Add to these EYES RIGHT and FOUR FEET, WINGS, AND FINS for lovers of natural history; Mrs. Lillie's STORY OF ENGLISH LITERATURE; Mrs. Pearson's GUTENBERG, OR THE ART OF PRINTING, and Hopkin's WAIFS AND THIER AUTHORS. Let the girls, if there are any in the family, add, as they can, the "Pansy" books, Ella Farman's COOKING CLUB, A WHITE HAND and ANNA MAYLIE, and Julia A. Eastman's series of girls' stories, while the boys should not forget GOOD-FOR-NOTHING POLLY, the OUT-OF-SCHOOL Series, and Mr. Rand's PUSHING AHEAD and BARK CABIN ON KEARSARGE. And then for filling out the shelves for the little ones, no library would be complete without Clara Doty Bates's CLASSICS OF BABYLAND, Pansy's OUR DARLINGS and LITTLE PEOPLE IN PICTURE AND STORY; BABY BUNTING, the KING OF PICTURE BOOKS, PICTURES FOR OUR DARLINGS. Besides these there is an immense variety of picture- and story-books, ranging in price from ten cents to a dollar.

We might go on almost without limit, but with these suggestions for a beginning, we leave the subject to the consideration of the great army of young readers for whom they are intended. All these volumes will be found included in the single list of D. Lothrop & Co.

ECLIPSES IN 1881.

In the year 1881 there will be two eclipses of the Sun and two of the Moon, and a transit of Mercury across the Sun's disc.

I. A partial eclipse of the Sun, May the 27th day, 6 o'clock 5 minutes in the evening, invisible to New England.

II. A total eclipse of the Moon, June the 12th day, 2 o'clock 11 m. in the morning, visible.

III. An annular eclipse of the Sun, November 21st day, 11h., 36 m., in the morning, invisible in the Northern Hemisphere.

IV. A partial eclipse of the Moon, December the 5th day, oh., 29 m. in the afternoon, invisible.

V. A transit of Mercury across the Sun's disc, November the 7th day, 7h., 53m., 23s. in the evening, invisible to North America.

SUPPLEMENTARY.

In addition to our own people whose statistics appear in the preceding pages, there are many other Baptist bodies of free communion views and practice, organized under various names. Many of them send us their Minutes, and we thus learn definitely and accurately their numbers, progress and efficiency from year to year. Others furnish us with no statistics, and we are left to gather our information as best we can.

The Disciples are a very numerous and growing denomination, whose greatest strength is in the Middle and Western States. They have some views and practices that characterize them as a people, but on most points they are not widely different from us, and our relations with them are pleasant, fraternal correspondence having been enjoyed.

The Church of God is a denomination of free communion Baptist Christians, principally located in Pennsylvania and the Western States, with which we hold occasional correspondence.

The General Baptist Associations in the Western States embrace a large number of churches and Ministers who are almost identical with us in faith and practice.

There are many associations of Freewill Baptists in the South, some white and some colored, and if it were not for cherished feelings connected with the slavery question, there would be no valid objection to a union of them all, and we with them in one body. They are found in almost every Southern State, and the entire number must be many thousands.

The Free Baptists of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick number about 14,000 members, and both bodies have signified a willingness to meet us in convention and confer together on the question of union in our Christian work.

The General Baptists of England have been in fraternal correspondence with us for many years, and the interchange of delegates has greatly strengthened the bond of union between us.

Three years ago a Committee was raised at the General Conference to confer with other Free Communion Baptist bodies, in the interests of increased union, and it is still continued, with Rev. O. B. Cheney, President of Bates College, Lewiston, Me., as chairman.

REPORTS

OF THE

FOREIGN MISSION SOCIETY.

SECRETARY'S REPORT.

No year of our mission work shows a better record than that just closed. Besides meeting the expenses of the year, we have paid a last year's deficiency of nearly \$1,000. No money borrowed, no debts incurred.

The accompanying India Report shows that the work abroad has also been prosperous.

Three new churches have been organized, with an aggregate membership of 41. Forty-three have been added to the churches by baptism, making the whole number 527.

The number of Sunday-school scholars is 641. There has been much progress toward making the India churches self-supporting. The Balasore church has already become such. The number of earnest inquirers, in the mission, is increasing, giving hope of large ingatherings, when once a general turning to Christ has commenced.

The Bible School, though lacking funds, is meeting the expectations of those who have hoped most from it. Courses of study have been established, and the hopeful work of training an efficient native ministry has commenced. Both the young men and women of the School are employed in Sunday-school work, and in such other Christian work as they are prepared for.

No report of the work of the Mission Press has been received.

The Rev. M. J. Coldren sailed for India, as a missionary of this Society, Oct. 11, 1879.

The Rev. Jeremiah Phillips, D. D., entered into his rest, Dec. 9, 1879. Having efficiently served this Society for about 40 years he has gone, unblemished and in honor, to receive his great reward. Mrs. Phillips remains among us, to receive our sympathy in her great bereavement.

Mrs. D. F. Smith has been dismissed from the service of the Society. We gratefully record the fact that our missionaries who have been seriously ill are now restored to usual health.

The claims of our mission were never stronger, its needs never greater. The missionaries must be supported; more money is needed to carry on the work. The field is wholly ours; we are responsible for the salvation of its millions of souls. The Bible School needs more funds for its work; a building for its use is a necessity. We should pray much for the missionaries and for the work. With unity of action, and by devoting all our energies and contributions to the regular work of the Society, we may hope for still greater results the coming year.

ABSTRACT OF THE INDIA REPORT.

