SPECIAL CALLED SESSION OF THE OKLAHOMA STATE ASSOCIATION OF FREE WILL BAPTISTS

A special called session of the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists met on the campus of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Saturday, March 16, 1996. The meeting was called to order by Clerk Keith Burden. He read the following statement:

"In the 1995 Minutes of the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists, the Constitution of this State Association states, under Article VIII, Section 1, Executive Board -

'Whereas this board represents the association when not in session, it and it alone shall have the power to call the association into special conference provided each affiliated association shall be given notice at least ten (10) days prior to the meeting of such special conference.'

The Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College Board of Trustees requested of the Executive Board that there be a called special session of the state association for the purpose of considering the need for immediate gift income for the college. The Executive Board has honored this request, and, in accordance with the constitution, notices were mailed to all our churches on March 1, 1996, informing them of the date, place and purpose of the meeting."

Harry Lee shared devotional thoughts from Luke 6:38 and led in prayer. Moderator David McDougal honored Brother Lee, welcomed delegates and visitors from other states, and read Ephesians 3:14-21.

Representatives from Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College gave reports about the various concerns and needs of the school. Speakers included: Trustee Board Chairman Jim Puckett, President Jim Shepherd, Vice President of Academic Affairs Tim Eaton, Public Relations Director Buddy Drake and Hillsdale student Greg Conner.

Following these reports, a number of churches and/or district associations pledged to give special gifts to Hillsdale which amounted to more than \$90,000.00

Motion and second to direct the Hillsdale Board of Trustees to hire a financial consultant to develop and implement a capital stewardship fund raising program. Motion carried to refer this item to the Trustee Board.

Motion carried that the State Association Executive Board be authorized to borrow the funds necessary to make the total special gift income to Hillsdale amounting to \$300,000.00

Motion carried to adjourn.

Board - 2 payments, and Hillsdale be responsible for the balance of the note." Motion carried to amend by deleting the statement - "and Hillsdale be responsible for the balance of the note." Motion carried to adopt the main motion as amended.

THE GENERAL BOARD REPORT

The General Board of the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists met October 14, 1996 at the Fountainhead State Lodge in Eufaula, Oklahoma. As a result of that meeting, we offer the following items for your consideration.

- 1. We received communication from twenty-three of the twenty-three District Associations comprising the membership of this body. We recommend their letters be received and their delegates seated.
- 2. We heard the reports of the Executive Board, Executive Secretary, Free Will Baptist Book Store, State Missions Board, Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, State Christian Education Board and the Historical Commission. We forward these reports to you for your consideration and refer the adoption of their budgets to the Budget Committee's recommendations.
- 3. We recommend that the State Executive Board be authorized to pursue the restructuring and relocation of the Book Store operations to the State Office and to make long range plans for this ministry. [Note: This includes the liquidation of current assets and the sale of the South Walker location.]
- 4. We recommend that the funds for the loan payments on the \$150,000.00 come from the following sources: The State Mission Board 12 payments, State C.E. Board 2 payments, and Hillsdale be responsible for the balance of the note.
- 5. We recommend that the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists authorize the Executive Secretary of the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists to head a task force for the purpose of proposing regional ownership of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College. The task force shall include the state moderators and executive secretaries of Oklahoma, Arkansas, Missouri, and Texas and two at-large members from each state to be appointed by the respective states.
- 6. As the Budget Committee, we recommend that a Cooperative Budget of \$380,000.00 be adopted for the 1997-1998 year.
- 7. As the Budget Committee, we recommend that the Cooperative Funds be distributed according to the following percentages:

State Executive Office (22%)	83,600.00
State Mission Board (15%)	57,000.00
Hillsdale College (33%)	125,400.00
Christian Education Board (6%)	22,800.00
National Ministries (24%)	91,200.00
TOTAL ALLOCATIONS (100%)	\$380,000.00

EXECUTIVE BOARD REPORT

We have enjoyed another good year and express our appreciation for the faithfulness of the churches in Oklahoma to the programs of our denomination.

Actions of the Executive Board for the year are as follows:

- 1. Approved an All Board Appreciation meal for the State Meeting
- 2. Purchased a fax machine for the State Office
- 3. Recommended that the State buy 1 acre of land in the amount of \$3,400.00 for FWBBC
- 4. Secured a loan in the amount of \$175,000.00 for the State Missions Project in El Reno
- 5. At the request of the Hillsdale Board of Trustees, called a special State Meeting for March 16, 1996
- 6. Borrowed \$150,000.00 for Hillsdale budget needs as voted by special called State Meeting. The loan is for 5 years at 7.5% interest. Payments began August 1, 1996 in the amount of \$3012.49 per month.

The Executive Board has three recommendations:

1. The cooperative budget for 1997-1998 remain at \$380,000.00 and that the allocations for state and national ministries be as follows:

- 3. We recommend that the funds for the loan payments on the \$150,000.00 note come from the following sources. The State Mission Board 12 payments, State C.E. Board 2 payments, and Hillsdale be responsible for the balance of the note.

STATE ASSOCIATION OF FREE WILL BAPTISTS NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS JUNE 30, 1996 AND 1995

(1) - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

General - The State Association of Free Will Baptists is a non-profit organization designed to provide central leadership and representation for the Free Will Baptists of Oklahoma and to handle certain receipts and disbursements of the Free Will Baptist Churches. The standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether Association uses fund accounting, whereby the net assets represents the equity the Association has in its assets.

The State Association governs the following auxiliary functions, the Oklahoma Free Will Baptist Bookstore, the Board of Church Extension, Missions and Evangelism,

and the Christian Education Board. Combined financial statements are not prepared for these functions because meaningful information would not result from presenting combined financial statements.

<u>Property and Equipment</u> - Property and equipment are recorded at cost. Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the related assets. Expenditures for repairs and maintenance are charged to operations when incurred while major betterments and renewals are capitalized.

The following useful lives were used to calculate depreciation:

Buildings 15 years

Building Improvements 10 to 15 years

Furniture, Fixtures & Equipment 5 years

(2) - NOTE RECEIVABLE

The State Association loaned the Oklahoma Free Will Baptist Bookstore \$35,000 in May 1994. The note receivable bears an interest rate of 6.5% and is unsecured. Monthly principal and interest payments of \$500 are received. The loan is expected to be repaid in May 1999. The following represents a summary of the principal maturities over the next three years:

(3) - DESIGNATED CONTRIBUTIONS PAYABLE

To provide timely payment of designated contributions to recipients, receipts through the 20th of each month are disbursed to recipients by the end of each month. The designated contributions payable consists of the total of designated contributions received between June 20 and June 30.

(4) - COOPERATIVE CONTRIBUTIONS AND EXPENDITURES

The State Association receives contributions to be cooperatively allocated among board approved organizations. The percentage allocation of Cooperative Contributions for the year ended June 30, 1996 and 1995 was as follows:

(5) - CONTINGENT LIABILITIES

The State Association has signed noted agreements as guarantor for several developing churches. Historically, none of these churches have defaulted on these note agreements and the State Association believes it is unlikely any of these will default on these loans in the future. However, should these churches become unable to meet their debt service, the State Association will be liable for payment of the debt. A complete listing of outstanding loans for Free Will Baptist Churches for which the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptist has guaranteed is not available.

(6) - LONG-TERM DEBT

The State Association is obligated as primary borrower on a promissory note to an individual in the amount of \$150,000. This debt is secured by a mortgage on the real estate and payable in monthly installments of \$3,012 including interest accruing at 7.5% beginning August, 1996. Principal payment maturities for the years ending June 30th are as follows:

(7) - CHANGE IN ACCOUNTING PRINCIPLES

The State Association elected to adopt Statement of Financial Accounting Standards (SFAS) No. 116, Accounting for Contributions and SFAS No. 117, Financial Statements for Not-for-Profit Organizations as of June 30, 1996. In accordance with SFAS No. 116, contributions received are recorded as unrestricted, temporarily restricted, or permanently restricted support depending on the existence and/or nature of any donor restrictions. Under SFAS No. 116, such contributions are required to be reported as temporarily restricted support and are then reclassified to unrestricted net assets upon fulfillment of the donor's specifications. Under SFAS No. 117, the State Association is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets, and permanently restricted net assets. In addition, the State Association is required to present a Statement of Cash Flows. As permitted by this new Statement, the State Association has discontinued its use of fund accounting and has, accordingly, reclassified its financial statements to present the three classes of net assets required.

(8) - RECLASSIFICATIONS

Certain accounts in the prior-year financial statements have been reclassified for comparative purposes to conform with the presentation in the current-year financial statements.

(1) SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

General - The financial statements of the Bookstore have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting, wherein income and expense are recorded as they are earned or incurred. The Bookstore does not combine their financial statements with those of the State Association of Free Will Baptists because meaningful information would not result from presenting combined financial statements.

<u>Inventories</u> - Inventories are recorded at the lower cost or market using the first-in, first-out method of accounting.

<u>Property and Equipment</u> - Property and equipment are recorded at cost. Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method based on the estimated useful lives of the related assets as summarized below:

Building and improvements Furniture, fixtures & equipment 40 years 3 to 10 years

Income Taxes - No provision for income taxes has been made as the Bookstore is a non-profit organization exempt from income tax under Section 501 © (3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

STATE MISSION BOARD REPORT

EL RENO: Major efforts this year have been directed toward the new building that was completed in April, 1996. This 7,420 sq. ft. building will seat over 200 in the sanctuary; has a kitchen and dining area; an upstairs over the educational facilities; classrooms and a pastor's office; baptistry; steeple; and concrete parking lot. The Mission Board made a 20 year loan for \$175,000 from Broadhurst Foundation for this building.

We are so grateful to the many individuals who worked on the building. A number of people from "Helping Hands Crew" came to help during hot days last summer. Special thanks to Garry Depperschmidt, Don Allen, and Pascal Bevans for their contributions in completing the plumbing, electrical, and heat & air conditioning. Our gratitude, also, to Gene and Danny Hawkins who spent many days doing tractor work on parking, landscaping, etc. A special thanks to Charles (Chuck) Wood for the months of hard labor he contributed in so many different areas.

