The Eightieth annual session of the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists met October 17-20, 1988 at the Cherokee Strip Conference Center in Enid, Oklahoma.

A vocal ensemble from the First Free Will Baptist Church in Ada,

Oklahoma began the pre-service by singing a number of musical selections.

Dennis Cariker and Marvin Harris were elected. Terry Van Winkle was nominated to fill the unexpired four year term of Phillip Bender. Terry Van Winkle was elected.

David McDougal gave the Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College Board of Trustees report. Edwin Wade gave the President's report. Richard Terry represented the Public Relations Department. Motion carried to adopt the College Trustees report. Frank Wiley was presented a plaque by the College in appreciation for his years of service on the Board of Trustees.

Motion carried to adopt item #5 of the General Board report.

Motion carried to adopt item #6 of the General Board report.

Motion carried to adopt item #7 of the General Board report.

The clerk read the nominations for membership on the 1989 General Board. Following various additions and corrections a motion carried to elect these men to the General Board for 1989.

Waymon Ray gave the report of the Oklahoma State Master's Men organization.

James Vallance gave the report of the National Master's Men Department.

Leroy Holman gave the report of the Oklahoma Minister's Conference.

The clerk read the final report of the Nominating Committee. Bob Ketchum was nominated to serve as Moderator. He was elected.

Bob Thompson was nominated to serve as Assistant Moderator. He was elected.

Keith Burden was nominated to serve as Clerk. He was elected. Bob Thomas was nominated to serve as Assistant Clerk. He was elected.

Motion carried to adjourn and enter into the morning worship service.

THURSDAY MORNING WORSHIP

Bob Thomas led the congregation in singing "My Saviour's Love." Lonnie DaVoult led in the opening prayer.

Sandy Shepherd brought greetings and introduced the speaker for the morning worship service.

The Oklahoma Minister's Quartet sang "The Prodigal Son," and "The Sun's Coming Up."

Richard Terry read Luke 23:27-38 for his text and spoke on the subject, "They Met At the Cross."

Following the service, Moderator Bob Ketchum shared some announcements and the service was dismissed by the congregation singing "Amazing Grace."

THE GENERAL BOARD REPORT

The General Board of the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists met October 17, 1988 at the Free Will Baptist Church in Enid, Oklahoma. As a result of that meeting, we offer the following items for your consideration.

- We received communication from twenty-three of the twenty-four District Associations comprising the membership of this body. We recommend their letters be received and their delegates seated.
- We heard the reports of the Executive Board, the Executive Secretary, Free Will Baptist Book Store, the Benevolent Committee, the State Mission Board, Christian Education Board, the Board of Trustees of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, and the Oklahoma Historical Commission.

We forward the reports of these departments and recommend their adoption.

- We recommend that the 1990 State Convention be held in Ada, Oklahoma.
- 4. We recommend that the Benevolent Committee be dissolved and any future revenues be distributed by the Executive Office.
- 5. We recommend that the Oklahoma Historical Commission's request for \$500.00 from the Executive Office to fund its work for another year be approved.
- 6. As the budget committee we recommend a Cooperative Budget of \$310,000.00 be adopted for the 1989-90 year.

We further recommend that the cooperative funds be distributed according to the following percentages and that the budgets of the boards be set accordingly.

RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE REPORT

RESOLUTION #1

Whereas, there are two (2) members of the Christian Education Board with terms which will expire this year, and

Whereas, there is one four (4) year board member who is moving out of state and his position will become vacant, therefore, be it Resolved, that the constitution be amended by deleting the first paragraph of Section 5 under Article VIII and inserting the following statement:

"The Board of Christian Education shall consist of seven (7) elected members who are members of an affiliated association and in good standing with the association of which they are members. They shall be elected at the discretion of this association."

And that Article VII be amended by deleting the words "except: (1) the Board of Christian Education which shall consist of 10 members who shall serve five years with two members elected annually," and re-aligning the following exceptions in their proper numerical order.

RESOLUTION #1 WAS POSTPONED INDEFINITELY

RESOLUTION #2

Whereas, in recent years concern has been expressed by missionaries, Foreign and Home Missions Departments, and pastors over the difficulty of raising funds for missionaries, and

Whereas, in many cases travel expenses equal or exceed the amount raised by the missionary due to the difficulty in scheduling week-night services and missionaries are often required to overlap their travel schedule due to lack of coordination, and

Whereas, we must find a solution to this problem, and after discussing this with both denominational mission departments, the State Mission Board, and many Oklahoma pastors, therefore, be it

Resolved, that the Oklahoma State Association recommend:

- 1. Annual state-wide missions revivals be conducted by the churches throughout Oklahoma during the months of November and April.
- 2. Region 1 consist of First Oklahoma, Union, Dibble, Hopewell #2, Canadian, Arbuckle, Center, Progressive, and First Mission Associations (125 churches) and that they meet in November each year.
- 3. Region 2 consist of Arkansas Valley, Eureka, Fellowship, Gaines Creek, Greater Tulsa, Green Country, Kiamichi, Little River, New Life, Northeast, Poteau River Valley, Roberts McGee, Southeastern, South Grand River, and Hopewell #1 Associations (135 churches) and that they meet in April each year.
- 4. Every Association be written and urged to adopt and participate in this effort.

RESOLUTION #3

Whereas, the Arkansas State Association of Free Will Baptists has formulated a Burial Agreement Plan called the "Sharing Together" Group, and

Whereas, it is believed that such a program would be beneficial to ministers in Oklahoma, therefore, be it

Resolved, that the Oklahoma State Executive Department formulate a Burial Agreement Program and bring back a recommendation with specific details to the 1989 State Association.

RESOLUTION #4

Whereas, we have enjoyed beautiful facilities, and

Whereas, the Enid Free Will Baptist Church opened their building and their hearts to welcome us, and

Whereas, their members have worked hard in registration, handing out materials, etc., therefore, be it

Resolved that we say "thank you" to the Enid Free Will Baptist Church with a rising vote of appreciation.

PUBLIC MORALS COMMITTEE REPORT

According to I Thessalonians 5:22 we are told to "abstain from all appearance of evil." We as Free Will Baptists believed this so intently that our Church Covenant reads, "We promise by His Grace to love and obey Him in all things, to avoid all appearance of evil, to abstain from all sinful amusements and unholy conformity to the world..." This committee, in light of today's clouded morals, strongly urge rededication to this lifestyle.

- 1. We strongly oppose the sanction or use of television networks such as HBO, Showtime, TMC, Cinemax, etc. . . . who produce and televise evil and sinful amusements.
- 2. We, heartbroken and disgusted, openly oppose the release and viewing of the motion picture, "The Last Temptation."
- 3. We very earnestly exhort our people to continue to do, all that we do, in conduct, in conviction, and in commitment to the glory of God.

MINISTER'S CONFERENCE REPORT

Registration totaled 127 (113 ministers and 14 visitors). Received \$174.00 in dues, and \$178.71 in offering (\$352.71).

Preachers for the conference: Lonny Burks, Trymon Messer and David Bigger.

Special music was provided by the Minister's Quartet.

Special recognition was given to Jeff Sloan, the winner of the first "Jerry Dudley Preaching Award" presented by Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College.

BUSINESS:

- 1. Motion carried to accept the written minutes and treasurer's report.
- 2. Motion carried that the Minister's Conference meet annually during the State Association (see minutes of 1987, page 45, article 5, which *shall* read—"This conference shall meet annually."
- 3. Motion carried that the dollar amount that is shown in the Minister's Conference Constitution be deleted (see 1987 minutes, page 45, articles 1 and 4, which shall now read: Article 1— "The Minister's Conference shall be called the Oklahoma State Free Will Baptist Minister's Conference, and shall be composed of ordained Free Will Baptist Ministers who are regular members of some orthodox Free Will Baptist church in the State of Oklahoma who have paid their annual dues." Article 4— "Members of this organization shall be all ordained ministers who participate in the

benefits and activities of this body, and associate members who become members by payment of the annual dues."