The year has been marked by the departure to their native land of the Rev. Jeremiah Phillips, D. D., and wife, and by the coming of the Rev. M. J. Coldren. It has witnessed the opening of the Bible School, and the organization of several churches. The cold season work has been prosecuted with more than usual vigor. The missionary for the Santals has taken up his residence at Bhimpore, and the Santal Training School has been removed to that place. Honorable mention is made of the character and work of the late Rev. Jeremiah Phillips, D. D., who sailed for America on the 17th of June, 1879, and entered into his well-earned rest on the 9th of Dec. following. "A good man has gone to his rest, and his works do follow him."

THE CHURCHES.

There has been a moderate increase in the membership, and three new churches have been organized. The matter of self-support has been pressed with renewed vigor.

Midnapore. This church was organized in 1863 with three members. It has sent out two branches, now organized into churches, the three aggregating 160 members. Among them is a fair proportion of Christian workers. Nearly all the women who can be spared from home duties, are engaged as zenana teachers or in teaching small schools. The Sunday-school work secures the co-operation of nearly all the members. The additions to the church have been mostly from Christian families. The church pays nearly one-third of the salary of its native preacher. The principle of systematic giving is urged upon the members.

Dr. Phillips thus speaks of the churches under his charge:

Fellasore. Church organized in 1840. The Girls' Orphanage has principally furnished the membership of this church. These girls are year by year marrying and moving away, and thus the membership is reduced. There are but two chances of increase; a famine like that in 1866, for which we can not pray, and a genuine revival which may the Lord send soon. Miss Crawford is the real pastor of the church. Though forty and fifty miles away, and with abundant work at home, it has been a real joy for me to visit these southern churches once in two months. Eight or ten of the girls go out daily to teach heathen children, and three are doing noble Christian work in heathen villages where they live. The meetings of the church are faithfully sustained, and there is a flourishing Sabbath-school under Miss Crawford's superintendence. Silas Curtis, now our senior native preacher, has done considerable distinct work besides attending to pastoral duties. The church pays one-half his salary. All the churches under my care have been urged to the duty of self-support.

Santipore. Organized in 1867. Since the removal of the missionary and the closing of the Santal Normal School this station has suffered not a little. The people are learning the difficult lesson, for native Christians in India, of depending upon themselves. The care of the church has devolved upon Hiram Curtis, a lay preacher. The Sabbath meetings have been fairly attended, but there is a large falling off from former days. There have been a few accessions by baptism from the nominal Christian community. The principle of self-support works slowly in this church. Too much dependence on foreign aid, in the past, makes giving come hard now. This church has dismissed 16 members to the new churches at Babaigadia and Dantoon. The mission farm had attracted some who have never been a help to the church. The day is now past when converts need seek the shelter of the missionary compound. Converts of our time should, generally, keep their homes. The manliness of the converts and the power of the native church call for a thorough change of policy.

Palasbani (22 miles west of Midnapore). This church was organized the first of last March with 15 members, eleven of whom were dismissed from Midnapore. There are but three families here, but they have selected a pastor and pledged a fair share of his support. They will put up a chapel and a house for the preacher, Tuphan Chak-

dar, who is to keep up a morning school for the children, as well as a Sunday-school.

Babaigadia (25 miles south-west of Midnapore). This church was organized the 7th of last March with 16 members, twelve of whom were dismissed from Santipore. The people here are chiefly potters, and large markets are held on Saturdays. The first convert here was baptized 6 years ago. This church has chosen one of the Bible School students for its pastor, and has pledged, the first year, one-sixth of his support. They have a good school-house, which will be fitted up for a chapel. A good Sunday-school has been brought together.

Dantoon (35 miles south of Midnapore). A mission station was opened here three years ago by the late Rev. Jeremiah Phillips, D. D. Miss Phillips has been living here since the departure of her father for America. A church of ten was organized on the 6th of last March. These members were dismissed from the Midnapore, Santipore and Jellasore churches. Purna Chandra Basu was chosen pastor. The Sunday-school has done a good work. An English class for studying the Bible is attended by the babus in the government offices, and general Christian work, in several forms, has been well started. A missionary is needed here.

Bhimpore. Mr. Burkholder reports thus:—Our home is now in the jungle among the Santals. We are grateful to God for sending us here. There have been four additions to the church by baptism. The church now contributes four rupees per month toward the support of its pastor. Dukhu Murmu, a most promising young man, connected with the Bible School, has been chosen pastor. All the services of the church are, as a rule, well attended. One of our number has died, but he was prepared for the change. The Sabbath-school is in a prosperous condition, with an average attendance of 60 during the sessions of the Training School. We wish those at home who have contributed so liberally toward the support of Mrs. Burkholder's work among the poor, could look in upon these neglected children some Sabbath afternoon, and see them attentively listening to the words of their teachers, and repeating after them the ten commandments and the Lord's prayer.

Balasore. Mr. Marshall reports as follows:—We have relaxed none of our efforts for the instruction and conversion of the people of this station and district. We are able to report growth in several important directions. The church has maintained a better standard than usual. Seventeen have been added by baptism. The church is now self-supporting, having a pastor of its own and paying his entire salary. This has been secured not only by teaching religious duty, but by aiding the people into positions on good salaries, or into successful prosecution of business. The Sabbath-school is well-attended, and several of its members have been converted and added to the church. The number in the Sabbath-school is 124.

Vernacular School. This school, standing first last year among schools of its grade, has fully maintained its high position. The attendance has increased from 50 last year to 80 this year. Very few pass through this school who do not lose faith in idols and become strong believers in the true God. The school has cost the mission twenty rupees per month the past year.

DISTRICT WORK.