A number of El Reno folks gave many days of labor and were so delightful to work with. Ladies from the church provided some wonderful meals for workers at different times. Pastor Homer Young put in more time than anyone else, often starting before daylight and working into the night. Mission Director Berton Perry, acted as builder and superintendent.

Brother Young reported that their Sunday morning worship average for the year was 46 and the highest attendance for any Sunday was 192. He hopes to reach an average of 100 as soon as possible. He feels that this number will give enough financial base to support all expenses, building payments, and pastor's salary.

ENID: During the year, six new families have been added to the church, seven were saved, and a number were rededicated. The average Sunday School attendance for the year was 37 and worship average was 57.

Pastor Bill Adcock and his wife Betty, have faced many health difficulties in their family since accepting the Enid Church. Both he and his wife are having health problems and each have learned recently that both of their fathers are seriously ill. Betty's father has been diagnosed with pancreatic cancer and Bill's father recently suffered a heart attack and was told he has congestive heart failure.

Please remember the Adcock family and the Enid Church during these trying times.

MISSION BOARD NEWS: The Mission Board was notified in June that State Mission Director Berton Perry resigned to accept a church in Arkansas.

Berton began serving in this position November 1, 1983. He has served as interim pastor of five missions during these years including: Bartlesville, Crystal Hills in Lawton, Fort Gibson, Hugo, and Enid, for a combined total of 29 months. He acted as builder and superintendent in constructing new buildings at Glenpool, Hugo, and El Reno. Carpentry repairs and additions were also conducted at Elk

City, Vinita, Weatherford, Enid and East Latimer in Tulsa, totaling 33 months.

Other ways he served included: scheduling itinerary services for Foreign, Home, and State Missionaries; serving as Board treasurer and bookkeeper, office secretary, promotional director (promoted in 246 Oklahoma churches during those years), fund raiser, and State Missionary advisor and counselor.

The Board plans to fill this position sometime in the future.

During our June Board meeting, we were told that in compliance with the called State Association meeting in March, the State Executive Board borrowed \$150, 000 for Hillsdale. Our Board voted that beginning August 1, 1996, we will make the \$3012.49 monthly payments on this money borrowed for Hillsdale for a period of up to one year or until a new Mission Director is secured.

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists Board of Church Extension, Missions and Evangelism (the Mission Board) is an auxiliary function of the State Association of Free Will Baptists created to assist in the establishment

of Free Will Baptist churches in the state of Oklahoma. The Mission Board does not combine their financial statements with those of the State Association of Free Will Baptist.

To ensure observance of certain constraints and restrictions placed on the use of resources, the accounts are maintained in accordance with the principles of fund accounting. Net assets, representing resources to be utilized for various purposes, are classified for accounting and reporting purposes in accordance with the nature of the donors' restrictions, when applicable.

The Board's policy is to prepare its financial statements on the cash basis of accounting; consequently, certain revenues are recognized when received rather than when earned, and certain expenses are recognized when cash is disbursed rather than when the obligation is incurred. There are no material receivables/payables at year end.

The Board is exempt from federal and state income taxation under Section $501\mathbb{O}$ (3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

Salaries and benefits represent amounts paid to Mission Church ministers. Restricted cash represents unexpended restricted donations.

As of June 30, 1995, the Board elected to adopt Statement of Financial Accounting Standards (SFAS) No. 117, Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Organizations. Under SFAS No. 117, the Board is required to report information regarding its assets and liabilities and support, revenue and expenses according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets, and permanently restricted net assets. The Board has reclassified its financial statements to present the three classes of net assets required. This reclassification had no effect on net assets for the year ended June 30, 1996.

Wise planning, fiscal responsibility, and diligent work-these are the commitments that the college makes to Oklahoma Free Will Baptists. But, caution cannot exclude the willingness to dream and to take the risks that will lead Hillsdale into its most glorious days.

The partnership between Hillsdale Free Will Baptists has produced an impact on our world that far exceeds what might be expected of a small college. The question, "Is it worth it?", is a worthy consideration, and the answer is "Yes!" Nearly forty years ago, Oklahoma Free Will Baptists decided that they could not afford to neglect the training of our youth for life and service in God's kingdom, and God has blessed that decision. May we continue in partnership for the cause of Christ and Christian higher education.

Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement.

The management of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College is responsible for establishing and maintaining an internal control structure. In fulfilling this responsibility, estimates and judgments by management are required to assess the expected benefits and related costs of internal control policies and procedures. The objectives of an internal control structure are to provide management with reasonable, but not absolute, assurance that assets are safeguarded against loss from unauthorized use or disposition, and that transactions are executed in accordance with management's authorization and recorded properly to permit the preparation of financial statements in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. Because of inherent limitations in any internal control structure, errors, irregularities, or instances of noncompliance may nevertheless occur and not be detected. Also, projection of any evaluation of the structure of future periods is subject to the risk that procedures may become inadequate because of changes in conditions or that the effectiveness of the design and operation of policies and procedures may deteriorate.

In planning and performing our audit of the basic financial statements of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College for the year ended June 30, 1996, we obtained an understanding of the College's internal control structure. With respect to the internal control structure, we obtained an understanding of the design of relevant policies and procedures and whether they have been placed in operation, and we assessed control risk in order to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the basic financial statements and not to provide an opinion on the internal control structure. Accordingly, we do no express such an opinion.

Our consideration of the internal control structure would not necessarily disclose all matters in the internal control structure that might be reportable conditions and, accordingly, would not necessarily disclose all reportable conditions that are also considered to be material weaknesses.

We also noted other matters involving the internal control structure and its operation that we have reported to the management of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, in a separate letter dated August 16, 1996.

HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS JUNE 30, 1996 AND 1995

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

General - The significant accounting policies followed by the Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College (the College) are described below to enhance the usefulness of the financial statements to the reader.

Accrual Basis - The financial statements of the Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting. The statement of current funds revenues, expenditures, and other changes is a statement of financial activities of current funds related to the current reporting period. It does not purport to present the results of operations or the net income or loss for the period as would a statement of income or a statement of revenues and expenses.

Fund Accounting - To ensure observation of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of the available resources, the accounts of the College are maintained in accordance with principles of "fund accounting." This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds that are in accordance with activities or objectives specified. Separate accounts are maintained for each funds. However, in the accompanying financial statements, funds that have similar characteristics have been combined into fund groups. Accordingly, all financial transactions have been recorded and reported by fund group.

Investment in plant - Investments recorded in the plant are recorded at cost. Depreciation is calculated using the straight-line method over estimated useful lives of assets as summarized below:

Buildings 20 to 50 years
Land Improvements 20 years
Equipment 3 - 15 years
Library Books 10 years

Tax Exempt Status - The College is exempt from income taxation under Internal Revenue Code Section 501 © (3).

Cash - For purposes of the statement of cash flows, cash includes cash on hand and cash in checking and savings accounts of the current unrestricted and temporarily restricted funds.

Implementation of FAS #116 and #117 - The College has implemented FAS #116 which among other things distinguishes between contributions that increase permanently restricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets, and unrestricted net assets. The College has also implemented FAS #117, which requires the three basic financial statements presented and the schedule of functional expenses. The College has classified gifts where the donor has imposed restrictions as either permanently restricted or temporarily restricted net assets of the current fund. Endowment funds by nature are permanently restricted. Loan funds and grant funds are not classified into the three classes.

NOTE 2 - INVESTMENTS

Investments are recorded at cost. As of June 30, 1996 and 1995, investments of the current permanently restricted funds were composed of the following:

NOTE 3 - PERKINS LOAN FUND

The loan fund reflects activity with respect to the Perkins Student Loan program which is funded primarily by the Department of Education. The College provides matching funds equal to one-ninth of the federal funds received.

NOTE 4 - ENDOWMENT FUND

During the fiscal year ended June 30, 1983, the governing board of the College determined that certain funds were to be retained and invested as an endowment. The board stipulated that the principal is to remain invested and the interest income is to be placed in the current unrestricted fund. Gifts to the Endowment Fund totaled \$1,095 and \$1,752 for fiscal year ending June 30, 1996 and 1995, respectively.

NOTE 6 - CURRENT FUND BORROWING

Loans from the Current Restricted Fund and from the Endowment Fund were made to cover negative cash flows in the Current Unrestricted Fund at various times during the last six fiscal years. As of June 30, 1996, all funds borrowed from the Current Restricted Fund had been fully repaid from Current Unrestricted Fund, however, the Current Unrestricted Fund was indebted to the Endowment Fund for \$137,500.

NOTE 7 - TAX SHELTERED ANNUITY PROGRAM

The College offers a tax sheltered annuity program to its permanent employees under Internal Revenue Code Section 403 (b). Employees can make elected contributions and the College matches up to 5% of the employees salary. For the year ending June 30, 1996 and 1995, the College made matching contributions of \$21,600 and \$15,872, respectively to the participants accounts.

NOTE 8 - LOANS TO STUDENTS

During fiscal years ended June 30, 1996 and 1995, the College made loans to students from temporarily restricted donations. Proceeds from the repayment of these loans will be used for future student loans.

OKLAHOMA FREE WILL BAPTIST CHRISTIAN EDUCATION BOARD REPORT

The Christian Education Board ministered to the needs of Oklahoma Free Will Baptist through seven different events this past year. There were over 2,300 in attendance with several saved and a number of rededications and decisions.

Our 2nd Great Youth Escape was held in two cities on September 9, 1995. The First Free Will Baptist Church of McAlester hosted 127 teens and juniors with Randall Ray and Greg Cleveland speaking to these young people. The New Home Free Will Baptist Church of Tulsa was the site of 230 young people who heard Bro. Toby Youngblood speak to the teens while the juniors heard Bro. Danny Phillips. Three "escapes" are planned, at press time, for September 14, 1996.