- 4. Motion carried to increase dues effective in October 1989 to \$5.00 per minister.
- 5. Motion carried to receive an offering to be applied to the honorariums for this conference (\$178.71).
- 6. Officers for 1988-89 elected:
 President—Leroy Holman
 Vice President—Steve Turner
 Secretary/Treasurer—David Taylor
- 7. Request was made to send out notices of dues to all ministers.

STATE MASTER'S MEN REPORT

During the past year we have driven several hundred miles promoting Master's Men. Our results are minimal . . . two promise to join and several have said perhaps.

We have 19 chapters and approximately 250 churches. In 1956 when the Master's Men was started, many chapters organized, but many have discontinued. Why? No workers, not interested, pastors are not supportive.

Regardless of the reason, we challenge each layman and pastor without a Master's Men group to please convert over to Master's Men and let's work as a unit and see what we can accomplish for God.

I can change Oklahoma. I can change Master's Men. Bring a can full of change to next year's meeting, and put the National Master's Men fund into the *BLACK* and also take care of all local needs.

Home Missions Land Fund: loan \$5,000.00 to the land fund, then receive 12.5% to 15% write-off for income tax purposes. We need 20 people willing to loan \$5,000.00 each to purchase land to be used as collateral for borrowing money for building churches. Then all the Master's Men under Brother Howard Gwartney to build the church. Then pay off the building and start over again.

Parable of the fig tree. Luke 13:6-9. As Free Will Baptist laymen, are we producing fruit? Have we been cut down? Do we need special care? What is our problem?

Let's become lifetime members. Let's organize new chapters. Let's fill our money cans. Let's complete our land fund. Let's build mission churches.

Let us put our shoulder to the plow and work for God as we never have before. Time is running out to get people saved. Invite us to your quarterly meeting. I HAVE TIME AND WILL TRAVEL. Please call me.

We are publishing a quarterly news update and mailing it to all pastors in Oklahoma. It contains news of Oklahoma and National Master's Men. Please send news items about the projects of your men's groups.

STATE ASSOCIATION OF FREE WILL BAPTISTS NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS JUNE 30, 1988 AND 1987

(1) SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

General—The State Association of Free Will Baptists is a nonprofit organization designed to provide central leadership and representation for the Free Will Baptists of Oklahoma and to handle certain receipts and disbursements of the Free Will Baptist Churches. The Association uses the fund method of accounting, whereby the fund balance represents the equity the Association has in its assets. This accounting method is generally accepted among non-profit organizations as the most feasible way of reflecting their financial activity and position.

Property and Equipment—Property and equipment are recorded at cost. Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method based on the estimated useful lives of the related assets. Expenditures for repairs and maintenance are charged to operations when incurred while major betterments and renewals are capitalized.

(2) MORTGAGE RECEIVABLE

The executive residence was sold on May 30, 1974 for \$20,500. The buyer assumed the mortgage on the property and gave the Association a second mortgage in the amount of \$10,300. Payments began on July 1, 1974. The rate of interest is 8% and the mortgage is for thirty years.

(3) COOPERATIVE CONTRIBUTIONS AND EXPENDITURES

The State Association receives contributions to be cooperatively allocated among board approved organizations. The percentage allocation of Cooperative Contributions for the year ended June 30, 1988 and 1987 was as follows:

FREE WILL BAPTIST BOOKSTORE NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS JUNE 30, 1988 AND 1987

(1) SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES General—The financial statements of the Bookstore have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting, wherein income and expense are recorded as they are earned or incurred. Inventories—Inventories are recorded at the lower of cost or market using the first-in, first-out method of accounting.

Property and Equipment—Property and equipment are recorded at cost. Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method based on the estimated useful lives of the related assets as summarized below:

Building and improvements 40 years Furniture, fixtures & equipment 3 to 5 years

Income Taxes—No provision for income taxes has been made due to the fact that the Bookstore is a non-profit organization exempt from income tax under Section 501 (c) (13) of the Internal Revenue Code.

(2) RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

Retail

The Bookstore has an agreement with the State Association of Free Will Baptists, whereby the Bookstore makes periodic payments of \$500 to the Association. During the current fiscal year and the year ended June 30, 1988, the Bookstore incurred \$6,000 of payments in each year.

STATE MISSION BOARD REPORT FOR 1988-89

One day William Carey was meditating upon the verse "Go ye into all the world, and preach the Gospel to every creature," and as he meditated he asked "Lord, do you mean me?" The Lord seemed to say. "Yes, I mean you." Carey submissively said, "Lord, I will go and preach the Gospel." Carey told his friends, "I will go down into the well, if you will hold the ropes." This story of the call of William Carey is an old one and has been heard by most of us. The story emphasizes the fact the GO-missionaries greatly need CO-missionaries who will pray and support them. This is what missions is all about.

We who are members of the state mission board are doing what we can to help our state hold the ropes while sending others to various places to preach the Gospel.

During the past year we have been busy in many places. Seemingly, the most exciting advancement was made at Woodward. Allen Mabra was employed by the board and has been preaching in a beautiful facility there since May 1. The board purchased a complete building there appraised at \$342,000.00 for \$175,000.00. Everything needed for services was already in place except a piano. Thirty-three (33) people were committed from the beginning, and the names and addresses of many more prospects are on file. Churches and individuals are pledging to underwrite the loan payments for two (2) years of this state missions projects. The prospects there are great.

Seven acres of choice property have been purchased in Hugo. This property is located on the Highway 70 by-pass. Three (3) acres are in the clear with only \$12,000.00 owing on the remainder. Most of it has been raised, and hopefully we will have a clear title to the remainder of the property by January 1, 1989. A nice sign has been erected on the property indicating that a Free Will Baptist Church will be located on this property in the near future. An experienced pastor has expressed an interest in going there. Hopefully, an announcement will be made by the state meeting.

Elk City is coming along well under the direction of our missionary, Larry Haggard. They have had a high of eighty-four (84). The mission board voted for them to start a land fund. More land is needed for them to expand their present facilities and also for parking.

Vinita is also coming along well. They have had a high attendance of sixty-seven (67). Several improvements have been made on the facilities. Ken Stevens, our missionary, is doing a fine job of getting a

church going there.

Several "Back to Basics" Conferences have been held by the board. Response has been unusually good. Other such conferences are being planned for the near future. We sincerely hope our people will continue to respond favorably when a conference is held in their area.

Mexican missions has also been emphasized. James Munsey and the Mexican Quartet have been in several fund-raising banquets over the state. The board voted to sponsor an annual time for promoting Mexican missions in Oklahoma.

Our board and director stand ready to assist in conferences, missionary scheduling, and anything else that will get the message of God's love to a lost world.

Please pray for our missionaries, missions director, and the board. They have a tremendous responsibility.

TO THE BOARD OKLAHOMA FREE WILL BAPTIST CHURCH ESTABLISHMENT PROGRAM—MOORE, OKLAHOMA

I have examined the assets, liabilities, and fund balance arising from cash transactions of the Oklahoma Free Will Baptist Church Establishment Program ("Program") as of June 30, 1988, and the related statements of revenue and expenses for the year then ended. My examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and, accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and other auditing procedures as I considered necessary in the circumstances.

As described in Note 1, the Program's policy is to prepare its financial statements on the basis of cash receipts and disbursements; consequently, certain revenue and the related assets are recognized when received rather than when earned, and certain expenses are recognized when paid rather than when the obligations are incurred. Accordingly, the accompanying financial statements are not intended to present the financial position and results of operations in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

OKLAHOMA FREE WILL BAPTIST CHURCH ESTABLISHMENT PROGRAM NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS JUNE 30, 1988

NOTE 1—SUMMARY OF ACCOUNTING PRINCIPLES.

The Oklahoma Free Will Baptist Church Establishment Program was created to assist in the establishment of Free Will Baptist churches in the state of Oklahoma.

The Program uses the cash basis of accounting for recognizing revenues and expenses.

The Program owns no significant fixed assets. Therefore, no depreciation is necessary.

Salaries and benefits expenses of Mission Church ministers are included in salaries and benefits.