One hundred and twenty-four days have been spent in this work, our tours extending to almost every part of the field. The first tour was made to the west of Balasore, to the villages among the mountains and jungles of the Mayurbhanj Raja's territory. Though no missionary had preceded us here, we found the people with considerable knowledge of our religion, and ready to hear us. Our second tour was to the south, extending to the southern limit of our territory. The people about Sora whom we have visited repeatedly during the year, we found still professing belief in the word we preach, but not yet ready to risk all for Christ. We held interesting meetings at Dantura, one of their villages. A congregation of 30 or more came regularly to be instructed by us. Bhudruck is still one of the most interesting fields for mission work. We found here a well-attended school for girls, conducted by Mrs. Frazer, wife of the magistrate of the place. Our next place of interest was Dhummuggar. Here we met 300 boys of the district primary schools assembled for examination. Here we sold many books and large crowds attended on our preaching. We found a man who has many years believed in Christianity, though he has not been baptized. He aided us in selling books. While a Brahmin was talking very loud and using strong language in a discussion with a native preacher, a friend remarked that such language would offend the preacher. "No, no;" replied this man, "he will not get angry whatever you say to him. It is a part of his religion never to get angry or to tell a lie." From this place we went to Santipore. There have been four baptisms during the year. One of the leading men here has been deeply impressed with the duty of doing something to spread the gospel. He has already done good service, and is destined to do much more. Having reached home, we received a cordial invitation from the king of Moyurbhanj to visit him and his wife. This we did, at his capital. This king is doing much for his people, and is kindly disposed toward Europeans. We were urged to build a church and teach his people. Mrs. Marshall found the queen intelligent, and quite willing to accept a book she had taken to her. Thus we found signs of promise everywhere we went.

WOMAN'S WORK.

Mrs. Phillips's report:

It was our privilege to visit many of the high caste women at Contai during the cold season. Their intelligence, their desire to

learn more, and the hearty welcome they gave us were most grateful. We were invited to dine at the house of a very intelligent babu. Soon after he had met us, his little wife came into the room and most gracefully gave her hand to each of us, including the gentlemen. "Oh, what changes! A zenana woman talking face to face with a foreign man." The women employed as teachers deserve honorable mention. During the cold season Nellie Cole came to visit us. She had walked six miles from a heathen village where she and an old woman are the only Christians. This is only one of Miss Crawford's faithful girls. These teachers now enter the darkest alleys in our cities, and the wildest villages in the jungle. The small number of women in the Bible School have made commendable progress. "Could the noble men who pledged so generously for the Bible School look into the zenanas and streets, crowded with untaught women and children, and then into the earnest faces of our Christian young women here, waiting to be fitted for teachers in just these places, compound interest on these pledges would reach us ere another three months roll away."

Mrs. Bacheler writes :

"There has been but little change in Midnapore zenana work. A number of native gentlemen in government employ have been transferred to other places; but these have given room for others who have asked for teachers. The work might be increased almost indefinitely were it not cramped for lack of funds. There is a cheering sign, however. The native gentlemen seem to gradually value zenana teaching, and they not only ask for it, but are willing to pay a trifling sum per month. Our teachers need to be better educated. As it is they are hard-working, persevering and modest. The work thanks its kind helpers, and mutely asks them to continue their help."

Miss Crawford says :

"Work by Christian girls among heathen women and children has been rather fluctuating through the year. Two hundred and five pupils have been instructed more or less, with an average of about half that number. The girls who stay in the villages where they teach often read the Bible to women who do not learn to read. Some of these women are exceedingly fond of hearing Christian hymns sung, and they sometimes exclaim, 'What good words, and how true and kind they are.' We rejoice with trembling over these dear girls and women who go amongst the heathen, and beg all our Christian friends to pray that they may keep very near the Saviour and not become contaminated."

Abstract of Mrs. Burkholder's report :

Most of December and January were spent in camp, visiting the Santal village schools. Progress has been made in inducing the people to send their daughters as well as their sons to the schools. Many of the teachers are gathering in the girls, and some of them are teaching their wives. We were cheered by having the wife of one of the

village teachers come to us and ask to be taught. We have now five schools for girls attended by 81 pupils; also the beginning of a training school for Santal girls. We find the people here more willing to learn than when we were here five years ago. They not only attend the day-school, but many of them come to the Sabbath-school. There is a great improvement in the cleanliness and in the dress of the children. It requires much patience and tact to gather and keep these children. Little by little we are getting hold of this people.

Abstract of Mrs. Marshall's report :

It has always been difficult to interest our native Christians in the education of their girls. For over twenty years there has been a good school for boys. A little more than a year ago a school for girls was started, with one teacher. Into this school, by dint of perseverance, a good number have been gathered. At present we have a good girls' school with increasing attendance, and two teachers employed, using the same curriculum of studies as the boys. In some cases the girls have outstripped their brothers. In connection with the school an hour is spent daily in learning various kinds of work. Our Orphanage still contains eleven orphans, among whom are some very bright children. Seven are supported by mission funds, one by government aid, and three by private subscription. Those who are of suitable age are sent to school and taught to labor. Some who have been connected with the Orphanage are now occupying honorable places; some are enlightening others with the truths they have been taught. One is a teacher in the Jellasore girls' school.

Abstract of Miss Hattie Phillips's report (*Dantoon*) :

The removal of my dear father from this place left the work in untried hands. For two months my sister Julia was in charge. From that time, with only five months' experience, the care of the work has fallen to me. The strong arm of the Lord has extended help to a weak child. During this time I have had for co-laborers, a few weeks at a time, Miss Hooper, Miss Bacheler or one of my sisters. Our work among women and children has not received the support from the natives which we hoped for. But the work goes on. The school-roll numbers thirty names, but the average attendance does not exceed fifteen. Within two months another school has been opened with thirty scholars. During the year about forty women have received instruction. They have made good progress. I can report no conversions, but the truth is evidently producing its effect. Sunday mornings a Bible reading (in English) is held with the leading babus of the place. They have made no move toward professing Christianity, but they have lost faith in Hinduism, and the Bible is proving itself, to them, to be a wonderful book. At the regular services of the native Christians outsiders are frequently present. Book sales for the past two months show a steady increase. There are five more schools in the vicinity than there were a year ago.