Fountainhead Resort, on Lake Eufaula, was the site of the State Youth Conference. It was held on December 28-29, 1995 with Roy Dale Smith, Brad Ransom, Russell Payne and Joey Wilson speaking at the four different sessions. There were 315 in attendance this year.

Our seventh Teen Leadership Conference was held at the Rejoice Free Will Baptist Church in Owasso. Jerry Kasse, Joe Grizzle and Scot Bullman spoke to the teens on the different topics of leadership. There were 43 teens in attendance. The conference was held March 8-9, 1996.

The Senior Adult Retreat continues to be one of our most exciting events of the year. This year it also showed the greatest increase in attendance. Bill Jones and J.C. Morgan preached and the Oklahoma Minister's Quartet sang to 200 senior adults. The retreat was held at Western Hills Lodge, near Wagoner, on March 18-20, 1996.

The 1996 State C.T.S. competition was held on the campus of O.B.U. on May 11, 1996. Over 600 people competed or observed 202 entries compete. Oklahoma was represented by 82 entries at the National Youth Conference held in Fort Worth, TX on July 21-24, 1996. Katie Beam, from the Bethany Free Will Baptist Church, was selected for the National Youth Evangelistic Team. Katie was also selected as the female young person of the year. The youth group from Norman First Free Will Baptist Church was selected as Youth Group of the Year at the National. Bro. Joey Wilson is their Youth Pastor. Congratulations to both Katie and this Youth Group.

State Youth Camp was held June 17-21, 1996 at the Kiamichi Baptist Association Campgrounds. Once again we were able to combine the juniors and teens into one week. A total of 667 campers and sponsors attended camp this year. Bruce Bennett preached for the Junior camp while Collision Ministries (Kevin Riggs, Evangelist; Mike Hollifield, Music) conducted the teen services. Thirtynine young people were saved and made other decisions for Christ.

The Oklahoma Land Run is still underway. Many of our young people are raising and saving money for this important mission project. We made our first disbursement of those funds this year:

\$5,000 going to the orphanage in Brazil

\$2,500 going to the land fund in Overland Park, KS \$2,500 going to the El Reno Mission Church

We challenge all of our young people to get involved in this mission project.

Paul Allen is no longer serving the board as promotional secretary or as a technical advisor. We appreciate all that Paul did for our board during the years he served on the board and was employed by the board.

We are thankful for all the Lord's blessings on our ministry this past year. We desire your prayers and your input.

OKLAHOMA FREE WILL BAPTIST CHRISTIAN EDUCATION BOARD OF DIRECTORS INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT August 26, 1996

We have audited the accompanying statement of assets, liabilities, and net assets - cash basis of the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists Christian Education Board (the Board) as of June 30, 1996 and 1995, and the related statements of revenues, expenses, and other changes in net assets - cash basis for the years then ended. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Board's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audits.

We conducted our audits in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audits provide a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As described in Note 1, these financial statements were prepared on the cash basis of accounting, which is a comprehensive basis of accounting other than generally accepted accounting principles.

As further discussed in Note 4 to the financial statements, during the year ended June 30, 1996 the Board changed its method of accounting for contributions and its method of financial reporting and financial statement presentation.

OKLAHOMA FREE WILL BAPTIST CHRISTIAN EDUCATION BOARD NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS JUNE 30, 1996 AND 1996

(1) SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists Christian Education Board is an auxiliary function of the State Association of Free Will Baptists created to assist in the establishment of Free Will Baptist churches in the state of Oklahoma. The Christian Education Board does not combine their financial statements with those of the State Association of Free Will Baptists because meaningful information would not result from presenting combined financial statements.

To ensure observance of certain constraints and restrictions placed on the use of resources, the accounts are maintained in accordance with the principles of fund accounting. Net assets, representing resources to be utilized for various purposes, are classified for accounting and reporting purposes in accordance with the nature of the donors' restrictions, when applicable.

The Board's policy is to prepare its financial statements on the cash basis of accounting; consequently, certain revenues are recognized when received rather than when earned, and certain expenses are recognized when cash is paid rather than when the obligation is incurred. There were no material receivables or payables at year end.

Equipment items are recorded at cost. Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the related assets, which is 3 years. Expenditures for repairs and maintenance are charged to operations when incurred while major betterments and renewals are capitalized.

The Board is exempt from federal and state income taxation under Section 501 (c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

The Board receives a percentage of the cooperative giving program sponsored by the State Association of Free Will Baptists.

Restricted cash represents unexpended restricted donations.

(2) RESTRICTED FUNDS

The Board sponsored a fund raising program and received \$7,772 of restricted contributions. The purpose of the contributions is for missions.

(3) RECLASSIFICATIONS

Certain accounts in the prior-year financial statements have been reclassified for comparative purposes to conform with the presentation in the current-year financial statements.

(4) CHANGE IN ACCOUNTING PRINCIPLES

The State Association elected to adopt Statement of Financial Accounting Standards (SFAS) No. 116, Accounting for Contributions and SFAS No. 117, Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Organizations as of June 30, 1996. In accordance with SFAS No. 116, contributions received are recorded as unrestricted, temporarily restricted, or permanently restricted support depending on the existence and/or nature of any donor restrictions. Under SFAS No. 116, such contributions are required to be reported as temporarily restricted support and are then reclassified to unrestricted net assets upon fulfillment of the donor's specifications. Under SFAS No. 117, the State Association is required to report information regarding its financial position activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets, and permanently restricted net assets. This reclassification had no effect on net assets for the year ended June 30, 1996. In addition, the State Association to present a Statement of Cash Flows. As permitted by this new Statement, the State Association has discontinued its use of fund accounting and has, accordingly, reclassified its financial statements to present the three classes of net assets required.

HISTORICAL COMMISSION REPORT

The primary purpose of the Historical Commission is to collect and preserve important historical information about Free Will Baptists, and particularly about Free Will Baptists in Oklahoma. The Commission also seeks to encourage research and writing in Free Will Baptist history.

The Historical Commission had one official meeting this year to review our progress and make plans for next year. During this past year we continued collecting past and present copies of national, state, and district minutes. We have also collected copies of Contact, Heartbeat, The Promoter, and other Free Will Baptist publications. We also obtained a rack which can be used for storing cassette tapes of historical interest. During the past year, the secretary has

responded to requests for information from several individuals. Generally these requests come from people who want to know what information the Historical Commission has on a particular subject.

During 1996-97 we plan to work on the following projects.

- 1. We plan to work with Mrs. Nancy Draper, Director of the Hillsdale Learning Resource Center, to develop written guidelines for collecting, preserving, and using the historical materials in the historical collection.
- 2. We plan to continue expanding our collection of state and district minutes from Oklahoma. We have a list of minutes which are lacking in the collection, and we invited Free Will Baptists to donate any of these minutes which they may have to the collection.
- 3. We plan to continue collecting historical information about Oklahoma Free Will Baptists, local churches, and district associations to be included in the vertical file. Free Will Baptists are encouraged to donate any type of written historical information which can be included in the file.
- 4. We plan to write every district clerk in Oklahoma encouraging him or her to send a copy of the district minutes to the historical commission each year.
- 5. We plan to encourage local churches and associations to prepare histories. We will certainly make any information we have available to them. We would like to have a copy of the written history to be included in the historical collections.
- 6. We need some help from Free Will Baptists in arranging and organizing the historical collection. If you have some time you would like to donate to this project, please contact the secretary.

We have not spent any funds this past year, but we will need some funds to complete the projects we are planning for next year. We request a budget of \$500.00 again this year. These funds are to come through the state office budget.

THE FREE WILL BAPTIST MASTER' MEN State of Oklahoma

CONSTITUTION

Section 1. The executive committee shall consist of the elected officers of this organization and they shall serve as the program committee for each annual convention.

Section 2. Ex-officio members of the executive committee shall be the presidents of the district associations of Master's Men, presidents of any local chapter where there is only one chapter int he district, and the state executive secretary of the State Association of Free Will Baptists.

ARTICLE V MEETINGS

This organization shall meet annually at 7:30 p.m. on Monday night before the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists convenes.

ARTICLE VI AMENDMENTS

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of any regular meeting.

BY-LAWS

VOTING RIGHTS

Section 1. Every member of each affiliated district association, or any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district, is eligible to vote on all questions and matters that might come before the Free Will Baptist Master's Men, State of Oklahoma.

COMMITTEES

Section 2. The executive committee shall transact all routine business and shall act for the organization in the interim between meetings.

Section 3. The executive committee shall meet at the call of the president.

Section 4. A nominating committee, for the annual election of officers, shall be composed of the presidents of each district association, and the president of any local chapter where there is only one chapter in the district.

Section 5. The president shall appoint all other committees, subject to the approval of the body.

FINANCE -

Section 6. This organization shall be financed on the basis of offerings, dues and assessments.

QUORUM

Section 7. One-tenth of the members of this organization shall constitute a quorum at any regular meeting.

AMENDMENTS

Section 8. These by-laws may be amended at any regular meeting by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

As adopted by the Free Will Baptist Master's Men, State of Oklahoma, annual session in Muskogee, Oklahoma, October 19, 1970.

MINISTER'S CONFERENCE

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I

The Minister's Conference shall be called the Oklahoma State Free Will Baptist Minister's Conference, and shall be composed of Ordained Free Will Baptist Ministers who are regular member of some orthodox Free Will Baptist Church in the State of Oklahoma who have paid their dues.

ARTICLE II

The officers of this conference shall be President, Vice-President, and Clerk-Treasurer, who shall be elected annually.

ARTICLE III

This conference shall have the power to discipline its members.

ARTICLE IV

Members of this organization shall be ordained ministers who participate in the benefits and activities of this body, and associate members who become members by payment of the annual dues.

ARTICLE V

This conference shall meet annually.

ARTICLE VI

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any regular session.

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I

The clerk or assistant clerk, or in their absence the senior minister in years, shall call the ministers into conference. If a quorum is present, the President or in his absence, the Vice-President, shall moderate the meeting. If neither of those are present, the senior minister in years shall be in charge.

