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ECLIPSES FOR THE YEAR 1889.

There will be five eclipses this year, three of the sun and two of the moon.

I. A total eclipse of the sun, Jan. 1, invisible in New England, but visible throughout the larger portion of North America, and in the North Pacific Ocean, and coming close to the western edge of New England itself.

II. A partial eclipse of the moon, Jan. 16 and 17, visible as follows: Begin Jan. 16, 10h., 58.2m. P. M.; middle Jan. 17, 0h., 29.7m. A. M.; ends Jan. 17, 2h., 1.2m. A. M.

III. An annular eclipse of the sun, June 28, invisible in New England, but visible in the southern portions of Asia and Africa and the South Atlantic and Indian Oceans.

IV. A partial eclipse of the moon, July 12, invisible in New England, as the eclipse ends 2¼ hours before sunset, but visible in Europe, Asia, Africa, the Atlantic Ocean, and the easterly portion of South America.

V. A total eclipse of the sun, Dec. 22, invisible in New England, but visible in South America, Asia, and Africa, as well as the Atlantic, Pacific, and Indian Oceans, and just grazing the eastern edge of portions of the United States.

EXPLANATION.

In previous *Registers* the computations have naturally been expressed in local time, this being practically the same for any phenomenon for places in the same latitude.

The introduction of the new time system, however, demands a change, so that a table of correction becomes necessary, as given below.

The calendar quantities are for the meridian and latitude of Boston, expressed in the present time system. For the other places, given in the table below, add to or subtract from the calendar times, as expressed in said table.

For places not in table, find the correction from the place nearest in longitude to the one in question, and apply this. A still closer result would be obtained by finding two places in the table, one a little east and the other a little west, and estimating the correction between.

Each person had better mark on the margin of his *Register* the addition or subtraction for his own locality, and apply this correction whenever he looks for the time of any event.

The Eastern time belt ends, and the Central begins, near the western borders of New York and Pennsylvania.

For places still using the old local time, no use is to be made of this table, but 16 minutes are invariably to be added to the *Register* time.

Report of the Foreign Mission Society.

CORRESPONDING SECRETARY'S REPORT:

The results of the past year present much to cheer us, and much to stimulate us to greater activity in this, one of the most important departments of Christ's work.

In the field the work has been pushed with marked courage and faithfulness, and the results have been unusually good, showing an increase in church membership, Sabbath-school scholars, the number in Christian communities, and in native contributions. Sixty-two have been added to the churches by baptism.

The changes have been few: Mr. and Mrs. George were compelled to leave the work in January, on account of the dangerous illness of Mrs. George. Mrs. George is still in a critical condition in the Homeopathic Hospital at Providence, R. I. Let her be remembered in our prayers. Mr. George has done some work for the Society since his return. Miss Ida O. Phillips took a needed furlough to this country about one year ago, and has been working in the interest of the mission here.

The health of the other missionaries has been usually good, with the exception of Mr. Griffin and his family who are compelled to take a change for recuperation at the present time.

Every year the prospect is more cheering. The Gospel is heard with gladness, native helpers are more efficient, and the churches catch the spirit of the work. There are constant hindrances, but none which we need consider so much as those arising from lack of means to push the work even where the people hear the word gladly.

Is this going to be the case much longer? In a weak, faint-hearted way we have said, "Lift up your heads, O ye gates; even lift them up, ye everlasting doors; and the King of glory shall come in." While God says, "Bring ye all the tithes into the store-house, that there may be meat in mine house, and prove me now here-with, saith the Lord of hosts, if I will not open you the windows of heaven, and pour you out a blessing, that there shall not be room enough to receive it." God's voice is prevailing; the voice

assuring more consecration and more abundant means is in the air.

At home we have been both pained and rejoiced; pained that the poverty of our treasury prevented us from providing adequately for some special work, and that we really had to retrench.

We hope that we shall not be so handicapped again; certainly the silver and the gold, and the cattle of the thousand hills were somewhere, and morally they belonged to the mission, but our treasurer could not legally control them.

It is self-evident that the more good work that can be done by the natives the better, but it will be some time before they can be self-supporting, and the necessary expense for good work is a great deal more than the salaries of the missionaries whom we send out.

To meet the demands of the coming year, we present through our treasurer an estimate of expenses necessary to carry on the work, and confidently expect that your appropriations will be made accordingly.

We are rejoiced at the movement in progress among the young people to support Mr. and Mrs. Stiles. We are certain that this will be done, and when their work is systematized we shall have grand results; indeed, let the young people of our denomination unite heartily with the present older workers and there will be no lack of workers and means. I believe that a great wave of missionary interest is coming. Already it is apparent that the church which is not enthused with this spirit is not the church for the times. The pastor not having this spirit is not the pastor for the times.

Dear people, your opportunity is now. Remember that opportunity lost is lost forever; like the sea wave, it rises but once and sends its voice across the shores of time, and then is silent forever.

This is God's work, we have a right to ask for and expect all the instruments and means necessary to carry it forward. Let us hesitate no longer. Let us go up and possess the land.

ABSTRACT OF THE INDIA REPORT.

THE CHURCHES.

