Report of Credentials Committee

- 1. We recommend that J. P. Hudson be licensed to preach the gospel.
- 2. We recommend that Rev. V. F. Boner and Rev. L. A. Rosser be licensed to preach another year.
- 3. We recommend that Rev. G. P. Givens be ordained to preach the gospel.
- 4. We recommend that Bro. J. C. Pewitt, Bro. Ollie Porter be ordained as deacons.
- We recommend that Pewitts Chapel be accepted into this Association.
- 6. We recommend that the General Business Board appoint a committee to settle trouble at Alabama City Church.

Report of General Business Board

- 1. We recommend that our Association support our National Unified Program of the National Association, money for this is to be sent to Rev. F. S. Van Hosoe, Paintsville, Ky. He divides it between foreign and home missions, education, and superannuation.
- 2. We recommend 500 minutes be printed and sent out by the clerk.
- 3. We recommend the clerk be paid \$12.00.
- 4. We recommend that a delegate be sent to the National Association in Nashville, Tennessee, the week after the second Sunday in July, 1943. That an entrance fee of \$5.00 be given him and train fare if possible.
- 5. We recommend a delegate to the State Association at Pell City, Alabama, to be appointed and \$5.00 be given and train fare if possible.
- 6. We recommend that the Moderator be given authority to investigate how pastors are governing their churches and filling their appointments. If your church has a complaint write the moderator.
- 7. We recommend the Association pay the Cordova Church \$3.00 for printing programs.
- 8. We recommend article eight of the Constitution be changed so as to read: This Association shall vote by acclamation where it will convene next time until one church gets a majority.
- 9. We recommend that the ordaining council be appointed to take care of ordination for at least one year.
- 10. We recommend that the moderator go to Alabama City three Sundays if necessary and see if he can get them to agree on a pastor. If they fail to pay his expenses the Home Mission Board will pay it.
- 11. We recommend that article nine of the constitution be changed so as to read: The constitution or by-laws may be altered or amended by a majority vote in any regular session of the Association, provided it lies on the table from morning until evening or evening til morning and being read twice in creation.
- 12. We recommend that any conference, besides the regular quarterly conference, be announced in three services of the church before it is held.
- 13. We recommend that we have three day sessions from now on and the women have the second day. This means we will

meet Thursday, Friday and Saturday before the second Sunday in October.

14. We recommend that we accept Rev. Damon C. Dodd into this association.

15. We extend our heart-felt thanks to the Cordova Church and community for their hospitality shown us during this session.

Flower Committees

CONSTITUTION

Article 1. This Association shall be known as the Progressive Association of Free Will Baptists of Alabama and bordering states.

Article 2. This Association shall be composed of ministers, deacons and delegates of different churches forming the same.

Article 3. All ministers and churches wishing to become members of this body must willingly submit to the Articles of Faith, Constitution, and all rules of the same.

Article 4. Each church in this Association shall be entitled to three delegates for the first hundred members, and one delegate for each additional fifty members, or fraction thereof.

Article 5. This Association shall have a credential committee, composed of three memebers, two ordained ministers and one layman, who shall be appointed by the moderator at the convening of each regular session, whose duty shall be to examine all church letters and applications for membership for both churches and ministers and make a report of same to the body

Article 6. The officers of this Association shall be a moderator, assistant moderator, clerk, and treasurer, who shall be elected by talict at each regular session.

Article 7. This Association shall meet on Friday and Saturday before the second Sunday in October of each year, and shall not adjourn until all business is transacted.

Article 8. The Association shall vote by ballot where the next Association shall be held until one church gets the majority of votes cast.

Article 9. The Constitution or By-Laws may be altered or amended by a majority vote of any regular meeting if the proposed amendment shall have been presented at the last preceding regular meeting and approved by that body and published in the mirutes with notice that it will be acted upon at the next meeting.

Article 10. No ministers, deacons or delegates shall be seated in this body unless they agree to stay throughout the session unless they are providentially hindered.

Article 11. Each church representing in this Association shall be required annually five cents per capita as an asso-

ciational fund for the purpose of printing the minutes and associational expense.

RULES OF DECORUM

- 1. This Association shall be opened and closed with singing and prayer.
- z. The officers elected at the previous session shall begin their administration at the opening of each regular session.
- 3. Only one person shall speak at a time. They shall arise and address the moderator and when recognized they shall proceed.
- 4. No person shall be interrupted while speaking by anyone except by the moderator and not by the moderator unless he breaks the rules of order.
- 5. The person speaking must adhere to the subject in question and shall not use words of personal reflection.
- 6. No person shall speak more than twice on the same subject without leave of the Association and not more than five minutes each time.
- 7. No member shall laugh or whisper in time of public speaking.
- 8. No member shall address another except by the appellation of brother or sister.
- 9. No member shall absent himself without leave of the moderator.
- 10. The names of all the ministers, deacons and delegates shall be enrolled by the clerk, and called as often as deemed necessary by the moderator.
- 11. Every member of this body shall vote for or against every move that comes before it. Those failing to do this shall be reprimanded by the moderator.
- 12. Any person who shall knowingly break any of those rules shall be reproved by the moderator according to directions of the Association.