ARTICLE II

It shall be the duty of the clerk to enroll ministers of the conference. Ministers shall present themselves with proper evidence of their rights to seats therein, and those enrolled by the clerk shall compose the conference. In case of questionable representation, the case under question shall be referred to the Credential Committee.

ARTICLE III

It shall be the duty of each minister belonging to this conference, to be active in pastoral or evangelistic services (disabled or retired ministers excepted). Any minister belonging to this conference shall report in each session in person or by letter, and failing to do so for two successive sessions shall be subject to discipline.

ARTICLE IV

Each conference shall be opened by reading a portion of God's word and prayer, and each session shall be closed with prayer.

ARTICLE V

By two-thirds vote of the members present, ruling of the President may be overruled.

ARTICLE VI

This conference shall sit with open doors, except when it shall go into a committee as a whole.

ARTICLE VII

No member shall be absent himself from the conference during its meeting without permission from the President.

ARTICLE VIII

No person shall be allowed to nominate more than one member of a committee, unless person nominated is not elected.

ARTICLE IX

The President shall not allow discussion when not carried on in a Christian spirit, or when he thinks it will cause discord.

ARTICLE X

Anyone desiring to speak shall arise and address the President by appellation "Brother President", but shall not speak further until recognized.

ARTICLE XI

No member of this conference shall be allowed to speak more than five minutes, nor twice on the same subject without permission from the President.

ARTICLE XII

These By-Laws may be altered or amended at any regular or adjourned session of this conference by a two-thirds vote of members present.

AMENDED AND RESTATED BYLAWS OF HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE, INC.

These Amended and Restated Bylaws were duly adopted by the Board of Trustees, in its regular meeting held on May 5, 1994, pursuant to Section VII of the original Bylaws, and amend in their entirety the original Bylaws which were heretofore adopted.

ARTICLE I POWERS OF TRUSTEES

Section 1.

The Board of Trustees shall have the power to manage the property and business of the Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc. (referred to in this and the following articles as the "College") and shall have the power to carry out any other functions which are permitted by the Charter, or these Bylaws, except insofar as such powers may be limited by law. These powers shall include but shall not be limited to the following:

- (I) Appoint or remove the President and/or other officers of the College in accordance with these Bylaws;
- (ii) Approve degrees in courses upon recommendations of the faculty;
- (iii) Approve the awarding of honorary degrees upon recommendation of any of the following: Faculty, President, or appropriate Board committee;
- (iv) Establish and review the educational programs of the College after review by the Board Committee on Academic Affairs, or by special committees of review set up by the President and Chairman of the Board in a financial emergency situation;
- (v) Establish annually the budget of the College, which shall be submitted to it upon recommendation of the Board Business Affairs Committee;
- (vi) Authorize the construction of new buildings and major renovations of existing buildings;
- (vii) Authorize the sale and purchase of land, buildings or major equipment for the use of the College;
 - (viii) Institute and promote the major fund-raising efforts of the College;
 - (ix) Authorize any changes in tuition and fees within the College;
 - (x) Authorize officers or agents of the College to accept gifts for the College;
- (XI) Authorize the incurring of debts by the College and securing thereof by mortgage and pledge of the real, personal, tangible and/or intangible property;

(ix) Any other duties or responsibilities which obtain to it under the Charter of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc.

Section 2.

The Board of Trustees of the College shall not launch any expansion project, major expenditure of capital funds, creation of debt for capital needs, or any significant change in usual operations except upon prior authority given by the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists or the Executive Board thereof.

ARTICLE II MEMBERSHIP OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Section 1.

The Board of Trustees of the College shall consist of seventeen (17) members. Ten (10) of the members shall be elected by the delegates to the annual convention of The Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists, each of which shall serve for a term of five (5) years and until his/her successor is duly elected and qualified. These members shall serve staggering terms such that two (2) members shall be elected at each annual convention of The Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists. The remaining seven (7) members shall be elected by the following State Associations of Free Will Baptists and shall serve for such terms as may be established by their respective state associations, to wit: Arkansas, two (2) members; Missouri, three (3) members; and Texas, two (2) members.

Section 2.

Vacancies of the Board of Trustees shall occur through resignation, ceasing to be a resident of the state by which he/she is elected, death of a trustee, or as the result of his/her inability or failure to act. Should a vacancy on the Board of Trustees occur during the interval between the annual sessions of the State Association by which the trustee has been elected, the vacancy may be filled at the next annual session of such State Association, by the Executive Board of such State Association, or as may be otherwise prescribed or directed by such State Association.

In the event any member misses two (2) consecutive meetings of the Board of Trustees without giving advance notification to the office of the President of the College, the member shall be considered as having resigned.

Section 3.

No person shall be eligible for election prior to attaining the age of twenty-one (21) years.

Section 4.

Any member of the Board of Trustees may be removed from office, for cause, by action of the State Association, or Executive Board thereof, which elected such member.

ARTICLE III OFFICERS OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES AND HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE, INC.

Section 1.

The officers of the Board of Trustees shall consist of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, Vice-Chairman, Secretary, and Assistant Secretary, all of whom shall be elected annually by the Board of Trustees. For the purpose of executing legal documents in compliance with Oklahoma Law, the office of Chairman of the Board of Trustees shall be synonymous with the office of President of the Corporation, Vice Chairman with the office of Vice President of the Corporation, and Secretary with the office of Secretary of the Corporation, and Assistant Secretary with the office of Assistant Secretary of the Corporation.

Section 2.

All officers of the Board of Trustees shall hold office as such officer for a period of one year, or until their successors are duly elected and qualified.

Section 3.

The President of the College shall be an ex officio member of the Board without power to vote and shall not be counted as a member of the Board, or any committee on which he/she may serve, for any purpose. The Vice President of Business Affairs of the College shall serve as Treasurer of the Corporation and as such shall be an ex officio member of the Board without power to vote and shall not be counted a member of the Board or any committee on which he may serve for any purpose.

Section 4.

The Board may appoint one or more vice chairmen, assistant secretaries, and such other officers as may be deemed necessary for the proper management of the affairs of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc.

Section 5.

All officers of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc. shall hold office at the discretion of the Board of Trustees and shall be subject to removal by affirmative vote of a majority of the entire membership of the Board of Trustees, without prejudice to any contract rights such officer may have against the College.

ARTICLE IV POWERS AND DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1.

The Chairman of the Board of Trustees shall preside at all meetings of the Board of Trustees, sign all deeds, contracts, bonds, mortgages, and other papers evidencing the official acts of the Board of Trustees where the signature of a presiding officer is required by these Bylaws or by custom or practice, and he/she shall call all special meetings of the Board of Trustees, give notice of the time and place of all meetings of the Board of Trustees as herein provided, appoint all committees and generally exercise such authority as is usually exercised by a chairman or president of the Board of Trustees of a non-profit corporation. He/She shall also perform any other and further duties as may be assigned to the Chairman by the Board of Trustees.

Section 2.

The Vice Chairman of the Board of Trustees shall perform all the duties of the office of Chairman of the Board of Trustees in the absence of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, or as a result of the inability of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees to act because of sickness, misfortune, casualty, or emergency absence.

Section 3.

The Secretary of the Board of Trustees shall keep minutes of the meetings of the Board, issue, or cause to be issued, notices of meetings under the direction of the Chairman, have charge of the seal of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc. and affix attest the same to all instruments which may require that the

corporate seal be affixed; and shall perform the duties usually performed by a secretary of the Board of Trustees of a non-profit corporation. He/She shall also perform any other duties which may be assigned to the Secretary by the Board of Trustees.

Section 4.

The Secretary of the Board of Trustees, with the approval of the Board of Trustees and the President of the College, may authorize an officer of the College and/or a person other than the Secretary of the Board of Trustees to affix the corporate seal to any diploma, transcript, or other instrument having to do with the administration of the affairs of the College, and to exercise the administration of the affairs of the College, and to exercise the same authority with regard to the affixing of the corporate seal to such instrument as may be exercised by the Secretary of the Board of Trustees.

Section 5.

The Assistant Secretary shall perform all the duties of the Secretary of the Board of Trustees in the absence of the Secretary, or in the event of the inability of the Secretary to attend a meeting of the Board of Trustees, or as a result of the inability of the Secretary to act because of sickness, misfortune, casualty, or emergency.

Section 6.

The Treasurer shall be the Chief Financial Officer of the College and shall be, as Treasurer, an ex officio member of the Board of Trustees without power to vote and shall not be counted as a member of the Board. He/She shall have the duty to keep, or cause to be kept, full and accurate accounts of all receipts and disbursements and to follow the directives of the Trustees, the President of the College and the Business Affairs Committee respecting funds, property, and accounts of the College. He/She shall be responsible for the preparation of any corporate financial reports as may be required by departments of federal or state government. The Treasurer shall, in the name of the College, give receipts for monies or property as shall be required, deposit funds in accordance with resolution and direction of the Business Affairs Committee or the Board of Trustees, and safeguard the money of the College. He/She shall not pay out any money except by direction of the Board of Trustees or under such regulations or with such approval as the Business Affairs Committee may prescribe. He/She shall cooperate with any independent auditors or certified public accountants retained by the Board of Trustees for the purpose of conducting audits of the accounts of the College, and shall make reports at meetings of the Board of Trustees or the Business Affairs Committee with respect to the financial condition of the College

at such time and in such form as the Board or the Committee may require. The Treasurer shall give a bond to the College to faithfully perform the duties of his/her office, and to account for all monies and other matters and things which may come into his/her hands and possession by virtue of said office, in such amount as the Business Affairs Committee shall direct.

ARTICLE V POWERS AND DUTIES OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE COLLEGE

Section 1.

The affairs of the College shall be administered by the President of the College, who shall be elected by the Board of Trustees and hold office at the pleasure of the Board of Trustees. The Board of Trustees shall adopt a system of periodic evaluations for the purpose of evaluating the performance of the President and to, among other things, set the salary and compensation for the President for a term acceptable to the Board and the President.

