**PROCEEDINGS OF THE 151ST ANNUAL SESSION
OF THE OLD MOUNT ZION ASSOCIATION
“CONTEND FOR THE FAITH”**

THURSDAY EVENING SESSION

The 151st annual session of the Old Mount Zion Association of Free Will Baptists convened on Thursday May 7, 1991. Bro. Eldon Bagwell, Moderator, called the meeting to order at 7:30 p.m. Bro. Cecil Garrison led the congregation singing *Amazing Grace* and *That's Why I Love Him So*. Sister Georgia Gabbard played the piano.

Bro. Bagwell read Jude 1-4 enjoining the gathering to keep in mind the need to “earnestly contend for the faith,” that faith being belief in the true word of God. He suggested that “Contend For the Faith” be the theme of this year’s session. Ministers were asked to gather at the altar for a time of prayer.

Mike and Georgia Gabbard sang a special, *It Will Be Worth It*.

Bro. Ellis Doyle, pastor of the Freedom Church, brought the message. He read Revelations 12:17 reminding the congregation that we are in a war today. Bro. Doyle then read II Timothy 2:1-4 and spoke on “Being a Good Soldier For The Lord.” He told how a good soldier must be called, trained, and equipped.

During the invitation and altar call, Bro. Garrison and Sister Gabbard led the congregation singing *What A Friend We Have In Jesus*.

The business session began with prayer by Bro. Boyd Harp. The Committee on Committees was appointed. Members are Bros. Lester Harp, Arthur Lee Galloway, Claude Hendrix, Norman Cline and Terry Mudd.

Church letters were read. A letter from the Old Union Association of United Baptists was read. The delegates were seated with a right hand of fellowship.

An offering of \$100.00 was received and given to the General Fund.

Bro. Tommy Day moved that the session dismiss until 9:30 a.m. Friday morning. John Hutchins dismissed in prayer.

FRIDAY MORNING SESSION

The service opened with singing led by Bro. Scott Marrs with Bro. Scott McCully at the piano. Songs were *Since He Gave Me This Heart of Love*, *When We All Get To Heaven*. Bro. Glen Faulkner led the opening prayer.

Bro. Eldon Bagwell read II Corinthians 11:1-15 and told the congregation how Satan can get people confused. It may sound good, but if it can’t be backed up by the Bible to leave it alone.

Delegates who were not seated Thursday night were offered the right hand of fellowship and seated.

Bro. Bagwell urged churches to be more involved in the Association; to look to the future. He then read the Rules of Order.

Permanent officers were elected.

Bro. David Joslin, promotional director for the Arkansas Free Will Baptists gave a brief talk. He read Deuteronomy 2:31, and spoke on "I have begun to give...begin to possess." He reminded the gathering that God has given us much, but we are not willing to possess it. Bro. Joslin went on to tell about upcoming activities in the State Association. He reminded everyone that the National Association of Free Will Baptists will meet in Little Rock in July of 1994. Bro. Joslin asked each church to try to give at least \$50.00 over the next two years to help support this meeting.

The Newsletter report was given and approved as read. Sister Gayla Haywood was re-elected editor of the Newsletter.

Bro. Tommy Day moved that the business meeting adjourn until 1:00 in the afternoon.

FRIDAY MORNING WORSHIP SERVICE

The service began with congregational singing. Sister Mabel Phillips played the piano, and Bro. Eldon Bagwell led the singing of *I Feel Like Traveling On*. Bros. Scott Mars and Scott McCully led the singing of *The Gloryland Way* and *When the Roll is Called Up Yonder*.

Bro. Glen Faulkner sang *Someone To Care* for a special number.

Bro. Lowell Bradley, pastor at Pilgrim's Rest Church, brought the morning message. He read from Isaiah 6:1-12 stated that "We need a vision." Bro. Bradley went on to say that when we get a vision of who God

is, we can see ourselves as we really are. When we are right with God we are willing servants. Sin and bitterness can destroy our vision.

The Christian Education Board report was read and approved. Motion made and carried to waive Amendment 1 to Article 5 and to nominate Dwayne Lane to a full five-year term.

Home Mission Board report was given and approved as read. Jack Jackson was elected to a five-year term.

