## PREFACE.

Time, not weary of its rapid flight, has borne to the other world many who were numbered in our Register twelve months ago. Among these is included the one who wrote the miscellaneous part of the last No. of the Register—SAMUEL BEEDE. Who of us will follow this year we know not: therefore, it doth seriously become us to be also ready.

That the publication of a Register in our connection is important, must be manifest on a moment's reflection. Without this, or a similar publication, our members would have little knowledge of the Connection in general. Were it not for the call for an annual report, it is too true, that some churches would be scarcely able to ascertain their real numbers, much less would they keep a true account of all their variations.

With one exception we have endeavored to render this number as worthy of patronage as any which have preceded it. The exception is this: we have put in something like *prophecies* concerning the weather—not because we have any faith in them, but because there are some people who will not have any of the good there is in our Register, unless we will guess something about the weather.

Those who have taken an interest in the circulation of the Register and endeavored to extend its sale, will please accept our grateful acknowledgement for past favors. The continuance of them is also solicited for the time to come. We have fixed the price as low as it can be afforded, and we hope our friends will endeavor to secure an immediate sale.

### Rate of Postage.

For every letter of a single sheet, conveyed not over 30 miles, six cents; over 30 miles and not exceeding 80, ten cents; over eighty and not exceeding 150, twelve and a half cents; over 150 and not exceeding 400, eighteen and three fourth cents; over 400, twenty five cents.

Every letter consisting of two pieces of paper, double those rates; every letter consisting of three or more pieces of paper, and weighing less than one ounce, triple those rates; every letter consisting of more than three pieces of paper, and weighing one

ounce, quadruple those rates: and at the rate of four single letters for each ounce, which a letter or packet, consisting of more than three pieces of paper, may weigh.

Every ship letter, originally received at an office for delivery, six cents. Newspapers, not over 100 miles, one cent; over 100 miles one cent and a half; to any distance in the state where printed, one cent. Magazines and pamphlets, not periodical, for any distance not over 100 miles, four cents per sheet, that is, four cents for every 4 pages folio, 8 quarto, 16 octavo, or 24 12mo. 36 18mo. 64 32mo.—over 100 miles, six cents. Periodical magazines and pamphlets, not over 100 miles, one and a half cents per sheet; over 100 miles, two and a half cents. An annual report, or any pamphlet published at stated times, is a periodical. Magazines and pamphlets containing more than one sheet, are charged by the sheet; but those containing only a half sheet or less, are charged with one half the amount of postage of a sheet. There must be printed, or written, on one of the outer pages of all magazines and pamphlets, the number of sheets they contain; and if such number be not truly stated, double postage may be charged.

II. June 10th, Moon eclipsed very slightly, ♀ at 6h. 6m. mean time, even. invisible.

III. Nov. 20th, Sun eclipsed, invisible, ♂ at 5h. 51m. mean time, even. Moon's lat.  $0^{\circ} 9' 49''$  N.

IV. Nov. 7th, ♀ (Mercury) in transit over the Sun's disc, and mostly visible, thus:

The transit begins at about  $186^{\circ}$  from the Sun's vertex on the eastern border of its disc; and ends at about  $85^{\circ}$  from the vertex on the western side, and about 1 1-4 hour after sunset.

### Morning and Evening Stars.

Venus will be morning star till October 4th; then evening star through the year. Jupiter will be evening star till June 15th; then morning star through the year.

The calculations of our Calendar are made to mean time, save the Sun's declination, and are, consequently, adapted to the time shown by cloeks and

watches which keep true and regular motions. Hence, the equation of time becomes unnecessary, and the trouble to the reader of adding or subtracting such equation to or from the calendar time, to bring it to clock time, is wholly avoided.—Adding 4 min. to a star's time of rising, southing, or setting for every day, gives its rising, &c. for any number of days back; subtracting four minutes a day from its rising, &c. on a given day, gives its rising, &c. for any time forward.

Alioth is the first star in the tail of the Great Bear, or that next to the square, or wagon, and is a circumpolar star, never setting to us; it is, consequently, just about 12 hours from its being south below the pole, or polar star, to its being south above it—that is, from being directly beneath the north star to being directly above it; and 6 hours from south below to being due east of north star, or from south above to due west of it. It is here given for the first six months above, and for the last six below, the pole.

The equation of time is of use for rectifying time-keepers, and is given several times in each month.

