ECLIPSES IN 1883.

In the year 1883 there will be two eclipses of the Sun, and two of the Moon, in the following order:

I. A partial eclipse of the Moon, April the 22nd day, 6h., 42m., in the morning. Invisible to the New England States.

II. A total eclipse of the Sun, May 6th, 5h. 13m., in the evening, invisible. The central line of the eclipse will be wholly south of the equator.

III. A partial eclipse of the Moon, Oct. the 16th day, 2h. om., in the morning; visible, and by calculation as follows: begins, 1h. 17m., middle, 2h. 11m., end, 3h. 5m. Duration of eclipse, 1h. 48m. Digits eclipsed, 3 1-40 on the Moon's south limb.

IV. An annular eclipse of the Sun, October the 30th day, 7h. 12m., in the evening: invisible to North America.

Venus will be morning star, from the beginning of the year, till September the 20th, then evening star till the end of the year.

SUPPLEMENTARY.

The preceding pages give the statistics of the denomination, as they have been furnished us, but they do not embrace all the Baptists in sympathy with us on the subjects of freedom of the Will, free communion, &c. Other bodies, some of them quite numerous, are one with us in the advocacy of these great doctrines, and some of them send us their annual Minutes, while others do not.

There are many associations of Freewill Baptists in the South, some white and some colored, and if it were not for cherished feelings connected with the slavery question, there would be no valid objection to a union of them all, and we with them in one body. They are found in almost every Southern State, and the entire number must be many thousands.

The Free Baptists of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick number about 14,000 members, and both bodies have signified a willingness to meet us in convention and confer together on the question of union in our Christian work. We are together in our Foreign Mission work, and a closer home union may be effected before many years.

The General Baptist Associations in the Western States embrace a large number of churches and ministers who are almost identical with us in faith and practice. The question of a complete union is sometimes agitated, but the time for its consummation has not yet arrived.

The General Baptists of England have been in fraternal correspondence with us for many years, and the interchange of delegates has greatly strengthened the bond of union between us.

The Disciples are a very numerous and growing denomination, whose greatest strength is in the Middle and Western States. They have some views and practices that characterize them as a people, but on most points they are not widely different from us, and our relations with them are pleasant, fraternal correspondence having been enjoyed.

The Church of God is a denomination of free communion Baptist Christians, principally located in Pennsylvania and the Western States, with which we hold frequent correspondence.

REPORTS

OF THE

FOREIGN MISSION SOCIETY.

ABSTRACT OF CORRESPONDING SECRETARY'S REPORT.

The year has been one of vigorous and successful work in the foreign field. Considerable additions have been made to the native churches. The seemingly slow progress of the work is not to be wondered at when all the circumstances are considered, and our faith in the Gospel, as sure to win at last, should make us hopeful and encourage us to patient labor until the surely coming harvest-time appears.

The successes of the past and present indications confirm this faith and fully warrant this hope.

There have been sad changes during the year. Mrs. R. M. Lawrence died on the 10th of Sept. 1881. Mr. Lawrence, broken in health, returned to this country soon after the death of his wife, and has resigned his position as a missionary of this Society.

In April last, Miss Lovina Crawford for many years our eminently successful missionary entered into her rest. The Rev. J. M. Brewster, a very serviceable member of the Executive Board, has also died.

There have also been hopeful changes. Mrs. J. Phillips and her daughter, Miss Nellie M. Phillips, M. D., arrived in India in November. Miss Emma L. Smith has been accepted as a missionary of the Society, and is on her way to India.—Changes during the year to come are foreshadowed. Mr. Marshall and family have signified their desire to return to this country for needed rest. Dr. Bacheler has asked a release from the work on account

of advancing years. Mrs. Burkholder is reported seriously ill, and it is feared she and her husband may be compelled to return home for a time. The demand for new men is thus most strongly emphasized, and can not be safely neglected any longer.