The Program is exempt from federal and state income taxation under Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

NOTE 2—INVESTMENT DEPOSITS

At June 30, 1988, the Program had made deposits with two separate offices of the National Free Will Baptist Association. Interest is earned at variable rates ranging from 7 to 8% at June 30. The deposits earn interest semi-annually and is recognized when received by the Program. Except for \$1,000 which has been established as a permanent endowment trust, the deposits are withdrawable upon written

notification by the Program.

NOTE 3—LOAN

At June 30, 1988, the Program had a loan outstanding to a former Mission Church. The loan earns no interest and has no fixed maturity date.

NOTE 4-LAND, BUILDINGS, AND EQUIPMENT.

During the year, the Program was deeded church facilities in Sand Springs, Oklahoma. It is the Program's intention to sell this property and is currently listed with a broker. Expenses incurred in maintainin this property have been included in Other Expense and totalled \$2,188. NOTE 5—TRAVEL AND PROMOTION

Travel and Promotion expenses included \$2,638 in expenses incurred by the Program on behalf of the National Free Will Baptist Home Missions Department to promote Mexican Missions. This amount has been reimbursed to the Program in July, 1988.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION BOARD REPORT

As your Christian Education Board we are happy to report another productive year. We have consistently improved the quality of our programs and we have seen a good increase in almost every area, especially numerically.

The 1987 State Youth Conference was held at the First Free Will Baptist Church in Ada. This Conference consisted of two dynamic presentations by Multi-Media Inc., several workshops for youth on various contemporary Christian topics, and two stirring sermons by Dr. Ken Riggs. This event was attended by a record 483 young people and youth workers.

We look forward to the 1988 State Youth Rally being an even bigger

and better one. Because of anticipated growth we are changing the location to the campus of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College on November 5th. The theme of this year's Youth Rally will be Looking for Love. We will have another Multi-Media presentation with R. Dean Stone, a former board member, as the principal speaker and several workshops that will address many of the problems our teens encounter today.

In February of this year we again co-sponsored with Hillsdale the appearance of Ron Ralston of Josh McDowell Ministries at the Hillsdale Bible Conference.

A weekend Sunday School workshop was sponsored by our board at the Clinton Free Will Baptist Church of the Union Association in March of this year. If your church or association would like to host a similar event please mail an invitation to do so to our CE Secretary at the State Office.

Also, in cooperation with the State Executive Secretary we promoted *Roll Call Sunday* in March. Awards were presented at the 1988 CE Convention.

In May we had another boost for the youth of our state at the State CE Competitive Activities & Music and Arts Festival held at Oklahoma State University at Stillwater. This activity has always been difficult to conduct because of the many people and space it requires. This past festival proved to be the best yet because the space and facilities provided the opportunity for our young people to do their very best.

There were approximately 1200 spectators and contestants attending the 1988 festival. We believe this activity is great because it not only teaches our youth the Word of God, but it involves them in many ways in building Christian character. Of all the participants in the National competition Oklahoma had 48 National winners. We are thankful for this great involvement.

In June and July our board sponsored three State Camps. Approximately 500 youth and youth workers took part in these camps. Senior High Camp was held at Camp Look-Away in Tahlequah and Junior High and Junior camps were at First Mission Association Campgrounds near Drumright.

By the time this report is given we will have had the State CE Convention at the Lawnwood Free Will Baptist Church in Tulsa with Rev. Bob Shockey as the principal speaker. We know this is a great time of challenge and training for our pastors, youth workers, and teachers in our local churches.

Throughout the year we have continued to improve our *Video Lending Library*. We currently have 82 volumes on hand. These tapes are available to the churches of our state on a free will offering basis. We encourage you to pick up a catalogue containing a list of offerings, users' policy, and the procedure for check out. We anticipate more purchases in the near future.

Our board took another step this year and hired a part-time secretary and librarian whose office is located in the State Office Building in Moore.

We are thankful to God for richly blessing the work of the State Christian Education Board and in representing our State Association in providing Christian Education for all ages in the State of Oklahoma.

Lastly, we request 6% of the cooperative receipts.

NOTE 1

Summary of Significant Policies

The Organization policy is to prepare its financial statements on a cash basis. Under this basis, revenues are recognized when received rather than when earned, and expenditures are generally recognized when paid rather than when incurred. Consequently in the case of this organization expenditures are normally paid in the month following when they were incurred. This however does not materially effect the financial statement.

NOTE 2

Capital Expenditures

Since the organization has chosen to report on the cash basis all capital expenditures for equipment are expensed and not capitalized. Therefore, the fund balance is reduced by the full cost of the expenditure even though the equipment may have a residual value.

NOTE 1—SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

General—The significant accounting policies followed by the Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College are described below to enhance the usefulness of the financial statements to the reader.

Accrual Basis—The financial statements of the Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting except for depreciation. Depreciation is not taken on depreciable assets comprising the physical plant in conformity with the reporting objectives of accounting for resources received and used rather than the determination of net income. The statement of current funds related to the current reporting period. It does not purport to present the results of operations or the net income or loss for the period as would a statement of income or a statement of revenues and expenses.

Fund Accounting—In order to ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of the resources available to the College, the accounts of the College are maintained in accordance with principles of "fund accounting." This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds that are in accordance with activities or objectives specified. Separate accounts are maintained for each fund; however, in the accompanying financial statements, funds that have similar characteristics have been combined into fund groups. Accordingly, all financial transaction have been recorded and reported by fund group.

NOTE 2—INVESTMENTS

Investments exclusive of physical plant are recorded at cost; investments received by gift are carried at market value at the date of acquisition. As of June 30, 1988 and 1987, investments of the restricted and unrestricted funds were composed of the following:

NOTE 3—LOAN FUND

The loan fund reflects activity with respect to the National Direct Student Loan program which is funded primarily by the Department of Education. The College provides matching funds equal to one-ninth of the Federal funds received. This program, along with the College Work-Study, Pell Grant and Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant program disbursements are reflected in the supplemental schedules and letters following these footnotes.

NOTE 4—ENDOWMENT FUND

During the fiscal year ended June 30, 1983, the governing board of the College determined that certain funds were to be retained and invested as an endowment. The board stipulated that the principal is to remain invested and the interest income is to be placed in the current unrestricted funds. Gifts to the Endowment Fund totaled \$10,575 and \$20,120 for fiscal years ending June 30, 1988 and 1987 respectively.

We have examined the balance sheets of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College as of June 30, 1988 and 1987, and the related statements of revenue, expenditures and transfers and changes in fund balances for the years then ended, and have issued our reports thereon dated August 15, 1988. As a part of our examination, we made a study and evaluation of the system of internal accounting control of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College to the extent we considered necessary to evaluate auditing standards and the standards for financial and compliance audits contained in the U.S. General Accounting Office's Standards for Audit of Governmental Organizations, Programs, Activities and Functions.

The purpose of our study and evaluation was to determine the nature, timing, and extent of performing the auditing procedures

necessary for expressing an opinion on the entity's basic financial statements. Our study and evaluation was more limited than would be necessary to express an opinion on the system of internal accounting control taken as a whole or on any of the categories of controls identified above.

The management of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College is responsible for establishing and maintaining a system of internal accounting control. In fulfilling this responsibility, estimates and judgments by management are required to assess the expected benefits and related costs of control procedures. The objectives of a system are to provide management with reasonable, but not absolute, assurance that assets are safeguarded against loss from unauthorized use or disposition, and that transactions are executed in accordance with management's authorization and recorded properly to permit the preparation of financial statements in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles.

Because of the inherent limitations in any system of internal accounting control, errors or irregularities may nevertheless occur and not be detected. Also projection of any evaluation of the system to future periods is subject to the risk that procedures may become inadequate because of changes in conditions or that the degree of

compliance with the procedures may deteriorate.

Our study and evaluation made for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph would not necessarily disclose all material weaknesses in the system. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the system of internal accounting control of the Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College taken as a whole. However, our study and evaluation disclosed no condition that we believe to be a material weakness in the system of internal accounting control.

OKLAHOMA HISTORICAL COMMISSION

To: The State Association of Free Will Baptists

We have met only a few times this year, but have done a lot of thinking and studying as to how we might accomplish our objective as outlined in the resolution last year—establishing this commission with three members, one to be elected annually, with the authority to receive materials of historical interest by gift or purchase and properly preserve the same, to publish, as funds are available, materials to inform our people concerning their heritage and we were authorized the first year to receive up to \$500.00 from the Executive Office to cover travel expense, supplies, postage, etc. The commission may also receive designated funds from individuals and churches to underwrite its work, with Hillsdale Library serving as the repository for these documents.