With respect to those who have no knowledge of the true God, we may consider the worship of images as gratitude, led captive by the devil: but, in those to whom he is known, both truth and charity oblige us to pronounce it *idolatry*.

That which we cannot avoid, we should prepare to meet: and for that which *may* come soon, we should be always ready.

## GENERAL SUMMARY.

*Different sects of Baptists.*

There are several communities of Baptists whose sentiments are similar to those of the Freewill Baptists. Among these is the Liberty Association in Kentucky. In 1830 they numbered 8 churches and 214 members. Also, the Free Communion Baptists in N. Y. and U. C. They number perhaps 4000 members. During the past year an association of 'United Baptists' in Georgia have opened a correspondence with us, by which it appears that their sentiments are the same as ours. They have 16 churches, 10 ordained ministers and 4 licentiates. Of their churches thirteen in 1831 contained 861 members. The New Connection of General Baptists in England in 1832 numbered 114 churches and 1199 members. Under their direction they have a flourishing Academy, and both a Home and Foreign Mission Society. They have three or four missionary stations in India. There is also a Society of General Baptists in Wales.

*N. H. Charitable Society.* Annual meeting, Friday previous to the N. H. Y. M. Hon. Job Otis, of Strafford, Treasurer. Funds about \$1600.

*Vermont Charitable Society.* Annual meeting Friday before the Vermont Y. M.

*Maine F. W. B. Charitable Society.* Annual meeting Tuesday after 2d. Saturday in Sept.

*Freewill Mission Society,* attached to the Farmington Q. M. Annual meeting Friday before last Sat. in Aug.

A Charitable Society is also attached to the Prospect Q. M.

*Genesee F. W. B. Beneficent Society* is attached to the Genesee Q. M. Annual Meeting, Thurs. after 3d. Wed. in Jan.

*F. W. Baptist Foreign Mission Society.* Elder John Buzzell, of Parsonsfield, Me., President. I. N. Sanborn, do. Treasurer. Eld. S. Burbank, Limerick, Me. Corresponding Secretary. \$25 entitles any moral person to life membership. Funds perhaps \$1200.

*F. B. Home Mission Society* was organized July 31, 1834. Wm. Burr, Dover, N. H. Treasurer. Eld. D. Marks, do. Corresponding Secretary. \$15 entitles to life membership. Ladies are admitted honorary life members for \$10. Annual meeting Friday preceding the N. H. Yearly Meeting.

*Sabbath School Union*, organized at Dover, N. H. Nov. 1833. Wm. Burr, Treasurer. 12 or 15 have subscribed \$10 each towards raising a fund to establish a Sabbath School Depository, on condition, however, that the number who subscribe this sum shall be increased to 20 persons.

*Literature.*

*Parsonsfield Seminary.* Elder Hosea Quinby, Principal. There is a Ladies' department under the care of Miss L. Griswold. They have a philosophical apparatus, and the institution is represented as being in a flourishing state.

*Strafford Union Academy* has been established the past year under the patronage of the New Durham Q. M. It is in a prosperous state. Mr. J. D. Berry is the Principal.

*The F. B. Education Society* was organized under the patronage of the Sandwich Q. M. They loan sums without interest to enable the members of their churches to obtain an education.

*Sabbath Schools, Bible Classes and Temperance Societies* are rapidly increasing throughout the Connection.

### OBITUARY---Preachers.

Within a year past five more of our preachers have gone to reap their reward.

Oct. 1833, *Elder Francis Tufts*, of Hopkinsville, Ohio, departed this life in the 90th year of his age. He removed from Farmington, Me. but two years before his death. Though old and feeble he appeared zealous in the cause of Christ, and possessed Divine support in his last conflict.

Dec. 17, 1833, *Elder Samuel Albee*, of Wiscasset, in the 64th year of his age. He is represented as having been a faithful minister of Jesus Christ. He enjoyed resignation and strong consolation in his death.

Dec. 24, 1833, *Elder Dudley Blake*, of Canaan, Me. in the 44th year of his age. He was ordained Feb. 1828. He travelled the most of his time till 8 or 9 months before his death, when he was confined of consumption. He was blessed with patience and comfort on the approach of death, and exhorted his children to seek the Lord.