CHURCH RULES

- 1. We agree as a member of the Progressive Association of the Free Will Baptists to co-operate in every move for the betterment of our denomination and the extension of God's kingdom throughout the world.
- 2. We agree to meet in conference quarterly or oftener if necessary to transact the business of the church.
- 3. The moderator shall be chosen by the suffrage of the church in the absence of the pastor. The moderator shall observe good order and explain all questions before he takes the voice of the church on them, and shall have the liberty of speech as any other, but no vote unless there be a tie, when he shall give the deciding vote.
- 4. It shall be the duty of all members to fill their seats in conference and bear their part of the expenses.

- 5. No member shall leave their seat during conference without permission from the moderator.
- 6. No member shall arraign another before the church for any grievance without first taking gospel steps. See Matthew 18:15-16-17.
- 7. All business brought before the church by motion and second and in gospel like order shall be attended to by the church unless withdrawn by the mover.
- 8. Any person wishing to speak shall arise and address the moderator and if two arise at the same time the moderator shall decide who shall speak first and no member while speaking shall cast any reflection on any person but shall adhere strictly to the subject under consideration.
- 9. No member shall speak twice on any subject without permission from the church and not more than five minutes at the time.
- 10. It shall be the duty of all church members to be present at all church meetings to vote on all questions that come before the church when called on by the modrator or any member of the church who desires to obtain the mind of the whole church.
- 11. If any member shall remain silent during the transaction of any business of the church and afterwards complain of what was done the same shall be deemed disorderly and the member so offending shall be dealt with accordingly.
- 12. We agree to do all business by a majority of the members present at any regular or called conference providing a quorum is present, said quorum being seven members or more.
- 13. These rules shall be read at the opening of each conference, strictly enforced by the moderator.
- 14. Any member who shall wilfully absent himself from church and who fails to discharge his duties as a member for six months, unless Providentially hindered shall not be permitted to vote in Church Conference until he or she make restitution.
- 15. Any member desiring to move his membership from one church to another in this Association must have a letter, failing to do so he is taken under the watch care of the church until he presents the letter.
- 16. Concerning the ordination of deacons: (a) He must be elected by the church of which he is a member. (b) He must be appointed for the work of the church by the Credentials Committee. (c) Any local church in good standing in the Association, if it so desires, may ordain deacons with the help of any two ordained ministers and five ordained deacons who are approved by the moderator of the Association.

RULES FOR PREACHERS

- 1. All ministers wishing to become members of this Progressive Association will be required to go before the Credential Committee with a recommendation from the church of which they are members, and will also be called upon to present their credentials for examinations and answer satisfactorily such questions as they ask them.
- 2. All preachers shall attend all business meetings unless providentially hindered.
- 3. Any minister who behaves himself unbecomingly to his high and exalted calling shall be reported by the credential committee to the Association who shall deal with him.
- 4. All ministers will be required to strictly adhere to the teachings of the Free Will Baptists according to the Articles of Faith.
- 5. No minister shall speak slanderously or cast personal reflections upon another minister that will hurt his influence or ministerial standing.
- 6. All ministers shall be required to support and stand by all boards and committees appointed by this Association and do their utmost to make them a success.
- 7. All ministers shall be required to support and stand by Il boards and committees appointed by this Association and do their utmost to make them a success.
- 7. All ministers must make an annual report of the work done by them and submit the report to the Association at its regular session.
- 8. An aspirant to the ministry must be recommended to the Credential Committee by his church for license and if they find him worthy they recommend him to the Association.

9. If, at the end of one year, he has proved himself worthy and has been called to a pastorate, the church of which he is a member recommends him to the Credential Committee for ordination. If he is approved he is then recommended to the Association for ordination.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