Abstract of Miss Ida Phillips's report (*Balasore*):

The zenana work has gone steadily on this year except during two weeks while the cholera was raging most fearfully. The cholera took away quite a number of my pupils, and now I hear it has come again and taken one of my best. She was one whom I had long thought almost a Christian. Amidst this suffering Christ is making his way. Homes where once the Bible was scoffed at, now it is freely permitted to enter. Very truly did a mother say to us, "Our sons are no Hindus." The young men of to-day seem almost wholly regardless of the gods. The work done by my pupils this year is better than it has been before. The people are doing much better about paying for instruction given. I have eighty scholars to report in my girls' schools. One of these schools is about three miles from town. The people of the place contribute the entire amount of the teacher's salary. One of my schools needs a more competent teacher, and the other needs a house. A good teacher for the first-mentioned school would cost about \$4.50 per month. A good school-house for the other would cost certainly not more than twenty-five dollars. I can raise part of the sum here among the natives. I have spent a little over a month in district work, which we have found very encouraging.

Abstract of Miss Hooper's report of the Midnapore ragged schools:

Despite all the obstacles in the way of a work so vast, it is interesting to note the improvement in the little ones, and the eagerness with which the teachers are received in many places by the parents. Much discretion has to be used in imparting religious instruction, since the fear of becoming Christians will cause the children to leave the schools. Two very intelligent girls have left from this cause. Still we work hopefully on. During the year the "Helping Hands" of Carlton, N. B., have sent fifty dollars for the work; the Woman's Board in the United States the same amount. It will be spent in securing the services of efficient teachers. Mrs. Phillips adds: "The year has been full of encouragement. We commenced our ragged school with seven; we now register over three hundred names, and have schools in ten different localities. We return thanks to the babus in Midnapore, and to friends in England and America who have kindly helped us. The appropriation from the Woman's Board was most timely."

Schools. Ours has been chiefly a preaching mission, but not a little attention has been paid to schools. Of Balasore Mrs. Marshall writes: "The Vernacular School, which stood first in its class in Orissa last year, has done equally well this year. One new teacher has been added without extra expense to the mission. The patrons of the school are now willing to pay a monthly fee. The Metrapore Village school has been re-opened. The Hindu girls' school is still in successful operation. There are two teachers and thirty scholars." Of Jellasore Miss Crawford writes: "The girls' school has enjoyed more

than usual prosperity. Since our last report seven girls have married, and two have been dismissed to teach, one in Midnapore, and the other in Dantoon. Another is teaching twelve miles from home, and two others eight miles distant. Seven others study and recite a part of the day, and teach the other part. The present number in the orphanage is thirty-five. Nineteen day-scholars attend from our Christian village. At Santipore Hiram W. Curtis has been keeping up a day-school during the year. There have been upwards of thirty children in attendance monthly. Babaigadia and Palasbani have their primary schools. At Palasbani Tuphan Chakdar keeps the school, and teaches the native Christian children."

Mrs. Bacheler writes: "The Santal Training School has gone to Bhimpore. This school was commenced by Dr. Bacheler in 1863 with six boys. Among the named boys who have been educated in it, are John Sinclair, Enoch Page, Perkins Brown, Plummer Brown, Tafts Brown, Adam Brown, Samuel Dudley, Joseph Chadwick, James Howe, Ben Batchelder, Ellston Sheldon and others." This school has been removed to Bhimpore, and is now under the superintendence of Mr. Burkholder. The school began with ten members on the tenth of February; two months from the day of opening forty-one names were on the roll. The school is under the tutorship of Santan Murmu, the only Santal who has ever graduated from the government Normal School. There have been between sixty and seventy Santal village schools during the year covered by this report. The year closed with sixty-one. As in former years the teachers have been brought together twice for examination. The grade of scholarship has been raised. The number of girls in these schools has been somewhat increased, there being seventy at this time.

THE DISPENSARY.

There has been no epidemic the past year. The fever and enlarged spleen still supply a considerable portion of our patients. The small-pox in virulent form visited our community last cold season. We had ten cases—three fatal. Some were attacked who had been vaccinated, though our American vaccination of from three to fifty years' standing still holds its own as a safeguard. At Midnapore two hours of the mornings are usually occupied in attending to patients. In describing his experience during last cold season, Dr. Phillips speaks of the medicine chest as the best pulpit. Many of the sick and suffering who gathered about the camp were ministered to. "Would that like the suffering ones of Palestine they would come to the Great Physician's feet. It is our joy to point them to Him."

MIDNAPORE BIBLE SCHOOL.

This was formally opened May 1, 1879, having an endowment fund of \$25,000, raised in America. The object of the school is to train candidates for missionary work in Bengal and Orissa. The Bible is the chief text-book. Twenty-one young men were admitted to the

school during the first session: two Bengali, nine Santals and ten Oriyas. Besides the Bible the following subjects will be embraced in the regular course of study: Natural Theology, Evidences of Christianity, Church History, Rhetoric, Logic, Bible Geography and Archæology, and Polemical Theology, including the controversial books of the Hindus and Mohamedans. Besides attending to their studies, the students are employed in missionary work. Two hours, from five to seven each evening, are set apart for this. They visit the bazars, and listen to the preaching, and talk familiarly with the people. Some are sent out two by two to the out-stations and branch churches. The wives of the students have been taught in Bible topics by Mrs. Phillips, and by a pundit in secular subjects. The School needs the prayers of Christians; it needs the prompt payment of the interest on the endowment; it greatly needs dormitories for the students, and a lecture-hall and class-rooms.

SECRETARY'S REPORT.

