ECLIPSES AND RATES OF POSTAGE.

ECLIPSES IN 1882.

There will be two eclipses this year, and consequently, both of the Sun, as is always the case when there are but two.

I. The first will be a *total* eclipse of the Sun, May the 17th, 2h. 48 m., in the morning; invisible to any part of the United States.

II. The second will be an *annular* eclipse of the Sun, November the 10th, 6h. 35m., in the evening; invisible to any part of North America.

There will be a transit of Venus over the Sun's disc, December the 6th; visible in the United States.

Venus will be morning star from the beginning of the year until February the 20th; then evening star till December the 6th day; then morning star till September, 1883.

SUPPLEMENTARY.

The preceding pages give the statistics of the denomination, as they have been furnished us, but they do not embrace all the Baptists in sympathy with us on the subjects of freedom of the Will, free communion, &c. Other bodies, some of them quite numerous, are one with us in the advocacy of these great doctrines, and some of them send us their annual Minutes, while others do not.

There are many associations of Freewill Baptists in the South, some white and some colored, and if it were not for cherished feelings connected with the slavery question, there would be no valid objection to a union of them all, and we with them in one body. They are found in almost every Southern State, and the entire number must be many thousands.

The Free Baptists of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick number about 14,000 members, and both bodies have signified a willingness to meet us in convention and confer together on the question of union in our Christian work. We are together in our Foreign Mission work, and a closer home union may be effected before many years.

The General Baptist Associations in the Western States embrace a large number of churches and Ministers who are almost identical with us in faith and practice. The question of a complete union is sometimes agitated, but the time for its consummation has not yet arrived.

The General Baptists of England have been in fraternal correspondence with us for many years, and the interchange of delegates has greatly strengthened the bond of union between us. Revs. Messrs. Goadby and Burns were with us at the Centennial Conference in 1880, and Dr. Durgin, President of Hillsdale college, represented us at their Conference last year.

The Disciples are a very numerous and growing denomination, whose greatest strength is in the Middle and Western States. They have some views and practices that characterize them as a people, but on most points they are not widely different from us, and our relations with them are pleasant, fraternal correspondence having been enjoyed.

The Church of God is a denomination of free communion Baptist Christians, principally located in Pennsylvania and the Western States, with which we hold frequent correspondence.

OF THE

FOREIGN MISSION SOCIETY.

ABSTRACT OF CORRESPONDING SECRETARY'S REPORT.

Missionary work in a heathen land is like the work of recovering a district of a great city that has gone to decay. It is first destructive. The first work to be done by our missionaries was to destroy and clear away the gross system of idolatry, and then, after that, build up in its place the beautiful and beneficent system of Christianity. This destructive work has gone on in our mission field, until now the inhabitants have but very little confidence in their idols. Thus the ground is largely cleared for Christian work. This is so far hopeful. But missionary work is also constructive, and this latter is the greater and more difficult work.

In the work of construction, we have thus far, for the most part, been doing the less showy work of laying foundations.

The fact that the people have been made acquainted with Christianity and prepared for its reception is, itself, very hopeful, though this work can not be represented by statistics. But beyond this less conspicuous work of laying foundations, important results have appeared which are both a prophecy of greater results in the immediate future, and samples of what India is to be when it is fully redeemed.

From the India report, remarkable for its clear presentation of the work and the forces employed, we learn that the work abroad has been unusually prosperous and hopeful. The churches organized last year are doing well, and all the churches are making progress toward self-support.

Forty-eight have been added to the churches during the year, making the present membership 545.

The Bible School is fully meeting the expectation of those who endowed it, and is a most hopeful feature of our foreign work. Upon the educated native preachers and teachers which it sends out must be our great dependence for future success.

A building for the accommodation of the school is greatly needed.

It will be seen from the India Report that all departments of the work are prosperous and present a hopeful outlook.

New openings for successful work make new demands upon us, and painfully suggest the inadequacy of our working force. More laborers are needed. How shall they be supplied?

Our veteran and most valuable missionary, the widow of the late Dr. Jeremiah Phillips, sailed for India Sept 24. With her, went her daughter, Miss Nellie M. Phillips, an educated physician. Mrs. Phillips returns at her own expense. Miss Phillips is supported by the Ohio Free Communion Baptist Association. The contributions to the funds of the Society, though coming in somewhat tardily, are equal to those of last year. A deficiency, existing at the end of the financial year, has now been made up. The financial outlook of the Society is hopeful; but in order that the present hopefulness may be realized, larger contributions must be made, and it is needful that they should be made promptly to meet the quarterly remittances.