Executive Board report was read and approved. Paul Payne was elected to a five-year term.

District Woman's Auxiliary's annual report was given and approved.

James Bragg was elected to a five year term on the Board of Trustees.

The Divine Service Committee report was given and approved.

Bro. Ricky Grimes was welcomed back into the Old Mt. Zion Association.

The Resolution Committee report was given and accepted as read. Four resolutions were presented and approved. Bro. Tommy Day made a motion to amend Amendment No. 6 to Article 14 of the Constitution to give Executive Board the authority to oversee the training of newly called ministers in Free Will Baptist Doctrine. Motion carried.

Bro. Mark Casey was recommended to the Polk Bayou Association.

FRIDAY EVENING SERVICE

(Communion and Feetwashing)

Bro. Ernest Johnson, Assistant Moderator, presided over the service.

Congregational singing was led by Steve and Lawanda Ash. The songs were *Heaven's Jubilee* and *Come and Dine*.

Bro. Ernest Johnson led in an altar of prayer.

Lawanda Ash sang two specials, *Only Jesus Can Satisfy Your Soul* and *A Touch From Your Hand*.

Scott and Leah McCully sang *Son, Go Bring Your Children Home*.

Bro. Jim Spurlock, pastor of the Huntsville church, brought the message. He read Phillipians 2:1-9 and said that we need to put Christ in our lives, live in His kingdom, and fellowship with Him. Bro. Spurlock stated

that if you wash another's feet, you can be happy. An invitation was given with Lawanda Ash at the piano.

In the communion service, all ordained ministers were called forward. Bro. Ernest Johnson read I Corinthians 11:24. Bro. Tommy Day asked the blessing for the bread. I Corinthians 11:25 was read. Bro. Dale Kester prayed before the serving of the fruit of the vine. Twenty-two ministers and eight deacons helped with the service.

After the Communion service was completed, 22 women and 36 men took part in the feet washing service.

At the end of the service, a quartet—Eldon Bagwell, Iva McKinney, Carl Johnson, and Elmer Martin—with Vonna Campbell at the piano sang *I'll Meet You in the Morning*. The service ended with an old fashioned handshake.

SATURDAY MORNING BUSINESS SESSION

Bro. Eldon Bagwell read Ephesians 4:1-14. He urged pastors to see that church members have a copy of the Free Will Baptist Treatise; and if necessary, to teach and preach it.

The Finance Committee report was given and approved as read.

The Obituary Committee report was read and approved.

The Youth Camp Board report was given and approved as read. Scott Davis was elected to a four-year term, replacing Jesse Carothers, who resigned. Bro. Greg Madden was elected to a five-year term.

The Divine Service Committee gave the report for the selections for the August Quarterly Council meeting.

The 1991 Divine Service Committee was discharged.

The Radio Program report was read and approved. Bro. Noel Easterling announced he was retiring as radio pastor. Bro. Loy Counts made a motion to continue the radio program and investigate the possibility of finding a station that will reach more people. Motion carried. Bro. Cecil Case was elected radio pastor. Sister Carol Case will replace Sister Hazel Easterling as secretary.

The resolution committee was discharged.

The Greenland Church was appointed to prepare for the Association's Communion and Feetwashing Service in 1993.

The 1993 Registration Committee will be Bro. Rick and Linda Grimes and Leah McCully.

Delegates to the Old Union Association of United Baptists will be Bro. Norman Cline, Bro. Cecil Case, and Roy Edgmon.

Judy Payne, Mary Johnson, Melvin and Sherry Martin were selected as delegates to the State Association.

Melvin and Sherry Martin will attend the National Association.

Bro. Cecil Case made a motion to have a standing order of 1,000 minutes each year. Motion carried.

Bro. Bagwell encouraged everyone to attend and support the Saturday evening youth service.

Motion was made and carried to adjourn until Thursday, May 6, 1993, at 7:30 p.m.

MEMORIAL SERVICE

The Memorial Service began with the congregation singing *When All of God's Singers Get Home, I'll Meet You in the Morning*, and *That Glad Reunion Day*. Bro. Eldon Bagwell led the singing with Shirley Sizemore at the piano.

Bro. Eldon led the list of names of those who have died during the last 12 months.