BALASORE CHURCH.—Rev. B. F. Griffin reports: Our church as a body is still "fighting the good fight of faith." Many live far beneath their privilege, but many others are faithful. Kamal Nayak is pastor another year. The church is independent of mission money, and does some mission work in way of contributions. Thirteen days of special meetings in November brought good results; some were converted. The stated meetings are well sustained. The Sabbath school, with Miss Hattie Phillips superintendent, is increasing in interest.

METRAPORE BRANCH.—This church remains about the same as last year. They are supplied on stated Sabbaths. Sabbath school and prayer-meetings are kept up. Special meetings in November were interrupted by the severe illness of Mrs. Griffin. The church labors under disadvantages, but there are some among them who have "not defiled their garments."

JELLASORE CHURCH.—Last November Dr. O. R. Bachelier came here to spend a month. Special meetings were carried on, securing a general reviving of the church. There are a large number of candidates for reinstatement, and some for baptism. Paul Nayak, a graduate of the Bible school, has been chosen pastor.

SANTIPORE CHURCH.—A series of meetings here immediately followed those at Jellasore; as a result, sixteen were baptized. Hiram Curtis is still pastor. There has been no resident missionary here this year. I visit this church once in two or three months. Dr. Nellie Phillips has charge of work connected with this community.

CHANDBALI AND BHUDRACK.—Rev. J. M. Coldren reports: These churches are hopeful. The work is steadily advancing. The regular meetings have been faithfully observed. We have many precious spiritual seasons. Titus has been working hard among the Teligoos. Dubrage is doing a good work in Bhudrack,

DAINMARI CHURCH.—Sachidananda reports: Last year Mr. George was in charge, but many other duties kept him from visiting the church often. I go there once a month. Seven years ago the name of the true God was not known here. Now, every Sabbath morning and afternoon a small company of God's chil-

dren come together to worship. During the seven years, seven Hindu families have joined this church and others are now seeking to do so. These Christians are hindered by ignorance, and by the proscriptions of labor, by the Hindus. No Hindu will work for a Christian.

PALASBANI CHURCH.—This church is few in numbers. The removal of the pastor Tuphan, to Midnapore, and other members to other churches, lessened the membership. They keep the Sabbath services without a pastor. They repaired the chapel at their own expense. Some of them, while going about on personal business, have preached the Gospel and done good.

BABAIGADIA CHURCH.—It is eight miles from Dainmari, and I visit both churches on the same tour. This church is not as fruitful as is desired, yet the work is not discouraging. Brother Jhampad is a good helper. He leads Sabbath and other religious meetings. There is a good school here, both for Christian and Hindu boys.

MIDNAPORE CHURCH.—Jacob Mishra reports: God's supply has been bountiful this year. Babu J. B. Bhattacharjee, Babu Sachidananda Rai, Rev. F. D. George, and Dr. O. R. Bachelor, have helped in supplying the pulpit. In the Sabbath school Miss Coombs and Dr. and Mrs. Bachelor have rendered help, also a number of native brothers and sisters. The young men have done good work. Disunion and uncharitable works have disappeared. Some have put on Christ in baptism. Example goes farther than precept there. A native Friday evening prayer-meeting has been instituted. A Home Mission fund has been established. Mrs. Bachelor is working hard for our Christian boys. Pray for us. The Sabbath school has been well attended. Have followed the International lessons prepared by Mrs. Burkholder, also pictures from the Prov. Lithograph Co. Six from the school baptized during she year.

BHIMPORE CHURCH.—Rev. T. W. Burkholder reports: Some have been added to the church, two fallen away, two died. Quite a number give a tenth to the Lord. The church has met all current expenses during the year, including repairs costing Rs. 80, also something has been done toward supporting a young man of the church as preacher. The people grow more earnest and spiritual. The interest in the Sabbath school was kept up during the year. The majority of additions to the church during the year have come from the Sabbath school.

GADALOTA CHURCH.—This little church has met with trial. The young man in charge was unfaithful; the flock was alone for a while, but they have done well considering the circumstances. Two young men of this church are in the Bible school. Four were baptized here in February. Pray for them. The Sabbath school has been kept up during the year. We were helped by the last session of the Midnapore Quarterly Meeting.

SCHOOLS.

CHANDBALI SCHOOLS.—Mr. Coldren reports: This school is becoming more popular and far less objectionable to orthodox Hindus. Some hindrances have been removed. Two boys passed government examination in the first grade. The school is doing well.

BALASORE INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL.—Mr. Griffin reports: This is most prosperous and has secured a government grant. The Inspector and Joint Inspector speak words of encouragement. We are putting up a good shop.

BALASORE BOYS' ORPHANAGE.—There are thirteen boys in the orphanage. One died during the year. All the boys are learning trades. One has graduated from the mission school.

BHIMPORE TRAINING SCHOOL.—Mr. Burkholder writes: One hundred and five on the rolls,—seventy-two boys and thirty-three girls. The year has witnessed trials and death. Some were sent up to government examinations. The Bible is taught regularly.

The Industrial Department has been carried on also. The pottery industry was suspended on account of its cost; the other branches have gone on. Thanks to home friends who have aided us.

THE SANTAL JUNGLE SCHOOLS.—There was a falling off for lack of funds usually covered by government grant. Fifty-two schools were kept up, in which were 1428 pupils,—166 Hindus, 963 Santal boys, 247 girls, and 52 Christians. We lack good faithful teachers here of sufficient number to do the work. Thanks to those at home who have helped us.