We have occasion for abundant gratitude to God for the measure of success with which he has crowned our feeble endeavors during the past year. More has been accomplished than was really hoped for at the beginning of the year. The revival of business in our country has had a salutary effect on the finances of this Society. The sum of \$4,238.50 has been distributed in appropriations by the Board, and all the appropriations to the end of the year—Sept. 1, 1880—have been fully paid. In addition to this, the several State Societies have reported the following sums raised during the year:

We have the total amount expended for Home Missions for the year, \$7,147.95

The appropriations of this Society the past year have been made to aid interests in fourteen different States of the Union, viz.: Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Ohio, West Virginia, Pennsylvania, Illinois, Kentucky, North Carolina, Minnesota, Nebraska, and Louisiana.

The Board have been obliged to refuse many calls for help and grant only a portion of what has been asked in other instances, for want of funds. None but those who have had a trial of it can fully appreciate the responsibility and perplexity attending the division of a small amount of funds among many needy. The work becomes much easier when the funds are proportionate to the real needs.

We have another occasion of gratitude to God, in that a greater spirit of union in different parts of the denomination relative to the Home Mission interest seems to be springing up. Our centennial gathering at the Weirs in July last contributed not a little to this result. The cordial grasping of hands, the commingling of spirits before the throne in the meetings for devotion, the exchange of ideas concerning plans and purposes which were found to be much nearer unity than were supposed, the glances taken at the past with its successes through devotion to principle and simple trust in Christ, and its failures because of want of unity in plan and purpose and the great amount of work looming up in the future, demanding for its accomplishment energy, zeal, devotion and union of spirit, these brought our brethren from all quarters to see eye to eye, and heart responded to heart, as over the whitened fields they cast their longing glances, and sent heavenward their earnest prayers for the descent of the Holy Spirit to clear the way before them and to consecrate and fit them for their work. Apparent differences vanished as past experiences were recalled, and the magnitude and glory of the work yet to be accomplished. All seemed to be possessed, at the close of that Conference, of purposes nobler and broader, aspirations higher and more spiritual, and a fellowship for their brethren deeper and sweeter than those which prevailed at its commencement. No branch of our work, as a denomination, received more quickening impulses from the twenty-fourth General Conference than that of church extension in our own country. Because of this, we ought to thank God and take courage, for a renewal of interest here must renew the interest all along the line of our endeavors. Let us look at

OUR OPPORTUNITIES.

In the great West, which is now being settled very fast, there is sufficient territory to make out six or eight States, each the size of all New England. Centers of trade and influence are being formed at the present time, which are to give character to the surrounding country for centuries to come. If we go into those centers early, before society crystallizes, we may have our share in forming public opinion throughout those regions, and in leading the generations yet to come. If we refuse to enter where we are now so earnestly invited, another shall go before us, and it will be of little avail for us to attempt to follow a quarter of a century hence. In West Virginia there is an opportunity for doing effective work in Taylor and adjoining counties, a work which may tell not only on the future of our denomination, but on the future of our country. Our people are strongly opposed to oppression, and a little more influence of that kind, in that State, will sooner or later be felt in rescuing it from the old slave-power. The opportunity for planting churches in the Kanawa valley has been recently opened to us.

The work accomplished already at Harper's Ferry can not be overestimated. We have sent forth from Storer college at least two hundred persons fitted to teach, besides ministers and other professional men. These, at a small estimate, will come in contact with fifty persons every four years, giving them the elements of a good English education, and putting them in position to push on to higher attainments. This tide of teachers has been flowing forth for the last ten years. We therefore conclude that at least twenty thousand colored persons have already felt the influence of Storer College, and these twenty thousand are in turn to exert their influence on their surroundings. It is but a small amount which has been expended for the support of this interest for the last thirteen years, and yet, who will tell us where so little money has done so much in the process of elevating our humanity and honoring our Saviour during these years? The influence of Storer will advance in geometrical ratio, if we are ready to do liberal

things for her. This is one of our grandest opportunities. Philadelphia may become one of our strongholds. Boston and Worcester, Mass., are fields where judicious labor and expenditures of means will make ample returns. The former of these places has long been under cultivation by us, but in order to the greatest success it needs to have a vigorous effort put forth in its behalf. The latter place offers inducements for labor equal to any of our new fields. A dozen laborers might find employment for the Master in Aroostook county, Maine. Thus the fields are white ready for the harvest, but the laborers are few, and the means for their support are not abundant.

Let us glance at what has been accomplished. An abstract of the report of Rev. A. H. Morrell, from the Shanandoah Valley Mission, is appended, which speaks for itself. Rev. J. S. Manning spent the months of April and May in visiting the Quarterly Meetings of colored people, in what has been known as the Cairo Mission in Southern Illinois and Kentucky, with cheering results. Letters from the colored brethren, and the report of their delegate to the General Conference, bear record to the high esteem in which Bro. M. is held among them. He is accustomed to hold a Ministers' Conference for two or three days, in connection with Quarterly Meetings, where questions of doctrine and polity are discussed, to the advantage of the ministers and the churches over which they preside. Bro. Manning has been returned to the work for the coming year, to the great satisfaction of the brethren there. Rev. J. Blackstone has been acting as our missionary among the colored churches of Louisiana, with satisfactory results. He is to continue in the same work the year ensuing.

Rev. S. F. Smith has been acting missionary for this Society in Nebraska. The work, under his direction, has prospered as well as could be expected, considering the extent of his field and the small amount we have been able to appropriate for it. He ought to be sustained so that he could give his entire time to the work. He has also been continued in his mission for the coming year.

The first church in Harrisburg, Pa., has been enabled to lift a

heavy debt which has long embarrassed it. The Pond Street Church, of Providence, R. I., has been enabled, by the assistance rendered by this Society, to finish its audience room (at an expense of about \$1,400) without increasing its debt. A grand record for the work of one year. Much credit is due to the energy, ability and perseverance of the pastor, Rev. J. D. Veney (a graduate of Storer college), for these results. The Park Street Church, Providence, one year ago was without a home, its house having been sold without its knowledge to satisfy the mortgage. The whole matter was quite irregular, and the position very embarrassing. The house has been repurchased by the church and is now owned by them, subject to a mortgage of only \$4,000. This, and increased spiritual prosperity, has inspired the brethren with bright hopes for the future.

