

PROCEEDINGS

The Seventy Seventh Annual Session of the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists met in the Civic Center, Tulsa, Oklahoma, October 21-24, 1985. The convention theme was "Give Unto the Lord," taken from I Chronicles 16:29. Keith Burden served as music coordinator.

TUESDAY EVENING

The Gloryland Singers presented a music prelude. James Dunbar directed the congregation in singing "Saved By the Blood" to open the service.

The clerk, Waldo Young, called the convention into official session and introduced the officers. Officers were Assistant Clerk J. B. Chism, Assistant Moderator Earl Scroggins, Executive Secretary Lonnie DaVoult, and Moderator Jerry Dudley.

Jerry Dudley brought the Moderator's message based on "I Send You Forth as Sheep Among Wolves."

Don Payne brought greetings and a welcome from the Tulsa area Ministerial Fellowship.

The congregation sang "My Savior's Love."

Roy Bingham, presiding officer, was in charge of receiving a special offering for E. E. Morris. The offering was \$550.00.

The congregation sang "At Calvary." The choir from the West Tulsa Church sang "Redeemed," and "I Believe That He Died For Me." The Gloryland singers sang "The Sun's Coming Up in the Morning."

Roy Bingham introduced James Puckett, pastor of the Southern Oaks Church, Oklahoma City, as the speaker. His subject was "Give Glory Unto His Name." He read I Chronicles 16:29, brought the message, and closed in prayer.

The moderator read the names of the men who would serve on the various committees. Those serving on the Resolutions Committee were Dan Farmer, Orville Hood, Albert Collier, Charles Brazeal, and Odie Nunley. Those named to the Public Morals Committee were Bob Ketchum, Jim Smith, Roy Bingham, Ernest Harrison, Jr., and Jim Shepherd. Those appointed to the Obituary Committee were Howard Gage, David Archer, Glen Hood, Glen Lewis, and Leroy Holman.

The benediction was by Earl Scroggins.

WEDNESDAY MORNING

Phil Akin led the congregation in singing "Power in the Blood" to open the Wednesday morning session.

Leroy Holman brought devotional thoughts from II Corinthians 4:1-7, and led in prayer.

The moderator read the Rules of Order from the minutes.

The clerk read Item 1, of the General Board report. A motion carried to receive the letters and seat the delegates.

A petitionary letter was received from the Little River Association. Item 2 of the General Board report was read. A motion carried to adopt Item 2.

A motion carried to adopt the program, leaving the order of reports and time element flexible.

Visitors were welcomed.

The clerk read the names of those appointed to serve on Committees.

Keith Burden, chairman, gave the report of the State Sunday School Board. A motion carried to receive the report.

Harold Harrison gave a report from the National Sunday School and Church Training Department.

Keith Burden was elected to serve a seven year term on the Sunday School Board.

Item 3, of the General Board report was adopted. A report on Target 90, written by David Sutton, was read by the clerk. A motion carried to adopt the report. The report called for a task force.

A motion was made and seconded that the moderator appoint the Target 90 task force. A motion was made to amend the motion by stating that the Chairman of each board, the Executive Board, the Moderator, the Executive Secretary, and two or three at-large members make up this task force. A motion to amend the amendment carried, which reads, "A member selected from each board, The Executive Secretary, the Moderator, the Executive Board, and three members at-large make up this task force." The three at-large members elected were David Sutton, Frank Wiley, and James Puckett.

A motion carried that each board pay expenses of those serving from that board, that the Executive Department pay the expense of members at-large, and that each board share equally the expense of publication and distribution of materials.

Kent Hubbard gave the report of the Church Training Service Board. A motion carried to receive the report. Phil Akin was elected to a seven year term on the CTS Board. Kevin Lauthern was elected to a five year term replacing Doug Little who moved out of state.

WEDNESDAY MORNING WORSHIP

Doyle Baker called the service to order and led in prayer. Phil Akin led the congregation in singing, "He Keeps Me Singing" and "Oh, How I Love Jesus."

The Ministers Quartet sang "All Because of God's Amazing Grace," "What A Beautiful Day," and "Learning to Lean."

Joe Blair, pastor of the Southwest Church, Oklahoma City, was introduced to bring the message. His subject was "Give an Offering and Come Before Him." He read I Chronicles 16:29, and brought the message. His points were that there are three things we need to see to properly bring an offering to God; A Vision of God, a Vision of the Globe, and a Vision of the Goal.

After announcements, the closing prayer was led by Ernest Harrison, Jr.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON

The Wednesday afternoon session opened with Phil Akin leading the

congregation in singing "Jesus is the Sweetest Name I Know," and "All that Thrills My Soul."

Earl Scroggins read Ephesians 3:20, brought devotional thoughts and led in prayer.

The Harvesters from Hillsdale FWB College sang "Brethren, We Have Met To Worship."

The report of the Executive Board was given by Bailey Thompson, Chairman. A motion carried that the report be received.

Lonnie DaVoult gave the report of the Executive Secretary. A motion was made and seconded to adopt the report. A request was made to divide the two parts of the report. The financial report was adopted. The resignation of the Executive Secretary was accepted.

Melvin Worthington gave a report of the National Executive Office.

Ray Martin, Manager, gave the report of the Free Will Baptist Book Store. A motion carried to receive the report.

A motion carried to give Lonnie DaVoult a standing vote of appreciation for his years of service in the office of Executive Secretary.

A motion was made that the clerk read the extended report of the Executive Secretary, the one read in the General Board meeting. An objection to consideration was heard. The objection was sustained.

O. J. Hood was elected to a seven year term on the Executive Board.

The report of the Mission Board was given by Berton Perry, director, and Ron Carner, chairman. The Mission Board also made the recommendation that "The State Mission Board met concerning the 50 year Advance Celebration. Due to the limited time needed to completely inform pastors and churches about this program, we recommend postponing the adoption of this program this year and make a decision concerning it next year at the state meeting."

A motion was made to adopt the Mission Board report with the recommendation.

A plaque was presented to Jim Smith for a job well done in leading the Weatherford Church to a self supporting basis.

Roy Thomas gave a report of the National Home Missions Department. Buddy Drake, Missionary appointee to Cheyenne, Wyoming, also brought greetings.

Rolla Smith gave a report of the National Foreign Missions Department.

J. B. Chism was elected as the seven year member of the Mission Board. Homer Young was elected to a six year position on the Mission Board.

The item from First Oklahoma Association concerning the election of the Executive Secretary was read. A motion carried that it be tabled indefinitely.

Resolution 1, was read because it would require a constitutional change. A motion was made and seconded that it be tabled indefinitely. This motion was defeated. A motion carried to lay it on the table until Thursday.

After announcements, Waldo Young led in prayer to close the afternoon session.

THURSDAY MORNING

Terry Van Winkle led the congregation in singing "He Keeps Me Singing" to open the Thursday morning session.

Lonny Burks brought devotional thoughts on "The Fear of the Lord," and led in prayer.

Herman Hersey gave the report of the National Retirement and Insurance Department.

Ray Gwartney, Chairman, and Edwin Wade, President, gave the report of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College. A motion carried to adopt the report.

Ronald Creech gave the report of Free Will Baptist Bible College.

Ron Barber and David McDougal were elected to five year terms on the Hillsdale Board of Trustees.

Resolution 1, was brought from the table. A motion carried that the Sunday School Board and the Church Training Service Board in a joint meeting work out the details of merging these works, that each member of each board serve his full term, and that as each term expires only one member be elected.

After announcements, the meeting was recessed.

THURSDAY MORNING WORSHIP

Clayton Crafton presided at the morning worship service. Terry Van Winkle led the congregation in singing "He Lives," and "The Banner of the Cross."

Kent Hubbard was introduced to bring the message. Before the message Vernon Whaley sang "Hold to God's Unchanging Hand."

Kent Hubbard led in prayer, called attention to I Chronicles 16:30, and brought the message on "Give Reverence and Fear Unto Him." He closed the message with prayer.

Clayton Crafton led in prayer to close the service.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON

The meeting was called to order at 1:30 p.m. Vernon Whaley led the congregation in singing "Oh, How I Love Jesus."

Randall Miller read I Corinthians 10:18 and brought devotional thoughts. Homer Young led in prayer.

The remainder of the report of the Resolutions Committee was read. Item 2 was considered. It was adopted.

Item 3, was adopted.

Item 4, was adopted.

The report of the Obituary Committee was read. Names of those deceased were added. The body stood for prayer in memory of those who have departed during the past year.

A motion carried that this body elect two co-chairmen for Celebration 50, and adopt a goal. O. J. Hood and Joe Grizzle were elected as the co-chairmen. A motion carried that this committee set the goal and report it to the churches.

The report of the Special Finance Committee was read by Bailey Thompson. Item 5 of the General Board report was also read. A motion was made and seconded to receive the report. A motion carried to postpone action on the report until items 5 and 6 of the General Board report are given.

Item 5, of the General Board Report was read. A motion carried to adopt item 5.

Item 6 was considered. A motion was made and seconded that item 6 be adopted as a substitute for the Special Finance Committee report.

A motion was made to amend item 6, by changing the percentages to read:

Hillsdale FWB College	55%
State Missions	30%
State Sunday School	5%
State CTS	5%
National Ministries	5%

The amendment was adopted. Item 6 was adopted as amended.

Item 7, of the General Board report was read. A motion was made and seconded to adopt the item. A motion carried to amend it to read "Any punitive damages received would go to the individuals involved." Item 7 was adopted as amended.

Item 8, was adopted.

Item 9, was adopted.

A vote was taken to see if the Sunday School and Church Training Service boards are to be combined immediately or after one year. The vote was that they are to combine their works immediately.

The report of the State Woman's Auxiliary was read. A motion carried to receive the report.

Keith Burden gave the report of the Master's Men.

Jim Vallance gave a report of the National Master's Men. Both reports were received as information.

