PROCEEDINGS

The 78th annual session of the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists met October 14-16, 1986 at Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College and the First Free Will Baptist Church, Norman.

Jerry Pilgrim directed the congregation in singing choruses to open the evening service. The choruses included "I Am So Glad," "Oh, How I Love Jesus," "Jesus We Just Want to Thank You," and "Thank You, Lord."

Leonard Pirtle led in prayer after which the congregation sang "The Banner of the Cross."

The Southern Oaks and the Norman First Church choirs joined together and sang "I Must Tell Jesus," and "He's Ever Interceding."

The convention was called into session by the clerk, Waldo Young, who also introduced the officers. The other officers included Assistant Clerk Bob Thomas, Assistant Moderator Bob Thompson, Executive Secretary Connie Cariker, and Moderator Jerry Dudley.

The Moderator, Jerry Dudley, brought the Moderator's message based on "Thou Shalt Love Thy Neighbor as Thyself," Luke 10:25-27.

Don Guthrie brought greetings and a welcome from the Oklahoma City area churches.

P. A. Barton who presided over the service, asked the people present to greet each other and get acquainted.

Marguerite Kern, Dennis Kern, and Howard Gwartney, the Locust Grove Trio, sang "Who Can Do Anything," and "Canaanland is Just in Sight."

Charles Brazeal, pastor of the Zion Hill FWB Church, was introduced to bring the message. He read Ephesians 2:19-20, and brought the message on "Foundation for Growth," in keeping with the overall theme "Framed Together for Growth." P. A. Barton led in prayer at the close of the message.

The moderator announced the members of the committees which would serve during the session. Those appointed to the Resolutions Committee were David Sutton, Joe Blair, Johnny Bilby, Jim Haas, and Leroy Holman. The Public Morals Committee consisted of Dan Harper, Allen Moore, and Dean Stone. Mike Wade, George Harvey, and Marguerite Kern were appointed to serve on the Obituary Committee.

The service was dismissed.

WEDNESDAY MORNING

The meeting was called to order at 9:15 Wednesday morning. Vernon Whaley directed the congregation in singing "There's Power in the Blood," with Bob Thomas as pianist. The congregation also sang "Oh, How I Love Jesus."

L. C. Lynch was introduced to bring the devotion. He read I Corinthians 3:6-9 and brought devotional thoughts. Wade Jernigan led in prayer.

Item #1 of the General Board was read. A motion carried to receive the partial report of the General Board and seat the delegates.

Item #2 of the General Board report was read. A motion carried to receive Item #2.

Clarence Shepherd, Vice Chairman, gave the report of the Executive Board.

A motion carried to receive Item #3A of the General Board report.

A motion was made and seconded that the report of the Executive Board be received and that recommendations 1 and 2 be adopted.

A request was heard to vote on recommendation #1 separately. This item was adopted. The rest of the report was also adopted.

Connie Cariker gave the report of the Executive Secretary, including the financial report. A motion carried to adopt the report.

Melvin Worthington gave a report of the National Executive Office.

Manager Ray Martin gave the report of Free Will Baptist Book Store. A motion carried to receive the report. A motion carried to give Ray Martin a standing vote of thanks for his work.

Joe Blair gave the report of the Benevolence Committee. A motion carried to receive the report.

After announcements, the meeting was recessed.

WEDNESDAY MORNING WORSHIP

Vernon Whaley led the congregation in singing "Will Jesus Find Us Watching," and choruses "The Longer I Serve Him," "The Wonder of it All," and "Learning to Lean."

Charles Bigger presided over the service. He called on Harrold Harrison to lead in prayer. The congregation sang "Glory to His Name."

Ernest Harrison, Jr., pastor of the First FWB Church, Wewoka, was introduced to bring the message. Before the message a ladies quartet from Southern Oaks Church sang "Holy, Holy, Holy."

The speaker read Ephesians 2:12-21, and brought the message on "Framework for Growth."

After announcements, Roy Thomas led in prayer to dismiss the service.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON

The Moderator called the Wednesday afternoon session to order at 1:30 p.m. Vernon Whaley led the congregation in singing "Victory in Jesus." Tom Keylon read from Chapter 2 of the book of Acts, brought devotional thoughts and led in prayer.

The Ministers Quartet sang "Happy Day."

Items #3B and 3C of the General Board report were read. A motion carried to receive these items.

Kent Hubbard, Chairman, gave the report of the Christian Education Board. Plaques were presented to churches in recognition of attendance on Roll Call Sunday.

A motion carried to receive the report, consider the requests and table those recommendations requiring constitutional changes, with budget items deferred until the budget is presented.

Harrold Harrison gave a report of the National Sunday School and Church Training Board.

David Taylor was elected as the 7 year member of the Christian Education Board.

Chairman Ron Carner and Director Berton Perry gave the report of the State Missions Board. A motion carried to receive the report.

Roy Thomas, National Home Missions Director, gave a report of the work of that department.

Victor, a native of Ivory Coast and a leading pastor there, gave greetings to the body through interpreter Lonnie Palmer.

Lonnie Sparks, missionary to Spain, brought greetings.

Ernest Harrison, Jr. was elected to a 7 year term on the Missions Board. Since he was a member of the Christian Education Board and could not serve on two boards, Ernest Harrison, Jr. chose to remain on the Christian Education Board.

A motion carried to elect Wade Jernigan as the 7 year member of the State Missions Board.

A motion carried to recess.

After announcements and prayer requests, Tommy Roberts led in the closing prayer.

WEDNESDAY EVENING SERVICE

Frank Young presided over the Wednesday evening service. David Archer led the congregation in singing "I Have Decided to Follow Jesus."

New Life Singers from Hillsdale FWB College presented spécial music, a medley of songs.

Howard Ray Gwartney sang a medley of songs written by Free Will Baptists. David Sutton led in prayer.

David Archer led the congregation in singing "Brethren, we have Met To Worship."

An offering for Hillsdale FWB College was received in the amount of \$325.00. Allen Wood led in the offeratory prayer. Kenny Hancock sang "When I'm Above," and "Undying Love."

David Archer led the congregation in singing "Amazing Grace," and "God Is So Good." The Watchmen Quartet sang "I'm Free," and "Til the Storm Passes By."

Homer Young, pastor of the First FWB Church, McAlester, was introduced as the speaker. He read several verses from Ephesians, Acts 19:10, and brought the message on "The Fruits on Growth."

After announcements, Paul Kettelman led the closing prayer.

THURSDAY MORNING

The Thursday morning session was called to order at 9:15 a.m. Ed Pack led the congregation in singing " 'Tis So Sweet to Trust in Jesus," with Bob Thomas as pianist. The congregation also sang the chorus "We are One in the Bond of Love."

Otho Boyd brought devotional thoughts on "Fellowship" from the book of Acts. Ron Carner led in prayer.

Chairman Ray Gwartney gave the report of the Hillsdale Board of Trustees. He was assisted by President Edwin Wade. A motion carried to receive the report, excepting the budget items and the land lease proposal.

Board member Frank Giles gave the report on the proposal to lease Hillsdale land to the Moore Christian Academy for the purpose of building a Sports Complex.

Item 3D of the General Board report was read. Frank Giles introduced Dan Thompson, pastor of Immanuel Baptist Church, Moore, who spoke concerning the proposal.

A motion was made and seconded that the proposal be adopted leaving the contractual agreement to the Board of Trustees, and that minute details of the contract not be discussed in this body.

A motion carried to amend the motion stating that the body vote on whether or not to locate a sports complex on the land in consideration in the proposal. The previous question was moved and carried. The substitute motion was adopted.

A motion was made and seconded that we as Free Will Baptists raise the money and build the sports complex on Hillsdale Free Will Baptist campus as needed by Free Will Baptists.

The meeting was recessed for the morning worship service.

THURSDAY MORNING WORSHIP

Ed Pack led the congregation in singing "He Brought Me Out." Johnny Bilby presided over the service. He called on Frank Wiley to lead in prayer.

The Hillsdale College Choir sang "We'll work 'Til Jesus Comes," and "I Want to be More Like My Jesus Every Day."

Mike Wade, pastor of Calvary FWB Church, Norman, was introduced as the speaker. The quartet from Hillsdale College sang "Going Home." Mike Wade read Ephesians 2:19-22, and brought the message on "Fellowcitizens for Growth," or "You Are Not Alone."

Connie Cariker led in prayer to close the service.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON

Ed Pack led the congregation in singing "I Am Thine, Oh Lord," to open the afternoon session. Jerry Dudley read Ephesians 2:5-7, and brought devotional thoughts. The Watchmen sang "He Made A Way for Me," and "We Shall See Jesus." Bob Thompson led in prayer.

Discussion was resumed on the land lease proposal. After discussion the previous question was moved and carried.

A motion carried to reconsider the previous question. The motion to reconsider carried.

The maker of the motion clarified the motion by restating it.

The previous question was moved and carried. The motion that we as Free Will Baptists raise the money and build the sports complex on Hillsdale Free Will Baptist Campus as needed by Free Will Baptists, was defeated.

The motion to adopt the land lease proposal was adopted by a roll call vote.