The indebtedness of the Society to its permanent fund still remains but little reduced. Measures should be taken for the payment of this debt. Our opportunities are large, the demands upon us are therefore greater than ever before. We are able to meet these demands by vigorous, united work, through the ready help of God, for whom and with whom we are laborers.

ABSTRACT OF THE INDIA REPORT.

THE CHURCHES.

Balasore. This church, reported last year as self-supporting, continues to pay its pastor promptly. The pastor, one of the best educated in the mission, is faithful, and the church is prospering. A new work has been commenced in the center of the town. A book-room has been erected, a day-school of about forty pupils opened, a Sunday-school of about the same number established and regular preaching services are held. This work is mainly under the direction of Mr. Coldren. The Sunday-school at the church is prosperous. Through the day-schools, opened by Miss Phillips, opportunities are afforded for extending Sunday-school work. The present working force of the church, apart from missionaries, consists of four native preachers, two students in the Bible School and seventeen women teachers.

Jellasore. The church has had trials, but made good progress. In September it was much revived, through the special labors of Mr. Marshall. A number were baptized and added to the church. This church is mostly composed of the girls in Miss Crawford's school and is continually reduced in numbers by these girls going to other parts of the mission.

Santipore. A series of special meetings held in October resulted in the addition of a number by baptism, and in the awakening of many. Hiram Curtis, the native preacher, is a faithful laborer. Every leading member of the church has stood firm. This church, thus far behind in the matter of self-support, promises better in this respect for the future. They have now arranged to pay their church dues in connection with their land rents. Much has recently been done to awaken among the members a sense of business honor. Land rents due for years have been paid. The Sunday-school, heretofore falling back, is somewhat revived. Four members of the church are in the Bible School. A family of Hindoos from Babukha have recently come into the mission and accepted the gospel.

Midnapore. Much work has been done during the year, especially in educating the lower classes. The women are employed in the zenanas and in the day-schools for the poor, while the men teach in night-schools. The Sabbath congregations are large. The Sabbath-school connected with the church is small, since the best workers are nearly all engaged in conducting Sabbath-schools in different parts of the town.

Bhimapore. The church has had sore trials. Some have fallen deeply into sin, but they are returning. The church has had seven additions by baptism. Progress has been made in the matter of

church finances. The Sabbath-school has been kept up regularly. Six from the school have been added to the church. Besides the Sabbath-school at the church, two other small schools are gathered each Sabbath.

Palasbani. This church celebrated its first anniversary in May, by dedicating a new chapel. The chapel was dedicated free from debt, the four brethren in the church assuming the deficiency remaining. One-sixth of the pastor's salary is paid by the church. The church in Georgiaville, R. I., has paid ten rupees per month towards the salary. The pastor, Tuphan, is faithful. There are probably twenty villages in the region of this church; in all these the pastor has preached.

Babaigadia. This church, though passing through troubles still lives. Jhampad Santra is the preacher, and has done well. The church in Georgiaville, R. I., also aids in the support of this church. The church has chosen Nabakumar Kar for preacher the coming year. Work in the large Saturday market and in villages near by has been faithfully attended to. Another young man from this church has entered the Bible School.

Dantoon. Purna Chandra Basu has been stationed here during the entire year. Miss Phillips was transferred to Midnapore in November. The zenana work and the English service for babus have been suspended. The station greatly needs a resident missionary. Six converts from heathenism, received into this church, live in the village of Dainmari. In September a young man called on Dr. Phillips at Midnapore expressing a desire to become a Christian. He had been secretly baptized by the Romanists, but found no peace in keeping their rules. He asked Dr. Phillips to visit him in his own village. This he did in November, when he found him, his mother, a younger brother, a sister and her husband waiting for baptism. This man told Dr. Phillips that the first light was brought into his home through a little book, "The Peep of Day," which the Doctor had given to him in 1870. Thus fruit comes after a time from the faithful sowing.

SCHOOLS.