The report of the Ministers Conference was read. A motion carried to receive the report.

A motion carried that the Benevolent Committee be a three member committee. Joe Blair, Jerry Dudley, and N. R. Smith were elected as this committee.

Jack Richey was elected to represent Oklahoma on the National General Board.

Bob Thomas was elected as Assistant Clerk.

Waldo Young was elected as Clerk.

Bob Thompson was elected as Assistant Moderator.

Jerry Dudley was elected as Moderator.

A motion carried to give a standing vote of appreciation to the officers and to the Tulsa area churches for their hospitality.

A motion carried to adjourn. The closing prayer was by David Bigger.

THE CALLED SESSION OF THE STATE ASSOCIATION

A called session of the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists convened November 30, 1985, at Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, for the purpose of electing an Executive Secretary. It was called to order by the moderator, Jerry Dudley, at 10:00 a.m.

Jerry Pilgrim led the congregation in singing "At the Cross." J. R. Hall led in prayer.

Albert Collier brought devotional thoughts from Psalm 133:1. His thoughts and comments centered on "Unity." Homer Young led in prayer.

Bailey Thompson, chairman, gave a report of the Executive Board, their efforts in selecting a nominee for the position of Executive Secretary Secretary, and the name of David Sutton as the board's nomination. Connie Cariker was nominated from the floor.

A motion carried to close nominations. Connie Cariker was elected as Executive Secretary.

A motion carried to adjourn. After announcements were made, David Taylor led in the closing prayer.

GENERAL BOARD REPORT

The General Board met here in the Civic Center October 21, 1985. As a result of this meeting we offer the following report and recommendations:

1. We received correspondence from 23 district associations. We recommend these letters be received and the delegates seated. (adopted)
2. We received a petitionary letter from the Little River Association. Three churches: Watermill, Felker, and Idabel, make up this association. We recommend that this association be received into the Oklahoma State Association. (adopted)
3. We heard the reports of the Executive Board, the Executive Secretary, Free Will Baptist Book Store, Sunday School Board, Mission Board, C.T.S. Board, and Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College. We recommend that these reports be received as each is given. (adopted)
4. We heard the report of the Advance Celebration, a project of the National Foreign Missions Department. The General Board referred this to the state Mission Board with the request to bring recommendations to this body.
5. The report of the Special Finance Committee was heard. The General Board offers the following recommendation concerning the income from oil. We recommend that the first \$150,000.00 of the oil money received after January 1, 1986 be placed in a benevolent fund and a committee be elected to dispose of these funds. (adopted)
6. After the above mentioned money is received, we recommend that the remainder of the oil money be divided according to the following percentages:

55% to Hillsdale FWWB College
 30% to State Missions
 5% to State Sunday School
 5% to State Church Training Service
 5% to National Ministries

(adopted)

7. We recommend that the Executive Board be placed in charge of the law suit to recover insurance claims, and that any money received be placed back into the benevolent fund. (adopted)

8. We recommend the adoption of a \$325,000.00 Co-operative Plan budget for the 1986-87 year, and that the following allocations be set.

9. We recommend a combined budget for the State Ministries be adopted.

RESOLUTION COMMITTEE REPORT

1. Whereas, the National Association of Free Will Baptists have studied the matter thoroughly and have chosen to unite the Sunday School and CTS boards;

And, Whereas the combining of these two boards in our state would better enable them to coordinate educational activities;

And Whereas in hope of soon having a full time employee to work in these areas in our state and the combining of the boards might financially enable this;

Be It Resolved that this association combine the Sunday School and CTS boards to form one Christian Education Board.

2. Whereas the responsibilities of the Executive Secretary of the State of Oklahoma are vital to the work in Oklahoma, and
 Whereas the National Association of Free Will Baptists convening in Tulsa in July, 1986 will need the coordination of Oklahoma's Executive Secretary, and

Whereas we need the leadership of the Executive Secretary to encourage unity and to direct growth, therefore

Be It Resolved that we instruct the Executive Board to proceed as quickly as possible with interviews and a nomination for the office of Executive Secretary, and

Be It Further Resolved that when a nomination is secured, a special called session of the State Association be called to elect a new Executive Secretary (date, time, and place to be announced to all churches).

3. Whereas the Celebration of Praise program is so important, and Whereas postponing the implementation of the program for a year will defeat the main idea of the program, therefore

Be it Resolved that we rescind the action to postpone the Celebration of Praise program and that we adopt the Celebration of Praise Program, and

Be it Further Resolved that we direct our State Missions Director to proceed accordingly.

4. Whereas, according to the Executive Board's printed report the failure of the Ministers Hospitalization Insurance Company was unforeseeable, and

Whereas the failure of the Ministers Hospitalization Insurance Program was beyond the control of the Executive Secretary, therefore

Be it resolved that this state association go on record as exonerating our Executive Secretary of any responsibility in the failure of the Ministers Insurance Program.

RECOMMENDATION FROM FIRST OKLAHOMA ASSOCIATION

Whereas the Executive Board acts in behalf of this Association, when the Association is not in session.

And whereas the Executive Board has the oversight of the Executive Department.

And whereas the Executive Secretary is the only person hired or elected by this Body;

Therefore be it resolved, that the Executive Secretary no longer be elected by this Body, but rather employed by the Executive Board, giving power to the Board to hire and fire, with the same rules for firing; namely, nonperformance of job, immorality, or doctrine contrary to the Free Will Baptist Treatise. (Tabled indefinitely)

SPECIAL REPORT: CHURCH GROWTH

It was while I was serving as State Moderator that I was asked to share in the 1984 National Leadership Conference. The theme of the conference was "Guidelines for Growth." There was a great sense of need among those who attended that we take the steps necessary to ensure a real and lasting growth within our denomination.

At the 1985 Jubilee Convention of the National Association the Growth Task Force recommended "TARGET 90", a five year growth

strategy. "Target 90", which calls for growth in membership and in new churches planted, was adopted. We will endeavor to increase our membership by 50,000 and begin 100 new churches by the year 1990.

Oklahoma Free Will Baptists CAN and MUST play a vital role in helping to reach this goal. We must accept the challenge and develop an appropriate plan of action to involve each department, institution, district association and local church within our state.

At the request of, and in cooperation with our State Moderator, I offer the following recommendations:

1. We recommend that the Oklahoma State Association adopt the National Association's "Target 90" and select a Growth Task Force to accomplish our growth program by devising, communicating and implementing growth materials, goals and methods.
2. We recommend that we adopt the suggested growth goal of (25%) twenty-five percent by 1990.
3. We recommend the National Association's theme, "GROWING FOR GOD'S GLORY", with a special emphasis in four growth areas:

GROWING FOR GOD'S GLORY

"The whole body fitly joined together maketh increase of the body" (Eph. 4:16).

- I. Growing Spiritually
- II. Growing Doctrinally
- III. Growing Numerically
- IV. Growing Cooperatively (In Stewardship)

We propose to accomplish these four growth areas by:

1. Each member Association, with each of its churches, and finally each Church member committed to growth in every area of the Christian experience.
2. Each Association, Church and individual member setting realistic goals and reaching them through the strength and grace of our God.
3. Each growth area being repeatedly emphasized and publicized at each level of our fellowship.
4. The State Association adopting a growth program with specific goals.

PUBLIC MORALS COMMITTEE

1. We recommend that our pastors alert their people of the deadly damnable teachings of secular humanism that is being taught so widely in our public educational systems.
2. We recommend that our pastors gather information and dispense it to their people in regard to the sin of a legalized lottery and all forms of gambling.
3. Because there seems to be a lack of Christian separation from the world today, we recommend that the pastors set the example for their

people and that all Free Will Baptists adhere to the spiritual principles given in the church covenant and in Titus 2:11-13.

4. We recommend that we continue to oppose the awful murder of 1.5 million babies per year by abortion.
5. We recommend that the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists reaffirm our position as being opposed to homosexuality, drug abuse, divorce, immorality in both movies and the television programming, and all other immoral issues.
6. We go on record as encouraging our laity to become active in all moral, ethical, and political issues.
7. We encourage our pastors co-operate with Sooner Alcoholics Narcotics Education, both financially and in their fight against drug abuse and other issues.

The yearly meeting for the purpose of setting the budget for the executive department met August 26. A good financial year was reported. The giving to the Cooperative Program was down some but not enough to be alarmed about. Token raises were given to the executive department employees. They will be reflected in the Budget.

The Book Store gave one of its best reports ever. Bro. Martin has done a good job and we commend him for it. He reported an increase in sales, net profit and an increase in inventory.

Money was spent for the beautification of our property. A water well and sprinkler system has been installed. This should give our property a very nice appearance. The amount of money spent will be reflected in the Budget.

Motion, second and passed to recommend to the State Association the acceptance of the Little River Association.

On September 23, 1985, Brother Lonnie DaVoult, State Executive Secretary, informed The State Executive Board of his intent to tender his resignation to the State Association when it convenes in October, 1985. The resignation is to be effective December 31, 1985. The Executive Board commends Brother DaVoult for his 14 years of Faithful Service in this important office. The State Association has prospered, a new State Office Building has been built, and Brother DaVoult has given himself untiringly to this ministry. We wish Brother and Sister DaVoult a very happy and successful ministry in whatever area of service they choose.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
JUNE 30, 1985 AND 1984

(1) SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

General — The State Association of Free Will Baptists is a non-profit organization designed to provide central leadership and representation for the Free Will Baptists of Oklahoma and to handle certain receipts and disbursements of the Free Will Baptist Churches. The Association uses the fund method of accounting, whereby the fund balance represents the equity the Association has in its assets. This accounting method is generally accepted among non-profit organizations as the most feasible way of reflecting their financial activity and position.

Property and Equipment — Property and equipment are recorded at cost. Depreciation is computed based on the estimated useful lives of the related assets. Expenditures for repairs and maintenance are charged to operations when incurred while major betterments and renewals are capitalized.