Are we able to occupy the field committed to us? There can be no doubt of this. With five men in addition to the Principal of the Bible School, and with these men set over well-defined districts as superintendents, the field may now be well occupied; and with such help as may be furnished by the lady missionaries and the native workers, it may be creditably and hopefully cultivated. This number of men we can support; and we should not think, for a moment, that we can meet our obligations by sustaining a smaller mission force.

The work at home, in raising funds, has been more than usually successful. The outlook of the mission is hopeful: hopeful because of what has already been accomplished; hopeful because a creditable occupancy of our mission-field is now clearly within the limits of our ability.

ABSTRACT OF THE INDIA REPORT.

The year has brought its changes. Mrs. Lawrence, who joined the mission in 1878, died on the 10th of Sept. 1881. Mr. R. M. Lawrence, who joined the mission in 1874, left the field soon after the death of his wife. He was Superintendent of the Mission Press and Treasurer of the Mission, and did efficient service. Dr. Bachelor again becomes Superintendent of the Mission Press.

Mrs. Phillips, widow of one of the founders of the mission, and her daughter, Miss Nellie M. Phillips, M. D., reached the mission in November last, and have been assigned to Dantoon. "*More men are greatly needed. How long must we wait for them?*" Hearty thanks are extended to the friends at home for their contributions.

THE CHURCHES.

Balasore. The salary of the native pastor, Solomon Nayak, is promptly paid by the church. Seven of the members have been engaged in preaching, and twenty more have been employed in zenanas, or as Bible readers. Services have been held every Sabbath at the new book-room, under the direction of S. B. Mookerjee. The usual services have been kept up at Metrapore. Paul Nayak labored at the village of Kalia until the beginning of the Bible School term, when he decided to enter that school. A young man, the adopted son of a respectable landholder, and well educated, has also entered the Bible School. Mrs. Peters, a converted heathen woman, shortly before her death, secured her property to the church. The Sunday-school at the church, and in the book-room and at Metrapore, has been well sustained, and has prospered.

Jellasore. The church has prospered. There have been trials, but, on the whole, advancement. Silas Curtis is in charge of the country and bazar work, and Joseph Fullonton is pastor of the church. The Sunday-school is in a hopeful condition. One little one has died of fever. Prayer is asked that this light in a dark place may never go out.

Santipore. This little church has moved on steadily. Hiram Curtis is still the faithful pastor. There have been additions to the church. One of the best native preachers and five other leading workers have gone to help the church at Babaigadia. Death has removed one of the native preachers, Supai. He was above reproach, and, though not great, was always on the right side. The work has prospered.

Bhimpore. The wanderers spoken of in the last report have all returned save one, and his case is not hopeless. Eight have been baptized, and two others are waiting an opportunity.

Among those baptized is a whole family, father, mother, two sons

and a daughter-in-law. One has died, but no one was better prepared. The women of the church have done good service. The matter of self-support is being pressed, but the progress is slow.

Mr. Burkholder has had one man as an assistant in the neighboring villages; he has done good service, and fruits will doubtless appear. The Sunday-school is prosperous; four of its members have been converted and baptized during the year.

Midnapore. Nearly all the adult members are engaged in Christian work; all the married women are employed in zenanas or in ragged schools. Several of the men are engaged in evening schools, after the work of the day. A weekly service has been held for the children of the church which has been profitable to converts and to inquirers. Owing to the fact that Sunday-schools are now held in different parts of the town, the school in connection with the church is smaller than formerly, though the school embraces all members of the community who are not otherwise employed.

The church is in a hopeful condition as regards self-support. Jacob Misra is employed a part of the time as pastor; for this service he is paid by the church, and the expenses of the chapel and Sunday-school are also met by the church. Two have been added to the church, one a lad of much promise.

Palasbani. Through the aid of Rev. J. T. Ward this church has had regular preaching, Tuphan Chandra Chakdar being the faithful pastor. The pastor has visited many neighboring villages. The church has paid one-fifth of the pastor's salary. The Quarterly Meeting was held here in May, the session being one of much interest and profit.