A motion carried that we receive an offering for Victor for a motor bike, and bicycles for other native workers. An offering of \$253.51 was received. Don Guthrie led in prayer.

Paul Kettelman gave a report of Free Will Baptist Bible College.

A motion carried to elect a committee to continue the work of the Benevolent Committee. A motion carried to retain the present Benevolent Committee to serve another year.

Richard Terry was elected as the one year member of Hillsdale College Board of Trustees, replacing Guy Keys who resigned.

Ernest Harrison, Jr., and James Puckett were elected as five year members of Hillsdale College Board of Trustees.

The report of the Resolutions Committee was read. A motion carried to receive the report and adopt it item by item.

Resolution #1 was considered. A motion carried to postpone Item #1 until the budget is set.

A motion carried to adopt Resolution #2. Resolution #3 was also adopted.

The report of the Obituary Committee was read. A motion carried to adopt the report. A time of prayer was observed in memory of the deceased and in behalf of their families.

The report of the Public Morals Committee was read. A motion carried to adopt the report.

The final report of the General Board, serving as the budget committee, was read. A request was heard to consider Items #4 and 5 separately. Item #4 was adopted.

A motion was made and adopted to leave the Cooperative Plan percentages as they were in the 1985 minutes. These percentages are Executive Board 21%, Christian Education Board 6%, Missions Board 15%, Hillsdale FWB College 28%, and National Ministries 30%.

A motion was made and seconded that \$500.00 per month from the Book Store which has been given to the Co-operative Plan be given to the Christian Education Board. The motion was defeated.

Resolution #1 was brought back to the body. A substitute motion was made and seconded that the Christian Education Board operate with a nine member board.

An amendment was made and adopted that the Christian Education Board work with the present board members one more year and come

back with a recommendation pertaining to the number of members on the board and the number of years each man should serve.

A motion carried to lay on the table the constitutional changes recommended by the Christian Education Board, and that they be considered in the 1987 session.

A motion carried to elect General Board members for 1987 as they were recommended by the district associations and nominated by members of this body.

The report of the State Woman's Auxiliary was read by the clerk and received as information.

Jim Vallance gave a brief report of the Oklahoma Master's Men and a report of the National Master's Men Department.

Don Guthrie gave report of the Ministers Conference.

Jerry Dudley was elected as Moderator.

Bob Thompson was elected as Assistant Moderator.

Keith Burden was elected as the Clerk.

Bob Thomas was elected as the Assistant Clerk.

Don Guthrie was elected as six year member of the Christian Education Board replacing Keith Burden.

A motion carried to give a standing vote of thanks for Ray Gwartney and Delbert Akin for their service on the Hillsdale College Board of Trustees, and to Waldo Young for his service as clerk.

A motion carried to adjourn.

The 79th session of the Oklahoma State Association will be October 12-15, 1987, in Muskogee, Oklahoma.

THE GENERAL BOARD REPORT

The General Board of the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists met October 13, 1986 at the First Free Will Baptist Church, Norman, Oklahoma. As a result of this meeting we offer the following items for your consideration.

1. We received communication from twenty-three of the twenty-four district associations affiliated with the state association. No letter or delegate fees have yet been received from Green Country Association. We recommend that the letters be received and the delegates be seated.
2. We heard the reports of the Executive Board, the Executive Secretary, Free Will Baptist Book Store, the Benevolence Committee, the Christian Education Board, the State Mission Board, and Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College. We recommend that these reports be received as each one is given.
3. We recommend the adoption of the following recommendations coming from the boards.
 - A. From the Executive Board we recommend the adoption of recommendations #1 and #2.

- B. From the Christian Education Board we recommend the adoption of their request to employ on a part time basis a State Christian Education Secretary.
 - C. From the Christian Education Board we recommend the adoption of the proposed constitutional changes as proposed on page 17 and 18 of their report in the digest.
 - D. From the Hillsdale Board of Trustees report we recommend the adoption of the ground lease proposal with Moore Christian Academy.
4. We recommend that the 1988 session of the Oklahoma State Association be held in Tulsa.
 5. As the budget committee we recommend a Cooperative Budget of \$330,000.00 be adopted for the 1987-88 year. We further recommend that the cooperative funds be distributed according to the following percentages and that the budgets of the board be adjusted accordingly.

RESOLUTION COMMITTEE REPORT

1. Whereas, the C.T.S. Board and the Sunday School Board have been merged together to become the Christian Education Board;
And whereas, it is quite difficult and expensive for a board of fourteen members to meet together;
And whereas, we feel that a seven-member board could adequately serve the need
Therefore, be it resolved, that this body elect seven men from the existing board to serve and fulfill the duties of the board.
2. Whereas we do not at present have a State Retirement Plan for our preachers;
And whereas the state of Arkansas and the state of Missouri have a good retirement plan for their preachers;
Be it resolved, that we instruct our Executive Board, in cooperation with our State Executive Secretary to make a feasibility study of starting such a program and report back to this body at the State Association next year in Muskogee, Oklahoma.

3. Whereas, the Norman First Church, the Calvary Church, and Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College have been most gracious in inviting and entertaining this 78th Annual session of the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists;

Be it therefore resolved, that this body give a standing vote of appreciation for the kindness and hospitality shown to us all.

PUBLIC MORALS COMMITTEE

We recommend that each church carefully examine the views of each candidate on the local, state and national level regarding their stand on abortion, gay rights, E.R.A. and any other moral issue, and that these views be given serious and prayerful consideration as we vote in the coming elections.

We recommend that our pastors continue to alert their people of the deadly damnable teachings of secular humanism that is being taught so widely in our public educational systems.

We recommend that our pastors continue to warn our people about the evil of all types of gambling including the lottery proposal that will be facing us in the near future.

We recommend that the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists Reaffirm our position as being opposed to homosexuality, drug abuse, divorce, immorality, in both movies and television programming, and all other immoral issues.

We encourage our pastors to cooperate with the Sooner Alcoholics Narcotics Education, both financially and in their fight against drug abuse and other issues.

EXECUTIVE BOARD REPORT

The Executive Board met more times than usual this year because of the Executive Secretary change, January 1.

The yearly meeting for the purpose of setting the budget for the executive department met August 25. The cooperative giving for the year did not reach our budget.

A Tandy 2000 computer with a letter-quality printer was purchased to upgrade all of our State programs.

The board recommends a Coop budget of \$330,000 for 1987-88, and voted to make the following requests of the State Convention:

1. The board be allowed to work toward turning over the ministers insurance program to a private agency, with the board working with the agency to maintain the minister's status as a group and in behalf of the ministers.
2. Invite the National Association to Oklahoma in 1998.
3. 23% of the Coop receipts for 1987-88 be given to the Executive Office.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE SECRETARY

I have now been your Executive Secretary for nine months. These months have been very rewarding as I have had the privilege of seeing many of you at your District Meetings and in your churches. Pastors have been so kind to invite me to share our work and preach to their people. Lonnie DaVoult has been very helpful in making the transition and the Executive Board has been nice and thoughtful to assist me in whatever way they could to make my work go smoothly. My secretary, Jan Caison, is doing well in her duties at the office. I am thankful for her ministry here.

Our cooperative giving through the State Office was \$308,122 compared to \$302,638 last year. Our budget was \$315,000 last year, and is \$325,000 this year. We must have more of our churches giving to the Coop plan if we are to reach our budget.

The designated giving was \$531,453 compared to \$515,278 last year. I believe it will increase this year because of all the mission activities in our state.

The oil royalties decreased \$89,819 compared to last year. The royalties are now coming in at a rate of between \$300 and \$400 per month. The price is low and the oil well is drying up.

As we go through these slow economic days in Oklahoma, we must keep in mind that we are in the Lord's work and that He has never short-changed any of us. I believe God has great things for us in the future as we rethink our priorities and get back to the basics. *We can reach people for Christ, our churches can grow, our giving will increase.* The Lord will bless and I want to be in on it.

JUNE 30, 1986 AND 1985

(1) SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNT POLICIES

General—The State Association of Free Will Baptists is a non-profit organization designed to provide central leadership and representation for the Free Will Baptists of Oklahoma and to handle certain receipts and disbursements of the Free Will Baptist Churches. The Association uses the fund method of accounting, whereby the fund balance represents the equity the Association has in its assets. This accounting method is generally accepted among non-profit organizations as the most feasible way of reflecting their financial activity and position.

Property and Equipment—Property and equipment are recorded at cost. Depreciation is computed based on the estimated useful lives of the related assets. Expenditures for repairs and maintenance are charged to operations when incurred while major betterments and renewals are capitalized.

(2) MORTGAGE RECEIVABLE

The executive residence was sold on May 30, 1974 for \$20,500. The buyer assumed the mortgage on the property and gave the Association a second mortgage in the amount of \$10,300. Payments began on July 1, 1974. The rate of interest is 8% and the mortgage is for thirty years.