Bro. Claude Hendrix brought the message he titled, "Home." Reading from several scriptures included I Corinthians 15:51-57, I Thessalonians 4:13-18, I Kings 13:7, and Revelations 7:9. Bro. Hendrix spoke of that home that is far better than the one we have now. He also reminded us of the great homecoming for all those who have won the victory.

The service closed with the song, *Never Grow Old*.

SATURDAY NIGHT SERVICE

August 3, 1991

RESOLUTIONS: (Permanently Printed)

Resolution No. 1: Be it resolved that the Association set aside Saturday night of the conference each year for the youth of our churches to make their reports concerning their work and to be in charge of the worship service for that night, with privilege of selecting a speaker or speakers for the service.

Resolution No. 2: That attention be called to Article 3 of the Constitution of this Association, as terms of receiving members into the local church as, namely: (1) profession of faith; (2) by letter of recommendation; (3) by restoration; (4) by denominational choice.

Resolution No. 3: That Article 1, Membership, be amended to read: All regularly ordained ministers and deacons of this Association becoming

properly credentialed and in full fellowship and good standing in the church of which they are members shall be entitled to seats as a delegate, by virtue of their office.

Resolution No. 4: Be it resolved that we give adequate support and approval to Home Mission work in the bounds of the Old Mt. Zion Association such as assisting in organizing and establishing new churches. Said work to be under the supervision of the Home Mission Board (amended August, 1979) consisting of five ordained ministers or deacons in good standing.

Resolution No. 5: Be it resolved that the churches of Old Mt. Zion Association go on record as denouncing the modern day doctrine of speaking in tongues as a part of the doctrine of a second work of grace (following regeneration and calling it the Baptism of the Holy Ghost), as heresy, and unsound doctrine. We warn any church (endorsing such, or having members in their churches advocating such) to purge out such or stand in risk of losing their place in this Association.

Resolution No. 6: Be it resolved, "Any church desiring a resolution to be voted on at setting of Association, send a copy of proposed resolution to each church of Old Mt. Zion Association before Association convenes; that is, if possible."

Resolution No. 7: (amended) In view of the fact that our Youth Camp has become a reality, we recommend that "all churches" support both the Youth Camp and the Home Mission Board.

Resolution No. 8: Be it resolved that the moderator appoint three persons to direct the registration on Thursday night and Friday morning and that they arrive early.

Resolution No. 9: That it be recorded in the minutes which church will be responsible for the Communion Service. They shall be responsible for the juice, bread and cleaning of supplies. If said church cannot serve, they must contact the moderator in time to get another.

Resolution No. 10: Be it resolved, "Any Free Will Baptist minister coming from a sister Association must present a letter of good standing from the Association from which he is coming."

Resolution No. 11: (Resolution No. 4 of 1977 Minutes) Be it resolved that the Old Mt. Zion Council Meeting be changed to a quarterly meeting convening on the first Saturday in November, February and May with three (3) elected delegates from each church attending to conduct any business necessary between annual sessions of the Association in August. (Annual Association now meets in May, therefore, quarterly meetings fall on the first Saturday in August, November and February.) Services to begin at 9 a.m.

Resolution No. 12: We believe that Sunday School plays a very important part in the training of our people. Our churches need dedicated teachers who will follow II Timothy 2:15, and we recommend that our churches, who use literature, use Freewill Baptist literature.

Resolution No. 13: Be it resolved that all church letters in the Annual Association be mailed to the Clerk a week prior to the date of the Association, if possible.

Resolution No. 14: Be it resolved that any event, function, or activity to take place on the Association properties be supported by one of our Free Will Baptist Churches, being a member in good standing with our Old Mt. Zion Association, or Associational committees, and be approved by the Board of Trustees.

CHURCH COVENANT

Having been brought, as we believe, by the divine grace to accept the Lord Jesus Christ as our Saviour and Preserver, we do now solemnly and joyfully covenant and agree by God's help to walk together in brotherly love.