Babaigadia. This has been a brighter year. The designs of the enemies of the church have been frustrated. Our people have obtained peaceful possession of the land in litigation. Jhampad Santra and his father, with their families, have returned home from Santipore. Nabakumar Kar, a Brahmin convert and a member of the Bible School, has been the preacher this year. Good fruits are confidently expected here. The January session of the Midnapore Quarterly meeting was held with this church. Mr. Ward has aided this church also.

Dantoon. There has been a small increase. Two converts from Hinduism have been baptized at the Dainmari branch, and it is hoped other families will soon follow them. Though little apparent progress has been made in the immediate vicinity of Dantoon, there are hopeful inquirers in the villages not far away. The return of Mrs. Phillips and the opening of the medical department by Miss Phillips make the prospect more cheering. The New Brunswick Society has adopted the native preacher, Purna Chandra Basu, and has become responsible for his support.

Sufficient money has also been sent by this Society to cover the expense of the new house just completed for the preacher.

SCHOOLS.

The schools have always been of great advantage to the mission. From these have come the greater part of the accessions to the churches, and the chief workers in the native Christian community.

The Balasore Boys' School, a middle grade school, has had an attendance of eighty-two. The head-master, Bhim Charan Panda, having accepted an appointment in the district court, his place was supplied by the appointment of Saul Nayak, a son of one of the native preachers, and an earnest Christian.

Jellasore Girls' Orphanage. A year of more than usual prosperity. An Oriya paper says: "The Jellasore Girls' School stands ahead of all in the Balasore district in scholarship." The number in the asylum is twenty-four. The twenty day-scholars are more punctual and more earnest in their work than ever before. One of the day-scholars recently died. There has been much suffering from fever.

Santipore School. Under charge of Hiram Curtis; advancement has been made; attendance diminished because of fever and small-pox; a number have died. Good work has still been done. Much is hoped for through the Christian education of the children.

Dantoon. The educational work has been hopefully begun by Mrs. J. Phillips.

Babaigadaria. Good work done; attendance large; the present master doing well, being a man of energy and fond of his work. The Scriptures are faithfully taught, and much fruit is hoped for. A night school has been opened which promises well.

Palasbani. School faithfully kept by the lay preacher; attended mostly by children of native Christians. Bible studies have been well attended to. The wayside chapel has been used for a school-house, and the singing of hymns to Christ, and the pictures on the walls have attracted many passers to halt and listen to the story of Jesus.

Bhimpore Santal Training School. A year of encouragement, especially in the girls' department. In this department there has been an industrial class. The school has increased in numbers. Thanks to the first church of Harrisburg, Penn., for a donation of twenty-three dollars to buy tools for the work-shop. Attendance, boys forty-nine; girls thirty.

Jungle Schools. The number of these schools, sixty-three: number of pupils 1310. The teachers have done their work well, and the schools are of a higher order than usual. The examination of the teachers showed them to have better ideas of their work, and they compare favorably with teachers at home. The teachers asked for one month of study at Bhimpore. This afforded opportunity for Bible instruction from which great results may be hoped for.

Midnapore Bible School. Session began March 1st and closed Oct. 18. Nineteen young men in the school, sixteen of whom are married and whose wives are under instruction; four are new men. There

has been more than usual illness during the year. All the students have been ill, and some seriously ill by repeated attacks of fever. The health of the Principal has, however, been good.

The school has its dark side, and this should be shown, so that the condition of things may be understood.

Five men have left the school, two of their own accord, and three others sent away. Of the two who left voluntarily, one went because of sickness, to which he weakly yielded, the other because of serious charges made against him. Of the others, one was sent away because of a shameful scandal, and two because of falsehood and quarrelsome-ness. Of one of these there is hope; all are remembered in our prayers.

In teaching, it has been the aim to constantly bring the substance of the Gospel message in contact with the student's mind; so that in his preaching he may not only tear down evil systems, but also build something better in their place. On Tuesday evenings lectures are given on practical subjects,—including lectures on the Sceptical Tendencies of Modern Thought, so that the student may be able to meet the opinions which are everywhere expressed.