- 1. We believe that there is but one true and eternal God, the Father, of whom are all things from everlasting to everlasting, glorious and immutable in all His attributes. 1 Cor. 8:6; Isaiah 40:28.
- 2. We believe that there is one Lord Jesus Christ, by whom are all things, the only begotten Son of God, born of the Virgin Mary whom God freely sent into this world, because of the great love wherewith He loved the world, and Christ as freely gave himself a ransom for all; tasting death for every man, who was buried and rose again the third day, and ascended into Heaven from whence we look for Him the second time in the clouds of Heaven at the last day to judge both the quick and the dead, 1 Timothy 2:5, 6; St. John 3:16; Rev. 1:17; Acts 24:15; I John 2:2.
- 3. We believe that there is one Holy Ghost, the precious gift of the Father through His dear Son, unto the world; who quickeneth and draweth sinners home to God, St. John 16:7-8; Acts 2:4; Eph. 4:4-6; Eph. 2:1.
- 4. We believe that in the beginning God made man upright, and placed him in a state of Glory without the least mixture of misery, from which he voluntarily, by transgression fell, and by that means brought on himself a miserable and mortal state subject to death, Genesis 2:17; 3:19.
- 5. We believe that God is not willing that any should perish; but that all should come to repentance and the knowledge of the truth, that they might be saved, for which end Christ hath commanded the Gospel to be preached among all nations and to every creature. Mark 16:15; John 3:15-17; I Timothy 2:4.
- 6. We believe that no man shall suffer in hell for want of a Christ who died for him, but as the Scripture has said, for denying the Lord that bought them because they believe not in the name of the only begotten Son of God, unbelief therefore being the cause why the just and righteous God of Heaven will condemn the children of men; it follows against all contradictions that all men at one time or other are found in such capacity as that through the grace of God they may be saved, Acts 17:30; Mark 6:6; Hebrew 3:10; John 5:10.
- 7. We believe the whole Scripture is infallibly true, and that they are the only rules of faith and practice, 2 Tim. 3:16-17.
- 8. We believe in the doctrine of General Provision made of God in Christ, for the benefit of all mankind who repent and believe the gospel, Luke 14:16-20; Luke 13:3-5; Luke 24:27; Matthew 28:19, 20; Acts 3:19; Mark 1:15.
- 9. We believe that sinners are drawn to God, the Father,

by the Holy Ghost, through Christ His Son, and that the Holy Ghost offers His divine aid to all human family, so as they all might be happy, would they give place to His Divine teaching whereas such who would not receive the divine impressions of His Holy Spirit shall at a future day, own their condemnation just, and charge themselves with their own damnation for wilfully rejecting the offers of sovereign grace, Matthew 11:27; St. John 6:44-65; Psalms 1:1; Titus 2:11, 12; Jeremiah 22:29.

- 10. We believe that men, not considered simply as men, but ungodly men, were of old ordained to condemnation, considering such who turn the grace of God into lasciviousness, denying the only Lord God, Jesus Christ, who brought them, and therefore, shall bring upon themselves swift destruction but we observe that they and such the Apostle saith because they receive not the love of faith that they might be saved, therefore, the indignation and wrath of God is upon every son of man that doeth evil, living and dying therein for there is no respect of person with God, Jude 1:4; 2 Peter 2:1-2; Thessalonians 2:11, 12; Romans 2:9-11.
- 11. We believe that all children dying in infancy, having not actually transgressed against the law of God, in their own persons are only subject to the first death, which was brought on them by the fall of the first Adam and not that any of them dying in that state shall suffer punishment in hell by the guilt of Adam's sin, for such is the kingdom of God, 1 Corinthians 15:22; Matthew 18:2-5; Mark 9:36-37; Matthew 14:14.
- 12. We believe that good works are the fruits of a saving faith and that in the use of the means of grace, and not out of the use of those means, eternal life is promised to men, Rev. 22:14-15; Isaiah 1:19, 19; Matthew 7:8; Jeremiah 6:16, Luke 13:34-35.
- 13. We believe that no man has any warrant in the Holy Scriptures for justification before Ged through his own works, power or ability which he has in and of himself, only as he by grace is made able to come to God, through Jesus Christ believing the righteousness of Jesus Christ to be imputed to all believers for their eternal acceptance with God. Romans 4:24; Acts 8:20-21.
- 14. We believe that all things are forseen in the wisdom of God, so that God knoweth whatever can or cannot come to pass upon all supposed conditions, yet not having decreed any person to everlasting life, out of respect of mere choice, farther than He hath appointed the Godly into life and the ungodly who die in sin unto death. Hebrew 4:13; Proverbs 8:22; Matthew 25:21-24.
- 15. We believe, as touching Gospel ordinances, in believers baptism, laying on the hands, receiving of the sacrament in bread and wine, washing the saint's feet, anointing the sick with oil in the name of the Lord, fasting, prayer, singing praise to God and the public ministry of the Word, with every institution of the Lord we shall find in the New Testament Mark

IC:15, 1C; Acts 8:17 ; Acts 19:6; Luke 22:19, 20; John 13:5-17, James 5:14.