Jan. 8, 1834, *Elder George Parcher*, of Saco, Me. in the 52d year of his age. He was ordained about 25 years ago. It is said that he possessed a temper very mild and even, that he was a very good man, and an ornament to his profession; but being closely confined to manual labor for the support of his family, he had little opportunity to become very successful as a preacher. Though he was no office seeker, he was elected seven years in succession to serve his town as an assessor and selectman; and thrice as a representative in the State Legislature. After this he withdrew from being a candidate, probably that he might attend to the duties of a more important calling.

Feb. 9, 1834, *Elder David Fisk*, of New Hampton, in the 54th year of his age. He was baptized at the age of 28 by Eld. B. RANDAL, and ordained

at the age of 33. His labors in the ministry were successful, though he had to live principally by the sweat of his face. He enjoyed comfort in life and in death. His labors will be remembered long by many in New Hampton and the adjacent towns.

#### **MISCELLANEOUS.**

---

ORDER is that regular and methodical arrangement of things which prevents confusion. All the works of God are in order. Great and wise men have ever lived by rule and kept their works in order. All religious communities, families and individuals must have a regular order in relation to every thing of importance, or else calculate on meeting with trouble. Persons, however, who do not wish to submit to wholesome regulations will oppose the introduction of any rules that would bring them to order. **COVETOUSNESS.** This is a sin which Satan dresses in more sanctimonious plausibility than any other. He persuades the covetous man that he is poor, that the property he has will not turn for much; that his expenses are much more than they really are, and that his income is much less than it actually is; that there are always other objects of charity more important than the one to which his attention is now called; and finally perhaps that no man is more ready to give than he is, if he could only know where he ought to bestow his favors. But as he can rarely find this out, he thinks the safer way is to keep his gifts to himself.

**FREETHINKERS** some have taken for persons possessing more than ordinary powers of mind, who, having burst the bands of ignorance, have soared into the regions of more than common sense. But this is a great mistake. They are nothing more than a class of self conceited persons, who can cast off moral obligation and condemn religion. They are called Freethinkers because they can think just as they please, without evidence, even in opposition to almost any amount of testimony. The wisdom of ages has no influence with them; they are *Freethinkers*.

**FREEWILLERS.** The meaning of this word is found in the same dictionary that gives a definition of Boundwillers. The former title has been applied to the Freewill Baptists as a term of reproach. If by it is meant that we believe the human mind *can* act virtuously or viciously without any compulsion, necessity, or influence of fate, we have no objection to the term. Perhaps it is as good a word as Boundwillers.

**LIBERTY OF CONSCIENCE** properly signifies freedom from *restraint* or compulsion in our choice and judgment of the things of religion. Perhaps there never was a term that has been more frequently and

more shamefully abused than has "*Liberty of conscience.*" This has happened more generally among people that have no conscience. By liberty of conscience they mean that they themselves may speak and act as they please, and that others shall not censure their conduct.

**"WHOSE SEED IS IN ITSELF."** It is said that a single *Elm* will produce 1,580,000,000 seeds, each of which may yield the same number again. This would produce 2,496,400,000,000. The third generation would amount to three thousand nine hundred and forty four trillions and three hundred and twelve thousand billions! This would be myriads more than enough to stock not only our globe, but also all the planets of the solar system! Can this be the work of blind nature?

**How can I advance the kingdom of Christ?**—Cultivate vigorously your own growth in grace, watch your own heart, and labor with all your powers for your own spiritual good. Deeply impress your mind with the meaning of such expressions of our Saviour as the following: "Ye are the light of the world." "Ye are the salt of the earth." "Let your light so shine before men, that they, seeing your good works, may glorify your Father which is in heaven." Let the least, the most obscure Christian follow these rules, and he will effectually advance the cause of Christ. Private Christians are too apt to think that ministers, Bibles, and the benevolent enterprises of the day are the *principal* agents that God will use for converting the world. True these are indispensable in their place, but they are too apt to overlook the influence of their own private character and conduct, and the spirit manifested in their dealings. "The best way to spread pure religion is to exemplify it." A holy body of Christians, a pure church, is the most powerful army to attack Satan's strong holds. Harmless and undefiled, they would live as

strangers and pilgrims in this world. With hearts burning with love to God, and ardent affection for one another, and untiring benevolence towards all around them, their very lives would lead many to God. Yes, would every professed Christian now live in accordance with the principles of our holy religion, be faithful in all his duties, the united example and efforts of all would give Christianity an impulse that would be fatal to the very existence of Satan's kingdom in this world. Their holy lives and spotless examples could but arrest the attention and alarm the consciences of the careless, and thus they would win to Christ even the *witnesses* of their good works.