It is the object of the school to teach women as well as men. Miss Phillips, assisted by the pundits and by the wife of a native preacher, has conducted this department. Some of these women, taught, have been diligent, and have made good progress. A few of the women have attended the Tuesday evening lectures.

The Students have worked in the bazars and villages. The endeavor has been made to have them go from house to house and talk quietly and earnestly with the people. On Sabbath afternoons the students have assisted Mrs. Phillips in conducting Sunday-schools. Some of the men and women have done admirably. The students have gone out to neighboring villages to labor on the Sabbath as heretofore. Sometimes they come back discouraged, and sometimes full of hope. The Memorial hall is much needed, and the friends of the mission are urged to provide for it as soon as possible. The conquest of India is to be achieved by the native church. The students itinerate with missionaries during vacation.

WOMAN'S WORK.

As these pages go to press one of our number is called up higher. Our beloved Miss Crawford is no more among us. She fell at her post with her whole armor on. Her poor girls are asking, "Who is coming to stay with us?" May the chosen one not pray to be excused.

Balasore Mission Girls' School. In it are taught the girls of the native Christian community, the normal class for teachers in zenana work, and the Hindoo girls' schools under Miss Ida Phillips. Funds are greatly needed for support of this important school. Number during the year, forty-eight—eight in normal class, and forty in the lower classes.

Balasore Zenana and Girls' School. An unusual amount of sickness during the year, but well sustained interest, and good results. The work in zenanas is still hopeful, and Bible instruction willingly received. A new school has been opened with thirty-four girls. There have been eight schools kept up during the year, with eighteen teachers and 350 scholars, including zenana pupils.

Bhimpore. Seven ragged schools have been taught, each school having a Sunday-school. Teachers are asked for in the surrounding villages. Christian women who have never learned to read are instructed. The Girls' Training School has increased from two pupils to between 20 and 30. Aid is needed for the industrial department of the work.

Dantoon. Mrs. and Miss Phillips arrived here Jan. 21, 1882. A school was soon established and twenty names were on the roll. The teacher was called away by sickness of her friends. When she returned the school was scattered, and the interest much less than before.

Jellaspore. Sickness greatly interfered with the work. One of the best pupils died of fever. There are nine teachers who go from a half mile to over three miles to teach. They report 123 pupils. Miss Crawford, now entered into her rest, writes: "We are not doing half we wish, but rejoice to know that the work will go on after we are unable to do anything."

MIDNAPORE ZENANA WORK.

Notwithstanding their long degradation we find the Hindoo women eager to learn and quick to understand, and possessed of a certain indefinable delicacy of feeling and refinement. The zenana teaching in Midnapore has been mostly confined to elementary books, and good progress has been made. The Bible is taught, in some form, in every house, and we have reason to believe that its truths have found an abiding place in some hearts. We could easily do a greater work if we had more means.

The zenana teachers have been instructed by Miss Bacheler. She has also held regular meetings for the children of the Christian community. One of these children has joined the church, and others are trying to lead a Christian life.

RAGGED SCHOOLS.

These schools number 553 pupils. The teachers show great improvement by reason of their studies in the Bible school. Much attention has been given to Sunday-school work in connection with these schools. There has been much sickness among the children; and many have died. Miss Phillips, who has taught the women successfully in connection with the Bible school, urges the need of a building for this school.

MEDICAL WORK.

Fever, though of a mild type, has prevailed in Midnapore. Dr. Bacheler had ten thousand patients during five months, and twelve thousand during the year. Much religious instruction has been imparted to patients. Miss Phillips, at Dantoon, reports sometimes as many as sixty patients a day. Dr. Phillips, on preaching tours, has cared for the sick while he has imparted religious instruction.

PREACHING TO THE HEATHEN.

Of Balasore district, Mr. Marshall and Mr. Coldren report that an effort has been made to reach all parts of the district. The first tour was through the tributary state of Mayurbunj, where a number of large towns were visited and the Gospel listened to with marked attention. At another time the large villages of Russelpore, Antapore, Soro, Turdegadia, Duntoor, and Ruse were visited. The Christian family at Sultanpore were found steadfast. We visited a swinging festival at Mitrepore where, after a time, we prevailed upon the people to stop the cruel ceremonies. The work upon the whole has been encouraging during the year.