In August we began with some printing, and made our first purchase. A large amount of very scarce materials became available, and upon learning of this we took immediate steps to secure it. Because we considered this a tremendous opportunity, we proceeded to try and purchase this library of materials dealing with Free Will Baptist history and heritage, even when we did not have the money to purchase it. That is where you come in. We need your help in accomplishing this and also in purchasing necessary equipment for storage of these materials, others we have purchased and for future purchases.

We have previously written pastors across the State of Oklahoma asking if they could help us raise \$2,500.00 to buy this historical library and the equipment to use in preserving it. The \$1,000.00 asked for the amount of materials seemed reasonable and is an opportunity we may never have again. We are counting on initial gifts from 25 individuals or churches toward this need and all additional funds will be used for supplies and for other materials that will be needed or as they become available. We are counting on volunteer help to catalogue and preserve these materials and are looking for someone who can consistently donate several hours each week for awhile, as needed.

We will have a packet of materials available for each association, asking each church to help with vital information regarding ministers on whom we should have a biographical sketch and to both present

and past history of the Association. We would ask each Associational Clerk in the future to mail one copy of the annual minutes to the Oklahoma Historical Commission.

THE FREE WILL BAPTIST MASTER'S MEN State of Oklahoma CONSTITUTION

PREAMBLE

The purpose of the Free Will Baptist Master's Men, state of Oklahoma is to provide a means of Christian fellowship and to deepen the spiritual lives of the laymen of the local church. Also, to provide a means of developing the abilities and talents of the laymen, and to promote the cause of Christ through a complete, "total church program," as prescribed by Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists.

ARTICLE I NAME

The name of this organization shall be known as the Free Will Baptist Master's Men, State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE II MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. The membership of this organization shall be composed of the district associations of Master's Men, and any local chapters where there is only one chapter in the district, within the state of Oklahoma.

Section 2. Every member in good standing of an affiliated district association of Master's Men, or any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district, is entitled to the full benefits of membership.

Section 3. Each district association, or any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district, shall submit an annual, written report to this body, (as a matter of information).

ARTICLE III OFFICERS

The officers of this organization shall consist of a president, vice-president and a secretary-treasurer.

The officers of this organization shall be elected annually and may succeed themselves, at this level.

ARTICLE IV EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The executive committee shall consist of the elected officers of this organization and they shall serve as the program committee for each annual convention.

Section 2. Ex-officio members of the executive committee shall be the presidents of the district associations of Master's Men, presidents of any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district, and the state executive secretary of the State Association of Free Will Baptists.

ARTICLE V MEETINGS

This organization shall meet annually at 7:30 P.M. on the Monday night before the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists convenes.

ARTICLE VI AMENDMENTS

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of any regular meeting.

BY-LAWS

VOTING RIGHTS

Section 1. Every member of each affiliated district association, or any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district, is eligible to vote on all questions and matters that might come before the Free Will Baptist Master's Men, State of Oklahoma.

COMMITTEES

Section 2. The executive committee shall transact all routine business and shall act for the organization in the interim between meetings.

Section 3. The executive committee shall meet at the call of the president.

Section 4. A nominating committee, for the annual election of officers, shall be composed of the presidents of each district association, and the president of any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district.

Section 5. The president shall appoint all other committees, subject to the approval of the body.

FINANCE

Section 6. This organization shall be financed on the basis of offerings, dues and assessments.

QUORUM

Section 7. One-tenth of the members of this organization shall constitute a quorum at any regular meeting.

AMENDMENTS

Section 8. These by-laws may be amended at any regular meeting by a twothirds vote of the members present.

As adopted by the Free Will Baptist Master's Men, State of Oklahoma annual session, in Muskogee, Oklahoma October 19, 1970.

CONSTITUTION OF MINISTER'S CONFERENCE

ARTICLE 1

The Ministers Conference shall be called the Oklahoma State Free Will Baptist Minister's Conference, and shall be composed of Ordained Free Will Baptist Ministers who are regular members of some Orthodox Free Will Baptist church in the State of Oklahoma who have paid their dues.

ARTICLE 2

The officers for this conference shall be President, Vice-President, and Clerk-Treasurer, who shall be elected annually.

ARTICLE 3

This conference shall have the power to discipline its members.

ARTICLE 4

Members of this organization shall be all ordained ministers who participate in the benefits and activities of this body, and associate members who become members by payment of the annual dues.

ARTICLE 5

This conference shall meet Annually.

ARTICLE 6

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any regular session.

BY-LAWS OF MINISTER'S CONFERENCE

ARTICLE 1

The clerk or assistant clerk, or in their absence the senior minister in years shall call the ministers into conference. If a quorum is present the President or in his absence the Vice-President shall moderate the meeting. If neither of these are present, the senior minister in years shall be in charge.

ARTICLE 2

It shall be the duty of the clerk to enroll the ministers of the conference. Ministers shall present themselves with proper evidence of their rights to seats therein, and those enrolled by the clerk shall compose the conference. In case of questionable representation the case under question shall be referred to the Credential Committee.

ARTICLE 3

It shall be the duty of each minister belonging to this conference, to be active in pastoral or evangelistic services (disabled or retired ministers excepted). Any minister belonging to this conference shall report in each session in person or by letter, and failing to do so for two successive sessions shall be subject to discipline.

ARTICLE 4

Each conference shall be opened by reading a portion of God's word and prayer, and each session shall be closed with prayer.

ARTICLE 5

By a two-thirds vote of the members present ruling of the President may be overruled.

ARTICLE 6

This conference shall sit with open doors, except when it shall go into a committee as a whole.

ARTICLE 7

No member shall absent himself from the conference during its meeting without permission from the President.

ARTICLE 8

No person shall be allowed to nominate more than one member of a committee, unless person nominated is not elected.

ARTICLE 9

The President shall not allow discussion when not carried on in a Christian Spirit, or when he thinks it will cause discord.

ARTICLE 10

Anyone desiring to speak shall rise and address the President by the appelation "Brother President," but shall not speak further until recognized.

ARTICLE 11

No member of this conference shall be allowed to speak more than five minutes, nor twice on the same subject without permission from the President.

ARTICLE 12

These By-Laws may be altered or amended at any regular or adjourned session of this conference by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE, INC. BY-LAWS BOARD OF TRUSTEES

SECTION I

The Board of Trustees of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc., an Oklahoma corporation, shall be composed of fifteen members, elected as provided in the Articles of Incorporation of said College, as amended:

ARTICLE A—OFFICERS: The officers of the Board of Trustees shall be a Chairman, an Assistant Chairman, and a Secretary, each of whom shall be elected by the Board for a term of one year. They shall continue in office until their successors have been chosen:

Item 1—CHAIRMAN: The chairman of the Board of Trustees or his assistant shall preside at all meetings of the Board. He shall be an ex-officio member of the Executive Committee.

Item 2—SECRETARY: The Secretary shall record and preserve minutes of all meetings and acts of the Board of Trustees and countersign all deeds, conveyances, and other papers authorized by the Board. He shall have authority to call special meetings of the Trustees of the College upon the written request of two-thirds of the members of the Board; he shall mail notice of said meeting to the trustees ten (10) days in advance.

Item 3—EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE: The Executive Committee shall consist of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, the Vice-Chairman of the Board, the Secretary of the Board. The Executive Committee shall have authority to consider and act upon all questions affecting the College which may be brought before it between the stated meetings of the Board, or a quorum of the Board fails to attend a called or regular meeting. It shall transact such business as may be committee to it by the Board and shall act for the College on such matters as it may submit to it. The Committee shall meet at the call of the Chairman or the President of the College.

ARTICLE B—MEETINGS: The Board of Trustees shall meet each year at a time and place agreed upon by the Board. It shall, also, hold special meetings whenever called in accordance with the By-Laws of the Board. Such special meetings may be called by either the chairman of the Board, or the President of the College.

