

### **ARTICLE XI**

SPECIAL SESSIONS: Elected delegates to the last session of this association shall be retained as standing delegates for special called sessions.