Of Midnapore bazar work, Dr. Bacheler reports that with one native preacher and one of the Bible School students there has been almost daily preaching to audiences ranging from fifty to a hundred.

Of Midnapore district work, Dr. Phillips reports that he was able to devote only seven weeks to the work, and these weeks were devoted to one tour to the west, southwest and south, as far as Silda, Mahapal and Dantoon. Some of the Bible School students accompanied him and did excellent service; especially was good service done by Supai Marndi who has since died. The gospel, as a rule, was well received. Several days were spent on the banks of the Subarnarekha; there Dr. Phillips preached in the same market where his father, in 1845, gave away the volume of tracts that brought eight persons into the church. We toil on praying for and expecting a harvest.

Of Bhimpore, Mr. Burkholder reports that he has preached in the bazars of Midnapore; he has preached in the villages surrounding Bhimpore. In December a tour was made to the south and west of Bhimpore. At one village where an entire family were ready to confess Christ last year, Mr. Burkholder this year baptized the older son and his wife and the younger son. The father and mother now wish to be baptized. A little church has been started in this village.

THE MISSION PRESS.

The press is now in charge of Dr. Bacheler. A substantial and permanent building, erected for the press, was dedicated on the first of May. It is hoped that more of strictly mission work may be done by the press the coming year. The press has been self-sustaining, and will have a balance to aid in other departments of work.

On Thursday afternoon at 6.30 o'clock the Society met at the same place at the call of the President. The business before the Society was the reception of life members. Voted to adjourn.

OF THE
HOME MISSION SOCIETY.

SECRETARY'S REPORT.

A multitude numbering five thousand were in the midst of a Judean wilderness hungry and without food. The Saviour asked his disciples to feed them. Their reply showed their astonishment that he should make such a request. They had no resources worth mentioning to satisfy the hunger of such a crowd. The Saviour decided to feed them with what they had. Though in the region of miracle, the methods used foreshadow the Master's approved methods for carrying on his work in the centuries that follow. The first step in the process of feeding the multitude was the direction to take account of stock—"How many loaves have ye?" The second was the command, "Bring them to me." This done, the Saviour consecrated what was possessed, and directed the disciples to proceed to serve the immense company as though they had enough to feed them all. As they obeyed, the bread and fishes expanded as they were needed, till all were filled, and the fragments gathered up exceeded in amount what was possessed at first. Our Home Mission Work in several respects bears a likeness to the performance of this miracle of the Master. The work to be done is very great. The means to do it with is quite small; the workers are as much puzzled as were the disciples of old to know where enough shall be found to feed so many. What better arrangement can we have than to note the Master's methods, take account of what we have, carry it to him for his consecration and blessing, and then go forth with expecta-

tion of great results? We believe if the spirit of submission and obedience shown by the disciples be entertained, and the methods of the Saviour in performing this miracle be adopted, the results will be astonishing. Indeed, the Home Missionary work our Fathers have done, has produced results many times beyond their reasonable expectation. Light from the cross, through their efforts and sacrifices, has pierced far out into the darkness, and thousands of hungry souls have beheld the gospel table spread, and have come and partaken thereof and been satisfied. A knowledge of our resources, their consecration to Christ, and their use under his direction will give us increased means for our work, more missionaries to go to neglected places, and more precious souls rescued as the result of our toil. We call upon our brethren throughout the denomination to consider well the opportunities they have of feeding the hungry and saving the lost, and use them to the best advantage of humanity and the glory of God.

The details of our Home Mission work are to a great extent carried out by the various State and local societies, and are known to us only as reported by them. A failure of many of these societies to report leaves us unable to give as full an account as we could wish. From the intelligence received, we submit the following:

SHENANDOAH VALLEY.