There has never so much been done for the education of poor children as now. Very little progress has as yet been made toward inducing native Christians to support their own schools. A high school is much needed in which pupils shall pay their tuition. An industrial school is also needed. Such a school is especially needed in case of the orphans. These children and others should be taught to earn their own bread in an honorable way. Christian farmers and mechanics are needed. It would well pay an Indian mission to set apart one missionary for the work of establishing and superintending industrial schools at all the stations.

The Balasore Boys' School. This school has had a regular attendance of eighty. At the government examination it sustained its former good reputation. It has an important influence in our mission

work, in impressing Christianity upon the Hindoo pupils, and in developing the native Christian community. The people see in these schools a benefactor, and they do not object to the direct religious teaching.

Jellasore Girls' Orphanage. The number of pupils has been reduced by various causes to twenty-five. Of the famine girls who received government aid, not one is now young enough to receive such aid. Six only remain, while five of these earn their own support in teaching. One has been received in the place of the eleven who have left during the year. The village children come in for instruction as heretofore.

Santipore School. This school under the charge of Hiram Curtis is doing well. The native Christians see more and more that the hope of the salvation of their countrymen lies in the Christian education of the children. There is a daily attendance of about fifty pupils, many of whom seem interested in the daily lesson from the New Testament, and in the repetition of the Lord's prayer.

Dantoon. The schools here were discontinued on the removal of Miss Phillips.

Babaigadia. There is a good primary school of about forty or fifty pupils. The master is paid in part from the Santal school fund. The Christian and Hindoo pupils pay for their schooling, a very cheering token.

Palasbani. The preacher in charge has kept up a school for native Christians. A few from the Hindoo and Santal villages attend it. The Bible is taught daily.

Bhimapore Santal Training School. There has been marked improvement in attendance and in standing of the scholars. The number might be much larger were there more money at command. The grade of scholarship has been increased as the boys were prepared for it. Forty-one pupils during the year. In February some of the boys were examined with a view of obtaining schools. All succeeded. A female department has been added during the year. This is under the supervision of Mrs. Burkholder. Eighteen girls have been in attendance.

Jungle Schools. There has been marked prosperity in these schools: more schools and more in attendance. Most of the teachers have done well. There are seventy-five schools, with an attendance of sixteen hundred. Last year there were ninety-nine girls, this year two hundred and fifty-six.

Midnapore Bible School. The session occupied six months, from May 1st to Oct. 28. The Principal, Dr. Phillips, was obliged to be absent from the school for two months, on account of severe sickness. Dr. Bacheler officiated as Principal during his absence. The studies of the year have been pursued on the plan indicated in the last report. The juniors have made excellent progress in Scripture topics. The juniors have been taught in English by Mrs. Phillips.

The Entrance class has been attending to the preparatory studies, and those below them have been engaged with elementary subjects.

The Bible has been made the chief text-book. Much instruction has been presented by familiar lectures by Dr. Phillips on Homiletics, Sunday-schools, Bazar work, Funerals, Burden-bearing, Politeness, Revival Services, &c. Dr. Bacheler has given familiar lectures on anatomy and physiology. An interesting exercise, on Tuesday evenings, has been the public reading of Bible passages, the student reading a passage and then being subjected to criticism; afterwards the student gives the substance of the passage in his own language when he is criticized again by his fellow pupils. Thus are the students learning to tell the Bible story forcibly, in their own language. The women's department is in charge of Miss Phillips. Most of the pupils in this department are wives of the students in the Bible School. Much work has been done by the students. They are sent out, two and two, on alternate Saturdays, to conduct religious services on the Sabbath. The two closing months of the year were spent by the students in itinerating with the missionaries. A building for the school is much needed.

WOMAN'S WORK.

The year has been decidedly in advance of any other.

Midnapore. The Perry Sunday-school is now divided into branch schools held at the places of the day-schools. In the very vilest quarters of the city we have one of these schools. Sabbath-schools at twelve other places are doing well.

Zenana Work. This work is beset with many difficulties, but progress is being made. The aggregate number of houses visited during the year is seventy-five, the average thirty-five, the aggregate number of pupils one hundred, the average sixty. Miss Bacheler is now engaged in teaching a school exclusively for zenana teachers. This meets with marked success. Our working finances are in a low state. Help is needed in this direction, if we are to carry the light into these dark homes.

RAGGED SCHOOLS.