O that the church of God and all his ministers were fully sensible that the great hindrance to the immediate conversion of the world, is, *their want of more inward holiness!* O that this awful truth were sounded to the conscience of every Christian with such a voice as would effectually awaken them from their guilty slumbers, and cause them to consider carefully the responsibility that rests upon them. Christians are living too much to the world, and not enough to God. They are influenced too much by the spirit of the world, and not enough by the Holy Spirit. And a cold, worldly church, instead of being "*the pillar of the truth,*" is a millstone about its neck. Instead of its reflecting the rays of the Sun of righteousness, it sheds abroad a darkness and dreary gloom which there is nothing to dispel. "If all the cold, and worldly, and indifferent professors of religion could be exchanged, each for ten boisterous and inveterate enemies, piety might proclaim a jubilee at the brightening prospects of her cause."

Dear brethren, in view of these things, let us now retire to our closets and seek for more supplies of grace; let it be our daily labor to gain victory over sin; and in proportion as we make attainments in piety, and increase in holiness of heart, God will use us as instruments for the advancement of his kingdom. God is holy. Angels are holy. Saints in

glory are holy. Heaven is a holy place; and unless we are holy, we shall have no admittance there, for it is written by the pen of truth, that "*without holiness none shall see the Lord.*"

**To THE HUMBLE.** There are other persons again, who have so low an opinion of themselves, of their own attainments, talents and powers, that they really and unfeignedly believe they can do little or nothing for the service of their Lord. To such persons I would say, Your very humility is a proof that you *may* do something for the Lord. It is a proof that the Lord has done much for *you*, even that he has led you to take your seat in "*the lowest room,*" and has convinced you (one of the hardest things in the world for our proud hearts to be convinced of) that of yourself you "*can do nothing.*" (John xv. 5.) Remember that humility itself becomes a sin, or rather that it changes its name and nature, and is no longer humility, but indolence and want of faith, if instead of leading you to labor diligently in the vineyard of the Lord, whilst you look up to heaven for the dew of his Holy Spirit, and for "*showers of blessings,*" it leads you to bury your one talent in the earth, and to sit supine under the shadow of your own insignificance.

**To THE TIMID.** Again, there are other persons whose timidity and gentleness are greater than their courage and strength of mind, and whose fear of man is too often greater (at least to all appearance) than their fear and love of God. These persons perhaps hear activity and zeal spoken against and ridiculed, and though their hearts at times may burn to do something for that Saviour whom (notwithstanding all their weakness) they truly love, yet their hands seem tied and bound by the chain of their constitutional but sinful timidity and fear of man. Let such persons remember that "*the fear of man bringeth a snare,*" (Prov. xxix. 25) and that "*if they never move*

till they can do it with perfect decorum and propriety in the eyes of the world, they may sit still till they die."—*Hints to Five Classes.*

**THANKSGIVING DAY.** When first New England was planted, the settlers met with many difficulties and hardships, as is necessarily the case when a civilized people attempt to establish themselves in a wilderness country. Being piously disposed, they sought relief from heaven, by laying their wants and distresses before the Lord in frequent set days of fasting and prayer. Constant meditation, and discourse on the subject of their difficulties, kept their minds gloomy and discontented, and, like the children of Israel, there were many disposed even to return to that Egypt which persecution had determined them to abandon.

At length, when it was proposed in the assembly to proclaim another fast, a farmer, of plain sense, rose and remarked, that the inconveniences they suffered, and concerning which they had so often wearied heaven with their complaints, were not so great as might have been expected, and were diminishing every day as the colony strengthened; that the earth began to reward their labors, and to furnish liberally for their sustenance; that the seas and rivers were full of fish, the air sweet, the climate wholesome; above all, they were in the full enjoyment of liberty, civil and religious. He therefore thought, that reflecting and conversing on these subjects would be more comfortable, as tending to make them more contented with their situation; and that it would be more becoming the gratitude they owed to the Divine Being, if, instead of a fast, they should proclaim a thanksgiving. His advice was taken; and from that day to this they have in every year observed circumstances of public happiness sufficient to furnish employment for a thanksgiving day, which is therefore constantly ordered and religiously observed.