The work in the Shenandoah Valley has been very prosperous. Anthony Hall has been completed and dedicated, giving Storer College opportunities for doing work for the Master which it has not possessed before. Two hundred and thirty-one students have been in attendance during the year. The State of West Virginia has acknowledged the estimation placed upon the instruction given at Storer College by designating it as the only Normal school in the State for the training of colored teachers. More teaching force is needed. How to furnish this and meet the bills is the unsolved problem. Brother and Sister Brackett can

not long endure the pressure they have been bearing. Some aid must be given them or they will certainly be disabled. The religious interest has been deepened by revivals in several of the churches; a new church has been established at Shepherdstown and other interests have been commenced at several available points. God has blessed our work here, and we may well rejoice over what has been accomplished. We should, however, remember that the work is only fairly commenced.

THE CAIRO MISSION.

This mission has been left to care for itself the past year. Rev. J. S. Manning commenced his work there as missionary at the commencement of the year, but was soon obliged to leave the field on account of failing health. Our correspondence with several of the pastors show how much his presence was missed and how greatly a missionary is needed among them. Bro. Manning returns to the field again this fall, we hope with strength sufficient to pursue the work.

OTHER FIELDS.

Rev. J. Blackstone has been the accredited missionary of the Society in the Louisiana Yearly Meeting. He has done what he could with the limited resources at command. Books, Sunday-school papers, &c., sent to his address, St. Cloud St., New Orleans, will aid him greatly in helping the churches in that Y. M.

Rev. S. F. Smith of Fairbury, Nebraska, has been doing a good work in that State.

The churches at Waterbury Center, Vt., Worcester, Mass., Pond St., Providence, and Auburn, R. I., and Philadelphia, Pa., have received aid during the year.

Aid has been rendered to the Minnesota State Society for several interests specified, and for the Mission at Minneapolis, with excellent results.

Iowa has an efficient Home Mission Society. It has an agent

in the field who acts as Superintendent and Financial agent. During the last two and a half years several weak churches have been resuscitated; two new churches organized; lots secured, and three new commodious meeting-houses built, all of which have been in Railroad centers and county seats; more than two thousand dollars have been raised and expended for Home Mission purposes, and about one hundred and forty persons have been added to the churches.

With more men and more money we feel assured that greater results could have been accomplished. Let us furnish the means, and ask the Lord of the harvest for the men filled with his own Missionary Spirit.

REPORTS

OF THE EDUCATION SOCIETY.

CORRESPONDING SECRETARY'S REPORT.

The paramount object of this Society for forty-three years has been to help furnish young men of piety and culture to preach the Gospel.

We have just risen from our knees where we have been beseeching the Lord to provide more men for India. There are vacant pulpits in New England waiting and praying for men. From the great West and South comes the crying demand for more men. It may be well for us to inquire whether our prayers to the Lord of the harvest that he will send forth laborers into his harvest, be not a mockery until we have done something more in the way of seeking out, encouraging and qualifying the young men to whom the call of the Lord has already come. "Wherefore criest thou unto me?" Exod. 14: 15.

Facts seem to show that the Lord has been doing his part better than we have done ours. We have at present in the Theological departments at Hillsdale and Bates fifty-two students—a larger number than ever before; in College and preparatory courses, fifty-three. We have, then, more than one hundred students in course of preparation for the work. Exclusive of these are others who, for lack of encouragement at home, are pursuing their studies elsewhere; and still others are on the farm or in the shop because of their financial inability to enter upon a course of study. As a denomination praying for more laborers, what are we doing for these who are struggling to qualify themselves for the responsi-

ble work? During the past year the amount of \$2,004.67 has been dispersed to 53 students in the East and West. Surely none have been very extravagantly pampered. Our 80,000 members have contributed, on an average, two and one-half cents each during the year to meet the urgent claims upon this Society.

When God shall give to the farmer good crops of corn and potatoes solely in answer to prayer, then possibly we may expect that through the same agency He will marshal well-qualified men, and lead them forth to the whitened fields.