There is a decided increase of little girls in the poor schools this year. This is hopeful, since to educate the mothers is the surest way to elevate the people. More mothers are graduated from these ragged schools than from the colleges of America. In all places where schools are held during the week, the children come on Sunday for religious instruction. In these ways the good seed is being scattered, and the workers are hopeful. Much aid has been rendered in this work by the gifts of the women and children of New Brunswick.

THE BIBLE SCHOOL.

In woman's work, prominent mention deserves to be made of the woman's department of this school, under charge of Miss Phillips.

While the pupils of this school are being prepared for future usefulness as teachers and Christian workers, they are even now employed in such work as they may be able, and have opportunity, to perform.

Jellasore. During the year one hundred and seventy-eight pupils have been taught, but the average is considerably less. The three schools farthest from headquarters have been given up. The school that was started at Lucknath has also been given up. The teacher of this school has gone to Balasore and is teaching there. Three new schools have been started, but one of these is now closed, because the man in whose house it was held has died. The Sabbath-school has been diminished in numbers by all who have left Jellasore and by a few others who have gone over to the enemy. The present average attendance is about one hundred.

Bhimpore. The work here has considerably increased since the last Report. The whole number under instruction during the year, two hundred and seventy-six; twelve teachers have been employed. Many of the girls in the day-schools are also brought into the Sunday-school. There is a girls' department of the Training School. The number during the year has been eighteen.

Balasore. The work is more encouraging. At Sora Mrs. Marshall and Miss Phillips were welcomed by Sara Ma, a widow who has been trying to be a Christian for six years. At Ludigadia they were invited by Brahmins to visit their families. At Russo, where a white woman had never been seen before, Mrs. Marshall was invited into the houses, and found earnest inquirers. One woman, after asking many questions, said, "Your husband and mine believe alike," whereupon she brought out a couple of soiled leaves of the Gospel of Mark. In Bhuddruck the Hindoo girls' school is in a flourishing condition, having two teachers and sixty pupils. A building has been erected, mostly by subscriptions of native gentlemen.

During the past year the mission girls' school has been organized upon the principle of a normal school. There are, at present, forty-six in the school. A house for this school is much needed.

ZENANA WORK.

Progress has been made. The women more readily submit to a regular course of instruction. A monthly fee is exacted of all pupils. The teachers have been provided with Bible catechisms which they are to teach wherever they go. Some of the women study regularly the Bible or books relating to it. In October a school was opened in a part of the town never visited by our teachers before. This school is in a flourishing condition. The work for Hindoo girls has been most encouraging. During the year two schools have been opened, one of nine pupils, the other with twenty-six. Their success is assured. There are now, under Miss Phillips's direction, seven schools, with two hundred and forty-four pupils. Number of pupils in the zenanas, eighty-five.

MEDICAL WORK.

In the mission it is the rule for every person having charge of a station to keep in supply more or less of the needed remedies, and it is certain that many lives have been saved in this way. The work of the dispensary, in charge of Dr. Bacheler, has had its usual amount of attention. About three thousand cases have been treated during the year. Two hours of the morning are devoted, when necessary, to patients while urgent cases receive attention at any time of day or night. Most patients come to the dispensary. There is an increasing willingness on the part of the poor to help meet the expense of the aid they receive. The present is the forty-first year of the existence of this special department of the mission. Dr. Phillips attends to medical practice very little, except in camp. A well-filled medicine chest is taken with him on missionary tours. As a rule there is very little surgery in camp, and that confined to cases of the minor class. Favorable opportunity is afforded for giving religious instruction to patients, and some of these listen very thoughtfully.

PREACHING TO THE HEATHEN.

Of Midnapore district work, Dr. Phillips reports that he was able to spend but two months in itinerating, on account of illness. This time was spent in the vicinity of the three churches under his charge. Several days were spent in the vicinity of Dantoon, including Dainmari, where is the Brahmin household already spoken of. In a little village near Dantoon lived and died Sam Set of whom mention has been made in India letters; when he died he asked that the New Testament might be placed under his head. A neighbor of his likewise believed in the Saviour. Dr. Phillips visited the son of this neighbor and found him leading a life of prayer. In a village not far from Babaigadia two brothers were found who broke caste several years ago and took other steps in the right direction, but they have fallen back. Others are in this state. Dr. Phillips and party spent about a fortnight in the neighborhood of the Palasbani church. During the two months Dr. Phillips was helped by several native brethren, among them some from the Bible School. Other students from the Bible School itinerated with the other missionaries.