The work in Minnesota has been vigorously pushed forward during the year, under the immediate direction of the State Society, which is in full sympathy with this Society, from which it has received some aid. Rev. J. B. Palmer is State Missionary. He is proving himself the right man in the right place.

The Iowa Yearly meeting is becoming thoroughly aroused in Home Missions.

Extract from the report of Rev. A. H. Morrell's report of the Shenandoah Valley Mission :

This Mission combines instruction both secular and religious. Intelligence and goodness are necessary to the highest success of any people. This mission of the Freewill Baptists amongst the freed people of the South resembles a river. I. The Christian ladies, sent out from the North at the close of the war, were like so many mountain rills from pure fountains, flowing together to swell the tide of human love to God and love to man. II. The Missionaries, furnished and sustained by the Home Mission Society, formed a junction with that branch of service. III. Storer College has poured into the same current its enlightening and Christian influence, and now, with yearly increasing joy, we witness the widening and deepening flow of this beautiful river. This "Nile" of the South overflows its banks year by year, enriching the country on every hand.

STORER COLLEGE advances in the grade of scholarship, and in favor with the people of all colors, every year. The year just closed has seen the largest number of students yet in attendance. Four graduated from the Academic and five from the Normal department. More than two hundred teachers, in all, have prepared for their work here, besides those who have entered the ministry and other professions. We suggest the great importance of a liberal endowment of such an institution in such a position.

THE CHURCHES have retained their former pastors generally, and have shared a good degree of prosperity, but the number of additions has not equalled that of some other years. Three new churches have been organized from branches of old ones the past year. Two new houses of worship have been dedicated and a third is being built.

We are thankful to God for the many friends he has inclined to aid us in this good work, especially the Woman's Missionary Society and some private individuals.

The appropriations by the Board will reach between seven and eight thousand dollars for the year commencing Sept. 1, 1880. If these appropriations are to be paid, our brethren and sisters will see the necessity of placing in our treasury some six to seven hundred dollars per month. We mean in the treasury of the Parent Home Mission Society, as that is the only source from which we can meet these appropriations.

No more has been appropriated than ought to be. Shall the money be raised to pay them, is the important question? This question must be answered by the churches, and the pastors must take the lead in answering it.

REPORTS

OF THE

EDUCATION SOCIETY.

CORRESPONDING SECRETARY'S REPORT.

The work of this Society during the past year has been conducted along the same general line of policy that has directed its efforts for the decade just closed.

Its first aim has been to encourage and promote a higher grade of culture in our ministry, by providing assistance for the young men in our schools, who are preparing themselves for the sacred office.

From reports recently received it appears that about fifteen hundred students are now attending our denominational schools of all grades. Of this number, ninety-five are reported as preparing for the ministry. Thirty-one are in the Theological schools, twenty-seven in the colleges, and thirty-seven in the academies and preparatory schools.

The number who have received aid during the year from the Treasury of this Society is fifty-five. Only a small proportion of these have received the amount of help that could have been wisely bestowed upon them had the condition of the Treasury allowed an increase of appropriations.

The principal sources of income the past year have been the same that have yielded nearly all the funds used since 1875. These are: I. A small amount of surplus interest on the invested funds remaining after meeting the claims of the colleges. II. The regular installments on the subscription notes. III. The

contributions of Quarterly Meetings, churches and individuals.

The dependence of the Society for the means of assisting its young men and increasing their appropriations for the year to come is the same as last year. It is probable, however, that the item of "surplus interest" will be considerably reduced, on account of the general reduction in the rates of interest in the business of the country, even if it be not wholly diverted from this use to other objects of the Society's care. There is also reason to anticipate a slight falling off in the amount received from the subscription or installment notes. There must, therefore, be a large increase in the contributions of individuals, churches and Quarterly and Yearly Meetings to this cause, or the work must suffer serious embarrassment, which will be surely felt for harm throughout the denomination in years to come. For, as sure as effect follows cause, whatever tends to diminish the number of godly graduates from our schools for the pulpits of our churches, or interferes with the acquirement of the highest attainable qualifications for their holy calling by those who seek the culture which the schools afford, will act as a crippling force upon our ranks all along every line of march we attempt to make in advancing the standard of the Cross. Most gratifying evidence of the increasing prevalence of this opinion among our people is found in the increase, from year to year, in the number of churches and Quarterly Meeting sessions contributing to this cause—the list of contributing churches having risen the past year from one hundred and forty-eight to two hundred and twenty-four, and of Quarterly Meeting sessions from six to forty-eight. There has also been a perceptible though not corresponding increase in the amount of funds contributed.

The practical identity of the interests of the Education Society and the denominational schools—especially the colleges—has been more actively recognized the past year than heretofore, and should receive additional recognition and emphasis in the future. The Education Society was founded on the felt necessity of an improved denominational ministry. The same

feeling brought all our schools into being. *More and better heralds of the Cross* is a fit inscription for the seal of this Society, and it is equally fit to be nailed over the door of every school we have founded. Whenever the government or instruction in any one of our schools shall so far forget this great end for which the school exists, as to concern itself primarily with mere literary and scientific culture, irrespective of the nurture of the Christian graces, the cultivation of vital piety, and the unceasing presentation of motives to "covet earnestly the best gifts," then will it become recreant to a sacred trust, and will forfeit its claim to denominational support with either funds or students. And, on the other hand, whenever this Society shall fail to take a lively interest in the welfare of the schools, which shall manifest itself in a broad and warm sympathy with them in their work, and in their trials, and in a hearty co-operation with them in all well-directed efforts to increase their efficiency and enlarge their influence, then will it be found repudiating an honest debt, and at the same time letting blood from the right arm of its own power for good.