(3) COOPERATIVE CONTRIBUTIONS AND EXPENDITURES

During the fiscal year ended June 30, 1986, oil revenues received from the Ringling property totaled \$246,376. The oil revenues were designated to be disbursed as follows:

a) Prior to January 1, 1986 the oil revenue from the Ringling Property was to be divided with 10% of all funds received going into the Cooperative program and the remainder to be divided 90% to Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College and 10% to the State Mission Board as follows:

b) Effective January 1, 1986, the first \$150,000 of the oil money received was to be placed in a benevolent fund and a committee was elected to dispose of these funds. As of June 30, 1986, oil royalties totaling \$81,708 had been placed in the benevolent fund and \$78,903 had been disbursed at the designation of the committee. The balance of \$2,805 is reflected as a liability. (See Benevolent Fund Payable)

As of June 30, 1986 the number of barrels being produced from the Ringling property had declined from over 8,000 barrels per month to 800 barrels and the price as of June 30, 1986 was \$11.64 as compared to over \$30.00 in previous years.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
JUNE 30, 1986

(1) SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

General—The financial statements of the Bookstore have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting, wherein income and expense are recorded as they are earned or incurred.

Inventories—Inventories are recorded using the first-in, first-out method of accounting and are further reduced to the lower of cost or market.

Property and Equipment—Property and equipment are recorded at cost. Depreciation is computed based on the estimated useful lives of the related assets. Expenditures for repairs and maintenance are charged to operations when incurred while major betterments and renewals are capitalized.

Income Taxes—No provision for income taxes has been made due to the fact that the Bookstore is a non-profit organization exempt from income tax under Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

(2) RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

The Bookstore has an agreement with the State Association of

Free Will Baptists, whereby the Bookstore makes periodic payments of \$500 to the Association. During the current fiscal year, the Bookstore incurred \$6,000 of payments whereas payments during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1985 totaled \$3,000.

BENEVOLENCE COMMITTEE REPORT

The Benevolence Committee has met five (5) times during the year to accomplish the task assigned by the Association. To determine the amount of claims, and to whom, the Committee has reviewed the records of Christian Organizations Medical Society, (as provided by the Texas State Insurance Commission Receivership) with the additional information provided by the Receivership and the amounts developed by this committee by writing to all known members of the Insurance Group. From these records received to date we have determined a total amount owed to the members of our insurance group to be \$140,114.27. Of this amount, a total of \$89,042.38 has been paid to assist our insured in the payment of these medical liabilities. This leaves a total of \$51,071.89 to be paid as funds are available. There is a possibility of other claims being received after this report. If there are indeed further claims, they will be handled in the same manner as all of the claims received to date.

The Benevolent Committee wants to emphasize that the Oklahoma State Association through its Benevolent Committee has in no manner, at any time, assumed the responsibility of payment of medical bills for any person. We are only benevolent in purpose to assist members of our group medical insurance plan in payment of their unpaid claims caused by default of the insurance carrier.

STATE CHRISTIAN EDUCATION BOARD REPORT

I am glad to report a smooth and successful first year for our new State Christian Education Board. The entire board met three times at the State Office Building in OKC, and the committees of our board met numerous times at various locations.

The Competition Committee of our board was responsible for the state-level CTS Competitive Activities and Music and Arts Festival held in May at Hillsdale College. 29 of our state's first place finishers placed first at the National Youth Conference. A record number of entrants and spectators participated. We thank Hillsdale College for their graciousness. However it seems that we have simply outgrown our college's facilities. Hesitantly, we are investigating the use of other, larger facilities. If a change in locations and/or dates is necessary, we

will contact district associations well in advance so that they can plan accordingly. This committee has obtained information for Roll Call Sunday 1986, and at the close of this presentation we will be recognizing those churches who registered the largest percentage of increase in the various size categories. Our video tape lending library, which contains a number of helpful materials available to our churches on a free will offering basis, has also become the responsibility of this committee. Committee chairman Mike Wade can provide you with a list of materials and the check-out policy.

Our Conference Committee planned the 1986 State Christian Education Convention held on September 5th and 6th at the West Tulsa Church. Doubled attendance and the high praise received over the new, improved convention format is encouraging. Influence your local church workers to attend this annual fall training opportunity. This committee also sponsored 3 local and area training workshops at Healdton, Stratford, and Duncan. Committee chairman Keith Burden would be glad to help you arrange a customized, localized workshop for your church or association.

Ministering to the young people of our churches, a perennial priority of our board, was the responsibility of our board's Youth Committee. The 1985 State Youth Conference was held in November at the Ada First Church. A record crowd of approximately 400 teens and teen workers were present. The 1986 State Youth Conference will be held on Saturday, November 8th at the accomodating Ada facilities. Encourage your teens and workers to help us again "break the record." They are sure to enjoy the fellowship and day-full of edifying activities. Attendance was up, over 15%, for our three summer youth camps. The 1987 Senior High Camp has been scheduled for June 8th-12th, the Junior High Camp for June 29th-July 3rd and the Junior Camp for July 6th-10th, all at the First Mission Association's Campgrounds near Drumright, Oklahoma. The committee also co-sponsored a well-received Puppet Ministry Training Festival in March of 1986 at the Ada First Church.

The length of this report alone is testimony to how fast and far our board has grown. We take this as an indication that we are meeting a real need of our state's churches. We want to enlarge and improve our ministry and keep up with the need. However, man-hours have become a problem. Our 14 board members have worked hard. Several board members have given sacrificially of their time. We have gone as far as we can go on strictly volunteer labor. We feel that if we are to continue to keep up with the need that the employment of a worker, at least on a part-time basis, is necessary. Therefore we recommend that the state grant us permission to employ a State Christian Education Secretary.

The duties of the State Christian Secretary would be to work under the State Christian Education Board in:

- 1-coordinating board sponsored activities.

- 2-promoting the work of the State Christian Education Board on a

statewide basis.

3-aiding in the planning and implementation of new areas of ministry.

4-serving as treasurer of the Board.

The conditions of employment and termination would be determined by the State Christian Education Board.

That brings us to our second recommendation. If we are to hire now, even on a part-time basis, additional funding would be necessary. We do not deem it wise to depend on honorariums or designated gifts to finance this office. Unlike all other state boards, we do not have a promotional officer traveling the state raising funds. Therefore we are dependent on the cooperative program. We feel it would be a wise investment to allocate 8% of cooperative monies to our board. We request such. Without this additional funding, it would not be feasible to hire a Christian Education Secretary at the present time.

Included in our report are 2 budgets. The first is based on 8% of cooperative funds and the employment of a part-time Christian Education Secretary. The alternate budget is based on 6% of cooperative monies and does not provide for the employment of a part-time worker. Also note our financial report for last year and proposed appropriate constitutional changes.

In keeping both the letter and the spirit of the action adopted by the Oklahoma State Association in its seventy-seventh annual session in Tulsa, Oklahoma, October, 1985, wherein the Church Training Service Board and the Sunday School Board were combined into one Board and named "Christian Education Board," and directed that these two boards be combined immediately;

THEREFORE, the Christian Education Board recommends that this be accomplished by amending the Constitution of the Oklahoma State Association as follows:

ARTICLE VII, Boards: (Paragraph #2)

Substitute—"Christian Education Board" in the place of "Sunday School Board; Church Training Service Board."

ARTICLE VIII, delete Section 5 and Section 6 and insert the following as Section 5. "This board shall be composed of seven (7) members who are members of affiliated associations and in good standing with the association of which they are members. They shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

The duties of this board shall be those assigned it by the Oklahoma State Association to provide Christian Education opportunities to the general membership of this Association. To accomplish these, this board shall plan, coordinate and conduct such state-wide activities as youth conferences, camps, retreats, competitive activities, etc. and shall assist district and/ or local youth ministries as are appropriate; and, conferences, conventions, workshops, campaigns and/or other activities deemed expedient in providing educational opportunities for the general membership of this association.

This board shall organize itself and elect such officers as necessary to

the orderly conduct of its affairs and labors. This board shall keep an accurate record of all meetings, decisions, work done, funds received and disbursed and shall make a report in writing at each annual session of this association. All records shall be available to this association at its request.

Section 7 shall become section 6 and section 8 shall become section 7."

STATE MISSION BOARD REPORT FOR 1986-87

The Lord told a very interesting story in Luke 10. He told of a man traveling down from Jerusalem to Jericho. He fell among thieves who wounded him, stripped him of his raiment, and left him half dead. It is easy to see that the poor Samaritan of the story is typical of a world that has been wounded, cheated and violated by sin and Satan.

It wasn't long until a priest and Levite passed the wounded man—looked at his sad condition—and passed by "on the other side." But a certain Samaritan came along, and when he saw him, he had compassion on him, went to him, bound up his wounds, and brought him to an inn, and took care of him.

The "other side" of Jericho Road was the *easiest* side. The priest and Levite saved themselves a lot of time and bother by passing the wounded man. The "other side" was the most *pleasant* side. The priest and Levite did not have to attend to the unpleasant matter of dressing wounds and witnessing suffering. The "other side" was the least *expensive* side. Over the past year we have worked hard to start new churches in some vital areas and maintain our missionaries who are already on station. We have used wisely the money you have entrusted to us. Over the past year we have had Lawton to go self-supporting. Both Glenpool and Bartlesville will be in the next few months. We have been considering several other areas where we can begin some new Free Will Baptist mission churches. Hopefully, we will be able to make some announcements regarding this during our state meeting. However, making plans and seeing them through are two different things. It takes money and lots of it. We need the help of every church in Oklahoma to make the Church Establishment Program work as it should. We beg each pastor to not travel on the "other side of the road" in this vital matter. Put C.E.P. in your budget so the board can effectively make plans and see them through to completion. Your "bandages" and "oil" are greatly needed.