It is easy for us to say, "Let us *pray* for more men." May we as a people inquire what remains for us to *do* to secure the results. Some may question the propriety of aiding young men at all while securing their education. But that is a settled policy in all our educational institutions. All students in them are beneficiaries. Said Pres. Robinson recently in Providence, "No student who attends our University and pays the full expenses can be said to pay more than ten per cent. of the necessary cost of his education." Essentially the same statement may be truthfully applied to all our Universities and Colleges. No one has seemed to be alarmed lest this generous aid should emasculate the men who enter the various occupations and professions. From the necessity of more men for the ministry originated this Society, which accepts the policy of aiding *all* students, and proposes to carry the principle a little farther in the way of aiding those qualifying themselves for the ministry. When the professions of law and medicine shall be in as desperate need of able advocates and practitioners we may confidently expect a similar course to be pursued in reference to law and medical students. As the church comes to feel more the need of sanctified culture, not only in the pulpit, but also in the pew, when the people come to feel that an educated Christian man is a public benefactor, it is entirely probable that the policy of rendering aid will be extended and the Christian church feel that she is serving herself and the state by aiding all worthy students still more than at present. The *policy* is settled. The demand for Christian ministers im-

pels us to make extra exertion to secure recruits. We ask aid for young men, not so much for their sake as for the cause of Christ. They can better afford to go unaided than can we to shirk the responsibility, and deny ourselves the privilege of helping them. We should immediately double our contributions for this purpose. Failing to do this, our cause in India will suffer, our churches at home will lose the increase of power they might have, and destitute ones will longer wait for the bread of life. How many pastors will say to their people, Let us *give* as well as pray for more men?

REPORT
OF THE
FINANCIAL SECRETARY
OF THE
BENEVOLENT SOCIETIES.

The Tables in this Report have been prepared with reference to showing what each church, Quarterly Meeting and Yearly Meeting in the denomination has contributed during the year to each of the causes—Foreign Missions, Home Missions and Education—and also the total gifts of each church to the three causes.

The Report is based, as usual, on the regular receipts of the Financial Secretary, the receipts of the Treasurer of the three Societies and those of the Treasurers of the different local societies, as they have been reported from month to month in the *Morning Star*.

The Contributions of the Woman's Society appear near the close of the Report, in gross. They are not included in the credits given to the churches.

The Report takes no account of the contributions of our people to our institutions of learning, except such as are under the patronage of the Home Mission Society.

The approximate number of churches contributing this year to the Foreign Mission cause is 547—to Home Missions, 394—and to the cause represented by the Education Society,—that of educating our young men for the ministry—211.

Slight deductions should be made from these figures, from the fact that not every locality reported has a church.

About two-fifths of our churches, two-fifths of the Quarterly Meetings, and one-half of the Yearly Meetings have made offerings

to the Foreign Mission cause, while a still smaller number have contributed to Home Missions and Education.

A renewal of the appointment of Quarterly Meeting Agents for all of these causes is earnestly recommended.

In comparing this year's receipts with last, it appears that the Foreign Mission cause has received \$3,197.02 more than last year—the largest sum contributed in any year of its history except one.

The Home Mission offerings have been \$6,317.37 less than last year, on account, partly, at least, of the small amount coming from legacies, and the absence of the spur given last year by the efforts for Harper's Ferry.

The Educational income is \$460.84 less than last year—the large falling off in interest on invested funds not having been made up by increased legacies. The *Contributions* have been \$265.90 larger than last year.

The total receipts of the three causes have been \$3,681.19 less than last year,—or, including the contributions to the Woman's Society the F. M. cause receives \$3,293.83 more this year than last,—the H. M. \$6,193.93 less, the Ed. Soc. \$460.84 less, and the total receipts of all the causes \$3,360.94 less.

The question of the efficiency and relative expense of our present method of raising funds as compared with former methods having arisen of late, it seems desirable to avail ourselves of all the light obtainable upon that subject. Selecting the six years in the history of the F. M. Society previous to the adoption of the "Co-operative Plan" in which the receipts were largest, it appears that the average annual income for those years was \$13,320.61, and the average expense of doing the business was 13.9 per cent.

During the six consecutive years next preceding the present plan, the average annual income was \$12,313.07, and the average expense of transacting the business 15.9 per cent.