ARTICLE C—QUORUM: A majority of the members or the Board of Trustees of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc. in attendance at any called or regular meeting, written notice of which has been mailed by the Secretary to each trustee, shall constitute a quorum. No proxy votes shall be permitted. No ex-officio member shall be entitled to vote at meetings of the Board of Trustees.

ARTICLE D—ELECTIONS: In all elections held by the Board of Trustees each member present except ex-officio members shall be entitled to one vote, and the result shall be determined by a majority of the votes cast. Due notice of any election must be personal notice to the members or a day on the minutes of the Board not less than one week preceding the election.

SECTION II OFFICERS OF HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE

The officers of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College shall be a President who is elected by the Board of Trustees for an indefinite term. Other officers shall be a Vice President of Academic Affairs, Vice President of Student Affairs, and a Vice President of Business Affairs, each of whom shall be appointed by the President with the approval of the Board of Trustees.

ITEM ONE—PRESIDENT: The President shall be executive officer of the Board of Trustees and shall have general control of the College including its officers, teachers, students, and business. He shall render to the Board complete annual reports and to its chairman, Executive Committee or other committees such information as may be deemed essential to a thorough knowledge of the operation of the College and its promotion. He shall be a member of the Board of Trustees ex-officio and the Executive Committee ex-officio and shall have the rights and privileges of a member of the Board except voting. The President shall execute all documents, instruments, and conveyances on behalf of the college. Duties of the president and working relationship shall be further detailed in a format approved by the Board of Trustees.

ITEM TWO—VICE PRESIDENT OF ACADEMIC AFFAIRS: The Vice President of Academic affairs of the College shall, under the President, fix the hours of recitation, govern, control, and regulate the conduct of the students, have general oversight of curriculum, student's records, and such other internal details and administrative duties as may be delegated to him by the President of the College.

The Vice President of Academic Affairs shall act as President in the absence of the President.

ITEM THREE—VICE PRESIDENT OF STUDENT AFFAIRS: The Vice President of student affairs shall be responsible for directing the religious activities of the College, serve as counselor to the students, and such other duties as may be delegated to him by the President of the College.

ITEM FOUR—VICE PRESIDENT OF BUSINESS AFFAIRS: The Treasurer shall keep an accurate record of all accounts of the College and shall receive and expend as directed by the Board of Trustees and President, all money for the expenses of the institution. He shall make an annual report to the Board and furnish the Executive Committee with such information pertaining to his office as may be requested. He shall provide bond in whatever amount the Board may require. Until such times as the Board of Trustees may deem different the Treasurer's office shall be contained within the Vice President of Business Affairs office. The Vice President of Business Affairs may at the direction of the administration designate this duty to a subordinate officer. The Vice President of Business Affairs shall have general supervision of the financial business of the College, and shall, at the direction of the President, be responsible for the upkeep of all the physical facilities and premises of the College. His detailed duties are directed in a format approved by the Board of Trustees.

SECTION III FACULTY

The faculty shall consist of the President, the Vice President of Student Affairs, and all teachers of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College. Instructors and assistant teachers shall have the privilege of sitting with the faculty in stated meetings but shall not have the right of voting.

It shall be the policy of the College to employ on its faculty those who are members of Free Will Baptist churches that are affiliated with the National Association. Emergencies, however arising from the resignation, illness, death, or approved leaves of absence of faculty members may be relieved by the temporary employment of instructors who are affiliated with any evangelical denomination. Part-time or short-term instructors, deemed essential to the successful prosecution of a consistent education program, may be employed at the discretion of the President without respect of denominational affiliation.

The faculty, under the authority and jurisdiction of the President, shall have general charge of instruction, attendance of students, examinations, administration of curriculum, discipline, and all matters involving the spiritual, physical, and social welfare of the College. The faculty shall be hired upon recommendation of the President.

In the selection of the faculty qualitative factors shall be kept in mind. All faculty members shall be urged to pursue graduate programs in their respective fields. Except in special cases no faculty member will be required to teach courses outside of his field.

SECTION IV ACADEMIC COUNCIL

The Academic Council shall consist of the President, the Vice President of Student Affairs and the heads of the departments of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College: It shall determine the curriculum and academic policy of the College, prescribe requirements for admissions, certificates, diplomas, and degrees, and supervise the courses of instruction offered by the various departments of the College.

SECTION V CONTRACTS

The Board of Trustees shall establish the College policy involving the execution of contracts, deeds of conveyance, the determination of salaries, and employment of all officers, representatives, faculty members and essential domestic and maintenance employees. The President of the College shall negotiate agreements, executive contracts, employ representatives, and supply vacancies incurred by the termination of contracts, resignations, or death of any essential employees. All contracts for building construction shall be let only to persons or corporations posting a valid performance bond and recording the same in the Office of the County Clerk of Cleveland County, Oklahoma.

SECTION VI ADVISORY COUNCIL

An advisory council shall be formed which is to be composed of interested, qualified persons in the various fields which will be of value in building and maintaining a strong academic program to carry out the educational program stated in the charter.

SECTION VII AMENDMENT

These By-Laws may be amended by a favorable vote of two-thirds of the qualified members of the Board of Trustees of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College at any meeting of the Board, provided that the proposed amendment has been submitted in writing to each Trustee one month in advance. This change to be subject to the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists.

SECTION VIII ADMINISTRATIVE FUNCTIONS

The President of the Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College shall be elected by the Board of Trustees, and he shall act for and on behalf of the Board in the conduct and management of the institution. He shall also be a member of the Board of Trustees ex-officio and of the Executive committee, ex-officio, and his duties, powers and term of office shall be prescribed in the by-laws of the College and a format approved by the Board of Trustees.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF THE HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE, INC.

Know all men by these presents, that, we whose names are hereunto subscribed, do hereby associate ourselves together for the purpose of forming a cor-

poration under the provisions of the corporation laws of the State of Oklahoma, and for that purpose state:

ARTICLE ONE

The name of this corporation shall be HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAP-TIST COLLEGE, INC.

ARTICLE TWO

The purpose of this corporation shall be the creation, establishment and maintenance of a college and institution of higher learning devoted to the promotion and impartation of higher learning, Christian education and such other education, instruction, learning, training and research as may be deemed essential for the cause of Christ and to that end prescribe courses of study and grant degrees. The doctrinal and theological position of this institution shall be that of the sponsoring denomination, Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists and the treatise of the National Association of Free Will Baptist as endorsed by the state body, and in connection therewith, in accordance with the stipulation of the Constitution and By-laws of the State Association of Free Will Baptists, Inc.

- (a.) To prescribe courses of study for both resident and correspondence students, which shall include general education in the arts, Christian Ministries of Service and Biblical studies for wisdom; said courses to be taught in both a Junior College Division and a Bible College Division, and to award degrees, either graduate or post-graduate, to those persons satisfactorily completing the prescribed courses of study and to grant such other literary honors, including honorary degrees, as shall be deemed advisable.
- (b.) To charge and collect tuition as determined by the Board of Trustees and to create scholarships.
- (c.) To employ professors, instructors and other subordinate employees as may be necessary for the proper conduct of the college under the direction and control of the President of the College, with the advice and consent of the majority of the Board of Trustees.
- (d.) To institute and carry on missions and commissions for missionary purposes and investigations.
- (e.) To publish and distribute such pamphlets, literature or books as may be required in the conduct of such work and the general promotion of the College.
- (f.) To sue and be sued in its corporate name and to enter into contracts of every type and nature.
- (g.) To solicit support, receive, collect, hold and receive by gift or bequest personal property in any amount, money or other thing of value; to purchase real estate, to receive real estate that may be given, or devised to the college for achieving the legitimate ends of the college and to sell or mortgage the same as the need arises.
- (h.) To borrow money in payment of property for erecting buildings and making improvements and for any other purpose germane to the objectives and purposes of the college.
- (i.) To issue notes, bonds, debentures and other evidences of indebtedness and execute mortgages, liens and other incumbrances upon the property of the

corporation, real or otherwise, to secure the payment of any such evidences of indebtedness.

(j.) To transact any and all business connected with said College as may be

necessary to achieve the purposes of said College.