Of course we are involved in other things besides building churches. Our missions director is more than glad to assist you in scheduling mission services since he keeps an up-to-date list of missionaries who are available for services both foreign and home. He will also help you with missionary conferences if you desire.

The Church Establishment Program has done well for the short time it has been in existence. We have several nice churches we would not have had if we had not forsaken the philosophy of the priest and Levite. We do thank God for the help of our people in Oklahoma who were just waiting for some Samaritan to come along so they could supply the "bandages," the "oil," and "expense" necessary to help.

Last but not least—please pray for our missionaries, missions director, and the board. They have a tremendous responsibility.

We request 15% of the Co-op receipts for the coming year.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
JUNE 30, 1986 AND 1985

(1) SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

General—The significant accounting policies followed by the Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College are described below to enhance the usefulness of the financial statements to the reader.

Accrual Basis—The financial statements of the Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting except for depreciation. Depreciation is not taken on depreciable assets comprising the physical plant in conformity with the reporting objectives of accounting for resources received and used rather than the determination of net income. The statement of current funds revenues, expenditures and transfers is a statement of financial activities of current funds related to the current reporting period. It does not purport to present the results of operations or the net income or loss for the period as would a statement of income or a statement of revenues and expenses.

Fund Accounting—In order to ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of the resources available to the College, the accounts of the College are maintained in accordance with the principles of "fund accounting." This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds that are in accordance with activities or objectives specified. Separate accounts are maintained for each fund; however, in the accompanying financial statements, funds that have similar characteristics have been combined into fund groups. Accordingly, all financial transactions have been recorded and reported by fund group.

(2) INVESTMENTS

Investments exclusive of physical plant are recorded at cost; investments received by gift are carried at market value at the date of acquisition. As of June 30, 1986 and 1985, investments of the restricted and unrestricted funds were composed of the following:

(3) LOAN FUND

The loan fund reflects activity with respect to the National Direct Student Loan Program which is funded primarily by the Department of Education. The College provides matching funds equal to one-ninth of the Federal funds received. This program, along with the College Work-Study, Pell Grant and Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant program disbursements are reflected in the supplemental schedules and letter following these footnotes.

(4) ENDOWMENT FUND

During the fiscal year ended June 30, 1983 the governing board of the College determined that certain funds were to be retained and invested as an endowment. The board stipulated that the principal is to remain invested and the interest income is to be placed in the current unrestricted fund. On September 16, 1983, an investment in a limited partnership was made in the amount of \$87,000. Gifts to the Endowment Fund totaled \$21,320 and \$21,923 for fiscal years ending June 30, 1986 and 1985, respectively.

(5) INVESTMENT IN PLANT

The College records fixed asset acquisitions in the plant fund using historical cost. The construction of a library classroom building was completed at June 30, 1985 with a total cost of \$655,444. Building fund pledges and designated oil royalties totaled \$358,052 for the year. During the current fiscal year building fund pledges and designated oil royalties totaled \$117,767 in the plant fund and were expended as follows:

HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE PROPOSAL FOR GROUND LEASE WITH MOORE CHRISTIAN ACADEMY

The following is an outline of the proposed terms of a ground lease between Hillsdale and Moore Christian Academy.

1. *Improvements:* Improvements are to be constructed per written plans and specifications approved in advance by the Board of Trustees. Phase I of the improvements will be done for a cost of \$50,000. Phase II of the improvements will be optional, and, if built, will be done for a cost of \$100,000. Moore Christian Academy will be responsible for obtaining all governmental approvals and will administer the construction process per the Board of Trustees' directions, including payment of all construction costs out of an escrow account, if necessary. Phase I improvements will be required to be completed prior to the commencement of the lease term, and the school will have the right to relocate all improvements at any time at the Board of Trustees' discretion.

2. *Term:* The term of the agreement is proposed to be for ten years, provided that if Phase II improvements are not completed prior to the end of year three, the term will be for five years only. The College will have the option to "buy out" Moore Christian Academy after the seventh year by paying amounts as follows:

A precondition to the exercise of the "buy out" option will be two years advance notice prior to the "buy out" date.

3. *Maintenance & Utilities:* All maintenance and upkeep will be the responsibility of Moore Christian Academy. They will have the affirmative obligation to maintain all facilities in a condition suitable for sporting events. All utility bills will be placed in Moore Christian Academy's name and they will be fully responsible for payment of all bills, including deposits. Moore Christian Academy will maintain a liability insurance policy in the amount of \$2,000,000, or such other amounts that the Board of Trustees may require, and Moore Christian Academy will give the College an indemnity agreement in the event that insurance proceeds are sufficient to compensate the school for any losses.

4. *Scheduling:* Moore Christian Academy will have full rights to schedule both baseball and football facilities for a period of seven years, subject to the College's baseball schedule. During years seven through ten of the term, (if applicable), Moore Christian Academy will have full scheduling rights on the football facility, while the College will have the option of taking full scheduling rights on the baseball facility. After the expiration of the full ten year term, (if applicable), Moore Christian Academy will be given scheduling rights (subject to negotiation with the College).

5. *Concessions*: Moore Christian Academy will have the right to all revenues from the concessions for the first seven years of the term, and will be required to report to the College regarding all revenues derived therefrom. During the last three years of the term, and thereafter, the College will have the right to operate all concessions for both football and baseball facilities.

6. *Rules and Regulations*: Moore Christian Academy and all institutions utilizing the sports facilities will be required to pledge in writing prior to each sporting event to comply with all rules and regulations promulgated by the College regarding conduct and use of the facilities. Such rules and regulations shall be subject to amendment by the College from time to time and any sporting event (and the entire lease, if necessary) will be cancellable for failure to comply with all rules and regulations after due notice.

If approved, the foregoing proposal will be presented to the Moore Christian Academy for final consideration. The Board of Trustees would appreciate approval of this proposal "in concept," allowing flexibility to negotiate changes where necessary.

THE FREE WILL BAPTIST MASTER'S MEN

State of Oklahoma

CONSTITUTION

PREAMBLE

The purpose of the Free Will Baptist Master's Men, state of Oklahoma is to provide a means of Christian fellowship and to deepen the spiritual lives of the laymen of the local church. Also, to provide a means of developing the abilities and talents of the laymen, and to promote the cause of Christ through a complete, "total church program," as prescribed by Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists.

ARTICLE I

NAME

The name of this organization shall be known as the Free Will Baptist Master's Men, State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE II

MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. The membership of this organization shall be composed of the district associations of Master's Men, and any local chapters where there is only one chapter in the district, within the state of Oklahoma.

Section 2. Every member in good standing of an affiliated district association of Master's Men, or any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district, is entitled to the full benefits of membership.

Section 3. Each district association, or any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district, shall submit an annual, written report to this body, (as a matter of information).

ARTICLE III

OFFICERS

The officers of this organization shall consist of a president, vice-president and a secretary-treasurer.

The officers of this organization shall be elected annually and may succeed themselves, at this level.

ARTICLE IV

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The executive committee shall consist of the elected officers of this organization and they shall serve as the program committee for each annual convention.

Section 2. Ex-officio members of the executive committee shall be the presidents of the district associations of Master's Men, presidents of any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district, and the state executive secretary of the State Association of Free Will Baptists.

ARTICLE V MEETINGS

This organization shall meet annually at 7:30 P.M. on the Monday night before the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists convenes.

ARTICLE VI AMENDMENTS

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of any regular meeting.

BY-LAWS

VOTING RIGHTS

Section 1. Every member of each affiliated district association, or any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district, is eligible to vote on all questions and matters that might come before the Free Will Baptist Master's Men, State of Oklahoma.

COMMITTEES

Section 2. The executive committee shall transact all routine business and shall act for the organization in the interim between meetings.

Section 3. The executive committee shall meet at the call of the president.

Section 4. A nominating committee, for the annual election of officers, shall be composed of the presidents of each district association, and the president of any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district.

Section 5. The president shall appoint all other committees, subject to the approval of the body.

FINANCE

Section 6. This organization shall be financed on the basis of offerings, dues and assessments.

QUORUM

Section 7. One-tenth of the members of this organization shall constitute a quorum at any regular meeting.

AMENDMENTS

Section 8. These by-laws may be amended at any regular meeting by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

As adopted by the Free Will Baptist Master's Men, State of Oklahoma annual session, in Muskogee, Oklahoma October 19, 1970.

CONSTITUTION OF MINISTER'S CONFERENCE

ARTICLE 1

The Minister's Conference shall be called the Oklahoma State Free Will Baptist Minister's Conference, and shall be composed of Ordained Free Will Baptist Ministers who are regular members of some Orthodox Free Will Baptist church in the State of Oklahoma who have paid their \$1.00 dues.

ARTICLE 2

The officers for this conference shall be President, Vice-President, and Clerk Treasurer, who shall be elected annually.