Of Midnapore bazar work, Dr. Bacheler reports: This work is much curtailed as compared with former years. Only one native preacher is now located in Midnapore. One daily stand for preaching in the bazar has been kept up during the year—part of the year, two. Jacob Misra has done good service. Sasi, the head master, rendered important aid while he was here. One of the students from the Bible School joined the party during a portion of each term. County work has been prosecuted to as great an extent as possible. One trip of fourteen days was made to the north as far as Garbeta. Another, extending to Tomlook, occupied thirty-six days. The native brethren also made a trip by themselves among

the villages near Midnapore, occupying nearly a month.

Of Balasore district work, Mr. Marshall reports: Ninety-one days were spent outside the station, in district work, besides several weeks in Jellasore. During the first tour a number of inquirers were visited about Sora, and there was daily preaching in the streets and market-places. A number of people at a village called Puannund were found to be observing the Sabbath and other commandments which they had learned from the Bible. They seem to be trying to follow Christ. At another tour, Russo, Duntoora, Tudigadia and Dhumnuggar were visited. The people about these places were especially interesting. The fabric of Hindooism is sadly broken up. All those who had previously professed to believe in Christianity were standing firm to their convictions, and gaining accessions. On another tour the village of Karlia was visited. A son of Kamal Nayak is teaching here. He has lately been converted, but had not yet been baptized. He was doing faithful work for the Master. He was desirous of being baptized, but thought it best to wait for others whom he thought would soon profess Christianity.

Mr. Coldren reports that he spent most of the cold season in the north division of the Balasore district, together with Silas Curtis and four of the Bible School students. They visited Ulmara at the time of the annual festival; here they received striking evidence of the decline of heathenism, in the fact that hundreds crowded around the preacher while only three bowed before the idols. At Babulkar they were heartily welcomed; since their visit there, a prominent Hindoo family have professed Christianity. At Baliapal were found a number anxious to know more about Jesus. This is a most interesting point, and the people desire missionary work and schools. A church might easily be established here.

REPORTS

OF THE

HOME MISSION SOCIETY.

SECRETARY'S REPORT.

We have been passing through an eventful year; the elements have been greatly disturbed, which disturbances have ripened into flood, hurricane and earthquake. The political atmosphere has also witnessed evolutions which have resulted in the untimely death of one of the best presidents our nation ever had, bringing the deepest and most wide-spread cloud of sorrow over the nation ever felt at the death of one person, and at the same time casting shadows over every land in the civilized world.

The centrifugal forces which have been operating in our own denomination, throwing off here and there much of our strength for aggressive missionary work and organizing it into small and weak bodies illy prepared to do great and effective service, have been still at work.

At our Centennial gathering last year, it did seem as though the denomination was aspiring to that unity by means of which our strength might be developed and brought to bear on our benevolent enterprises until they should be made to advance in a very marked manner. In accordance with this feeling, the Home Mission Board made appropriations to the amount of \$6,000 with the full expectation that so small a sum would be gathered to carry forward the work. But it was doomed to disappointment. Seven States or local societies have covered nearly all the ground and have been working on their own territory, and have retained most of the funds within their jurisdiction. At least three-fifths of

all our membership are women. Our sisters, in their commendable zeal in carrying forward the particular branch of our work which they have undertaken, perhaps have not always borne in mind that, first of all, their plan proposes that each should meet the apportionments of the original boards, and for this reason the amount received by the Treasurer of this Society has been considerably reduced.

The Denominational Society has therefore but little left to it but a name, and while struggling under these embarrassments, its policy has been severely criticised, and the facts connected with its history set forth in a false light.

When compared with some sister denominations we are a small people, but we have a history of which we may well be proud. But if this process of division and subdivision is to go on, it is doubtful if the future will add to our renown—it is questionable if the deeds of the sons shall add to the glory of their fathers.

We submit that one Independent Home Missionary Society, with subordinate societies acting in unison with it, according to the plan proposed by the sub-committee of the present Board and published in the *Morning Star* a few weeks ago, is what our denomination needs, to give strength and inspire confidence throughout its borders.