(2) MORTGAGE RECEIVABLE

The executive residence was sold on May 30, 1974 for \$20,500. The buyer assumed the mortgage on the property and gave the Association a second mortgage in the amount of \$10,300. Payments began on July 1, 1974. The rate of interest is 8% and the mortgage is for thirty years.

(3) OFFICE BUILDING

Construction of the new office building located in Moore, Oklahoma, began in March, 1983. As of June 30, 1985, the capitalized costs were \$103,726. Financing for the building came from:

- (a) Contributions from churches and individuals:
- (b) \$500 monthly payments from the Free Will Baptist Bookstore
- (c) Current operating fund of the State Association; and

(4) LONG-TERM DEBT

As of June 30, 1985, the Association had retired all of its long-term debt.

(5) COOPERATIVE CONTRIBUTIONS AND EXPENDITURES

During the fiscal year ended June 30, 1985, oil revenues received from the Ringling property totaled \$370,219. The oil revenues were designated to be disbursed as follows:

- a) A one-time gift of \$30,000 to the Executive Office to pay of the State

Office Property.

b) Prior to January 1, 1985, all funds were to be disbursed by the Hillsdale Board of Trustees. These funds totaled \$132,508 and are reflected as designated expenditures in our report.

c) Effective January 1, 1985 the oil revenue from the Ringling property was to be divided with 10% of all funds received going into the Cooperative program and the remainder to be divided 90% to Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College and 10% to the State Mission Board as follows:

FREE WILL BAPTIST BOOKSTORE NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS JUNE 30, 1985 AND 1984

(1) SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

General — The financial statements of the Bookstore have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting, wherein income and expense are recorded as they are earned or incurred.

Inventories — Inventories are recorded using the first-in, first-out method of accounting and are further reduced to the lower of cost or market.

Property and Equipment — Property and equipment are recorded at cost. Depreciation is computed based on the estimated useful lives of the related assets. Expenditures for repairs and maintenance are charged to operations when incurred while major betterments and renewals are capitalized.

Income Taxes — No provision for income taxes has been made due to the fact that the Bookstore is a non-profit organization exempt from income tax under Section 501(c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

(2) RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

The Bookstore has an agreement with the State Association of Free Will Baptists, whereby the Bookstore makes periodic payments of \$500 to the Association. During the current fiscal year, the Bookstore incurred \$3,000 of payments whereas payments during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1984 totaled \$6,000.

REPORT OF SPECIAL FINANCE COMMITTEE

This Committee met August 1, 1985 to discuss the disbursement of the Oil monies. All Board chairmen were present with one delegate at large present elected by the State Association. The Hillsdale and the Mission Board were the only boards that asked for a percentage of the oil monies.

A motion was made that the money be put in Savings for the first five years and that the interest on these funds be divided 50% to Hillsdale, 30% to the State Missions, 10% to Coop and 10% to contingency fund.

STATE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD REPORT

During this past Associational year the State Sunday School Board met four (4) times at the State office building in Moore, Oklahoma. The following is a summary of the Board's activities this past year:

- (1) Chairman Keith Burden and State Moderator Jerry Dudley attended a "Congress on Christian Education" in Chicago, Illinois. Information from the Congress was used in the formulation of plans for this year's State Sunday School Convention.
- (2) A Spring Enlargement Campaign was conducted in conjunction with the National Home Missions sponsored "Roll Call Sunday" on Sunday, March 31. This year's attendance was compared to last year's attendance, and winners were declared on the basis of the greatest percentage of increase over last year. STATE MISSION BOARD REPORT 1984-1985

The State Mission Board has supported four Missionaries during the year. They are: Danny Hester—Bartlesville; Curtis Linton—Lawton; Jim Smith—Weatherford; and David Archer—Glenpool.

We are proud of these churches and the good job each Missionary is doing. Danny Hester has led his people in Bartlesville to much greater spiritual growth and stability as well as a steady growth in numbers saved and attendance. The Lawton church began assuming a portion of Curtis Linton's salary in March and will continue increasing the amount over the next 12 months. This will make their church self-supporting by March of 1986. The Weatherford church was organized August 4. Jim Smith has done an outstanding job there. They have a good organization involving most of their adults as officers and teachers in the church. The Glenpool church continues to do well. David Archer hopes to reach the goal of self-supporting status within the next year.

This year the board gave \$100.00 toward each Missionary's National Association expense. We feel that each church should be taught to send their Pastor's family to the National and State Association meetings. Each church was written and encouraged to supply the remainder of this expense, and to furnish the entire amount in the future.

The State Missions Walk-A-Thon did not receive the response that we had hoped for. We only know of about 30 churches that participated. As of August, we had received about \$15,000.00 from this effort. However, money is still coming in each month, so it is not certain what the final total will be.

We have made some long range plans to accelerate the number of churches started in the future. We need your help. Pastor, will you ask your church to give C. E. P. a percent of your income? Many churches have already voted to do this. As our Mission Director visits churches and associations, he is asking churches to include our program in their budgets. Income has increased about \$1,000.00 per month in the last year. We want to thank those churches who have put us in their budgets. Please become a part of this urgently needed effort.

We want to help churches in scheduling all Missionaries for itinerate services in our State. The Mission Director will keep the names of each church, a list of Missionaries available (Foreign and Home), and how many Missionaries each church has each year. He will also help you with Missionary conference scheduling if you desire. He has begun office hours

Tuesday through Thursdays each week at the State Office. You may reach him there if you need his services.

We request an additional 3% of the State Co-op receipts.

GUIDELINES FOR C. E. P. CANDIDATES

1. The candidate must have completed at least two (2) years (60 hrs.) in a Christian college with a grade point average of at least 2.85 and three (3) years of pastoring.
2. In lieu of the foregoing requirements a candidate may qualify if he has pastored for six (6) years with four (4) years in one denominationally active church.
3. The candidate's experience in either one or two must show an aptitude for mission work.
4. The candidate must be married and have a good report with his family.
5. The candidate must have a good credit rating.
6. He must answer to the satisfaction of the Mission Board their questionnaire for missionaries.
7. The candidate must have a record of outside financial and denominational support of all ministries in his former pastorate.
8. Denominational loyalty and support . . . The Mission Church should:
 - A. Be trained in all denominational doctrines and activities.
 - B. Become involved in an association immediately after conception.
 - C. Receive tithes and offerings in each Sunday service.
 - D. Give 10% Co-op to outside causes, and encourage individual financial support to missions and Christian education.
 - E. Have Communion and Feetwashing, Revivals, Missionaries, and Bible College representatives at least once a year.
9. The Church Establishment Program should be completely explained and kept before the people at all time.
10. A Church conference should be held each month and a copy of all income and expenditures given to each member.
11. The missionary should be the church treasurer until the mission becomes an organized church.
12. A detailed statistical and financial report is to be sent to each Mission board member monthly. Any balance above \$500.00 each month is to be sent to the mission board treasurer.
13. The missionary is allowed two (2) weeks paid vacation each year. He may conduct and keep the income from four (4) revivals each year. Other revivals should be cleared with the board.
14. Any difference or conflict between the mission board and the missionary should be kept confidential and settled without criticism or backbiting.

HOME MISSIONS DEPARTMENT

October, 1985

Dear Friends in Oklahoma:

Greetings from your National Home Missions Department. May God richly bless you and all the good people in Oklahoma for all that you have done for the cause of Christ and our country through your Home Missions Department.

Twelve missionary families were sent to the field in 1984. A new state was opened—Rapid City, South Dakota by Tim Coats. A new province was opened—Windsor, Ontario, Canada by Bill Reagan. A new work was launched with Fred Jones being employed for the Bible Institute in Monterrey, Mexico to train Mexican preachers and lay workers to reach their own people for Christ.

At present we have 54 missionary families planting Free Will Baptist churches throughout North America and the islands belonging to the United States. **FIFTIETH ANNIVERSARY REPORT OF
FOREIGN MISSIONS DEPARTMENT TO THE
OKLAHOMA STATE ASSOCIATION
OCTOBER 21-22**

Praise the Lord for raising up more than 136 organized churches, congregations and preaching points around the world. In addition to our missionary staff of 110, there are 32 ordained national pastors, 10 licensed preachers and 48 lay-preachers preaching the gospel. Last year our churches on the mission fields witnessed more than 1,058 conversions, 324 baptisms, and 4,895 in attendance.

Here are some news briefs.

THE BANKS (Japan) rejoice over the assistance of Pastor Kawasaki. The church at Kito Hiroshima is growing.

THE NICHOLS (Ivory Coast) have successfully completed the first phase of their study of French.*

THE SPARKS (Spain) report open air evangelistic efforts and souls saved.

LYNN MIDGETT (Spain) is working in Mostoles while continuing her language study.

THE COUSINEAUS (Ivory Coast) recently led the Bouna area Christians in a successful evangelistic campaign.

THE PAYNES (Ivory Coast) are on furlough. Sandra's health has improved considerably. They hope to return to the field next spring.*

THE FILKINS (Ivory Coast) are making good progress studying French.

THE DEEDS (Brazil) have successfully established a church in Lafayette. They ask prayers for strong lay leadership.

THE TEAGUES (France) are hoping to return to the field soon. They would appreciate the opportunity of sharing their burden with your congregation.*

THE BRYANS (Ivory Coast) direct activities at the only evangelical publishing house in West Africa.

THE REEVES (Spain) were appointed in April of this year. They would love to share their burden with your congregation.*

THE HOLLANDS (Ivory Coast) have just begun their deputational ministry. They hope to leave for the field next summer.*

THE COMBS (Brazil) are busily preparing to establish a Bible College to serve the entire field.

ARILLA WODE (Ivory Coast) is still recovering from being bitten by a rabid dog. She is making a valuable contribution in Agnibilekrou.