ARTICLE 3

This conference shall have the power to discipline its members.

ARTICLE 4

Members of this organization shall be all ordained ministers who participate in the benefits and activities of this body, and associate members who become members by payment of the \$1.00 annual dues.

ARTICLE 5

This conference shall meet Semi-Annually.

ARTICLE 6

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any regular session.

BY-LAWS OF MINISTER'S CONFERENCE

ARTICLE 1

The clerk or assistant clerk, or in their absence the senior minister in years shall call the ministers into conference. If a quorum is present the President or in his absence the Vice-President shall moderate the meeting. If neither of these are present, the senior minister in years shall be in charge.

ARTICLE 2

It shall be the duty of the clerk to enroll the ministers of the conference. Ministers shall present themselves with proper evidence of their rights to seats therein, and those enrolled by the clerk shall compose the conference. In case of questionable representation the case under question shall be referred to the Credential Committee.

ARTICLE 3

It shall be the duty of each minister belonging to this conference, to be active in pastoral or evangelistic services (disabled or retired ministers excepted). Any minister belonging to this conference shall report in each session in person or by letter, and failing to do so for two successive sessions shall be subject to discipline.

ARTICLE 4

Each conference shall be opened by reading a portion of God's word and prayer, and each session shall be closed with prayer.

ARTICLE 5

By a two-thirds vote of the members present ruling of the President may be overruled.

ARTICLE 6

This conference shall sit with open doors, except when it shall go into a committee as a whole.

ARTICLE 7

No member shall absent himself from the conference during its meeting without permission from the President.

ARTICLE 8

No person shall be allowed to nominate more than one member of a committee, unless person nominated is not elected.

ARTICLE 9

The President shall not allow discussion when not carried on in a Christian Spirit, or when he thinks it will cause discord.

ARTICLE 10

Anyone desiring to speak shall rise and address the President by the appellation "Brother President," but shall not speak further until recognized.

ARTICLE 11

No member of this conference shall be allowed to speak more than five minutes, nor twice on the same subject without permission from the President.

ARTICLE 12

* These By-Laws may be altered or amended at any regular or adjourned session of this conference by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE, INC. BY-LAWS BOARD OF TRUSTEES

SECTION I

The Board of Trustees of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc., an Oklahoma corporation, shall be composed of fifteen members, elected as provided in the Articles of Incorporation of said College, as amended:

ARTICLE A—OFFICERS: The officers of the Board of Trustees shall be a Chairman, an Assistant Chairman, and a Secretary, each of whom shall be elected by the Board for a term of one year. They shall continue in office until their successors have been chosen:

Item 1—CHAIRMAN: The chairman of the Board of Trustees or his assistant shall preside at all meetings of the Board. He shall be an ex-officio member of the Executive Committee.

Item 2—SECRETARY: The Secretary shall record and preserve minutes of all meetings and acts of the Board of Trustees and countersign all deeds, conveyances, and other papers authorized by the Board. He shall have authority to call special meetings of the Trustees of the College upon the written request of two-thirds of the members of the Board; he shall mail notice of said meeting to the trustees ten (10) days in advance.

Item 3—EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE: The Executive Committee shall consist of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, the Vice-Chairman of the Board, the Secretary of the Board. The Executive Committee shall have authority to consider and act upon all questions affecting the College which may be brought before it between the stated meetings of the Board, or a quorum of the Board fails to attend a called or regular meeting. It shall transact such business as may be committee to it by the Board and shall act for the College on such matters as it may submit to it. The Committee shall meet at the call of the Chairman or the President of the College.

ARTICLE B—MEETINGS: The Board of Trustees shall meet each year at a time and place agreed upon by the Board. It shall, also, hold special meetings whenever called in accordance with the By-Laws of the Board. Such special meetings may be called by either the chairman of the Board, or the President of the College.

ARTICLE C—QUORUM: A majority of the members or the Board of Trustees of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc. in attendance at any called or regular meeting, written notice of which has been mailed by the Secretary to each trustee, shall constitute a quorum. No proxy votes shall be permitted. No ex-officio member shall be entitled to vote at meetings of the Board of Trustees.

ARTICLE D—ELECTIONS: In all elections held by the Board of Trustees each member present except ex-officio members shall be entitled to one vote, and the result shall be determined by a majority of the votes cast. Due notice of any election must be personal notice to the members or a day on the minutes of the Board not less than one week preceding the election.

SECTION II

OFFICERS OF HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE

The officers of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College shall be a President who is elected by the Board of Trustees for an indefinite term. Other officers shall be a Vice President of Academic Affairs, Vice President of Student Affairs, and a Vice President of Business Affairs, each of whom shall be appointed by the President with the approval of the Board of Trustees.

ITEM ONE—PRESIDENT: The President shall be executive officer of the Board of Trustees and shall have general control of the College including its officers, teachers, students, and business. He shall render to the Board complete annual reports and to its chairman, Executive Committee or other committees such information as may be deemed essential to a thorough knowledge of the operation of the College and its promotion. He shall be a member of the Board of Trustees ex-officio and the Executive Committee ex-officio and shall have the rights and privileges of a member of the Board except voting. The President shall execute all documents, instruments, and conveyances on behalf of the college. Duties of the president and working relationship shall be further detailed in a format approved by the Board of Trustees.

ITEM TWO—VICE PRESIDENT OF ACADEMIC AFFAIRS: The Vice President of Academic affairs of the College shall, under the President, fix the hours of recitation, govern, control, and regulate the conduct of the students, have general oversight of curriculum, student's records, and such other internal details and administrative duties as may be delegated to him by the President of the College.

The Vice President of Academic Affairs shall act as President in the absence of the President.

ITEM THREE—VICE PRESIDENT OF STUDENT AFFAIRS: The Vice President of student affairs shall be responsible for directing the religious activities of the College, serve as counselor to the students, and such other duties as may be delegated to him by the President of the College.

ITEM FOUR—VICE PRESIDENT OF BUSINESS AFFAIRS: The Treasurer shall keep an accurate record of all accounts of the College and shall receive and expend as directed by the Board of Trustees and President, all money for the expenses of the institution. He shall make an annual report to the Board and furnish the Executive Committee with such information pertaining to his office as may be requested. He shall provide bond in whatever amount the Board may require. Until such times as the Board of Trustees may deem different the Treasurer's office shall be contained within the Vice President of Business Affairs office. The Vice President of Business Affairs may at the direction of the administration designate this duty to a subordinate officer. The Vice President of Business Affairs shall have general supervision of the financial business of the College, and shall, at the direction of the President, be responsible for the upkeep of all the physical facilities and premises of the College. His detailed duties are directed in a format approved by the Board of Trustees.

SECTION III FACULTY

The faculty shall consist of the President, the Vice President of Student Affairs, and all teachers of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College. Instructors and assistant teachers shall have the privilege of sitting with the faculty in stated meetings but shall not have the right of voting.

It shall be the policy of the College to employ on its faculty those who are members of Free Will Baptist churches that are affiliated with the National Association. Emergencies, however arising from the resignation, illness, death, or approved leaves of absence of faculty members may be relieved by the temporary employment of instructors who are affiliated with any evangelical denomination. Part-time or short-term instructors, deemed essential to the successful prosecution of a consistent education program, may be employed at the discretion of the President without respect of denominational affiliation.

The faculty, under the authority and jurisdiction of the President, shall have general charge of instruction, attendance of students, examinations, administration of curriculum, discipline, and all matters involving the spiritual, physical, and social welfare of the College. The faculty shall be hired upon recommendation of the President.

In the selection of the faculty qualitative factors shall be kept in mind. All faculty members shall be urged to pursue graduate programs in their respective fields. Except in special cases no faculty member will be required to teach courses outside of his field.

SECTION IV ACADEMIC COUNCIL

The Academic Council shall consist of the President, the Vice President of Student Affairs and the heads of the departments of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist

College: It shall determine the curriculum and academic policy of the College, prescribe requirements for admissions, certificates, diplomas, and degrees, and supervise the courses of instruction offered by the various departments of the College.

SECTION V CONTRACTS

The Board of Trustees shall establish the College policy involving the execution of contracts, deeds of conveyance, the determination of salaries, and employment of all officers, representatives, faculty members and essential domestic and maintenance employees. The President of the College shall negotiate agreements, executive contracts, employ representatives, and supply vacancies incurred by the termination of contracts, resignations, or death of any essential employees. All contracts for building construction shall be let only to persons or corporations posting a valid performance bond and recording the same in the Office of the County Clerk of Cleveland County, Oklahoma.

SECTION VI ADVISORY COUNCIL

An advisory council shall be formed which is to be composed of interested, qualified persons in the various fields which will be of value in building and maintaining a strong academic program to carry out the educational program stated in the charter.

SECTION VII AMENDMENT

These By-Laws may be amended by a favorable vote of two-thirds of the qualified members of the Board of Trustees of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College at any meeting of the Board, provided that the proposed amendment has been submitted in writing to each Trustee one month in advance. This change to be subject to the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists.