Section 2.

The President of the College shall be the Chief Executive and Operational Officer of the College and the official adviser to, and executive agent of, the Board of Trustees and its Executive Committee. He/She shall, as educational and administrative head of the College, exercise a general superintendence over all the affairs of the institution, and bring such matters to the attention of the Board as are appropriate to keep the Board fully informed to meet its policy-making responsibilities. He/She shall have power, on behalf of the Trustees, to perform all acts and execute all documents to make effective the actions of the Board or its Executive Committee. Except as otherwise provided in these Bylaws, he/she shall be an ex officio member of all committees of the Board without power to vote.

Section 3.

The President of the College shall have the power and authority to appoint officers to assist him/her in the administration of the affairs of the College, including such officers as Vice Presidents, Deans, Directors, Treasurers, Registrars, and their assistants. The officers so appointed by the President of the College shall hold office for such periods of time as the President determines, and the tenure of office shall be subject to the will of the President and the contractual employment procedures of the Administrative and Staff Handbook then in force.

Section 4.

The members of the faculty of the College shall be recommended by the President of the College and elected by the Board of Trustees annually, and the members of the faculty, when their election has been confirmed by the Board of Trustees, shall hold office subject to the rules of the existing contractual employment which have been approved by the Board of Trustees in the Faculty Handbook then in force. Nominations of faculty members, however, may be made by the President of the College and confirmed by the Board of Trustees at any regular or special meeting.

Section 5.

In the event the office of President of the College becomes vacant, a Presidential Search Committee of three trustees shall be elected at a meeting of the Board prior to which two weeks notice has been given concerning this needed action. The committee, at least two of whom shall have at least four (4) years of consecutive service, shall be elected by open nomination from the floor. If the Chairman of the Board of Trustees is not one of the three trustees elected, he/she shall join the Presidential Search Committee as a voting member.

The Search Committee shall notify, in writing, all members of the Board of Trustees of the dates and times of the on-campus visit of any prospective candidates. A resume of the candidate shall accompany the notification. Members of the Board of Trustees shall have opportunity to participate in the on-campus visit. Before the Search Committee presents a candidate for election, an informal meeting of the candidate and the Board of Trustees shall be held.

ARTICLE VI MEETINGS

Section 1.

All regular meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be held at the campus of the College in Moore, Oklahoma. The Board of Trustees shall hold at least three meetings each year and such other special meetings as may be called by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, or, in his absence from the state of Oklahoma, by the Vice Chairman of the Board of Trustees. The first meeting shall be held in September or October on a date selected by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, at which time the Board of Trustees shall receive reports and conduct any and all other business which it may desire to consider concerning the affairs of the College or its own affairs. The second meeting shall be held on a date selected by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees in November or December, at which time the

Board of Trustees shall orient newly-elected trustees, receive reports, and consider any and all other business which the Board of Trustees may desire to transact. The third meeting shall be held on a date selected by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees in February, at which time the Board of Trustees shall elect the faculty of the College, adopt an annual budget, receive reports, and consider any and all other business which the Board of Trustees may desire to transact. The dates of regular meetings and of all special meetings and the hour and place thereof shall be selected by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, and notice thereof shall be mailed to each trustee not less than seven days before the meeting. Notice of the time and place of all special meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be mailed to each trustee in such time and manner as the Chairman of the Board of Trustees deems reasonable and proper, except as hereinafter provided for amendment to the Bylaws. Notice of special meetings shall include a brief summary of the purpose of the meeting and the business expected to come before it.

Section 2.

The presence of at least fifty percent of the Board of Trustees shall constitute a quorum and be sufficient to enable the Board of Trustees to pass any resolution or motion, receive reports or recommendations, and transact any business which may properly come before it.

Section 3.

The meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be in accordance with and governed by parliamentary law, insofar as is practicable, as set forth in Robert's Rules of Order.

Section 4.

No notice of the time, place, or purpose of any meeting of the Board of Trustees, except for amendment of the Bylaws, whether prescribed by law, by the Charter of the Bylaws, need be given to any member of the Board who attends in person, or who in writing, executed and filed with the records of the meeting either before or after the holding thereof, waives such notice.

ARTICLE VII ACTION WITHOUT FORMAL MEETING

Section 1.

Any action required or permitted to be taken by the Board of Trustees or by any committee thereof may be taken without a formal meeting. Meetings may

be conducted by mail, telegram, cable, teleconference, or in any other way the Trustees shall decide. However, a written consent setting forth the action so taken and signed by at least two-thirds of the members of the Board or of a committee, as the case may be, must be filed with the minutes of the proceedings of the Board or of the committee.

ARTICLE VIII COMMITTEES

Section 1.

There may be special or ad hoc committees as the Board of Trustees may from time to time establish for the discharge of particular duties.

Section 2.

There shall be the standing committees specified in this Article. Members and chairmen of standing committees shall be appointed by the Chairman of the Board after consultation with the President annually at. or following, the November or December meeting of the Board of Trustees. Except as provided in these Bylaws, the Chairman of the Board and the President of the College shall be ex officio members of all standing committees, and each standing committee shall include at least three additional Trustees. Except where otherwise provided in this Article, additional ex officio members, including persons who are not on the Board of Trustees, may be enlisted as resource persons. However, the chairman of each standing committee and a majority of its members shall be Trustees.

Section 3.

The Board of Trustees may at any time discontinue any of its standing committees for such time as may be determined, and the duties of any committee so discontinued shall be performed during such discontinuance by the Executive Committee.

Section 4.

The chairman of any committee, with the consent of the Chairman of the Board, may request the President of the College to appoint an administrative officer of the College or a member of the administrative staff to serve as a liaison between the committee and the office of the President. Such liaison person shall assist the committee in the carrying out of its duties.

Section 5.

Except as provided in this section, all standing committees shall meet at least two times annually.

Section 6.

The Board of Trustees shall be organized in the following committees:

- (I) The Executive Committee. The Executive Committee shall consist of the Chairman, Vice Chairman, and Secretary of the Board. The presence of at least 50 percent of the members of the Executive Committee shall constitute a quorum. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to advise with the President of the College concerning affairs of the College when the Board of Trustees is not in session, to make recommendations to the Board of Trustees, and to perform such duties as may be referred to it by the Board of Trustees. The Executive Committee shall at all times be subject to and governed by the Board of Trustees of the College.
- Administrative Committees. There shall be four standing (ii) administrative committees of the Board: Academic Affairs Committee, Business Affairs Committee, Development Committee, and Student Affairs Committee. The committees and their chairmen shall be appointed by the Chairman of the Board in consultation with the President of the College. The Administrative Committees shall receive reports from policies administrative officers and consider recommendations regulating the life and function of the College.
- (iii) Academic Affairs Committee. The Academic Affairs Committee shall be composed of at least three Board of Trustee members. It shall, in cooperation with the President and Vice President of Academic Affairs, study and appraise the quality of the academic program, measure the program relative to other comparable institutions in terms of teaching load, class size, student-faculty ratios, instructional expenditures, research programs, and other relevant factors; formulate desirable short and long range enrollment goals, advise the Business Affairs Committee on the specifications and requirements for financing the academic programs, recommend salary, pension, and other personnel policies concerning the academic and faculty personnel, review matters affecting the faculty of the College, consider proposals on such matters, and report and make a recommendation thereon to the Board of Trustees as may be required.

- (iv) Business Affairs Committee. The Business Affairs Committee shall be composed of at least three Board of Trustees members. It shall review annual operating and capital budgets prepared and presented under the direction of the President and Vice President of Business Affairs, and shall make recommendations with respect thereto to the Board of Trustees. It shall review major financial transactions not provided for in the budget and submit proposed variances with recommendations to the Board of Trustees or Executive Committee. The Vice President of Business Affairs shall be an ex officio member of the Business Affairs Committee, without power to vote, and shall not be counted as a member of the Committee for any purpose.
- (v) Student Affairs Committee. The Student Affairs Committee shall be composed of at least three Board of Trustee members. It shall review matters affecting students of the College, other than those relating to the academic program, consider proposals on such matters, and report and make recommendations thereon to the Board of Trustees as may be required.
- (vi) Development Committee. The Development Committee shall be composed of at least three Board of Trustee members. It shall review and recommend student recruitment, fund-raising and public relations programs, and report to the Business Affairs Committee on recruitment and fund-raising progress and estimates of income to be received therefrom. It shall report on its activities at meetings of the Board of Trustees.

ARTICLE IX INDEMNIFICATION

Each Trustee and Officer of the College shall be indemnified by it against all expenses actually and necessarily incurred by such Trustee or Officer in connection with the defense of any action, suit, or proceeding to which he/she has been made a party by reason of being or having been such Trustee or Officer except in relation to matters as to which such Trustee or Officer shall be adjudicated in such action, suit, or proceeding to be liable for gross negligence or willful misconduct in the performance of duty.

ARTICLE X CONFLICTS OF INTERESTS

A Trustee shall be considered to have a conflict of interest if (a) such Trustee has existing or potential financial or other interests which impair or might reasonably appear to impair such members' independent, unbiased judgment in the discharge of his/her responsibilities to the College, or (b) such Trustee is aware that

a member of his/her family (which for purposes of this paragraph shall be a spouse, parents, siblings, children, and any other relative if the latter resides in the same household as the Trustee), or any organization in which such Trustee (or member of his/her family) is an officer, director, employee, member, partner, trustee, or controlling stockholder, has such existing or potential financial or other interests. All Trustees shall disclose to the Board any possible conflict of interest at the earliest practicable time. No Trustee shall vote on any matter under consideration at the Board or committee meeting, in which such Trustee has a conflict of interest. The minutes of such meeting shall reflect that a disclosure was made and that the Trustee having a conflict of interest abstained from voting. Any Trustee who is uncertain whether he/she has a conflict of interest in any matter may request the Board or committee to determine whether a conflict of interest exists, and the Board or committee shall resolve the question by majority vote.