We, therefore, enter into covenant as members of this church, and as Christians, that we will watch over each other in love, sharing together each other's joys and sorrows; that we will not forsake the assembling of ourselves together, nor omit the great duty of prayer for ourselves and others; that by Divine assistance we will endeavor to bring up those under our care in the nurture and admonition of the Lord; that in all things we will strive to exemplify our profession by a corresponding practice, to abstain from all sinful conformity to the world, to be just in our dealings, faithful in our agreements, and exemplary in all our deportment; that we will abstain from the sale and use of intoxicating liquor as beverage; that we will contribute cheerfully according to our ability, to support of the ministry, the expense of the church, the relief of the poor and the general spread of the Gospel.

In keeping this solemn covenant, may we ever enjoy the blessings and presence of the Great Head of the church, which is Jesus Christ the Saviour.

RULES OF ORDER

1. At every sitting of the Association, business shall be opened and concluded by prayer by the Moderator or whomsoever he may request.

2. Ordained ministers, deacons, and delegates of Old Mt. Zion Association, when present, are invited to seats, allowed to take part in debates on all subjects, and to vote. Visiting ministers, deacons and delegates are invited to seats, allowed to take part in debates on all subjects, but not to vote.

3. Those who speak shall arise and address the Moderator. Personal reflections shall be avoided in all debates.

4. No motion shall be discussed without a second.

5. When a motion has been made and seconded, and a member opposes its discussion, the Moderator shall put the question, "Shall it be discussed?" If negative, the question shall be dismissed.

6. If any proposition or motion under debate contains two or more points, it shall be divided at the request of any member, and the vote taken separately.

7. Motions made and lost shall not be recorded.

8. No one shall speak more than twice on the same subject without special leave of the Moderator.

9. All questions shall be decided by a majority vote of all members voting.

10. No member shall absent himself without special leave of the Moderator.

11. Minutes shall be leisurely read and corrected if necessary before the close of the Association.

12. At all future sessions of the Association, arrangements shall be made to insure two sermons, or other devotional exercises equivalent thereto, during each day of the session, and the chair shall announce just before adjournment, who shall preach.

13. These Rules of Order shall be distinctly read from the chair immediately after the organization of the Association.

14. Alterations may be made in these rules at any regular session of the Association.

CONSTITUTION

From long experience, we, the members of the Church of God (denominated Free Will Baptists) being regularly baptized upon profession of our faith in our Lord Jesus Christ, and being convinced of the necessity of a combination of churches to perpetuate a union among us, and to preserve and maintain correspondence with each other, do therefore, ordain this Constitution for our better Church government.

Article 1. Membership--This Association shall be composed of members chosen by the different churches of our union, not exceeding three messengers from each church, and upon producing letters, they shall be entitled to seats. All regularly ordained ministers and deacons of this Association becoming properly credentialed and in full fellowship and good standing in the church of which they are members, shall be entitled to seats as a delegate, when present, by virtue of their office.

Article 2. Name--The members thus chosen and assembled with the ministers and deacons, to be denominated the Old Mt. Zion Association of Free Will Baptists being composed of the several churches of our union, the Association having no power over the churches reserving the right of withdrawing from any church becoming disorderly.

Article 3. Letters--Letters from the different churches representing are to express their number in fellowship including the names and addresses of ordained and licensed ministers, the number of members received upon profession of faith, by letter of recommendation, by restoration or denominational choice; the number of members dismissed by letter, excluded, and

those having died since last Association. Churches, in sending their letters, may send obituaries of anyone who died during the year, that we may keep up the memorial to our dead.

Article 4. Dismissing Members--Our churches, upon granting letters of dismissal to any of its members, shall require a notice from the church receiving said letter that it has been received.

Article 5: Officers--The Association to have a Moderator and an Assistant Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, and an Assistant Clerk-Treasurer, elected annually for a term of one year by the suffrage, and an executive committee of five, one member chosen each year for a term of five years, and that each member be an Ordained Minister in good standing of the Old Mt. Zion Association, who shall have the authority to transact any business transactions of the Association between sessions of the Association and make a report to the Association annually.

Amendment No. 1 to Article 5

Be it resolved that we amend Article 5 to read that no person can serve two consecutive terms on any standing board.

Amendment No. 2 to Article 5

Be it resolved that current Officers of the Association be retained through the present Association and any new Officers assume responsibilities immediately thereafter.