SECTION VIII ADMINISTRATIVE FUNCTIONS

The President of the Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College shall be elected by the Board of Trustees, and he shall act for and on behalf of the Board in the conduct and management of the institution. He shall also be a member of the Board of Trustees ex-officio and of the Executive committee, ex-officio, and his duties, powers and term of office shall be prescribed in the by-laws of the College and a format approved by the Board of Trustees.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF THE HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE, INC.

Know all men by these presents, that, we whose names are hereunto subscribed, do hereby associate ourselves together for the purpose of forming a cor-

poration under the provisions of the corporation laws of the State of Oklahoma, and for that purpose state:

ARTICLE ONE

The name of this corporation shall be HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE, INC.

ARTICLE TWO

The purpose of this corporation shall be the creation, establishment and maintenance of a college and institution of higher learning devoted to the promotion and impartation of higher learning, Christian education and such other education, instruction, learning, training and research as may be deemed essential for the cause of Christ and to that end prescribe courses of study and grant degrees. The doctrinal and theological position of this institution shall be that of the sponsoring denomination, Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists and the treatise of the National Association of Free Will Baptist as endorsed by the state body, and in connection therewith, in accordance with the stipulation of the Constitution and By-laws of the State Association of Free Will Baptists, Inc.

(a.) To prescribe courses of study for both resident and correspondence students, which shall include general education in the arts, Christian Ministries of Service and Biblical studies for wisdom; said courses to be taught in both a Junior College Division and a Bible College Division, and to award degrees, either graduate or post-graduate, to those persons satisfactorily completing the prescribed courses of study and to grant such other literary honors, including honorary degrees, as shall be deemed advisable.

(b.) To charge and collect tuition as determined by the Board of Trustees and to create scholarships.

(c.) To employ professors, instructors and other subordinate employees as may be necessary for the proper conduct of the college under the direction and control of the President of the College, with the advice and consent of the majority of the Board of Trustees.

(d.) To institute and carry on missions and commissions for missionary purposes and investigations.

(e.) To publish and distribute such pamphlets, literature or books as may be required in the conduct of such work and the general promotion of the College.

(f.) To sue and be sued in its corporate name and to enter into contracts of every type and nature.

(g.) To solicit support, receive, collect, hold and receive by gift or bequest personal property in any amount, money or other thing of value; to purchase real estate, to receive real estate that may be given, or devised to the college for achieving the legitimate ends of the college and to sell or mortgage the same as the need arises.

(h.) To borrow money in payment of property for erecting buildings and making improvements and for any other purpose germane to the objectives and purposes of the college.

(i.) To issue notes, bonds, debentures and other evidences of indebtedness and execute mortgages, liens and other incumbrances upon the property of the

corporation, real or otherwise, to secure the payment of any such evidences of indebtedness.

(j.) To transact any and all business connected with said College as may be necessary to achieve the purposes of said College.

(k.) To obtain under Internal Revenue Laws of the United States and of the Revenue Laws of the State of Oklahoma exemption from income property and other forms of taxation.

ARTICLE THREE

The location of this corporation shall be in Moore, Oklahoma.

ARTICLE FOUR

The duration of this corporation shall be perpetual.

ARTICLE FIVE

The general control of this corporation shall be vested in a Board of Trustees consisting of 16 members, 10 of which shall be elected by the delegates to the annual Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists—each of which shall serve for a term of 5 years, and until his successor is elected and qualified. Two members shall be elected at each annual sitting of the State Association for the expiring five year term and vacancies that occur on the board. One member each shall be elected by the delegates to the annual meeting of the State Association of Free Will Baptists of the states of Arkansas, Colorado, Kansas, Missouri, New Mexico, and Texas, each of which serve for a term designated by the states they represent.

ARTICLE SIX

An executive committee consisting of the Chairman, Vice Chairman, and Secretary of the Board of Trustees shall possess all powers of the Board of Trustees between the stated meetings of the Board of Trustees.

ARTICLE SEVEN

All contracts for building construction shall be let only to persons or corporations posting a valid performance bond and recording the same in the office of the County Clerk of Cleveland County, Oklahoma.

SECTION IX AMENDMENTS

This charter may be hereafter amended subject to the provisions contained herein and the laws of the State of Oklahoma. It is provided, however, that the Trustees of the College shall not propose or apply for any amendment which has not been previously authorized by an act of the Oklahoma State Association.

OKLAHOMA STATE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY CONVENTION CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I

NAME

This organization shall be known as the Oklahoma State Woman's Auxiliary Convention.

ARTICLE II

PURPOSE

The purpose of this convention shall be to bring the women of each district convention together for fellowship, sharing information, and encouraging one another in the work of the Lord.

ARTICLE III

OFFICERS

The Officers of this convention shall be a president, vice president, secretary, assistant secretary, treasurer, and field worker. These shall serve on the state executive committee together with three members elected by the convention as desired. These shall serve for a period of 2 years.

ARTICLE IV

MEMBERSHIP

This convention shall be composed of the officers of the convention together with each active auxiliary member of the district or local (duly accredited by the credentials committee).

ARTICLE V

MEETINGS

The annual meeting shall be held each year on the day preceding the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists and at the place designated by said Association.

ARTICLE VI

AMENDMENTS

This constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the convention by a two-thirds vote of members present.

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1, President. The president shall preside over all meetings, appoint such committees as may be needed, call the executive committee together when necessary, be ex-officio member of all committees, and serve as chairman of the executive committee, see that reports are made promptly to the national secretary and perform all duties usually pertaining to such an office.

Section 2, Vice President. The vice president shall preside in the absence of the president or by her request and otherwise assist her in the overseeing of the work in general.

Section 3, Secretary. The secretary shall keep an accurate record of all proceedings of the convention and executive meetings, preserve all valuable papers and turn same over to her successor in office, and make an annual report to the national secretary on a form available from the NWAC office. She shall compile the districts slates of officers and addresses immediately after the convention. She shall also send a slate of state officers and addresses to the national executive secretary. She is chairman of the Credentials Committee.

The secretary shall also serve as historian keeping an historical record and submitting historical information to the national executive secretary annually.

Section 4, Assistant Secretary. The assistant Secretary shall assist the secretary in recording proceedings of convention and executive committee meetings and shall aid the secretary in all her work as needed.

Section 5, Treasurer. The treasurer shall have charge of all funds belonging to this convention and shall pay out same only when authorized by the convention. The treasurer shall keep an accurate account and shall give a written report of all funds received and disbursed at each annual meeting of the convention. She shall also send an annual report to the WNAC office (executive secretary-treasurer) at least ten days before the end of the fiscal year. She shall encourage support of missions through the WNAC Gift Plan, individual giving and special offerings.

Section 6, Field Worker. The field worker shall have charge of all field work pertaining to, or necessary to, the promotion of the work of the convention and keep the national program before the district officers.

ARTICLE II

ELECTIONS

The general officers shall be nominated by a nominating committee and shall be elected by acclamation, unless there are other nominations. In case of more than one nominee for any particular office, a vote will be taken on each. All elections shall be held at the closing business session of the convention.

ARTICLE III

EXPENSES

Section 1. An appropriation of 18 cents per mile toward the expense of the general officers, when called upon to attend the executive committee meeting to plan program, secretary's expenses, phone calls, postage and stationery for officers will be paid by the convention. All field promotional work is subject to the state executive committee, who should approve all work done by state officers in the interest of state work, as well as expenses of the same.

Section 2. An amount of \$100.00 shall be paid on the expense of the state president to attend WNAC. If the president is unable to go to WNAC that we give the \$100.00 for this purpose to whomever goes in her place providing she is a state officer.

Section 3. The auditing committee shall be paid mileage the same as the executive committee.

ARTICLE IV

COMMITTEES

Section 1. Executive Committee—The executive committee shall be composed of the five officers and three members elected by the convention. Five of these shall compose a quorum. They shall hold meetings for the transaction of business as often as necessary. It shall be the duty of the executive committee to maintain an overseeing of the work at large. They shall act for the convention when necessary. They shall meet with district presidents the night preceding the state auxiliary convention. They will send out a newsletter with expenses paid by the State Treasury.

Section 2. Resolutions Committee—A resolutions committee of five members shall be appointed by the president as needed.

Section 3. Nominating Committee—The nominating committee shall be composed of at least one member from each district convention. Nominations shall be submitted by district with their annual report. These elected by the body at the annual meeting.

Section 4. Credentials Committee—The secretary shall be chairman of the credentials committee, and other members may be appointed by the president. The treasurer shall be a standing member of this committee.

Section 5. Finance Committee—The finance committee shall be appointed by the president. This committee audits the financial records of the year and reports on same to the convention.

Section 6. Registration committee shall be provided by the district convention which is host to state convention.

ARTICLE V

FEES AND REPORTS

Active members shall pay dues of \$1.50 per year. With 25 cents remaining in the district, \$1.25 to be forwarded to state where 25 cents shall be retained, and \$1.00 forwarded to WNAC as required for membership fees. It shall be the duty of each body directly affiliated with the State Auxiliary Convention to send a report to every annual session.

ARTICLE VI

AMENDMENTS

These by-laws may be amended by a two-thirds vote of members present at regular meeting of the state auxiliary convention.