*—Need additional support.

We have asked each state to underwrite its missionaries. In the case of a married couple in which only one partner is from Oklahoma, our goal is to get 50% of that family's support from your state. The following list shows the percentage of each missionary's support which you supplied during 1984: Banks — 40%, Bryans — 38%, Combs — 38%, Cousineau — 42%, Deeds — 66%, Filkins — 50%, Hollands — 65%, Wode — 82%, Midgett — 67%, Nichols — 75%, Payne — 26%, Sparks — 33%.

Thank you for the \$310,355 which you contributed to foreign missions last year. Cooperative giving provided \$14,934 of this amount.

Your suggested quota for 1985 is \$362,000. Through August you have given \$199,768. This is 55% of your goal with 66% of the year passed.

On September 1 our general fund was \$21,601.22 in the red. We have worked very hard in the past 2½ years to bring the missionaries' deficit accounts down from a high of \$118,710 to the current level of \$59,166.90. Perhaps we have failed in the process to inform you and others of the need for consistent contributions to the general fund.

Through gifts to the general fund you are helping every missionary. All of them depend upon the home staff for many materials and services. HEART-BEAT and other informational items are paid for from the general fund and distributed without charge. Telephone, travel, rent, postage, utilities, etc. continue to go up. We must have additional support for the operational budget or cut back sharply on services rendered missionaries and churches.

We appreciate those who regularly send us gifts that can be used to meet these needs. If your church is not supporting the general fund, would you consider adding at least 10 percent to your present missionary gifts to help with these expenses? Thank you for considering and responding to this need.

This year we Free Will Baptists are celebrating "50" years of foreign missions endeavor with a nationwide Advance Celebration. Overseas Secretary Jimmy Aldridge is coordinating this event. He will be counting on you to join us in praising God for 50 years of blessings.

General Director Rolla Smith, Director of Communications Don Roberts, Treasurer-Administrative Assistant Earl Larson, Overseas Secretary Jimmy Aldridge and I appreciate what you're doing. If we can assist you at any time feel free to call us.

STATE CTS BOARD REPORT

Looking back, I'm thankful first of all to God who has blessed our endeavors. I'm also thankful for our hard-working board members. While we met four times this past year to "plan our work," board members spent countless hours outside the board room "working the plan."

A statewide Youth Conference was held on November 10th, 1984. Approximately 225 teens and sponsors gathered at the First FWB Church in Ada for a full day of activities centered around the theme "My Brother's Keeper."

What do you suppose is the largest gathering of Oklahoma Free Will Baptists each year? My guess is that it is now the State CTS Competitive Activities and Music and Arts Festival. A special thanks to Hillsdale College for hosting this event, May 18th, 1985. Again Oklahoma was well represented at the National Competition in July. Literally any size church youth group can participate in some way. Our board members would be delighted to talk to pastors or youth workers about the particulars.

Our board sponsored three weeks of summer camp at the First Mission Association's Campgrounds near Drumright. 190 attended Junior Camp and 175 attended Junior High Camp. While a smaller group, 90, attended Senior High Camp, the blessings were big. Only time and eternity will tell the results of an unusual, wonderful moving of God among these soon-to-be adults.

Looking ahead, we would like to continue to enlarge and improve our present work and move into new areas of training. We are limited, however by a lack of finances. Though we raised fees considerably in 1984-85, still we lost approximately \$4000 on our camp and CTS competition. A look at our financial report shows an extremely low ending balance. Unless we receive an increase in funds we will be forced to make another marked increase in fees. We fear large, annual increases in fees will keep us from reaching many of our state's teenagers. They must be reached! If they are not reached for Christ and led to maturity and commitment all of our state work will suffer now and in the future. We feel that we have and can help reach them. Therefore, though our proposed 86-87 budget is based upon 2% of cooperative receipts, we request 3%.

In the past we've concentrated our efforts of the training of young people exclusively. As we look ahead we desire to begin offering training to local church workers also. We realize that Hillsdale offers training and that the State Sunday School Board offers training for Sunday School workers. However the majority of our lay workers have not or will not attend Hillsdale. There are countless lay people who work not in Sunday School, but rather in bus ministry, children's church, teen ministry, senior adult ministry, visitation, deacon's ministries, music, etc. They have, by and large, been offered little or no training. We are excited about the possibility of offering quality training, in a wide range of areas, to a large number of people through a video tape lending library. Obviously such an undertaking would require funding. We feel that 10% of the oil revenue that God has blessed our state with would be well invested in allowing us to begin a video library as well as purchase much needed audio-visual equipment for our camps and competitive activities program. We request such.

We feel strongly about the importance of the work to which we've been assigned. While far from perfect, we feel we're doing a good job. We have definite plans for the future. We ask the state association to very seriously consider our requests.

Dear Friends of Hillsdale:

Greetings to you in the name of Christ our Lord. It is a pleasure to again report to the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists.

God continues to bless Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College. The 1984-85 school year was one of several changes and accomplishments. The spirit of the student body was excellent. Their participation in the campus activities has portrayed their leadership potential and promises good things as they merge into society and assume responsibilities in the Kingdom's work.

The major physical project of the year was the completion of the Geri Ann Hull Learning Resource Center. The building is now in use and has created a lot of excitement among students and personnel on campus. The building was completed within the cost guidelines that were prescribed by the state association. The donor response of our churches and people, the amount set aside from the budget, plus the income from the oil revenues have made possible a debt-free building. We give God the praise.

Other activities include the work on the self study that will be presented to North Central. The men's dorms were refurbished during the summer. Some limited remodeling has taken place in the Administration Building including offices to accommodate the development department. This has enabled us to vacate the state offices which we have occupied for the past two years. We appreciate the use of this space. It has been a great blessing. We also, appreciate the excellent relationship with Brother Lonnie DaVoult during this time.

Our enrollment for Fall semester 1984 was 154 with 26 new students enrolling for the Spring semester. We are thankful for the 73 students from Oklahoma. These students made valuable contributions to the campus life and the mission of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College.

The giving to the general fund has remained stable for the fiscal year with a slight upturn over the two previous years. The general fund gifts are channeled through the Co-op, Scholar's Share, and Church Partner Programs. We appreciate your support of these programs. While the general fund remained stable, we operated at a \$38,000 deficit for the 1984-85 year. This was largely due to a decline in enrollment. For this reason, your continued faithful giving is essential if we are to avoid another deficit this year. As an individual you are asked to give. As a church, if you are not a Church Partner now, consider putting Hillsdale in your budget.

The top 30 churches in Oklahoma contributed \$92,497.34 to the general fund during the past year. The top 10 gave \$55,795.97 and are ranked as follows:

HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE

We have examined the balance sheets of the Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College (an Oklahoma corporation, not for profit), as of June 30, 1985 and 1984, and the related statements of revenue, expenditures and transfers and changes in fund balances for the years then ended. Except as explained in the following paragraph, our examinations were made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and, accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

As discussed in Note 5 to the financial statements, the College did not maintain a record of fixed asset additions and retirements prior to June 30, 1975; and, as such, we were unable to obtain sufficient evidence to form an opinion as to the basis on which fixed assets were stated.

In our opinion, except for the effects of such adjustments, if any, as might have been required with respect to the fixed asset accounts, the financial statements referred to in the first paragraph present fairly the financial position of HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE as of June 30, 1985 and 1984, and the changes in fund balances and the current funds revenues, expenditures and other changes for the years then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
JUNE 30, 1985 AND 1984

(1) SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

General — The significant accounting policies followed by the Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College are described below to enhance the usefulness of the financial statements to the reader.

Accrual Basis — The financial statements of the Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting except for depreciation. Depreciation is not taken on depreciable assets comprising the physical plant in conformity with the reporting objectives of accounting for resources received and used rather than the determination of net income. The statement of current funds revenues, expenditures and transfers is a statement of financial activities of current funds related to the current reporting period. It does not purport to present the results of operations or the net income or loss for the period as would a statement of income or a statement of revenues and expenses.

Fund Accounting — In order to ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of the resources available to the College, the accounts of the College are maintained in accordance with the principle of "fund accounting." This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds that are in accordance with activities or objectives specified. Separate accounts are maintained for each fund; however, in the accompanying financial statements, funds that have similar characteristics have been combined into fund groups. Accordingly, all financial transactions have been recorded and reported by fund group.

(2) INVESTMENTS

Investments exclusive of physical plant are recorded at cost; investments received by gift are carried at market value at the date of acquisition. As of June 30, 1985 and 1984, investments of the restricted and unrestricted funds were composed of the following:

(3) LOAN FUND

The loan fund reflects activity with respect to the National Direct Student Loan program which is funded primarily by the Department of

Education. The College provides matching funds equal to one-ninth of the Federal funds received. This program, along with the College Work-Study, Pell Grant and Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant programs have been reported under a separate audit report to the Department of Education.

(4) ENDOWMENT FUND

During the current fiscal year, the governing board of the College determined that certain funds were to be retained and invested as an endowment. The board stipulated that the principal is to remain invested and the interest income is to be placed in the current unrestricted fund. On September 16, 1983, an investment in a limited partnership was made in the amount of \$87,000. In addition, as of June 30, 1984, an amount of \$21,199 which was in the current fund was designated to be transferred to the endowment fund and as such was transferred during the current fiscal year. Current year gifts to the Endowment Fund totaled \$21,923.

(5) INVESTMENT IN PLANT

The College did not maintain adequate historical cost accounting records for fixed asset acquisitions and retirements in years prior to June 30, 1975. Best available estimates of historical costs were used to record \$871,093 of fixed assets acquired prior to June 30, 1975. However, fixed asset acquisitions made subsequent to that time and through June 30, 1984 totaling \$616,392 were properly accounted for and recorded using the historical cost basis as were current year acquisitions which totaled \$721,008.