MIDNAPORE CHRISTIAN SCHOOL.—Mrs. Bachelor reports: On Feb. 1, it seemed desirable to have the children of our native Christians in a school by themselves. The school is in a large school-house close to our own. It numbers forty pupils three years and under to twenty-five or thirty year- of age, two being

the wives of Bible students. A Bengali pundit comes in to teach pronunciation one-half hour.

THE BIBLE SCHOOL.—Dr. Bachelor reports: The term of 1887 continued through eight months, with a mid-term vacation of two weeks. An extra month was given the students. The term opened with sixteen, one was expelled; only one case of discipline has occurred. Thorough work has been done. Two were graduated, both very promising. Instruction was arranged as follows: The two higher classes in the Bible and Church History; Lectures on various subjects, and an hour's daily drill in Sanscrit for the whole school, O. R. Bachelor; two classes in the Bible, F. D. George; higher classes in English, Mrs. Bachelor; lower classes in English, Miss Butts; Sanscrit, mathematics, and Bengali literature, Samuel Dass. In women's department—Head Master, Samuel Dass; Bible teacher, Joseph Fullonton; pupil teacher in arithmetic, Bhim Marndi. A vocal music teacher was employed for two months. After school duties are over the young men go out every day with the preachers to sing, read, or listen to the preaching. We aim to give a practical training. The woman's department numbered twenty-five,—wives of students and young women employed in the zenanas and day schools.

WOMAN'S WORK.

CHANDBALL.—Mrs. Coldren reports: Two Bible women have been employed all the year, and part of the time three. The outlook is more encouraging than a year ago. The first woman began studying Bengali in December, soon after several others in Oriya; seven in all have been reading, one a Mussulmani. Opportunities to work among this people are less than among the Hindus. The Bible women visit several different villages, and find many who would embrace Christianity were it not for caste.

BHADRACK.—Last year, of the eight girls of the first class who attended government examinations six passed. The school has not done so well the past year on account of a change in teachers. Forty-three pupils were reported last January. Two teachers, a woman servant, and a Bible woman, do work here. Means have been provided for the work.

BALASORE HINDU GIRLS' SCHOOL.—Miss Hooper reports: The school-houses swept away by the cyclone of last year are not all rebuilt yet, but the Lord is blessing the work and it is moving forward. An inspectress for the girls' school in the district of

Balasore is giving new impetus to the education of Hindu girls. There are nearly one hundred new pupils already. All the girls have passed in the first division. Two went up for the upper primary examination. Five of the little girls who went for the examination are married, one of them only ten years old. In connection with the week day schools are four Sabbath schools. Work with the children usually leads into the house. The Bible women, supported by the Woman's Mission Society of New Brunswick, is engaged in this house-to-house visitation. The good seed is being sown here, and it finds reception.

MIDNAPORE RAGGED SCHOOLS.—Miss Coombs reports: The number is precisely the same as last year. There are nearly 400 pupils on the roll, 115 of them, girls. The schools number sixteen, nine of them in or near Midnapore. A new school-house is being built at a farmers' village about two miles from Midnapore. They ask for a Christian teacher there. Sumbhu Nath Jenna, a Bible school graduate, has served faithfully as inspector for the past three years. He examines the Midnapore schools in their secular studies, and also in the catechism, once a month. Those outside are examined once in two months.

At Christmas time, J. B. Bhattacharjee, a Christian Bengali gentleman of Midnapore, interested himself in raising a good amount of funds for us for the general expenses of the school. My visit to the two schools near Dainmari, just after Christmas, was very interesting. The Hindus there have been bitter against the Christians, but this is lessening.

The "Bessie Peckham School" is rejoicing in a new school-house, built by the society at Great Falls, N. H. Twenty-two from the Midnapore schools passed government examination. A generous gift from the Cary Missionary Society connected with the Bible School, and one from the Press Fund, enabled us to wipe off all old debts at the end of the year. Expenses all paid for the last quarter. Would like to correspond with any one who would like to work for a school as a specialty. Thanks for help.

THE INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL.—Mrs. H. M. Bachelor reports: The Midnapore Industrial School fell into my hands at the departure of Mrs. George. The average is smaller than last year, owing to the new school for the children of Christian parents. The school is divided into three departments. A good native pundit has charge of each. Beside these, another pundit is employed for two hours each morning in Bible teaching. Rope-making and

sewing are the industries now taught. Irregular attendance is a hindrance to the work. The boys attending this school are also expected to attend Sabbath school in the chapel.

SANTIPORE SCHOOLS.—Miss Nellie Phillips reports: I visit this place at intervals and keep track of the schools. A Hindu man teaches sewing and Hiram, the pastor, oversees four outside schools, besides doing his pastoral work. Last year, five of the six boys sent up for examination passed. The catechism is taught, and Christian hymns are chanted.

BALASORE.—Miss H. P. Phillips reports: The zenana work in Balasore has the same number of teachers as last year, viz., ten. Two were dismissed for inefficiency, and others took their place. The work has given much satisfaction. The Normal class continues, for teachers who have not yet passed all their examinations. Two hundred pupils have been taught during the year. About one hundred and forty attend now. Very few except those unable to pay ask for free instruction. Nearly all of these pupils profess belief in God, though none of them have publicly confessed it. My heathen Sabbath school has decreased in numbers; the reason assigned is that there are no more pictures given out monthly. I hope that the next box from home will bring a fresh supply. Our Christian Sabbath school work has been very interesting. The workers are becoming more engaged in the work. During six months the children contributed enough to buy a good clock for the chapel. We need some Christian organization for the boys. Weekly meetings of Sabbath school teachers continue under my direction.