ARTICLE XI ADMINISTRATION OF PROPERTY

Section 1. Contracts

The Board of Trustees may authorize any officer or agent of the College to enter into any contract or execute and deliver any instrument in the name of or on behalf of the College, and such authority may be general or confined to specific instances.

Section 2. Checks, Drafts, etc.

All checks, drafts, or other orders for the payment of money, notes, or other evidences of indebtedness issued in the name of the College shall be signed by such officer or agent of the College and in such matter as shall from time to time be determined by the Board of Trustees.

Section 3. Bonding

The Board of Trustees may require all officers, agents, or employees charged with responsibility for the custody of any of the funds of the College to give bonds in the amounts the Board of Trustees deems appropriate, the cost thereof to be paid by the College.

Section 4. Deposits

All funds of the College shall be deposited to the credit of the College in such banks, trust companies, or other depositories as the Board of Trustees may from time to time select or approve.

Section 5. Gifts

The Board of Trustees may accept, on behalf of the College, any contribution, gift, bequest, or device for the general purpose or for any special purpose of the College, and may delegate this authority to appropriate corporate and/or administrative officers. These officers shall make regular reports to the Board of Trustees of all gifts accepted by them in the name of the College.

Section 6. Fiscal Year

The fiscal year of the College shall begin the first day of July and end the last day of June in each year.

ARTICLE IX BYLAW AMENDMENT

Section 1.

These Bylaws may be amended by the Board of Trustees at any meeting, regular or special, by a vote to amend constituting two-thirds of the members present at such a meeting, provided that the notice calling the Board meeting shall announce that amendments to the Bylaws will be voted upon and proposed amendments accompany the notice. Such notice must be mailed at least thirty (30) days prior to such meeting to each Trustee at his/her usual place of residence. Any such change shall be subject to The Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists.

Section 2.

These Bylaws shall stand in the place and stead of, and shall be substituted for all other and former Bylaws of the Board of Trustees of the College which have heretofore been adopted.

Section 3.

Prior to each meeting during the month of February of the Board of Trustees, the Executive Committee shall review these Bylaws and suggest any necessary changes thereto.

The within and foregoing Amended and Restated Bylaws of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc. have been duly adopted by the Board of Trustees on this 5th day of May, 1994.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF THE HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE, INC.

Know all men by these presents, that, we whose names are hereunto subscribed, do hereby associate ourselves together for the purpose of forming a corporation under the provisions of the corporation laws of the State of Oklahoma, and for that purpose state:

ARTICLE ONE

The name of this corporation shall be HILLSDALE FREE WILL BAPTIST COLLEGE, INC.

ARTICLE TWO

The purpose of this corporation shall be the creation, establishment and maintenance of a college and institution of higher learning devoted to the promotion and impartation of higher learning, Christian education and such other education, instruction, learning, training and research as may be deemed essential for the cause of Christ and to that end prescribe courses of study and grant degrees. The doctrinal and theological position of this institution shall be that of the sponsoring denomination, Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists and the treatise of the National Association of Free Will Baptists as endorsed by the state body, and in connection therewith, in accordance with the stipulation of the Constitution and By-laws of the State Association of Free Will Baptists, Inc.

- (a.) To prescribe courses of study for both resident and correspondence students, which shall include general education in the arts, Christian Ministries of Service and Biblical studies for wisdom; said courses to be taught in both a Junior College Division and a Bible College Division, and to award degrees, either graduate or post-graduate, to those persons satisfactorily completing the prescribed courses of study and to grant such other literary honors, including honorary degrees, as shall be deemed advisable.
- (b.) To charge and collect tuition as determined by the Board of Trustees and to create scholarships.
- (c.) To employ professors, instructors and other subordinate employees as may be necessary for the proper conduct of the college under the direction and control of the President of the College, with the advice and consent of the majority of the Board of Trustees.

- (d.) To institute and carry on missions and commissions for missionary purposes and investigations.
- (e.) To publish and distribute such pamphlets, literature or books as may be required in the conduct of such work and the general promotion of the College.
- (f.) To sue and be sued in its corporate name and to enter into contracts of every type and nat ure.
- (g.) To solicit support, receive, collect, hold and receive by gift or bequest personal property in any amount, money or other thing of value; to purchase real estate, to receive real estate that may be given, or devised to the college for achieving the legitimate ends of the college and to sell or mortgage the same as the need arise.
- (h.) To borrow money in payment of property for erecting buildings and making improvements and for any other purpose germane to the objectives and purposes of the college.
- (i.) To issue notes, bonds, debentures and other evidences of indebtedness and execute mortgages, liens, and other incumbrance upon the property of the corporation, real or otherwise, to secure the payment of any such evidences of indebtedness.
- (j.) To transact any and all business connected with said College as may be necessary to achieve the purposes of said College.
- (k) To obtain under Internal Revenue Laws of the United States and of the Revenue Laws of the State of Oklahoma exemption from exemption from income property and other forms of taxation.

ARTICLE THREE

The location of this property shall be in Moore, Oklahoma.

ARTICLE FOUR

The duration of this corporation shall be perpetual.

ARTICLE FIVE

The general control of this corporation shall be vested in a Board of Trustees consisting of seventeen (17) members, ten (10) of which shall be elected by the delegates to the annual Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists-each of which shall serve for a term of five (5) years, and until his successor is elected and qualified. Two members shall be elected at each annual sitting of the State Association for the expiring five year term and vacancies that occur on the board. The representatives of the other supporting states shall be as follows: Missouri--three (3) members, Arkansas--two (2) members, and Texas--two (2) members, who shall be elected by the delegates of their representative state association, each to serve for a term designated by the states they represent.

The distribution for members of this board shall be reevaluated every five years beginning in 1999. A committee for this purpose shall be appointed each previous year, beginning in 1998.

ARTICLE SIX

An executive committee consisting of the Chairman, Vice Chairman, and Secretary of the Board of Trustees shall possess all powers of the Board of Trustees between the stated meetings of the Board of Trustees.

ARTICLE SEVEN

All contracts for building construction shall be let only to persons or corporations posting a valid performance bond and recording the same in the office of the County Clerk of Cleveland County, Oklahoma.

SECTION IX

AMENDMENTS

This charter may be hereafter amended subject to the provisions contained herein and the laws of the State of Oklahoma. It is provided, however, that the Trustees of the College shall not propose or apply for any amendment which has not been previously authorized by an act of the Oklahoma State Association.

OKLAHOMA WOMEN ACTIVE FOR CHRIST

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I

NAME

This organization shall be known as the Oklahoma Women Active For Christ.

ARTICLE II

PURPOSE

The purpose of this convention shall be to bring the women of each district convention and independent local auxiliary together for fellowship, sharing information, and encouraging one another in the work of the Lord.

ARTICLE III

OFFICERS

• The Officers of this convention shall be a president, vice president, secretary, assistant secretary, treasurer, assistant treasurer, and field worker. These shall serve on the state executive committee together with three members elected by the convention. These shall serve for a period of 2 years.

ARTICLE IV

MEMBERSHIP

This convention shall be composed of the officers of the convention together with each member of the district or independent local auxiliary.

ARTICLE V

MEETINGS

The annual meeting shall be held each year on the day preceding the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists and at the designated by said Association.

ARTICLE VI

AMENDMENTS

This constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the convention by a two-thirds vote of members present.

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1, President

The President shall preside over all meetings, appoint such committees as may be needed, call the executive committee together when necessary, be exofficio member of all committees, and serve as chairman of the executive committee, see that reports are made promptly to the national secretary and perform all duties usually pertaining to such an office.

Section 2, Vice President

The vice president shall preside in the absence of the president or by her request and otherwise assist her in the overseeing of the work in general.

Section 3, Secretary

The secretary shall keep an accurate record of all proceedings of the convention and executive committee meetings, preserve all valuable papers and turn same over to her successor in office, and make an annual report to the national secretary on a form available from the WNAC office. She shall compile the districts' slates of officers and addresses immediately after the convention. She shall also send a slate of officers and addresses to the national executive secretary.

The secretary shall also serve as historian keeping an historical record and submitting historical information to the national executive secretary annually.

Section 4, Assistant Secretary

The assistant secretary shall assist the secretary in recording proceedings of convention and executive committee meetings and shall aid the secretary in all her work as needed.

Section 5, Treasurer

The treasurer shall have charge of all funds belonging to this convention and shall pay out same only when authorized by the convention. The treasurer shall keep an accurate account and shall give a written report of all funds received and disbursed at each annual meeting of the convention. She shall also send a monthly report to the WNAC office (executive secretary treasurer). The treasurer shall secure the services of a certified public accountant (CPA) on an annual basis. The treasurer shall receive an honorarium of \$25.00 per month and an annual honorarium of \$275 per year out of the Retreat Fund.

Section 6, Assistant Treasurer

The assistant treasurer shall assist the treasurer in all her work as needed and shall have the authority to sign checks in the absence of the treasurer or at the request of the treasurer.

Section 7, Field Worker

The field worker shall be responsible for organizing new auxiliaries and for promoting the work of the state and national convention.

ARTICLE II

ELECTIONS

The officers shall be nominated by a nominating committee and shall be elected by acclamation, unless there are other nominations. In case of more than one nominee for any particular office, a vote will be taken on each. All elections shall be held on odd numbered years at the closing business session of the convention.

ARTICLE III

EXPENSES

- Section 1. When performing official duties for the convention, executive committee shall be reimbursed for mileage at the current rate allowable by the IRS. Expenses incurred by executive committee, i.e. telephone calls, postage, stationery, etc.., shall be reimbursed by the convention.
- Section 2. An amount of \$200.00 shall be paid toward the expense of the state president to attend the WNAC. If the president is unable to attend, \$200.00 shall be paid to the executive committee member appointed by the president to attend the meeting.
- Section 3. An amount of \$75.00 shall be paid toward the expense of the president when attending the national retreat or the national leadership conference.