(6) NOTES PAYABLE

As of June 30, 1985 and 1984, the College had the following long-term notes payable:

THE FREE WILL BAPTIST MASTER'S MEN State of Oklahoma CONSTITUTION

PREAMBLE

The purpose of the Free Will Baptist Master's Men, state of Oklahoma is to provide a means of Christian fellowship and to deepen the spiritual lives of the laymen of the local church. Also, to provide a means of developing the abilities and talents of the laymen, and to promote the cause of Christ through a complete, "total church program," as prescribed by Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists.

ARTICLE I NAME

The name of this organization shall be known as the Free Will Baptist Master's Men, State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE II MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. The membership of this organization shall be composed of the district associations of Master's Men, and any local chapters where there is only one chapter in the district, within the state of Oklahoma.

Section 2. Every member in good standing of an affiliated district association of Master's Men, or any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district, is entitled to the full benefits of membership.

Section 3. Each district association, or any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district, shall submit an annual, written report to this body, (as a matter of information).

ARTICLE III OFFICERS

The officers of this organization shall consist of a president, vice-president and a secretary-treasurer.

The officers of this organization shall be elected annually and may succeed themselves, at this level.

ARTICLE IV EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The executive committee shall consist of the elected officers of this organization and they shall serve as the program committee for each annual convention.

Section 2. Ex-officio members of the executive committee shall be the presidents of the district associations of Master's Men, presidents of any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district, and the state executive secretary of the State Association of Free Will Baptists.

ARTICLE V MEETINGS

This organization shall meet annually at 7:30 P.M. on the Monday night before the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists convenes.

ARTICLE VI AMENDMENTS

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of any regular meeting.

BY-LAWS

VOTING RIGHTS

Section 1. Every member of each affiliated district association, or any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district, is eligible to vote on all questions and matters that might come before the Free Will Baptist Master's Men, State of Oklahoma.

COMMITTEES

Section 2. The executive committee shall transact all routine business and shall act for the organization in the interim between meetings.

Section 3. The executive committee shall meet at the call of the president.

Section 4. A nominating committee, for the annual election of officers, shall be composed of the presidents of each district association, and the president of any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district.

Section 5. The president shall appoint all other committees, subject to the approval of the body.

FINANCE

Section 6. This organization shall be financed on the basis of offerings, dues and assessments.

QUORUM

Section 7. One-tenth of the members of this organization shall constitute a quorum at any regular meeting.

AMENDMENTS

Section 8. These by-laws may be amended at any regular meeting by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

As adopted by the Free Will Baptist Master's Men, State of Oklahoma annual session, in Muskogee, Oklahoma October 19, 1970.

CONSTITUTION OF MINISTER'S CONFERENCE

ARTICLE 1

The Minister's Conference shall be called the Oklahoma State Free Will Baptist Minister's Conference, and shall be composed of Ordained Free Will Baptist Ministers who are regular members of some Orthodox Free Will Baptist church in the State of Oklahoma who have paid their \$1.00 dues.

ARTICLE 2

The officers for this conference shall be President, Vice-President, and Clerk Treasurer, who shall be elected annually.

ARTICLE 3

This conference shall have the power to discipline its members.

ARTICLE 4

Members of this organization shall be all ordained ministers who participate in the benefits and activities of this body, and associate members who become members by payment of the \$1.00 annual dues.

ARTICLE 5

This conference shall meet Semi-Annually.

ARTICLE 6

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any regular session.

BY-LAWS OF MINISTER'S CONFERENCE

ARTICLE 1

The clerk or assistant clerk, or in their absence the senior minister in years shall call the ministers into conference. If a quorum is present the President or in his absence the Vice-President shall moderate the meeting. If neither of these are present, the senior minister in years shall be in charge.

ARTICLE 2

It shall be the duty of the clerk to enroll the ministers of the conference. Ministers shall present themselves with proper evidence of their rights to seats therein, and those enrolled by the clerk shall compose the conference. In case of questionable representation the case under question shall be referred to the Credential Committee.

ARTICLE 3

It shall be the duty of each minister belonging to this conference, to be active in pastoral or evangelistic services (disabled or retired ministers excepted). Any minister belonging to this conference shall report in each session in person or by letter, and failing to do so for two successive sessions shall be subject to discipline.

ARTICLE 4

Each conference shall be opened by reading a portion of God's word and prayer, and each session shall be closed with prayer.

ARTICLE 5

By a two-thirds vote of the members present ruling of the President may be overruled.

ARTICLE 6

This conference shall sit with open doors, except when it shall go into a committee as a whole.

ARTICLE 7

No member shall absent himself from the conference during its meeting without permission from the President.

ARTICLE 8

No person shall be allowed to nominate more than one member of a committee, unless person nominated is not elected.

ARTICLE 9

The President shall not allow discussion when not carried on in a Christian Spirit, or when he thinks it will cause discord.

ARTICLE 10

Anyone desiring to speak shall rise and address the President by the appellation "Brother President," but shall not speak further until recognized.

ARTICLE 11

No member of this conference shall be allowed to speak more than five minutes, nor twice on the same subject without permission from the President.

ARTICLE 12

These By-Laws may be altered or amended at any regular or adjourned session of this conference by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE, INC. BY-LAWS BOARD OF TRUSTEES

SECTION I

The Board of Trustees of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc., an Oklahoma corporation, shall be composed of fifteen members, elected as provided in the Articles of Incorporation of said College, as amended:

ARTICLE A—OFFICERS: The officers of the Board of Trustees shall be a Chairman, an Assistant Chairman, and a Secretary, each of whom shall be elected by the Board for a term of one year. They shall continue in office until their successors have been chosen:

Item 1—CHAIRMAN: The chairman of the Board of Trustees or his assistant shall preside at all meetings of the Board. He shall be an ex-officio member of the Executive Committee.

Item 2—SECRETARY: The Secretary shall record and preserve minutes of all meetings and acts of the Board of Trustees and countersign all deeds, conveyances, and other papers authorized by the Board. He shall have authority to call special meetings of the Trustees of the College upon the written request of two-thirds of the members of the Board; he shall mail notice of said meeting to the trustees ten (10) days in advance.

Item 3—EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE: The Executive Committee shall consist of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, the Vice-Chairman of the Board, the Secretary of the Board. The Executive Committee shall have authority to consider and act upon all questions affecting the College which may be brought before it between the stated meetings of the Board, or a quorum of the Board fails to attend a called or regular meeting. It shall transact such business as may be committed to it by the Board and shall act for the College on such matters as it may submit to it. The Committee shall meet at the call of the Chairman or the President of the College.

ARTICLE B—MEETINGS: The Board of Trustees shall meet each year at a time and place agreed upon by the Board. It shall, also, hold special meetings whenever called in accordance with the By-Laws of the Board. Such special meetings may be called by either the chairman of the Board, or the President of the College.

ARTICLE C—QUORUM: A majority of the members or the Board of Trustees of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc. in attendance at any called or regular meeting, written notice of which has been mailed by the Secretary to each trustee, shall constitute a quorum. No proxy votes shall be permitted. No ex-officio member shall be entitled to vote at meetings of the Board of Trustees.

ARTICLE D—ELECTIONS: In all elections held by the Board of Trustees each member present except ex-officio members shall be entitled to one vote, and the result shall be determined by a majority of the votes cast. Due notice of any election must be personal notice to the members or a day on the minutes of the Board not less than one week preceding the election.

SECTION II

OFFICERS OF HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE

The officers of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College shall be a President who is elected by the Board of Trustees for an indefinite term. Other officers shall be a Vice President of Academic Affairs, Vice President of Student Affairs, and a Vice President of Business Affairs, each of whom shall be appointed by the President with the approval of the Board of Trustees.

ITEM ONE—PRESIDENT: The President shall be executive officer of the Board of Trustees and shall have general control of the College including its officers, teachers, students, and business. He shall render to the Board complete annual reports and to its chairman, Executive Committee or other committees such information as may be deemed essential to a thorough knowledge of the operation of the College and its promotion. He shall be a member of the Board of Trustees ex-officio and the Executive Committee ex-officio and shall have the rights and privileges of a member of the Board except voting. The President shall execute all documents, instruments, and conveyances on behalf of the college. Duties of the president and working relationship shall be further detailed in a format approved by the Board of Trustees.

ITEM TWO—VICE PRESIDENT OF ACADEMIC AFFAIRS: The Vice President of Academic affairs of the College shall, under the President, fix the hours of recitation, govern, control, and regulate the conduct of the students, have general oversight of curriculum, student's records, and such other internal details and administrative duties as may be delegated to him by the President of the College.

The Vice President of Academic Affairs shall act as President in the absence of the President.

ITEM THREE—VICE PRESIDENT OF STUDENT AFFAIRS: The Vice President of student affairs shall be responsible for directing the religious activities of the College, serve as counselor to the students, and such other duties as may be delegated to him by the President of the College.

ITEM FOUR—VICE PRESIDENT OF BUSINESS AFFAIRS: The Treasurer shall keep an accurate record of all accounts of the College and shall receive and expend as directed by the Board of Trustees and President, all money for the expenses of the institution. He shall make an annual report to the Board and furnish the Executive Committee with such information pertaining to his office as may be requested. He shall provide bond in whatever amount the Board may require. Until such times as the Board of Trustees may deem different the Treasurer's office shall be contained within the Vice President of Business Affairs office. The Vice President of Business Affairs may at the direction of the administration designate this duty to a subordinate officer. The Vice President of Business Affairs shall have general supervision of the financial business of the College, and shall, at the direction of the President, be responsible for the upkeep of all the physical facilities and premises of the College. His detailed duties are directed in a format approved by the Board of Trustees.

SECTION III FACULTY

The faculty shall consist of the President, the Vice President of Student Affairs, and all teachers of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College. Instructors and assistant teachers shall have the privilege of sitting with the faculty in stated meetings but shall not have the right of voting.