Mrs. Griffin's report: The work of the librarians and Bible women has gone on steadily. We have four women now at work. They work principally in the zenanas. They have established a prayer-meeting among the women, which is doing good. The Russell Memorial School was established in memory of Sister Russell, formerly of Champlin, Minn. We have a good teacher over it. On account of the illness of Miss Dessa's mother, she has been with me only a small part of the year. She is now helping Mrs. Smith for three months. We hope that her connection with the mission will from this time be permanent. We send thanks to those giving for Miss Dessa's support, for teachers, and other work.

BALASORE GIRLS' ORPHANAGE.—Mrs. Smith reports: There are twenty-seven children connected with this institution, includ-

ing one in Christ's Church School in Calcutta. Help is given to four others to enable their parents to keep them in school. Health of the children has been good. All repairs are completed on the building. A brick wall to enclose the dormitories is needed. This is donated to the Woman's Mission Society through the generosity of Rev. J. L. Sinclair, late of New Hampshire.

The Balasore Girls' School, with which the orphanage is associated, has been removed to this place. There are sixty names on the attendance roll, and good progress is made. Five out of seven sent up to examinations passed. The Industrial department is working satisfactorily. The six schools in and about Jellasore, under my charge, are doing well. Time for better oversight would improve them. It is difficult to secure good Christian pundits.

Bible Work: Six women are at work as Bible readers. There is much to encourage in this work, but we desire to see more self-denying devotion on their part. The prospect is hopeful.

BHIMPORE.—Mrs. T. W. Burkholder reports:—

Work Among the Lowly: Different departments of work have been kept up with occasional interruptions. Our Christian women have carried on village visitation the whole year here and at the branch church. Bible class was sustained for eight months. Our day school has been sustained. Twelve or thirteen promoted from the Primary to the Normal school. Three girls went up to government examinations. Industries taught as last year. Two of our young men conduct the Sabbath afternoon children's meetings. Our Sewing Society has used its funds for furnishing clothing for poor children at Christmas. This year it bought two good chairs for the church. A Santal girl fifteen or sixteen years old, and daughter of the head man of a village near by, joined our church, professing her faith in Christ. Every Wednesday morning we have a half-hour service for the children of the church.

MIDNAPORE ZENANAS.—Miss Coombs reports: I have been able to devote more time than formerly to zenana work. At the end of March there are on the roll 173 names, the whole number taught during the year being 238; more than ever before. The work is divided into nine parts, two teachers employed at a part. Many of them have to ride to and from their work. This work is having a deep and lasting effect. Many are deeply interested in Christian books and religious instruction. Instruction in En-

English is called for more this year than ever before by the wives of men in high position. Work of the Bible women in Midnapore has been carried on only during the Bible School vacation, as they were pupils in the woman's department. Those in Dainmari and Babaigadia have been at work the whole year. This branch of work has been opened again at Palasbani. The Zenana Library has been opened only about five months during the year, as a suitable person to care for it is hard to find. Thanks to friends who have written to teachers whom they support.

The Girls' English School has had its "ups and downs." The largest number on the roll has been nineteen; the smallest, nine. The present number is thirteen. We lose the services of Miss Smith, who goes to Darjeeling to teach. Since January I have taught two hours a day in the school, having some assistance. Shortage was partially made up by a donation from the Magistrate, the remainder I advanced.

Miss Butts reports: The woman's department of the Bible School has been nominally under my charge, but being a beginner my supervision was exercised only indirectly. This department is composed of wives of Bible School students, and some of the zenana teachers. School hours are in the afternoon. Classes range from the "Primer" to the Grammar School grade. Mothers work with their babies about them. They have much perseverance. Every Wednesday afternoon, instead of the usual classes, the women have a prayer-meeting, after which there is a sewing class. Miss Coombs has charge of this work. Mrs. H. M. Bachelor and myself assist her. There are various degrees of proficiency among the pupils. This is an important work. Pray for these women and those who teach them.

BALASORE.—Mrs. Boyer reports: Early in this year I opened a school for high-caste girls in my house. Six children came, representing the best Bengali families in Balasore. Two Christian children and two Eurasians have been added since. A Christian pundit instructs in Bengali, Oriya, and English, while I teach them sewing, knitting, etc. They are much interested in Bible stories. Through the children I have been enabled to visit every zenana represented. The babus have little faith in their gods. The school is almost self-supporting.

EVANGELISTIC WORK.

BALASORE.—Z. F. Griffin reports:—

Bazar Preaching: One year ago Mr. Boyer took charge of this work, I have gone when opportunity was afforded.

District Work: In this work there are encouragements and discouragements. Where Brahmin influence is great, listeners are not so numerous. We often gather a company by talking with one or two. Joseph Fullonton, a graduate from the Bible School last year, is appointed to do country work entirely this year, and is now engaged in it. Bro. Brown of Hillsdale supports a native teacher who accompanies him. The boat spoken of last year is nearly paid for. Baptized two from the ranks of the heathen during the year.