If the present Board of management are not among our wisest and best counselors, let them retire, and let their places be filled by better men; and if the sisters can do better work by having representatives on that Board, let them have them. But at all events let us have those for leaders whom we can trust, and then let us follow them. The doctrines of State's rights and secession from our denominational societies can never make us a strong and influential people. The salaries of persons engaged as missionaries by the Board the past year have been paid, and about thirty-three and one-third per cent. of the amounts conditionally pledged to the aid of other interests have also been paid. As the conditions with these interests were, that if the money could be raised during the year, they should have the amount pledged,

if not, what was raised should be divided among them *pro rata*, the contract ceased at the close of the year, September 1, 1881. This is discouraging to the churches and saddening to the Board. But it has used all the means at its disposal according to its best wisdom. Any failure must be chargeable to the circumstances which our brethren and sisters have made to govern us.

THE OUTLOOK.

We need the services of five of our best men to act as Missionaries in Kansas, Nebraska and other Western States. They should be fully supported, and this would require at least four or five thousand dollars. The work such an additional force would accomplish would help make a future for us, which we can never have if we disregard the present opportunities.

There is a choice opportunity for establishing Free Baptist interests in and about Philadelphia, Pa. Rev. L. L. Harmon, now pastor of our church in that city, reports that with some aid the church there can be placed on a substantial basis. They are now engaged in building a parsonage. There are also openings for Free Baptists at Vineland and Elwood, N. J. The fields are white already for the harvest, and if the sum of \$100,000 should be placed at the disposal of the Board for the coming year, their duties in disbursing would be easier and more delightful than those which have devolved upon them the past year.

INTERESTS AIDED.

Aid has been rendered this year to Presque Isle and Kittery churches, Maine, West Derby and Newport, Vt., Boston, Mass., Park St. and Pond St., R. I., Philadelphia, Pa., and to the general mission work in Iowa and Minnesota, Nebraska and Louisiana. Also to the Cairo Mission and to the work in the South under the direction of Rev. N. C. Brackett at Harper's Ferry.

The following extracts from the reports of Brethren Brackett and Manning show what is being done in the last two fields mentioned.

REV. N. C. BRACKETT'S REPORT.

To me, it is much more pleasant to work than to try to tell what I have done, or even what others have done.

The work of the year has fallen so far short of my ideal, as formed at the beginning of it, that I do not like to recall it. But forgetting for the time the imperfect instruments, and turning our minds to what the "Lord hath wrought" we can say, "Truly the Lord is good to Israel."

In several counties around us there were powerful and extensive revivals, a few new churches were formed and several older ones greatly strengthened, while none were lost.

We were not without trials in our ministry, but we hope that these light afflictions which are but for a moment will work for us a far more exceeding and eternal weight of glory.

I need not tell you that we greatly miss the labor and the counsel of Rev. A. H. Morrell. We feel his loss more and more, as the months pass by. May the good Lord send a true man to take the place so long and faithfully filled by him, and also the money through his other servants to support the messenger. The fields are white and ready for the harvest. They never were more numerous or more inviting than to-day.

Our need of money to help the new and destitute fields is very great, but our need of true, manly men is even greater.

We must not forget the want of this generation of colored people is educated men and women. Every Christian young man or woman, who has even an elementary education, becomes a powerful elevating force. Each agency is truly valuable in proportion to the number of these forces that it can send into this greatest and most fertile missionary field.

Could we double the \$2,000 we now spend annually (aside from what is put into the buildings), we could more than double the number of active laborers sent out. Henceforth the work of teaching and saving the great South, the dark belt of this country, must be done largely by laborers from the Northern States. Storer College rejoices in a large number of her sons and daughters doing the Master's work in Maryland, Virginia, West Virginia, North Carolina, Missouri, Texas and other States, while she mourns the untimely death of her first missionary to Africa (Mrs. Kemp). May the Lord call and send forth many into that great field.

I can not speak in detail of the work of pastors and churches, nor of the work of the small but excellent corps of teachers that have so faithfully labored with me in the school the past year, but the school was full, and we had the evidence of approval of the Master, in the conversion of nearly forty of the students during the year.

By the blessing of God and the liberality of friends, we have almost enclosed Anthony Hall. We hope soon to be within its walls.