It shall be the policy of the College to employ on its faculty those who are members of Free Will Baptist churches that are affiliated with the National Association. Emergencies, however arising from the resignation, illness, death, or approved leaves of absence of faculty members may be relieved by the temporary employment of instructors who are affiliated with any evangelical denomination. Part-time or short-term instructors, deemed essential to the successful prosecution of a consistent education program, may be employed at the discretion of the President without respect of denominational affiliation.

The faculty, under the authority and jurisdiction of the President, shall have general charge of instruction, attendance of students, examinations, administration of curriculum, discipline, and all matters involving the spiritual, physical, and social welfare of the College. The faculty shall be hired upon recommendation of the President.

In the selection of the faculty qualitative factors shall be kept in mind. All faculty members shall be urged to pursue graduate programs in their respective fields. Except in special cases no faculty member will be required to teach courses outside of his field.

SECTION IV ACADEMIC COUNCIL

The Academic Council shall consist of the President, the Vice President of Student Affairs and the heads of the departments of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist

College: It shall determine the curriculum and academic policy of the College, prescribe requirements for admissions, certificates, diplomas, and degrees, and supervise the courses of instruction offered by the various departments of the College.

SECTION V CONTRACTS

The Board of Trustees shall establish the College policy involving the execution of contracts, deeds of conveyance, the determination of salaries, and employment of all officers, representatives, faculty members and essential domestic and maintenance employees. The President of the College shall negotiate agreements, executive contracts, employ representatives, and supply vacancies incurred by the termination of contracts, resignations, or death of any essential employees. All contracts for building construction shall be let only to persons or corporations posting a valid performance bond and recording the same in the Office of the County Clerk of Cleveland County, Oklahoma.

SECTION VI ADVISORY COUNCIL

An advisory council shall be formed which is to be composed of interested, qualified persons in the various fields which will be of value in building and maintaining a strong academic program to carry out the educational program stated in the charter.

SECTION VII AMENDMENT

These By-Laws may be amended by a favorable vote of two-thirds of the qualified members of the Board of Trustees of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College at any meeting of the Board, provided that the proposed amendment has been submitted in writing to each Trustee one month in advance. This change to be subject to the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists.

SECTION VIII ADMINISTRATIVE FUNCTIONS

The President of the Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College shall be elected by the Board of Trustees, and he shall act for and on behalf of the Board in the conduct and management of the institution. He shall also be a member of the Board of Trustees ex-officio and of the Executive committee, ex-officio, and his duties, powers and term of office shall be prescribed in the by-laws of the College and a format approved by the Board of Trustees.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF THE HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE, INC.

Know all men by these presents, that, we whose names are hereunto subscribed, do hereby associate ourselves together for the purpose of forming a cor-

poration under the provisions of the corporation laws of the State of Oklahoma, and for that purpose state:

ARTICLE ONE

The name of this corporation shall be HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE, INC.

ARTICLE TWO

The purpose of this corporation shall be the creation, establishment and maintenance of a college and institution of higher learning devoted to the promotion and impartation of higher learning, Christian education and such other education, instruction, learning, training and research as may be deemed essential for the cause of Christ and to that end prescribe courses of study and grant degrees. The doctrinal and theological position of this institution shall be that of the sponsoring denomination, Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists and the treatise of the National Association of Free Will Baptist as endorsed by the state body, and in connection therewith, in accordance with the stipulation of the Constitution and By-laws of the State Association of Free Will Baptists, Inc.

(a.) To prescribe courses of study for both resident and correspondence students, which shall include general education in the arts, Christian Ministries of Service and Biblical studies for wisdom; said courses to be taught in both a Junior College Division and a Bible College Division, and to award degrees, either graduate or post-graduate, to those persons satisfactorily completing the prescribed courses of study and to grant such other literary honors, including honorary degrees, as shall be deemed advisable.

(b.) To charge and collect tuition as determined by the Board of Trustees and to create scholarships.

(c.) To employ professors, instructors and other subordinate employees as may be necessary for the proper conduct of the college under the direction and control of the President of the College, with the advice and consent of the majority of the Board of Trustees.

(d.) To institute and carry on missions and commissions for missionary purposes and investigations.

(e.) To publish and distribute such pamphlets, literature or books as may be required in the conduct of such work and the general promotion of the College.

(f.) To sue and be sued in its corporate name and to enter into contracts of every type and nature.

(g.) To solicit support, receive, collect, hold and receive by gift or bequest personal property in any amount, money or other thing of value; to purchase real estate, to receive real estate that may be given, or devised to the college for achieving the legitimate ends of the college and to sell or mortgage the same as the need arises.

(h.) To borrow money in payment of property for erecting buildings and making improvements and for any other purpose germane to the objectives and purposes of the college.

(i.) To issue notes, bonds, debentures and other evidences of indebtedness and execute mortgages, liens and other incumbrances upon the property of the

corporation, real or otherwise, to secure the payment of any such evidences of indebtedness.

(j.) To transact any and all business connected with said College as may be necessary to achieve the purposes of said College.

(k.) To obtain under Internal Revenue Laws of the United States and of the Revenue Laws of the State of Oklahoma exemption from income property and other forms of taxation.

ARTICLE THREE

The location of this corporation shall be in Moore, Oklahoma.

ARTICLE FOUR

The duration of this corporation shall be perpetual.

ARTICLE FIVE

The general control of this corporation shall be vested in a Board of Trustees consisting of 16 members, 10 of which shall be elected by the delegates to the annual Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists—each of which shall serve for a term of 5 years, and until his successor is elected and qualified. Two members shall be elected at each annual sitting of the State Association for the expiring five year term and vacancies that occur on the board. One member each shall be elected by the delegates to the annual meeting of the State Association of Free Will Baptists of the states of Arkansas, Colorado, Kansas, Missouri, New Mexico, and Texas, each of which serve for a term designated by the states they represent.

ARTICLE SIX

An executive committee consisting of the Chairman, Vice Chairman, and Secretary of the Board of Trustees shall possess all powers of the Board of Trustees between the stated meetings of the Board of Trustees.

ARTICLE SEVEN

All contracts for building construction shall be let only to persons or corporations posting a valid performance bond and recording the same in the office of the County Clerk of Cleveland County, Oklahoma.

SECTION IX AMENDMENTS

This charter may be hereafter amended subject to the provisions contained herein and the laws of the State of Oklahoma. It is provided, however, that the Trustees of the College shall not propose or apply for any amendment which has not been previously authorized by an act of the Oklahoma State Association.

OKLAHOMA STATE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY CONVENTION CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I

NAME

This organization shall be known as the Oklahoma State Woman's Auxiliary Convention.

ARTICLE II

PURPOSE

The purpose of this convention shall be to bring the women of each district convention together for fellowship, sharing information, and encouraging one another in the work of the Lord.

ARTICLE III

OFFICERS

The Officers of this convention shall be a president, vice president, secretary, assistant secretary, treasurer, and field worker. These shall serve on the state executive committee together with three members elected by the convention as desired. These shall serve for a period of 2 years.

ARTICLE IV

MEMBERSHIP

This convention shall be composed of the officers of the convention together with each active auxiliary member of the district or local (duly accredited by the credentials committee).

ARTICLE V

MEETINGS

The annual meeting shall be held each year on the day preceding the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists and at the place designated by said Association.

ARTICLE VI

AMENDMENTS

This constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the convention by a two-thirds vote of members present.

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1, President. The president shall preside over all meetings, appoint such committees as may be needed, call the executive committee together when necessary, be ex-officio member of all committees, and serve as chairman of the executive committee, see that reports are made promptly to the national secretary and perform all duties usually pertaining to such an office.

Section 2, Vice President. The vice president shall preside in the absence of the president or by her request and otherwise assist her in the overseeing of the work in general.

Section 3, Secretary. The secretary shall keep an accurate record of all proceedings of the convention and executive meetings, preserve all valuable papers and turn same over to her successor in office, and make an annual report to the national secretary on a form available from the NWAC office. She shall compile the districts slates of officers and addresses immediately after the convention. She shall also send a slate of state officers and addresses to the national executive secretary. She is chairman of the Credentials Committee.

The secretary shall also serve as historian keeping an historical record and submitting historical information to the national executive secretary annually.

Section 4, Assistant Secretary. The assistant Secretary shall assist the secretary in recording proceedings of convention and executive committee meetings and shall aid the secretary in all her work as needed.

Section 5, Treasurer. The treasurer shall have charge of all funds belonging to this convention and shall pay out same only when authorized by the convention. The treasurer shall keep an accurate account and shall give a written report of all funds received and disbursed at each annual meeting of the convention. She shall also send an annual report to the WNAC office (executive secretary-treasurer) at least ten days before the end of the fiscal year. She shall encourage support of missions through the WNAC Gift Plan, individual giving and special offerings.

Section 6, Field Worker. The field worker shall have charge of all field work pertaining to, or necessary to, the promotion of the work of the convention and keep the national program before the district officers.

ARTICLE II

ELECTIONS

The general officers shall be nominated by a nominating committee and shall be elected by acclamation, unless there are other nominations. In case of more than one nominee for any particular office, a vote will be taken on each. All elections shall be held at the closing business session of the convention.

ARTICLE III

EXPENSES

Section 1. An appropriation of 18 cents per mile toward the expense of the general officers, when called upon to attend the executive committee meeting to plan program, secretary's expenses, phone calls, postage and stationery for officers will be paid by the convention. All field promotional work is subject to the state executive committee, who should approve all work done by state officers in the interest of state work, as well as expenses of the same.

Section 2. An amount of \$100.00 shall be paid on the expense of the state president to attend WNAC. If the president is unable to go to WNAC that we give the \$100.00 for this purpose to whomever goes in her place providing she is a state officer.

Section 3. The auditing committee shall be paid mileage the same as the executive committee.