BALASORE.—A. B. Boyer reports: My principal work this year has been with the Oriya language. I have attended the bazar daily with a native preacher, have done some village work and tract selling, and used what opportunity I had with native gentlemen in English. Work is increasingly interesting. The bazar preaching has done much good here,—the majority of those who listen go away convicted that Christianity is true. Babu Daniel Nayak, hitherto a teacher, decided in February to preach, and the ladies of New Brunswick guaranteed his support. I express thanks for this provided native helper. The end of my first year's work here leaves me with the following impressions:

1. Our field needs more workers, — educated, consecrated preachers.
2. Mission work in India has many difficulties that one who has not seen it can never know.
3. The primary work of a missionary is preaching in a limited sense. Too much time is encumbered with indirect mission work.
4. I believe the time is not far off when these people will come in large numbers to Christ.

CHANDBALL.—Mr. Coldren reports: There is a rapidly growing interest in the work. The workers are continually finding special cases, and in consequence are greatly encouraged. We are welcomed in villages where eight years ago we were opposed. I believe God is especially preparing the people of this district to receive the Gospel. Wonderful progress has been made in the last eight years, especially in the spirituality of the missionaries

and native preachers. Bro. Boyer and myself spent nearly a month in village work. We attended one large festival five days, preaching morning and evening. Some of the time there were no less than ten thousand people present. Over three hundred sermons were preached in the form of tracts and gospels sold. We took the names of those especially interested, that we might visit them in their homes.

Sadar, a man about thirty-eight years old, is doing a grand work. He was given a new turn in his religious life eight years ago by reading a tract, "The Refuter of Caste." He preaches no caste, that all are children of the same Father, and that the Son of God is the only Saviour. He has large faith, and has a following of about five thousand in forty different villages. He has sold all he had and given it to the poor and depends upon God. He believes that the majority in these villages will come to Christ. Let us pray that they will.

MIDNAPORE.—Dr. Bachelier reports: This work has been prosecuted with increased earnestness. During Bible School session, two and sometimes three daily working parties have occupied different prominent parts of the town. There has been good preaching, and many thousands of people have listened. The singing class in the Bible School of last year has been an efficient agency in collecting the people together. A Mohammedan preacher from Calcutta gathered daily congregations at our preaching places. We feared he would hinder our work, but he helped us, as he disgusted the Hindus, preached sect, and the people saw the difference between that and the godliness of Christianity. We have done less among the Santals than formerly. Government provides cheap liquor for the poor, consequently the Santals are addicted to drunkenness, greatly retarding Christian teaching among them. We employ Santal students to assist at the bazar. House-to-house visitation has not been neglected. During cold season the students have accompanied the native preachers in country tours with much encouragement.

Sachidananda Rai's report: Last year I preached the Gospel to the heathen, both in towns and villages. The Word of God is working among the heathen like leaven. Sometimes I preach in markets and festivals, sometimes from house to house. A hearty prayer in the home after conversation makes a solemn impression on the minds of the people. They are unfamiliar with the Christian's mode of prayer, face to face with God. Last year I found

four different places for preaching. I went with Dr. H. M. Bachelier to each place by turn every night. Sometimes a few of the Bible School students accompanied us. Dr. Bachelier's cornet helped to draw the audiences. Bedua, a suburban village of Midnapore, receives us gladly, being much attached to Christians through the medical treatment of Dr. O. R. Bachelier. This year we have begun to build a house there for school purposes and preaching.

ENGLISH WORK.

CHANDBALI.—Mr. Coldren reports: The services have been continued Sabbath evenings during the year, and have been a blessing; the Spirit's power is manifest.

BALASORE.—Mr. Griffin reports: English preaching has been maintained during the year with various interruptions, Mr. Boyer and myself alternating. English people in Government employment are mainly Church of England in their worship, and are indifferent to dissenting services. We trust good has been done for the English-speaking natives.

MIDNAPORE.—Mr. George reports: English preaching was carried on regularly during the Bible School session. Several lectures have been given to the school-boys of the town. They were well received. Two, one by Dr. H. M. Bachelier and one by myself, had the aid of the magic lantern. About two hundred attended. The class in Sabbath school now numbers about fifty,—one class in English and one in Bengali. Dr. H. M. Bachelier now has charge of the work, also of the "Progress." This paper is taken by about eighty babus. The sale of English pamphlets furnished me by the Madras Tract Society, has been successful. English Testaments, Bibles, and other good books, find ready sale.

REV. Z. F. GRIFFIN'S REPORT OF THE CYCLONE.

May 26 began with a drizzling rain, which gradually increased as the day wore away, until, at dark, the rain literally poured. We had no apprehension of anything more than a severe storm, until we went up stairs to retire at nine o'clock in the evening. Mrs. Griffin and the children went to bed and to sleep, but I saw the wind was rising, and concluded to watch. At eleven o'clock the roar was such outside that I thought it safer to go down stairs, as I was sure we were in for a cyclone. All night we worked, barricading doors, and all night the storm continued to increase in violence. At the first dawn of the day, I looked out

and saw that the out-buildings were standing; but very soon after the wind suddenly veered to the west, and in one gust the greater part of the buildings were leveled to the ground or unroofed. The work of rescuing our orphan boys and the people of the village began as soon as we could see. In our house, and in the brick school-house and church, all who needed it found temporary shelter. The damage done to Mission property in Balasore was not far short of Rs. 800. When we think that just a few miles east of us, on the Bay of Bengal, the steamer "Sir John Lawrence" went down with eight hundred passengers, and not one was left to tell the tale, we think we have cause for gratitude that the loss to us was so slight. Jellasore and Santipore sent letters calling for help, and as soon as possible I visited them. The damage at the latter place was slight, but Jellasore suffered considerably. The greatest strength of the cyclone, on the land, was at Balasore.