It will supply a want long and truly felt, and, we hope, enable us to do more and better work for the Master.

With heartfelt gratitude to the dear Father who has so blest and sustained us in the past, we ask our friends to pray for a more glorious outpouring of the Spirit during the coming year.

Rev. J. S. Manning has been doing good work in the Cairo mission, as shown by the following extracts from this missionary's report:

"I found the Quarterly Meetings in quite a good condition—some few discouragements and some difficulties that were easily adjusted. There has been a marked progress during the year in their order and system of doing business. * * * * We have enjoyed some prosperity during the year; five churches have been organized and one Quarterly Meeting. Some of the old Quarterly Meetings that had been dropped from the records have been revived, and work has been commenced in places where churches will likely soon be organized. Wherever the people hear of our doctrines they want our preachers to visit them. We are trying to establish churches in St. Louis; I organized one there last winter and we have a missionary there who has another church ready to organize and who has bought a lot to build on.

"The Union Quarterly Meeting lies along the Ohio river; some of her churches are in Kentucky and some in Indiana. Eddyville Quarterly Meeting extends nearly across the State of Kentucky, and is doing quite well. Carbondale Quarterly Meeting is situated on the Illinois Central R. R., and is our extreme northern Quarterly Meeting. Its churches are scattered and small, do not get much preaching and are not doing very well. Mound City Quarterly Meeting is the most compact of all, lying between Carbondale and Cairo. It always sends a full delegation. Cairo has given letters to seven churches in Missouri, and now has churches in Illinois, Kentucky and Tennessee. The New Madrid Quarterly Meeting was organized in July last. The aggregate value of church property is estimated at \$17,150.

"The ministry is receiving larger salaries than formerly. Some are devoting their entire time to the work of the ministry, and are supplying themselves with books. I think there is a decided improvement in their manner of presenting the truth and in the matter presented. We have sustained some severe losses in the ministry the past year."

The balance of Brother Manning's report gives the details of his own laborious services. He had collected \$294.23, and his traveling expenses amounted to \$124.27.

We have not been supplied with reports from the work of the State societies this year, and can not therefore give a report of the receipts.

In closing we most earnestly recommend that a conference of

representatives from the various Mission Societies be called at once to arrange for and adopt a plan whereby unity of action shall be secured in all our missionary work.

REPORTS

OF THE

EDUCATION SOCIETY.

CORRESPONDING SECRETARY'S REPORT.

Many people belittle their opportunities, and often find as the golden moment passes that they have lost the chance of a lifetime. There is danger that this Society, under a semblance of modesty, shall undervalue its opportunity, and fail to recognize the responsibilities laid upon it. It has been said, "The work of this Society is now narrowed to that of receiving and dispensing beneficiary funds. Narrowed! The question of our denominational life is vitally connected with the work for which this Society claims an existence. As a people we can not do less in the work of sustaining missionaries in India; we can not maintain our self-respect without doing more to evangelize the increasing millions at home, but it will avail little for benevolent organizations to solicit funds for the purpose of sustaining heralds of the cross in destitute fields at home and abroad, if the heralds themselves be not forthcoming. If either the question of providing well-qualified men or that of their subsequent support must be left to solve itself, then let us see to the furnishing of the men who can command a hearing, and trust that they will be supported. We do well to pray the "Lord of the harvest that he will send forth laborers into his harvest;" but we have no reason to expect that the prayer will be heard unless it originate from hearts willing to help in the work of searching out, encouraging and qualifying these laborers.

We find that for the year ending Aug. 31, 1880, less than two-

thirds of the churches which contributed to the Home Mission Treasury did anything for the Education Society; and of those contributing to the Foreign Mission work, less than two-fifths did anything to help answer the prayer for more laborers. It is additionally significant that of the Quarterly Meeting sessions, contributing to these causes, a much smaller proportion did anything for the Education Society. If our Quarterly Meetings, to which our church members go for inspiration and instruction, ignore the vital needs of this Society, then let us at least be thankful that the churches do better than they are taught. The Financial Secretary's report for the year ending Aug. 31, 1881, shows that the number of churches and Quarterly Meeting sessions aiding the Society during the last year is considerably less than for the previous year. The Society has received nothing from legacies the last year, and nothing from surplus interest on invested funds as formerly.