ARTICLE VII

GIFTS

The desired plans for giving in the Woman's Auxiliary are those adopted by WNAC as follows:

1. Mission offerings following each special season of prayer
2. Co-Laborer offering (monthly or quarterly designated to WNAC General Fund)
3. WNAC Emphasis Month in August or other time more convenient to help in support of WNAC General Fund

4. Memorial Student Loan Fund (special program and offering in September to assist worthy and needy students at FWBBC in Nashville)
5. Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College Student Loan Fund. (Special program and offering in September to assist worthy and needy students at Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College)
6. Tithes—Pay tithes on all undesignated money received
7. All offerings are to be forwarded through regular channels.

ARTICLE VIII

WNAC DELEGATE

Each district convention shall submit one nomination for a State delegate to WNAC with their annual report. This nomination (along with others as needed to make up 15 delegates to WNAC) shall be elected by the body at the annual meeting. It shall be the duty of delegates elected to notify president if they cannot attend WNAC. President shall appoint delegates as needed in absence of regular elected delegates.

ARTICLES OF FAITH OF STATE ASSOCIATION

1. **THE BIBLE**—The Scriptures of the Old and New Testament were given by the inspiration of God, and are our infallible rules of faith and practice.

2. **GOD**—There is one living and true God, revealed in nature as the Creator, Preserver and Righteous Governor of the Universe, and in the Scriptures as the Father, Son and Holy Ghost, yet as one God, infinitely wise and good, whom all intelligent creatures are supremely to love, adore and obey.

3. **CHRIST**—Christ is God manifest in the flesh: in His divine nature truly God, in His human nature truly man. The mediator between God and man, once crucified. He is now risen and glorified as our ever-present Saviour and Lord.

4. **THE HOLY SPIRIT**—The Scriptures assigns to the Holy Spirit all the attributes of God. He is the Reprover, Comforter, Guide and Sanctifier of all men.

5. **THE GOVERNMENT OF GOD**—God exercises a wise and benevolent providence over all beings and all things by maintaining the constitution and laws of nature. He also performs special acts of Grace, not otherwise provided for as highest welfare of man requires.

6. **THE SINFULNESS OF MAN**—Man was created innocent, but by disobedience fell into a state of sin and condemnation. His posterity, therefore inherited a fallen nature of such tendencies that all who come to years of accountability, sin and become guilty before God.

7. **THE WORK OF CHRIST**—The Son of God, by His incarnation, life, suffering, death, and resurrection effected for all a redemption from sin that is full and free and is the ground of salvation by faith.

8. **THE WORK OF SALVATION**—The conditions of salvation are:

1. Repentance or sincere sorrow for sin and the hearty renunciations of it.
2. Faith or the unreserved committal of one's self to Christ as Saviour and Lord, with purpose to love and obey Him in all things. In the exercise of saving faith the soul is renewed by the Holy Spirit; freed from the dominion of sin and becomes a child of God.
3. Continuance in faith and obedience until death.

9. **ELECTION**—God determined from the beginning to save all who should comply with the conditions of salvation. Hence by faith in Christ, men become His elect.

10. **FREEDOM OF WILL**—The Human will is free and self controlled, having power to yield to the influence of the truth and the Spirit and live, or to resist them and perish.

11. **SALVATION FREE**—God desires the salvation of all, the Gospel invites all, the Holy Spirit strives with all, and whosoever will may come and take the water of life freely.

12. **PERSEVERENCE**—All believers in Christ, who through grace persevere in holiness to the end of life, have the promise of eternal salvation.

13. **BACKSLIDING AND APOSTASY**—A person who has been regenerated or born again and is living in unconfessed, unforgiven sin, is rebellious to the principles of the Kingdom of God and His righteousness, and therefore is a backslider in a lost condition who must repent and be restored to the right relationship with God or be eternally lost.

We recognize, according to Hebrews 6:4-6, that it is possible for a person to get in the condition that he could never return to Christ. This, we believe, is Apostasy; However, we also recognize that a regenerate person can fall into sin, be in a lost condition and still not be an Apostate. This person, through repentance, can be reconciled to God.

14. **GOSPEL ORDINANCES**—Baptism, or the immersion of believers in water, and the Lord's Supper, are ordinances to be perpetuated under the Gospel; Feet Washing, an ordinance teaching humility, of universal obligation, and to be administered to all true believers.

15. **TITHING**—God commanded tithes and offerings in the Old Testament; Jesus Christ endorsed in the Gospel (Matt. 23:23), and the Apostle Paul said, "Upon the first day of the week let every one of you lay by him in store as God hath prospered him." 1 Cor. 16:2.

16. **THE CHRISTIAN SABBATH**—The divine law requires that one day in seven be set apart from the secular employment and amusements for rest, worship, holy works and activities, and for personal communion with God.

17. **RESURRECTION, JUDGMENT, AND FINAL RETRIBUTION**—The Scriptures teach the resurrection of all men at the last day. They that have done good will come forth to the resurrection of life, and they that have done evil unto the resurrection of damnation: then the wicked shall "Go away into eternal punishment but the righteous into eternal life."

RULES OF ORDER

1. At every sitting of the Association, business shall be opened and concluded by prayer by the Moderator or whomever he may request.

2. Ministers and deacons present are invited to seats, allowed to take part in debates on all subjects, and to vote.
3. Those who speak shall rise and address the Moderator. Personal reflections shall be avoided in all debates.
4. No motion may be discussed until made and seconded.
5. When a motion has been made and seconded, and a member opposes its discussion, the Moderator shall put the question, "Shall it be discussed?" If negative, the question shall not be discussed.
6. If any proposition or motion under debate contains two or more points, it shall be divided at the request of any member, and the vote taken separately.
7. Motions made and lost shall not be recorded.
8. No one shall speak more than twice on the same subject without special leave of the Moderator.
9. All questions shall be decided by a majority vote of all Members present.

BY-LAWS OF STATE ASSOCIATION

1. The Clerk or assistant clerk, or in their absence, the senior minister in years shall call the Association into conference, and if a quorum is present the moderator, or in his absence, the assistant moderator shall take charge; and if neither of them is present the senior minister in years shall act as Moderator.
2. It shall be the duty of the clerk to enroll the delegates to the Association, who shall present themselves with proper evidence of their rights to seats therein, and those enrolled by the clerk shall compose the Association.
3. It shall be the duty of every District belonging to this Association to send a letter to every annual session of this Association reporting in the same spiritual condition, benevolent work, and its statistics. Any District belonging to this Association, which shall fail to report itself for two successive sessions, may be dismissed from the Association by a two thirds vote of all members present.
4. Each meeting shall be opened by reading a portion of the Bible and with prayer, and shall be closed with prayer.
5. By a two-thirds vote of members present, a ruling of the moderator can be overruled.
6. This Association may correspond by messenger or otherwise with other religious bodies.
7. This Association shall sit with open doors except when it shall go into a committee of the whole.
8. Any person not a member of this Association may be allowed to take part in its discussions by obtaining permission from the moderator.
9. It shall be the duty of all the Association to be present at the time appointed for each meeting, and anyone wishing to retire shall first obtain leave of the moderator.
10. No person shall be allowed to nominate more than one member of any committee, provided the person nominated be elected.
11. The moderator shall not allow discussions when not carried on in a Christian spirit or when he thinks it will cause discord or division.

12. Anyone desiring to speak shall rise to his feet and address the moderator by the appellation "Brother Moderator," but shall not speak further until recognized by the moderator.

13. No member of this association shall be allowed to speak more than ten minutes nor twice on the same subject without permission from the moderator.

14. This association shall meet annually beginning on Tuesday following the second Sunday in October.

15. These By-Laws may be altered or amended at any regular or adjourned session of this Association by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

CONSTITUTION OF STATE ASSOCIATION

PREAMBLE: From long experience, we the members of the Free Will Baptist denomination, being regularly baptized upon a profession of our faith in Jesus Christ, and realizing the necessity of a bond in union and fellowship among us as a church; and to preserve and maintain correspondence and coordination with us, do therefore ordain this Constitution for our better denomination government.

ARTICLE I

NAME: This organization shall be known as the OKLAHOMA STATE ASSOCIATION OF FREE WILL BAPTISTS.

ARTICLE II

PURPOSE: The object and purpose of this organization shall be to unify the work of the various bodies composing this State Association, and to devise and execute measures for the extension of the Kingdom of God in connection with the various bodies in the Association, or that may hereafter be represented therein.

ARTICLE III

REPRESENTATION: Section 1. This Association shall be composed of all ordained ministers and deacons with membership in some local church which is a member of a district Association with membership in the State Association.

Section 2: Each District Association shall be entitled to a number of elected delegates equal with the number of churches composing said Association. These delegates may be recommended by the local churches and shall be endorsed by their district association.

ARTICLE IV

FINANCE: Each district association shall be responsible for sending \$35.00 per church to the State Association for State and National Convention fee, of this \$35.00, \$25.00 shall go to the State Association and \$10.00 to the National Association.

ARTICLE V

DISCIPLINE: This State Association shall have the right to settle any question of discipline, doctrine or practices that may properly come before it from any of the bodies composing said organization; furthermore, if there be any question

of discipline, doctrine or practices on the part of an affiliated association, delegates of that association shall not be seated until these questions have been settled to the satisfaction of the General Board.