THE MISSION PRESS.

Mr. George reports: After three years I am called to give up charge of the Press. I have done the best I knew while connected with this department of the work. I have labored to do more direct mission work with it: The Sabbath school lesson papers prepared by Mrs. Burkholder, also a little book called "Daily Food" prepared by her, were printed here. Another edition of a tract called "A Search for a Perfect Religion," was called for and 3000 copies printed. Dr. Warren of Boston University is the author. It has been in great demand. Financially the Press has succeeded, voting at the close of the year 600 Rupees to other mission objects.

Note. As Mr. George suggests, it is very desirable that the Press do more direct mission work. We are pledged to do this just so far as funds can be secured. Our people seem to have forgotten that we have a "Bible and Tract Department." We very much need a little help to enable us to print tracts and portions of the Scripture in Bengali and Santal. We have just finished Luke in Santal and wished to follow at once with Acts, but are obliged to stop for want of funds. We hope our friends will not forget us.

MEDICAL WORK.

Miss N. M. Phillips reports: On account of the unreliable condition of my health, I availed myself of an opportunity to attend the Medical College in Calcutta. I went in July and remained until the middle of September. Dr. Coates, the Principal of the college, showed me much kindness, and admitted me free of charge to the three dispensaries and wards of the hospitals connected with the college. I spent a month in the hills immediately after and returned to my work with health recovered and valuable knowledge acquired.

I have opened a dispensary in Balasore, and I have occasional calls to patients outside. Rev. B. F. Zells's church in Ohio sent a liberal contribution, which came just when I was in need of a new building in which to carry on my medical work. This is now practically completed. The work thus far is more nearly self-supporting than it was at Santipore.

MIDNAPORE DISPENSARY.—H. M. Bachelier reports: The number of applications by patients varies but little from year to year. Eight or ten apply daily upon an average. Fever and skin eruptions are prevailing diseases. We make a little profit on the fever medicine, which is in large demand. The system of paying for medicine is in advance of free distribution, regarding both as charity. We gain a more intimate acquaintance with the natives through our dispensary.

HOME MISSION SOCIETY.

Report of the Home Mission Society.

CORRESPONDING SECRETARY'S REPORT.

The correspondence for the year ending September 1, 1888, was commenced by Rev. O. E. Baker, who, at the end of six months, tendered his resignation as Corresponding Secretary to engage in pastoral and mission work in Lincoln, Neb. The gathering up of the results of the year's work will not be as easy or as fruitful and satisfactory as it would have been had Bro. Baker been able to continue in office and follow up the work he so well commenced. However, with some general knowledge of the field, we shall be able to give some outlines of the work accomplished.

In the Kansas, Nebraska, Iowa, and Minnesota Yearly Meetings, a certain sum was appropriated on condition that said Yearly Meetings should raise within their borders and appropriate a similar amount, and the appropriations have been paid only where the Treasurer has been satisfied that the conditions have been complied with. While in these States much more might easily have been accomplished, had we been possessed of the necessary funds, yet we have occasion to feel that with what we could furnish, a good degree of success has been attained. New and important points have been occupied, and the work has crystallized at some points heretofore entered upon. Lincoln, Neb., is now under the guiding hand of Bro. Baker, whose attachment to the West, and devotion to the cause of Christ, are auguries of future success there. He writes that eleven new members have been received since his pastorate commenced, that the Sunday-school has increased twenty, and that he has evidence that a good religious interest is already awakening in his audience. Oakland, Cal., has been taken under the fostering care of this Society, and, with such a leader as Dr. Penney, should not be left without assistance until able to care for itself and exercise in turn a fostering care over other interests which are sure to spring up on the Pacific coast. Bro. Penney writes: "We have a name, a place, and a recognition among the churches, but can

go on only by the help of the Home Mission Society." God has blessed Bro. J. S. Manning, in his ripening years, with good health and an open door for service the past year. Beside his usual care for the Cairo Mission he has spent some months in Louisiana, where he was greeted by many anxious workers, whose hearts were cheered by his coming and who received new inspiration for their service, as their letters to the officers of the Board testify. May he be spared for many more years of happy service. Bro. M. A. Shepard with a notable generosity and without expense to the Society has traveled hundreds of miles and done a good work among the churches of the Mississippi Valley. Crises in the existence of the churches in Concord and Manchester, N. H., have arisen during the past year, where material aid from this Society made it possible to tide them over breakers which might have proved their ruin. That help has been rendered, and these churches now have a bright prospect before them, the former having purchased a lot and built thereon, completing the vestries, in one of the finest locations in the city, and the latter having arranged for a complete payment of a heavy debt which threatened to destroy its usefulness if not its life. The work at Storer College and in the Shenandoah Valley, under the direction of Rev. N. C. Brackett, has been going on without interruption, but it has had and will need for years to come the sympathy, prayers, and material aid of every lover of the denomination. We must never be forgetful of the agony our fathers experienced over the horrors of American slavery, and in no better way can we express our remembrance of their experiences and toils than by entering and faithfully occupying the fields which emancipation opened to us. The novelty of the work may have worn away during the more than a score of years which have passed, but the need of service to God, our country, and humanity, still remains, and it appeals to our piety, our patriotism, and our philanthropy. We shall be unworthy sons of noble sires if we allow this work to languish upon our hands. The Morrell endowment fund ought to be completed at once. This would relieve Storer College of all anxiety in raising the president's salary, and leave several hundred dollars of Home Mission funds to be turned into other channels.