ARTICLE IV

COMMITTEES

Section 1. Executive Committee—The executive committee shall be composed of the five officers and three members elected by the convention. Five of these shall compose a quorum. They shall hold meetings for the transaction of business as often as necessary. It shall be the duty of the executive committee to maintain an overseeing of the work at large. They shall act for the convention when necessary. They shall meet with district presidents the night preceding the state auxiliary convention. They will send out a newsletter with expenses paid by the State Treasury.

Section 2. Resolutions Committee—A resolutions committee of five members shall be appointed by the president as needed.

Section 3. Nominating Committee—The nominating committee shall be composed of at least one member from each district convention. Nominations shall be submitted by district with their annual report. These elected by the body at the annual meeting.

Section 4. Credentials Committee—The secretary shall be chairman of the credentials committee, and other members may be appointed by the president. The treasurer shall be a standing member of this committee.

Section 5. Finance Committee—The finance committee shall be appointed by the president. This committee audits the financial records of the year and reports on same to the convention.

Section 6. Registration committee shall be provided by the district convention which is host to state convention.

ARTICLE V

FEES AND REPORTS

Active members shall pay dues of \$1.50 per year. With 25 cents remaining in the district, \$1.25 to be forwarded to state where 25 cents shall be retained, and \$1.00 forwarded to WNAC as required for membership fees. It shall be the duty of each body directly affiliated with the State Auxiliary Convention to send a report to every annual session.

ARTICLE VI

AMENDMENTS

These by-laws may be amended by a two-thirds vote of members present at regular meeting of the state auxiliary convention.

ARTICLE VII

GIFTS

The desired plans for giving in the Woman's Auxiliary are those adopted by WNAC as follows:

1. Mission offerings following each special season of prayer
2. Co-Laborer offering (monthly or quarterly designated to WNAC General Fund)
3. WNAC Emphasis Month in August or other time more convenient to help in support of WNAC General Fund

4. Memorial Student Loan Fund (special program and offering in September to assist worthy and needy students at FWBBC in Nashville)
5. Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College Student Loan Fund. (Special program and offering in September to assist worthy and needy students at Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College)
6. Tithes—Pay tithes on all undesignated money received
7. All offerings are to be forwarded through regular channels.

ARTICLE VIII

WNAC DELEGATE

Each district convention shall submit one nomination for a State delegate to WNAC with their annual report. This nomination (along with others as needed to make up 15 delegates to WNAC) shall be elected by the body at the annual meeting. It shall be the duty of delegates elected to notify president if they cannot attend WNAC. President shall appoint delegates as needed in absence of regular elected delegates.

ARTICLES OF FAITH OF STATE ASSOCIATION

1. **THE BIBLE**—The Scriptures of the Old and New Testament were given by the inspiration of God, and are our infallible rules of faith and practice.

2. **GOD**—There is one living and true God, revealed in nature as the Creator, Preserver and Righteous Governor of the Universe, and in the Scriptures as the Father, Son and Holy Ghost, yet as one God, infinitely wise and good, whom all intelligent creatures are supremely to love, adore and obey.

3. **CHRIST**—Christ is God manifest in the flesh: in His divine nature truly God, in His human nature truly man. The mediator between God and man, once crucified. He is now risen and glorified as our ever-present Saviour and Lord.

4. **THE HOLY SPIRIT**—The Scriptures assigns to the Holy Spirit all the attributes of God. He is the Reprover, Comforter, Guide and Sanctifier of all men.

5. **THE GOVERNMENT OF GOD**—God exercises a wise and benevolent providence over all beings and all things by maintaining the constitution and laws of nature. He also performs special acts of Grace, not otherwise provided for as highest welfare of man requires.

6. **THE SINFULNESS OF MAN**—Man was created innocent, but by disobedience fell into a state of sin and condemnation. His posterity, therefore inherited a fallen nature of such tendencies that all who come to years of accountability, sin and become guilty before God.

7. **THE WORK OF CHRIST**—The Son of God, by His incarnation, life, suffering, death, and resurrection effected for all a redemption from sin that is full and free and is the ground of salvation by faith.

8. **THE WORK OF SALVATION**—The conditions of salvation are:

1. Repentance or sincere sorrow for sin and the hearty renunciations of it.
2. Faith or the unreserved committal of one's self to Christ as Saviour and Lord, with purpose to love and obey Him in all things. In the exercise of saving faith the soul is renewed by the Holy Spirit; freed from the dominion of sin and becomes a child of God.
3. Continuance in faith and obedience until death.

9. **ELECTION**—God determined from the beginning to save all who should comply with the conditions of salvation. Hence by faith in Christ, men become His elect.

10. **FREEDOM OF WILL**—The Human will is free and self controlled, having power to yield to the influence of the truth and the Spirit and live, or to resist them and perish.

11. **SALVATION FREE**—God desires the salvation of all, the Gospel invites all, the Holy Spirit strives with all, and whosoever will may come and take the water of life freely.

12. **PERSEVERENCE**—All believers in Christ, who through grace persevere in holiness to the end of life, have the promise of eternal salvation.

13. **BACKSLIDING AND APOSTASY**—A person who has been regenerated or born again and is living in unconfessed, unforgiven sin, is rebellious to the principles of the Kingdom of God and His righteousness, and therefore is a backslider in a lost condition who must repent and be restored to the right relationship with God or be eternally lost.

We recognize, according to Hebrews 6:4-6, that it is possible for a person to get in the condition that he could never return to Christ. This, we believe, is Apostasy; However, we also recognize that a regenerate person can fall into sin, be in a lost condition and still not be an Apostate. This person, through repentance, can be reconciled to God.

14. **GOSPEL ORDINANCES**—Baptism, or the immersion of believers in water, and the Lord's Supper, are ordinances to be perpetuated under the Gospel; Feet Washing, an ordinance teaching humility, of universal obligation, and to be administered to all true believers.

15. **TITHING**—God commanded tithes and offerings in the Old Testament; Jesus Christ endorsed in the Gospel (Matt. 23:23), and the Apostle Paul said, "Upon the first day of the week let every one of you lay by him in store as God hath prospered him." 1 Cor. 16:2.

16. **THE CHRISTIAN SABBATH**—The divine law requires that one day in seven be set apart from the secular employment and amusements for rest, worship, holy works and activities, and for personal communion with God.

17. **RESURRECTION, JUDGMENT, AND FINAL RETRIBUTION**—The Scriptures teach the resurrection of all men at the last day. They that have done good will come forth to the resurrection of life, and they that have done evil unto the resurrection of damnation: then the wicked shall "Go away into eternal punishment but the righteous into eternal life."

RULES OF ORDER

1. At every sitting of the Association, business shall be opened and concluded by prayer by the Moderator or whomever he may request.

2. Ministers and deacons present are invited to seats, allowed to take part in debates on all subjects, and to vote.

3. Those who speak shall rise and address the Moderator. Personal reflections shall be avoided in all debates.

4. No motion may be discussed until made and seconded.

5. When a motion has been made and seconded, and a member opposes its discussion, the Moderator shall put the question, "Shall it be discussed?" If negative, the question shall not be discussed.

6. If any proposition or motion under debate contains two or more points, it shall be divided at the request of any member, and the vote taken separately.

7. Motions made and lost shall not be recorded.

8. No one shall speak more than twice on the same subject without special leave of the Moderator.

9. All questions shall be decided by a majority vote of all Members present.

BY-LAWS OF STATE ASSOCIATION

1. The Clerk or assistant clerk, or in their absence, the senior minister in years shall call the Association into conference, and if a quorum is present the moderator, or in his absence, the assistant moderator shall take charge; and if neither of them is present the senior minister in years shall act as Moderator.

2. It shall be the duty of the clerk to enroll the delegates to the Association, who shall present themselves with proper evidence of their rights to seats therein, and those enrolled by the clerk shall compose the Association.

3. It shall be the duty of every District belonging to this Association to send a letter to every annual session of this Association reporting in the same spiritual condition, benevolent work, and its statistics. Any District belonging to this Association, which shall fail to report itself for two successive sessions, may be dismissed from the Association by a two thirds vote of all members present.

4. Each meeting shall be opened by reading a portion of the Bible and with prayer, and shall be closed with prayer.

5. By a two-thirds vote of members present, a ruling of the moderator can be overruled.

6. This Association may correspond by messenger or otherwise with other religious bodies.

7. This Association shall sit with open doors except when it shall go into a committee of the whole.

8. Any person not a member of this Association may be allowed to take part in its discussions by obtaining permission from the moderator.

9. It shall be the duty of all the Association to be present at the time appointed for each meeting, and anyone wishing to retire shall first obtain leave of the moderator.

10. No person shall be allowed to nominate more than one member of any committee, provided the person nominated be elected.

11. The moderator shall not allow discussions when not carried on in a Christian spirit or when he thinks it will cause discord or division.

12. Anyone desiring to speak shall rise to his feet and address the moderator by the appellation "Brother Moderator," but shall not speak further until recognized by the moderator.

13. No member of this association shall be allowed to speak more than ten minutes nor twice on the same subject without permission from the moderator.

14. This association shall meet annually beginning on Tuesday following the second Sunday in October.

15. These By-Laws may be altered or amended at any regular or adjourned session of this Association by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

CONSTITUTION OF STATE ASSOCIATION

PREAMBLE: From long experience, we the members of the Free Will Baptist denomination, being regularly baptized upon a profession of our faith in Jesus Christ, and realizing the necessity of a bond in union and fellowship among us as a church; and to preserve and maintain correspondence and co-ordination with us, do therefore ordain this Constitution for our better denomination government.

ARTICLE I

NAME: This organization shall be known as the OKLAHOMA STATE ASSOCIATION OF FREE WILL BAPTISTS.

ARTICLE II

PURPOSE: The object and purpose of this organization shall be to unify the work of the various bodies composing this State Association, and to devise and execute measures for the extension of the Kingdom of God in connection with the various bodies in the Association, or that may hereafter be represented therein.