In this day, and in this land, where State vies with State and the people with their government, in the support of public schools of every grade from the primary country school to the National University, and where church rivals church in the endowment of private literary institutions from the village academy with a single instructor to the amply furnished college with a score of learned professors, the schools must furnish a constantly increasing proportion of candidates for the pulpit, or the pulpit will surely lose its hold upon an enlightened public, and suffer a deserved decline of influence as compared with other public platforms, detrimental alike to the church and the home, and alarming in its effect upon public and private morals.

But while this is beyond dispute, it is of the utmost importance to our success in the great work of saving men that we foster in our students preparing for the pulpit that genuine evangelical spirit, that unreserved loyalty to Christ as Master and Lord, and that fervid passion for souls that so eminently characterized the

fathers in our ministry. It is not theological statuary, however elaborately molded, however exquisitely polished, that this lost world needs in the pulpit to lift it Godward, but inspired men, alive in every Christian fibre and fresh in every Christian impulse, upon whose earnest souls the breath of the Almighty has blown in swift, warm, resistless currents, men who shall make the pulpit ring with the utterance of the truth as it is in Jesus, from lips touched by the Holy Ghost. Is it not questionable, at least, whether this Society has given that attention to this branch of training for the ministry which its importance demands? Did we earnestly enquire of the Lord and faithfully deal with our young men through their course of study, might we not reasonably hope to see, entering our pulpits in the early years of this opening century, a large number of that rare type of ministers of Christ which combines the very highest human attainments with the richest gifts of the spirit?

While we cease not to encourage any and all who can so preach as to win souls, let us labor and pray for the highest possible development of ministerial gifts for the churches of our faith, and to serve the general interests of Christ's kingdom on earth.

REPORT

OF THE

FINANCIAL SECRETARY.

BENEVOLENT SOCIETIES.

By the blessing of God, the Benevolent Societies that adopted the "Co-operative Plan" of raising funds four years ago have conducted another year's work to its close with encouraging results.

The appropriations of the three Societies, for the year just ended, have all been paid by the Treasurer with the income of the year, and a small payment has been made on the Foreign Mission debt. No money has been borrowed, and no debts have been contracted by either Society during the year.

In the management of the "Mission Cards" two objects have been kept constantly in view—the one, to secure their wider distribution and more general use in the churches; and the other, to encourage the churches using them to make contributions through them to all three of the causes which they represent.

The effort in both directions has been attended with gratifying results. The Cards have been used by a larger number of churches than ever before, and of those churches where they have been in use, forty-two more have contributed to all three of the Treasuries this year than last.

The number of churches contributing to the Foreign Mission cause this year is thirty-eight less than last. Two facts will account for this, in part, at least. First, the effort made last year to

cancel the Society's debt secured collections from many churches that do not give regularly to this cause; and secondly, some special agencies were in operation a part of last year that obtained small contributions from a considerable number of churches that had never before taken any apparent interest in Foreign Missions, and whose interest seems to have declined when those agencies were withdrawn.

The amount contributed to the Foreign Mission Treasury is \$4475.27 less this year than last.

At least three causes have been concerned in this result. First, the absence of the vigorous effort made the year previous to reduce the debt, and to provide for the outfit and passage of Missionaries; Secondly, the diminished payments this year on the Bible School subscription notes, a smaller number of the notes having become due, and, Thirdly, the fact that the legacies have fallen off in the sum of \$2280.00.

The regular *contributions* for current work have fully equaled those of last year.

In the Home Mission cause, a most gratifying increase of interest has been developed during the year. Ninety-seven more churches have made contributions to the Treasury this year than last, while the amount raised exceeds last year's receipts by \$2416.36, notwithstanding the fact that there has been a falling off in the item of legacies of \$835.

Prominent among the factors in this happy result have been the stirring appeals through the *Morning Star* of brethren in the West, together with their earnest work, and the improved organization of the churches in their Mission work in several localities.

The returns of the churches in behalf of the Education Society indicate encouraging progress in its hold upon the hearts of the people. The number of churches contributing to this cause has increased by seventy-six during the year, and the amount contributed shows an increase of \$157.07, although the legacies have declined by \$467.

The gross receipts of the three causes, not including interest

on invested funds in either of them, is \$1901.84 less than last year.

Deduct the legacies from the receipts of both years, and deduct also the donation of the Printing Establishment this year amounting to \$1250, and then compare the *contributions* to the three causes from individuals, churches and Q. Ms. in the two years, and the last year shows an increase of \$430.

The expenses of conducting the business have also been a trifle larger than last year.

In the Quarterly Meetings a new and marked interest has been developed during the year, and one of the results is a large gain in the number of Q. M. *sessions* that have contributed to each of the three causes, the F. M. reports showing a gain of 79, the H. M. an increase of 110 and the Ed. Soc. an advance of 42. This favorable showing is doubtless largely due to the work of the Q. M. Mission Agents appointed according to the recommendation made one year ago.

One hundred and fifty appointments were made by the Boards, and a circular letter was addressed to each one of them near the beginning of the current year. Ninety accepted the appointment, and their services have been of great value to the cause.

Still greater prominence should be given to this department of our work, and persistent efforts made to secure a live, enthusiastic Mission Agent in every Q. M. in the denomination, who shall see to it that each session in the year is provided with an attractive, wide-awake Mission service. With only one general agent in the whole field for the three causes, the necessity is upon us to organize our Mission work more thoroughly in the Quarterly Meetings. This was contemplated in the adoption of the "Co-operative Plan" four years ago, and the Plan will be found limping until this member of it receives more attention.

A Foreign Mission deficit of \$894.58 in the current expenses of 1879 has been canceled the past year, and the old debt has been reduced in the sum of \$210. This debt should receive the earnest

attention of the Board, and the liberal contributions of our people until every dollar of it is paid.