ARTICLE IV

COMMITTEES

Section 1, Executive Committee

The executive committee shall be composed of the seven officers and three members elected by the convention. Seven of these shall compose a quorum. They shall hold meetings for the transaction of business as often as necessary. It shall be the duty of the executive committee to maintain an overseeing of the work at large. They shall act for the convention when necessary. They shall meet with district presidents the night preceding the state auxiliary convention. They will send out a newsletter with expenses paid by state convention.

Section 2, Resolutions Committee

A resolutions committee of five members shall be appointed by the president at the annual convention.

Section 3, Nominating Committee

The nominating committee shall be composed of one member from each district convention and independent local auxiliary. Nominations for this committee shall be submitted with annual reports. The nominating committee shall be elected by the body on even numbered years at the annual convention.

Section 4, Registration Committee

The registration committee, chaired by the vice president, shall be provided by the district convention which is host to state convention.

ARTICLE V

FEES AND REPORTS

Members shall pay dues of \$10.50 per year, with 25 cents remaining in the district, \$10.25 to be forwarded to state where 25 cents shall be retained, and \$10.00 forwarded to WNAC as required for membership fees. It shall be the duty of each body directly affiliated with the state auxiliary convention to send a report of membership to every annual session.

ARTICLE VI

AMENDMENTS

These by-laws may be amended by a two-thirds vote of members present at the annual meeting of the Oklahoma Women Active for Christ.

ARTICLE VIII

WNAC DELEGATE

Section 1. Each district convention shall submit one nomination for a State delegate to WNAC with their annual report. This nomination (along with others as needed to make up 15 delegates to WNAC) shall be elected by the body at the annual meeting. It shall be the duty of delegates elected to notify president if they cannot attend WNAC. President shall appoint delegates as needed in absence of regular elected delegates.

Section 2. A National Nominating Committee member shall be elected at the annual convention on odd numbered years and serve for a period of 2 years.

14. A. Do you teach and practice these ordinances?
B. Do you practice these ordinances at night?
15.Do you believe in the possibility of apostasy?
16. Do you believe in the resurrection of the bodies of all men?
17. Do you believe that there will be a judgment when time and man's probation
will close, forever and then all will be judged according to their works?
18. Do you believe that immediately after the judgement the righteous will enter
into eternal life, and the wicked into a state of endless punishment?
19. Do you believe that Christ at His second coming, will close the gospel
dispensation, glorify His saints, and judge the world?
20. I pledge myself to teach and defend the Free Will Baptist Doctrine to the best
of my ability. If at any future time I preach or teach any doctrine contrary to the
Free Will Baptist articles of faith, I will surrender my credentials to the Quarterly
Conference of which I am a member.

ARTICLES OF FAITH OF STATE ASSOCIATION

- 1. THE BIBLE The Scriptures of the Old and New Testament were given by the inspiration of God, and are our infallible rules of faith and practice.
- 2. GOD There is one living and true God, revealed in nature as the Creator, Preserver and Righteous Governor of the Universe, and in the Scriptures as the Father, Son and Holy Ghost, yet as one God, infinitely wise and good, whom all intelligent creatures are supremely to love, adore and obey.
- 3. CHRIST Christ is God manifest in the flesh: in His divine nature truly God, in His human nature truly man. The mediator between God and man, once crucified, He is now risen and glorified as our ever-present Savior and Lord.
- 4. THE HOLY SPIRIT The Scriptures assigns to the Holy Spirit all the attributes of God. He is the Reprover, Comforter, Guide and Sanctifier of all men.
- 5. THE GOVERNMENT OF GOD God exercises a wise and benevolent providence over all beings and all things by maintaining the constitution and laws of nature. He also performs special acts of Grace, not otherwise provided for as highest welfare of man requires.
- 6. THE SINFULNESS OF MAN Man was created innocent, but by disobedience fell into a state of sin and condemnation. His posterity, therefore inherited a fallen nature of such tendencies that all who come to years of accountability, sin and become guilty before God.
- 7. THE WORK OF CHRIST The Son of God, by His incarnation, life, suffering, death, and resurrection effected for all a redemption from sin that is full and free and is the ground of salvation by faith.
 - 8. THE WORK OF SALVATION The conditions of salvation are:
 - 1. Repentance or sincere sorrow for sin and the hearty renunciations of it.
 - 2. Faith or the unreserved committal of one's self to Christ as Savior and Lord, with purpose to love and obey Him in all things. In the exercise of saving faith the soul is renewed by the Holy Spirit; freed from the dominion of sin and becomes a child of God.
 - 3. Continuance in faith and obedience until death.
- 9. ELECTION God determined from the beginning to save all who should comply with the conditions of salvation. Hence by faith in Christ, men become His elect.

- 10. FREEDOM OF WILL The Human will is free and self controlled, having power to yield to the influence of the truth and the Spirit and live, or to resist them and perish.
- 11. SALVATION FREE God desires the salvation of all, the Gospel invites all, the Holy Spirit strives with all, and whosoever will may come and take the water of life freely.
- 12. PERSEVERANCE All believers in Christ, who through grace preserve in holiness to the end of life, have the promise of eternal salvation.
- 13. BACKSLIDING AND APOSTASY A person who has been regenerated or born again and is living in unconfessed, unforgiven sin, is rebellious to the principles of the Kingdom of God and His righteousness, and therefore is a backslider in a lost condition who must repent and be restored to the right relationship with God or be eternally lost. We recognize, according to Hebrews 6:4-6, that it is possible for a person to get in the condition that he could never return to Christ. This, we believe, is Apostasy; however, we also recognize that a regenerate person can fall into sin, be in a lost condition and still not be an Apostate. This person, through repentance, can be reconciled to God.
- 14. GOSPEL ORDINANCES Baptism, or the immersion of believers in water, and the Lord's Supper, are ordinances to be perpetuated under the Gospel; Feet Washing, an ordinance teaching humility, of universal obligation, and be administered to all true believers.
- 15. TITHING God commanded tithes and offerings in the Old Testament; Jesus Christ endorsed in the Gospel (Matt. 23:23), and the Apostle Paul said, "Upon the first day of the week let every one of you lay by him in store as God hat prospered him." I Cor. 16:2.
- 16. THE CHRISTIAN SABBATH The divine law requires that one day in seven be set apart from the secular employment and amusements for rest, worship, holy works and activities, and for personal communion with God.
- 17. RESURRECTION, JUDGMENT, AND FINAL RETRIBUTION The Scriptures teach the resurrection of all men at the last day. They that have done good will come forth to the resurrection of life, and they that have done evil unto the resurrection of damnation: then the wicked shall "Go away into eternal punishment but the righteous into eternal life."

RULES OF ORDER

- 1. At every sitting of the Association, business shall be opened and concluded by prayer by the Moderator or Whomever he may request.
- 2. Ministers and deacons present are invited to seats, allowed to take part in debates on all subjects, and to vote.
- 3. Those who speak shall rise and address the Moderator. Personal reflections shall be avoided in all debates.
- 4. No motion may be discussed until made and seconded.
- 5. When a motion has been made and seconded, and a member opposes its discussion, the Moderator shall put the question, "Shall it be discussed?" If negative, the question shall not be discussed.
- 6. If any proposition or motion under debate contains two or more points, it shall be divided at the request of any member, and the vote taken separately.
- 7. Motions made and lost shall not be recorded.
- 8. No one shall speak more than twice on the same subject without special leave of the Moderator.
- 9. All questions shall be decided by a majority vote of all Members present.

BY-LAWS OF STATE ASSOCIATION

- 1. The clerk or assistant clerk, or in their absence, the senior minister in years shall call the Association into conference, and if a quorum is present the moderator, or in his absence, the assistant moderator shall take charge; and if neither of them is present the senior minister in years shall act as moderator.
- 2. It shall be the duty of the clerk to enroll the delegates to the Association, who shall present themselves with proper evidence of their rights to seats therein, and those enrolled by the clerk shall compose the Association.
- 3. It shall be the duty of every District belonging to this Association to send a letter to every annual session of this Association reporting in the same; spiritual condition, benevolent work and its statistics. Any District belonging to this Association, which shall fail to report itself for two successive sessions, may be dismissed from the Association by a two thirds vote of all members present.

- 4. Each meeting shall be opened by reading a portion of the Bible and with prayer, and shall be closed with prayer.
- 5. By a two-thirds vote of members present, a ruling of the moderator can be overruled.
- 6. This Association may correspond by messenger or otherwise with other religious bodies.
- 7. This Association shall sit with open doors except when it shall go into a committee of the whole.
- 8. Any person not a member of this Association may be allowed to take part in its discussions by obtaining permission from the moderator.
- 9. It shall be the duty of all the Association to be present at the time appointed for each meeting, and anyone wishing to retire shall first obtain leave of the moderator.
- 10. No person shall be allowed to nominate more than one member of any committee, provided the person nominated be elected.
- 11. The moderator shall no allow discussions when not carried on in a Christian spirit or when he thinks it will cause discord or division.
- 12. Anyone desiring to speak shall rise to his feet and address the moderator by the appellation "Brother Moderator," but shall not speak further until recognized by the moderator.
- 13. No member of this association shall be allowed to speak more than then minutes nor twice on the same subject without permission from the moderator.
- 14. This association shall meet annually beginning on Tuesday following the second Sunday in October.
- 15. These By-Laws may be altered or amended at any regular or adjourned session of this Association by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

CONSTITUTION OF STATE ASSOCIATION

PREAMBLE: From long experience, we the members of the Free Will Baptist denomination, being regularly baptized upon a profession of our faith in Jesus Christ, and realizing the necessity of a bond in union and fellowship among us as a church; and to preserve and maintain correspondence and coordination with us, do therefore ordain this Constitution for our better denomination government.

ARTICLE I

NAME: This organization shall be known as the OKLAHOMA STATE ASSOCIATION OF FREE WILL BAPTISTS.

ARTICLE II

PURPOSE: The object and purpose of this organization shall be to unify the work of the various bodies composing this State Association, and to devise and execute measures for the extension of the Kingdom of God in connection with the various bodies in the Association, or that may hereafter be represented therein.