The average annual receipts for the last six years during the operation of the new plan have been \$15,327.94, and the average expense of administration 7.8 per cent. In both cases the special

efforts of Missionaries in this country in raising funds should be taken into the account.

Taking the six years in the history of the H. M. Society when the largest income was received, it is found that the average annual receipts for those years were \$13,411.68, and the average expense of collecting and disbursing, 9.6 per cent.

For the last six consecutive years before the new plan went into effect the average annual receipts were \$7,018.32, and the average expense of the business a little above 20 per cent.

For the last five years the average annual income has been \$7,602.63, and the average expense 15.6 per cent. The first of the last six years is omitted from this computation, for the reason that during a considerable portion of that year both the old system and the new were in operation.

The average H. M. expense for the last three years has been 12.9.

In drawing inferences from these figures it should be remembered

1. That the years having the largest receipts, both Foreign and Home Mission, previous to the adoption of the new plan, cover a period when gold was at a premium of from 60 to 100 cents on the dollar.

2. That, whereas, in those years about all Home Mission and Foreign Mission money contributed in the denomination passed through the Treasuries of the Parent Home and Foreign Mission Societies, during the last six years State Societies have become so prominent a feature of our H. M. work that now more than half of our H. M. contributions do not appear in the Reports of the Treasurer of the Parent Society at all, and are, therefore, not reckoned in this computation,—although a considerable portion of the income of the State Societies results doubtless from the regular work of the Parent Society,—and that the receipts of the Woman's Society for Foreign and Home Missions for the past five years have averaged \$3,700.00.

3. That in obtaining the above averages of income and ex-

pense, no account has been taken of the contributions of our people for Home and Foreign Missions to the Woman's Society and no reference is had to the income of State H. M. Societies.

No comparative computation is made for the Education Society, for the simple reason that the new method is the only one ever worked for raising funds for that Society from the churches by regular contributions except for one year and a fraction, during which time the effort of the Agent was mainly confined to the securing of the installment notes.

The results above given have been drawn exclusively from the Annual Reports of the Treasurers of the Societies, which are easily accessible to all who may desire further light on the subject.

SUMMARY OF ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

REV. H. F. WOOD, COR. SEC. F. B. SUNDAY-SCHOOL UNION, FOR 1882.

Reports have been received from two hundred and twenty-six schools (226), giving a total membership of 23,178, and an average attendance of 102 and a fraction. Number of conversions, 476. Number of schools in which conversions have occurred, 79. Number in which no conversions are reported, 417. Average number of conversions two and a fraction. There has been an increase of 3,000 in the circulation of the *Star Quarterly*, and of 1,000 in that of the *Little Star*. More schools are reported as using our own Sunday-school publications than ever before. More schools are reported than ever before as maintaining a regular teachers' meeting, and with most encouraging results.

Children's day is being observed in more of our schools and churches each year. Five times as many are reported as observing it this year as last. And many that have not yet observed it say they intend to do so in the future.

We are glad to note also that some progress is being made in the line of holding Sunday-school Institutes and Conventions. In some parts of the field these have been held with success and profit.

The Sunday-school work is receiving more and more attention in our Quarterly and Yearly Meeting sessions and denominational gatherings, and from these many go away with increased zeal, more intelligent news as to methods and a new inspiration for the work. From the reports received, though comparatively few, we may judge of the condition of the Sunday-school work in the denomination generally, these probably being a fair sample of all.

which the Sunday-school has not a large place. Many others never think of giving it any formal attention whatever. In the language of one report received :—"The Sunday-school still stands outside, crowded out by business and sermons." We all need the enlightenment and inspiration that come from large and enthusiastic Sunday-school gatherings, and so let us seek to have more of them.

Finally, we are glad to know that at the beginning of the next year, the publications of a primary lesson leaf will be commenced, the need of which has long been felt. We have reason to believe that our Sunday-school Editor will continue to make improvements in our publications, and do all in his power to make them worthy the patronage of all.

Let us thank God for the past, and take courage for the future.