16. We believe the Gospel mode of water baptism is by immersion, and that believers are the only subjects for baptism. Matt. 3:16; Mark 1:9, 10; Acts 2:38; Rom. 6:4; Colossians 2:12.

17. We believe in a general resurrection of the dead and a tinal judgment at the last day, John 5:28, 29; 2 Corinthians 5:10

18. We believe the happiness of the righteous is eternal and the torments of the wicked are endless, Matthew 25:46.

BOARD OF RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

Myrtie Bloss, Columbia, Tenn.; Willa Mae Petty, Parrish. Ala.; Lorene Sides, Cordova, Ala.; Theo. Woods, Berry, Ala.; Route 2.

1. The management and control of all work on religious education as fostered by this Association, such as the Sunday School, the League, Ladies Aids or any other religious force, shall be under the direction of the Board of Religious Education.

2. The board shall meet as often as necessary, at the call of the chairman at such time and place as he may designate. They must meet annually.

3. The board at its annual meeting elect a director of religious education, whose duty shall be to direct the entire program of Religious Education work of this Association.

4. The board shall report annually to the Association at its regular meeting, the receipts, disbursements, assets, liabilities, and of work in general. It may make any recommendations deemed advisable.

5. The board at its annual meeting shall elect its own officers.

6. Any member who shall persistently neglect any of the duties of his office, tail to attend its meetings, or to represent by proxy, shall forfeit the office and the same may be declared vacant by the Moderator of the Association and his successor appointed.

7. A majority of the board may constitute a quorum for the

transaction of business.

8. The secretary of the board shall keep correct accounts of the proceedings of the board and perform many other duty that usually pertains to his office.

9. The treasurer shall keep all money, bonds, mortgages, etc., belonging to the board. He shall give bond in such sum as decided by the board. The secretary shall be the custodian.

10. Salaries and expenses shall be allowed at the direction

of the board.

11. These rules may be amended at any time, but only by a majority of delegates present.

GENERAL BUSINESS BOARD

1. This board shall be appointed by the moderator elected

at the close of each annual session of the Association.

2. The first named shall be chairman of the board. This board shall serve one year. They are seated at the beginning of the next meeting of the Association.

. 3. The duty of this board will be to care for all the work of the Association not otherwise provided for while in session, or between sessions, such as resolutions, new business, minute printing, etc. They are to assist the moderator in caring for any business that may arise or need adjusting between sessions.

4. They will serve as the Executive Board with the moderator and clerk as ex-efficio members.

BOARD OF AUDITORS

- 1. The Board of Auditors shall have charge of auditing the books of the treasurer of each department of the Association.
- 2. It shall decide itself which shall serve as chairman and which shall serve as secretary during their term.
- 3. There are no meetings to be held except for the purpose of auditing the books.
- 4. The board shall audit the books of each department of the Association once each year, and if a shortage found it shall take necessary steps to effect a settlement, provided, however, that it the treasurer in whose book the shortage is found refuses to make settlement, the board shall report same to the executive board of the Association who shall have authority in the matter.
- 5. The board shall not audit books more than once a year unless they are questioned and audit be demanded. In such case the moderator shall have jurisdiction whether the audit shall be made.
- The board shall mave an annual report to the Association as to the condition of the books.

- 1. The management and control of the financial affairs of the Association shall be vested in the Board of Finance, elected by the Association in the manner provided by the Association.
- 2. The board shall meet as often as necessary at the call of the chairman at such time and place as he may designate, but they must meet at lest annually.

- 3. The board at its annual meeting elect a director of finance, whose duty shall be to direct the whole financial program of the Association.
- 4. The board shall report annually to the Association its receipts, disbursements, assets, liabilities and of its work in general, together with any recommendation deemed advisable.
- 5. The board at its annual meeting may elect its own officers.
- 6. Any member who is negligent in his duty shall fortest his office and the same may be declared vacant by the moderator of the Association and his successor appointed.
- 7. A majority of the board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.
- 8. The secretary shall keep a correct account of the proceedings of the board and perform any other duty that usually pertains to his office.
- 9. The board shall ascertain each year the financial needs of the various departments of church work and from such information make up the Association budget and apportion same to the individual churches.
- 10. It shall be the duty of this board to notify each church not later than October the first of each year of the amount of their apportionment.
- 11. - 3. The board in its annual meeting shall elect a director of missions, whose duties shall be to direct the whole missionary program of the Association.
- 4. The board shall report annually to the Association at its regular meeting the receipts, disbursements, assets and liabilities and of its work in general together with any recommendation deemed advisable.
 - 5. The board at its annual meeting shall elect its own officers.

- 6. Any member who shall persistently neglect any of the duties of his office, fails to attend meetings, etc., shall forfeit his office and the same may be declared vacant by the moderator of the Association and his successor named.