(k.) To obtain under Internal Revenue Laws of the United States and of the Revenue Laws of the State of Oklahoma exemption from income property and other forms of taxation.

ARTICLE THREE

The location of this corporation shall be in Moore, Oklahoma.

ARTICLE FOUR

The duration of this corporation shall be perpetual.

ARTICLE FIVE

The general control of this corporation shall be vested in a Board of Trustees consisting of 16 members, 10 of which shall be elected by the delegates to the annual Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists—each of which shall serve for a term of 5 years, and until his successor is elected and qualified. Two members shall be elected at each annual sitting of the State Association for the expiring five year term and vacancies that occur on the board. One member each shall be elected by the delegates to the annual meeting of the State Association of Free Will Baptists of the states of Arkansas, Colorado, Kansas, Missouri, New Mexico, and Texas, each of which serve for a term designated by the states they represent.

ARTICLE SIX

An executive committee consisting of the Chairman, Vice Chairman, and Secretary of the Board of Trustees shall possess all powers of the Board of Trustees between the stated meetings of the Board of Trustees.

ARTICLE SEVEN

All contracts for building construction shall be let only to persons or corporations posting a valid performance bond and recording the same in the office of the County Clerk of Cleveland County, Oklahoma.

SECTION IX AMENDMENTS

This charter may be hereafter amended subject to the provisions contained herein and the laws of the State of Oklahoma. It is provided, however, that the Trustees of the College shall not propose or apply for any amendment which has not been previously authorized by an act of the Oklahoma State Association.

OKLAHOMA STATE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY CONVENTION CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I

NAME

This organization shall be known as the Oklahoma State Woman's Auxiliary Convention.

ARTICLE II

PURPOSE

The purpose of this convention shall be to bring the women of each district convention together for fellowship, sharing information, and encouraging one another in the work of the Lord.

ARTICLE III

OFFICERS

The Officers of this convention shall be a president, vice president, secretary, assistant secretary, treasurer, and field worker. These shall serve on the state executive committee together with three members elected by the convention as desired. These shall serve for a period of 2 years.

ARTICLE IV

MEMBERSHIP

This convention shall be composed of the officers of the convention together with each active auxiliary member of the district or local (duly accredited by the credentials committee).

ARTICLE V

MEETINGS

The annual meeting shall be held each year on the day preceding the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists and at the place designated by said Association.

ARTICLE VI

AMENDMENTS

This constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the convention by a two-thirds vote of members present.

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1, President. The president shall preside over all meetings, appoint such committees as may be needed, call the executive committee together when necessary, be ex-officio member of all committees, and serve as chairman of the executive committee, see that reports are made promptly to the national secretary and perform all duties usually pertaining to such an office.

Section 2, Vice President. The vice president shall preside in the absence of the president or by her request and otherwise assist her in the overseeing of the work in general.

Section 3, Secretary. The secretary shall keep an accurate record of all proceedings of the convention and executive meetings, preserve all valuable papers and turn same over to her successor in office, and make an annual report to the national secretary on a form available from the NWAC office. She shall compile the districts slates of officers and addresses immediately after the convention. She shall also send a slate of state officers and addresses to the national executive secretary. She is chairman of the Credentials Committee.

The secretary shall also serve as historian keeping an historical record and submitting historical information to the national executive secretary annually.

Section 4, Assistant Secretary. The assistant Secretary shall assist the secretary in recording proceedings of convention and executive committee meetings and shall aid the secretary in all her work as needed.

Section 5, Treasurer. The treasurer shall have charge of all funds belonging to this convention and shall pay out same only when authorized by the convention. The treasurer shall keep an accurate account and shall give a written report of all funds received and sibursed at each annual meeting of the convention. She shall also send an annual report to the WNAC office (executive secretary-treasurer) at least ten days before the end of the fiscal year. She shall encourage support of missions through the WNAC Gift Plan, individual giving and special offerings.

Section 6, Field Worker. The field worker shall have charge of all field work pertaining to, or necessary to, the promotion of the work of the convention and keep the national program before the district officers.

ARTICLE II

ELECTIONS

The general officers shall be nominated by a nominating committee and shall be elected by acclamation, unless there are other nominations. In case of more than one nominee for any particular office, a vote will be taken on each. All elections shall be held at the closing business session of the convention.

ARTICLE III

EXPENSES

Section 1. An appropriation of 18 cents per mile toward the expense of the general officers, when called upon to attend the executive committee meeting to plan program, secretary's expenses, phone calls, postage and stationery for officers will be paid by the convention. All field promotional work is subject to the state executive committee, who should approve all work done by state officers in the interest of state work, as well as expenses of the same.

Section 2. An amount of \$100.00 shall be paid on the expense of the state president to attend WNAC. If the president is unable to go to WNAC that we give the \$100.00 for this purpose to whomever goes in her place providing she is a state officer.

Section 3. The auditing committee shall be paid mileage the same as the executive committee.

ARTICLE IV

COMMITTEES

Section 1. Executive Committee—The executive committee shall be composed of the five officers and three members elected by the convention. Five of these shall compose a quorum. They shall hold meetings for the transaction of business as often as necessary. It shall be the duty of the executive committee to maintain an overseeing of the work at large. They shall act for the convention when necessary. They shall meet with district presidents the night preceding the state auxiliary convention. They will send out a newsletter with expenses paid by the State Treasury.

Section 2. Resolutions Committee—A resolutions committee of five members shall be appointed by the president as needed.

Section 3. Nominating Committee—The nominating committee shall be composed of at least one member from each district convention. Nominations shall be submitted by district with their annual report. These elected by the body at the annual meeting.

Section 4. Credentials Committee—The secretary shall be chairman of the credentials committee, and other members may be appointed by the president. The treasurer shall be a standing member of this committee.

Section 5. Finance Committee—The finance committee shall be appointed by the president. This committee audits the financial records of the year and reports on same to the convention.

Section 6. Registration committee shall be provided by the district convention which is host to state convention.

ARTICLE V

FEES AND REPORTS

Active members shall pay dues of \$1.50 per year. With 25 cents remaining in the district, \$1.25 to be forwarded to state where 25 cents shall be retained, and \$1.00 forwarded to WNAC as required for membership fees. It shall be the duty of each body directly affiliated with the State Auxiliary Convention to send a report to every annual session.

ARTICLE VI

AMENDMENTS

These by-laws may be amended by a two-thirds vote of members present at regular meeting of the state auxiliary convention.

ARTICLE VII

GIFTS

The desired plans for giving in the Woman's Auxiliary are those adopted by WNAC as follows:

- 1. Mission offerings following each special season of prayer
- Co-Laborer offering (monthly or quarterly designated to WNAC General Fund)
- WNAC Emphasis Month in August or other time more convenient to help in support of WNAC General Fund

- 4. Memorial Student Loan Fund (special program and offering in September to assist worthy and needy students at FWBBC in Nashville)
- 5. Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College Student Loan Fund. (Special program and offering in September to assist worthy and needy students at Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College)
- 6. Tithes—Pay tithes on all undesignated money received
- 7. All offerings are to be forwarded through regular channels.

ARTICLE VIII

WNAC DELEGATE

Each district convention shall submit one nomination for a State delegate to WNAC with their annual report. This nomination (along with others as needed to make up 15 delegates to WNAC) shall be elected by the body at the annual meeting. It shall be the duty of delegates elected to notify president if they cannot attend WNAC. President shall appoint delegates as needed in absence of regular elected delegates.