And yet to the credit of the 202 churches and 54 Quarterly Meeting sessions, which have contributed the last year, about the same amount of money has come into the treasury as last year. The number of students aided by the Society during the year is fifty-one. Necessarily the assistance rendered to each was much less than is desirable. Hillsdale reports a larger number in the Theological Department than ever before.

I quote here from a letter recently received from our veteran Professor in the Theological Department at Lewiston. "Just now, I think, the Education Society should see to it that the students, struggling to obtain a complete education, have suitable encouragement by way of pecuniary aid, especially such as attempt the necessary preparation and come out of college from three to six or seven hundred dollars in debt. Of the incoming class, considerably larger than usual, six are college graduates. It was with no small difficulty that we persuaded several of them to attempt the Theological course under these embarrassing circumstances. We did it, however, hoping that the churches and friends would contribute the more largely if the young men

should take the risk and trust to their liberality. We had to cut down the appropriations last year for the want of funds, and unless we can have a more ample income, several now in the school will be compelled to leave, at least for a season, and should this necessity occur I hope to hear no more complaints about the small numbers in the Theological School.

It will remain for the churches and individuals to say whether these and other students shall be driven from school because the appropriations can not be increased. The heroic struggle of our young men who are fitting themselves for the work of the ministry may be calculated to develop their latent powers, but we should see to it that they do not exhaust their power in the preparation for the work as some have done. The present urgent demand is for more money to assist these worthy young men. Hardly less urgent is the need of better library facilities. When these demands have been attended to there will remain other opportunities for the energies of this Society, sustained, as we trust it may be, by the prayers and efforts of our people.

REPORT
OF THE
FINANCIAL SECRETARY.

BENEVOLENT SOCIETIES.

In preparing the tables of this Report, an effort has been made to credit each church in the denomination with the full amount of its contributions to these benevolent causes—Foreign Missions, Home Missions and Education.

The basis of this Report is the regular receipts of the Financial Secretary, the Reports of the Treasurer of the three Societies, and of the Treasurers of the numerous local Societies as these Reports have appeared from time to time in the *Morning Star*.

The contributions of the Woman's Society, however, do not appear in this Report *by churches*, but are appended in gross, at the close.

The Report includes one item not entered in previous Reports—viz., “Interest on Invested Funds,”—which will be found near the close of the tables.

Deducting this item, the income of the Foreign Mission cause, excepting the work of the Woman's Society, is \$904.77 less than last year, of which only \$590 has been received from Legacies.

The income of the Home Mission cause, after the same deductions are made, is \$11,677.96 more than last year, of which \$5,414.00 has come from Bequests, showing an increase in contributions of \$6,263.96, including the contributions to the work at Harper's Ferry.

The Cause of Education receives \$283.99 less from the churches than last year,—no legacies having come in—or about \$150.00 less in contributions.

The total income of the three causes, not including the "Interest on Invested Funds," nor the contributions of the Woman's Society, is \$10,489.20 larger than last year.

Including the receipts of the Woman's Society, the aggregate income of the three causes this year as compared with last, minus "Interest on Invested Funds," is \$10,739.86 larger, the whole gain being in the department of Home Missions, and largely on account of the liberal donations for Anthony Hall.

The deficit of over a thousand dollars in the Foreign Mission Treasury at the close of the year, the ever increasing demands of the stations now occupied, and the promising fields for new undertakings opening on every hand in India, call loudly for increased contributions to our Foreign Mission cause. It is also of the highest importance that the regular work of the Society already begun should be fully cared for first by the friends of the cause, and all special objects made secondary.

The large outlay at Harper's Ferry, rendering increased expenses there a necessity of the future, the growing demands of the great West, and the constant calls of struggling churches all over the country for help, appeal to all friends of our Home Mission work for larger giving to this cause. As in the Foreign Mission work, so here, let the regular appropriations of the Society be provided for first, so that the expectations raised thereby may be met in good faith, and let all special undertakings take a subordinate place.

The increasing attendance at our Theological Schools must of necessity be checked unless more generous response is made to the calls for assistance to our young men preparing for the ministry.

It has therefore seemed wise to call for an additional sum in this Report, for each of these causes, for the year to come. There can be no doubt in any practical Christian's mind that larger sacrifices in this direction for the Lord's cause would be rewarded by an increase of spiritual life and power among the churches.