Good progress has been made in collecting the Bible School notes, and no pains will be spared to secure the payment of every note at maturity.

The current expenses of the work in India will not vary materially, the coming year, from those of the year past. The contributions of the churches and people to the regular work under the care of the Board should not be suffered to decline for any cause, and a large number should be added to the list of contributions that the force may be increased.

The large increase of appropriations by the Home Mission Board calls loudly for new efforts and greater sacrifices for this cause, upon which so much of our success as a Christian body for the next hundred years depends. Our Home Mission income should be doubled at once, and our Home Mission enterprises increased accordingly.

The withdrawal of all assistance to our young men preparing for the ministry, through the surplus interest on invested funds, renders it imperative that a large increase of contributions begin at once to flow into the Treasury of the Education Society. We should not think of anything less than an advance of \$1000 in the year to come for this object.

The Theological Libraries at Bates and Hillsdale colleges need also \$1000 each at once to place them on a respectable basis.

In order that all of these causes may receive the regular, systematic and liberal donations of all our people, let the use of the Mission Cards be pushed vigorously everywhere and all the time.

In drawing inferences from the foregoing statements, and comparisons of results, and from the following statistical tables, two things may be safely kept in mind—first, that a very small deduction may need to be made from the more favorable aspects of the case, from the fact that the returns from the churches embraced in this report are slightly fuller than those in last year's report; and secondly, that the work of the year has been conducted

under more or less influence of the "Centennial" stimulus.

The Foreign Mission columns, in the following tables, include the contributions of churches, individuals and Quarterly and Yearly Meetings for current work and for the debt, all payments, both of principal and interest, on the Bible School notes and all bequests.

The Home Mission columns contain the receipts of the Parent H. M. Society and of the several State H. M. Societies from contributions, subscriptions (paid) and legacies.

The Education columns exhibit the receipts from contributions, legacies and installments on subscription notes.

The income of invested funds is not included in any of the tables.

Let a sturdy effort be made throughout the year to come to fill up the unsightly blanks in all the columns.

ABSTRACT OF THE SEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY, OCTOBER, 1880.

The Society's full report is published in the *Helper* and this condensed statement of its work is laid before the readers of the *Register*, hoping to enlist in all our churches, deeper sympathy with its efforts, and more fervent prayers for the blessing of God.

This Society supports three ladies in the foreign field, Miss Ida Phillips, of Balasore, Miss Hattie Phillips, of Dantoon, and Miss Mary Bachelor, of Midnapore. Beside this, they supply funds, as far as they are able, to other missionary ladies, for the support of native teachers. The native teachers are a very important agency in missionary work, and their importance increases year by year. They are persons who have been educated and converted in the Mission schools, and are now able to do a great work among their own people.

Miss Ida Phillips, whose work is principally among the women of high caste, writes, "Though I can not speak of brilliant success, I can say we have strong evidences that the spirit of God is at work." The Zenana work has gone steadily on, save for an intermission of two weeks, during which time the cholera raged fearfully. She reports an average of ten teachers and 156 pupils, under her care the past year. She tells us of her deep sorrow in witnessing the hopeless deaths of those blind idolaters, and in view of the great work to be done, intreats for larger means.

Miss Hattie Phillips has been trying, with heroic faith and patience, to hold the station at Dantoon, left vacant by the removal of her parents. She says, "But for the strong arm of the Lord, which is always extended to help a weak child and the cheering visits of the Missionaries appointed to the charge of the central stations, it would have been a year of burdens heavy indeed." She tells us that in her work among the women and children, she has met with trials and opposition, but she is not dismayed, because she finds strength and courage in God, and she now "stands ready, heart and hand, for the work of another year."

Miss Mary Bachelor is engaged, in connection with her mother, in the Zenana work. They are visiting forty-eight houses, with about eighty pupils. They tell us their work constantly increases in interest and extent. Besides teaching in the Zenanas, they have classes for training native teachers, of whom they employ as many as their funds will allow.

Mrs. Lawrence, Miss Hooper, Miss Crawford, Mrs. J. L. Phillips and Mrs. Burkholder have been assisted in their work by the funds of the Woman's Society. The three last report that this assistance has been of great importance, and they intreat that it may be continued and if possible increased. Mrs. Phillips has her work among the children of the poor. She employs twenty-two native woman, and two men, as teachers; and has in her schools between three and four hundred pupils. She begs for more help to save these perishing little ones, who in a few years, if they can be brought to Christ, may be the hope of India.

The Woman's Society supports Miss Lura Brackett, as teacher at Harper's Ferry, and in many other ways assists in the work which is being done there—a work most important and encouraging. A strong effort will be made, the coming year, to raise \$1000 towards building a chapel which is greatly needed there.

Mrs. Lowell, in concluding her report says, "The field is so broad, and the work is so vast, that the help of every one is needed. For this reason, we again urge that auxiliaries be formed in those churches where none now exist."

Mrs. B. F. Hayes, Home Secretary, speaks of success and encouragement, but she deplores that so many are indifferent. She implores the women of the denomination, for the sake of the dear Lord who died for them, to take hold of this work, and to see that auxiliaries are formed in every church and that Q. Meeting and Yearly Meeting Societies are established.

Our missionaries have asked for more money to use in their work,—their work increases, and demands more. With faith in God, and in their sisters in the churches, the Board has made larger appropriations for the coming year than ever before, and now they appeal to every one who reads this, to say whether the money to meet these appropriations shall be placed in their treasury, or, rather, in the Lord's Treasury. Remember every cent goes to the purpose for which it is designed. The officers of the Woman's Society do their work gratuit-

ously. Their object is, not to interfere with, but to help, the work of the Free Baptist Home and Foreign Missionary Societies, by doing a part that must otherwise remain undone, especially among women and children. They earnestly entreat their sisters in the F. Baptist churches to do as the women of other evangelical denominations are doing—to help in "woman's work for woman."