ARTICLES OF FAITH OF STATE ASSOCIATION

- 1. THE BIBLE—The Scriptures of the Old and New Testament were given by the inspiration of God, and are our infallible rules of faith and practice.
- 2. GOD—There is one living and true God, revealed in nature as the Creator, Preserver and Righteous Governor of the Universe, and in the Scriptures as the Father, Son and Holy Ghost, yet as one God, infinitely wise and good, whom all intelligent creatures are supremely to love, adore and obey.
- 3. CHRIST—Christ is God manifest in the flesh: in His divine nature truly God, in His human nature truly man. The mediator between God and man, once crucified. He is now risen and glorified as our ever-present Saviour and Lord.
- 4. THE HOLY SPIRIT—The Scriptures assigns to the Holy Spirit all the attributes of God. He is the Reprover, Comforter, Guide and Sanctifier of all men.
- 5. THE GOVERNMENT OF GOD—God exercises a wise and benevolent providence over all beings and all things by maintaining the constitution and laws of nature. He also performs special acts of Grace, not otherwise provided for as highest welfare of man requires.
- 6. THE SINFULNESS OF MAN—Man was created innocent, but by disobedience fell into a state of sin and condemnation. His posterity, therefore inherited a fallen nature of such tendencies that all who come to years of accountability, sin and become guilty before God.
- 7. THE WORK OF CHRIST—The Son of God, by His incarnation, life, suffering, death, and resurrection effected for all a redemption from sin that is full and free and is the ground of salvation by faith.
 - 8. THE WORK OF SALVATION—The conditions of salvation are:
- 1. Repentance or sincere sorrow for sin and the hearty renunciations of it.
- 2. Faith or the unreserved committal of one's self to Christ as Saviour and Lord, with purpose to love and obey Him in all things. In the exercise of saving faith the soul is renewed by the Holy Spirit; freed from the dominion of sin and becomes a child of God.
- 3. Continuance in faith and obedience until death.
- 9. ELECTION—God determined from the beginning to save all who should comply with the conditions of salvation. Hence by faith in Christ, men become His elect.

- 10. FREEDOM OF WILL—The Human will is free and self controlled, having power to yield to the influence of the truth and the Spirit and live, or to resist them and perish.
- 11. SALVATION FREE—God desires the salvation of all, the Gospel invites all, the Holy Spirit strives with all, and whosoever will may come and take the water of life freely.
- 12. PERSEVERENCE—All believers in Christ, who through grace persevere in holiness to the end of life, have the promise of eternal salvation.
- 13. BACKSLIDING AND APOSTASY—A person who has been regenerated or born again and is living in unconfessed, unforgiven sin, is rebellious to the principles of the Kingdom of God and His righteousness, and therefore is a backslider in a lost condition who must repent and be restored to the right relationship with God or be eternally lost.

We recognize, according to Hebrews 6:4-6, that it is possible for a person to get in the condition that he could never return to Christ. This, we believe, is Apostasy; However, we also recognize that a regenerate person can fall into sin, be in a lost condition and still not be an Apostate. This person, through repentance, can be reconciled to God.

- 14. GOSPEL ORDINANCES—Baptism, or the immersion of believers in water, and the Lord's Supper, are ordinances to be perpetuated under the Gospel; Feet Washing, an ordinance teaching humility, of universal obligation, and to be administered to all true believers.
- 15. TITHING—God commanded tithes and offerings in the Old Testament; Jesus Christ endorsed in the Gospel (Matt. 23:23), and the Apostle Paul said, "Upon the first day of the week let every one of you lay by him in store as God hath prospered him." 1 Cor. 16:2.
- 16. THE CHRISTIAN SABBATH—The divine law requires that one day in seven be set apart from the secular employment and amusements for rest, worship, holy works and activities, and for personal communion with God.
- 17. RESURRECTION, JUDGMENT, AND FINAL RETRIBUTION—The Scriptures teach the resurrection of all men at the last day. They that have done good will come forth to the resurrection of life, and they that have done evil unto the resurrection of damnation: then the wicked shall "Go away into eternal punishment but the righteous into eternal life."

RULES OF ORDER

1. At every sitting of the Association, business shall be opened and concluded by prayer by the Moderator or whomever he may request.

- 2. Ministers and deacons present are invited to seats, allowed to take part in debates on all subjects, and to vote.
- 3. Those who speak shall rise and address the Moderator. Personal reflections shall be avoided in all debates.
 - 4. No motion may be discussed until made and seconded.
- 5. When a motion has been made and seconded, and a member opposes its discussion, the Moderator shall put the question, "Shall it be discussed?" If negative, the question shall not be discussed.
- 6. If any proposition or motion under debate contains two or more points, it shall be divided at the request of any member, and the vote taken separately.
 - 7. Motions made and lost shall not be recorded.
- 8. No one shall speak more than twice on the same subject without special leave of the Moderator.
- 9. All questions shall be decided by a majority vote of all Members present.

BY-LAWS OF STATE ASSOCIATION

- 1. The Clerk or assistant clerk, or in their absence, the senior minister in years shall call the Association into conference, and if a quorum is present the moderator, or in his absence, the assistant moderator shall take charge; and if neither of them is present the senior minister in years shall act as Moderator.
- 2. It shall be the duty of the clerk to enroll the delegates to the Association, who shall present themselves with proper evidence of their rights to seats therein, and those enrolled by the clerk shall compose the Association.
- 3. It shall be the duty of every District belonging to this Association to send a letter to every annual session of this Association reporting in the same spiritual condition, benevolent work, and its statistics. Any District belonging to this Association, which shall fail to report itself for two successive sessions, may be dismissed from the Association by a two thirds vote of all members present.
- 4. Each meeting shall be opened by reading a portion of the Bible and with prayer, and shall be closed with prayer.
- 5. By a two-thirds vote of members present, a ruling of the moderator can be overruled.
- 6. This Association may correspond by messenger or otherwise with other religious bodies.
- 7. This Association shall sit with open doors except when it shall go into a committee of the whole.
- 8. Any person not a member of this Association may be allowed to take part in its discussions by obtaining permission from the moderator.
- 9. It shall be the duty of all the Association to be present at the time appointed for each meeting, and anyone wishing to retire shall first obtain leave of the moderator.
- 10. No person shall be allowed to nominate more than one member of any committee, provided the person nominated be elected.
- 11. The moderator shall not allow discussions when not carried on in a Christian spirit or when he thinks it will cause discord or division.

12. Anyone desiring to speak shall rise to his feet and address the moderator by the appelation "Brother Moderator," but shall not speak further until recognized by the moderator.

13. No member of this association shall be allowed to speak more than ten minutes nor twice on the same subject without permission from the moderator.

14. This association shall meet annually beginning on Tuesday following the second Sunday in October.

15. These By-Laws may be altered or amended at any regular or adjourned session of this Association by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

CONSTITUTION OF STATE ASSOCIATION

PREAMBLE: From long experience, we the members of the Free Will Baptist denomination, being regularly baptized upon a profession of our faith in Jesus Christ, and realizing the necessity of a bond in union and fellowship among us as a church; and to preserve and maintain correspondence and coordination with us, do therefore ordain this Constitution for our better denomination government.

ARTICLE I

NAME: This organization shall be known as the OKLAHOMA STATE ASSOCIATION OF FREE WILL BAPTISTS.

ARTICLE II

PURPOSE: The object and purpose of this organization shall be to unify the work of the various bodies composing this State Association, and to devise and execute measures for the extension of the Kingdom of God in connection with the various bodies in the Association, or that may hereafter be represented therein.

ARTICLE III

REPRESENTATION: Section 1. This Association shall be composed of all ordained ministers and deacons with membership in some local church which is a member of a district Association with membership in the State Association.

Section 2: Each District Association shall be entitled to a number of elected delegates equal with the number of churches composing said Association. These delegates may be recommended by the local churches and shall be endorsed by their district association.

ARTICLE IV

FINANCE: Each district association shall be responsible for sending \$35.00 per church to the State Association for State and National Convention fee, of this \$35.00, \$25.00 shall go to the State Association and \$10.00 to the National Association.

ARTICLE V

DISCIPLINE: This State Association shall have the right to settle any question of discipline, doctrine or practices that may properly come before it from any of the bodies composing said organization; furthermore, if there be any question

of discipline, doctrine or practices on the part of an affiliated association, delegates of that association shall not be seated until these questions have been settled to the satisfaction of the General Board.

Section 2: Decisions of the General Board may be appealed in this manner. All appeals shall come before the State Association when sitting in a committee as a whole.

ARTICLE VI

OFFICERS: A. The officers of the State Association shall consist of a Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, and an Executive Secretary. Each of these shall be elected at the close of each regular session except the Executive Secretary.