Article 6. New Churches--Newly organized churches may be admitted to the Association, which are to petition by letter and delegates, and if, upon examination, they are found to be orthodox and orderly, they may be received into the Association, the Moderator giving the right hand of fellowship.

Article 7. Questions--No resolution from any church shall come under consideration of the Association unless it has been first considered in its own church and, if possible, a copy be sent to each church before the Association.

Article 8. Motions--Every motion made and seconded shall come under the consideration of the Association except it be withdrawn by the member who made it.

Article 9. Minutes--The Association is to endeavor to furnish the churches the minutes of the Association in proportion to the amount paid by each church, the distribution to be made at the discretion of the Association.

Article 10. Clerk--It shall be the duty of the Clerk to keep a regular file of the minutes of the Association in a book to be kept by the Association for that purpose.

Article 11. Signatures--The minutes of the Association shall be read and corrected, if needed, and signed by the Moderator and Clerk before the close of the Association.

Article 12. Amendments--Amendments of this Constitution may be made, when necessary, by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any regular session.

Article 13. Non-Attendance--The Association, in case of failure of any church to attend, shall inquire into the case.

Amendment No.1 to Article 13

Be it resolved that churches that fail to be represented by delegation, or letter, for two consecutive years, be notified they will be dropped from our Association.

Article 14. Ordination of Ministers--Old Mt.Zion Association of Free Will Baptists accepts the wording of Epistles I Timothy 3:1-7 and Titus 1:6-9 as authoritative for guidelines to Ordaining Ministers.

Amendment No. 1 to Article 14

Be it therefore resolved that we amend Article 14 of our Constitution in compliance of our State Constitution. That Old Mt. Zion Association of Free Will Baptists accept the wording of the Epistles to Timothy and Titus as authoritative, namely the interpretation of the phrase, "the husband of one wife," to mean that divorced personnel should not be ordained. (I Timothy 3:2, 12; Titus 1:6)

Amendment No. 3 to Article 14

Be it further resolved that no woman be ordained as minister or a deaconess.

Amendment No. 4 to Article 14

Be it further resolved that we recommend to the Executive Board of this Association in their examination of candidates for ordination, to observe greater caution, and in agreement with the instructions of the apostles, "To lay hands suddenly on no man." (I Timothy 4:22)

When a Church member acknowledges their call to the Ministry, they should be licensed by the Church of which they are a member for the period of one year prior to Ordination; or until they have proved themselves to the Church. When the member has proven himself, the church shall call for his Ordination.

That all Churches of Old Mt. Zion Association, in all Ordinations services of Ministers, comply strictly with the rules and regulations laid down by the Free Will Baptist denominations. Said procedure to be conducted by the Local Church.

Amendment No. 5 to Article 14

If any ordained minister of the Old Mt. Zion Association of Free Will Baptists at anytime be found guilty of misconduct, or disregard of any rule or ordinance set forth and practiced by the Constitution of the Old Mt. Zion Association, the said party shall be dealt with according to "Article 14" of the Constitution of the Old Mt. Zion Association as follows:

1. After the local church has made a full and complete investigation as to the misconduct or other charges and the evidence proves to be true—he shall surrender his credentials to the local church or association until said

misconduct or other charges have been investigated by the local church or Executive Board. (The local church clerk or associational clerk to hold said credentials.)

2. If after the period of not more than one year after the surrender of his credentials, the said party shall be contacted by the local church of which he is a member or by the Executive Board to try and make restitution. If the local church fails to deal with the charges, then the Executive Board will have the authority to deal with the charges. The Executive Board shall make this report to the regular session of the associational body which will vote on the report as whether to revoke or return the credentials to said party.

Amendment No. 6 to Article 14

Be it resolved that no minister be ordained without written approval of the Executive Board. Be it further resolved that all men who acknowledge their call to preach, upon being licensed, immediately report to the Executive Board. The Executive Board to assign them lessons covering the entire treatise of the Free Will Baptist. We recommend that some of our older ministers be used to administer these lessons. The candidate to meet at least once a month with said minister. Upon completion of lessons, candidate must agree fully with Free Will Baptist doctrine to be ordained.

Amendment No. 7 to Article 14

Be it resolved that the Association instruct the Executive Board not to approve any minister for ordination who uses tobacco in any form.