ARTICLE III

REPRESENTATION:

Section 1. This Association shall be composed of all ordained ministers and deacons with membership in some local church which is a member of a District Association with membership in the State Association.

Section 2. Each District Association shall be entitled to a number of elected delegates equal with the number of churches composing said Association. These delegates may be recommended by the local churches and shall be endorsed by their District Association.

ARTICLE IV

FINANCE: Each District Association shall be responsible for sending \$50.00 per church to the State Association for State and National Convention fees, of this \$50.00, \$25.00 shall go to the State Association and \$25.00 to the National Association.

ARTICLE V

DISCIPLINE:

Section 1. This State Association shall have the right to settle any question of discipline, doctrine or practices that may properly come before it from any of the bodies composing said organization; furthermore, if there be any

question of discipline, doctrine or practices on the part of an affiliated association, delegates of that association shall not be seated until these questions have been settled to the satisfaction of the General Board.

Section 2. Decisions of the General Board may be appealed in this manner. All appeals shall come before the State Association when sitting in a committee as a whole.

ARTICLE VI

OFFICERS:

- A. The officers of the State Association shall consist of a Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk and an Executive Secretary. Each of these shall be elected at the close of each regular session except the Executive Secretary.
- B. (1) The Executive Secretary shall be elected for an indefinite term. It shall be the responsibility of the Executive Board to seek out a prospective candidate and make their recommendation to the body at the State Association in its regular session, with privilege of nominations from the floor.
- (2) In the event of a vacancy occurring during the course of the year, the Executive Board shall fill the vacancy until the annual setting of the Association.
- (3) Any time a majority of the Executive Board, or seven (7) members of the General Board requests a vote of confidence on the Executive Secretary, a vote shall be taken. If such action results in the termination of the Executive Secretary, he shall be given sixty (60) days severance pay.
- (4) In the event of immorality on the part of the Executive Secretary, or of him teaching or preaching doctrine contrary to the Free Will Baptist Treatise, he may be dismissed by a majority vote of the Executive Board with no severance pay.

ARTICLE VII

BOARDS:

All standing boards and committees shall be composed of seven (7) elected members who shall serve terms of 7, 6, 5, 4, 3, 2, and 1 years with such exofficio members as may be provided for elsewhere with no member serving more than two (2) consecutive terms of office or portion thereof, except:

- A. (1) the Board of Christian Education which shall consist of 10 members who shall serve five (5) years with two members elected annually,
- (2) the General Board which shall be composed of one (1) member from each affiliated association, the chairman of each standing board, and the current general officers of this association, and
- (3) the College Board of Trustees which shall be composed as provided for in the Articles of Incorporation of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, lnc.

- B. (1) The Moderator shall be authorized to appoint annually, at the beginning of each session, a Committee on Committees, which shall consist of 5 members, each member being from a different District Association within the State Association.
- (2) This Committee on Committees in turn shall select the following committees that are authorized by, but function only, during the annual state convention Resolution, Obituary, and Nominating Committee. These committees shall consist of 5 member per committee, each member being from a different District Association within the State Association.
- (3) The Nominating Committee shall annually present one name to the assemble for each vacant office except General Board, with nominating privilege form the floor.

The standing boards of this association shall be: Executive Board; Board of Church Extension, Missions and Evangelism; Board of Christian Education; and College Board of Trustees.

No standing board shall meet in a functional meeting during the session of the association.

ARTICLE VIII

DUTIES, SCOPE OF ENDEAVOR AND QUALIFICATIONS OF STANDING BOARDS

Section 1.

EXECUTIVE BOARD: The Executive Board shall be composed of seven (7) members who are members of an affiliated association and in good standing with the association of which they are members. They shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

It shall be the duty of this board to act in behalf of the association when it is not in session. It shall be bound to carry out the directions of the association and shall hold itself bound by every consideration of morality and honor to carry out the wishes of this association and to act under its instructions in whatever technical rights, civil laws and the decisions of courts may give it in certain emergencies. It shall be the duty of this board to sign their signatures to any and all papers concerning properties, indebtedness, bonds, or other legal documents pertaining to the execution of the will of this association, exclusive of the College Board of Trustees.

This board shall have the oversight of the Executive Department of this association. The members shall assist and direct such work for the general promotion of this association as is deemed needful or necessary as the means available shall permit. The Executive Department shall serve as the coordinating agency of this association to correlate the work of all standing boards and agencies.

This board shall have the oversight of Free Will Baptist Book Store and shall endeavor to serve affiliated association s and churches and the community

with literature and church supplies. Merchandising procedures shall be those accepted as normal retail procedures with the board being cognizant of the spiritual contribution of the store in distributing Christian literature.

All decisions of this board shall be governed by the general tenets of this association and shall not violate this constitution.

This board shall organize itself and elect such officers as necessary to the orderly conduct of its affairs and labors. This board shall keep an accurate record of all meetings, decisions, and work done and shall make a report in writing at each annual session of this association. All records shall be available to this association at its request.

Whereas this board represents the association when not in session, it and it alone shall have the power to call the association into special conference provided each affiliated association shall be given notice at least ten (10) days prior to the meeting of such special conference.

Section 2.

GENERAL BOARD: This board shall be composed of one (1) member from each affiliated association, the chairman of each standing board, and the current general officers of this association. Each member must be a member of an affiliated association and in good standing with the association of which he is a member. The members shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

The duties of this board shall be to meet one (1) day preceding the annual session of this association. This board shall serve as the credential committee with the duties and responsibilities and assigned by Article V of this constitution. This board shall hear reports of all standing boards. It shall serve as budget committee and shall make such recommendations as deemed pertinent to this association. A complete and accurate record shall be kept of meetings of this board and a report shall be made in writing to this association in its annual session.

The moderator of the association shall serve as chairman of this board, and the clerk of the association shall serve as its clerk.

Section 3.

BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION, MISSIONS AND EVANGELISM: This board shall be composed of seven (7) members who are members of affiliated associations and in good standing with the associations of which they are members. They shall be elected at the discretion of this association.

It shall be the duty of this board to labor to further the Gospel of Jesus Christ into the uttermost parts of the earth. In accomplishing this, they are to endeavor to establish missions and churches in communities within the bounds of this association with whatever moral and financial assistance that may be theirs. In cases of small churches failing to function, whatever assistance deemed appropriate shall be rendered to maintain the effective witness of that church by either direct labor with the church or with an associational board in instance where the affiliated association has a functional board or agency.

This board shall be empowered to receive and convey title to real property in the area of its labors.

The promotion of missionary endeavors from a local, state or national level shall come withing the scope of endeavor of this board. This board shall assist in maintaining prayer and financial support of missionary enterprises through whatever channels available.

Whereas missionary and evangelistic labors are so intimately related, this board shall assist through participation or assistance in maintaining a strong evangelistic thrust in the life of affiliated association.

This board shall organize itself and elect such officers as necessary to the orderly conduct of its affairs and labors. This board shall keep an accurate record of all meetings, decisions, work done, funds received and disbursed and shall make a report in writing at each annual session of this association. All records shall be available to this association at its request.

Section 4.

COLLEGE BOARD OF TRUSTEES: The College Board of Trustees shall be composed as provided for in the Articles of Incorporation of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc.

Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, Inc. Is an agency of the Oklahoma State Association of Free Will Baptists and is incorporated under the corporate laws of the State of Oklahoma. The articles of incorporation are a part of this association's record and delineates the purpose, duty and scope of endeavor of the members of this board.

Section 5.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION: This board shall consist of 10 members who are members of affiliated associations and in good standing with the association of which they are members. The members shall serve five years with two members elected annually.

The duties of this board shall be to promote and provide assistance for the development and sustaining of a total Christian Education program in the local church and district association.

This board shall also administer state-wide activities such as, but not limited to, youth camps, seminars, and training programs, working with local agencies to distribute and employ effective methods and materials.

This board shall organize itself and such officers as necessary to the orderly conduct of its affairs and labors. This board shall keep accurate record of all meetings, discussions, work don, funds received and disbursed and shall make a report I writing at each annual session of this association. All records shall be available to this association at its request.

Section 6.

VACANCIES: Vacancies shall occur when a member moves from the territorial bounds of this association, by death, by resignation or by removal from office by this association. In the event of disciplinary action where charges concerning misconduct, doctrine or practice shall have been lodged against a member of any board, his office shall be held in abeyance until such charges shall be concluded or as determined by this association.

All boards shall have power to fill vacancies arising between sessions of this association. Such appointment shall terminate at the next session of this association and shall be filled by this association.

Section 7.

session.

EMPLOYEES: All employees of boards or agencies of this association shall be employed by agreement or contract with employing board or agency upon approval of this association except those elected by this association and the conditions of their employment shall be those approved by this association.

The duties of the Executive Secretary of this association shall be:

- (1) He is to represent, or cause to be represented, the association at all affairs of interest to the association.
- (2) He is to promote the work of the association in such a manner so as to unify the efforts of the association.
- (3) He is to serve with all standing boards and committees of the association in and ex-officio capacity.
- (4) He is to aid in planning the work of the association by relating the activities and plans of one board to another.
 - (5) He is to report to the association during each annual
- (6) He is to communicate to the affiliated members of this association the pressing causes and events before the association. This can be in person or by means of a periodical bulletin or both.
- (7) He shall serve as treasurer of this association. An accurate and complete record of all funds received and disbursed shall be kept and a written report shall be included in his report to this association in its annual session.
- (8) The conditions of employment shall be determined by the Executive Board.

ARTICLE IX

DISSOLUTION:

Should this association cease to function, all properties and holdings shall go the National Association of Free Will Baptists after all creditors are satisfied and indebtedness cleared.

ARTICLE X

AMENDMENTS:

This constitution may be amended or altered at any regular session of the association by a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of members present and voting, provided proposed amendment or alteration be presented in writing to the body one (1) day in advance.

ARTICLE XI

SPECIAL SESSIONS:

Elected delegates to the last session of this association shall be retained as standing delegates for special called sessions.