ARTICLE III

REPRESENTATION: Section 1. This Association shall be composed of all ordained ministers and deacons with membership in some local church which is a member of a district Association with membership in the State Association.

Section 2: Each District Association shall be entitled to a number of elected delegates equal with the number of churches composing said Association. These delegates may be recommended by the local churches and shall be endorsed by their district association.

ARTICLE IV

FINANCE: Each district association shall be responsible for sending \$35.00 per church to the State Association for State and National Convention fee, of this \$35.00, \$25.00 shall go to the State Association and \$10.00 to the National Association.

ARTICLE V

DISCIPLINE: This State Association shall have the right to settle any question of discipline, doctrine or practices that may properly come before it from any of the bodies composing said organization; furthermore, if there be any question

of discipline, doctrine or practices on the part of an affiliated association, delegates of that association shall not be seated until these questions have been settled to the satisfaction of the General Board.

Section 2: Decisions of the General Board may be appealed in this manner. All appeals shall come before the State Association when sitting in a committee as a whole.

ARTICLE VI

OFFICERS: A. The officers of the State Association shall consist of a Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, and an Executive Secretary. Each of these shall be elected at the close of each regular session except the Executive Secretary.

B. (1) The Executive Secretary shall be elected for an indefinite term. It shall be the responsibility of the Executive Board to seek out a prospective candidate and make their recommendation to the body at the state association in its regular session, with privilege of nominations from the floor.

(2) In the event of a vacancy occurring during the course of the year, the Executive Board shall fill the vacancy until the annual setting of the association.

(3) Any time a majority of the Executive Board, or seven (7) members of the General Board requests a vote of confidence on the Executive Secretary, a vote shall be taken. If such action results in the termination of the Executive Secretary, he shall be given sixty (60) days severance pay.

In the event of immorality on the part of the Executive Secretary, or of him teaching or preaching doctrine contrary to the Free Will Baptist Treatise, he may be dismissed by a majority vote of the Executive Board with no severance pay.

ARTICLE VII

BOARDS: All standing boards shall be composed of seven (7) elected members who shall serve terms of 7, 6, 5, 4, 3, 2 and 1 years with such ex-officio members as may be provided for elsewhere, with no member serving more than two (2) consecutive terms of office or portion thereof, except: (1) the General Board which shall be composed of one (1) member from each affiliated association, the chairman of each standing board, and the current general officers of this association, and (2) the College Board of Trustees which shall be composed as provided for in the Articles of Incorporation of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc.

The standing boards of this association shall be: Executive Board; Board of Church Extension, Missions and Evangelism; Sunday School Board; Church Training Service Board; and College Board of Trustees.

No standing board shall meet in a functional meeting during the session of this association.

ARTICLE VIII

DUTIES, SCOPE OF ENDEAVOR AND QUALIFICATIONS OF STANDING BOARDS

Section 1. EXECUTIVE BOARD: The Executive Board shall be composed of seven (7) members who are members of an affiliated association and in good standing with the association of which they are members. They shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

It shall be the duty of this board to act in behalf of the association when it is not in session. It shall be bound to carry out the directions of the association and shall hold itself bound by every consideration of morality and honor to carry out the wishes of this association and to act under its instructions in whatever technical rights, civil laws and the decisions of courts may give it in certain emergencies. It shall be the duty of this board to sign their signatures to any and all papers concerning properties, indebtedness, bonds, or other legal documents

pertaining to the execution of the will of this association, exclusive of the College Board of Trustees.

This board shall have the oversight of the Executive Department of this association. The members shall assist and direct such work for the general promotion of this association as is deemed needful or necessary as the means available shall permit. The Executive Department shall serve as the coordinating agency of this association to correlate the work of all standing boards and agencies.

This board shall have the oversight of Free Will Baptist Book Store and shall endeavor to serve affiliated associations and churches and the community with literature and church supplies. Merchandising procedures shall be those accepted as normal retail procedures with the board being cognizant of the spiritual contribution of the store in distributing Christian literature.

All decisions of this board shall be governed by the general tenets of this association and shall not violate this constitution.

This board shall organize itself and elect such officers as necessary to the orderly conduct of its affairs and labors. This board shall keep an accurate record of all meetings, decisions, and work done and shall make a report in writing at each annual session of this association. All records shall be available to this association at its request.

Whereas this board represents the association when not in session, it and it alone shall have the power to call the association into special conference provided each affiliated association shall be given notice at least ten (10) days prior to the meeting of such special conference.

Section 2. GENERAL BOARD: This board shall be composed of one (1) member from each affiliated association, the chairman of each standing board, and the current general officers of this association. Each member must be a member of an affiliated association and in good standing with the association of which he is a member. The members shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

The duties of this board shall be to meet one (1) day preceding the annual session of this association. This board shall serve as the credential committee with the duties and responsibilities assigned by Article V of this constitution. This board shall hear reports of all standing boards. It shall serve as budget committee and shall make such recommendations as deemed pertinent to this association. A complete and accurate record shall be kept of meetings of this board and a report shall be made in writing to this association in its annual session.

The moderator of the association shall serve as chairman of this board, and the clerk of the association shall serve as its clerk.

Section 3. BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION, MISSIONS AND EVANGELISM: This board shall be composed of seven (7) members who are members of affiliated associations and in good standing with the associations of which they are members. They shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

It shall be the duty of this board to labor to further the Gospel of Jesus Christ into the uttermost parts of the earth. In accomplishing this, they are to endeavor to establish missions and churches in communities within the bounds of

this association with whatever moral and financial assistance that may be theirs. In cases of small churches failing to function, whatever assistance deemed appropriate shall be rendered to maintain the effective witness of that church by either direct labor with the church or with an associational board in instances where the affiliated association has a functional board or agency.

This board shall be empowered to receive and convey title to real property in the area of its labors.

The promotion of missionary endeavors from a local, state or national level shall come within the scope of endeavor of this board. This board shall assist in maintaining prayer and financial support of missionary enterprises through whatever channels available.

Whereas missionary and evangelistic labors are so intimately related, this board shall assist through participation or assistance in maintaining a strong evangelistic thrust in the life of affiliated association.

This board shall organize itself and elect such officers as necessary to the orderly conduct of its affairs and labors. This board shall keep an accurate record of all meetings, decisions, work done, funds received and disbursed and shall make a report in writing at each annual session of this association. All records shall be available to this association at its request.

Section 4. COLLEGE BOARD OF TRUSTEES: The College Board of Trustees shall be composed as provided for in the Articles of Incorporation of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc.

Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc. is an agency of the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists and is incorporated under the corporate laws of the State of Oklahoma. The articles of incorporation are a part of this association's record and delineate the purpose, duty and scope of endeavor of the members of this board.

Section 5. CHURCH TRAINING SERVICE BOARD: This board shall be composed of seven members who are members of affiliated associations and in good standing with the associations of which they are members. They shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

The duties of this board shall be to plan and assist in organizing and sustaining a strong Church Training Service in every church in each association affiliated with this association with every means of promotion and assistance available to them. This board shall plan, coordinate and conduct state-wide youth camps or camp.

This board shall organize itself and elect such officers as necessary to the orderly conduct of its affairs and labors. This board shall keep an accurate record of all meetings, decisions, work done, funds received and disbursed and shall make a report in writing at each annual session of this association. All records shall be available to this association at its request.

Section 6. SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD: This board shall be composed of seven (7) members who are members of affiliated associations and in good standing with the associations of which they are members. They shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

The duties of this board shall be to plan and promote Sunday schools in every church in each association affiliated with this association. This board shall use every available means to promote Sunday school clinics, seminars, institutes

and conventions on local, district and state-wide basis, working with local agencies to distribute and employ all effective methods and material available.

This board shall organize itself and elect such officers as necessary to the orderly conduct of its affairs and labors. This board shall keep an accurate record of all meetings, decisions, work done, funds received and disbursed and shall make a report in writing at each annual session of this association. All records shall be available to this association at its request.

Section 7. VACANCIES: Vacancies shall occur when a member moves from the territorial bounds of this association, by death, by resignation or by removal from office by this association. In the event of disciplinary action where charges concerning misconduct, doctrine or practice shall have been lodged against a member of any board, his office shall be held in abeyance until such charges shall be concluded or as determined by this association.

All boards shall have power to fill vacancies arising between sessions of this association. Such appointment shall terminate at the next session of the association and shall be filled by this association.

Section 8. EMPLOYEES: All employees of boards or agencies of this association shall be employed by agreement or contract with employing board or agency upon approval of this association except those elected by this association and the conditions of their employment shall be those approved by this association.

The duties of the Executive Secretary of this association shall be:

- (1) He is to represent, or cause to be represented, the association at all affairs of interest to the association.
- (2) He is to promote the work of the association in such a manner so as to unify the efforts of the association.
- (3) He is to serve with all standing boards and committees of the association in an ex-officio capacity.
- (4) He is to aid in planning the work of the association by relating the activities and plans of one board to another.
- (5) He is to report to the association during each annual session.
- (6) He is to communicate to the affiliated members of this association the pressing causes and events before the association. This can be in person or by means of a periodical bulletin or both.
- (7) He shall serve as treasurer of this association. An accurate and complete record of all funds received and disbursed shall be kept and a written report shall be included in his report to this association in its annual session.
- (8) The conditions of employment shall be determined by the Executive Board.

ARTICLE IX

DISSOLUTION: Should this association cease to function, all properties and holdings shall go to the National Association of Free Will Baptists after all creditors are satisfied and indebtedness cleared.

ARTICLE X

AMENDMENTS: This constitution may be amended or altered at any regular session of the association by a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of members

present and voting, provided proposed amendment or alteration be presented in writing to the body one (1) day in advance.

ARTICLE XI

SPECIAL SESSIONS: Elected delegates to the last session of this association shall be retained as standing delegates for special called sessions.