“ARTICLES OF FAITH”

1. **God**--We believe in one true and living Triune God; composed of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, equal in divine Essence, Purpose, Power and Glory. St. John 1:1, I Cor. 8:6, St. John 10:30; I John 5:7.

2. **Christ**--We believe that Jesus Christ is the divine Son of God, was with the Father and the Holy Spirit at the time of creation, left the Courts of Heaven and came to earth, took upon Himself the form of humanity, sin excepted, by being born of the Virgin Mary, manifested His power, was crucified, placed in Joseph's tomb, rose again the third day, completed the great plan of salvation, walked and talked with his disciples, publicly ascended to Heaven, and that He will descend again to gather His jewels home. Isaiah 9:6; St. John 1:14; Luke 1:26-28; Matt. 14:13-21; Mark 16:9-19; Luke 24:50-53; Acts 1:9-12; Mark 15:22-41.

3. **Holy Spirit**--We believe that the Holy Spirit has visited true believers in all ages, and especially since the ascension for the Son back to the Father, and his coming on the day of Pentecost. Has taken up His office work among all nations of people, as a Divine Reprover, Comforter and Guide. Judges 6:34; 11:29; St. John 16:8-14; Isaiah 63:10-12; Ephesians 4:30; Acts 8:17-20.

4. **The Bible**--We believe the Bible, which is composed of the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments was given by inspiration of God,

is our way-bill from earth to heaven, and the only infallible and inerrant rule of faith and practice. II Peter 1:19-21; II Tim. 3:14-17; Daniel 10:21; Acts 1:16-17; Matt. 21-42.

5. The Fall of Man--We believe that God created man good, gave a just law by which he should be governed, with the promise of reward for faithfulness and with penalties of punishment for disobedience. Gave man power of free moral agency to choose the right and reject the wrong. But our first parents heeded the voice of the great enemy of souls, voluntarily transgressed the law of God, fell with their posterity under the just penalty of the same, and were unable of their own power to extricate or save themselves from the great dilemma into which they had fallen. God gave them the hope of salvation through the coming of Christ. Gen. 1:27, 2:16-17; Rom. 11:11-35; Rom. 5:18; Psalms 37:23-24.

6. Redemption, Salvation, Adoption--We believe that Jesus Christ by His birth, death, burial, resurrection and ascension paid the purchase price for the redemption of the whole human race, arranged a pardon for all who came upon Gospel terms; and a law of adoption into the Kingdom of Heaven and eternal inheritance into the glorified Kingdom above. Heb. 9:12; Gal. 3:13, 4:4-5; Titus 2:14; Heb. 1:4; St. John 3:16; Isaiah 45:22.

7. Condition of Salvation--We believe that all persons dying in infancy and all idiots are saved by the atoning merits of the Son of God without any act on their part,. that persons coming to the years of accountability, transgressing the law of God, must upon their part, exercise faith in Jesus Christ through repentance toward God, at the completion of which pardon takes place in the mind of the Father and by the Holy Spirit they pass through the ordeal of regeneration, are washed in the blood of the Lamb and are planted in the Kingdom of Christ. John 3; Matt. 19:13-22; II Cor. 7:10; Luke 18:17; St. John 4:11-16; Psalms 98:3.

8. Salvation Free--We believe that God desires the salvation of all; Christ died for all; the Gospel invites all; the Holy spirit strives for all; and whosoever will may come and be saved on the terms of the Gospel. Rev. 22:17; I Peter 1:9-13; I Peter 2:9-24; Rom. 3:24.

9. Baptism--We believe that Christian baptism is the immersion of believers in water, in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, in which are represented the burial and resurrection of Christ; also represents our death to sin, and only those who have come under the presbytery of the elders are qualified to administer the same. Matt. 3:14-16, 3:5-6; I Peter 3:21; St. John 3:23; Acts 10:47; Matt. 28:19.

10. Communion and Feet Washing--We believe that the Lord's Supper and the washing of the saints' feet are ordinances of the Gospel of Christ; The Lord's Supper was instituted by our Savior to commemorate His broken body and shed blood for the sins of the world and to show our remembrance of Him till He comes.

All Christians have a right to the Lord's Supper and should be invited. "Let a man examine himself and so let him eat."