B. (1) The Executive Secretary shall be elected for an indefinite term. It shall be the responsibility of the Executive Board to seek out a prospective candidate and make their recommendation to the body at the state association in its regular session, with privilege of nominations from the floor.

(2) In the event of a vacancy occurring during the course of the year, the Execu-

tive Board shall fill the vacancy until the annual setting of the association.

(3) Any time a majority of the Executive Board, or seven (7) members of the General Board requests a vote of confidence on the Executive Secretary, a vote shall be taken. If such action results in the termination of the Executive Secretary, he shall be given sixty (60) days severance pay.

In the event of immorality on the part of the Executive Secretary, or of him teaching or preaching doctrine contrary to the Free Will Baptist Treatise, he may be dis-

missed by a majority vote of the Executive Board with no severance pay.

ARTICLE VII

BOARDS: All standing boards shall be composed of seven (7) elected members who shall serve terms of 7, 6, 5, 4, 3, 2, and 1 years with such ex-officio members as may be provided for elsewhere, with no member serving more than two (2) consecutive terms of office or portion thereof, except: (1) the Board of Christian Education which shall consist of 10 members who shall serve five (5) years with two members elected annually, (2) the General Board which shall be composed of one (1) member from each affiliated association, the chairman of each standing board, and the current general officers of this association, and (3) the College Board of Trustees which shall be composed as provided for in the Articles of Incorporation of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc.

The standing boards of this association shall be: Executive Board, Board of Church Extension, Missions and Evangelism; Board of Christian Education; and

College Board of Trustees.

No standing board shall meet in a functional meeting during the session of this association.

ARTICLE VIII

DUTIES, SCOPE OF ENDEAVOR AND QUALIFICATIONS OF STANDING BOARDS

Section 1. EXECUTIVE BOARD: The Executive Board shall be composed of seven (7) members who are members of an affiliated association and in good standing with the association of which they are members. They shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

It shall be the duty of this board to act in behalf of the association when it is not in session. It shall be bound to carry out the directions of the association and shall hold itself bound by every consideration of morality and honor to carry out the wishes of this association and to act under its instructions in whatever technical rights, civil laws and the decisions of courts may give it in certain emergencies. It shall be the duty of this board to sign their signatures to any and all papers concerning properties, indebtedness, bonds, or other legal documents

pertaining to the execution of the will of this association, exclusive of the College Board of Trustees.

This board shall have the oversight of the Executive Department of this association. The members shall assist and direct such work for the general promotion of this association as is deemed needful or necessary as the means available shall permit. The Executive Department shall serve as the coordinating agency of this association to correlate the work of all standing boards and agencies.

This board shall have the oversight of Free Will Baptist Book Store and shall endeavor to serve affiliated associations and churches and the community with literature and church supplies. Merchandising procedures shall be those accepted as normal retail procedures with the board being cognizant of the spiritual contribution of the store in distributing Christian literature.

All decisions of this board shall be governed by the general tenets of this association and shall not violate this constitution.

This board shall organize itself and elect such officers as necessary to the orderly conduct of its affairs and labors. This board shall keep an accurate record of all meetings, decisions, and work done and shall make a report in writing at each annual session of this association. All records shall be available to this association at its request.

Whereas this board represents the association when not in session, it and it alone shall have the power to call the association into special conference provided each affiliated association shall be given notice at least ten (10) days prior to the meeting of such special conference.

Section 2. GENERAL BOARD: This board shall be composed of one (1) member from each affiliated association, the chairman of each standing board, and the current general officers of this association. Each member must be a member of an affiliated association and in good standing with the association of which he is a member. The members shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

The duties of this board shall be to meet one (1) day preceding the annual session of this association. This board shall serve as the credential committee with the duties and responsibilities assigned by Article V of this constitution. This board shall hear reports of all standing boards. It shall serve as budget committee and shall make such recommendations as deemed pertinent to this association. A complete and accurate record shall be kept of meetings of this board and a report shall be made in writing to this association in its annual session.

The moderator of the association shall serve as chairman of this board, and the clerk of the association shall serve as its clerk.

Section 3. BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION, MISSIONS AND EVANGELISM: This board shall be composed of seven (7) members who are members of affiliated associations and in good standing with the associations of which they are members. They shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

It shall be the duty of this board to labor to further the Gospel of Jesus Christ into the uttermost parts of the earth. In accomplishing this, they are to endeavor to establish missions and churches in communities within the bounds of this association with whatever moral and financial assistance that may be theirs. In cases of small churches failing to function, whatever assistance deemed appropriate shall be rendered to maintain the effective witness of that church by either direct labor with the church or with an associational board in instances where the affiliated association has a functional board or agency.

This board shall be empowered to receive and convey title to real property in the area of its labors.

The promotion of missionary endeavors from a local, state or national level shall come within the scope of endeavor of this board. This board shall assist in maintaining prayer and financial support of missionary enterprises through whatever channels available.

Whereas missionary and evangelistic labors are so intimately related, this board shall assist through participation or assistance in maintaining a strong evangelistic thrust in the life of affiliated association.

This board shall organize itself and elect such officers as necessary to the orderly conduct of its affairs and labors. This board shall keep an accurate record of all meetings, decisions, work done, funds received and disbursed and shall make a report in writing at each annual session of this association. All records shall be available to this association at its request.

Section 4. COLLEGE BOARD OF TRUSTEES: The College Board of Trustees shall be composed as provided for in the Articles of Incorporation of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc.

Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc. is an agency of the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists and is incorporated under the corporate laws of the State of Oklahoma. The articles of incorporation are a part of this association's record and delineate the purpose, duty and scope of endeavor of the members of this board.

Section 5. BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION: This board shall consist of 10 members who are members of affiliated associations and in good standing with the association of which they are members. The members shall serve five years with two members elected annually.

The duties of this board shall be to promote and provide assistance for the development and sustaining of a total Christian Education program in the local church and district association.

This board shall also administer state-wide activities such as, but not limited to, youth camps, seminars, and training programs, working with local agencies to distribute and employ effective methods and materials.

This board shall organize itself and elect such officers as necessary to the orderly conduct of its affairs and labors. This board shall keep accurate record of all meetings, discussions, work done, funds received and disbursed and shall make a report in writing at each annual session of this association. All records shall be available to this association at its request.

Section 6. VACANCIES: Vacancies shall occur when a member moves from the territorial bounds of this association, by death, by resignation or by removal from office by this association. In the event of disciplinary action where charges concerning misconduct, doctrine or practice shall have been lodged against a member of any board, his office shall be held in abeyance until such charges shall be concluded or as determined by this association.

All boards shall have power to fill vacancies arising between sessions of this association. Such appointment shall terminate at the next session of this association and shall be filled by this association.

Section 7. EMPLOYEES: All employees of boards or agencies of this association shall be employed by agreement or contract with employing board or agency upon approval of this association except those elected by this association and the conditions of their employment shall be those approved by this association.

The duties of the Executive Secretary of this association shall be:

- (1) He is to represent, or cause to be represented, the association at all affairs of interest to the association.
- (2) He is to promote the work of the association in such a manner so as to unify the efforts of the association.
- (3) He is to serve with all standing boards and committees of the association in an ex-officio capacity.
- (4) He is to aid in planning the work of the association by relating the activities and plans of one board to another.
- (5) He is to report to the association during each annual session.
- (6) He is to communicate to the affiliated members of this association the pressing causes and events before the association. This can be in person or by means of a periodical bulletin or both.
- (7) He shall serve as treasurer of this association. An accurate and complete record of all funds received and disbursed shall be kept and a written report shall be included in his report to this association in its annual session.
- (8) The conditions of employment shall be determined by the Executive Board.

ARTICLE IX

DISSOLUTION: Should this association cease to function, all properties and holdings shall go to the National Association of Free Will Baptists after all creditors are satisfied and indebtedness cleared.

ARTICLE X

AMENDMENTS: This constitution may be amended or altered at any regular session of the association by a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of members present and voting, provided proposed amendment or alteration be presented in writing to the body one (1) day in advance.

ARTICLE XI

SPECIAL SESSIONS: Elected delegates to the last session of this association shall be retained as standing delegates for special called sessions.