The church extension fund has been found very valuable in aiding certain important interests in Nebraska, Missouri, and other States and Territories. If every church would make it a

point to do *something* each year in this direction, this society might be able to render great assistance by its loans to churches until the days of their pressure are past and they are able to assume their own responsibility for building. We suggest that the first Sabbath in October be hereafter set apart each year as the time when the churches throughout the denomination be asked to contribute to the Church Extension fund. The question has been raised by some of our best workers whether the raising of funds by this Society, in common with the several local societies, is not a hinderance to both, rather than a benefit. The local work should be carried forward with zeal, and the funds to carry the Gospel into the regions beyond should be clearly presented. But we have come to believe that donations will be larger and more numerous when the two objects are presented separately. With a firm trust in God and a greater devotion to his service, let us go forward to the work of the coming year,

Report of the Education Society.

CORRESPONDING SECRETARY'S REPORT.

Four great classes of truths are taught, according to Sir James Paget, by "Scientific Education: those of the power of observation; of accuracy; of the difficulty of getting a knowledge of real truth; and of methods by which we can pass from that which is proved to the thinking of that which is possible. How difficult it is really to observe, is proved by every scientific discovery that is made; for each such discovery rests upon the clear observation of facts that have been within the range of sight of many, but previously overlooked." Can these principles of investigation and thought find a more ample and more useful field of search and work than in the domain of *religion*? There the subject matter is the grandest,—man's nature and his possibilities, God's purposes and his inscrutable character; the method of procedure is the deepest, applying, as it does, the never failing resources of Gospel truth to the ever changing needs of society, and of each soul. God's remedy must be brought from a book to be mastered. The Book stands reaching its truth to us in two unknown tongues. While the effectiveness of the message will depend upon what we *are* quite as much as upon what we *have*. The minister must know the book, himself, his age, and back of his knowledge *he* must stand a man, spotless and strong, and with old-fashioned common sense, wisely apply apt truth, eloquently if he can, to congregations, and turning, with the simplicity of a child, whisper directions that can not be mistaken into the dull ear of the dying. The ministry will seek thorough education. Shall *our* ministry be educated in *our* schools?

I believe that our people have answered this question *Yes*, by their zeal for the denominational schools in the year just passed. I report as corresponding secretary of the Education Society, looking East and West and over to India, general activity and life in educational interests with a resolute and manly reception of the needs which are coming to the surface.

I turn and greet with delight the birth of our youngest institution of learning. Aug. 21, 1888, the corner-stone of Keuka

College was laid at Lake Keuka, near Penn Yan, Yates Co., N. Y., in the presence of 4,000 persons. Dr's Geo. H. Ball, D. Henry Palmer, and Senator Warner Miller made enthusiastic addresses. The Central Association has emerged into a new era of its educational development. They now ask public spirited men of the denomination to purchase the building lots offered there for the completion of the endowment of the institution. Winnebago City College of Southern Minnesota makes the same offer of lots to complete its endowment. Last week this college was publicly dedicated with a ringing address by Dr. Dunn; and the Rev. A. J. Marshall begins his office as president with the brightest of auspices. A church was at once formed, and the peculiarly religious character of our educational work indicated. Indeed President Davis of Rio Grande College voices the universal experience of our people in the statement, "Some of the best young church members in the Ohio River Y. M. were converted at Rio Grande College, and carried thence their church letters to their home churches. Often, also, young persons who, at home, are entirely outside our borders of influence, are converted at school, and ally themselves for life with the people who, while furnishing food for their minds also brought the love of God to their hearts." Rio Grande College is doing excellent local work. It sprang from a gift of property of about \$100,000 in value. Of this a portion was used in erecting two substantial buildings, and a balance with interest accrued amounts to \$75,000 endowment at present. Hillsdale College, with its \$300,000 (half in buildings, half in endowment), with its annual income of \$12,000, finds its work greater than its resources. At Evansville, Wis., Oct. 19, 1887, the Western Association created an Educational Board consisting of G. R. Holt, G. F. Mosher, E. J. Reese, A. D. Sandborn, F. W. Washburn, H. J. Brown, A. J. Marshall, J. J. Hall, B. F. McKenney, L. C. Chase, E. O. Dickinson, E. J. Mawhorter, H. M. Ford, J. M. Davis, and O. D. Patch. They adopted the motion: "That all schools now existing be placed under the care and supervision of this Board, which shall be empowered to classify them, as to courses of study, so as to bring them into a harmonious relation in work; and further, it shall be a special work of this Board to secure funds, and direct agencies in securing endowments for them."