The washing of feet was instituted by our Lord at the same time that Supper was instituted as an act of humility to show our love for each other, and both ordinances should be perpetuated by all Christians until His second coming. Luke 22:19-20; I Cor. 11:20-29; St. John 13:1-18; Matt. 26:26-29.

11. The Sabbath--We believe that the Christian Sabbath should be observed as a day of rest and for the worship of God; that we should abstain from all sinful amusements and secular employments, works of mercy and piety excepted. Exodus 20:11, 31:12-18; Deut. 5:12-15; Ezek. 20:12; Matt. 28:1; Luke 23:56; Acts 13:42-48; Mark 2:27.

12. Call to the Ministry--We believe in a Divine call of the ministry; that God in His goodness and power of grace, impresses His ministers with the burden of lost souls to the extent that the call becomes irresistible with personal contentment; that when they yield to the call and exercise the native gifts according to the Scriptures, with full reliance upon Him, He accompanies them in person of the Holy Spirit to guide them in the way of truth and to bless their labors according to His purposes. Jonah 1:1; Jer. 1:5; Mark 3:14; Acts 1:22-26; Matt. 28:19.

13. The Invisible Church--We believe that the Invisible or Spiritual Church is the redeemed in the aggregate, is the family of God, is composed of all true Christians of every congregation from righteous Abel to the restitution of all things from every kindred, nation, tongue and people. Eph. 3:16-21; Heb. 12:22-23; I Peter 2:5; Eph. 2:20-22; Acts 2:47; Matt. 16:18.

14. The Visible Church--We believe that a visible church of Christ is a congregation of faithful men and women, having obtained fellowship with the Lord and with each other, agreeing to keep up a good discipline and doctrine according to the rules of the Gospel. II Thess. 1:1; Acts 16:5; III John 1:10; Matt. 18:17; Acts 20:28; Rev. 1:4, 11, 20.

15. Perseverance--We believe that all true believers in Christ should persevere in divine graces, and in the knowledge of the truth and that God's grace is sufficient to help them to overcome all the obstacles of life and that all the combined forces of the great enemy of souls on earth and in Hell (or in his eternal abode) are not able to pluck them from his hand so long as they walk in the path of duty; but those who sidestep and willfully refuse or neglect to perform their duty, they would backslide and if persistently continued, would be eternally lost. II Cor. 9:10; II Peter 1:4-8; II Peter 1:12; I Peter 2:2; Rom. 8:35-39, Apostasy; II Peter 1:8-9; I Cor. 10:1-13; Heb. 12:15-17; I John 5:16; Heb. 6:1-6; I Tim. 4:1-2; Heb. 3:12; St. John 15:1-7; Matt. 12:31-32.

16. Christ the Head of the Church--We believe that Christ is the Great Head of the Church and that the government of the local church is with the body. Col. 1:18-19; Matt. 16:18; Heb. 12:23; Matt. 21:42; Eph. 1:22; Acts. 16:4-5.

17. Sanctification--Sanctification is work of God's grace, by which the soul is cleansed from all sins and wholly consecrated to Christ. It takes

place in regeneration, and the Christian can and should abide in this state to the end of life constantly growing in the grace the knowledge of our Lord
18. The Resurrection--We believe in the resurrection of the dead, both of the righteous and the wicked. When the resurrection shall take place, the soul and body shall be reunited, the righteous shall be received into everlasting happiness to reign with God forever, but the wicked shall go away into everlasting punishment. Matt. 28:6; St. John 5:28-29; I Cor. 15:51-58.

19. The Soul--The soul is endless, hence does not die with the body, but immediately after death enters into a conscious state of happiness or misery, according to spiritual character here possessed. Phil. 1:23; Luke 23:43; Rev. 6:9; Luke 16:19-25; Matt. 10:28.

20. Judgement--We believe that there will be a general, universal judgment, when all men shall be judged according to their works whether they be good or bad, and that immediately thereafter, the wicked shall enter into everlasting punishment and the righteous into eternal happiness. II Thess. 1:4-9; Rev. 14:9-13; Luke 16:23; Rev. 21:8; II Cor. 5:10; Matt. 12:36-37; Rev. 20:12-13; Acts 17:31.