Section 2: Decisions of the General Board may be appealed in this manner. All appeals shall come before the State Association when sitting in a committee as a whole.

ARTICLE VI

OFFICERS: A. The officers of the State Association shall consist of a Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, and an Executive Secretary. Each of these shall be elected at the close of each regular session except the Executive Secretary.

B. (1) The Executive Secretary shall be elected for an indefinite term. It shall be the responsibility of the Executive Board to seek out a prospective candidate and make their recommendation to the body at the state association in its regular session, with privilege of nominations from the floor.

(2) In the event of a vacancy occurring during the course of the year, the Executive Board shall fill the vacancy until the annual setting of the association.

(3) Any time a majority of the Executive Board, or seven (7) members of the General Board requests a vote of confidence on the Executive Secretary, a vote shall be taken. If such action results in the termination of the Executive Secretary, he shall be given sixty (60) days severance pay.

In the event of immorality on the part of the Executive Secretary, or of him teaching or preaching doctrine contrary to the Free Will Baptist Treatise, he may be dismissed by a majority vote of the Executive Board with no severance pay.

ARTICLE VII

BOARDS: All standing boards shall be composed of seven (7) elected members who shall serve terms of 7, 6, 5, 4, 3, 2 and 1 years with such ex-officio members as may be provided for elsewhere, with no member serving more than two (2) consecutive terms of office or portion thereof, except: (1) the General Board which shall be composed of one (1) member from each affiliated association, the chairman of each standing board, and the current general officers of this association, and (2) the College Board of Trustees which shall be composed as provided for in the Articles of Incorporation of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc.

The standing boards of this association shall be: Executive Board; Board of Church Extension, Missions and Evangelism; Sunday School Board; Church Training Service Board; and College Board of Trustees.

No standing board shall meet in a functional meeting during the session of this association.

ARTICLE VIII

DUTIES, SCOPE OF ENDEAVOR AND QUALIFICATIONS OF STANDING BOARDS

Section 1. **EXECUTIVE BOARD:** The Executive Board shall be composed of seven (7) members who are members of an affiliated association and in good standing with the association of which they are members. They shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

It shall be the duty of this board to act in behalf of the association when it is not in session. It shall be bound to carry out the directions of the association and shall hold itself bound by every consideration of morality and honor to carry out the wishes of this association and to act under its instructions in whatever technical rights, civil laws and the decisions of courts may give it in certain emergencies. It shall be the duty of this board to sign their signatures to any and all papers concerning properties, indebtedness, bonds, or other legal documents

pertaining to the execution of the will of this association, exclusive of the College Board of Trustees.

This board shall have the oversight of the Executive Department of this association. The members shall assist and direct such work for the general promotion of this association as is deemed needful or necessary as the means available shall permit. The Executive Department shall serve as the coordinating agency of this association to correlate the work of all standing boards and agencies.

This board shall have the oversight of Free Will Baptist Book Store and shall endeavor to serve affiliated associations and churches and the community with literature and church supplies. Merchandising procedures shall be those accepted as normal retail procedures with the board being cognizant of the spiritual contribution of the store in distributing Christian literature.

All decisions of this board shall be governed by the general tenets of this association and shall not violate this constitution.

This board shall organize itself and elect such officers as necessary to the orderly conduct of its affairs and labors. This board shall keep an accurate record of all meetings, decisions, and work done and shall make a report in writing at each annual session of this association. All records shall be available to this association at its request.

Whereas this board represents the association when not in session, it and it alone shall have the power to call the association into special conference provided each affiliated association shall be given notice at least ten (10) days prior to the meeting of such special conference.

Section 2. GENERAL BOARD: This board shall be composed of one (1) member from each affiliated association, the chairman of each standing board, and the current general officers of this association. Each member must be a member of an affiliated association and in good standing with the association of which he is a member. The members shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

The duties of this board shall be to meet one (1) day preceding the annual session of this association. This board shall serve as the credential committee with the duties and responsibilities assigned by Article V of this constitution. This board shall hear reports of all standing boards. It shall serve as budget committee and shall make such recommendations as deemed pertinent to this association. A complete and accurate record shall be kept of meetings of this board and a report shall be made in writing to this association in its annual session.

The moderator of the association shall serve as chairman of this board, and the clerk of the association shall serve as its clerk.

Section 3. BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION, MISSIONS AND EVANGELISM: This board shall be composed of seven (7) members who are members of affiliated associations and in good standing with the associations of which they are members. They shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

It shall be the duty of this board to labor to further the Gospel of Jesus Christ into the uttermost parts of the earth. In accomplishing this, they are to endeavor to establish missions and churches in communities within the bounds of

this association with whatever moral and financial assistance that may be theirs. In cases of small churches failing to function, whatever assistance deemed appropriate shall be rendered to maintain the effective witness of that church by either direct labor with the church or with an associational board in instances where the affiliated association has a functional board or agency.

This board shall be empowered to receive and convey title to real property in the area of its labors.

The promotion of missionary endeavors from a local, state or national level shall come within the scope of endeavor of this board. This board shall assist in maintaining prayer and financial support of missionary enterprises through whatever channels available.

Whereas missionary and evangelistic labors are so intimately related, this board shall assist through participation or assistance in maintaining a strong evangelistic thrust in the life of affiliated association.

This board shall organize itself and elect such officers as necessary to the orderly conduct of its affairs and labors. This board shall keep an accurate record of all meetings, decisions, work done, funds received and disbursed and shall make a report in writing at each annual session of this association. All records shall be available to this association at its request.

Section 4. COLLEGE BOARD OF TRUSTEES: The College Board of Trustees shall be composed as provided for in the Articles of Incorporation of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc.

Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc. is an agency of the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists and is incorporated under the corporate laws of the State of Oklahoma. The articles of incorporation are a part of this association's record and delineate the purpose, duty and scope of endeavor of the members of this board.

Section 5. CHURCH TRAINING SERVICE BOARD: This board shall be composed of seven members who are members of affiliated associations and in good standing with the associations of which they are members. They shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

The duties of this board shall be to plan and assist in organizing and sustaining a strong Church Training Service in every church in each association affiliated with this association with every means of promotion and assistance available to them. This board shall plan, coordinate and conduct state-wide youth camps or camp.

This board shall organize itself and elect such officers as necessary to the orderly conduct of its affairs and labors. This board shall keep an accurate record of all meetings, decisions, work done, funds received and disbursed and shall make a report in writing at each annual session of this association. All records shall be available to this association at its request.

Section 6. SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD: This board shall be composed of seven (7) members who are members of affiliated associations and in good standing with the associations of which they are members. They shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

The duties of this board shall be to plan and promote Sunday schools in every church in each association affiliated with this association. This board shall use every available means to promote Sunday school clinics, seminars, institutes

and conventions on local, district and state-wide basis, working with local agencies to distribute and employ all effective methods and material available.

This board shall organize itself and elect such officers as necessary to the orderly conduct of its affairs and labors. This board shall keep an accurate record of all meetings, decisions, work done, funds received and disbursed and shall make a report in writing at each annual session of this association. All records shall be available to this association at its request.

Section 7. VACANCIES: Vacancies shall occur when a member moves from the territorial bounds of this association, by death, by resignation or by removal from office by this association. In the event of disciplinary action where charges concerning misconduct, doctrine or practice shall have been lodged against a member of any board, his office shall be held in abeyance until such charges shall be concluded or as determined by this association.

All boards shall have power to fill vacancies arising between sessions of this association. Such appointment shall terminate at the next session of the association and shall be filled by this association.

Section 8. EMPLOYEES: All employees of boards or agencies of this association shall be employed by agreement or contract with employing board or agency upon approval of this association except those elected by this association and the conditions of their employment shall be those approved by this association.

The duties of the Executive Secretary of this association shall be:

- (1) He is to represent, or cause to be represented, the association at all affairs of interest to the association.
- (2) He is to promote the work of the association in such a manner so as to unify the efforts of the association.
- (3) He is to serve with all standing boards and committees of the association in an ex-officio capacity.
- (4) He is to aid in planning the work of the association by relating the activities and plans of one board to another.
- (5) He is to report to the association during each annual session.
- (6) He is to communicate to the affiliated members of this association the pressing causes and events before the association. This can be in person or by means of a periodical bulletin or both.
- (7) He shall serve as treasurer of this association. An accurate and complete record of all funds received and disbursed shall be kept and a written report shall be included in his report to this association in its annual session.
- (8) The conditions of employment shall be determined by the Executive Board.

ARTICLE IX

DISSOLUTION: Should this association cease to function, all properties and holdings shall go to the National Association of Free Will Baptists after all creditors are satisfied and indebtedness cleared.

ARTICLE X

AMENDMENTS: This constitution may be amended or altered at any regular session of the association by a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of members

present and voting, provided proposed amendment or alteration be presented in writing to the body one (1) day in advance.

ARTICLE XI

SPECIAL SESSIONS: Elected delegates to the last session of this association shall be retained as standing delegates for special called sessions.