The West Virginia College, at Flemington, is thriving under the wise direction of Rev. Thomas E. Peden. He writes:

"I have been here but little over a year. Our attendance has more than doubled, and extensive repairs have been made. Among the 129 students two are studying for the ministry, one a Freewill Baptist. If the Society is able and willing to aid in building up a school in West Virginia for all who will avail themselves of its privileges, the assistance will be gladly and thankfully accepted." Harper's Ferry has ten students for the ministry, five of whom received last year \$175 in aid. Prof. Brackett writes: "One of our greatest needs is a thoroughly educated man of the right spirit to teach young men who have the ministry in view. We have had during the year a good religious interest and a fair manifestation of missionary zeal. We are feeling more than ever before the need of earnest, devout young men and women to enter the whitening fields about us." The India Bible School has had sixteen male and twenty-five female students; 3,058 pupils have come for instruction to the various secular schools provided by our missionary stations. Dr. Phillips writes: "The graduates of our Bible School are generally doing well, and are a credit to the mission. We need a *hall* which may cost \$5,000, a small part of which is already in hand. Let us pick our men very carefully, aiding only the worthy in America and India both."

In New England the rally to complete the endowment of Bates College has overshadowed all other educational work. Yet we must not forget the \$5,000 assumed by the Society to secure for our Vermont interests the fine school at Lyndon Centre. Last year Lyndon Institute reported over 200 students. Maine Central Institute is prosperous. At Austin Academy, at Centre Strafford, good learning is still dispensed. Last week I visited with friends the old Smithville Seminary, at North Scituate, R. I. The buildings rose in their unique beauty before us. Time with its restless tooth has not been allowed to eat away the fresh whiteness of the walls. All is in good repair as when Hosea Quinby's voice rang clear and strong through those halls. But all is wrapped in silence. (Bates College can realize quite a sum towards its endowment if this school and grounds can find a purchaser who will use it for a school or other respectable purposes.) New Hampton Institute has exhibited wonderful vigor in its green old age. Although New Hampshire has raised over \$4,000 within its borders towards the endowment of Bates College, it has purchased the fine mansion house of Col. R. G. Lewis for a ladies'

boarding hall, and put an agent in the State to finish raising the sum with \$1,500 additional for repairs. Nichols Latin School at Lewiston needs a building of its own. It reports the largest classes the school ever had; eight are students for the Christian ministry. The completion of the \$100,000 endowment for Bates College has been carried steadily forward through the year. The sum will soon be reached, and the \$30,000 conditional for the new observatory be secured as well. The great need just now is for the completion of the endowment of the Fullonton Chair, for which only half of the \$25,000 needed has been raised. There are thirty students for the ministry in the theological department of the college, and twenty-two besides in the college itself. The Society has disbursed \$1,386 for the aid of students for the ministry in the past year.

Let us remember that these denominational schools are ours, and that in their lap lies the future of our Zion. Arise, brethren, and build the wall, every man opposite his own door, and the whole city shall have ramparts worthy of us and of God.

AN ABSTRACT OF THE ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CORRESPONDING SECRETARY, REV. H. F. WOOD, READ AT LACONIA, N. H., OCT. 4, 1888.

I have not attempted this year to obtain a full statistical report of our Sunday-school work. This has been attempted in other years, but the effort has not been attended with very satisfactory results. This year we have attempted to secure only a general report of the conditions of the Sunday-school work of our denomination. And the reports have never been more in number or more satisfactory in character than the present year. Some time since I sent to clerks of Quarterly and Yearly Meetings and Associations, and to leading Sunday-school workers in every part of the denomination, asking for a general report of the Sunday-school work in their several localities. The responses have been numerous from every part of the field.

IMPROVEMENTS.—In many ways there have been perceptible and commendable improvements, and many of the schools report increase in numbers. We have better methods and better teachers, and more has been done in the holding of institutes, conventions, and normal unions.

TEACHERS' MEETINGS.—Comparatively few of our schools hold teachers' meetings regularly. In some of our churches the lesson for the following Sunday is made the theme of one of the evening meetings. In many places, union teachers' meetings are held Saturday afternoons with great success.

CHILDREN'S DAY.—The people are coming to understand what these words mean, and the results of properly observing such days can be measured only in eternity. No church or Sunday-school can afford to omit such observances.

CONVERSIONS.—Far too many of our schools report no conversions; but we are glad to note that many, and more than in any other year, report conversions.

THE YOUNG MEN.—The reports show the sad fact that few of our schools hold the young men, and they in too many of our schools graduate early.

LITERATURE.—Many of our schools are using Sunday-school publications other than our own, and it seems to us without sufficient reason. They themselves being judges, they are not justified in this; for their own written testimonies condemn their action in this regard. While Cook's publications are *cheaper* in price, for real worth ours are the cheapest. Before complaining any more of lack of denominational growth, let us learn to be loyal to our own people, and especially to our own publishing house. The maximum in quality for the minimum in price is not always an economical rule to follow. But I am glad to be able to report that the number of schools using publications other than our own is growing less every year. Our schools are coming to appreciate the excellence of our publications, and to know that they are among the best, to say the least, and that they are the very best for Free Baptists, whatever they may cost. Our publications are constantly improving in quality, and this important fact our schools now recognize. The circulation of our publications among our own people depends very largely on the attitude our pastors take towards them.

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2d. Its Modernness. New light is continually being thrown upon the Scriptures by the researches of travelers who have visited every region on which the light of revelation originally shone, by investigation in science, the expository labors of scholars and critics, and the discovery and deciphering of ancient inscriptions, monuments, and manuscripts, thus rendering the Commentaries of former days comparatively useless.

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
